

## Capitol Pays Dirksen Tribute: Plan Burial

WASHINGTON (AP) — Everett McKinley Dirksen, dead at 73, was eulogized today as a Senate man, a leader whose unique style "is the stuff of legends."

The Senate, where he served for 10 years as leader of the Republican minority, met for 12 minutes and adjourned in tribute after adopting a resolution of sorrow.

Dirksen's body is to lie in state in the rotunda of the Capitol for 24 hours, beginning at noon EDT Tuesday. The casket will be closed.

After Wednesday funeral services at National Presbyterian Church here, he is to be buried in Pekin, Ill., his birthplace.

Senate Majority Leader Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., spoke the first formal eulogy to Dirksen. He formally announced the death of a colleague, although every man in the chamber knew Dirksen had died Sunday at Walter Reed Army Hospital.

"A great chair across the aisle stands empty," Mansfield said. "The Senate has lost a Senate man."

"Yet, his death does not diminish the Senate. His uniqueness is the stuff of legends and he leaves here a permanent imprint and an enduring echo."

Sen. Hugh Scott, R-Pa., the acting GOP leader, spoke for the Republicans: "At the going down of the sun, and in the morning, we will remember him."

On Dirksen's desk, Sen. Margaret Chase Smith, R-Maine, placed a golden marigold, a white ribbon on the stem.

"He loved his marigolds," she said of Dirksen.

During its brief session, the Senate passed a resolution expressing "profound sorrow and deep regret"—the traditional action to mark the death of a member.

A second resolution invited President Nixon and members of the House to join senators at memorial services for Dirksen in the rotunda Tuesday.

The Rev. L. R. Elson, chaplain of the Senate, is to conduct the brief service there at noon.

Mansfield said members of the Senate will form a guard of honor to meet the casket when it reaches the rotunda.

The public is to be admitted later to pay final respects to Dirksen.

Mansfield said the Senate will go ahead Tuesday with the business it had planned to consider today, a vote on an amendment to cut \$533 million from the Pentagon budget.

The majority leader said the Senate also will transact business on Wednesday, prior to the Dirksen funeral at 2 p.m.

Mansfield said he plans no Senate session Thursday, since he assumes many members will go to Pekin for the burial service.

For a decade Dirksen was leader of the Senate GOP minority.

At the peak of his power, during two Democratic administrations, the senator from Illinois fashioned that minority, and his own talent for oratory, drama and political maneuver, into a force which made him one of Washington's most influential figures.

## Grenades Hit Israeli Sites In 3 Nations

BONN, Germany (AP) — Two Israeli embassies and an El Al airline office came under attack today in three European countries.

Two hand grenades exploded outside the Israeli Embassy in Bonn, but no one was injured.

Two explosions ripped the Israeli airlines office in Brussels, Belgium's capital, wounding four persons. A grenade was thrown near the Israeli Embassy in the Hague, Netherlands.

An embassy spokesman in Bonn said the attacks seemed synchronized.

In the Bonn attack, police found the remains of two hand grenades as well as some wrapping paper which probably contained the explosives before they were thrown.

The embassy is in the Bad Godesberg section of Bonn on a main street.

In Amman, Jordan, the Arab Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine claimed responsibility for all three attacks. It said the front's "Ho Chi Minh" unit had thrown the explosives in the three places and that they were four "young cubs" of the front, all in the 'teens.

"The grenades apparently were meant for us," said the Israeli ambassador.

Police in Brussels said they arrested a young man who appeared to be an Arab after the airline bombing. Another young man ran away, they said.

Police in the Hague said they had the grenade-thrower under arrest. Israeli Ambassador Yassov Yanny told newsmen he was an Arab-looking boy.

# Viet Cong Blow Up Train Nine Hours After Truce

SAIGON (AP) — Viet Cong soldiers blew up a train traveling from Da Nang to Hue today then raked it with small arms fire, sources reported.

The attack came about nine hours after the enemy cease-fire honoring North Vietnamese President Ho Chi Minh went into effect.

A government militiaman aboard the train was wounded, sources said. The blast damaged the locomotive, derailed two cars and ripped up several yards of track.

Paratroopers of the U.S. 101st Airborne Division were sent into the area 16 miles northwest of Da Nang to protect railway repair crews.

Meanwhile the U.S. and South Vietnamese commands announced today that allied military operations would be scaled to match the enemy's during the Viet Cong's three-day cease-fire in mourning for Ho Chi Minh.

The joint South Vietnamese-American communiqué tactfully accepted the three-day truce although it declared: "It is not our intention to talk about a cease-fire at this time."

The communiqué confirmed earlier reports that the allied forces were in a "defensive posture" but patrols were continuing to intercept any enemy attempt to build up troops and firepower closer to allied bases.

The joint communiqué said: "The scale of our military operations in the past has been influenced by the scale of enemy military operations. During this period the scope of our military operations will likewise be influenced by the nature of enemy military operations."

"The Communist announcement of a cease-fire must be viewed in the light of the savage rocket attacks against civilians in Da Nang, and other aggressive actions which have followed the announcement. It must also be viewed in the light of the known history of past Communist violations of cease-fires which they themselves had proposed. Consequently it is not our intention to talk about a cease-fire at this time."

American B-52 bombing raids previously scheduled for targets in South Vietnam were diverted to attack North Vietnamese infiltration trails through Laos, informed sources said.

One radio message heard in the field from an American company commander to his top sergeant said: "The thing is today we'll have sort of a cease-fire in our hostile actions. We don't want to take anything under fire unless it's absolutely necessary."

A spokesman for the U.S. Command said that according to early reports, "the level of enemy-initiated actions is relatively low."

He said no shelling of American bases had been reported and there had been only a handful of "insignificant incidents."

South Vietnamese headquarters reported a dozen enemy attacks in which 10 civilians and three soldiers were killed and 38 civilians wounded, including 18 civilians.

In one attack, the Viet Cong detonated a land mine electrically under a bus 30 miles south (See Page Eight)

## Agnew: Truce Might End War

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President Spiro T. Agnew says "new things are happening" on the Hanoi-proclaimed cease-fire that he hopes might lead to peace in Vietnam.

Agnew said Sunday the matter was at "a particularly sensitive stage" and he couldn't discuss it further. He said he had talked with other officials about the implications of the cease-fire.

But at the Western White House, Presidential Press Secretary Ronald L. Ziegler told newsmen that he didn't think Agnew had spoken to President Nixon before the broadcast.

Ziegler said Agnew was talking in general terms.

Agnew said, "I wouldn't want to do anything to untrack what we hope might be a very profitable undertaking."

He appeared on NBC's "Meet the Press."

The vice president also said, "We have exercised every conceivable initiative that can be dreamed up. Every time we make one of these initiatives it is rejected by the enemy."

Meanwhile, W. Averell Harriman, the Johnson administration's chief negotiator at the Paris peace talks, said U.S. troops should observe the three-day cease-fire regardless of what Saigon does.

The South Vietnamese government announced earlier that it would not honor the cease-fire, called for the funeral of Ho Chi Minh, but today a joint communiqué said U.S. and South Vietnamese troops would scale their fighting to that of the enemy.

Harriman said North Vietnam might welcome a peace initiative because of Ho's death.

He appeared on CBS' "Face the Nation."

Rep. Gerald Ford of Michigan, the House Republican leader, said North Vietnam must do three things before the United States should consider an extended truce.

"If the Communists start treating our prisoners of war in a humane way, if they will stop their infiltration or slow it down materially and if they desist their military efforts, then I think the President could very easily look for a permanent or extended truce," Ford said.

## Iraq Executes Trio as Spies

DAMASCUS, Syria (AP) — Iraq executed three men as spies for the United States and Israel at dawn today.

Baghdad Radio said two civilians died on the gallows and one soldier was shot. Two were Moslems and the third, Iskander Youssef Khoudra Karam, may have been a Pakistani or Iranian.

The other two were identified as Anis Elmas Abbas and Pvt. Reda Haidar.

A total of 54 persons have been executed in Iraq as spies this year. They included 11 Jews.

The radio said those executed today were sentenced to death by Iraq's revolutionary court in a trial held behind closed doors. They were convicted of espionage for the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency and Israel, the broadcast said, but it gave no details.

## Bishop Pike Is at Peace, Wife Says

JERUSALEM (AP) — Dr. James A. Pike, who lost his battle with the Judean desert which he had hoped would yield a fuller meaning of Christianity for him, "did not fear death and now he is at peace."

The words came from his 31-year-old third wife Diane after the body of the former Episcopal bishop of California was recovered from a ledge of a deep canyon Sunday. The spot was two miles from where she had left him to go for aid last Monday night.

"There was no more appropriate place for Jim to die, if he had to die," said Mrs. Pike. She told newsmen her 56-year-old husband remarked before they set out on the trip: "If I die here, I will be happy and at peace."

The Pikes came to the Holy Land to do research for a book on the life of Christ.

"And now Jim has died in the place where Jesus found consolation," she said. "The book must be finished. My brother and I will do it. It will be a memorial to Jim."

Pike was to be buried Monday afternoon at St. Peter's Cemetery in Jaffa, a Tel Aviv suburb, the government announced. Mrs. Pike made the decision after talking with her husband's relatives in the United States.

## Colleagues Say: His Likes Not Soon To Be Seen Again

WASHINGTON (AP) — Everett McKinley Dirksen's wit, political skill and grand manner were praised today with a sad sense that his likes may never pass this way again.

"To politics and government he brought a dedication matched by few and a style and eloquence matched by no political leader in our time," President Nixon said after learning of the death Sunday of the Illinois Republican who became a political giant during the last decade as his party's Senate leader.

The President, who returns to Washington from his summer White House tonight, canceled his usual Tuesday morning conference with GOP congressional leaders out of respect for Dirksen. Congress also called off doing any business today.

Former President Lyndon B. Johnson, a Democrat who often found in Dirksen a valued ally, sent a private message of condolence to Mrs. Dirksen.

"Everett Dirksen brought the embellishment of the past to the politics of the present," said Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho. He was "an authentic product of an earlier period who remained prominent and powerful to the moment of his death. We will not see the likes of him again."

From conservatives within and without the Republican party came testimonials to Dirksen's devotion to what is often called America's traditional values.

Former GOP minority leader William Knowland of California talked of Dirksen preserving the constitutional equality of the legislative branch with the executive and judicial branches of the federal government.

James O. Eastland, the Mississippi Democrat, said "America is deprived of his services in a period of her history when she can ill afford the loss of one of her greatest and strongest sons."

"My political godfather," said Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona, the GOP's "Mr. Conservative" whose name was placed in nomination by Dirksen for the 1964 presidential campaign.

The party's liberals, such as frequent foe Sen. Jacob Javits of New York, could remember Dirksen as serving the nation "as a gifted virtuoso."

"An altogether singular man who placed on his times the indelible and cherished stamp," said GOP Senate whip Sen. Hugh Scott, a moderate, who was not Dirksen's choice to be his deputy.

Welfare Secretary Robert H. Finch lost to Dirksen in the crunch to appoint Dr. John Knowles. "A great legislative leader, a great patriot, a great American," said Finch.

## Vow Violent Campaign

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) — The U.S. ambassador to Brazil, C. Burke Elbrick, returned to his residence Sunday night with a cut on his head, freed by his kidnappers after 18 political prisoners reached Mexico.

Brazilian security officials began a widespread hunt for Elbrick's abductors. They searched several houses in the area where he was set free. Police sources said at least a dozen persons were arrested.

The military junta that took over a week ago when President Arthur de Costa e Silva suffered a stroke alerted military and law enforcement agencies to be on guard against a broadened campaign of violence which the two terrorist groups that kidnaped Elbrick promised to unleash.

There was speculation that the junta would issue a decree making death the punishment for terrorism.

## Arabs Pinpoint War A Torture to Israel

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — The Arab states may call it a "battle of destiny" but for the Israelis it is a version of the water torture—a drop-by-drop erosion against the human element that is the foundation of the Jewish state.

For nearly 24 years, Arab armies and guerrilla groups have been pinpricking Israel with almost daily firefights, ambushes, mines, artillery and mortar barrages.

The Israeli answer in kind—usually demanding an extra round or two of flesh.

But the perennial conflict and bloodshed take their toll psychologically. Death and injury still hit the Israeli hard.

Many foreign visitors and even some diplomats are asking if the Israelis, who place such a high value on the lives of their citizens and soldiers, won't fold if the Arab war of attrition continues for years.

The Israelis give an unqualified no.

What options do they have? They can strike back, attempting again to win such a sweeping victory over the Arab states that peace will be forced on the losers.

Or they can keep on suffering daily casualties and striking back along the cease-fire lines until peace comes.

Most Israeli military thinkers believe no general Middle East war is imminent. But they are uncertain about next year or the year after.

And most Israelis realize that a garrison state, buffeted by raids and terrorism from within and without, could bleed to death.

The Israeli Foreign Ministry promptly labeled the summit talks "council of war" which would strengthen Israel's resolve to further buttress its security along the cease-fire lines until peace comes.

## Love Can Bridge The Generation Gap

ALTON, Ill. (AP) — Two groups of society's outcasts—juvenile delinquents and the aged mentally infirm—have been brought together at Alton State Hospital in an experiment one man thinks can help both.

J. Robert Russo, an associate professor of psychology at Southern Illinois University at Carbondale, bases his belief on the good feeling a person gets from helping another.

Those involved are 20 teenage boys from Pere Marquette State Boys' Camp, a minimum-security reformatory, and elderly patients at Alton State.

All Russo asks the boys to do is help the hospital staff, to get out of bed and joining work with the patients whenever they can.

"The basic concept has two parts," the 38-year-old professor explained. "The first part is that human beings behave in a way that is not as good as we expect them to be. We want to increase personal responsibility plus provide the positive feeling of helping another human being."

"This is going to improve the self-concept of the delinquent. Up to this point in his life, the delinquent has been told by other people he's no good. Our whole correctional process is meant to tell him this. He's reformed from society and exiled."

The Department of Health, Education and Welfare's office of education granted \$9,990 for a one-year experiment. It's a hospital, really. As far as the office of education knows, Russo said, this is the first experiment of its kind. It began in July.

It began simply, Russo said. He asked the 20 kids at Pere Marquette for volunteers. Fewer than 10 refused. The boys already were being transported to the hospital, located about 25 miles from St. Louis, to do menial jobs in the kitchen and laundry. Russo just changed their jobs.

Part of the experiment is to see what effect the casual company of youth has on the patients. The boys were to act as nurses' aides, more or less, helping carry for the patients and keep them company.

But the youths quickly decided for themselves they wanted to do more.

They learned the operational framework of the hospital and worked within it to get from those they considered less seriously ill to those they felt really needed their attention.

"I thought it would be very depressing to them (the kids), but apparently it hasn't," said Wilma Kincaid, ward nurse. "I think it's helped the patients. They all tend to get like each other because they're old. I think youth stimulates them."

Ask the kids why they took on the responsibility and they have difficulty explaining. Their first answer usually is cynical or glib, but not honest. Press them and they shrug their shoulders or say "I don't know."

### Vernon Democratic 'Big Brother' Help Program Debt Is Now To Be Explained Wednesday \$7.7 Million

WASHINGTON (AP)—Democrats, with the help of understanding creditors and a new drive to recruit donors, are slowly whittling away at their massive 1968 campaign debt.

Spurred by the Democratic National Committee, now stands at about \$7.7 million.

Although the deficit has been trimmed about \$500,000, this cut party executive committee decided to take over about \$2 million in outstanding debts run up by candidates for the Democratic presidential nomination.

Hubert H. Humphrey's successful drive for the nomination still had about \$1 million in unpaid bills, about the same as the campaign of Robert F. Kennedy.

And Sen. George S. McGovern of South Dakota, who bid briefly for the nomination, had about \$750,000 in campaign debts.

Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy of Minnesota declined the national committee's offer. He told Democratic officials arrangements had been made to pay off part of his debt, and to settle some bills on a percentage basis.

Democratic governors, many of them far more conservative than the party's 1968 candidates, objected to the debt assumption.

But Sen. Fred R. Harris, the party chairman, told them the arrangement, which called for money raising effort with the active participation of the party's star performers in the primary states, was a necessary part of the party's strategy.

Furthermore, a party spokesman said, the creditors "understand our situation, and they understand that they're just going to have to wait a while."

In addition, some of the debt may be reduced by negotiation, a common practice in settling political campaign obligations.

Party officials said Humphrey is making nine fund-raising appearances for the Democratic National Committee this year.

Sen. Edmund S. Muskie of Maine, his vice presidential partner in 1968, is making eight Massachusetts had appeared four times at events designed to bring the party debt and provide operating funds.

Sen. McGovern also has signed for nine fund-raising appearances with the fund-raising effort. A New York City dinner at which Humphrey, Muskie and Kennedy all appeared cleared about \$500,000 for the party's presidential nomination.

A new organization with 1,000 membership pledges, the Young Leadership Council, has pledged for more than \$24,000. This is a group of affluent young Democrats who pledge their contributions, then discuss issues with the party's leaders.

But Harris is putting new stress on the Democrats' efforts to enlist similar contributors in big numbers.

### Soul Food Cookery Takes 'Good Heart'

NEW YORK (AP)—When Ruth L. Gaskins started collecting recipes for a book on traditional Negro dishes she ran into an immediate problem: She found that Negro women cook with merely "A Good Heart and a Light Hand," which is what she calls her book.

"It's a hard job pinning down a recipe because Negro cooks don't bother with them—they just instinctively add a bit of this and that," explained Miss Gaskins, in New York to demonstrate cooking techniques at a department store.

"I went into the homes of people I knew and sat with my notebook watching them," continued the 28-year-old Alexandria, Va., woman. "When they'd pick up a handful of flour I'd have to pick up my own handful and put it in a cup to see how much it was."

The recipes thus arrived at were tested by 25 women volunteers who filled out detailed questionnaires on ingredients, measurements, temperatures, whether they and their families liked the food and other details.

"I tried Negro testers first because they didn't work out because they had their own ideas about cooking," she said. "They would come out my recipe and write in their own. While women seem not familiar with the dishes and were more critical and more exact."

The project came about through the encouragement of a white friend, Miss Rosenthal, a professional photographer who had heard Miss Gaskins hold forth numerous times on the philosophy of Negro cookery and the Negro welcome, "Welcome it down," Mrs. Rosenthal insisted.

"The Negro welcome," Miss Gaskins pointed out, "is just the way you're greeted. You don't have to wait for an invitation or announce yourself. You just walk straight to the kitchen or you're led there. There are more chairs, it's brighter, it's warmer and that's where the ice box is. You're served food or you just take it."

Miss Gaskins, a clerk in the U.S. patent office, had never heard the term "soul food" when she started her recipe search. But by the time the volume was ready it had become a much used expression and restaurants featuring this type of cooking had been established all over the country.

"Soul is a catch-all phrase for the whole black popularity now and has spilled over into use with food," she said in explanation of the expression. "The black people are in vogue and anything about us is 'soul.'"

"What has always been 'in' for the Negro diet are basic foods that are cheap and readily available, such as pork, wild greens, corn, molasses, aced food, chicken and game. The volume contains recipes for turtle, minkat, squirrel, rabbit and possum. As for the pig, Miss Gaskins tells how to utilize every part but the stick, including hog maw, pig feet, pig tails, pig ears, neckbones and entrails for chitterlings.

"Black people who can now afford to eat better may they never eat this type of food again," she remarked, "but one of these days they'll get hungry and what they'll want is ham hocks and pork weed salad."

It took about three years to gather and test the recipes, then came the task of finding a publisher. "Nobody would touch it. Every time there was a riot we got another rejection," she laughed. ### Artificial Palate May Correct Speech Problems

By BILL WITCOCK

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP)—A researcher using an artificial palate hooked up with a computer hopes to pioneer an electronic treatment for persons with speech problems.

As outlined by Samuel Fletcher, a University of New Mexico psychologist, the device may ultimately turn a speech patient in effect into a sort of human player piano.

He would be programmed by impulses from a computerized "map" of normal speech sounds.

Embedded in the artificial palate, which fits snugly against the roof of the mouth, are 80 electronic sensors.

Writes from the sensors are strung between the teeth and cheeks and out the mouth to the computer.

As a test subject with normal speech talks, the tongue touches different sensor areas. The computer maps these tongue movements.

"We want to describe precisely how a person uses the tongue to make sounds," Fletcher said in an interview. "When we know how a normal person uses his tongue, then we can reverse this knowledge and show someone with a speech problem where the tongue is."

By reversing the palate's electrical flow, someone with a speech problem could have his tongue tickled by a small electric charge if he placed the tongue incorrectly to make a sound.

In this way, a deaf person is guided in placing his tongue to make a correct sound, even though he couldn't hear it.

But first, Fletcher wants to perfect the palate and explore the full range of tongue movements in normal speech.

"As soon as we get a good understanding of what is normal speech," he said, "we will try someone with a speech problem."

Dwight T. Keith, chairman of the Manchester Renewal Agency (MRA); and Mrs. Ruth M. Stum, its acting executive director, will brief those present on a recent planning study for the proposed project, undertaken by the MRA.

The meeting will be at 8 a.m. in the Municipal Planning Hearing Room.

Invited to attend are: Philip Harrison, president of the Manchester Chamber of Commerce; J. Grant Swank, executive vice president of the chamber; William Blith, chairman of the Downtown Committee of the Chamber; Robert Fuller, chairman of the MRA; and Lyman Hoops, former president of the chamber and now chairman of the CDAP Agency.

A proposed \$2 million bond issue for Downtown Renewal was defeated in a townwide referendum on Oct. 3, 1966. The \$2 million was to have been the town's share in a \$14.6 million proposal, with the \$14.6 million difference to be in federal and state contributions.

In late 1967, former MRA executive director Edward Rybcyk acknowledged that he best the town could hope for in federal funds was \$3.7 million. He said then, and events have proved him right, that federal funds for redevelopment projects were tight, and that there was no assurance that \$3.7 million would be forthcoming. He blamed the shortage of renewal funds on the cost of the Vietnam War.

The Board of Directors, until late last year, declined to consider a new proposal for Downtown Renewal until such time as North End Renewal neared completion.

Now that the latter project is approaching its last stages, the board has consented to consider new proposals for Downtown Main St., without committing itself.

### Hurricane Slams S.E. New England

BOSTON (AP)—Hurricane Gerda, a fast-moving storm born almost overnight off the South Atlantic coast, slammed into southeastern New England today, catching the region only half prepared.

The storm bore down first on picturesque Cape Cod, and next was to turn its fury on eastern Maine.

Gerda developed on such short notice and traveled so quickly that officials feared property damage would be extremely heavy.

"We just can't move fast enough," said one police officer in Hyannis, on Cape Cod, "where moving families in the school, and they're having to leave windows unboarded and everything because there isn't time to be time. And they haven't got all the boats in either."

Hundreds of pleasure boats were anchored in the cove and harbors that dot the region's weathered shoreline, and Gerda's 90-mile-per-hour winds were expected to be especially destructive with them.

The storm left little untouched. Foam-flecked seas began tearing at the Cape's exposed southern beaches around noon, eating away tons of sand.

Three bent under the strain of the wind, and power and telephone outages developed as branches tore loose and sliced lines.

Gerda was trundling northward at 40 m.p.h., unusually fast for a hurricane.

The Weather Bureau said the storm's brunt with land would continue.

### Israeli Units Enter Egypt

TEL AVIV (AP)—Israeli aircraft and armored units thrust into Egypt across the Gulf of Suez today in a raid on Egyptian army positions, the Israeli army announced.

It was the biggest action reported on the Egyptian front since the 1967 Middle East war.

The 10-hour operation ranged over a 30-mile stretch of the Egyptian shore, a military spokesman reported.

One Israeli plane was lost and the pilot parachuted into the desert. It said another Egyptian plane was shot down and the pilot was killed.

### Action Light In Second Day of Truce

SAYON (AP)—American forces probably will continue to curtail their offensive operations in the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese, maintain their present low level of activity after the truce for the funeral of Chi Minh ends Thursday, U.S. sources said today.

"We want to keep the negotiating door open," said one American official. "We're not looking for a fight. We're just trying to provide an atmosphere for pacification and security."

Only light action was reported across South Vietnam today in the second day of the truce. But U.S. officials considered it most unlikely that the enemy would continue the cease-fire long after the announced expiration time.
