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Professor Tells Intricacies Of Executive Suite Power

NEW YORK (AP)—You see the statements in the newspapers from time to time: The corporation president suddenly announces his resignation "to pursue personal interests." Is it true? Maybe. But it could mean he was fired.

Outright firings are always messy affairs, especially when they involve high executives and are attended by heated emotions, charges and counter-charges and even law suits. Firings are considered crude to say the least.

Elaborate plans therefore are made to hide the true facts from the kibitzers—that growing population of stockholders, financial analysts, mutual funds and big stockholders. But the techniques are expensive.

After having spent two decades psychanalyzing the corporation, Dr. Eugene Janney, a university professor and professional kibitzer—he gets paid handsome fees for his services—corporations have detailed some techniques for firing the president. None of the techniques refers to any specific individual or firing, but the art was hidden in the background.

The first technique is back-rooming. The chairman gives the president the job of challenging the board. This technique is especially useful if the executive is hungry, meaning very eager to please. A hungry executive is insecure.

Eventually the job accumulates until he is incapable of handling them all. He makes a serious error. No matter that he handled 98 per cent of the jobs well; he failed on 2 per cent, and that's enough to nail him.

Sometimes a curious twist occurs in which the insecure president participates in his own demise. In his effort to please, he surrenders authority—sometimes even if he can't effectively use that authority.

Having taken on more than he can handle, he begins delegating, and eventually he delegates a job to what Janney calls the president's "intimate enemy," a subordinate and perhaps even envious of him.

The intimate enemy does just enough to escape scrutiny, but not enough to be effective. He is a presidential saboteur, but he has power. He has support from other executives. And power, which is how, defeats authority, which is assigned.

Realizing that things aren't going well, the president loses his cool and orders the intimate enemy: "Do things as I say or get out!" The powerful intimate enemy refuses. The matter goes to the chairman.

"I'm sorry Mr. President, but things haven't worked out as we expected," says the chairman, who prefers the loss of the president to the resignations of

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Dalai Lama: Tibet's Hope For Freedom Is It's Youth

DHARAMARALA, India (AP) — The Dalai Lama, leader of the Tibetan people, said today that the Dalai Lama's hope for Tibet's freedom lies in its youth.

"The Dalai Lama is now acting according to his impulses as he acts like the ancient emperors. What he says is the law. What he is doing now is just what he has done in the past," he said.

In an interview with The Associated Press at his mountain-top home of exile here in northern India, the Dalai Lama spoke of China's takeover of his country—Tibet—and his hopes for the future.

The Dalai Lama is not the retiring, ethereal one might expect. His large and expressive eyes behind blue-tinted glasses watch every move of his guest. His voice is a rich baritone that can explode in laughter or rise sharply as emotions pour from him while he talks of the country he fled in 1959.

He once thought well of Mao. "When I first met him in China, he seemed that he really had deep feelings for the people, for the poor people."

"But after the cultural revolution my attitude has changed. Now everything in China is in the hands of Mao and his wife."

"This is very bad. Unless...," he paused. "Unless things are being used...," he said.

"We have the right to struggle. Our struggle has a practical purpose."

"Tibet can even be a Communist state if that's what the majority of the people want. It doesn't matter what they choose as long as it is what the Tibetans are not satisfied under the rule of a foreign power. Tibet is a free country."

"Our struggle here is not for the Tibetans who have fled. It is for those still in Tibet. If those still in Tibet are satisfied with their life and the foreign rule, then it is senseless to struggle for them."

Chinese broadcasts from Lhasa have admitted that some fighting factions in Tibet are "in favor of fighting a civil war and of splitting up the revolutionary ranks."

"The broad-based declaration that despite Mao's order for all people to support the army some forces were still struggling at the People's Liberation Army units stationed in Tibet."

Refugees who fled Tibet report widespread fighting in provincial cities, but largely between rival Maoist factions.

Although the Dalai Lama declined to discuss it, it is known that his top aides make trips into the remote principality of Mustang in northern Nepal where rebel Tibetan tribesmen have a base. Strikes into Tibet by Khambas, tribesmen, from the Indian and American sides, have been conducted for years.

The Dalai Lama made no attempt to speculate when he returned to his native country. That he is young, and he is patient.

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Armed Services Regain Voice in Shaping of Budget

WASHINGTON (AP) — The armed services have regained a leading role in shaping the defense budget under a significant shift by Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird away from the practices of his Democratic predecessors.

Guidelines laid down by Laird and Deputy Secretary David Packard give back to the services the role of the military secretaries and the uniformed chiefs much of the budget responsibility they enjoyed before former Defense Chief Robert S. McNamara started gathering powers to himself and his staff more than eight years ago.

This means the young "white mice" in the Pentagon's systems analysis office are being downgraded still more, pushing them back in the decision-making process which they strongly influenced in the McNamara years.

The move is in line with Laird's policy of giving the individual services a greater and earlier say in planning.

However, some key elements of McNamara's budget reforms remain and Laird is not foreclosing ultimate authority. He and Packard will make the final Pentagon decisions on the Nixon administration's first defense budget which will be sent to Congress in January.

There are indications it will be relatively austere budget, possibly held to around \$70 billion. This would be about \$1 billion below the present cut-down version of the final Johnson administration defense budget.

Before McNamara took over in 1961 the individual armed services were allocated an amount of money and were left largely alone as to what they did with the funds.

When McNamara became defense secretary, he threw out that system and instituted a centralized procedure under which his systems analysis experts took the lead in determining overall requirements and how each service's forces and arms would fit into the total picture of U.S. military power. This was called a program package.

Thus, the number of Navy's Polaris submarines would be determined in relation to the Air Force's Minuteman missiles, and the missile force would be considered in relation to the bomber force.

In the general-purpose forces, Pentagon planners would fashion packages in which the Army's division, the Air Force's tactical fighters and the Navy's carriers all would be considered together with the task of achieving a balance to meet national commitments.

Also, instead of operating on a year-to-year basis, McNamara instituted a system of projecting ahead five years to facilitate unified long-range planning.

While restoring some of the powers of the individual services, Laird is not going all the way back to the original system, under which inter-service rivalries flourished.

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THE BIRTH OF A BLIMP



Columbia (left) and Mayflower are soon to welcome to public life a third sister, the new blimp "America."

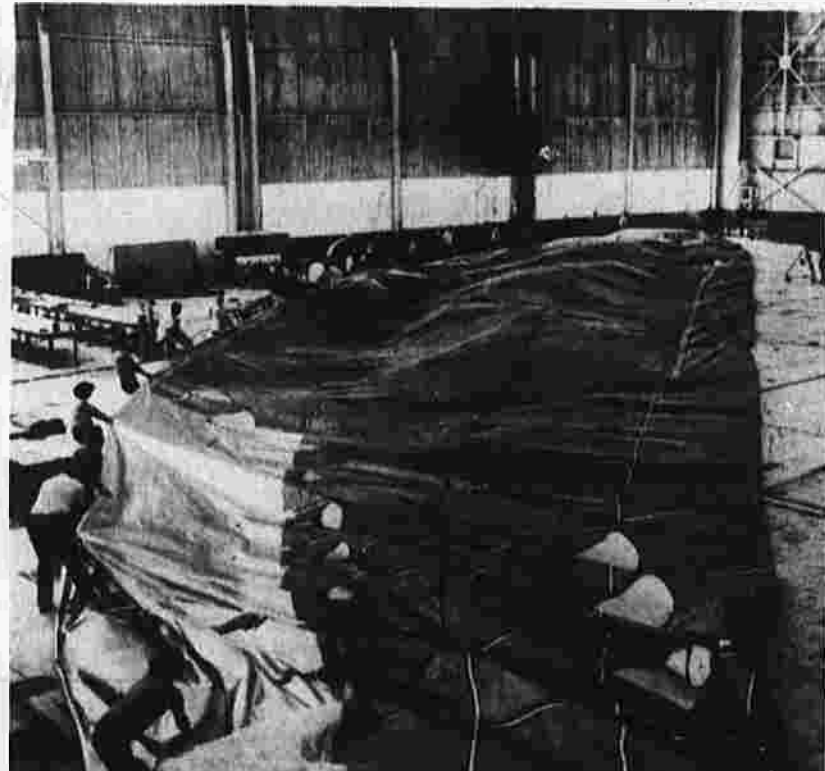
Three gentle giants of the air — the Goodyear airships — float their friendly greetings above America with less frenzy and a more disarming approach than many another form of public relations. They are the only "blimps" now operating in any part of the world. But gas-filled dirigibles have been flying for over a hundred years, longer than any winged aircraft. Goodyear has built 298 of these lighter-than-air craft since 1917, 53 for the company and the rest for the Army and Navy, who have now ceased airship operations.

The last-built of the present elephantine trio, the "America," completed in the summer of 1969, is part of an expansion and improvement program for the blimp fleet. The America's ponderously graceful sisters are the Mayflower, launched late last year, and the Columbia, soon to be replaced by a brand-new version. They are all named for winners of the America's Cup yacht race.

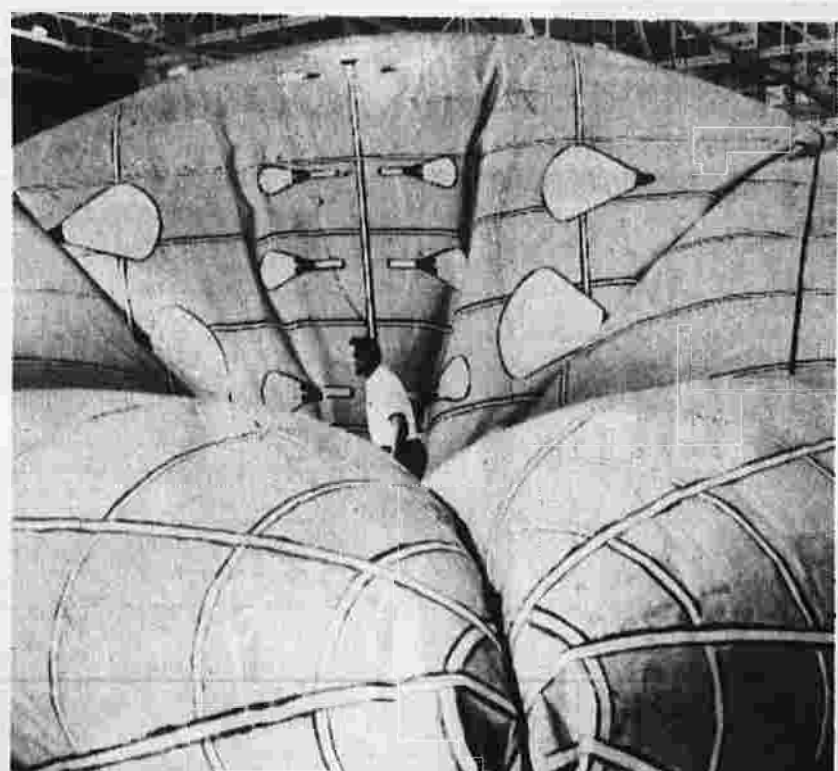
This Picture Show page tells the story of the building of the America — an over-sized sewing and blowing-up job. The new blimp is 192 feet long, 50 feet wide and 59½ feet high. Its envelope is made of neoprene-coated dacron, and is filled with 202,700 cubic feet of nonflammable helium.

The airships tour the United States from May to October (from November to April they are at their winter bases). By day they visit sports events, civic functions, great city parades, village shows, country fairs, company picnics, clambakes. Besides taking passengers up for short joyrides, a lot of flying time is spent in public service, helping government agencies research programs with survey work, for example.

By night, the "Skytaclars" panels of lights attached to the airships' ample sides sing in flashing color through the dark skies. The America's animated signs are composed of 7,560 computer-controlled bulbs in colored reflectors, connected by 80 miles of wiring. The night signs are used to support public service programs, such as United Fund drives and Savings Bond campaigns, as well as to present Goodyear messages.



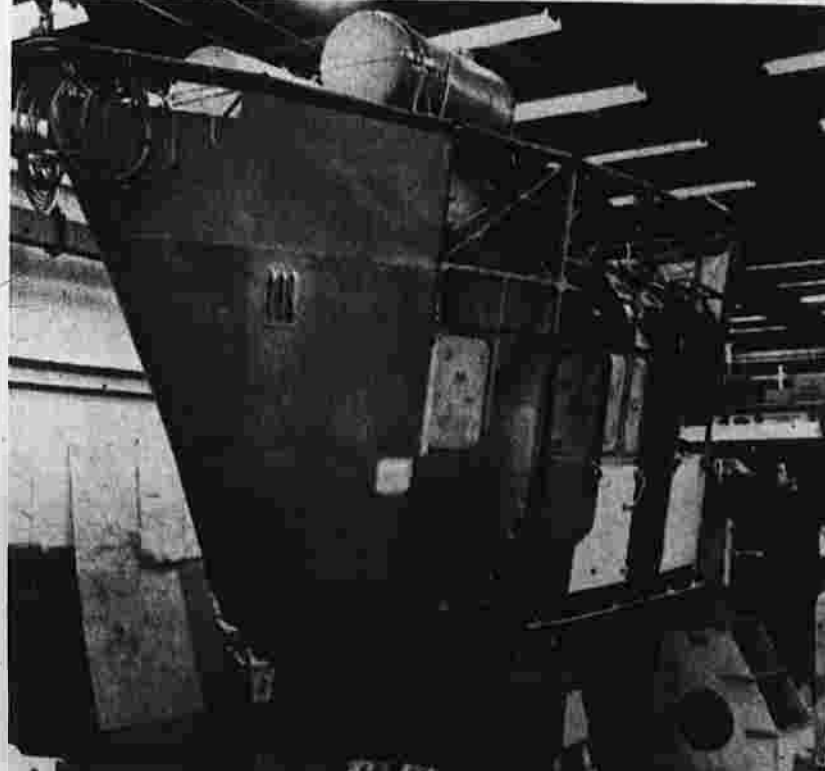
The America's envelope of neoprene-coated Dacron has been cut and stitched and is now ready for inflation.



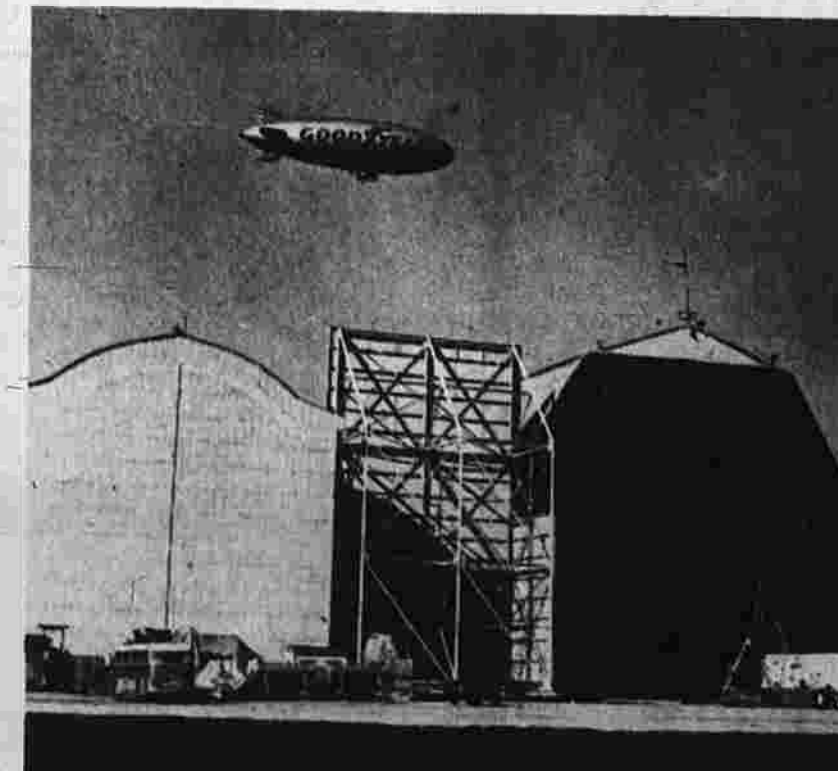
Partially inflated, like a giant pillow, the envelope bears markings showing where rudder and fins will be attached.

'Hot Line' Is Alive and Well And Helping Town's Elderly

Coventry's "Hot Line" is now active and taking calls again, after being closed for a while so that volunteers could have a summer vacation. The "Hot Line" is a service of the Junior Women's Club, set up by the Home Life Committee of that group. It was organized a year ago in order to provide a service for the elderly of the town. Since then, the services of the "Hot Line" have expanded to include anyone in Coventry.

The service provides volunteer transportation for doctors' appointments, clinics, shopping and so forth. It also tries to visit, cook, bathe, or run errands for the elderly, the sick, or shut-ins. The "Hot Line" is not an emergency service, however. These calls are referred to the police, fire or ambulance departments. "Hot Line" works in cooperation with the Public Health Nursing Association and the Winham Area Community Action Program.

Volunteers are always welcome to call and be listed in the "Hot Line" file. Among the volunteers are keepers, housewives and retired men. The "Hot Line" number is 742-6961.

Vets Exemptions
Veterans who are entitled to exemptions should have their discharges filed with the town clerk before Oct. 1. Under Public Act 201, any person now serving in the armed forces may also apply for exemptions through a notarized statement of a guardian, spouse, or legal representative.

This must be presented to the Town Clerk before the Oct. 1 assessment date. Assessor Samuel P. Allen also reminds residents that all personal property should be declared at the assessor's office before Nov. 1. This would include unregistered motor vehicles regardless of their condition, snowmobiles, boats, horses, cattle, sheep and truck-mounted trailers.

Any personal property not declared and found by the assessors will be added to the grand list and a penalty of 10 per cent of value added for failure to declare, Allen warned.

Town Plan Cost May Come From General Fund

The Board of Finance voted at a meeting last night that an additional \$5,000 for a town plan should be taken from the general fund, rather than promised in next year's budget. This means that at a town meeting to be scheduled as soon as the call can be drawn up, townspeople will be asked to appropriate \$5,000 for the plan, to be prepared by the firm of Brown, Donald and since then, including the additional \$5,000 for a town plan, as quoted at a meeting of the Planning Commission Monday night, will be \$10,000. There is already \$5,000 in this year's budget for a comprehensive plan, although when it was included the thought was that the amount represented the town's share in a federally financed program. dena of enemy-initiated action." The other incidents, the Command said, were minor, such as trail activity, moving lights at night, and new bunkers.

U.S. forces, in response to the indications of enemy presence or activity, have attacked positions (inside the zone 4,500 times since last Nov. 1, U.S. artillery, fighter-bombers and 7th Fleet warships all have participated in the attacks.

Elsewhere, U.S. Navy river boats ambushed enemy soldiers attempting to cross the Saigon River 55 miles northwest of Saigon for the third time in the past two nights. Headquarters said 14 Viet Cong were killed in the latest ambush, raising the total enemy killed in the three actions to 28. There have been no U.S. casualties.

In the same general area, 10 U.S. forces, in response to the indications of enemy presence or activity, have attacked positions (inside the zone 4,500 times since last Nov. 1, U.S. artillery, fighter-bombers and 7th Fleet warships all have participated in the attacks.

WASHINGTON (AP) — One of President Nixon's key political lieutenants has told a Republican stalwart in the heart of Texas of country the White House will reverse its field and support the 27 1/2 per cent oil depletion allowance.

Gorman Named President Of Penn Central

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Paul A. Gorman, who began his working life 40 years ago as a \$20-a-week clerk, will become head of the nation's largest railroad.

The directors of the Penn Central Co. announced Monday that the 61-year-old retired president of Western Electric Co. would succeed Alfred E. Perlman as president and chief administrative officer on Dec. 10.

Stuart T. Saunders, chairman of the Penn Central board, said Perlman, 67, would become vice chairman of the board of directors. Perlman has headed the company since the merger of the New York Central and Pennsylvania Railroads Feb. 1, 1968.

Gorman, a native of Carrollton, Mo., joined Western Electric after graduating from the University of Missouri in 1929. The soft-spoken executive advanced to president of New Jersey Bell, serving from 1962 to 1969, and vice president of American Telephone and Telegraph, 1969 to 1964.

In 1964 he became president of Western Electric and remained there until his retirement earlier this month. Field leaders "by virtue of his rich experience in practically every phase of management and as a top officer in one of the nation's largest corporations, Mr. Gorman will bring to Penn Central many new viewpoints and concepts, particularly in the areas of control, budgeting, computer technology, personnel and public relations."

Perlman has been a railroad man since 1923 when he started his career as a field construction foreman for the Northern Pacific.

In 1966, he joined the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy Railroad as an assistant engineer, and went to the Denver & Rio Grande as an engineer a year later.

Perlman was president of the New York Central from 1964 until the merger. The Penn Central Co. has total assets of about \$8.5 billion. It had consolidated net earnings last year of \$2.1 million, although the railroad operation lost \$2.8 million.

Revolution Brewing In Truck Tire World

TAMARAC, Ill. (AP) — Ever try to mount a tire that's eight feet high on the rim of a 260-ton truck?

R.W. Malinski says he can do it in 15 minutes. The tire-service operator in this town of 700 said mounting such large tires normally takes five men with hand tools 20 minutes of hard labor.

He decided a special machine was needed for the job, but officials of a major tire company and a maker of large earth-moving equipment told him it couldn't be done.

Malinski said he spent about five years and \$20,000 of his own money to invent a hydraulic tire mounter. He went a step further by designing a one-piece rim to replace the heavier steel-type used by coal and earth-moving trucks.

All of which led five executives of the tire firm to visit Malinski recently and view the invention. One told Malinski he was impressed; another said it "would revolutionize the large truck tire industry."

Major Crimes Increase In State's Cities. WASHINGTON (AP) — Most — but not all — categories of major crimes showed increases in Connecticut in the first half of 1969, compared to the first six months of 1968, according to a report by the Bureau of Investigation. Among the increases were: forcible rapes, up from 11 to 15 in Hartford, 9 to 8 in Bridgeport, and 23 to 27 in New Haven; robberies up from 133 to 203 in Hartford, 98 to 173 in Bridgeport and 48 to 61 in New Haven; aggravated assaults up from 188 to 243 in Hartford, 97 to 77 in Bridgeport and 168 to 188 in New Haven; and auto thefts up from 1,066 to 1,176 in Hartford, 571 to 609 in Bridgeport and 941 to 1,078 in New Haven. Because of the differences in crime reporting, the FBI, which released the crime statistics Monday, cautioned against city-by-city comparisons. In other categories, Connecticut's three largest cities reported the following: Murders and non-negligent manslaughter — Hartford down from 8 to 7, Bridgeport down from 8 to 4, New Haven both years. Burglaries or breaking-and-enterings — Hartford down from 1,738 to 1,575, Bridgeport up from 843 to 1,120, New Haven down from 1,494 to 1,488. Larcenies of \$50 and more — Hartford down from 818 to 788, Bridgeport up from 618 to 1,200, New Haven up from 585 to 699. NEW YORK (AP)—The man in the space age suit will not be an astronaut; he just might be your banker or your broker. If Ruben Torres has anything to say about his wardrobe.

The Texas-born, Paris fashion-bred designer wants to put men's clothes into the space age. His austere, close fitting, no nonsense suits—no ties, no buttons, no lapels—are designed to be worn in sports cars and business offices. Torres' suits jacketed, short-sleeved, come in a variety of colors from pale blue to crumpled strawberry.

"I'm considered the most way out of all designers, but it's about time someone started designing for the future instead of producing suits that recreate the past," says the slim, 38-year-old Torres. On his white turtleneck Torres was wearing a gold Olympic medal given to him by the Mexican government in appreciation for his design concept during the summer Olympics.

Torres has not worn a tie for three years, an act of fashion daring that has kept him out of old restaurants like New York's Cole Shoppes. He criticizes American men for building their whole life around their ties.

Torres finds traditional formal wear tedious boring. "Men look so much more handsome in purple," he says.

One of Torres' innovations is the helmet meant to replace the felt hat. The shock-resistant, fibrous helmet should be worn while driving. Torres says he definitely left in the car before that dinner date.

Torres acknowledges that some men feel that if they wear something different, they'll be called effeminate. "But that's not true," he argues. "When the French government asked me to dress the French ski team at Grenoble in 1968, to me this was unsolicited proof that my clothing has passed the test of masculinity."

Ruben Torres' suits, a selection of six different styles selling for less than \$100, will be available at Hart Schaffner and Marx stores this fall.

Capital City Crime Rate Rises 9% Since Jan. 1

WASHINGTON (AP)—Crime in the nation rose 9 per cent overall during the first half of 1969, the smallest increase during a six-month period in two years, reports FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover.

The nation's crime rate jumped 17 per cent during the corresponding period of 1968, due primarily to "an unusually large number of property crimes," Hoover said.

But the smaller increase in property crime—larceny, auto theft and burglary—during 1969 is partially offset by a 15 per cent increase in the more serious violent crimes such as robbery, rape, assault and murder, he added.

In that category, Hoover said, robberies jumped 37 per cent over the first half of 1968, rapes were up 18 per cent, aggravated assaults increased 10 per cent and murders were up 8 per cent.

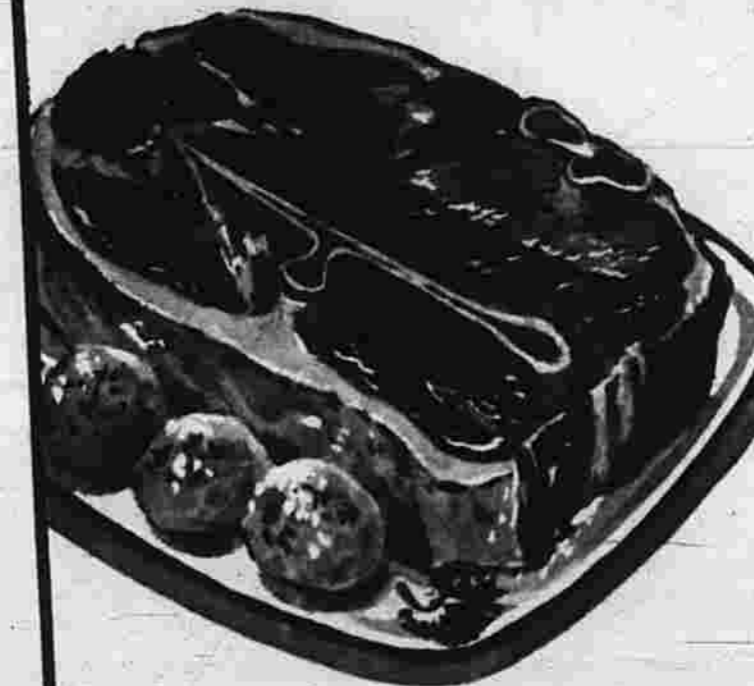

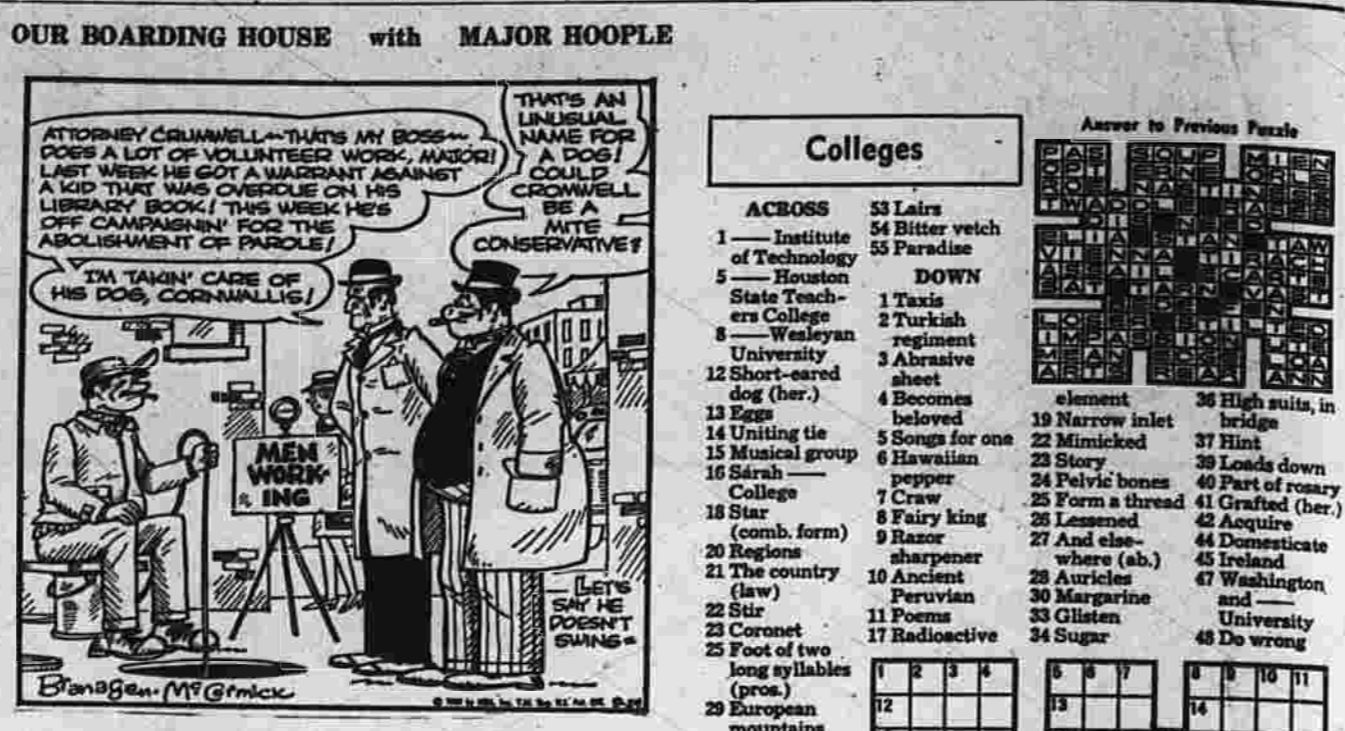

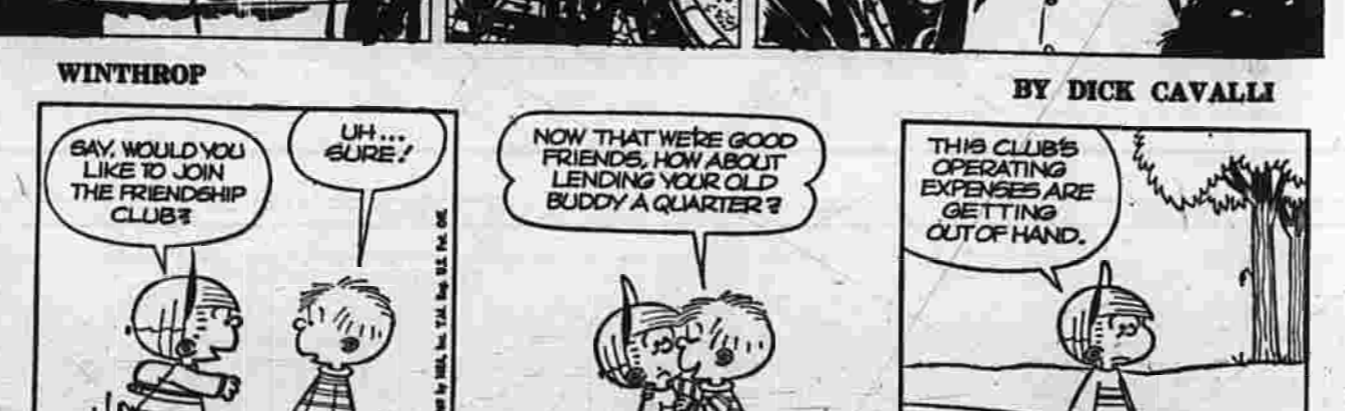

Capital Query: Was U.S. Invited To Join Viet War?

WASHINGTON — The Nixon Administration has searched the records in vain for evidence that South Vietnam made any formal request for U.S. troops before the first American battalions reached there in March, 1965.

Administration officials spent nearly four months examining and mulling over, and to an inquiry from Sen. J. William Fulbright (D-Ark.) about that surprising omission.

It is shocking to realize that Congress was not asked for specific authority for the sending of American soldiers to South Vietnam and, indeed, Vietnam had not made a written, formal request for U.S. troops.

Lodge Calls on Hanoi To Reciprocate Pullout

Lodge said President Nixon's order to pull 50,000 U.S. soldiers by mid-December "constitutes a significant step," and should be taken seriously.

He told the North Vietnamese and Viet Cong at the 28th session of the Paris peace talks, "The overriding fact represented by the removal of these forces is that the trend of our force strength is decisively down."

"Your side knows this," he added. "Your side should take it seriously rather than dismiss it as a meaningless arithmetic juggling or by slighting phrases."

Major portions of non-Vietnamese allied troops could be withdrawn in a year, he said, and the rest could be replaced in base areas until an agreement is reached with the United States.
