Special Hearing On Subdivision

A special public hearing has been called by M. Adler Dobkin, chairman of the Planning and Zoning Commission, for a 16-lot subdivision of some Residence AA property on Tolland Tpk.

The land is part of a 54-acre parcel owned by Richard Hayes, whose application to change the zone of the entire tract to industrial, making way for Manchester's third industrial park, was denied by the commission on May 8.

But, according to J. Eric Potter, the town planning director, the hearing is unnecessary. Potter told Dobkin that since the land is already zoned residential, no public hearing would be necessary; only the commission's review of the subdivision plans is required, Potter said.

But Dobkin scheduled the hearing anyway. He said "I just hate to change the precedent, especially on something that's so controversial."

Potter said, "The public should be told, and you (the commission) cannot deny it. The hearing is set for Monday night at 7:30 in the Municipal Building."

Fire Damage

EAST HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — A 23-year-old Hartford man was arrested Friday on suspicion of selling false drivers' licenses at prices ranging from \$20 to \$30.

Police arrested Leroy Carter on Friday as a result of a four-month investigation of fraudulent licenses found during checks of traffic violations.

Carter had several hundred blank license forms that allegedly had been printed in a 14-room building in Portsmouth, N.Y.

Two city detectives said they bought licenses from Carter before arresting him, and he was charged with forgery and held in lieu of \$10,000 bond to await an appearance Monday in Circuit Court.

Youth Killed

EAST HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — David Ferguson Jr., 33, of Enfield was killed early today when his car hit the rear converted barn that housed several businesses.

There were several explosions and the place was an inferno when firemen arrived on the scene, said Fire Chief Thomas Hayes, who made the damage estimate.

One explosion was believed to have been a tank of compressed gas. Firefighters trained hoses on other tanks to keep the heat below the exploding point.

The blaze started from the center of the building and spread quickly, Hayes said.

Inmate Missing

DANBURY, Conn. (AP) — Officials of the Federal Correctional Institution here said today an inmate failed to return Friday night from his work release program job at a Danbury business.

The missing inmate was identified as Joseph A. Griffin, 26, of Brockton, Mass. Authorities said he was wearing a five-year sentence on a conviction of issuance of forged money orders.

Grant Approved

WASHINGTON (AP) — A \$300,000 grant for Griffin Hospital in Derby, Conn., has been approved by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, a spokesman for Rep. John S. P. Swain, D-Conn., announced Friday.

The money is earmarked for a new intensive care unit, and for a new pharmacy, a non-sectarian chapel and a project for physical-medicine department.

Jail To Close

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — The old state jail at Haddam is going to be closed Sept. 1, because "it's a luxury we can no longer afford," says Deputy Commissioner John R. Mansson.

The luxury "is the high cost per inmate of keeping it open in a separate institution, Mansson indicated Friday.

The stone building was constructed in 1865 and was renovated about 10 years ago. The state intends to keep it for other uses.

Persons at the jail are being offered pools at other correctional institutions.

Protest March

VOLUNTOWN (AP) — Members of the pacifist Committee for Non-Violent Action (CNVA) plan to lead a protest march today on the Navy Discipline Army Prison in Portsmouth, N.Y.

The New England group expects Dr. Benjamin Spock, a noted baby doctor, to address the march before the 2 p.m. march to protest the imprisonment of two marines.

The marchers were sentenced for "promoting disobedience among the troops," according to Marion Brown, a CNVA spokesman. He added that the group had "been working for this march for quite some time."

Stock Increase

BLOOMFIELD (AP) — The Actus Insurance Co. reports that the value of its stock has increased 32 cents per share, compared to a 6-cent per share during the corresponding period last year.

Actus, an affiliate of Connecticut General Insurance Corp., also reported Friday a statutory gain of \$5.8 million from business operations during the first half of 1969. Last year the company reported an operating loss of \$1 million during the matching period.

35 Said Dead In Air Crash

ALGERIA, Algeria (AP) — An Air Algerie Caravelle jetliner, carrying 30 European adults and a crew of seven, crashed this morning near Algiers, Algeria's rich oil fields. Thirty-five persons were reported killed.

The official government news agency, Algerie Presse Service, said there were two survivors. Searchers and airline officials were on the scene.

The Caravelle was reported to have gone down about 25 miles from Algiers. The wreckage, including the aircraft's main engine, was found in the Algerian desert.

The pilot of the plane was the Algerian national line's chief pilot instructor.

The weather was clear at the time of crash and there are no mountains or other obstacles in the area. The Caravelle left Algiers by radio over the city of Constantine, about 125 miles north of the accident area.

The crash was the ninth involving the French-built twin-jet craft since it was put in service May 19 in 1969.

East took the ace of diamonds and returned a heart to the ace. Now South could take three spades, three diamonds and two hearts, but his huck run out later eight tricks. A declarer who was really trying would aim for nine tricks.

Four Club Tricks
South's best chance for nine tricks is to develop four clubs, and he can do this only if East has the singleton queen. With this in mind, South should lead the king of clubs from his hand at the second trick.

If West takes the ace of clubs and knocks out the ace of hearts, South must lead a club.

Communications Satellite Missing Following Blastoff

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—A new commercial communications satellite, blasted aloft by a three-stage Delta rocket, was missing and missing today.

At 6:30 a.m., about eight hours after the launching, officials said tracking stations in Australia and Italy "up to this time have received no signals to confirm that the satellite spacecraft is in the programmed orbit."

The spacecraft had been programmed for an initial 300-mile orbit for ground control from 105 miles high to 23,000 miles. Plans were for relaying from that orbit into circular orbit.







Coventry Visit

Apollo 11 Viewed with Sights

By HOLLY GANTER (Mrs. Ganter is with the 170 mostly Coventry residents who are on a three-week visit to Coventry, England.)

COVENTRY, England — Downtown Coventry is something of a surprise, especially since it's a city of over 300,000. The streets are narrow, and most of the buildings low. Much of the downtown area is new, since so many buildings were bombed out in the early 1940's. The highlight is Broadgate, and while it has been seen only briefly so far, it looks very impressive. Broadgate is the Constitution Plaza of Coventry, but it generally has a much more "used" look. There are many more shops there than in Hartford, so it attracts more people. It appears, on the basis of an afternoon visit, to be more casually used than Constitution Plaza, too.

We were told that it really was quiet here, since this is the two-week period of the big industrial shutdown, and many local residents are on their holiday, but it looked pretty busy, nevertheless.

Watching the downtown shoppers and strollers, it also appears that as far as dress goes, anything goes. The weather is not quite warm enough for shorts, but the girls wear their skirts much, much shorter than seems safe. Any kind of a breeze would probably create a disaster. Men, women, girls and boys all can be seen in bell-bottoms.

The weather held last weekend, and several small groups of guests and hosts went off on afternoon trips on Sunday. There were some clouds, but no rain and temperatures in the mid-70's. The newspapers here refer to this kind of weather as "hot and sultry," and all the local residents insist that such warm weather is very unusual. No one's complaining about the weather, anyway.

One popular place for a short trip is Kenilworth Castle, only about a 15-minute ride from Coventry. It is a little disconcerting to sit, eating ice cream, on the grounds of a ruined 13th century castle, having a chat with someone from your own hometown. It's not something you can do anywhere in the state of Connecticut, anyway.

Lake Forreth
The castle was, in its prime, one of the most important of all the lake fortresses of England, and was surrounded by a man-made lake which has since been drained. It was built early in the 13th century, largely of sandstone. It was held by a succession of British Kings and suffered through a siege now and then, with its use declining in the mid-17th century. It gradually fell into ruin; then the present Earl of Kenilworth turned it over to the people of Kenilworth in 1968, so that it is now open as a tourist attraction.

The main interest here has, of course, been Apollo 11, and side trips were arranged on a time schedule so that everyone could be home in time to watch a special open-ended telecast of the final hours before the lunar module touched down, and preceding the actual moonwalk. The British have been every bit as excited and impressed with the whole show as we have, and have followed all the Apollo shots quite closely. They have all received excellent television coverage apparently, and Apollo 11 has been very well covered also.

The three local stations, BBC 1, BBC 2, and ITV, have concentrated on different types of programming, all quite extensive, and the BBC has departed from its usual limited number of hours, and been on all day. Both the BBC networks are non-commercial, but the ITV is a commercial network and it had perhaps the most interesting approach to the coverage in what amounted to an almost all-night telethon. The host for the program was David Frost, who flew over here for the show after doing his own show in the States.

Familiar Houston Voices
Frost's program had regular

entertainers (Mary Hopkin, Engelbert Humperdinck, Dame Sybil Thorndike to name a few of the more familiar ones), interspersed with regular news reports on the flight, and phone calls from viewers who wanted to express their opinions on the whole moon program. The ITV hooked into the Houston Mission Control Center for live reports, via satellite, and again, it's a little eerie to hear the familiar voices from Houston, when we know we're so far away.

It's too early in the visit yet to give an overall expression except to say that everyone certainly seems to be having a wonderful time, and our English families here have been very generous to us all in repaying the hospitality of last year. They're still talking about it and anxious to make as a good a time for us here as they had in Connecticut.

Coventry, Conn. residents will be interested to know that a flight has been booked for 1971, and that many who made the trip over last year have already signed up for it. They are already making plans and looking forward to seeing Connecticut friends that didn't make it over here this time. So, the circle of friends keeps building and by Aug. 6, when this visit ends, it will be even stronger than it is now.



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Joan Blondell, Looking Back

SHERMAN OAKS, Calif. — Joan Blondell wore the calm expression of an uninvolved spectator at a crap game during this year's Emmy Award ceremonies. To begin with, her nomination—for playing Lottie, the worldly-wise saloon-keeper in ABC's "Here Come the Brides"—had been a total surprise. "I don't know why they singled me out," she said. "I do so little in the show." On top of that, she was "damn sure I didn't stand a chance of winning. So what was the use in getting all excited?"

Despite the surprise and the certainty, she hired a makeup man, costumer and a limousine, and showed up 20 minutes early. "As far as I'm concerned," she said, "being nominated is an honor that's practically as good as winning. And I know how disappointed I am when I watch an award ceremony and someone hasn't shown up."

During the awards, she quietly rooted for Peggy Lipton, the newcomer nominated in the same category for her work in "Mod Squad." When Barbara Bain of "Mission: Impossible" finally won, Joan was happy for her, but distressed that anyone could receive three Emmys in a row for playing the same role. "If someone wins once, that should be it, unless they go on to another role or a different series. The new people should be given a chance."

It all sounds so typical for a veteran Hollywood actress. But one visit with Joan Blondell at home and you realize that the humility and concern for others are authentic. She lives in a modest, three bedroom house in quiet suburban Sherman Oaks. She drives a small, sensible Volvo. She lives an hour away from work so she can be close to her four children. The glad hands, big talk, caviar and crackerjacks of Hollywood and Beverly Hills are over on the chic side of the mountains. And that suits her fine.

Sitting in her flower-festoon-

ed dining room, two walls of which are sliding glass, Joan Blondell looks anything but an everyday grandma. The mod black pumps, black bellbottoms and brightly patterned Indian-cum-hippie shirt look too good, too natural for her to be closing in on 60 with more than a half century of show biz behind her. The blond hair is still fluffy and the oversized grey-green eyes are still swimming in mischief. Sure, she's added a few pounds, but not nearly enough to make you forget those fantastic legs—or to betray that she'd been among the top 10 box office draws as long ago as the '30s, has played in nearly 100 films, some 25 stage roles, and about 75 television shows—not to mention 15 years of vaudeville.

The offers still keep her on the move. Between shooting schedules for the first and second years of "Brides," she did a bit in "The Sphinx," a Warner Bros.-Seven Arts comedy about the kidnapping of a bunch of oldtime film idols, including Dorothy Lamour, Johnny Weissmuller and Butterfly McQueen. In May she flew to Nashville for a cameo role in the Spillane-Fellows production of Mickey's latter-day punch-and-cruncher, "The Delta Factor." Now that she's shooting "Brides" again, she's up at 4 every weekday morning. "I read a little first—I've always got a book within reach—then I make breakfast and drive over to the set. When I'm through I come home and have a snort, then dinner, read my lines for the following day and then I go to bed. When I'm alone, it's because I want to be. Parties? Nightclubbing? Openings? You can have them. I'm bored with all that jazz."

A comparison of today's actors with the greats she's played with? "Oh, the kids today are fine," she said. "I just don't get the thrill I used to when I looked into Spencer Tracy's or Jimmy Cagney's eyes. They really had it. Feeling. And Timing. Oh, the timing. They had all the magic. Not many of them have that today."

Michael Landon, Scriptwriter

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — When a television series settles down for a long run and "role fatigue" sets in, many actors cast about for some new creative spark.

Michael Landon of "Bonanza," beginning its 11th year on NBC this fall, found his in writing and directing.

"I wrote the first show I did because we were at a point where we were going to close down because we didn't have a script," Landon recalled during a lunch break on the Paramount lot.

"It was a challenge, so I went home for the weekend and wrote it over Saturday and Sunday."

Landon, 33, who literally grew up in the part of Little Joe, said, "I guess that was six years ago. Then I went a long period of not

writing anything. In the last three years I think I've written nine of the shows."

Altogether, Landon has written 12 scripts for "Bonanza" and directed two, but few people were aware of his off-camera activities until "The Wish" last February.

This story of a young Negro boy and his family won critical plaudits and brought requests for screenplays from movie companies. None of the requests appealed to him, but Landon said he hopes to get a movie ready for the show's three-month layoff period in the late fall.

When Landon writes he secludes himself in the living room of his home in Encino, sits on the floor, puts a pad on the coffee table and writes in long-hand. "I sometimes go 18 hours at a time," he said, "get a little sleep and finish the script the next day."

He said he can write so fast because "I think about the people a long time before I sit down. I don't think much about the plot. I sometimes don't even know how it's going to end."

"I tried plotting it out once

but it seemed to be forcing the characters to do things," he said. "It seemed dishonest. The ideas of the people is his most exciting. You get to know somebody and hopefully it will have some effect and impact. Which isn't easy within the confines of a show like ours."

One limit is that the Cartwrights must react in character to every situation.

Another is that the three Cartwrights represent a united viewpoint. No room for conflict there. So the stories really aren't about the Cartwrights, but about their involvement with other people. Ben, Hoss and Little Joe are intruders into other people's lives—and stick around only long enough to solve their problems.

Landon said he's had "a ball" doing "Bonanza," but when its long run ends he wants to get into the movies. "I want to do something contemporary," he said. "I want to see if I can walk without this gun. You see I kind of lean funny."

And One Of the Boys Is a Girl

NEW YORK (NEA) — Saturday morning, on television, is another world. Norman Prescott is a Saturday morning expert. He heads up, with Lou Scheimer and Hal Sutherland, Filmation, the animation studio that turned out series like "Superman," "Batman," "Aquaman" and the big hit, "Archie." This year, on ABC, will come another Filmation series, "The Hardy Boys."

Prescott says that the Saturday morning audience is made up of people between the ages of two and 14. That limits, strictly, what can be done. You can't animate Dostoevsky for two-year-olds.

"The Hardy Boys" will be a detective series — but non-violent, in keeping with the current fad — and "The Hardy Boys" will also sing rock 'n roll, between clues.

In fact, a real, live group call-

ed The Hardy Boys has been assembled. They will make personal appearances and do television guest shots and make records.

Prescott's animators created the characters for "The Hardy Boys" (there is one girl among the Boys, which could only happen in Hollywood) and then the casting department went out and found singers who looked like the live drawings.

Prescott believes there is a big future for animation on television. He has the rights now to all Newspaper Enterprise Association comics (except for Major Hoople, who is owned by Fox) and is working on an Alley Oop show and another show which would feature several comics in one program.
