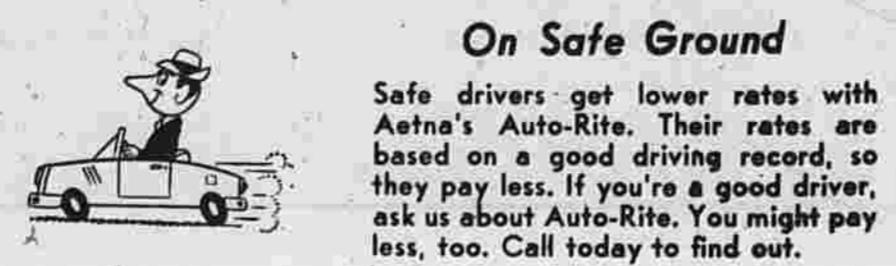

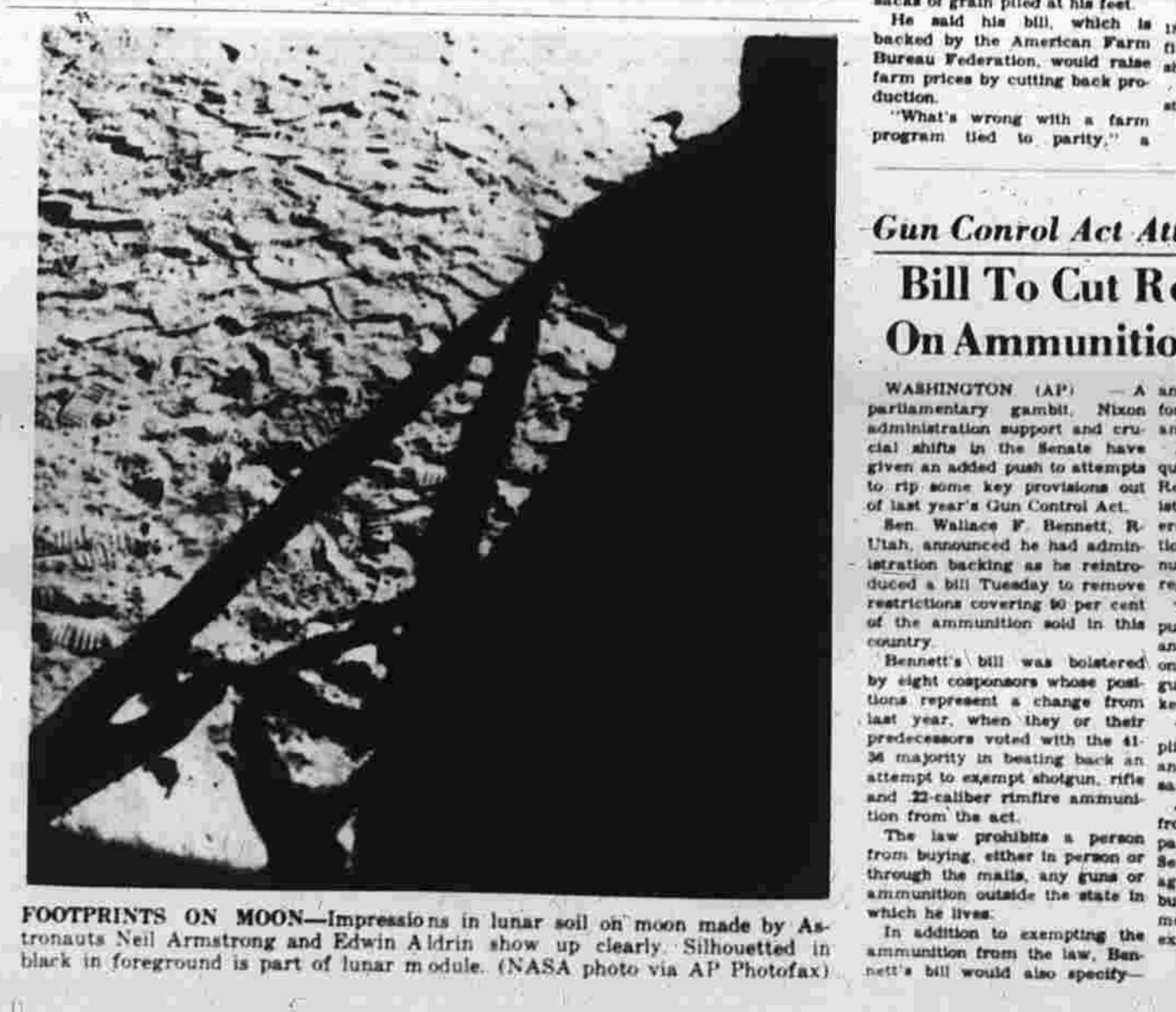

Smugglers Employ Surfboards, Coffins to Sneak Drugs into U.S.

MEXICO CITY — The body in the coffin looked ordinary enough, but there was something about the men accompanying it across the border in the United States that both defied the customs agents.

Not everyone connected with the illicit drug goes to such lengths. Simpler techniques have been far more successful. Yet the incident illustrates what U.S. Customs men are up against, and their task gets more difficult all the time.

As a result of the growing demand among U.S. users, the production of illicit drugs has become big business in Mexico. Just how big, no one knows, but the figures are sizable.

Mexican authorities, meanwhile, destroyed more than 7,000 fields of poppies, the source of opium and its derivatives, and burned off hundreds of acres of marijuana.

How much managed to get across the border and into the hands of users is anybody's guess. The consensus: Considerable.

Illicit drugs cross the border in every conceivable manner. The pungent, long-haired marijuana smoker may smuggle it in his surfboard. The professional is more likely to use trucks with false bottoms, boats or airplanes.

Arrests and stiff prison sentences appear to be a minor factor. Border arrests for trafficking in marijuana alone numbered 54 in 1968 and by last year had risen to 2,773.

On the Mexican side the law is even tougher. Just one thing keeps the international traffic alive: money. And, according to agents of the U.S. Bureau of Narcotics, not all of it flows into the hands of the Mafia.

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## MCC Students Get Realistic Business Lessons

During the last academic year, the Manchester Community College Accounting Club tried an experiment in mutual aid across town lines. It would assist in setting up cash and inventory controls for the Dutch Point Co-operative Store on Hartford's St. Michaels St. The store, in turn, would provide a place for the students to apply classroom theory.

The story of this project appeared in The Herald of April 22.

This budding venture has now come into full bloom, as club members hoped it would. Added by a \$1,500 grant from the Connecticut Commission on Aid to Higher Education, Alan W. Gates, assistant professor of business at the college and club advisor, with two student assistants, is planning the needs of earlier experience in four other Hartford co-ops.

Salaries of Gates and the assistants and accounting supplies come from the grant.

Every Monday and Friday morning, from 9:30-11, since June 1, Gates has been teaching a 25-student class in the Multi-Service Center at 76 Piny St. in Hartford's North End. The group is made up of co-op directors, volunteers, and Community Renewal Team (CRT) members.

The 12-week session will run through the end of August.

"The group is a challenging one," Gates said. "They are eager and receptive because they know there is no control, their store will go out of business. They have a high learning interest, try hard to do their homework, and shoot comments that he is working with individuals who have varying degrees of capacities and abilities. Gates pointedly said, 'I teach the subject through the student. I don't teach the subject to the student.' He added that in the summer situation, he must take shortcuts through what would be considered traditional classroom instruction. Diversity of background techniques and chalk for emphasis and clarity are two devices he employs.

As with Dutch Point, Gates emphasized that this is a two-way street. "These people have given us an opportunity to put accounting theory into practice. For them, we are trying to establish simple, easily understood systems which will produce results."

The approach was not an authoritarian one, he emphasized. "We didn't walk in and tell them they needed this and that. We asked them what they were most interested in having."

Their answer was three controls: Cash, Inventory, and Food Stamps. Classroom exercises, book theory and the development of the accounting system, and this is carried over into realistic procedures in the co-op," he said.

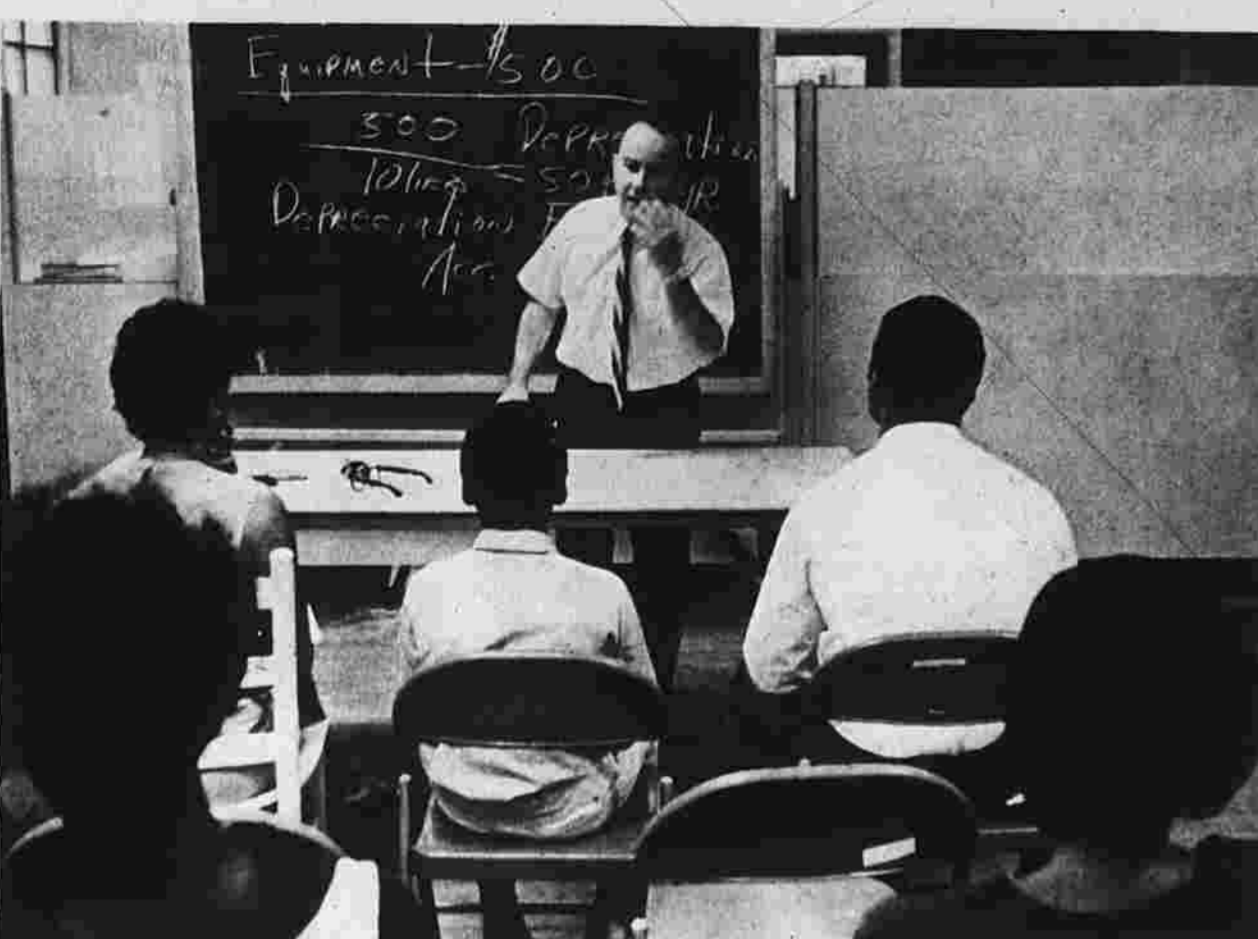
The student assistants are Frank Folkes of Hartford and Dennis Fitzgerald of East Hartford. Both are former students of Gates, and will enter their final year at MCC in September.

Gates meets with them each morning to make a daily report before they start their tour of Dutch Point and the other four co-ops: Charter Oak Terrace on Sunnyside Dr., Rowe Village on the Hartford-Wilson line, St. Michael's on Clark St., and South Arsenal Neighborhood Development (RAND) on Canton St. In time, another store Northeast, will open near N. Main St. and Albany Ave.

The students work hours a day, five days a week and make a point to visit each co-op every day; for example, Rowe, St. Michael's, and RAND in the morning, and Charter Oak in the afternoon.

A typical day for them, Gates said, consists of reconciling cash with the checkbook, and making statements, recording the previous day's receipts and disbursements, updating membership accounts for dues income, checking inventory for taxable vs. non-taxable items, checking food stamps on hand, and preparing worksheets for quarter, by financial statements.

Gates said his day does not end when he leaves the classroom. "I average eight to 10 hours a day, five days a week," he said. "Teaching, setting up the accounting system, and attending board meetings." He said:

## Room Paint Color Looks Dark Inside

Ever select a paint color for a room in your house—only to discover that it was darker when it was applied to the walls?

This happens often. And the reason is usually the same. Color appears darker on a large surface than on a small one. Thus, when a color is chosen from a small chip sample of the kind carried in most paint stores, it can be expected to seem deeper in tone when it is on the wall.

The lesson: always choose a color slightly lighter than you want it to be.

It's wise, too, to examine the chip sample in both natural and artificial light. This is especially important when selecting a color for the outside of the house, or as one peeked under the light of a store may appear quite different when the sun is shining on it.

Colors should be chosen on the basis of your personal preference, which leads to an interesting appearance if one wall is painted in a different color than the others. To widen the look of a long, narrow kitchen, paint the side walls a light color and the narrow end walls a deeper hue.

One use of color that is often overlooked in a kitchen is on the interior of cabinets and drawers. In most cases, such interiors are painted the same color as the exterior. But they will look a lot more attractive if an amusing contrasting color.

## Residents at Truck Hearing Split on Gravel Works Curbs

Mitchell Trucking Inc., through its attorney Edward Kuhn, last night asked for a permit which would allow it to consider an "ideal" trucking limit of 200 trucks per day, but said it would accept any reasonable limitations that the Planning and Zoning Commission might impose on their application.

At the same time, Atty. Herbert Barall, acting on behalf of James David and other Miller Rd. residents, asked the commission to reject or postpone action on the Mitchell application until the commission creates a set of regulations which would adequately protect residents from abuses of the permit.

Without new regulations, the commission has no way of controlling any gravel operation, according to Barall.

Barall's claim last night that because of the wording of the regulations the commission need grant a special exception only after the most stringent requirements have met.

Between 120 and 150 people showed up for the hearing, many of whom spoke either for or against the item.

By far the most frequent point made by the advocates of the trucking operation was the economic benefits to the town which result from trucking operations.

On the other hand, the opponents of the operation most frequently asked the commission to consider the health and safety of the residents in the area, objecting to the proposed figure of 200 trucks per day as being excessive.

The hearing was thrown open for comments, the commission chairman, Joseph Joseph Kravasi, 175 Foster Rd., Wapping, said the need for gravel in town to improve industrial land and noted that unlike some other trucking firms, Mitchell Trucking registers their trucks locally and are paid, tax locally as being trucking operations.

Barall's central point was that of several others who supported the application was that a denial of the permit would mean the loss of the area to other uses.

South Windsor residents were split last night at a public hearing on whether to limit the number of trucks that would be allowed to operate on the Miller Road gravel processing plant.

The hearing was held at the town hall, and was held to determine whether to grant a special exception to the Mitchell Trucking Co. application for a permit to operate a gravel processing plant in town which would allow double trucking — out of town — for processing and back in for trucking to the gravel processing plant. Mitchell also increases truck traffic.

Sympathy With Complaints

Former Mayor John Madden, with complaints of people, but he felt that the "problem is not with the Planning and Zoning Commission, but with the Town Council."

Until the council drafts reasonable ordinance which will protect both the rights of trucking and the rights of the residents, Madden said the commission would continue to exist, according to Madden.

In an argument of this nature, he "entitled to his day in court," he said, "and he asked exactly who has what rights, according to the former Mayor's opinion."

At least one Miller Rd. resident, Chuck Hawkins, spoke in favor of the application, supporting the application of Mitchell Trucking.

Robert Martin, who has the opposition to the trucking operation all spring, felt that the law is not fair to the town. He said that the residents of the area have been more than cooperative.

14 New Television Series This Fall to Feature Blacks

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Fourteen series in the new television season will have blacks in starring or leading roles.

The number is slightly ahead of last season. Five series in which blacks played roles were canceled and five were added. In addition, football star Rose Grier joins the cast of "Daniel Boone."

But, says a report by two Michigan State University researchers, the roles, dress and language of blacks on television—at least in past seasons—still are very white.

Dr. Bradley Greenberg, an associate professor of communication, and Joseph Dominick, 222 play school teachers. Lee graduate assistant, compared two average weeks of viewing in the 1967-68 and 1968-69 seasons. Hari Rhodes in "The Bold Ones: A New Perspective" that the percentage of blacks playing major roles remained the same both seasons. However, the number of black actors playing "second bananas" to white heroes increased in the latest season.

Concludes the MSU researchers: "Television feels a need to project black images, but really 'doesn't know how.'"

The networks aren't likely to offer any realistic portrayals of black roles soon. Television has never been one to pioneer, and after the uproar over "violence and sex" the industry is offering as low a profile as possible in all areas in the coming season. Besides, it is doubtful that blacks are any more anxious to see a situation comedy about the ghetto than whites are to see the poverty of Appalachia in "The Beverly Hills Cop."

Said Bill Cosby: "I think the reality of what happens in the news is depressing enough. A black man on a walk through the woods' isn't his week."

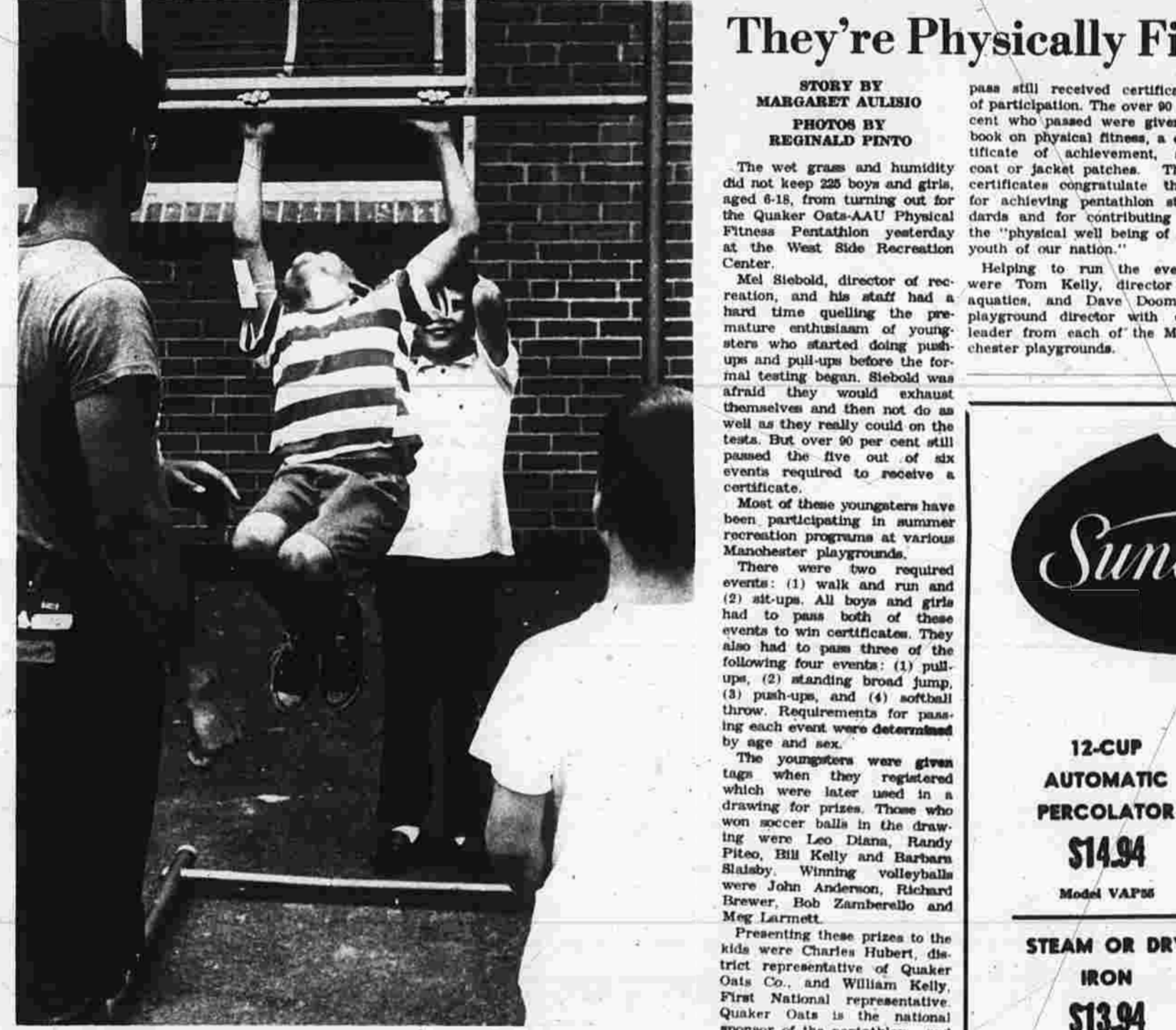

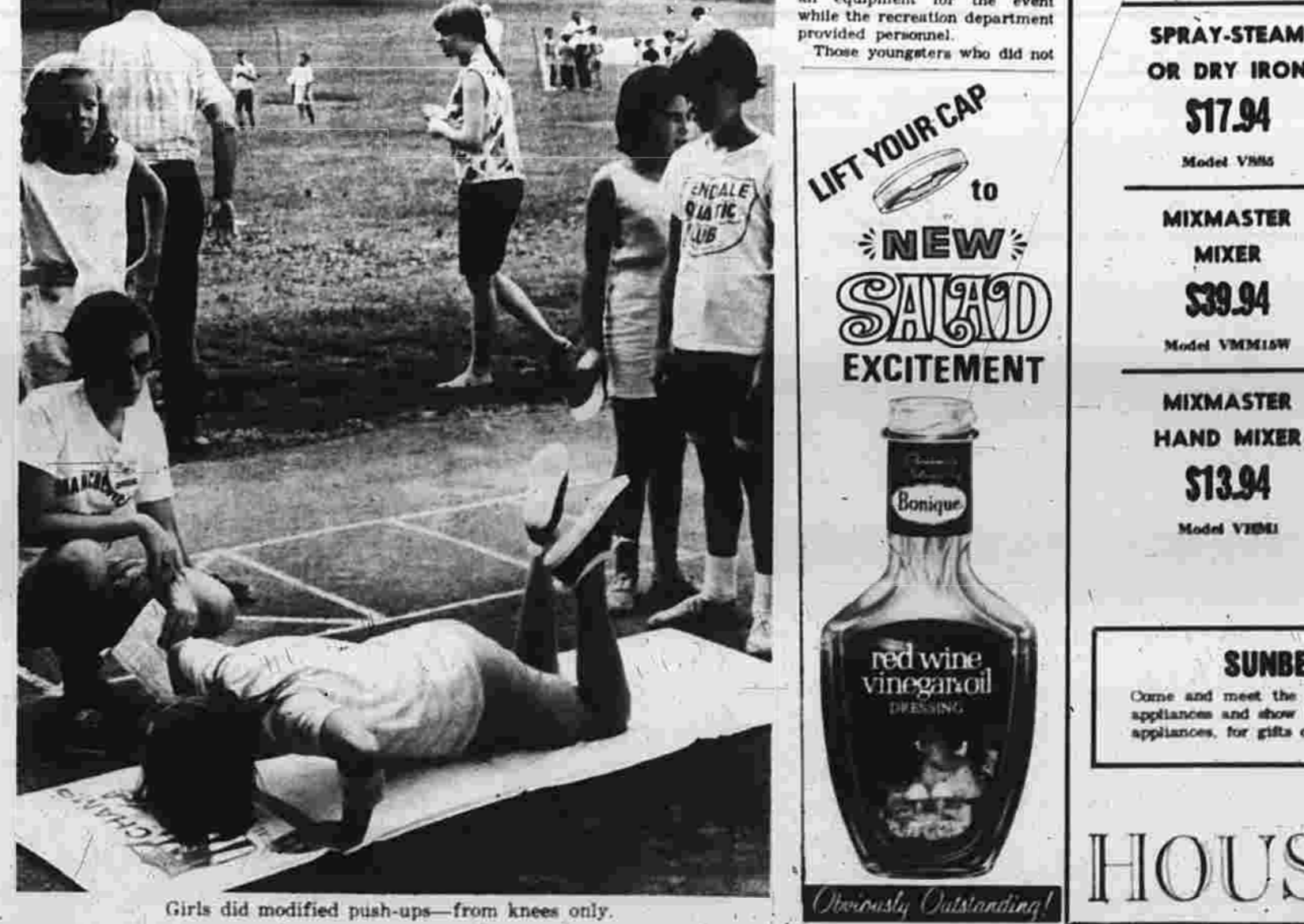

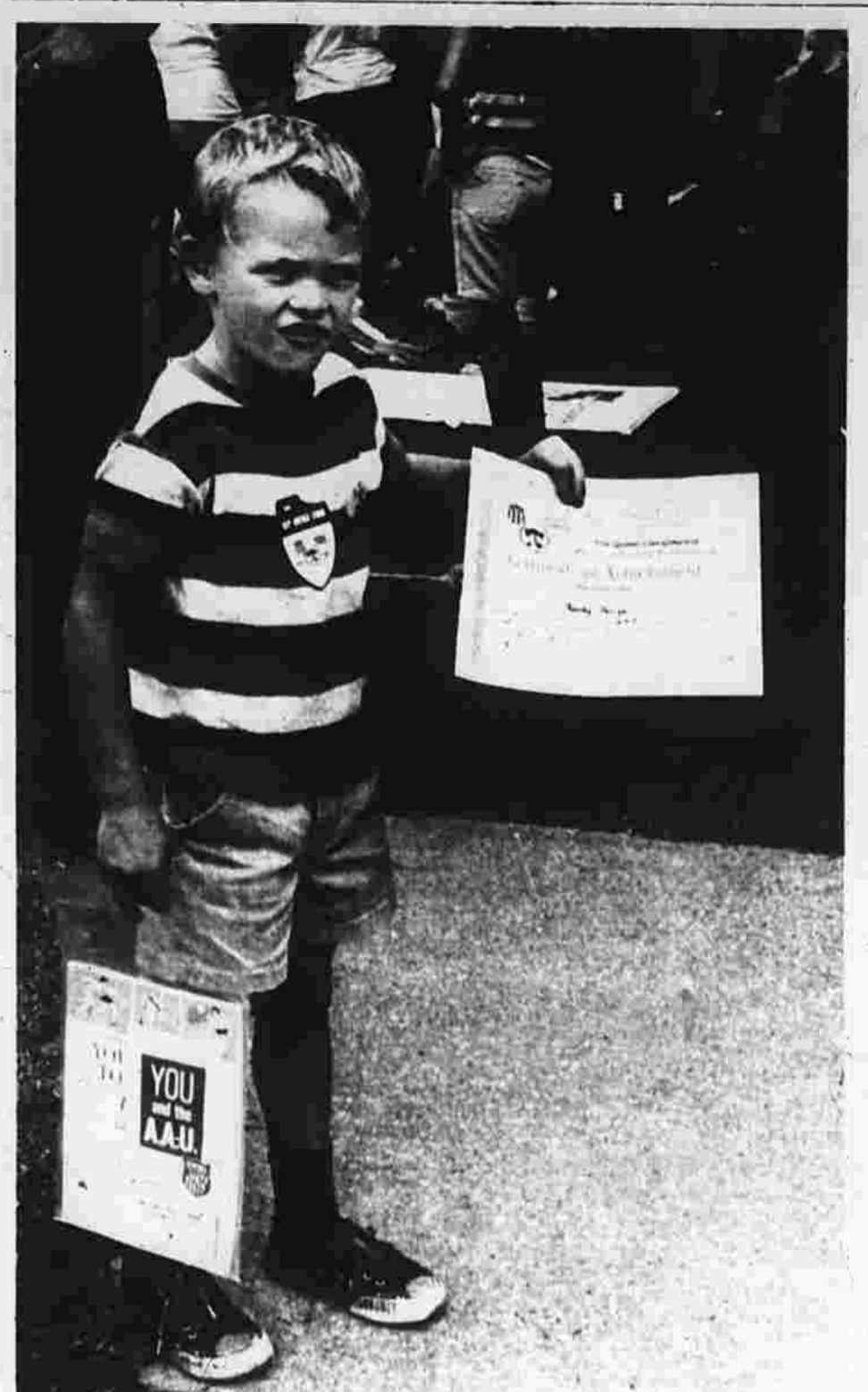

Pistol Fight In Viet Bar Being Probed

BAIGON—A barroom shooting three weeks ago in which a decorated and politically influential commander of a crack South Vietnamese army unit allegedly killed two American military policemen is still under investigation.

Officials have refused to discuss the case since the time of shooting, "R's" under investigation," one U.S. officer said.

The American role in the investigation is purely advisory, according to legal experts, since the U.S. would have no jurisdiction over any legal action against the Vietnamese commander.

Part of the reluctance of officials to discuss the case apparently stems from the sensitive relations between foreign troops and those of a host country, heightened by the current withdrawal of U.S. troops from Vietnam, in which the military efficiency of the Vietnamese is a key issue.

But apparently more sensitive is the identity of the Vietnamese officer—Lt. Col. Nguyen Viet Can, commander of the 11th Airborne Battalion, considered one of the best units in the Vietnamese armed forces.

Can has been wounded in action five times and has been awarded decorations by his own and the U.S. governments. Killed in the shooting were Sgt. Eugene T. Cox, 21, of Jackson Heights, N.Y., and Pfc. James H. Workman, 21, of Beaver Falls, Pa., both members of the 11th Military Police Battalion. Both had been scheduled to return to the U.S. within 30 days.

The shooting stemmed from a celebration. It unfolded, according to sources, like this: Can and two aides, both captains, were in the Ivory Tower night club on the third floor of a building in downtown Saigon celebrating a battle victory a few days earlier in Lang Binh province. All three were in uniform.

An American sergeant, not identified, who was slightly intoxicated was seated nearby talking in a loud voice. Can called the American to join his group.

At about 11 p.m. Cox and Workman entered the club on a routine curfew check for U.S. servicemen. They spotted the sergeant and told him to leave. He was violating the curfew which requires servicemen to be in their residence by 10 p.m. Can did not want his companion to leave and an argument ensued.

During the argument, Can reportedly slapped one of the MP's in the face. The second MP grabbed Can's arm. Can punched him in the abdomen. The MP who was struck was said to have pulled out his pistol and fired a shot that hit Can in the thigh. However, both of the MP's pistols were missing when investigators arrived at the bar and it could not be confirmed whether they had been fired.

The Vietnamese officer rolled behind the bar, pulled out his own pistol and shot the two MP's.

Workman's body was found on the floor near the bar. He had been shot in the leg and chest. Cox's body was found at the foot of the stairs leading to the bar. He had apparently fallen down the steps after he had been shot.

According to some reports more than 20 bullets were fired during the shooting. After the shooting Can and his two aides went to their jeep and ordered an aide to radio for help to the 11th Battalion which was bivouacked at a park behind the Presidential Palace in Saigon.

The Battalion dispatched a truck and two jeeps containing at least a dozen armed soldiers. Can returned to the Battalion compound with his escort, followed by two American MP jeeps carrying mounted machine guns. The firing at the Ivory Tower had attracted the two jeeps.

A short time later Can, again under armed escort, went to a military hospital at the Airborne Division Compound at Hoa Hoa Thum on the outskirts of Saigon. Again the American jeeps followed.

Guards at the Compound halted the Americans and threatened to open fire if they attempted to enter. A short time later American advisers at the Compound told the Americans to leave. They did.

Cornell Sets New Campus Conduct Laws

'Think Israel,' Investors Told

JONES The Los Angeles Times LOS ANGELES—Merton Carter, probably the most famous of the general with the black eye, patch, of a grandiose, price-misleader, or collective farms metacred by angry Arabs. It takes a shift in perspective to see the struggling young nation triggering a big fashion spread in Vogue, shipping 10,000 cases of beer to New York and selling a million dollars' worth of candy in the States.

That's the picture Victor M. Carter says more American businessmen should see — and probably to their profit. Carter, former chairman of the board of Republic Corp., Los Angeles-based manufacturing company, was interviewed after his return from the Israeli Economic Conference in Jerusalem, where he served as chairman of a 200-member North American Delegation.

Israel is ready to spread a thick red carpet under an investor who is willing to start a new industrial project or expand his own activity there. The nation offers solid incentives like a five-year free ride on a company's income tax, a quick shortcut through eliminating red tape, and even a computerized real estate service to reverse the "brain drain" of qualified people who are working elsewhere in the world but would rather return to Israel.

Less than a year after the state of Israel formally declared the first government in 1949 set up the Research Council of Israel. The emphasis on scientific research has continued, with strong government encouragement, and it welcomes to new industry is especially warm for companies in research and development.

The government offers a 50 per cent subsidy on the salaries of technical people working on approved research projects. Carter said. This brings the cost of brainpower down to what seems a bargain basement level by U. S. standards, because even without subsidy, salaries are half or less what they would be here.

Carter estimated that skilled workers such as electricians may be available for about \$200 a month. Engineers and chemists work for about \$300 a month. These are the kind of people who command salaries of around \$1,200 a month in the States, the industrialist noted. Business in Israel may be hampered by Israel's uneasy relations with its neighbors, but Carter said companies are thriving and growing despite their environment.

The West Bank territory would be especially favorable just now to a U. S. businessman who wants to expand his horizons. Carter said. "Just before I left the conference, the government enacted a regulation allowing loans of up to 60 per cent for investment in the West Bank area, in approved industries." "There are other special export incentives, and they will also give 100 per cent partial insurance."

Carter didn't have the details about that kind of insurance policy—but a company with recent experience of United States investment in Latin America, for example, might like the sound of it enough to test it.

Another attraction in the territory captured in 1967 and now administered by Israel is that it has a labor pool which is not so easily found elsewhere in the country. Carter said there are 15,000 "commuters" daily flooding from the West Bank area into Israel itself for jobs that aren't available in their territory.

A unique service keeps saps on an estimated 5,000 to 6,000 Israelis with master's degrees and technical qualifications who would like to work in their homeland but can't find jobs there.

There are no ownership strings attached to an industrial investment in Israel, Carter said. A company established in Israel can be 100 per cent foreign-owned. 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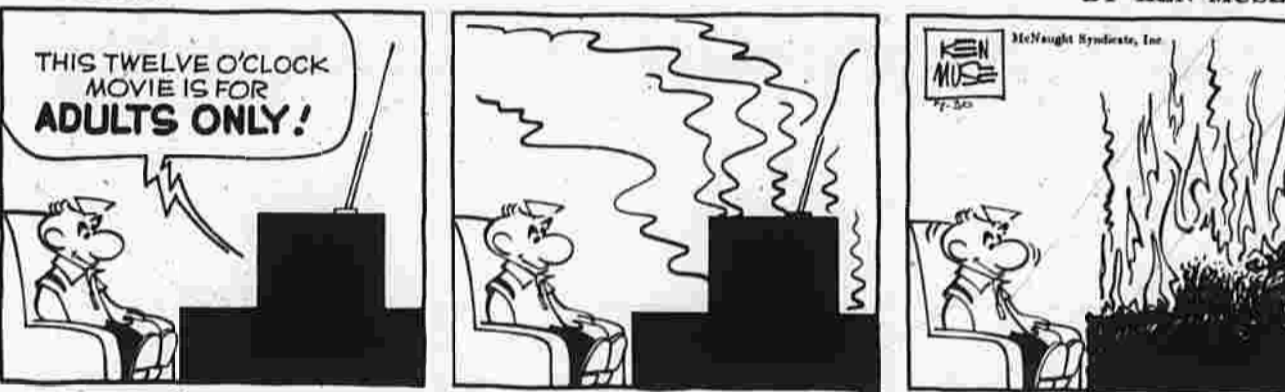
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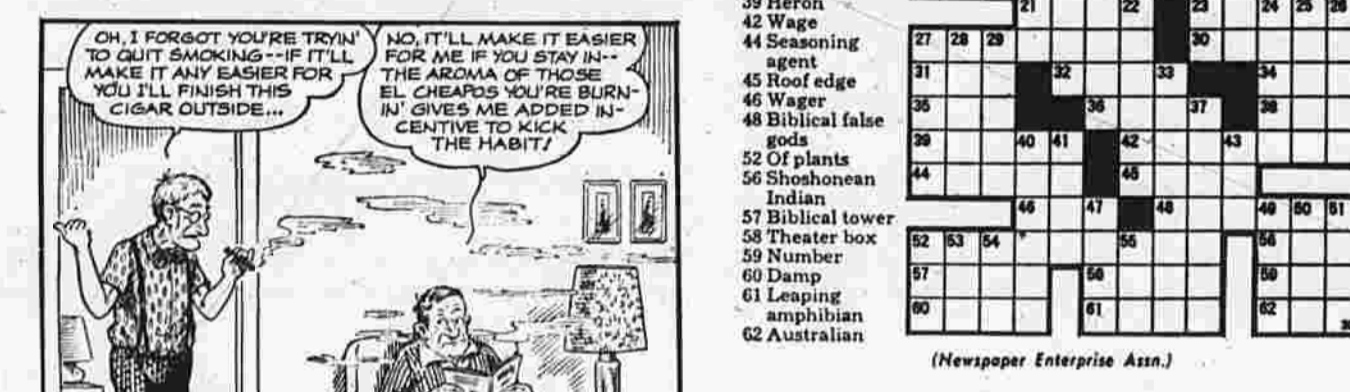
