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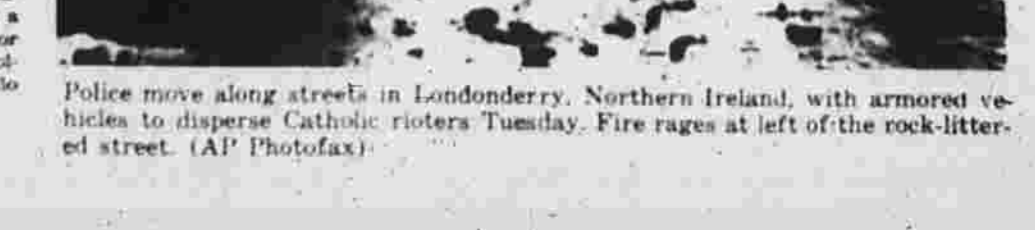
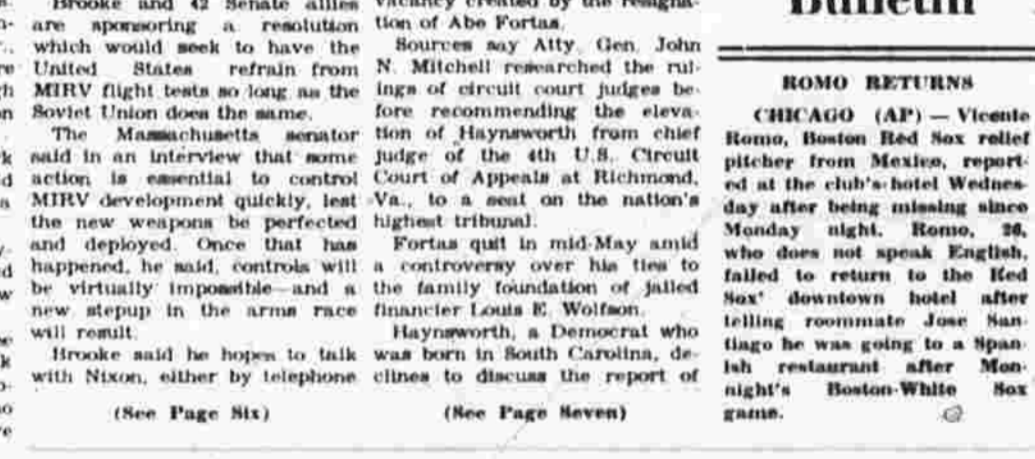
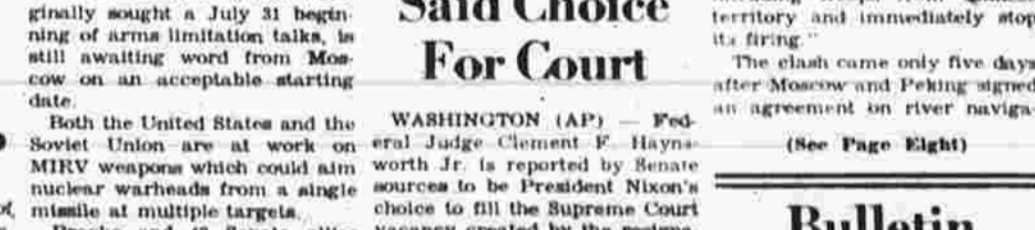

Vernon Judge Advises a Youth, 17, It's Better 'Out of Jail'

"People do care!" insisted a 17-year-old youth who looked confident yesterday. Circuit Court Judge Thomas C. Christian carefully explained the details of why it's better not to be in jail to Robert Morse Jr. who formerly lived at 48 1/2 Village St., Rockville. Morse had made it clear he didn't care whether or not he was sent to jail. The boy was charged with three counts of breach of peace in June on the complaint of his mother, Mrs. Frances Ovesian. He had caused disturbances at her home and also the family relative officer that she didn't want her son back in the house. The custody was divorced. Morse has been in the custody of his father, Robert Morse Sr. of Stafford, and this arrangement was continued as the court of probation Judge Christian specified only brief visits with the mother. Morse was sentenced to 30 days on each of two counts of the breach of peace charges and 60 days on the third, all to be served in the state reformatory for juveniles. Another mother appeared in court to request that her son be released from confinement at the State Correctional Center. She was granted. Michael W. Secore, 16, of 151 South St., Rockville, has two weeks to serve of a 90-day sentence. They had been arrested along with a third youth for causing damage to property in Ellington Cemetery. Falcon was fined \$40 and Maynard \$20. John Belasky, 35, of 72 Montauk Dr., Vernon, was fined \$100 for operating under the influence of liquor. Philip Martin, 27, of 25 Village St., Rockville, was fined \$100 for driving under suspension. An additional charge of following too close was noted. McCormick was fined \$30 for one count of trespassing with three counts of breach of peace and two other counts of trespassing. All of your friends will love you and will say what a good loser you are. Don't read today's bridge column if you really enjoy being known as a good loser. South dealer. Opening lead - Six of Spades. West opened the six of spades, and East, a fine sport and a good loser, played the ace. East continued with the queen of spades, and South held back the king. East next led his low spade, and South won with the king. South then went after the king and East took his king. East couldn't lead another East spade, much as he would have liked to do so. East actually returned a diamond (as good as anything else), and South took his king. East's one spade, one heart and three diamonds. Mystery Explained. If you're mystified by all this talk about good losers, that's your friend, since it proves that you're not so good at bridge as you think you are. What do you say? Answer: Bid 2-N-T, showing balanced distribution, strength in all of the solid suits, and a stop in the fourth. This cost a lot of money. East had led from the king of spades since then East's queen will win the trick and he can continue with the ace of spades and the low heart. The queen of spades defeats the contract if South cannot afford to hold up his king. Stardom's 'Vulgar'; Barbra Prefers Scrubbing Pantry

Some performers get a thrill out of winning over a cold audience - I talked to Elvis about it last night; he doesn't care. It turns me off. My work now is making movies. I enjoy it. I understand it. And you can work a normal day and have your weekends. 'One is human, but the fans want to keep you supernatural. I want to prefer fantasy to reality, but now I like reality. The healthier I get, the harder it is to get out and perform. Real life is more important to me than performing. I don't care about stardom; I like a pleasure you wouldn't believe from scrubbing my pantry.' Performers watching another actor perform feel a powerful urge to get up and work themselves. Not Barbra. She says: 'It feels vulgar, exhibitionistic. I don't care about stardom; I care about my son, my friends, my own life - my mind, my body, my emotions, more about that than about being a star or preserving some kind of image. What do you say? She debated six months before she signed the contract with the International she, she, and now she's on tour. But she's not a star. She's a woman who's had long, long thoughts (negative) about the whole business of performing before large audiences. "The sooner a large-scale inquiry is called and the matter resolved, the sooner he (Kennedy) can get down to the business of making the world a better place. It would be a waste if the world were to lose the ability of this talented young man." The Mirror did not explain how the federal government might inject itself into a case which lies wholly within the jurisdiction of the state of Massachusetts. Other comment about American news from abroad this week concerned the Nixon administration's new Asia policy and the Safeguard debate in the Senate. A British journalist said former Secretary of State John Foster Dulles "must be revivified in his grave" now that the Nixon administration has disowned "his doctrine of the necessity for military containment of the spread of communism." Christopher Serpell, diplomat, correspondent for the British Broadcasting Corp., commented: "Back into the old analogy book goes his row of dominoes; the famous simile long used as proof that if one Southeast Asian nation fell a victim of communism, its neighbors would inevitably topple too. Instead, these countries have been given a general option on self-help - 'Do It Yourself' - complete with a warning that the

Housewives Plan 'Sacrifice' Protest Over Costly Beef

COCOA BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Budget-conscious housewives in this resort community have threatened a beef boycott to protest soaring meat costs.

Jan Stophlett, a mother of two and the leader of the housewives' brigade, said the beef boycott would be a "super sacrifice" but had to come.

"My food bill averaged \$135 a month in 1964 and the same stuff would cost me about \$225 monthly in 1969. That hurts," she said.

"If they don't like it, let 'em buy cheap cuts," one meat packer said after hearing of the boycott.

Kaufman, chief manager of Wilson and Co. in Miami, said, "Nobody ever hears a word when prices sink. Then let 'em rise, and they scream."

The president of the National Cattlemen's Association said he didn't like the idea of a boycott. Contacted at his home in Cedar Vale, Kan., Bill House said, "That lady at Cape Kennedy is better off than anyone in agriculture."

"Beef," House said, "is the best bargain in the United States today."

Kaufman said production costs have caused increases more often than prices paid for beef by packers.

A Cocoa woman, Mrs. Grover Morgan, was forming a Central Broward boycott group and said she had already met with other boycott leaders.

"I've just decided to grab the bull by the horns and fight the price of beef," Mrs. Morgan said.

She said she urged her friends to call everyone they know, adding, "I really think it's going to work."

Mrs. Stophlett said, "My family loves beef, so it's a super sacrifice. If the boycott doesn't work we'll then haul out picket placards and bumper stickers for a little noisier campaign."

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Engineers Plan Ways to Control Tumbling ATS 5

By JIM STROTSMAN, Aerospace Writer, Cape Kennedy, Fla. (AP)—With its chances of survival raised to a real cliffhanger for the next two weeks, a \$12 million experimental satellite tumbled around Earth today while engineers planned ways to bring it under control.

Launched Tuesday, the 1,600-pound craft—called ATS 5 for fifth Applications Technology Satellite—ended up in the right orbit but on the wrong side of Earth and began spinning end-over-end.

Despite the problems, Robert J. Darcy, chief of the ATS office at the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Goddard Space Flight Center, rated chances as "pretty damn good" that the spacecraft can be straightened out and shifted to its desired station over the Pacific 600 miles west of South America.

An attempt to regain control probably will not take place for two weeks, however, and another official predicted "it'll be a real cliffhanger" until then.

Packed with apparatus for 3 experiments including extensive tests on a satellite as long as a football field, the satellite was designed to test ideas for spacecraft of the future.

Capra Eligible, NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP)—The city's Corporation Counsel has ruled that Republican mayor Paul C. Capra is eligible to hold the city's highest office.

Thomas F. Keyes found Tuesday that Capra meets the requirements of the city charter—that a mayor must be a resident and legal voter of the city for at least five years prior to election.

The question arose when an apparent clerical error eliminated Capra's name from the 1965 voting list, although he had registered to vote Sept. 28, 1964.

Keyes said, "It is evident that his name was omitted from the 1965 list because of a clerical error."

Capra said, "In my mind, there was never any question of my eligibility."

The party's convention is scheduled for tonight.

Oppose 'Contributory Negligence' ABA Adopts Code On Fees, Press, Poor

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—The American Bar association has adopted a new code of ethics for lawyers and proposed a constitutional overhaul of the way automobile accident claims are settled in court.

It states and local bar associations go along, lawyers will be forbidden to charge clients accused of crime a fee that depends on the way the case turns out. Such a charge is called a contingent fee.

Additionally, the code says contingent fees would be "routinely justified" in divorce, child support and other domestic relations cases.

The restriction on extrajudicial public statements about a pending criminal case has the stated purpose of assuring the defendant a fair trial.

In effect, the lawyer would be prohibited from telling newsmen much beyond the general scope of the investigation and a description of the offense. If late permits, the lawyer also could identify the victim.

The auto reparations proposal would scrap the "contributory negligence" approach to settlements. These prevent an accident victim from recovering if the defense can prove the victim contributed to the accident in the slightest way.

Instead, the Wisconsin system of "comparative negligence" would be used. A victim would recover if the jury decided the defendant was more negligent than the victim. The jury would cut down the settlement proportionately to the victim's negligence.

For instance, if Jones sues Smith and Jones is found to be 40 per cent at fault, Jones would recover—but only 60 per cent of the amount he would recover if Smith were entirely at fault.

Additionally, in areas where 12-man juries are used, the agreement of nine or more jurors would suffice for a verdict.

The committee, headed by Theodore Voorhes, a Washington, D.C., lawyer, was itself divided, though a majority backed the Tying bill in principle.

Lawyers B.B. Gullett, of Nashville, Tenn., and Earl Q. Gray, of Ardmore, Okla., led a successful fight to put off further consideration until next February, when the ABA meets again.

The Tying bill would set up a commission of five federal judges appointed by the chief justice to investigate complaints about a judge's behavior. On a finding of misconduct, the U.S. Judicial Conference, the policy-making arm of the federal judiciary, could remove the judge from his duties. He could appeal conference decisions to the Supreme Court.

At present, a judge can be removed only through impeachment.

The ethics code was put together over the last five years by a committee headed by Edward L. Wright, a Little Rock, Ark., lawyer who will become president of the ABA next summer.

Senate Skirmishes Over Thai Policy

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate fighting over military policy and spending has entered a three-week lull but not before a hot skirmish over a proposal to put strict limits on U.S. assistance to Laos and Thailand. Sen. John Sherman Cooper, who touched off the battle Tuesday, said opposition by Nixon administration backers and members of the Armed Services Committee might be explained by reports he has heard that U.S. troops are flying helicopters in support of Thai troops battling insurgents in northern Thailand.

Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, stormed out of the committee after the Pentagon refused to produce copies of the 1964 agreement. "Rumor has it," Church told the Senate later, "that the plans not only contemplate the use of American troops, but an arrangement that would actually place them under Thai command." But, according to Sen. Stuart Symington, D-Mo., one Pentagon witness made it clear that "nothing was done under the agreement, and should be taken up with the Congress." Symington, who opposed Cooper's proposal said "We've seen it all in Laos for years and it's time we stopped fooling the American people."

Macon County Black Sheriff Finds White Hostility Wanes

TUSKEGEE, Ala. (AP) — More equitable representation in local government, "able voting will continue," says Sheriff Laucus D. Amerson. He says white hostility is waning.

His biggest problems are those of most other law enforcement officers.

There was undignified evidence of resentment in the white community of Macon County when he took office in January 1967. But Amerson and some white leaders, too, say time and the sheriff's conduct have erased much of the ill will.

"The public attitude has really changed. It has changed tremendously," said Amerson, 35. "And this has helped destroy a lot of mythologies—the feeling that existed among Negroes as well as whites that a Negro sheriff couldn't get cooperation from the white community and from other law enforcement agencies."

When Amerson was elected, he proclaimed a policy of color-blind law enforcement in the county, where blacks outnumber whites 5:1. Negroes and whites alike would be arrested if they broke the law, he said. There would be no discrimination.

He has carried out that promise, says Editor Stan Jackson of the weekly Tuskegee News, "and the people respect him for it."

A former sheriff, Preston Herring—who is now prothonotary judge of the county—says "I hear less talk of resentment every day." In fact, he adds, "I just don't hear much talk at all."

A white businessman, speaking anonymously, finds the community "pretty well acquiescent" now. "I don't find any real resentment anymore."

Like many fellow officers, the powerfully built former Army MP says some recent court decisions are "detrimental to effective law enforcement."

For instance:

On a highway near Tuskegee, a pickup truck made a sudden U-turn and fled at the approach of a sheriff car with its telltale emergency light on top. Suspicious, two Negro deputies gave chase and overtook the truck.

On the road, in his view, was a plastic vial of marijuana. The two occupants of the truck, says Amerson, were black, longed and incoherent.

They were taken to jail for questioning; a search warrant produced more marijuana hidden in the truck. The two men were charged with violating the state narcotics law.

But the charges were dismissed, the sheriff says, on grounds that there was nothing illegal about the vial; that the deputies had no lawful right to stop the truck. Consequently, the men could not be prosecuted for possession of narcotics.

But the court says that's the law, Amerson philosophized, and he is sworn to uphold the law regardless of personal feelings.

Like many Southern county officials, Amerson draws no salary. He lives on fees from making arrests and serving subpoenas and other official papers. The county buys uniforms for the sheriff's force and pays the deputies. But the sheriff has to buy his own official car, gasoline, tires—even guns.

The fee system should be abolished, the sheriff says, and law enforcement officers should be paid a salary commensurate with the "responsibility and dignity of the office."

"I can make a comfortable living the way it is," he explains, "but I have to bump to do it. It just isn't good when the amount of money a sheriff makes depends on how many people he puts in jail."

"I get a tax deduction on gas," he said, "but when I drive into a service station, I have to pay the same price any other motorist does."

Amerson figures he could save money by going into the service station business. He could buy gas wholesale, sell it to himself at cost and still get the tax deduction.

"I've thought about doing it," he chuckled.

Amerson seems to have relaxed since his early days in office, when newsmen found him reluctant to talk, almost distrustful.

His role as a Negro sheriff has taken him across the nation for speaking engagements. Pictures on his office wall show him chatting with former President Johnson and former Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey. Amerson's watched with great interest the election of six Negroes to county office in rural Greene County, 150 miles across-state to the west. He was born on a farm in Greene County.

The victory of the black candidates over white incumbents gave the Negroes control of the county commission and the school board, says Amerson. "It was the best thing that could have happened."

He is hopeful that the break-through in Greene County—one of several counties, like Macon, where Negroes have a voting majority—will facilitate the election of Negroes elsewhere in Alabama.

Until that comes about, Amerson says, and until Negroes get

Penn Allowed To Drop Runs

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Interstate Commerce Commission authorized the Penn Central Co. today to abandon two passenger trains between Albany, N.Y., and Boston.

The discontinuance could take effect immediately.

In authorizing the move, the ICC noted that the rail claimed losses of \$106,222 each year along the 214-mile route.

Penn Central had sought the authority on grounds of steadily declining patronage. In the last eight years aboard the trains, No. 408 and No. 406, the ICC said, average daily patronage on 408 dropped from 227 to 190 to only 13 last year. During the same period, patronage on 406 declined from 69 a day to 10.1.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The head nurse at St. Christopher's Hospital for Children is a man—and that's not an easy combination.

William Miller decided on a nursing career while a school boy of 15 in his native Mahanoy City, Pa. He wanted to follow on his mother's footsteps.

"My father agreed I should try, although he wasn't quite sure I knew what I was getting into," recalls the 31-year-old bachelor.

"My mother said it was okay, but she was sure I'd never make it."

After high school he enrolled in St. Joseph's Hospital Nursing School in Philadelphia, with 32 girl classmates.

"I had been warned that some women might feel threatened or express hostility but I never felt any of this," he says.

After becoming an R.N., Miller decided he had to go for a master's degree if he wanted to be a director of nursing. Now as director of nursing he heads a staff that includes 275 registered and practical nurses.

Every day at the 150-bed hospital, he begins his 10-hour rotation by making the rounds.

"I try to see each patient and



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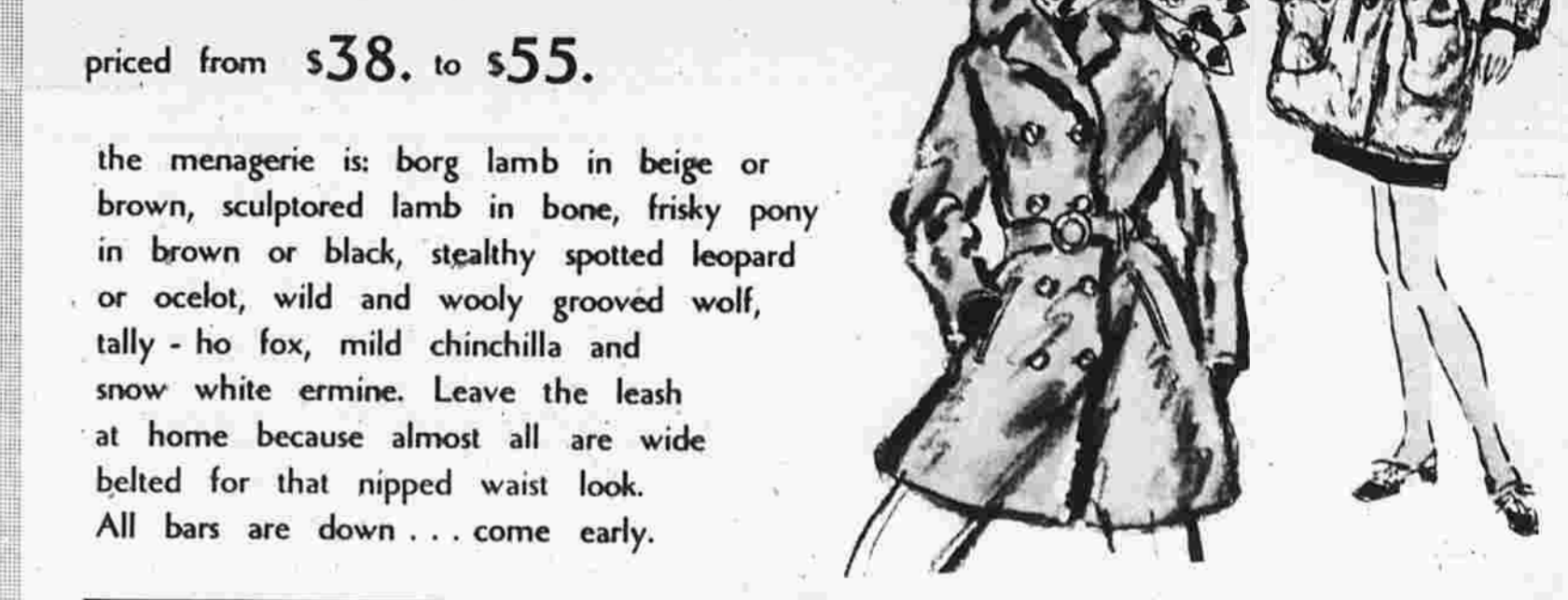

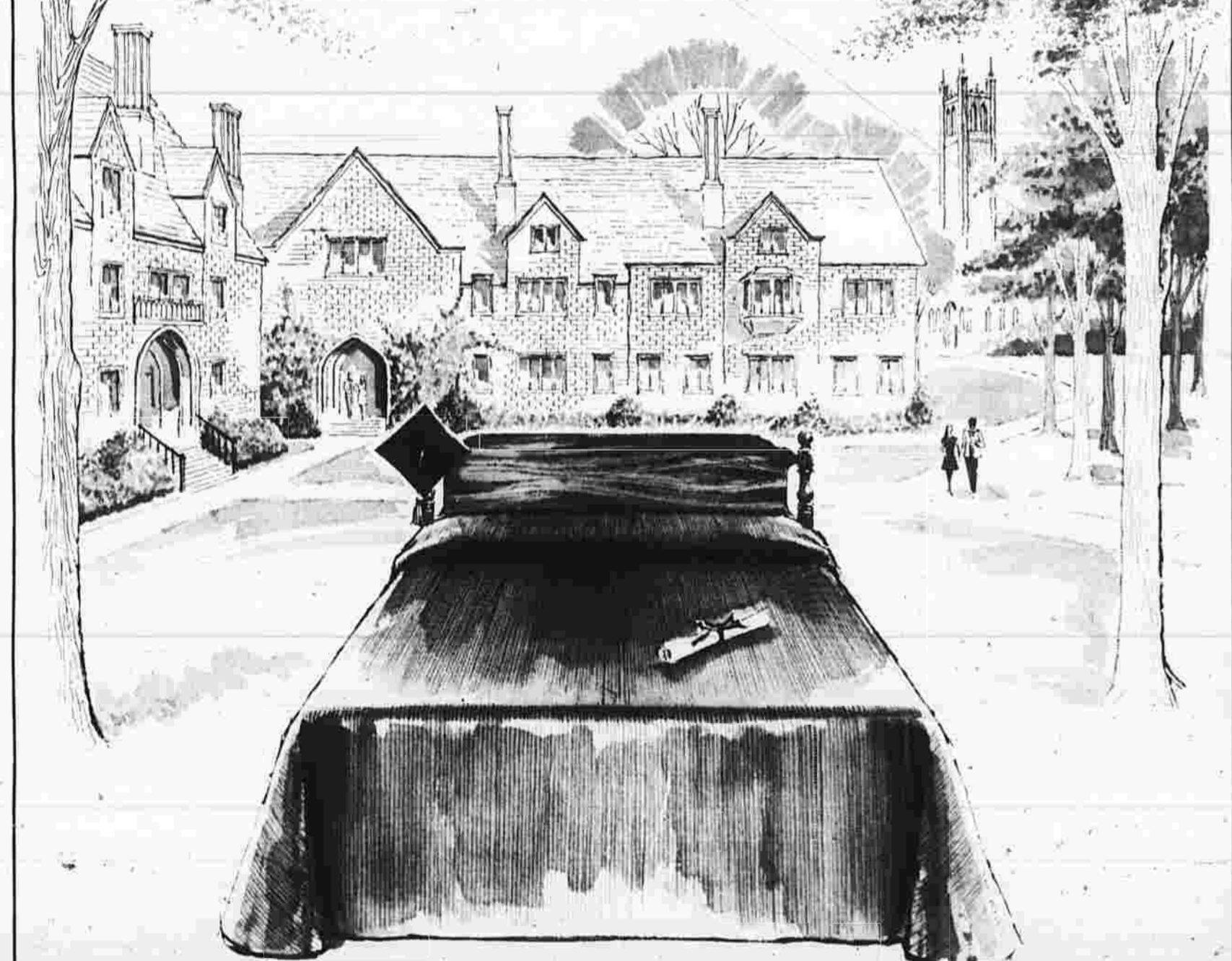

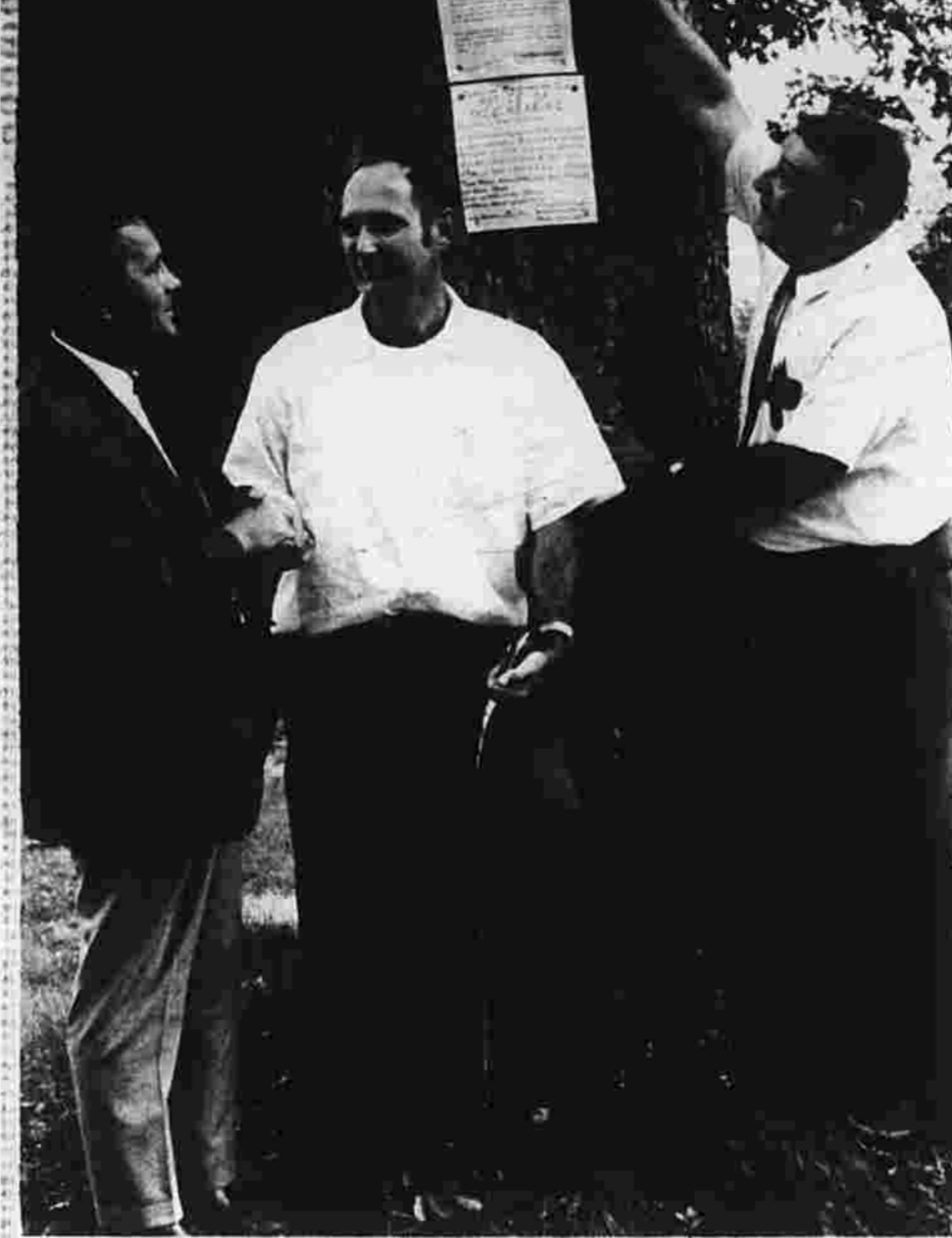

Poets, Scientists To Map 'Human Survival Strategy'

STOCKHOLM — We live in an age of conference. Perhaps because reality is so feverish, we turn to the make-believe of the council chamber where words seem the same as actions, and where the suggestion that salvation is on the way.

They aim high, many of these conferences, but few as high as one now planned in Stockholm which bears his name. It is boldly described as devising "a strategy for human survival."

Philosophers, scientists, historians, poets and economists have agreed to take part. They include Nobel Prize winners among them: Prof. A.M. Prokhorov, a Russian physicist laureate, and the American chemist, Linus Pauling, who twice won the Nobel Prize. He presided over the Chemistry Award for laboratory work on nuclear fusion, and the Peace Prize for trying to curb military abuse.

Other distinguished participants include W.H. Auden, Sir Isaiah Berlin, Arthur Koestler, Konrad Lorenz, the Australian ethnologist, and Ralph Bunche, U.N. assistant secretary-general.

They have been invited to Stockholm, and the meeting is financed by the Nobel Foundation. This Foundation is one of the more famous examples of an achieving conscience. It was established by the will of Alfred Nobel, the Swede who invented dynamite and the modern detonator, thus founding the science of high explosives, and introducing the last revolution in the practice of warfare before the advent of the nuclear bomb.

Nobel died in 1896, but he lived to see both the splendid and appalling consequences of his

An 'Inflammable' Laos Border Watched by U.S. Military Men

DA NANG, SOUTH VIETNAM — While conditions for demilitarizing the Demilitarized Zone have not seemed as favorable in the last five years as they do today, the Laos border remains highly inflammable in the opinion of American military men.

The North Vietnamese are judged capable of launching fresh offensives from the mountains across the narrow neck of northernmost South Vietnam against Hue, Da Nang and other populated localities along the coast of the five provinces that constitute I Corps.

U. S. Marines and airborne troops have uncovered the war's largest caches of supplies in the last seven months right up against the border of Laos, depriving the North Vietnamese of some of their potential.

But in at least one respect the North Vietnamese are better off than they were at this time last year. Since the halt in American bombings of the southern panhandle of North Vietnam Nov. 1, the North Vietnamese have again been able to transport supplies unhindered to the DMZ. Bridges have been rebuilt.

From just north of the DMZ the North Vietnamese have been moving supplies over two newly improved roads running southwest to Laos and then south around the western end of the DMZ.

One of these roads just cuts through the northwest corner of the DMZ, but the line was well to the west of the mountain crest giving Vietnam a strip of territory whose rivers flowed west into the Mekong River rather than east into the South China Sea.

Stamps In the News

The English Channel Islands—Jersey and Guernsey—will issue their own stamps starting Oct. 1 and will introduce a new line of items for collectors. Previously the stamps of these islands were issued by the British Post Office.

There will be 16 stamps in the first definitive issue of the Bailiwick of Guernsey with designs ranging from Charles Cornet, founded in the 18th century to the Guernsey lily. The Jersey definitives are 15 in number and depict a variety of historical sites—with one stamp featuring a Jersey cow.

Each of the stamps also bears a profile portrait of Queen Elizabeth II.

A stamp surplus in this country reports that commemoratives and issues for these islands are now being planned.

The United Nations Postal Administration has produced an attractive full-color brochure of the U.N. stamps to be issued in 1970. The brochure is available with brief descriptions. Copies free by sending a self-addressed envelope to the United Nations Postal Administration, United Nations, New York, N.Y. 10017.

The brochure also contains order forms with instructions for ordering these forthcoming U.N. stamps and indicating the values in U.S. currency.

Collectors of United Nations stamps will want to obtain first-day covers, too, and now have ample time to make arrangements, as announced previously in this column.

The Republic of China in Taiwan has begun a "Model Citizens Life Movement" by order of President Chiang Kai-shek, reports the World Wide Philatelic Agency. To honor and publicize this movement, a new set of three stamps has been issued with each stamp diagonally bisected into two illustrations.

One stamp depicts proper attitudes about food and clothing. Another stamp shows correct methods of housekeeping and the healthful pleasures of walking. The third picture shows the importance of education and recreational pursuits.

These new stamps are available at your local stamp dealer or stamp department.

Here's a chilly thought for a warm day.

The American Society of Philatologists has proposed that the U.S. Post Office Department issue a stamp in 1970 to honor the 150th anniversary of the discovery of Palmer Peninsula in the Antarctic. It was discovered in November 1820 by an American whaling captain named Nathaniel Palmer.

Oddly enough the British claim the area as part of the Falkland Islands while Argentina and Chile also declare ownership. Meanwhile, the U.S. maintains five permanent bases in the vicinity where more than 2,000 scientists and other personnel are involved in the study of weather and geology.

The last time the U.S. issued a stamp for Antarctica was in 1963 to honor the second Byrd expedition.

In the Mail Bag: Many readers from various parts of the country have inquired about the value of old stamps in their possession. Since it is almost impossible to determine the value of any stamp without a personal inspection, I suggest the owners of these items bring them to a stamp dealer in their area who will be able to give a first-hand appraisal.

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Tolland Estimates Sought on Cost Of School Use After Hours

The Board of Finance will request the Board of Education to prepare estimates of the cost of use of the local schools after school hours. In a decision reached at the finance board meeting last night, members agreed to set up a meeting between the finance board, the Board of Education and the Board of Selectmen to discuss the public use of the schools. Possible bookkeeping methods to be used to offset the costs involved if fees are charged will be investigated by finance board members.

The Board of Education decided to close the use of the schools to the general public after school hours as one of many areas out to keep within the \$17,000 budget approved by the annual town meeting.

Under state statutes all funds received from any town body must be turned over to the general fund, according to a decision rendered by Town Council Robert King. Presently, the finance board chairman, William Summers, is studying the costs involved in developing the recently purchased 45-acre addition to the industrial park.

Both Summers and the finance board generally agreed that the town should sell the land on a cost basis. Among the improvements necessary to open up the new area to development are the extension of an existing road into the industrial park, presently developed, laying water pipes to the site and installing storm drain pipes.

Summers stressed the need for "proper planning" of the new section, avoiding some of the "inefficiencies" which are included in the original section. With the additional 45 acres the town has a better chance to attract larger industries such as Kingfisher and Burroughs, Summers stated, warning against cutting the area up into too small lots.

An out-of-date prospect is presently looking over maps of the area and is interested in purchasing some acreage in the new site, Summers reported.

The Tolland 4-H Fair will be held Friday at the Tolland Agricultural Center on Rt. 30. The buildings will be open Thursday from 8 to 7 p.m. and on Friday from 9:30 until 1:30 to permit 4-H members to enter exhibits and set up booths. The judging ceremonies will begin at 2 p.m. Friday.

A buffet supper will be served beginning at 4:30, and a bake sale will be held. The 4-H Tolland County Band is scheduled to play during the event.

Men Using Perfumes— And Getting Rashes

CHICAGO (AP)— Modern males are beginning to have a problem previously peculiar to the opposite sex—rashes caused by deodorants and perfumes.

A dermatologist writing in The Journal of the American Medical Association blames "the recent renaissance of men's toiletries."

The dermatologist, Dr. Ernst Epstein of the San Mateo, Calif., Medical Clinic, reported treating 16 cases in four years, in which men experienced dermatitis caused by allergy to before-shaving preparations.

Allergic reactions to these preparations, he said, are facilitated by minute wounding of the skin during the whisker removal process. While the preparations usually are called after shave lotion or cologne, Epstein said, "the term 'perfume' best describes these clear, strongly aromatic liquids designed to impart a pleasant smell to the user."

Epstein determined that the perfumes were causing the skin problem through patch tests, in which he applied the preparations to various parts of the body.

One of the patients had a rash in his armpits because he used after shave lotion as a deodorant. Another used it on his thighs. A third was advised to stop using his lotion, but liked it so well he continued to apply it to his electric razor before shaving.

The 16 patients proved allergic to 10 brands of toiletries, Epstein reported. The brands were not named, and he said it was not possible to identify the perfume oils responsible for the allergy because the manufacturers would not disclose them.

Epstein added: "The incidence of perfume dermatitis in men is likely to increase, as perfumed shaving preparations have become very popular and are being promoted through intensive advertising campaigns."

THE FAMILY LAWYER

WIFE VERSUS PARENTS

If a bridegroom is lucky, his bride and his parents will work out their new relationship in sweet peace and harmony. But what if they don't—and he is "in the middle"? Where do his duties lie? By and large, the law says his wife comes first. Take this case: A man was hailed into court by his wife for non-support. In his defense, he explained: "I give every nickel I make to my elderly parents. I just feel they need the money more than we do." But the court decided this was no excuse, and ordered him to start taking care of his wife. The judge said she had first claim on his earnings. A similar principle applies to the family domicile. A man accused his wife of desertion, after she had good reason for leaving; her husband allowed his mother not only to live with them but also to run the household with an iron hand. Ruling in the wife's favor, the court said: "When a man marries and forms a new family, he assumes new duties. When conflict with his former ties, they must be held paramount. The very existence of the family depends on this principle. Whatever his filial obligations may be, a man may not bring his mother to reside in his new home. That place belongs to the wife."

Nevertheless, the law does not insist on total estrangement of a husband from his parents. In another case, a man brought his ailing, elderly mother into his home—partly for the sake of sentiment, partly for the sake of economy. However, it was his wife, not his mother, who had full charge of managing the household. Was this husband falling down on his marital obligations? This time, a court said no. The judge said that, although a wife does rank as Number One, she still must make fair and reasonable adjustments to reality—to make the marriage work.

Mayor Sues Self In Zoning Case HARTFORD, (AP)—Mayor James M. Brown Jr. is suing himself, but he's charged if he's going to serve himself with a subpoena and then try himself in court. Sound kind of complicated? It is. In addition to being mayor and a member of the Town Council, Brown is police chief and judge in this hamlet of 200. He and his nephew, Chris Robinson, jointly own a piece of property near the Intercoastal Waterway. Robinson recently opened a boat sales lot on the acreage. The Town Council changed Robinson with a violation of its zoning ordinance which requires sales operations to be housed under a roof. As mayor, Brown ordered his nephew either to comply with the act within 30 days or remove the boats. Robinson did neither. The Town Council, including Brown, then voted unanimously to go to court for an injunction to close the boat lot. As president of the two-man corporation owning the land, Brown was named defendant. As police chief it seemed up to him to serve himself with the court papers. And then, as judge. At this point Brown called a halt in the train of events.
