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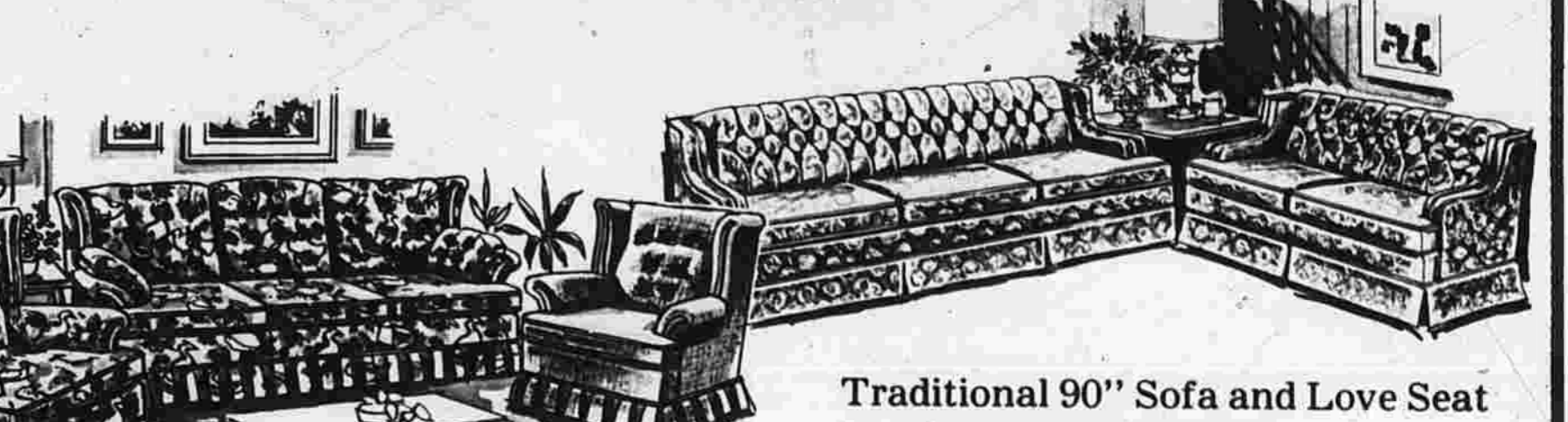

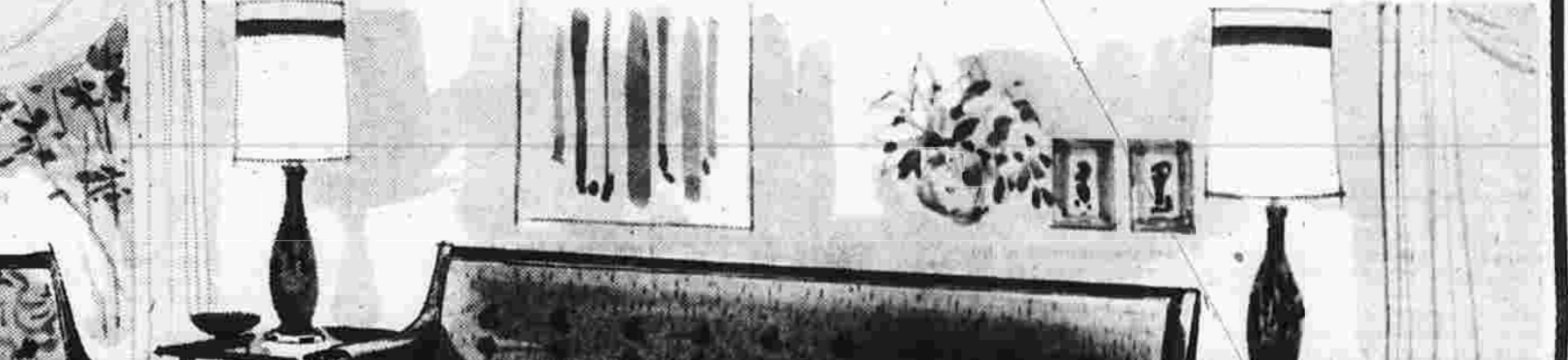

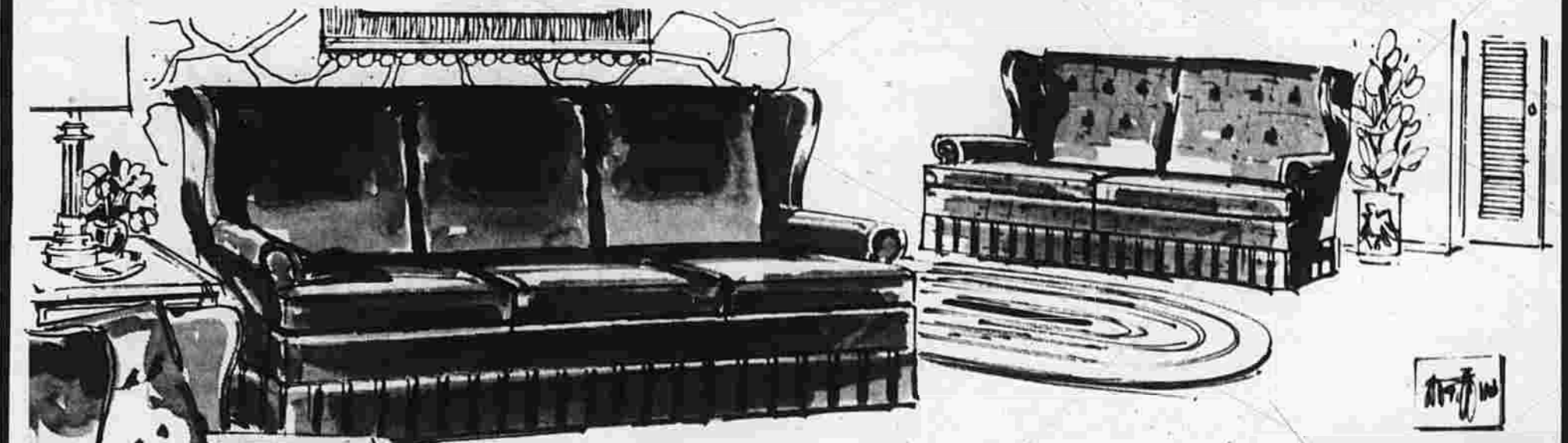

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The War Which Spills Its Guts: The one thing which has distinguished the war in Vietnam from all previous wars is, as we have observed many times already, the extent to which this war keeps stripping its naked front in the whole world.

There are several explanations for this. It is an undeclared war, which means that the civilian authority over the military has hesitated to let the military impose the kind of censorship which would be normal.

Of all the instances in which this war has denied itself before the public gaze is the burning of the villages, the shooting of the captives, the guising of the natives down below - none has been more blatant than the case of the Green Berets.

Perhaps its extraordinary hold on the public concern and imagination has resulted from the fact that, unlike other plot blank revelations in this war, the case of the Green Berets has been a strip tease kind of performance from the very beginning.

For many months it has threatened and promised to disclose secret parts of our war performance never before unveiled; now, without ever dropping the final garments, it has vanished behind the sudden fall of a total curtain; the grotesque imitation of the public imagination lingers on; the management of the performance has ended and will not resume.

This means that, after an incredible amount of disclosure and allegation, the transparency of the taking of a man's life are not going to be officially investigated and determined after all. Once it was being alleged that a crime had been committed. Now there is going to be no determination of whether anybody was guilty or innocent. There is to be no justice for the man killed; no justice, either, for those once accused of the killing. The one is dead; the others have been denied a clear verdict.

Once again, it is the particular character of this war which is the one thing which emerges clearly. This sort of cloak and dagger stuff has happened in many previous wars. Only this war insists on regurgitating its own most lurid privacies into the public view. Perhaps, as we sometimes think, the experience drivers feel amid all war and make the world sick of all war. Or perhaps the cult of ruthless violence and brutality it reveals is to be the wave of our future and bring itself back home into our other troubles, until we wonder whatever has become of that amateurish many-many staff we used to call violence on television.

Lindsay's Hecklers: In the course of his campaign tour of the city, Mayor John Lindsay has encountered vicious heckling from self-appointed representatives of just about every ethnic group in the city.

Each of these ethnic hecklers has accused Mayor Lindsay of having betray-

ed one group in favor of another. In the course of his touring he inevitably finds himself accused of being both for and against every kind of "hat" and "color" and of being a "liar."

If all this heckling is a valid sign of the mood of New York City, the arithmetic it makes is plain enough. New York is a city of pronounced ethnic groups. Mayor Lindsay has incurred the enmity and suspicion of all these groups.

In such a situation, in face of such a prospect, the only immediate recourse for Americans who want still to believe in America is to act of faith.

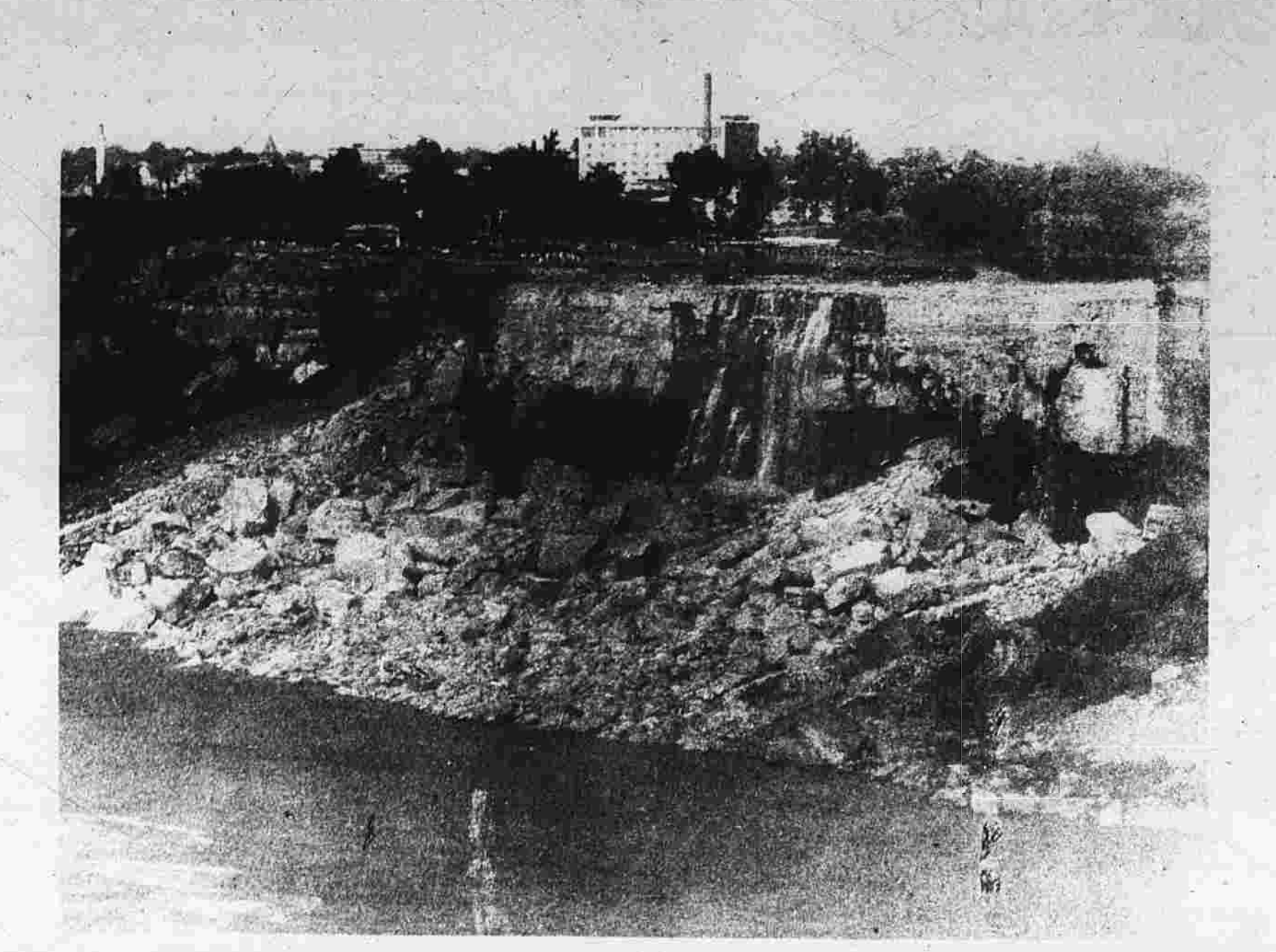

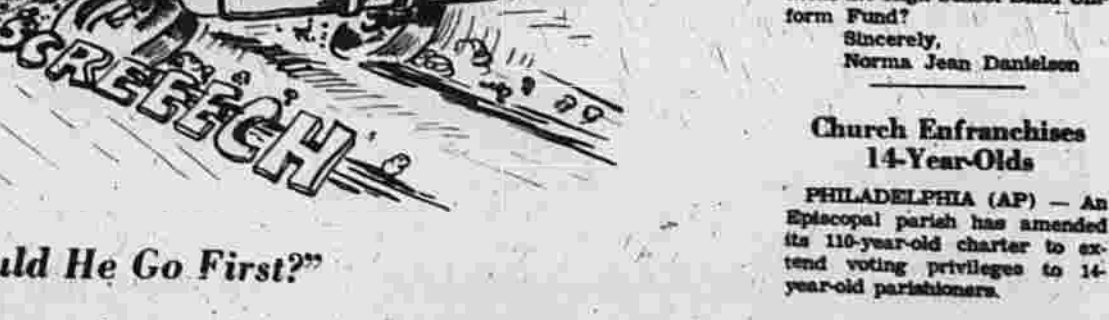

Volpe Gains Respect As Effective Operator

WASHINGTON (AP) — While some Cabinet secretaries are polishing public images as administrators, John Volpe is gaining respect in the White House and on Capitol Hill as an effective inside operator.

His name as a Cabinet member who has gotten more programs approved by the White House and over some pretty tough opposition, too," says one knowledgeable administration official.

As Others See Us

LONDON (AP) — After a tour through Pennsylvania and some southern states, the Washington correspondent for Pravda, the Soviet Communist party newspaper, said the strong criticism of the Pentagon in Congress is "merely an echo of the general discontent of the voters."

Correspondent Boris Steinhilber wrote: "Standing by the grave of Martin Luther King in Atlanta, a chance Negro questioner said 'the black man's problem is like a football which one administration throws to another. They tell us wait, we need money for the ARVN system.'"

"It seems to me that most people I spoke with did not take the anti-Soviet bait of the Pentagon leaders scolding the Americans with the 'Soviet threat.' On the contrary many said that the best way to security is in developing peaceful relations with the Soviet Union."

Another Soviet journalist, writing in Literaturnyaya Gazeta, described the United States after the summer vacation period:

"This evening, just as two or three months ago, the unchanged Walter Cronkite tells his television audience what happened during the day, War in Vietnam, Racialism, Crime. These things have not decreased over the summer—the quietest summer in the past three years."

The literature returns article said a commercial on the news broadcast showed how a headache pill was responsible for setting a prison riot and then observed, "If only all the problems, epidemics and catastrophes of America could be solved in such a simple and rapid manner."

Other comment about American abroad this week concerned the war in Vietnam and President Nixon's decision to go ahead with the supersecret transport plan.

The London Daily Telegraph said Nixon's policy of small concessions to the North Vietnamese and Viet Cong and other student and labor groups at home "has increased the pressure he is attempting to relieve."

"The Communists and the students become more intransigent," the Telegraph continued. "At the same time Nixon's strategy demands considerable American forces remaining in Vietnam for some considerable time meaning continuing casualties."

"What must seem remarkable is that there have been no voices raised in America demanding that unless the Communists agree to talk business the Americans should occupy towns in North Vietnam. The North Vietnamese have always said they intended to beat the Americans because of growing help from the Soviet Union. The Japanese newspaper Asahi Shimbun said the withdrawal of U.S. troops from Vietnam Thursday and Friday, and from the settlement of the South must be integrated politically." Asahi Shimbun said.

TWA Ordered to Follow Boeing's Safety Measure

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Aviation Administration has ordered Trans World Airlines to revise its operating instructions for a crucial safety measure on the Boeing 707, one of the nation's most widely used commercial jet airplanes.

The revision followed a disagreement between FAA officials and the National Transportation Safety Board, over the NTSB's report on the crash last July of a 707 in which five crew members died.

The two federal agencies still are at odds over mechanical revisions of the 707's hydraulic pressure warning system, which was determined by the NTSB to be a factor in the crash July 26 of a TWA 707 during a simulated engine failure exercise.

The differences between the FAA and the NTSB are set out in a series of letters between the agencies dating from late July to early this month.

The safety board, in its report on the accident, pointed out that TWA operating procedures for coping with loss of hydraulic power during an engine failure differed substantially from those recommended by the jet's manufacturer.

The FAA had approved for pilot use both a TWA operating manual containing one procedure and a Boeing manual containing the other, the safety board said.

The flight agency, however, issued a bulletin July 29 to all airlines warning of "poor" hotel accommodations and travel facilities and the high cost of reaching India.

Two days later the safety board wrote to FAA Administrator John H. Basher recommending an immediate review of TWA emergency procedures. It also called for modification of the warning light system.

Basher replied a week later that the FAA was "at a loss to understand what constructive purpose is served by your recommending to us an action which your staff is aware we have already taken."

But Safety Board Chairman John H. Reed wrote back Aug. 29 the NTSB was concerned with a matter not covered by the FAA's bulletin—the differences in the two FAA-approved manuals.

Reed said the TWA operations manual called for turning off all hydraulic systems in the event

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fluid loss while the Boeing manual recommended turning off pumps only on the affected systems.

The amber light now used in 707s to warn of low hydraulic pressure when switches are on is replaced by a red light when the pressure loss becomes critical.

"We believe the... red warning light is the more meaningful indicator and its operation is independent of any switch position," Thomas wrote.

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20 Years in Retrospect: Failures Outnumber Gains in Red China

Twenty years old today, the Chinese People's Republic is the result of a revolution that swept the whole world, full of defiance, down at the heels and unhappy inmates.

Measuring achievements against the lack of them, historians are likely to judge the Communist regime in its first two decades as a monumental failure of modern times; even though it has brought the enormous, overpopulated land to the point where its cracks in the arsenal make it a contender for major power status.

National Day celebrations opened to an ominous overture: what was probably China's 10th nuclear weapons test in five years. This is an achievement in terms of world power politics, but it is of doubtful value to a nation of 700 million or more that is decidedly poor.

There have been other achievements. In oil, for example, China was an importer before the revolution. Now her teaching oil fields supply more than half her needs. She has made some progress in industrialization, but so swollen is her population that most of her steel is engaged in raising food, and still the population growth outpaces production. The regime can claim to have kept the nation together as it never had been held together in the past, but at a high cost.

The failures are more pronounced. From the start of the first five years of "people's republic," China retrogressed to a state of internal political and economic chaos.

On Oct. 1, 1949, the victorious Mao Tse-tung's forces from the mainland gained with momentum. He had been the leader of Heavenly Peace in Peking and promised a bright future for his people. Mao's "Great Leap Forward" would guarantee freedom of thought, speech, press, assembly and a basic right to all "the people."

"There is a hitch in Communist promises," "The people's republic language means those who conform to party discipline all the rest of the world in the Communist movement will be the dealers. WASHINGTON (AP)—A Senate witness named the Army's former top noncommissioned officer today as one of a group he said was suspected of taking thousands of dollars from slot machine receipts at Army recreational clubs in Massachusetts.

Ervin E. Veard, a former investigator for the Army's criminal division, referred to Sgt. Maj. William O. Woodrige, the first man ever named as Army sergeant-major.

Veard said thefts from the slot machines in the clubs of the 24th Infantry Division at Augsburg, Germany, may have totaled as much as \$100,000.

"I found that the highly intelligent of high ranking noncommissioned officers dominated and controlled the operations of the club's mess system of the 24th Infantry Division," Veard said.

"My investigation convinced me, although hard evidence sufficient for prosecution was lacking, that these men were engaged in a criminal conspiracy which involved systematic larceny of nonappropriated funds, property and assets of the club's system for their own benefit and enrichment."

"I know that Sgt. Maj. William O. Woodrige, division sergeant-major of the 24th, was a leader in the criminal organization."

He testified before the Senate permanent investigations subcommittee whose acting chairman, Sen. Abraham A. Ribicoff, D-Conn., announced the scope of the hearings is being broadened.

Ribicoff said the hearings will deal also with charges of illegal traffic in weapons and munitions, a huge illegal currency manipulation scheme and the use of military police as a force of intimidation in the club operations, and the Army's former provost marshal general, retired Maj. 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China Watcher Remembers First Years of Revolution

LONDON—The Chinese Communist keep Oct. 1 as their feast day. Only the faithful are allowed to attend this vast public triumph.

In a manner they have reverted to ancient ways. They are still austerely simple and austere. They are not merely suspicious of foreigners—they once again despise them. Once again, they alone of nations are content to live alone. There is nothing new in these things.

Yet only 20 years ago in this full-scale civil war in China, in which the armies of the Kuomintang, led by Chiang Kai-shek, were being forced back and back, being herded rather than fought out of China.

Chiang's was the government that had fought the Japanese as a partner of the west, and now in exile in Formosa, it still has the veto in the United Nations Security Council to prove it.

Twenty years ago the Communists were a puritanical army unique to the far east—that on the march, an engine that no one guessed quite right and a revolution that had no logistical reason for winning.

But up to 20 years ago you could drift into China and find almost anything you sought. For the aesthetic and upper class intellectuals who took villa in the hills above Peking or hired a temple for their pleasures and lived with the smell of incense coming through the glassless windows. It was the most unloving place in the world. People who knew it then never forget it. It had the quality of exquisite excitement that no longer anywhere exists.

This was when you could buy bales of fantastic silk in Nanking or tang figures or jade animals in Peking and spend the afternoon in a dark shop what was like the sacristy of an ancient church, where the sacristan was prepared to fog the lot.

A British consulate then rattled around in its great compound in Peking. In Shanghai, there was another that was a small park in the very center of the city. Put together, it was as if the French had Buckingham Palace in London for their business. In fact, the embassy was a small but lovely pillared house in Nanking where the policemen were 18th century, the martinis perfect, the conversation largely about the purchase of Chinese antiques, and the No. 1 boy (major domo to you) was asked for cooling his feet in the ice box.

It was a place where Protestant missionaries exactly and heroically reproduced the middle-class life of their home towns, ignoring the screams, shouts, cracks, goings and smells that obscured as they heard their children's prayers. They were not luxurious. The Catholics lived more self-conscious lives, conscious that this was a country they might just have had for their own if

when the "Amethyst" had to fight its way down from the capital to the sea under the American guns the communists, captured from the nationalists. This is when the "Conservators" the "London," the "Black Swan," all British ships, found themselves under orders in Peking and sitting with fastidious respectability in the Italian Jesuits, all bearded and all dead now.

There were the White Russians who seemed the most loathsome people in the world. There was a restaurant where we feasted boryng on beef stroganoff and unidentified wine to a back ground of lions and the inevitable mother swathed in black who bent over a stove munching her pears. It really was like that—the past that did not matter—and I suppose it was all gone. It means a deal less of privileged pleasure.

The countryside was the most exquisite manufactured in the world. In the sculptured rice fields, each lump of mud, each clod of manure seemed to have been set in place by a delicate and fastidious hand. There were temples as commanding as English church towers, and on the rim of razorbacked hills unique to the far east—that of a fringe of elegant trees silhouetted against the sky.

This was 20 years ago and one never knew, could never know what it was like for the Chinese, those were the people who laughed when they were told the death of their son. Their old public buildings—charmingly in the center of the city—were still in the 18th century manner. The temples of heart, where the emperor had once sacrificed in the name of the whole nation, was a picturesque wasteland and indeed Peking was no longer the capital.

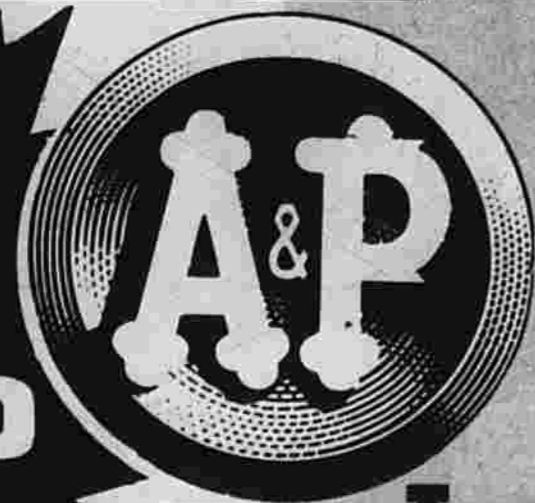

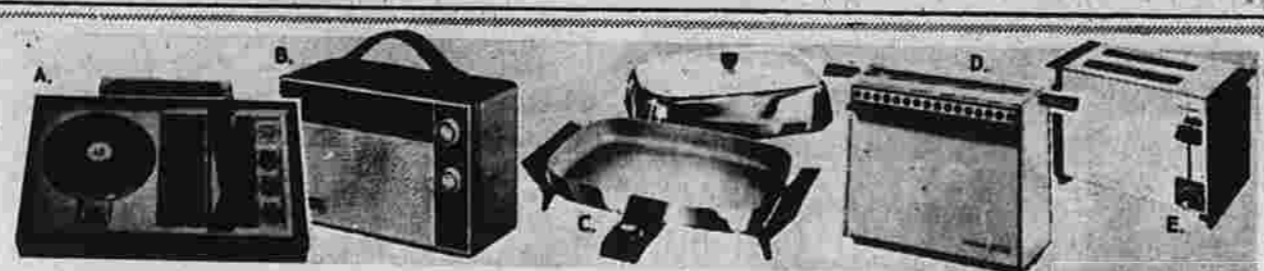

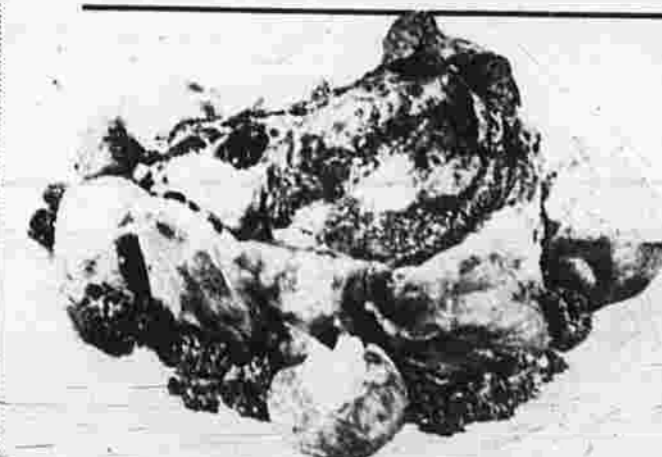

A U.S. military officer said a claim filed by the woman in August is now being considered by the Army office in Saigon. He added U.S. authorities did not know if her husband was a vital element of the Green Beret cause.

The case now is apparently legally closed, since Secretary of State Stanley Rogers last week dropped charges against eight Green Berets accused in the case.

School Aid Plan Offered in Michigan

LANSING, Mich. (AP) — Gov. William G. Milliken has unveiled a sweeping plan to revamp Michigan's school system, including a statewide property tax to eliminate the traditional district taxation.

Milliken also proposed state aid to parochial schools Tuesday in announcing the results of a five-month study by his commission on educational reform.

The state legislature begins a "social action" next Monday to consider Milliken's proposals.

"Under the present system," Milliken said, "some districts are limited to less than \$700 a year on the education of each child, while others receive more than \$1,000."

Michigan's school districts are the largest source of state revenue. They are expected to receive a minimum tax for them to qualify for state aid.

As an example, the North Branch school system in northern Michigan had no income tax until mid-September when it received the necessary tax.

Milliken recommended a constitutional amendment to lower the ceiling on local property taxes as a balance to the proposed state property tax.

Regarding aid to private and parochial schools, Milliken said: "Many nongovernmental schools are in deep financial trouble. Many of them have closed and many more are destined to close unless they are helped."

His commission recommended that the legislature pay half of the salaries of lay teachers of secular subjects in private and parochial schools.

Another proposed constitutional amendment would abolish the eight-member state Board of Education, now elected by partisan groups.

In its place, Milliken's commission has proposed a state department of education, appointed by the governor and confirmed by the Senate.

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Ruling Clears PR Firm on Lobby Charge

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — The state attorney general has ruled that a public relations firm is not a lobbyist and may not lobby on General Assembly passage of a bill allowing state aid to parochial schools.
