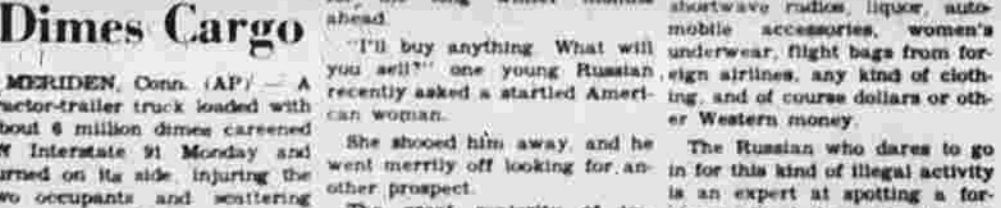
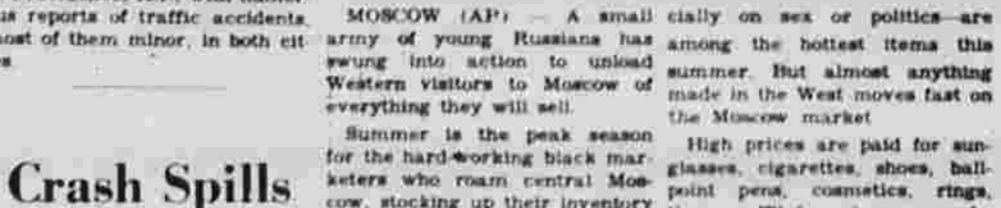

The Florida Girls

Most of the girls' work now is not outdoors, but in high-roofed barns where they sew the leaves that boys will hang above them. When the barn is filled, they will be immersed in leaves.

Their heads shielded by m... type helmets, their fingers taped with grey, dirt-covered bandages, their feet sinking in to the soft dirt which clings all over them — the Florida girls as they have come to be called, still seem content with their summer job on the tobacco farm. Since they are paid bonuses for sewing extra bundles of leaves, the girls work silently, intent on their work. When they do talk, it is with an accent incongruous to Connecticut: a strange Southern drawl.

They work now in brown wooden sheds, surrounded on all sides by a sea of green to be harvested. Most hangings right above their heads and stretching in rows up to the high ceiling.

The 14 girls in this summer's program were imported, so to speak, from Tampa and Miami City, Fla. They arrived July 6 and intend to leave Aug. 23. Their ages range from 12 to 17, most in high school, and 13 of them have worked here before. One of the girls, Diana Wansley, now a supervisor at Silverbers farm here for the fifth time.

None of the girls seemed to be grumbling; all appeared very happy. Their supervisors bustled around in a friendly way, taping a finger or inspecting a family machine. During lunch, the girls generally sprang out on the grass, joking, relaxing, and horsing around.

One of the girls sat by the wall of the shed. She was waiting for the director, Miss Ida Caville, to come and get her and return her to the Connecticut Y in Manchester where the girls live. She was having dyspepsia, and could not stand up to work without feeling faint. This girl, Carol Tucker, is very typical of the kind of girl who comes from Florida to work in the tobacco industry.

There is another buffet table with meat and fruit where the girls select food with which to make lunch. They start work at 7 a.m. For one week, the girls tied the tobacco plants to long, vertical strings, so they would grow up straight. As the plant grows, if it deviates from the vertical path, the girls twist it again around the string. Now the plants are all high enough so that the girls can spend all of their time sewing. Boys pick the leaves when they are ready and bring them inside for the sewing. Some girls place them in bunches on tables where others work by twos, across from each other, on a machine. These girls sew the leaves as fast as they can onto a string with the help of a machine. The string is attached to a stick and then hung in rows from the ceiling down. They are handed the leaves by other girls below. The helmets the girls wear protect them from falling stalks of leaves.

When the leaves have turned brown, they are packed in boxes and sent to a division of General Tobacco Co. They are a better quality leaf than that which goes into the inside of a cigar, and are used as the cigar's outer wrapping.

The girls work at two different farms in Ellington, Kelley and Silverbers. When their day ends at 3:30, says Carol, "We race home to see if Kelley or Silverbers gets there first to use the showers." Then they go to the mall hall and then eat. Bedtime for all the girls is at 9:30.

They also kept content with occasional field trips. They have already been to Boston and Plymouth and future plans include trips to Sturbridge Village and Gillette Castle. They go to occasional movies and shopping trips. There is no great compulsion to save; one night, says Miss Caville, they spent over \$1,000, as a group, shopping.

The minimum they make is \$33.44 a week above room and board and social security. They can make more money, depending on their output. One girl made \$25 in eight hours; another made \$30 in one week. Their roundtrip airplane expenses are paid by the farm.

Barbara Holmes is the Florida supervisor located at Kelley. One of the local supervisors, Nancy Della of Broad Brook, has been with the program for 18 years, 10 or 11 as supervisor. Without the Florida girls, the tobacco industry in Connecticut probably would have difficulty surviving. A failure in this industry would affect the entire economy of the state. It pays the industry to keep these girls happy.

'Films Reflect The World We Live In'

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Thirty years ago, film audiences were startled to hear Rhet Butler's response to Scarlett O'Hara's query of what would happen to her if he left her.

Clark Gable as Rhet turned to Vivien Leigh and snapped, "Frankly my dear, I don't give a damn."

The line caused a furor in Hollywood because movie star Will Hays allowed no such language in movies. Producer David O. Selznick argued that the millions who had read "Gone with the Wind" would ridicule the film industry if a watered-down version of the famous line were used. Hays relented, but Selznick had to pay a \$5,000 fine for violating the Production Code.

When audiences see "Gone with the Wind" today, Gable's line causes many a ripple. The "damn" seems utterly tame by the language of current movies. It's conceivable that Rhet Butler would have blushed at some of the dialogue in the new film.

In the past three years, words that were once specifically banned by the Production Code have become commonplace on the screen.

The past year has brought two four-letter words for letter functions out of the locker room and into the movie theaters. Next: The common words for fornication, perversion and genitalia.

Such words are used in underground movies and were heard in the independently made "Ulysses" the text being taken directly from James Joyce's original novel.

Now a film made for release by a major company will feature such words. It is "Medium Cool," a drama based on the Chicago riots during the Democratic National Convention last year. Paramount is releasing the film, which has received an X rating (children under 16 not admitted) by the Industry's Production and Rating Code.

The Code's new administrator, Gene Dougherty, was asked what the industry's policy is for strong language.

"There is no quick rule of thumb," he replied. "I try to avoid any hard-and-fast rules, because as soon as I made them, I would probably have some reason to break them."

"For instance, I never expected I would approve 'son of a bitch' in any picture rated G for general audiences. Yet I did that for 'True Grit.'"

He added that "Medium Cool" was classified X not only for its language but because of "a scene of nudity in a sex-oriented situation."

Said Dougherty: "We take a long, hard look at any film that contains vulgar language. Our evaluation is strictly on a qualitative, not a quantitative basis."

And we don't arrive at our judgment in a whimsical or capricious manner. Each case is based on its own merits. "Movies reflect the world we live in; they don't create it. About venereal disease in grammar schools didn't invent lipsticks or mar school and prostitution in adultery; such things exist, and movies must change with the times. It's unreasonable to believe that movies should maintain a pristine purity."

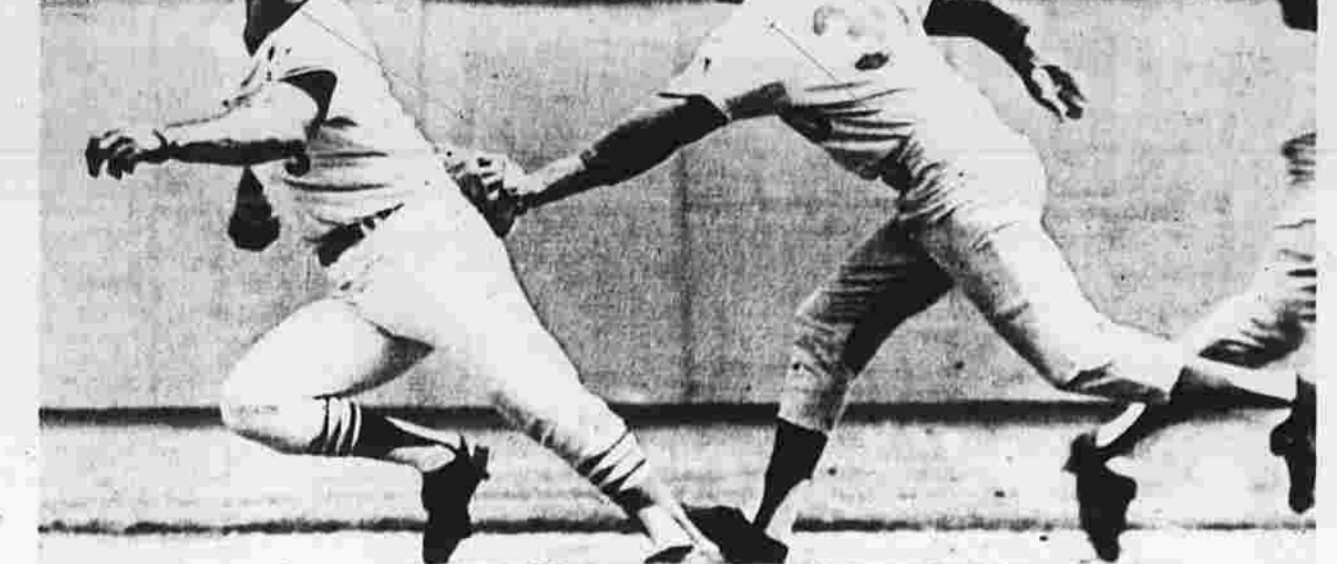
