Will 'Survivors' Survive?

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "The Survivors," ABC's multi-million dollar dramatic series that is to bring Lana Turner to weekly television, is playing a nervous game called "Waiting for Brazzi."

After almost two years of planning and almost a year of shooting, exactly one "chapter"—the first—is finished and the premiere date is only about a month away.

"I've been totally involved in this for 18 months," said Miss Turner, a worried frown on her face, "but it is nothing but changes."

One of the 11th hour changes in the original outline by best-seller writer Harold Robbins was the introduction of a Greek tycoon who as an impoverished tour guide 19 years before had fathered the child of Tracy Carlyle—that's Lana. After a frantic hunt for the right actor, Rossano Brazzi was cast in the part but Brazzi has been tied up in his native Italy with a movie and has not arrived in this country yet.

"We have shot the scenes without Brazzi in the next seven shows," continued Miss Turner, "so when he comes we'll just turn to and everybody will work with him. Anyway, the script for the ninth chapter is being re-written."

Robbins sold the series to ABC on the strength of an eight-page synopsis of a story line that has since almost disappeared. He had once shared office space with Lana's sixth husband, Robert Eaton, and through this contact, she became interested. Since then the Eatons have been divorced, Lana has remarried, and Robbins is far from Hollywood.

Successive relays of script writers have come in, the show has its third producer and everybody, including its star, is unhappy.

Miss Turner toyed with a cigarette as she sat in her studio dressing room and fretted:

"What keeps bothering me is that over everything that I have built up over 30 years in motion pic-

tures could go down the drain," she said. "I had done some television appearances before—with Bob Hope, Dinah Shore, the Smothers Brothers and Carol Burnett. I was a nervous wreck before and during those shows and a spastic case later, but I thought a series would be different."

"This started out with Tracy being something of a swinger but that's all changed. Each chapter is written by different writers and each has a new director and I keep asking myself who I am. We shot for five weeks in France and can't use one inch of the film because the story has been changed. I think I've laughed once—I keep saying we've got to get some humor in this thing."

There have been reports of personality differences between the members of the cast which, if true, might be attributed to the bad cases of nerves afflicting everyone.

Miss Turner says that it is a "strong company" George Hamilton plays her half brother; Kevin McCarthy, her husband, and Ralph Bellamy, her father. The general impression is that, in its form and in its

substance, it will be a nighttime soap opera. After all, everybody is beset by emotional problems. But instead of being just plain folks drinking coffee in Central City, these people are awfully rich and terribly social. They jet-set around and wear gorgeous clothes.

Miss Turner, whose tragedy-dogged personal life reads like the outline for a soap opera, will be playing a chic woman of 40 although the calendar gives her another nine. She looks great and not a day over 35.

Each year there is one new show reported to be in really big trouble—with scripts, with intra-mural sniping. That does not necessarily mean it will be a disaster. After all, several seasons back it was "The Virginian"—which will soon start its eighth year.

If "The Survivors" can get hold of Brazzi and catch up with its production schedule, it could still turn out to be a hit along the lines of "Peyton-Place."

He Misses the Violence

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Television's last surviving private eye, "Mannix," will keep his gun loaded and his fists clenched and bare during a season when man-to-man physical confrontations are definitely out of style.

Mike Connors, the star of the CBS series that soon will start its third season, believes that a little action can go a long way but that the audience will feel cheated and unhappy without any.

"There are few enough action series left," he ruminated glumly as he munched on a ham and cheese sandwich during a lunch break.

"But we will still have fights when they seem necessary—it is logical when the criminal is about to be apprehended. And we'll have some gun-play, too." Connors blamed pressure from the top for the trend away from violence.

"Sen. Pastore (a critic of TV violence) and a few others are really censoring what you and I are going to see on our television screens," Connors said. "I just don't think that people want it that way."

"We have the very best censoring devices in our own homes. If we don't like what we see on television, we can turn off the set. What I don't like is having someone saying ahead of time what I can see and what I can't."

Connors, in a director's chair on the sidewalk of a mid-Hollywood residential street, paused to open a container of butter-milk.

"I remember when I was growing up and watching John Wayne's wildest fights on the screen," he continued. "He was in good fighting shows about a clean-cut American who was defending the right. He was a strong man."

"If we're going to outlaw violence, let's really do it. Let's get rid of football, boxing, hockey and wrestling. That's all based on violence and most of it, like the blood spilled, is real."

Connors said that of course he believes that television shows should be in good taste—two words which are hard to define—but that he deplores "letting a few men impose their standards and tell you what you can see."

Parents, he said, are responsible for their children's viewing habits. He has two of his own, and said that a routine question from his 10-year-old son and 9-year-old daughter is "Pop, what's the movie? Can I watch it?" He often says no and makes it stick.

"But on the other hand, I don't want my kids to grow up believing that there is nothing destructive in the world. I want them to know that there is good and bad in the world, that you can be hurt physically, that guns can kill you, that drugs are bad for you, that not everyone means well."

Gladys and Tyrone: The Love Goes On

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — The sniping that accompanies the pressing question in beautiful downtown Burbank these days concerns the future relationship of Gladys Ormsby and Tyrone. Will Gladys finally accept Tyrone's attentions?

If Gladys and Tyrone are not household names, it is because the identities of "Laugh-In's" purse-swinging spinster and the dirty old man have been kept as secret as that of it's very interesting Nazi soldier. His name is Wolfgang.

George Schlatter, the producer of the NBC series, and his partner, Ed Friendly, are raring to go for a third season of the fast-paced series that has become the most popular hour in television. Neither seems scared of the Nielsen height or

the sniping that accompanies enormous success. "When the show appeared as a special, they said it was fine, but that we couldn't hold the pace for a series," recalled Schlatter. "After our first season—half season, really, because we were a January replacement—they said, sure, but we'd run out over a full season. We didn't and so now they are still predicting disaster. Well, I don't think so."

There is a madcap quality about the Schlatter-Friendly operation that obviously infects the show's cast and writers and almost conceals the basically workmanlike operation of the series.

The partners were dashed but not emotionally destroyed that their second production effort, "Turn-On" was the most dramatic disaster of last season: One show on ABC followed by cancellation.

Schlatter, with a long and occasionally bumpy career in television production behind him, is the ebullient, creative talent. Friendly, with a solid background as a network executive, is the production brains.

"You spend your whole life trying to find a once-in-a-lifetime thing," Schlatter commented. "I know, as far as I'm concerned, 'Laugh-In' is it."

"He can now shrug off but will never forget some disastrous moments in his career, including being fired."

"I remember when we had struggled through five or six Judy Garland shows I was producing," he recalled. "I was racing down the hall on the way to a rehearsal when Freddie Fields, Judy's agent, stepped out of an office and called out that he wanted to talk to me."
