The Ribicoff-Rockefeller Complaint. Two of the first criticisms of President Nixon's new welfare system proposals come from opposite sides of the political fence, but from a similar point of view.

Connecticut's own Senator Ribicoff declares that the new proposal seems "great for Mississippi but what does it do for Hartford?"

And New York's Governor Rockefeller, while conceding the theoretical advantages made in the new approach toward the welfare problem nationally, complains that the Nixon proposals, in their present form, mean that "states which have done the most to help those in need will receive the least benefits."

This indirect benefit is probably never going to be big enough or real enough to persuade Senator Ribicoff and Governor Rockefeller that their states shouldn't get a larger share of the new federal largesse. They obviously consider it their duty to put the case for their own taxpayers as strongly as possible.

The importance of style. If there is anybody who supposedly knows the importance of style it is the French. And they are probably not too surprised, therefore, to find that the world is reacting more to the manner in which they accomplished devaluation of the franc than to the devaluation itself.

People who are not sure what the economic effect of the French devaluation may be, once the world money markets have settled down to it, have been eager to volunteer admission of their devaluation coup.

The policy that was formally announced a few minutes after the close of the New York Stock Market on Aug. 8 was actually decided upon as early as July 16. In all that long interval, only slight human beings knew what was going to happen. They managed to keep the secret to themselves.

All this thus became the classic model for all future devaluation attempts by any government in any currency. This was how it should be done. None of the visible public agency which usually leads up to such a decision. None of the wild rumors of imminent action which tantalize the speculators. None of the secret trips to the favored few which can create scandal.

Instead a firm, clean decision, made before the final emergency itself had finally arrived, had discreetly private, efficiently planned and programmed, and then announced with perfect timing on a sleepy Friday afternoon in the midst of world vacation season.

Sometimes the perfect payoff for the superb style with which a difficult feat is performed is the elimination of much of the dangerous consequences that might otherwise be involved. It ever a devaluation looked good, it was this one.

It was a habit so strong that the default masterpiece of English literature were set against high greenery; Chaucer's Canterbury pilgrims make an April journey, Ophelia sings to her death clutching "weedy trophies, Palstaff and Justice Shallow sit outdoors on a fine summer evening, Tom Jones is from the lushness of Somerset.

Lawrence was isolated for the urban folk culture with which the working masses softened the past 20 years has been shown to be extremely defective and unenlightened. The common people stand to gain the most from change and yet their culture is a sort of insulation against it. It is, alas, a culture of placid covers and called salience.

A smug, privileged class and workers who cannot understand the ways in which the world has changed are consequences of colonialism; and we are, of course, a colonial people. Culturally we are the extreme. We are not terror'd but we are bewildered and every day our limitations are replaced by those of the master culture. New York and Los Angeles are the front-line cities of the 1960s in the sense that Manchester was the front line city of the 1840s. They are their shadow and image, bound to imitate their artistic modes and bound to discover in ourselves the best that we do is not important.

This is what is at stake with a terrible, irresistible address. One cannot believe, since one is moved by each pretense, that the landscape changes in English art could die. Yet it already has. Vulgar suburbia spreads everywhere we work to suit the production line, one of our own artefacts, and not the time of year or the weather. The landscape has been lost to the moral center it retained. It is a sentimental object like a china duck, or a recreational environment, like a golf course. It has ceased to be a scale against which destruction may be measured and the artistic forms which express them are abstract and electronic.

Perhaps our inspiration should be another strand in our art. For although Christian met the Jew, the Jew met the Christian in the fields, his eyes were not on the greenery. They were on his salvation. Like the Halleluiah, Christian learned that to find satisfaction he must act decisively and not be afraid to change his mode of life. WASHINGTON — One reason why President Nixon's safeguard anti-ballistic missile mandate to speak through the Senate Thursday may have been the reluctance to compromise by Sen. Philip Hart of Michigan, leader of Democratic anti-ABM forces.

The question of compromise was at the core of the cloak room struggle waged last week for the support of Sen. Clinton Anderson of New Mexico, one of the Senate's most respected Democratic elders.

For months, Anderson had been considered an ABM supporter. About one week before the vote, however, Anderson mentioned in a private discussion to anti-ABM Sen. George McGovern of South Dakota that he was deeply concerned over the prospect of adopting a measure which would authorize the use of new weapons systems by so narrow a margin.

That would have meant letting Anderson rewrite the amendment to the military authorization bill, co-sponsored by Democrat Hart and Republican John Sherman Cooper of Kentucky, barring ABM deployment.

Drug Runs Spur U.S. to Restrain Mexican Flights

Former Cosa Nostra Chief, Six Others Sought in Killing

BOSTON (AP) — Raymond L. S. Patriarca, identified before a U.S. Senate Subcommittee as one-time head of the Cosa Nostra in New England, and six other men were charged by the Justice Department today with conspiring to plan a gangland killing and racketeering activity.

The slaying was that of Ruffalo, who was killed in Providence, R.I., on April 20, 1968, by a pair of gunmen in Atlanta on a conviction of conspiring to kill Ruffalo's brother William in 1966.

Three of the six have been arrested by FBI agents. The others were sought on fugitive warrants, a spokesman for the FBI here said.

Those in custody were identified as Maurice R. Lerner, 33, of Brookline, Mass.; a suburb of Boston; Robert E. Fairbrother, 31, of Providence; and John E. Rossi, 29, also of Providence.

Lerner and Fairbrother were in the store at the time, but they escaped injury. The getaway car was found about four hours later about a half mile away. Police said it had been stolen and had phone license plates. It contained five loaded weapons and an assortment of clothing.

A North Providence man, Robert W. Almon, 48, was convicted last May 23 in Providence of first degree murder in the double slaying of John Ruffalo, 61, of Providence, and his brother William in 1966.

Almon was picked up at the Rhode Island State Penitentiary in Providence's Federal Jail here.

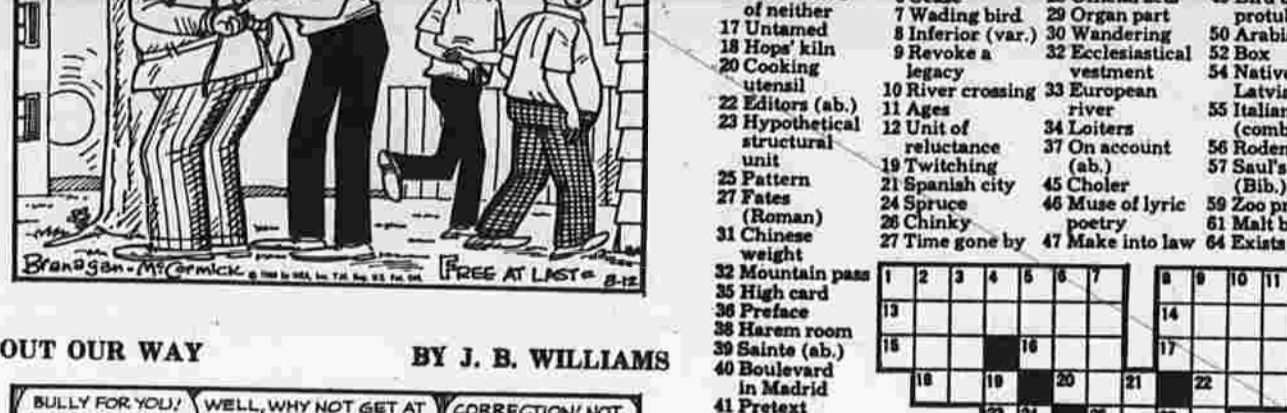
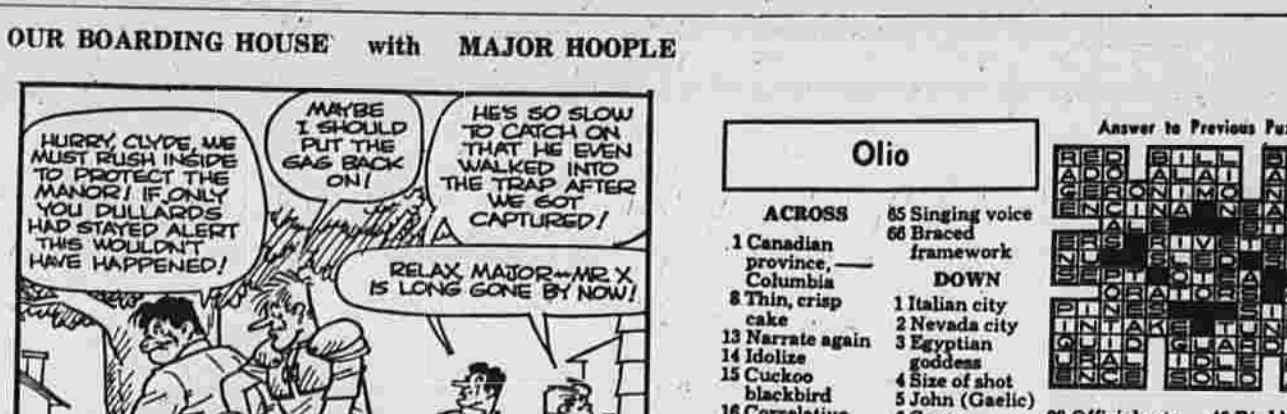

Nixon Says: Let States Share Income Tax Cash

SAN CLEMENTE, Calif. (AP) — President Nixon asked Congress today to start sharing income tax revenues with the states as a set amount to expand their own tax resources, a state whose revenue effort is above the national average would get on a fixed portion to city governments.

Nixon envisioned that most of the money would go to education. And he saw the whole project as a means of "shifting the balance of political power from Washington back to the country and the people" and "narrowing the distance between the people and the government agencies dealing with their problems."

President Nixon, declaring he intends to hold the line on congressional spending, has criticized Congress for spending \$1.1 billion to his budget for fiscal 1970.

He issued a statement Tuesday taking the House to task for taking the additional outlay to the budget he recommended for the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

"I regard this action as inconsistent with the intent of Congress to take earlier when it imposed a ceiling on spending for the current fiscal year," Nixon said.

He added that congressional action to date on his revenue request, which he said is "pointing" and that he hoped in future actions it would live up to its commitments to fiscal responsibility.

House Delays Action On School Loans

WASHINGTON (AP) — With the start of college classes only weeks away, Congress has left the guaranteed student loan program hanging in limbo.

The Senate voted 92-1 Tuesday to revive the program, but the House couldn't resolve a squabble over student rioting which will delay action until Sept. 3 when the congressional vacation ends.

Opponents of the bill argued that passage this month was essential so college-bound students could get the money necessary for many of them to continue their education.

The Senate bill makes Aug. 15 the effective date in the hope that banks will trust Congress to take final action on continuing the program by the end of the session.

Fearing another fight over campus riots, House sponsors moved quickly to take the bill to the floor under the usual rules permitting amendments.

Members wanting to add anti-riot provisions refused to allow the bill to be taken up under no-amendment arrangement.

The loan program is in trouble because the cost of borrowing money has risen by six per cent interest or higher, while the student loans have a 7 per cent interest ceiling.
