An Uneasy Peace In Middle East

(Ed. Note: John Gruber, music critic for The Herald, is now on an extended cruise in the Mediterranean aboard the Norwegian ship Concordiaford. Here he describes his visit to Syria, and his impressions of the Middle East situation.)

BEIRUT, Lebanon (Delayed) — It's an uneasy peace that lays over the Middle East these days. Back in Connecticut, the dispatches from this area seem remote and vague, but they're real enough in actual fact. No that we have a raging holocaust of war, rather it is a sort of mountain feud, where everyone is very careful.

I first became aware of how uneasy things were in Latakia, Syria. Incidentally, it's pronounced La-TAKHEE-ya, and not La-KEY-ya, as in the cigarette advertisement. Latakia is Syria's most important port by the way.

Early in the morning we were coming into port. I was wondering how a Syrian pilot, a Newscaster and a German at the helm would communicate. They used English, a couple of tapes were humming and puffing, pulling and pushing in the manner of tug boats everywhere.

So happens that I have a method of indexing my slides somewhat unusual manner. I use the flag of each country as I take there. So I climbed on the flying bridge to get an unobstructed shot of the flag flying on our main mast with its three stripes and three stars.

Of course I was visible to any and all, whether on shipboard or on shore, but I thought nothing of it. The Syrians, however, did think something of it.

Somewhat later there were four soldiers on board, under a corporal, as nearly as I could judge. Since all sorts of people in uniform come aboard (immigration, customs, quarantine, port police, and so on), I thought nothing of it. They were directly to the captain, and in short order the passengers were being questioned as to who had taken pictures of the harbor installations.

It is significant that the vote on this bill was the only party-line roll call in the House during the "trailer" session. The Republicans had enough votes to prevent passage and the bill failed to get the required 118 votes (the count was 100 to 59, with four Republicans voting with the Democrats). The impression left in the minds of some legislators was that the governor had been in for excuses to veto bills this year. Why?

Expect State Will Receive Claim Money

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP)—Connecticut's attorney general says he expects the state to get about half a million dollars as its part of the settlement of a federal antitrust case against five major drug companies.

Att. Gen. Robert K. Killian said Thursday he expects between 250,000 and 300,000 for the state within three months after claims filed by the State Welfare Department.

Another \$250,000 is expected to go into the state's general fund as a result of claims not yet made.

Guests Evacuated
GREENWICH, Conn. (AP)—About 150 guests were evacuated from the Shovelbait Inn hotel when fire broke out about 4 a.m. today.

Damage was estimated at about \$10,000. The blaze apparently began in the kitchen area where some grease in a venting system caught fire.

Fire officials said flames shot through a duct at the top of the two-story structure and burned a hole in the roof of the Inn on Shovelbait Road.

No injuries were reported. Firemen worked for about one hour to quell the "difficult" blaze.

HARTFORD (AP)—Federal marshals arrested a Hartford grocer Thursday on charges of unlawfully obtaining and possessing federal food stamps.

Paul S. Shurabawa, Assistant U.S. Attorney announced the arrest of Jose Montanez, owner of Yaruba Market on Albany Avenue, who he said bought food stamps with a face value of \$120 at a cost of \$60. Shurabawa said Montanez then turned in the stamps for their face value.

Montanez was released on a \$5,000 non-surety bond. The U.S. Department of Agriculture is carrying out investigations at some 225 retail stores in about 23 Connecticut towns.

Hearing Set For Changes In Rail Fare

First, we do not believe anyone can seriously question the worthwhileness of the gigantic investment—investment of all kinds—this country has made in the moon program.

Second, it should also now be agreed that we can now afford to relax into a regularly-sustained but non-crash-type program of experience and exploration in space. It is said that a budget of \$4,000,000,000 a year will enable us to maintain a very respectable rate of such experience and exploration. It can be agreed that this much we can and should afford. It can also be agreed that we no longer need to function with specific time schedules ahead of us to which we stand publicly committed so that, we have to make an effort to adhere to them, to catch up to them, no matter how things go or whatever other national priorities may have claim on either our money or our energy.

Third, it is completely valid and legitimate to argue that, having shown ourselves what we can do in pursuit of such a specific glamor objective as putting a man on the moon, there is no longer the slightest excuse for us—although there will remain, perhaps, almost as many human nature obstacles as ever—to keep on flunking the task of putting millions of ordinary men, women and children on their feet on this earth. By "on their feet" we mean, of course, in a positive sense, that their full part in the privileges and responsibilities, the duties and the joys, the ardors and the beauties, of human society. Whatever it might take in terms of money to keep certain sensible promises to ourselves we can afford; we have proved that. It has always been true. What it may take in terms of imagination, of willingness to lift ourselves off the pads of normalcy, of resolving that what can be tried ought to be tried and done, will, perhaps, not be much easier than ever before. But it should be a little easier; we should have obtained some mental and spiritual muscle from what human planning, decision, and performance has been able to do in this most magnificent of human exploits.

It is impossible, we think, for any human being to have lived through the spectacular events of this past week, with the unbelievable following of the unbelievable, the impossible, the impossible, the fantastic, the fantastic, and not feel that his or her life has been measurably enriched, without feeling that it has been a privilege to be alive and to be part of the human society at such a moment.

Imitating Our Folly

When Soviet Russia first publicly broached the idea of an "Asian Security System," our first reaction was that either Russia must be kidding, or that Russia must be unusually naïve.

After all, if Russia wanted a ready-made security system, we could sell her SEATO for practically a song, and let her discover for herself how completely worthless and wasteful such regional systems can be.

But Russia has been coming back to the idea again and again until we yield to such persistence and admit that apparently Russia is serious, and does insist on trying to float its own Asian regional alliance. Since Brezhnev first suggested the idea in June, Gromyko has discussed it in a speech to the Supreme Soviet, and now Izyvestia has devoted extensive space to explaining its desirability.

So doing, Russia is thinking of an answer to SEATO, as, in Europe, the Warsaw Pact was the only one of answer to NATO. Russia is also, of course, thinking of China, although this point cannot be emphasized because it might discourage some Asian nations which have friendly relations with China from joining such a Soviet-sponsored system.

Instead of rival American and Russian security systems in Asia there could, of course, be a joint American-Russian security system for Asia, in which Russia and the United States would submerge their own ideological differences in the aim of centering China. But that is considered only a faint possibility.

Not that we expect the suggestion to have any more weight with Russia than it has had with the United States, but because fact is fact and will inevitably prove itself to be fact, we remind Russia that there is only one security system, and that is the United States. The tragic folly of things like SEATO and the proposed system Russia is now pushing is that they detract from aid and against whatever good chances there are that the United Nations will be given the power and jurisdiction to be responsible for peace between everybody everywhere. In such regional alliances, Russia is merely imitating the United States. Its own evasion of full respect and loyalty to the United Nations, both great nations should be heading in the opposite direction, if they want to be around to create the dawning of another century.

Horror Dante Couldn't Match To put it simply: The greatest single obstacle to the economic and social development of the majority of the peoples in the underdeveloped world is rampant population growth. Having said that, let me make one point unmistakably clear: The solution of the population problem is in no way a substitute for the more traditional forms of developmental assistance: Aid for economic infrastructure; aid for agriculture; aid for industrialization; aid for education; aid for technological advance.

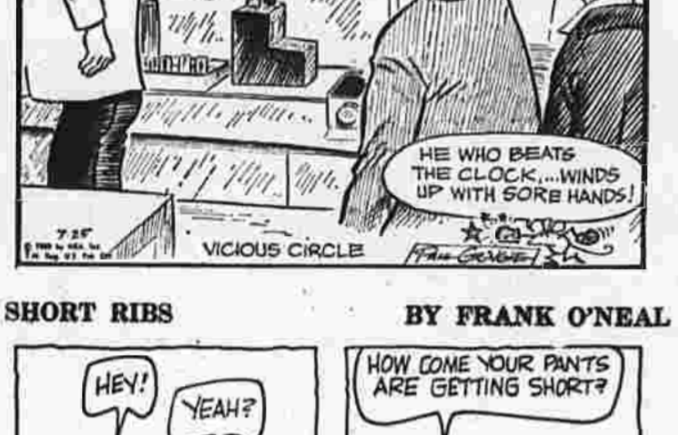

Manchester Memorial Hospital because the first estimate of the cost was some \$2 million lower — \$3,900,000. To compound future problems, a nationally-recognized hospital consultant has said Manchester Memorial Hospital must expand to 330 beds by 1975 if it is to meet projected area needs. Dittus said that as soon as the present construction is completed, a second, even larger project will begin. The original 50-year-old section of the hospital will be demolished and a new addition will rise in its place — at an estimated cost of \$10.2 million.
