For as the evidence of Lenin's resurgence quietly grows, dramatized by the respectful if not yet wholly responsive hearing that has been given to the speech which has been pronounced beyond the walls of the "Great Wall of China," the spotlight focuses more intensely on the "backlash" fever and a repudiation of the "Great Leap Forward" program.

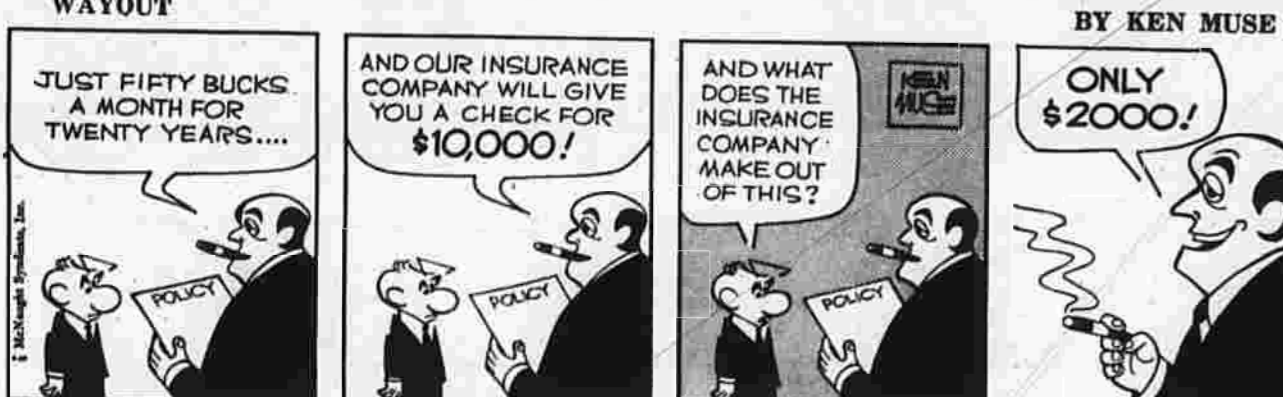

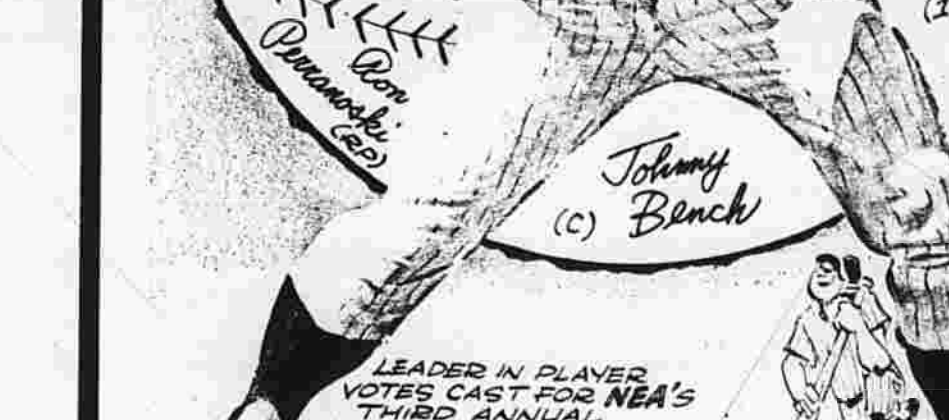

Stratton, who favors restora-
tion of the wall in place to pre-

said the cost of the expansion
project would make it the most
expensive building ever con-
structed.

"In this Congress, we have al-
ready done a number of things

creased our staffs, and boosted
our retirement benefits. Do we
really need to pay this enormous
sum to create 58 hideaway
offices for ourselves? That is
the question."

The members all have offices
in the three big buildings across
the street but it is a sign of sta-
tus to have another office in the
Capitol to slip into during weary
debates.

Present plans for the west
front project would add 600
offices divided between the
Senate and House.

Stratton offered an amend-
ment to eliminate \$2 million re-
quested for drawing plans for

ing study to see if restoration in
place is feasible. But he lost,
92-59, on a non-record vote.

There is considerable opposi-
tion to the expansion project in

Yom Kippur

Yom Kippur, or Day of Atonement,
will be observed by Jews
all over the world beginning to-
morrow at sundown and con-
tinuing through Monday, until
after sundown.

Services will be held at Tem-
ple Beth Shalom tomorrow at
7 p.m. (Kol Nidre) and through-
out the day on Monday. The
Memorial Service (Yizkor) will
be held on Monday at 5:15 p.m.

The day's services will end with
the blowing of the Shofar
(ram's horn) at 7:30 p.m.

Yom Kippur is the holiest day
in the Jewish calendar. It is a
fast day on which the Jews ab-
stain from food and drink for
25 hours, from sunset on Sun-
day until one hour after sun-
set on Monday. Thus freed of
physical concerns, the worshiper
is able to concentrate on the
spiritual aspects of life and
ponder the deeper meaning of
human destiny.

At the evening service on
Yom Kippur Eve, the Kol
Nidre is chanted, stressing the
importance of the plight of word
and the seriousness of promises
made to God and to man.

The highlights of the day's
services are the Confessional in
which the congregation ex-
presses its corporate sins
against God and against man,
the Yom Kippur prayer, recalling the
sacrifices in the ancient Tem-
ple in Jerusalem; the Martyro-
logy, recalling the death of ten
Jews who were martyred for
their faith at the hands of the
Romans in the second century;
and the Yizkor (memorial) ser-
vice at which the departed
members of each worshipper's
family are memorialized.

The Day of Atonement will
culminate a period of "Ten
Days of Repentance" which be-
gan with the New Year on Sat-
urday, Sept. 14. The theme of
the entire period is the quest
for life, its moral qualities, the
sinfulness of man which stands
in the way to the good life and
the constant need of self-
improvement, a condition which

week between the attacks, and
then sometimes I can go for
several months without them."

Broome's latest attack ended
a few days ago. He said he lost
10 pounds. "It may seem funny
when it's all over, but when you
have the hiccups like I have
them, it's not so funny," he
said.

He said he and doctors do not
know what starts them.

Broome said he has tried
many remedies suggested to
him, but the hiccups "always
come back."

He said he developed his
worst case of hiccups when he
was in the Army in 1940.

"The doctor tried everything.
Finally, he said there was nothing
else to do but operate," says
Broome. "He brought out the
biggest syringe I've ever seen.
It must have been a foot long."

MCC Enrollment at 2,299,

Youth Commission
Has First Meeting

"I'm going to step out because I'm a member of the
Establishment," said Robert J. Digan, Manchester co-
ordinator of youth services, last night at the first for-
mal meeting of the newly organized Youth Commission
in the Municipal Building Hearing Room.

As soon as the meeting got
under way, Digan and others of
the over-30 generation departed
to let the young people of Man-
chester run their own show.

In his introductory comments
to the 23 out of 24 commission
members who attended, Digan
said, "You have been empow-
ered by the government to be-
come part of the government."

Adult advisor Aaron Furrman,
22, added that he wanted the
group to become "a real mov-
ing force in this community."

There are two members on
the Youth Commission repre-
senting each high school and
junior high in town, parochial
and private, except East Cath-
olic, which felt that it was un-
fair for them to send repre-
sentatives since they served stu-
dents from a wider nucleus than
just Manchester. There are also
representatives from the Teen
Center, IOH, Depot Coffee
House and Manchester Commu-
nity College.

Digan said he wanted repre-
sentatives from minority
groups, school dropouts and
young workers, but that there
was a problem in locating them.
He said he couldn't just pick
people off the street since he
wanted those who would be
truly interested in putting a lot
of work into the commission.

Digan encouraged the com-
mission members to search out
people from these groups them-
selves to fill either vacant com-
mission posts or serve on an
auxiliary commission.

"Find several Negroes, Chi-
nese or Hindus," said Digan. "I
want to see them in here."

Advisor Richard Provost, as-
sistant coordinator of youth
services, added his own empha-
sis to Digan's point when he
said that the commission "was
not necessarily to be restricted
to school-oriented ideas."

Mayor Nathan Agostinelli ar-
rived shortly after the meeting
began to deliver his own words
of welcome.

"There are many people that
think the Youth Commission
won't work," he said. "I feel
very deeply that we need you.
We need your recommendations,
suggestions, and help in
trying to improve our town."

Agostinelli told commission
members to do their own think-
ing, and not to succumb to the
ideas or plans of others if they
didn't believe in them.

"I think the key word in
recommendations is sincerity,"
he said. "It's very easy to
jump on a bandwagon."

Three candidates were nomi-
nated for the chairmanship and
were asked to prepare brief
speeches for the next meeting
on what they thought the Youth
Commission could do and what
each could do as chairman.

Whoever receives the second-
most votes will serve as co-
chairman.

Nominated are Kathi Knapp
of Manchester Community Col-
lege, Eric Sinnamon of Man-
chester High School, and Kathi
Martin of the Depot Coffee
House.

Most of the commission mem-
bers were very conservatively
dressed, with many of the boys
wearing suits and sporting short
haircuts. Only one of the 10 boys
on the commission had side-
burns, although both adult ad-
visers did.

"We'll probably be labelled
goody-goody by all the kids in
town," said Miss Knapp. She
suggested that they schedule
more youth forums and that
they open themselves up to
controversial ideas.

Sinnamon formed a member-
ship committee to investigate
on what criteria they were all
chosen, and IOH President Gary
Aronson said, "I want to see
the dropouts. They're the ones
that are going to have most of
the gripes, and those are the
ones we want to hear from."

Some of the areas recom-
mended for study were:
Classes are scheduled in Har-
ford 10 classroom in Hartford
building from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m.
Approximately two-thirds of the
sections meet after 4 p.m. at
Manchester High School.

Despite student population
growth, the administration has
reduced class section sizes. This
has been achieved by increas-
ing the faculty to 111 full-time
and part-time members, and
opening 71 new class sections for
321 students.

New Shows, Familiar Faces

NEW YORK — (NEA) — II,  
like Chinese years, the 1969-70 television season were to be given a name, it would be known as The Year of the Second Time Around.

We have had The Year of the Beautiful Parking Lot Attendants (anything before 1963, when the brothers Warner kept turning out carbon copies called "77 Surfside Eye," or something like that); The Year of the Big Movie Name Coming to TV (1964 and Bing Crosby, Mickey Rooney, Carolyn Jones, David Niven, Charles Boyer) and The Year of the Show That Almost Didn't Show Up (1966, "The Tammy Grimes Show," four performances).

There are 22 performers back for a second try at a television series. Some of them are smarter and wiser. Like Monte Markham, formerly of "The Second Hundred Years" and now on ABC-TV's "Mr. Deeds Goes to Town." What did he learn from his first series? "Who to fight with," he says with firmness. "I wasted a lot of time arguing with the wrong people the first time."

Others, like E. G. Marshall, chose a schedule that has him work a month, get a few weeks off, work another month and be finished. E. G.'s schedule is possible because he is part of "The Bold Ones," an NBC-TV series which comprises three separate casts in three unrelated series about doctors, lawyers and protectors. The series is a haven for second timers. Besides E. G., formerly a lawyer on The Defenders and now a doctor, there is fellow doctor David Hartman (from "The Virginian"), lawyer Burl Ives (from

"O. K. Crackerby) and protector Hari Rhodes (Daktari).

Bill Cosby has graduated from "I Spy" to "The Bill Cosby Show" on NBC. William Windom, formerly a congressman on "The Farmer's Daughter," is a dog-hating, wife-hating, child-hating but nice guy cartoonist on NBC-TV's "My World and Welcome to It." Dennis Cole, formerly a cop on "Felony Squad," is a stunt man on NBC-TV's "Bracken's World." Elizabeth Allen plays the head of a movie talent school on "Bracken's World." Her former series required her to say, "Away we go." She was the original away we go-er on "The Jackie Gleason Show."

The other half of "The Defenders team," Robert Reed, is back playing a man with three sons who marries a woman with three daughters on ABC-TV's "The Brady Bunch." And he thought he had problems on his first series.

"Room 22," on ABC-TV, co-stars Michael Constantine as a high school principal. Previously he was a dyspeptic photographer on "Hey Landlord." Denise Nicholas has gone from the occasional role of Robert Hooks' wife on N.Y.P.D. to counselor on Room 222.

The Lennon Sisters, who formerly made the Walk-in ring, now have their own ABC-TV show with the cumbersome but starry title of "Jimmy Durante presents the Lennon Sisters Hour."

Bill Bixby is no longer involved with "My Favorite Martian," but is a widower with a son and an Oriental maid on ABC-TV's "The Courtship of Eddie's Father."

Leslie Uggams heads her own variety show on CBS-TV after getting her television feet

wet on "Sing Along With Mitch." Leonard Nimoy has gone from pointed-eared Mr. Spock on "Star Trek" to the Impossible Missions Force on "Mission: Impossible." Jim Nabors has left "Gomer Pyle, U.S.M.C." to march unseen while heading his own CBS-TV variety hour. "Medical Center" has two series graduates in James Daly ("Foreign Intrigues") — and who were the other two actors to star in that early, popular series? and Chad Everett ("The Dakotas").

Some actors never learn. They do series after series and get rich. Like Leslie Nielsen of "The Bold Ones," formerly in several Disney episodes called "The Swamp Fox," a one-time resident of "Peyton Place" and a member of "The New Breed."

Joe Campanella went from a doctor in "The Doctors and the Nurses" to the head of a detective agency in "Mannix" to a lawyer in "The Bold Ones." John Forsythe is still a "bachelor father" (that was his first series, with "The John Forsythe Show" his second) on CBS-TV's "To Rome With Love." He plays a professor in Rome with his three daughters, one a teenager. Oh, yes, he's that TV staple: a widower.

Ralph Bellamy on ABC-TV's "The Survivors," is part of television history with his first series, "Man Against Crime," seen live from New York. His second was "The Eleventh Hour," in which he replaced Wendell Corey.

Robert Young, back as "Marcus Welby, M.D." on ABC-TV, became a hero to all fathers when his popular series proclaimed "Father Knows Best." He followed that with "Window on Main Street," but not enough people peeked through the glass for that to be a success.

Dick Sargent, Elizabeth Montgomery's new "husband" on

Debbie Loves Lucy

In 1948, Debbie Reynolds entered show business by doing an imitation of Betty Hutton and winning the "Miss Burbank" title.

In 1951, writer Jess Open-

heimer created "I Love Lucy" for television and the show sent audience levels soaring to new levels for the new entertainment medium.

This season, Miss Reynolds teamed up with Jess Openheimer for "The Debbie Reynolds Show" and two gigantic talents were emerged. The result, which arrived Tuesday night (NBC) might best be described as "Debbie Reynolds imitates Lucy."

Lucy's husband was a band-leader and Lucy never tired of trying to get a job with the band. Debbie's husband is a sportswriter and she's determined to get a job on the newspaper.

And now you know why one network executive has already said of Miss Reynolds' situation comedy: "Even if the show is a (ratings) success, it will be a failure."

He meant, I think, that TV's creative geniuses shouldn't be permitted to take television backward—18 years backward—even for Debbie Reynolds.

Lucy, for example, used to put on a wig and a mustache as a disguise for an escapee. Tuesday night, Debbie put on a wig, sideburns and a mustache. She was determined to caddy for the governor of the state and get a big news story.

How in the world did "Julia" become the situation comedy hit of last season without earned laughter? It is possible that some viewers don't need to be told by electronics-just what is amusing? The very thought is dangerous in the ancient formula that is being used for "The Debbie Reynolds Show."

## Gene Bua, Idol: 'I Love Being 24'

Idol of millions who watch him on the daily soap opera, "Love of Life," Gene Bua is himself a lover of life—especially now that he is launching a new career as a recording artist.

"I love being 24," declares the strikingly handsome 6 foot 1 actor who plays the part of Bill Prentiss in the (CBS-TV) soap opera. "I'll love being 30 and I'll love being 50. Each age brings its own thing."

Bua (whose name rhymes with view-a) recently cut his first album on the MGM Heritage label. Also called "Love of Life," the record features a song by that title and others on the theme of love, performed in

his low-key style that has been compared with Perry Como's.

Already a veteran of stock, off-Broadway theater, movies and television, Bua is hoping to branch out into concert tours. A brief singing spot on the serial brought such response from fans that the story line was changed to give him more frequent opportunities to sing. His role is now that of a married college student who strums a guitar and sings while waiting on tables in a restaurant.

"I've always been interested in singing," he said, crossing his long legs and chewing earnestly on a stick of gum. "I was a boy soprano soloist in St. Fidelis Catholic Church in Queens, N.Y., for five years. My voice didn't change till I was about 15 so I had a long tenure."

Bua, born in Brooklyn, N.Y., is the son of an Italian father and Irish mother. He reluctantly studied piano as a boy, although he would have much preferred to play outdoors with his friends. Before he was out of high school he had organized his own group, "Gene Bua and the Cardinals," in which he played piano and sang. Later he worked at odd jobs to pay for lessons in acting, for which he has an enthusiastic regard.

"Acting is much like self-analysis," explained Bua, casually dressed in white pants, white slip-on canvas shoes and a shiny purple shirt. "It's a matter of relaxing and finding which side of yourself fits this particular character. When someone says a person is a natural actor what they mean is that he can relax better than the next guy. Even if it's a scene that calls for me to be nervous, first I relax, then the actor has to take on the nerves. Physical tension is one

of the worst things for an actor."

Bua feels that the caliber of soap opera acting is quite good, taking into consideration the short rehearsal time. The cast rehearses with script from 2 to 5 p.m., they study their lines at night and at 8 the next morning are back at work in the rehearsal hall. At 9 they go on camera and run through the show until 12:20 to get camera angles and solve light problems. From 12:20 to 12:50 the show is taped. "Then it starts all over again at 2 if I'm on the next day's show," he laughingly complained.

Running his fingers thoughtfully through his dark hair which he wears slightly long "not to prove anything, but because it just happens that I look terrible in short hair," Bua attempted to explain the popularity of the long-running serial, which he joined in June 1967.
