



### Bone Found At Loch Ness Worthless

VERNESS Scotland (AP) — The scientific team hunting the Loch Ness Monster decided today that a find identified by the finders as "the thigh bone of an animal not known to science" is no help in the search.

Colin Simms, curator of the natural history department of York Museum, saw the four-foot bone on television and identified it as the lower jaw bone of a whale which until two weeks ago had decorated his rock garden. He said the bone had been expelled from the museum years ago because it was worthless.

The two young Englishmen who claimed they found the bone beside Loch Ness last May stuck to their story, although they refused to give their names to newsmen.

David James, leader of the British-American research expedition at Loch Ness, said: "The bone is of no interest to us."

### Architectural Gambler Loses \$20,000 Home

ARLINGTON, Va. (AP) — Some neighbors don't think much of the new home which architect Brockhurst C. Rustice built himself.

So they got a court order Tuesday telling Rustice to tear down or haul away the two-story, starkly modern structure which cost him \$20,000.

Judge Charles S. Russell ruled that the house—a modular structure consisting of two two-story blocks connected by a one-story corridor—is "not harmonious" with the suburban ramblers in the rest of his neighborhood. The exterior is plywood panels with a cedar veneer.

Five neighbors brought the suit, citing a covenant attached to the deed when Rustice bought the land in April. The covenant provides that no home shall be "inharmonious" with the neighboring homes.

An architectural review board set up to go over plans for homes in the subdivision has never met, but the judge said Rustice was "gambling" when he chose not to seek formal approval of his plan before building. Because he is an architect, the judge said, Rustice should know about restrictive covenants.

The judge granted a 60-to-90 day stay of his decree to lessen the hardship.

### These Creations Take Pliers — Not Needles

NEW YORK (AP) — "If you've got a pair of pliers and imagination, you can do an awful lot," said an assistant to jewelry designer Bill Smith as he held up a pair of pants made of gold coils.

The pants, along with a matching vest, were one of a number of items at a show Tuesday night of Smith's latest jewelry.

The 34-year-old designer, one of the first Negroes in the business, creates dresses, suits, capes, pants, halters and hats of rhinestones, pearls, black beads and metal coils.

Smith said his designs are jewelry as clothing. They are strong enough so they can be clothing in themselves.

A former dancer who worked in a jewelry factory when he first came to New York and finally decided he preferred jewelry, said his designs "can be worn over clothing or instead of clothing."

The models Tuesday draped the jewels over simple Jersey dresses by Jon Hingst, over body stockings and over bare skin.

Among the standout items were a long scarf of pearls, trimmed with cloth tassels, a metal cape with "pearlized" cork, a floor-length skirt of ropes of pearls, a short skirt and vest of jet beads and a pearl cape.

There are about two dozen pieces in the collection for \$1,000, retailing for between \$80 and \$200. The pearl scarf, for example, is \$100.

Smith admitted that "not everyone can wear these things. There are many people, however, who will make sacrifices for beauty."

Among the disadvantages of the jewelry clothing is their weight. The pearls Smith uses have an alabaster or plastic base, but they still make a six-foot scarf pretty weighty.

### Gaullists Must Walk Line To Keep the Franc Stable

PARIS (AP) — Big and thick like a heavyweight boxer, the leader of the Communist group in the French National Assembly leaned forward on the balls of his feet, the heels of his hands on the rostrum.

His head thrust forward Robert Ballanger said with obvious satisfaction to the hostile Gaullist majority on the whole velvet benches before him:

"The disastrous situation in which we now find ourselves you say is the result of international circumstances."

"You ask us for sacrifices. He raised his hands in mock surprise. "This is a far cry from the arrogant speeches to which we became accustomed during more than 10 years—the past 10 years when Charles de Gaulle was France's president."

Ballanger cited Premier Jacques Chaban-Delmas' general policy statement made to the assembly earlier Tuesday, which called for a national effort to make devaluation of the franc work.

"It sounded like a funeral oration for your predecessors," said Ballanger, recalling that in 1966 De Gaulle had said, "There is no currency stronger than the franc."

"I won't press the point," said the Communist ironically. "It would be too cruel for you."

When he finished, the Gaullists and their allies—who hold more than three fourths of the assembly's 487 seats, booed and banged the tops of their desks. The 21 other Communists applauded as Ballanger returned to his bench.

In the subsequent ballot on the premier's request for a vote of confidence, the government won an easy 360-50 victory. But the government's problem is not the National Assembly.

If Chaban-Delmas and his ministers are to restore economic health to France, they must convince the trade unions to moderate their demands and stop striking. Government economists maintain an atmosphere of labor calm is needed to avoid a cost-price push and to restore confidence.

They fear a chain reaction of wildcat strikes may be starting, more or less with the benediction of the Communist party and its trade union, the CGT.

Tramway workers went on strike last Thursday. Paris urban transport workers have begun a series of work stoppages. Postal workers have served notice they will walk out early next month. The ground crews of the internal airline Air Inter, began a 24-hour strike at midnight.

Gaullist deputies acknowledge the paradox. They hold an unassailable parliamentary majority, but the Communists control the factories and the public services.



The Fact Is De-escalation

It gets to be a little strange how persistently political critics and editorial analysts talk and write their way around the elemental message contained in President Nixon's policy of withdrawing American troops from Vietnam.

None of this comment seems able to open its appraisal and perception to what might seem to be the self-evident truth, which is that no matter how you pull it apart or kick it about the central action of the Nixon Administration in Vietnam is one of de-escalation.

If, while you are riding high and handsome toward a new altitude record in your balloon, some unkind character aboard pulls a valve string and lets some of the gas out of the bag, so that your balloon descends gently a mile or two back nearer earth, you are likely to call the meddler a spoil sport.

The New Look Is the Old Look

The significant thing about the 1970 Chevrolet unveiled last week by General Motors is not the new look, but the old look. Except for a few minor changes, the new models are barely changed. This is true not only of the cars but of the American business and financial community watches, with instinctive reactions, jangled emotions, and slowly waking intelligence, the possibility that the Nixon Administration, with such dire things as a threat to cut back on governmental capital expenditures, may be letting a little pressure out of the inflation bag and forcing the economy to settle down at a somewhat lower level rather than try to keep climbing past all its old records.

The idea that cutting down on the amount and pace of present business can be good business in the long run is hard to take when the business being cut happens to be your own, and it is not easy to remember to be grateful for it when, the slump over, you are scrambling to get your own full share of new good times.

Both economy and common sense require the wisdom of few model changes. Planned obsolescence is no longer regarded by the car makers as sacred doctrine; it smacks too much of conspicuous consumption to be acceptable in a society which values human beings above machines, and is more concerned with poverty, education, racial equality, and scientific achievement than with automobile styling.

causing words for continual ballooning, but one of the best words for the economy as a whole, came from William McChesney Martin Jr., chairman of the Federal Reserve Board, when he said the other day that he thought we are now "getting to the end" of the period of very high interest rates. These rates, for months past, have been the symbol of our inability to control our ascent toward dizzy and impossible economic heights. If they are to pause, and then begin to settle down, that will be because the crush for money itself has begun to ease, which will be because people and government and institutions aren't quite so busy borrowing money for new investments, new construction, additional production. This is the kind of dull, down-grade news which is good news in a time like this, and leads to the hope that we can, this time, balance the economy before we wreck it.

Brewster To His Freshmen

Welcoming this year's more attractive than usual group of freshmen, President Kingman Brewster of Yale took the opportunity to warn them against the smart-aleck view, which so frequently captures the imagination of the young, that of cynicism which takes nothing at face value, distrusts every motivation, infers the canker in every rose, and makes universal law out of every imperfection it discerns in the society it is just entering.

He held before his freshmen boys and girls, rather, the example of two Yale products who, he said, "have not yielded to the temptations to cynicism which pervade the country" and who, instead, "in their quite different styles have been quite unshaken, wholly unshamed of their high purpose."

The two Yale products to whom he referred were the Rev. William Sloane Coffin Jr., the controversial chaplain of the University itself, and John Lindsay, the controversial mayor of New York City.

Life, he said, is more than material well being, and conscience more than simple fear. Love, he said, is more than simple affection; it is more than political power and community is more than organization. These are, he said, things we know by faith, not by our ability to establish them by the use of weights and measures.

He recommended them to his young hearers, and exhorted them never to hide their "public motivation, idealism or even romanticism."

It even must seem a rather high moment, for the boys and girls of the class of 1973, to be welcomed into an atmosphere where the vibrations were so positive.

WASHINGTON—The real target of Israel's new and fantastically successful military operations against Egypt is Moscow more than Egypt itself—a daring but dangerous tactic.

The Israelis want to demonstrate to Egypt's patron, the Soviet Union, that they can control Egyptian sites and raid Egyptian territory on the western side of the Suez Canal at will. Once Moscow realizes this, Israel hopes, Moscow will push Cairo into serious peace talks.

What worries U.S. policy-makers is that the new and dangerous game Israel is playing against Egypt could lead to menacingly different results in Moscow. Instead of reacting by pressuring President Nasser to talk peace with Israel, the humiliation of its No. 1 ally in the Arab world—and, therefore, its own humiliation—requires a drastic response.

The nature of this response is unknown here. It could be Soviet introduction of sophisticated weapons, such as a medium range conventional missile capable of hitting Israel from Egypt. Or it might temporarily transfer Moscow's attention from Egypt to a new emphasis on subverting such royalist regimes as Saudi Arabia and Morocco, as King Idris's regime in Libya was subverted two weeks ago by a revolutionary military clique.

Whatever Moscow's reaction, it could introduce explosive new elements into the combustible Middle East.

Israel's current offensive against Egypt is fundamentally different from the cycle of raid and counter-raid conducted along Israel's eastern frontier of Jordan, Syria, and Lebanon. It marks a profound turning point, a calculated Israeli intention to demonstrate military presence not against hardened E.F. Fatah guerrillas but against the Soviet army.

In proving that it can maintain control of both the sides and the ground across the canal in Egyptian territory, the Israelis are also proving that the Russian—so long as he is forced to work through the Egyptians—is a paper tiger.

The new Israeli strategy has been in the making for three months, starting with strategy sessions early last spring. Those sessions ended in June, the air force ordered to "clear the skies" of Egyptian aircraft—MiG 17s and the MiG 19 fighter—before the next two months (July and August), this first phase continued with brilliant success.

Then Israel having established air supremacy over Egyptian territory, phase two started with last week's astonishing cross-gulf ground raid. In control of the air, the Israelis were able to bring tanks artillery by amphibious landing craft without loss, move down the coast shooting out military targets, and return by amphibious craft to the other bank.

Long known as one of the great beef producers of the world, Argentina once a year parades its prize livestock before the admiring eyes of its own citizens and of buyers from all over the world at the Rural Exposition of Livestock, Agriculture and Industry in Buenos Aires.

It's the biggest outdoor show in the country, and a major social event of the winter season, with the President and the entire stock breeding aristocracy in attendance.

Started over a hundred years ago when Indians reclaimed the land and owned most of it, and the landed gentry were trying to unify the nation and safeguard their property, the Rural continues to be a glittering showcase of Argentina's wealth and natural resources.

The finest domestic animals in the land are exhibited, appraised by international judges, some from the United States, and auctioned to the highest bidder. In a country where cattle is king and the number one industry, a prize Black Angus bull can bring in as much as \$170,000 and a Holland-Argentine cow, bred only here, is more than an object of curiosity; it is a source of national pride and admiration.

This year more than 2,000 head of cattle, 600 sheep, 300 horses and thousands of other farm animals and fowl were exhibited during the show, held each August on 44 specially-equipped acres in Palermo Park. To feed and house these pampered and perfumed prima donnas of the animal world, more than 150 tons of balanced cereals, 440 tons of grass and 1,200 tons of straw were used.

This colorful annual spectacle, dedicated to the improvement of the nation's livestock, breeding standards and to its economy, is a festive event not unlike a gigantic country fair, where even the uninitiated city-bred visitor can see the people of Argentina at work and play, and fully appreciate the fruits of their labors.



## Student Loan Bill Passes in House, Sent to Senate

WASHINGTON (AP) — The student loan bill without provision for dealing with campus riots—on its way to the Senate after passing 322 to 60 in the House.

In the Senate, the measure—which attempts to make loans to needy students readily available through government-guaranteed interest subsidies—either can be passed in its present form or sent to a conference committee. The House defeated an attempt to write in anti-riot provisions.

Another version, passed earlier by the Senate, was rejected by the House just before Congress took its three-week summer recess.

This last money students who together with the help of a loan holding the bag, President Nixon, however, appealed to banks to grant the student loans anyhow, on the strength of the bill's passage when Congress returned.

Under either measure, private banks would grant loans to students and the government would pay the interest until the student completed his schooling. The government also guarantees repayment if the student's family has an income of less than \$15,000.

While the legal interest ceiling on such loans would remain at 7 per cent, the measure provides for interest subsidies of up to 3 per cent to the banks.

## Reston Relaxes The Rush Hour For Commuters

WASHINGTON POST RESTON, Va. — About 150 Reston commuters have selected the rush-hour traffic truce.

Six chartered express buses not only whisk Reston residents to and from their jobs in Washington each day, but also occasionally serve coffee and doughnuts during the morning trips and home Friday afternoon "social hours."

Reston's unique transit system has now been commended by the Washington Center for Metropolitan Studies as a model of how citizen action can improve urban transportation.

In a report released by the center this week, the success of the town's system was attributed to "careful planning, intensive promotion and subtle management" by the Reston Community Association.

The community decided to charter buses last year solely for express service between Reston and Washington. Services from commercial companies had been sporadic at times, according to the report noted.

QualReston, developers of the town, agreed to underwrite a deficit up to \$100 if response listed there was a chance for future success.

The residents got little more than encouragement from the state, federal and county governments.

However, more and more Reston commuters took the bus following an intensive promotional drive.

An added incentive, reduced fares of \$5 were given to monthly ticketholders. A daily round-trip ticket cost \$1.50.

In a postscript footnote to his report for the center, Henry Blair, a Reston associate, said: "The Reston experience is not likely to be often repeated without special stimulus. In a more typical suburban community, citizens may need more support and guidance."

## Stamps In The News

The crab-sign of Cancer in the zodiac—is featured on three stamps from the Netherlands to honor the Queen Wilhelmina Cancer Fund on its 20th anniversary. 

## They Check Health of 12-17 Age Group



Miss Lindner, rear, displays one of the physical exams youths undergo at health center. At she stands on an inclined treadmill at 3 1/2 miles an hour, technician Kenneth McDowell measures her pulse rate on the cardiograph, and Miss Lucy Eulse gives instructions. The pulse rate is recorded before the five-minute exercise begins and for ten seconds after the treadmill stops. The test shows what effect the exercise of a brisk one-third of a mile walk has on the heart.

Less than a tenth of a pint of blood is taken for the blood tests and placed in four separate test tubes. Three of the tubes are sent to three different labs, where they do "just about every imaginable test," says Miss Lindner.

The fourth tube of blood is sent in a machine to separate white from red blood cells. The red blood cells are usually heavier and sink to the bottom, leaving above what seems to be a colorless blood. These white blood cells are then sent to an Atlanta, Ga., laboratory where they are checked for protein and other contents.

One of the other tubes of blood is sent to a lab which checks for venereal disease; another tube is sent to the Johns Hopkins University for six different blood tests; and the third to a second Atlanta lab for another series of tests.

"We do our own anemia test here," Miss Lindner pointed out where "we take a picture of the height for accuracy." That way, even the possibility of error through a human eye reading is eliminated.

"When you do this for four years," she explained, the senior technician "and try to maintain the same standards of accuracy, it's a very difficult job."

In the next room, a teenage boy was having an electrocardiogram, or recording of his heartbeat.

"It goes on tape and is computer analyzed. The computer comes up with 25 different analyses from one exam in just a few minutes. This is much more accurate and less time consuming than the hospital recording."

The 70-minute psychology tests, administered personally

by two trailer-resident psychologists, determine intelligence and social adjustment.

So, within the walls of these four trailers, peaceful as they appear from Main St., there is much activity. What these U.S. Public Health Service examiners are at that time, they're examining children.

Pekel Venturi, who has a temporary office in the Widdell Elementary School, is field operations manager. The trailers will disappear suddenly Friday, as the group takes off to conduct another series of tests in Bristol.

### Alaska State Trooper, Her Uniform in Wrong

Associated Press Writer Miss Howard is a little leary of the physical regimen at the Jean Howard, a thoughtful, thoroughly feminine lass of 22, says she became Alaska's first female state trooper because she like police work—she because she's out to prove anything.

"I'm not a barnstormer. I'm not a women's rights advocate," the blue-eyed brunette said. "It just sorta happened."

It started when Miss Howard, a trained dental technician, decided "there were different things I wanted to see that I couldn't see at an 8:00 job in a dental office," and she left Grants Pass, Ore., for Alaska.

She got a job as a clerk typist with the Department of Public Safety in February 1968 and later began to think that there was a place in the department for a female trooper.

State regulations for state troopers don't mention that an officer has to be a man. And, Miss Howard, nicely built and South Vietnamese, forces on tall, passed the 5-foot-9 minimum height requirement.

### Pollution at Issue Auto Makers Face Suit By Chicago Aldermen

The suit filed Tuesday in U.S. District Court alleged that Chrysler Corp., Ford Motor Co. and General Motors Corp. had conspired since 1965 to "restrain action in U.S. District Court in Los Angeles where the Big Three, American Motors Corp. and their trade association, the Automobile Manufacturers Association."

The Chicago suit was filed by two city aldermen, Paul T. Wigoda and Thomas D. Keane, as private citizens on behalf of all Chicagoans. Keane is Mayor Richard J. Daley's floor leader in the City Council.

Keane said agreement on the California case was one reason the taxpayers' suit was filed in Chicago. Mitchell's announcement last week had brought protests from its congressmen.

### Fishing Lures Investments In Brazil

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) — Fishing has become a multimillion-dollar operation in Brazil and it is certain to become even bigger in the next few years.

"Within the next three years there will probably be a greater development in fisheries than this nation has seen in the past 300 years," the Ministry of Agriculture says.

The ministry's predictions are based on the results of studies carried out during the past two years by the Food and Agricultural Organization in conjunction with the government's office for the development of fishing.

A major stimulus for investment is fisheries law 221, enacted by the federal government in 1967. This led to approval of \$15 million in new investments. It provided fiscal incentives relating to taxes, importation of fishing equipment and the employment of income tax liabilities as investment.

These incentives are scheduled to continue until 1972.

Since this law took effect, 45 new fishing vessels have been approved and are being built with a total holding capacity of 18,000 tons. Total capacity will more than double within the next two years.

Several foreign firms are investing in the industry, but most years by the Food and Agricultural Organization in conjunction with the government's office for the development of fishing.

The shrimping catch has increased 300 to 800 per cent, the ministry reports. A new industry has sprung up in Belém with the discovery that catfish are an exportable commodity.

British Banks Raise Prime Lending Rate

LONDON (AP) — British commercial banks today raised their prime lending rate to 9 per cent, further tightening Britain's credit squeeze. The increase followed similar action last week in Austria, West Germany and Switzerland. U.S. commercial banks raised their prime rate on June 9 to 8.5 per cent, the highest ever. But because of the Federal Reserve Bank's restrictions on lending, the prime rate actually works out to 10.8 per cent. The new prime rate represents an increase of one-half a percentage point above the old rate of 10.3 per cent. The rate for ordinary customers rises from 9 1/2 to 10 1/2, and in some cases 11 per cent. The prime rate is the interest banks charge on lending to their biggest and best customers. The British banks said their action was taken "to reduce the current pressure on bank lending." Permission for the increase was given during a meeting between Chancellor of the Exchequer Roy Jenkins and

commercial bank representatives. The new prime rate goes into effect Oct. 1. It was one of the few times the commercial banks have acted on their own to raise their lending rate without a simultaneous increase of the Bank of England's basic discount rate which by tradition sets the pace for all changes on money lending.

The banks' action also brings their rates closer to those charged by other moneylenders in the market place. Up to now the lower prime rate has thrown a heavy strain on the commercial banks, which are bound by a ceiling imposed on their lending by the government to its drive toward activity. This ceiling is 98 per cent of bank lending at the time of the devaluation of the pound, Nov. 18, 1967. The banks are already 4 1/2 per cent of \$20 million above the ceiling and are under heavy government pressure to reduce lending. They hope the higher charge will make would-be borrowers think twice. The increase brought no immediate reaction in the London stock market although investors marked down the price of stocks and government bonds at the opening. But there was an outcry from representatives of farms and

small business men who said it would add an intolerable burden. A spokesman for the National Farmers Union said the increase would raise agriculture and horticulture costs by \$6 million a year.

Vernon Two-Town Refuse District Considers Going Inactive

The North Central Refuse District is seeking the guidance of the officials of the two member towns, Vernon and South Windsor, as to whether it should remain active as this time. In an advisory report presented to the Vernon Board of Representatives and the South Windsor Town Council Monday night, the district committee outlined the problems faced since organization of the district in 1965. The committee is made up of three members from Vernon and two from South Windsor. The district was formed through a special act of the General Assembly and was designed to include East Windsor and Bolton, as well as the two towns now involved. The purpose of organizing was "to provide a means whereby the towns might conveniently, economically and in a sanitary manner dispose of solid refuse." The district was not committed to any specific form of disposal but the inclination to date has been toward incineration and it was to this end that all future plans were directed.

Von Braun for Broad Goal Rather Than Big Mars Push

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Rocket pioneer Dr. Werner von Braun said he would rather see the United States engaged in a balanced space program rather than a Mars-or-bust plan, but he warned it would cost at least \$4 billion a year to do so. Members now feel, due to the unfavorable action taken by the zoning bodies, that the district is placed in the position of looking for a site not meeting the criteria, changing the criteria or stepping back into inactive status to allow further public thought in the development of the growing refuse disposal problem. The district feels that this may be the time to become inactive, awaiting conditions that will be more favorable to active interest in the district's method of approach to refuse disposal. Vernon has been without a disposal area of its own for about 10 years. For several years, its rubbish and garbage was trucked to Hartford then more recently to Ashford. Two months ago the town signed a contract to use an Ellington refuse area and does not now have the urgent need for an expensive incinerator facility. Couple Pleads Innocent In Death of Son



# Harrelson Big Hit In Fenway Finale

BOSTON (AP) — All day long Ken Harrelson was waiting to hit a home run in Fenway Park, and when he finally connected on his last chance he picked quite a spot for it.

"This is just like old times," the fifty-year-old Cleveland slugger exclaimed Tuesday night after his three-run eighth inning out that won the Indians in a 6-5 victory over Boston Red Sox teammates.

If you had to write a script it would be high over the left field wall couldn't have been better," he said to the reporters who crowded around him. "It was just one of those things. It had to happen. Twenty-two at bats in Fenway Park this year and only three singles—and this was my last time up here for the year."

The Hawk didn't really think it was to happen, though, as he strode to the plate with one out and runners on first and second. He's the cleanup hitter for the Indians, but Red Sox pitcher Jim Lonergan had just walked Duke Sims intentionally in front of him—and with good reason.

"I didn't think I could do it because of Lonergan," Harrelson said. "He's really tough—he's the toughest pitcher in the league to me."

The Hawk caught a fast ball out over the plate and cracked it over the 25th home of the year and his third against Red Sox pitching. The other two having come in Cleveland.


Harrelson, who hit 28 homers and 100 RBIs last year, and although he had been in the Indians' lineup for a long time, he received a standing ovation from the crowd of 16,597 as he circled the bases and was cheered loudly again as he went out to the field at the end of the inning.

"It was a long time coming," he said afterwards. "This one really feels good."

Overshadowed by Harrelson's heroics was Rico Petrocelli's 39th home run for Boston, equalling the American League record for a shortstop set by Vern Stephens, also with the Red Sox, in 1949.

Rico's homer also was a towering blast to left field, and it led the score 2-1 in the seventh, setting the stage for Harrelson's climactic shot.
