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Work Stopped On Recreation Community

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — A Novaco company aiming to create a "recreation community" in West Goshen announced Thursday it has temporarily discontinued sales in the project.

John Keating, vice president of Boise Cascade Properties Inc., issued the announcement after a meeting with State Consumer Protection Commissioner James Casey and James Carvey, executive director of the Connecticut State Real Estate Commission.

The meeting was held to consider questions and complaints about various aspects of the promotion of the recreation community, to be called Woodridge Lake.

Keating said that although the company believes previous engineering data on the nature of the soil in the project area was accurate, sales were being suspended pending the outcome of further tests.

It had been charged that the ground in the area was unsuitable for installation of sewage and water facilities.

In addition Keating said, "We stand ready to make full refund of all payments and closing costs to anybody who has already purchased property at the Woodridge Lake project and who now prefers to cancel."

Keating also said, "Each Woodridge Lake property owner will receive in writing a guarantee that he will be able to install water and sewage facilities at a reasonable cost."

Keating said he was satisfied after the meeting that the thing the state wanted had been accomplished. "The important thing was to insure that the people of this state could get out of all this money and closing costs and be satisfied with the problem would be corrected and taken care of. The Boise Cascade people have completely agreed."

Dr. Spock Says Demonstrations Slated for Fall

NEW YORK (AP) — President Nixon can count on plenty of pressure from antiwar demonstrators this fall despite his latest announced Vietnam troop withdrawal, Dr. Benjamin Spock says.

The pediatrician outlined Thursday a series of fall demonstrations against the war, one of them practically in the President's back yard. "We have made a good fight," said Democrat William Proxmire of Wisconsin, a leader in the two-month battle that ended Thursday night with passage of the bill.

Spock told newsmen that the President's announcement that another 30,000 troops would be withdrawn from Vietnam was a "trap" and a "fraud" to weaken antiwar demonstrators.

He spoke at a news conference also attended by David Dellinger, editor of Liberation magazine and one of the eight charged after one group, ignoring a police order and attempting to march to United Nations Plaza, seized briefly with police.

Senators Feel: Good Foundation Laid For Defense Inquiry

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate critics of defense costs say a new era has opened in public awareness of Pentagon spending, despite their crushing defeat on attempts after attempt to trim a \$40-billion bill for military hardware.

"We have made a good fight," said Democrat William Proxmire of Wisconsin, a leader in the two-month battle that ended Thursday night with passage of the bill. "But," he added, "this is merely the opening shot in a larger effort. The critical review will go on."

A defense system which for years has operated without sufficient public and private checks has now been exposed to the sunlight, said Republican Edward Brooke of Massachusetts. "A good foundation has been laid for future inquiry."

The Proxmire and Brooke comments came as the huge appropriations measure, finally passed on an 81-5 vote, climaxing the most heated debate over defense spending in two decades.

Sex Education Course Opens at St. Luke's

Miss Dick felt the need of masculine and feminine dialogue in the church and sees this happening, but only to a point. "God forbid that we ever have female priests," she spoke and unspoke for the role of the priest because of their nature. Man, she thought, was ordained by God to be the aggressor, the leader and the protector.

Artists Offer Objets-in-Poke. NEW YORK (AP) — More than 200 artists and collectors are being offered the chance to buy an object d'art which they can't get to see.

Our Acceptance of Madness

If anyone thinks there is any easy cure for the madness on this world, let him notice the blind and easy way in which the Atomic Energy Commission labeled as "very important to national security" the latest hydrogen blast set off underground out in Nevada.

It made a big visible bulge in the terrain at the testing ground. It sent waves into the sky, and it sent waves into the tall buildings of Salt Lake City, 300 miles away. It had explosive force equivalent to that of 800,000 tons of TNT.

But it was not the explosion passed off as a success, "very important to national security." Why do we feel more secure because of this test?

The thing being tested out was apparently an anti-missile warhead, which may eventually offer us some improved chance of halting some of our missiles which would be launched in our direction in any future world war.

Conceivably, if perfected, and then deployed, the new weapon might decrease by several million the number of millions of Americans doomed to die in the first, and perhaps only, and only last blow of that possible impossible war.

The madness of our world lies in the fact that there are any number of people who do accept that there can, within such general prospects, be such a thing as "national security," and who do indeed put a much trust as they can manage for anything that is their own days in the business of developing explosives to another explosion.

No saint or philosopher, no think tank, not even any computer, has yet been able to sell any sane concept or policy to any nation which possesses explosives.

Conscience Made Easy

One scientist, Dr. George Wald, Nobel Prize biologist at Harvard, has answered the big question for today's scientists rather easily. But then, his own ideological commitment was known; he is, specifically and eloquently, a man of peace. So, when the Army asked him whether he would have a Nobel Prize for his work in unraveling the chemistry of human vision, he would cooperate in developing an agent which would render people temporarily blind. Dr. Wald refused to cooperate.

a situation in which he would have to make an announcement about his discovery which would have to include, to guarantee safe use of his discovery, the information as to how to make its use unsafe. In other words, his cautionary warning to physicians employing the agent would also constitute the provision to the military of the military weapon which could cause momentary blindness.

One can imagine other situations in which Dr. Wald might have more choice, and still not be able to approach the easy answer he made to the Army's direct request for production of a specific agent. The truth is simply that the determination of scientific fact and effect cannot, in itself, be classified either as good or evil. We cannot fairly expect the scientist, then, to constitute himself the conscience for society.

We can, when we see him being engaged for himself, refusing to engage in any deliberate search for some new technology for man to inflict upon man, applaud his honorable and tender sentiment, his refusal to lend his positive cooperation to the development of the horrible evil of war.

But for the most part, society must accept its own conscience, and accept its own responsibility for what it does with the facts and potentials science happens to develop. There has always been the weapons for evil and for violence. There have been some gradations in the willingness of human beings to use them against one another.

The sound and meaningful hope, then, has to be not for scientists who will shrink from their universe, but for human beings who will shrink from the role of the wolf.

Mars, In Good Time

Just the latest light dropped by the scientists studying rocks from the moon is enough to justify — as if we could stop ourselves, anyway — our planning to get a man on Mars.

The tantalizing incentive dropped by the scientists is that the moon rocks brought back by Apollo 11 seem, on preliminary analysis, to have a chemical composition "unlike that of any known terrestrial rock."

There, in other words, may go the theory that the moon and the earth had a common origin.

And this complicates and makes more exciting the inevitable pursuit of the scientist's quest for explanation of how and when creation occurred.

We can't refrain from going where we can, in this search for the history of the universe, and we shouldn't refrain, even if we can.

This being accepted, we agree with the kind of timing now agreed upon by the Nixon administration, by both the Presidential study group on future space exploration, and the President himself.

Our priorities are here, on earth, on this unhappy and imperfect jewel of the universe.

President Nixon, far from gaining credit for far relief to the overburdened middle class, can now be blamed for trying to limit that relief. Congressional tax reformers and Republicans and Democrats alike, are outraged by the sudden Administration retreat.

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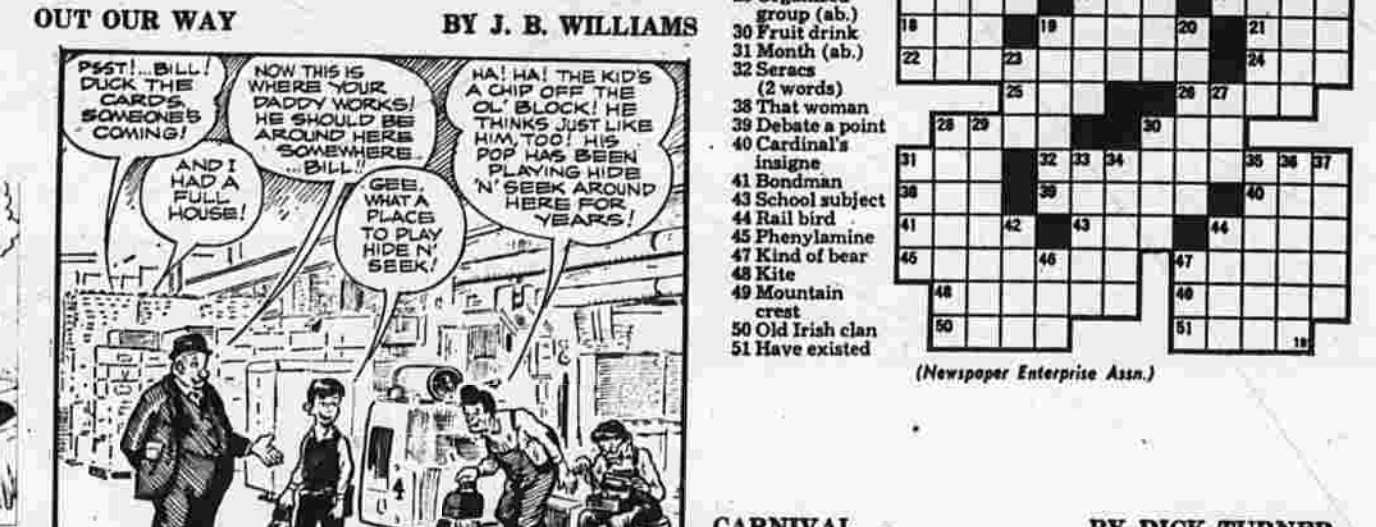
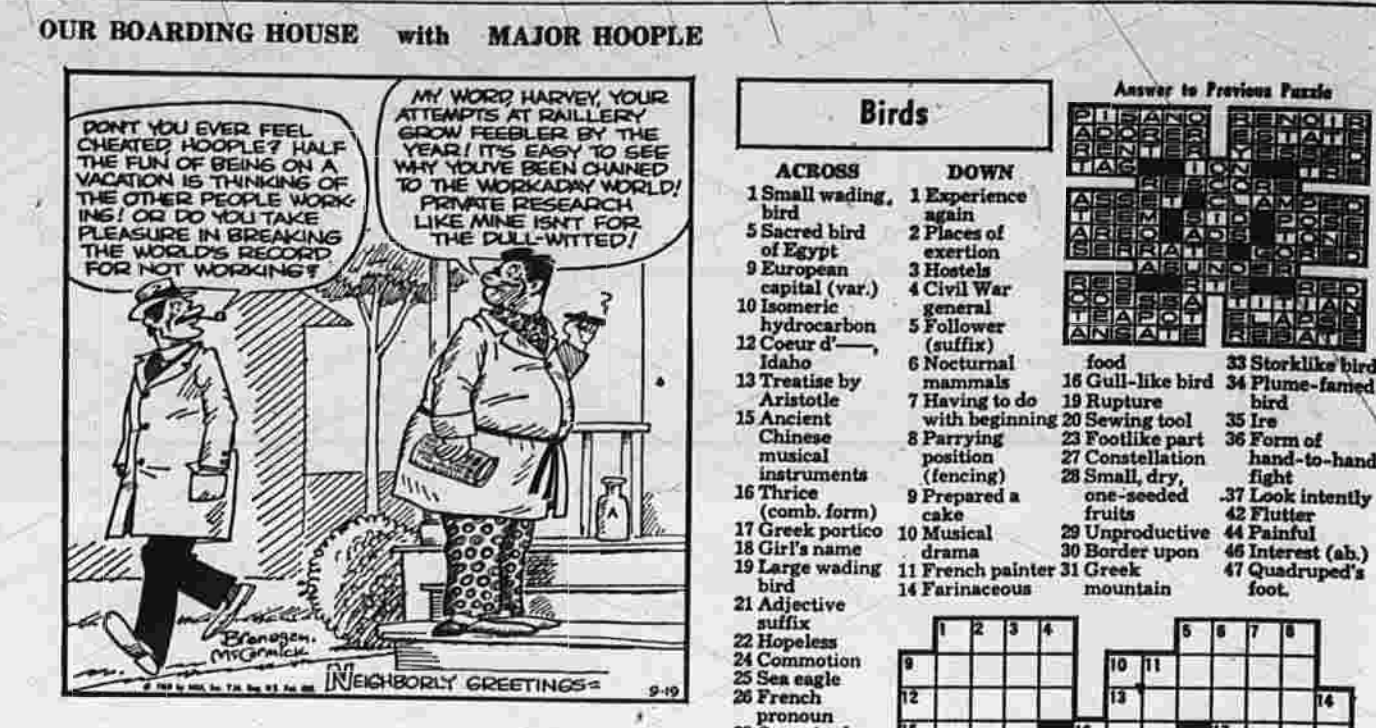
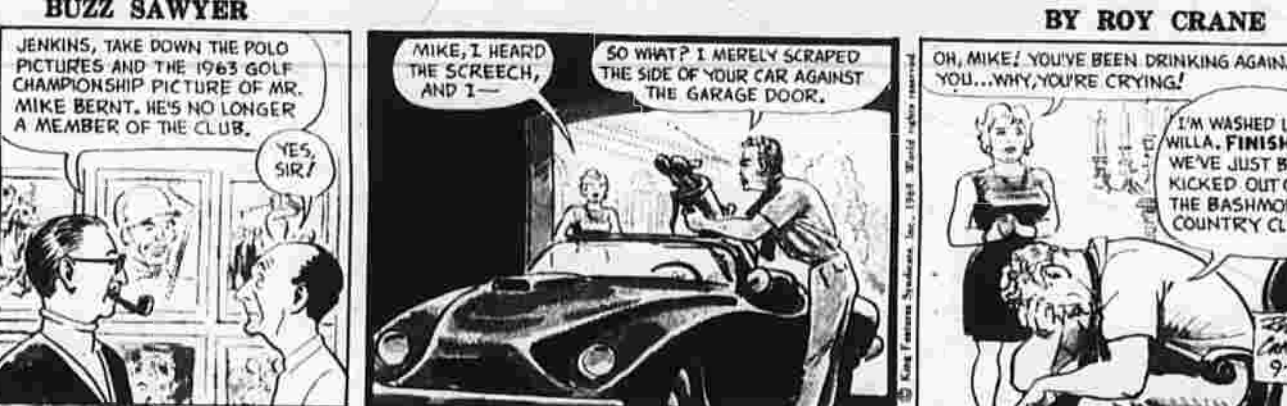
