Divorce Reform Bill Ready For Reagan's Signature

By EDITH LEDEBER Associated Press Writer SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — A major overhaul of California's divorce laws— which some say would make divorce easier but others say would make it merely less painful—now is up to Gov. Ronald Reagan, himself a divorced man.

The proposal provides only two grounds for dissolving a marriage: a finding of irreconcilable differences, and incurable insanity. The bill is expected to be passed by the Legislature in the next few weeks. It would allow a husband to sue for divorce on the grounds of incurable insanity.

Reagan was divorced by his first wife, actress Joan Wyman, in 1946. After Miss Wyman's remarriage, he and she became political enemies. He later married starlet Nancy Davis, his present wife.

Mental cruelty is one of many grounds for divorce that would be eliminated in the measure proposed by the California Legislature this past month after nearly a year of study.

Enslaved To A System

A year ago, it was Soviet tanks and Russian soldiers who restored order in Prague and other Czechoslovakian cities

This was the crude proof of the efficiency of the tactics the Russians decided upon a year ago

They had, this August, a government in Prague which was ready to do their bidding

The fact that there was so much work for these Czech soldiers and tanks to do on the anniversary of last year's rape

heart-rending testimony to the extent of the blood that their own people had spilled

But if there is hope in this situation, it lies not in the free and easy identification of villains and heroes, oppressors and victims

The real hope for Czechoslovakia, and for the rest of humanity, lies in the realization that this present situation, this present exercise of power politics in Czechoslovakia, is more the result of a failure than it is of deliberate wickedness

The Russians, when they do what they do, are as much the prisoners of their own particular situation and apparent necessities as the Czechoslovakians are the prisoners of the Russians

It is an error to conclude that the Russian people are the cause of the rebellion in one of their satellite nations

Another possible explanation is that a liberal leadership in the United States in Oklahoma, both Russia and the United States do what they feel to be necessary to their own national interest

1,000 Students Will Kill Selves, 10,000 Will Try

CHICAGO (AP) — One thousand college students will take their own lives this year, a study in the September issue of Today's Health stated today.

Emotional conflicts and mounting pressures will cause 10,000 students to attempt suicide, the study added.

Danna L. Farnsworth, director of health services at Harvard University, forecast that one of 10 students will experience emotional conflicts severe enough to require professional help.

Many will try to shrug off the problems with alcohol or drugs and others will turn to promiscuous sexual outlets, the article said.

The report said that freshmen students must cope with dramatically increased workloads and the panic competition for admission to college.

Almost half of this year's freshmen will drop out of college before graduation, the article said.

Several institutions have increased professional staff and special counseling clinics to cope with the problem.

The largest facilities, the article said, are at the University of Illinois, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Yale, Harvard, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and the University of California at Berkeley and Los Angeles.

Many colleges initiated non-graded courses in the freshman year to ease some of the academic pressure, the report said.

The first anniversary of the Aug. 29-30 Soviet reform movement that crushed the reform movement led by Dubcek. Official broadcasts and newspapers have not mentioned the anniversary in their reports of the "activities of anti-Socialist elements."

The specific measures adopted provide that anyone participating in, calling for or supporting a disturbance may be jailed up to three months and fined up to \$300.

The present maximum penalties for defaming the Czechoslovak state "or any state of the Socialist system" or their representatives, now generally punished by up to six months in jail, are increased to one year.

Anyone who "violates the Socialist order and loses the confidence needed to hold his position or job" can be fired. Students may be expelled from school, and professors and teachers can be dismissed if they "educate young people against the principles of Socialist society."

The state also may disband any voluntary organization, including trade unions, scout groups and cultural societies, if it helps spread unrest.

Key Biscayne

S.S. Men Outnumber Coconuts At Nixon's Florida Hide-Away

KEY BISCAYNE, Fla.—As the former hideout of pirates sailing the Spanish Main, Key Biscayne has turned into the sunbathed hideaway of America's President.

Previously noted for its coconuts, now it is famous for the Secret Service agents who move en masse. As President Nixon's sometimes vacation headquarters, the sunny island is attracting a goodly number of the tourists who once upon a time invaded Miami Beach. On Sundays the crowds are horrendous.

Key Biscayners refuse to budge from jungle-sheltered cottages between 3 and 6 o'clock when the Rickenbacker Causeway is jammed with rubberneckers returning to Miami.

Long before the election, Key Biscayne was the President's winter retreat. He came to laze in the sun as early as 1951. To man Key Biscayne the Nixon family was as familiar as the neighbor next door. Frequently he was seen strolling along the beach or browsing in Vernon's Drug Store at Crandon Blvd. and West Wood Dr.

When Nixon became President, the proprietor of Vernon's opened a charge account for him—No. 001. It is the sort of smalltown flavor of Vernon's Drug Store which attracted Nixon, an atmosphere which, even with its growing fame, remains a part of Key Biscayne's personality. At Vernon's Drug Store the neighbors hold coffee clatches each morning. Boys and girls gather at the soda fountain, or stand around reading comic books off the newsstand. Ice cream cones sell for only 15 cents and hamburgers are 35 cents. A sign over the lunch counter says, "We make our own Cakes and Pastries."

At the rear of the store notices are pinned to a neighborhood bulletin board. One tells of a baby crib for sale at \$25. Another says a stenographer is needed at Key Biscayne Hotel where Nixon vacationed until he became President.

Manager Charles Bremicker recalls how Nixon used to give guests his autograph. Occasionally he'd play the piano after dinner while someone else played the drums. Now when he sits at the dinner table every one stands and applauds, but there's no piano playing anymore.

After he became President, Nixon bought the home of former Sen. George Smathers at 500 Bay Lane. He bought another next door for \$127,000, plus two others. Wedged in between is the home of his chum, Charles G. (Bebe) Rebozo. Now Bay Lane is blocked off by a huge red fence. The winter White House compound is hidden behind a 10-foot high hedge of hibiscus. Sightseers motor down West Matheson Drive, which descends at the bay a few yards beyond the President's street. A man who was fishing rushed up to me and introduced himself as a Secret Service agent. He said, in a pleasant way, to get lost. The area is restricted, even when Nixon is in Washington.

Wounded Marine Tells Mom On Phone 'I'm All Right'

"Mother, I'm all right," Marine Pfc. Carlton Welsh Jr., who was wounded in Vietnam, told his mother yesterday from a hospital ship, the US Repose.

Pfc. Welsh, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carlton Welsh of 466 Woodland St., talked on a telephone call relayed over a ham radio and said he was wounded. Their conversation was very short, she said, but "he sounded good." This was her first notification that he was wounded.

From the Marine Corps Hartford Recruiting office, the Welsh's learned their son received shrapnel wounds in the right hand and left leg from a land grenade on Aug. 16 while he was on platoon patrol. His name was on the casualty list with the notation not to notify his parents. He has sent a letter home with more details which his parents have not received. This is all the information of his injuries they have been able to get.

Pfc. Welsh has been in the Marine Corps since January, and in Vietnam a month.

Movies For TV Only

HOLLYWOOD D(AP) — "The
word 'anthology' in television
has come to mean heavy, talky,
preachy and boring," said Bar-
ry Diller, an ABC programming
vice president. "The world
'movie' means entertaining."
So the ABC television network
has called its new, 90-minute an-
thology series, "Movie of the
Week."

"We are not trying to turn out
theatrical films," said the 27-
year-old Diller. "Hopefully one
or two shows of the series might
be a springboard to a future ser-
ies."

The network, which plans to
spend some \$16-million on the
season's dramas from assorted
suppliers, actually is breaking
no really new semantic ground.
The process began a few sea-
sons back when network execu-
tives were worrying about the
diminishing supply of theatrical
features with which to fill those
gaping two-hour time blocks.

As the movie studio vaults
were stripped costs spiraled. It
was not unusual for a network
to pay as much as a million dol-
lars for the privilege of broad-
casting one made-for-theatres
film a couple of times.

NBC, seeking to ease the
shortage, ordered an assort-
ment of two-hour filmed shows
from one studio and called them
"world premiere" shows.

Now all three networks are
following suit and movies-for-
television are in production all
over town. If these films had
been made for initial theatre re-
lease, most would have been re-
garded as "B features," be-
cause of their modest cost—us-
ually \$750,000 or under—and
the drawing power of their
stars.

The shows have some advan-
tages. They are tailored to tele-
vision's commercial needs
where theatrical films often
reach dramatic climaxes just

chose me."

Miss Garland said keeping
busy is important to her and her
family. "Acting is an extension
of my life, and because of it I

ter in my most important roles:
Wife-mother," she said. "Fortu-
nately my husband under-
stands that too."

Leslie Uggams Tired By Prework Work

NEW YORK — (NEA) — Leslie Uggams, looking cool and sinuous in two-piece black pajamas, flopped on the couch in her press agent's office and said she was tired. And she hasn't really begun working on her new CBS-TV series yet.

It's the prework work that is tiring her, the meetings, the photograph and wardrobe sessions, the interviews, the radio and TV promos and the recording sessions for the album which Atlantic will release in the latter part of September, to coincide with the Sept. 8 premiere of "The Leslie Uggams Show," with Dick Van Dyke as a guest.

"I'm well aware of how much work there is to a TV series

from the Sing Along With Mitch days," she said. "Recently I was there every day and it's not even my show."

Leslie became the star of her own series suddenly and unexpectedly because of the affaire Smothers. When the siblings and CBS parted company, Leslie, who was talking to the network about a pilot for a situation comedy series, received a telephone call which announced she was replacing the Smothers Brothers.

"I was stunned," she says, which seems very much to the point.

She adds, "It's a big responsibility. I'm very excited and I hope the show comes off great."

Her show is being produced by Saul Hison and Ernie Chambers, the original producers of "The Smothers Brothers Comedy Hour." There will be comedy skits which Leslie says will be satirical, and a regular skit tentatively called "The Folks Next Door." Lillian Hayman, who played Leslie's mother on Broadway in "Hallelujah Baby," will play her mother in these skits, and the role of Leslie's husband is still to be cast.

After winning a Tony Award for her Broadway debut and racking up rave reviews for TV and club appearances, Leslie is looking forward to a movie career. But so far that hasn't happened.

"I've been up for so many things lately. I don't know what producers and directors are looking for. I've lost roles because I'm too dark, not sexy enough, or they don't know what they want. They have no imagination. Unless you walk in the door and you look like their vi-

Smothers' Unbanned

NEW YORK (AP) — The Smothers Brothers show banned by the Columbia Broadcasting System last April will be televised in five U.S. cities soon, the Metromedia system said Monday.

Banning of the show, the culmination of a running battle between Tom and Dick Smothers and CBS over censorship, led to cancellation of the system's contract with the music and comedy team. The show later was broadcast in Canada, but has yet to be broadcast in this country.

A Metromedia spokesman said its stations WNEW-TV in New York and WTTG in Washington would broadcast the show at 8 p.m. Sept. 10. Broadcast times for three other stations, KTTV, Los Angeles, KNEW, San Francisco, and KMBC, Kansas City, have not been set.

The spokesman said the one-hour program was sold to the stations in a syndication deal and that the Smothers Brothers also would offer it to other stations.

CBS banned the program, originally intended for showing April 13, on grounds that parts of it were in bad taste. The network particularly objected to a monologue by David Steinberg touching on religion.
