Company of Viet Civilians, Led by Berets, Halved by Foe

SAIGON (AP) — A company of 130 South Vietnamese civilians irregulars led by American Green Berets suffered more than 60 per cent casualties in heavy fighting six miles south of the Cambodian border, military spokesmen reported today.

Within hours after the fighting ended, five waves of U.S. B-52 bombers pounded North Vietnamese bases and staging areas along the border north of Saigon.

Earlier, four American observation helicopters were shot at in the area northwest of Saigon.

The helicopters returned the fire with machine guns and directed artillery onto the enemy positions. U.S. headquarters said 18 enemy soldiers were killed. No U.S. casualties were reported, and the helicopters returned to their bases.

American fighter-bombers and artillery came to the rescue of the ambushed company and South Vietnamese headquarters said in North Vietnamese border were found afterward.

The U.S. Command sent its biggest bombers against the bases along the border in an attempt to break up preparations for a new enemy campaign expected to start in November.

U.S. spokesmen said the first reconnaissance unit, North Vietnamese "katchi" base camps, were named a mile and a half and a half from the border. The target area stretched from 65 miles north-northwest of Saigon to 85 miles north of the capital.

Nixon: \$662 Million Needed for Super Plane

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon said today he will ask for \$662 million in the next five years to develop a supersonic transport aircraft.

The United States must go ahead with the plane, called the SST, "to maintain its leadership in the world aircraft industry," Nixon said.

"I want the United States to continue to lead the world in air transport," he declared at a White House briefing. "The SST is going to be built in this country."

Nixon noted his decision on the 1,800-mile-an-hour, 300-passenger aircraft in a news conference. He said the SST will be built in this country.

Opponents of the project have argued it is impractical, too expensive and too noisy.

Nixon said \$98 million this year in new funds from Congress in addition to \$66 million in unused carryover appropriations for the SST program.

This would raise the \$214 million in fiscal 1970 to \$312 million in fiscal 1971, then progressively to \$1.2 billion in fiscal 1972, \$1.8 billion in fiscal 1973 and \$1.9 billion in fiscal 1974.

To meet a major objection from some opponents, Secretary of Transportation John A. Volpe said the SST would not be allowed to fly over population areas until the noise factor comes within acceptable limits.

Volpe said government investment in the SST would total \$900 million of the approximately \$1.2 billion needed to build two prototype aircraft by 1972.

The first test flights are scheduled for late 1972, with commercial use expected by 1978.

In addition to the need for continued U.S. leadership in world aviation, Nixon said a further reason for going ahead with the SST was "to bring the world closer together in a physical sense and in time."

Referring to the SST as a "transportation miracle," Nixon said it would bring Tokyo as close to Washington in travel time as London is now.

Volpe listed further reasons for the administration's favorable decision on the SST—the need to protect the U.S. balance of payments, the great impact on industry, employment, the SST will provide and the necessity to compete with existing Russian, British, and French SST programs.

Mrs. Alex Bissett
Homemakers Service

A graduate of the first class of eight "Homemakers," employees of the Manchester Homemakers' Service, Irene Bissett wanted to do something in public service. How her wish has been answered is the key to happiness for many other people who have served in her nearly five years as a homemaker for this United Fund Agency.

"The most obvious quality about Mrs. Bissett is a concern and professionalism. Since the stated goal of the service is to try to keep families together," Mrs. Bissett is dedicated to this end, and she has been active in every kind of case which has presented itself to the agency. Clients approach the agency either in their own or through referrals from what Mrs. Louise Hurwitz, agency director, calls "the school team." This includes the school social work system, clergy, the Public Health Nursing Association or other concerned people, friends and family. The Homemakers' Service in turn refers people to valid agencies such as the Child Guidance Clinic, Payson to the Homemakers' Service is based on the client's ability to pay, and the deficit incurred is made up through grants from the United Fund. Homemakers are often called in to help a mother who has been mentally ill, after she has been hospitalized, for example, to retain her in caring for her family.

Mrs. Bissett comments that sometimes, although a woman has brought up several children, after a personal disaster of the kind, the care of a new baby terrifies her. As a teacher-homemaker, trained through the division of Vocational Education of the State Health Department, an agency worker can enter a home and literally retrain a mother in how to care for her family. This includes financial advice and budgeting, actual scheduling of household routine, and the kind of emotional support that a warm, concerned person can give.

Mrs. Bissett last year took an eight-day course at Norwich State Hospital in orientation to the mental patient which she feels helped her in understanding the fears and attitudes of a returning to a community. All clients who have been helped by Homemakers during difficult times in their lives. Mrs. Bissett's pride is her dog, a Boston bull terrier, adopted by her because the elderly people who owned the dog were going to have to take it into a hospital and a conflict at one time. The service was successful.

Ton Duc Replaces Ho Chi

MOROCCO (AP) - The North Vietnamese National Assembly has chosen Vice President Ton Duc Thang, 81, to succeed Ho Chi Minh as president.

The dispatch from Hanoi said the National Assembly pledged to devote all energies to the service of the homeland, people and the revolution.

Thang himself has been in failing health for several years and only a figurehead as vice president. He automatically became acting president on Ho's death Sept. 3. He was 79.

Thang was elected president of the Communist party's Central Committee; Thung Chinh, chairman of the National Assembly; Standing Committee, and Prime Minister Pham Van Dong generally were considered the most powerful men in Hanoi when Ho died.
