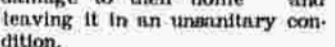

MIAMI (AP) - More than half a million residents of the Gulf coast from Florida to Mississippi were placed on a hurricane watch today as Camille howled toward that area with 100-mile an hour winds.

Red and black hurricane warning flags were expected to fly by noon EDT for a smaller, more pinpointed area.

Slowly retreating, but still in the eye of the storm, Camille chugged southward toward the Florida West Coast and all the way around the Gulf to Grand Isle, La.

At 9 a.m. EDT, Camille was located near latitude 24.1 north, longitude 80.5 west or about 40 miles south of Miami City, Fla. Gale gusts out 100 miles from the center.

"Camille is a dangerous hurricane and poses a great threat to the United States mainland," said the Hurricane Center at Miami.

Dr. Robert H. Simpson, director of the center, said the full force of the hurricane should strike the coast Sunday.

Troopers Say Rock Festival Cripples Area

The dockworker, Barry Murphy, 23, climbed down from the flag pole and announced that he was part of the Irish peace force to restore order in the North. London and Belfast promptly rejected the offer.

Marines Act Like Civilians In Race Clash

CAMP LEJEUNE, N.C. (AP) — Maj. Gen. Michael P. Ryan, commander of Camp Lejeune, says a recent racial clash at the Marine base was a reflection of similar tensions in civilian life.
The Marine Corps has "those who hate because of color," just as the general population does, he said in an interview Friday.
"The same assaults of groups against individuals are occurring in the cities," he added.
The general said he has taken measures to prevent future assaults and to "cope with the sources of racial tension at the base. We're trying to insure that our personnel understand the Marine Corps is going to guarantee equal rights and protection."
About 30 Negro and Puerto Rican Marines clashed with 14 white Marines the night of July 20 after a party at an enlisted men's club. One of the white Marines died a week later, and three Negro and two Puerto Rican Marines have been charged with murder and with rioting in the incident.
The general said the provost marshal's office has been keeping statistics on assaults involving men of the 2nd Marine Division at Lejeune. He said that from Jan. 1 to the first week of August 180 assaults were reported, most of them by individuals and involving a fight or robbery.

Under such a plan, the over-all allied command would be exercised by Field Marshal Thanom Kittikachorn, Thailand's prime minister and defense minister.
The 1964 plan provided that, in such an instance, Lt. Gen. Richard G. Stilwell, then chief of the U.S. military assistance advisory group in Thailand, would become ground forces commander. In the event of a general Red Chinese offensive, the over-all command would have been assumed by Gen. William C. Westmoreland, then U.S. commander in Vietnam.
The sources insisted the plan does not expand U.S. commitments under SEATO but was signed to reassure the Thais that the United States would honor its commitments.
Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, one of the members of the Foreign Relations Committee who have assailed the Pentagon for refusing to give a copy of the agreement, suggested earlier in the week that it involved putting U.S. troops under Thai command and asked for an explanation.
Church was unavailable for comment on the latest details of the plan.
Cooper said he could not comment on the still-secret agreement.

Israelis Claim Arab Guerrillas Killed in Clash

TEL AVIV (AP) — The Israelis said today they killed seven Arab infiltrators in two separate overnight clashes along the Jordan River frontier.
An army announcement said the Israelis killed five Arab guerrillas in a band of eight miles north of the Elat, killing two Arabs, the spokesman said.
Russian-made rifles, "sabotage packages" and timing devices were reported abandoned by the fleeing Arab survivors.
The army made no mention of Israeli casualties.
The army also said an Israeli border policeman was shot and wounded near the Lebanese border when his jeep came under light arms fire and bazooka shells fell into an Israeli camp in occupied Golan Heights of Syria early today.

River. The other shell injured one Vietnamese guard slightly but caused no damage.
Headquarters said only about a fourth of the overnight rocket and mortar attacks were considered significant in that they caused casualties or damage, which was described as light.
Elsewhere, U.S. military spokesmen reported the loss of six American aircraft in the past 48 hours with 24 persons killed and 12 wounded.
The crashes raised to 5,725 the number of American helicopters and fixed wing aircraft reported lost in North and South Vietnam since Jan. 1, 1961.
These figures do not include scores of other aircraft lost in unannounced daily bombing raids and other operations in neighboring Laos aimed at slowing the infiltration of North Vietnamese troops and movement of war stockpiles.
In one loss reported today, 10 Americans were killed when their helicopter was shot down by enemy fire Friday 60 miles south of Da Nang while supporting American Division infantry men battling North Vietnamese troops. Five enemy soldiers were reported killed in the ground battle.
There was no immediate report on U.S. casualties.
Another American Division helicopter was shot down by enemy fire Friday 25 miles south of Da Nang, but the four crewmen escaped uninjured and were rescued.

Defense Force Chief Picked In Canada
OTTAWA (AP) — The Canadian Cabinet has picked Lt. Gen. Frederick R. Sharp to head Canada's defense force after Gen. Jean Van Aillard retires Sept. 15.

Government Skirts Hemline Issue for Gals

WASHINGTON (AP) — The federal government's stylesetters deftly skirt the battle of the hemline for women in uniform.
The government diplomatically eschews the ruler or the tape. Instead it uses such negotiable guidelines as "good taste," "conservatively fashionable" and "adjusted to current styles but not extreme."
Those are the skirt-length edicts of the military services, Post Office Department, General Services Administration and National Park Service who have gals in uniform.
At the GSA, which prescribes uniforms for women elevator operators in government buildings, officials aren't about to be hemmed in by the hemline.
"Due to fluctuations of style, we try to maintain a stylish length and a uniform look," said one male GSA official.
The Park Service has dropped its regulation that a girl's hemline could be no more than one inch above the floor when she is kneeling.
The Post Office has gone mad in a few locations to promote use of the five-digit ZIP code. It has employed girls to aid customers in Louisville, Memphis and Cincinnati Post office lobbies as "Miss Zips"—and their skirts are four inches above the knees.
Other female postal workers abide by the edict to "dress appropriately from the standpoint of appearance and safety."
For the women in the military services, hemlines are all close neighbors to the kneecaps.

Plane Missing Over Greece

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — An Olympic Airways DC3 with 31 passengers aboard was reported missing today between Athens and Agriion, on Greece's northwest coast, the general director of the air announced.
Ioannis Georgaklis, general director of the airline operated by shipping magnate Aristotle Onassis, said the plane left Athens at noon and had not arrived at Agriion 30 minutes later. The plane was scheduled to continue to Ioannina, near the Greek-Albanian border and return to Athens later in the day.
The plane was listed as officially missing an hour after it was scheduled to reach Agriion. A sea and air search for the missing plane was under way.

Hondurans Claim Crimes By Salvador

TEGUIGALPA, Honduras (AP) — Troops from El Salvador that invaded Honduras during a week-long war between the two countries last month assaulted women, robbed and destroyed private property and committed murder, Honduran witnesses told an investigation committee from the Organization of American States Friday.
"The Salvadorean murdered my father and beat my mother," said Jose E. Chinchilla of Las Piles, one of the 50 persons who testified. "Then they looted their house and robbed the few livestock they had."
The Rev. Rodrigo Brennan, a Roman Catholic priest from Nueva Ocotepaque, said he was captured by Salvadoran troops and taken to their capital, El Salvador, after being accused of espionage. He said the U.S. Embassy arranged his release.
When he returned, he said, women parishioners told him that Salvadoran troops had assaulted them. He also said the troops desecrated his church and took money from collection boxes.

It Looms As the Bland Season

By CYNTHIA LOWEY HOLLYWOOD (AP) —Each new television season arrives in September and soon earns a tag. Last year was to be the season of meaningful drama and of specials. Now, less than six weeks away from curtain-raising time, 1969-70 looms as the bland season.

Broadcasting is under attack from various quarters and nobody wants to make waves. There are — and will be — Congressional inquiries into network practices. There are Federal Communications Commission proceedings about renewals of individual station licenses. There is criticism about sex and violence.

And there is vast concern

about the proposed withdrawal of cigarette advertising next year, which would remove \$125 million or more—6 to 10 per cent of the industry's total.

It is a trying time when television, particularly the three major networks, is proceeding cautiously. The memory of the Smothers Brothers controversy is still green and so is the reaction of one network's affiliated stations to a variety program, "Turn-On," canceled after one performance.

All this has had its effect on the quality and type of programs, but none on quantity. With Hollywood turning out all but five of the networks' 72 evening entertainment series, plus most of the coming spate of

movies-for-TV, variety and drama specials, the studios are working in high gear.

The trend toward cautious programming is evident in the categories of the 21 new series. Situation comedy, treated like a stepchild a few seasons back, is in high favor. Almost half the new shows will be half-hour programs played strictly for laughs. Five new variety and music shows will join the 11 returning for another season.

The seven new dramatic series are a mixed bag but significantly include two medical shows and one series involving doctors every third week. The veteran viewer will recall another season when, television being under attack for sex and

violence, both "Dr. Kildare" and "Ben Casey" were born, bringing with them built-in drama of life and death, without fights and shoot-outs.

There are no new westerns—although six of the genre are returning—and no new war stories or private eyes.

Production costs are a bit higher this year; new faces abound; some old shows will be turning up at new times, even on different networks. Writers are attempting as usual, to add some new twists to freshen established shows; actors are worrying as usual about the competition facing their series; producers and press agents are explaining, as usual, that their shows are new and different.

David Frost: He Listens

NEW YORK (AP) —David Frost is a listener. That's a rarity on talk shows, where so many people are waiting to blurt out their own provocative thoughts.

"I think the key thing is to listen," says Frost. "Not to go off to the next thing, but to let what your guest says trigger what you ask."

"If I had planned to talk to somebody for 10 minutes and he turns out to be marvelous I'll talk to him for half an hour."

Frost is taking over the spot vacated by Merv Griffin, who moves to a late-night hour on CBS. Frost's syndicated show premiered last week in most areas and will be seen in 55 cities.

This is the 20-year-old British satirist's second venture into American television. Five years ago he unsuccessfully tried to transfer "That Was the Week That Was" from England.

He's had his own talk show in London three nights a week for several years and hopes that

this transplant will be more successful.

How will an Englishman go in the Midwest? "I say Judy Carne, Richard Burton and the Beatles have struggled through," he said. "I think in a sense it's an advantage. I get a fresh approach to things. The voice will help, too."

The voice, couched in a dis-

arming English accent, is one that allows Frost to say outrageous things and ask embarrassing questions without offending.

Frost said he would seek out people who usually don't appear on talk shows. So far he has proved himself right. In his first show he had Prince Charles and Ed Sullivan. Although he treated them with kid gloves, the interviews were revealing and interesting.

Frost has dispensed with the usual sofa and, like Dick Cavett, he has no sidekick. "Or as someone in Dallas asked, are you going to have an amanuensis? I said no. That's Latin for second banana."

CURTIS HOST

Tony Curtis, the star of more than 50 motion pictures, will be making a relatively rare television appearance when he is host on "Times Presents the All-Star Circus," an hour special to be colorcast on the NBC Television Network Sep. 6. The Curtis countenance, characterized by a flashing smile and crowned by wavy black hair, is seldom seen on television except in reruns of his many movies. He has been a guest on a few late night talk shows.

Penny Fuller: No Teeny-Bopper

There may be more spin-offs from the new ABC series, "Love, American Style," than there are at a Whirling Dervish convention.

The series itself is a spin-off from a movie made for ABC's new night of specially-made-for-television films. The movie, which had three parts, became a series before it ever got on the air and the three parts will be shown, on different weeks, on the series they spawned.

Meanwhile one of the stars of one of the episodes from the pilot which will be seen on the series premiere on Sept. 22 (pay strict attention because we'll ask questions later) is a young lady named Penny Fuller, who was so good that she is now having a series written for her and ABC is excited enough about her to be making cooling sounds.

Penny is not one of your

fresh-off-the-protector-rouse teeny-boppers. She has been around long enough to know what 30 is like, but not much beyond that. At first glance she is just an ordinary, fairly pretty girl. But as she talks, and her enthusiasm shows and her personality sparkles and you study the delicacy of her features, she becomes extremely beautiful.

She's from North Carolina, studied drama at Northwestern, starred on Broadway for two seasons in "Barefoot in the Park," and is a veteran of soap opera serfdom. An enthusiastic New Yorker, she is maintaining her apartment here while living in Los Angeles and admitting the move is probably permanent.

"But when New Yorkers go to Los Angeles," she says, "we never admit we are going to stay. We hold on to our New York apartments, only buy six-packs of beer and small jars of mayonnaise and don't get cars. But I'm beginning to like living there.
