### CATER TO COMPANY LET ROAST BEEF REIGN!

Spurred by the bustle of autumn activity, many homemakers put on their hostess "hats" and schedule one or more special company dinners. Plans to satisfy eye and appetite come next. No need for concern; it's a challenge easily met.

Let regal roast beef reign at a table that captures the bright hues of fall foliage. Juicy, tender and inviting, it is right for any group. In fact, a recent survey reveals roast beef to be the top menu choice for special guests. A majority of the homemakers interviewed expressed confidence in serving roast beef when they did not know guests' preferences.

Add autumn glamour with a hot cling peach sauce and a tiered golden crown salad jeweled with glistening fruit cocktail and set on a ruff of lettuce. Hot or chilled, these popular and convenient canned fruits add fine flavor to dinner menus. Complete the main course with baked potatoes, a green vegetable such as Brussels sprouts or broccoli and hot rolls.

With this menu, the range and the refrigerator will free the cook for hosting. Roast beef competes with convenience foods when it comes to ease of preparation. A roast requires a minimum of the cook's time as the oven does the work. When it's a boneless sirloin tip, the carver's job is easy too. Select high quality sirloin tip for roasting. It is most tender when cooked only to rare or medium and carved in thin slices.

#### Beef Sirloin Tip Roast

Season 4 to 6 pound beef sirloin tip roast with salt and pepper. Place the roast, fat side up, on a rack in an open roasting pan. Insert roast meat thermometer so bulb is centered in the center of the thickest part, being sure the bulb does not rest in fat. Do not add water. Do not cover. Roast in a slow oven (325°F.) until the roast meat thermometer registers a temperature of 140°F. to 160°F., depending upon the degree of doneness desired. Allow roast to "set" for 20 minutes for easy carving. Internal temperature may rise 5° or more during this time.

To estimate how long it will take the roast to cook, the homemaker should allow 30 to 35 minutes per pound for roasting beef sirloin tip, depending on size of roast as well as degree of doneness desired.

#### Hot Ruby Cling Peach Sauce

1 can (1 pound) cling peach slices 1 tablespoon cornstarch  
1/4 cup catsup 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon  
2 teaspoons lemon juice 1/8 teaspoon ground cloves  
2 tablespoons sugar 1/4 teaspoon salt

Drain peaches; reserve juice and combine with catsup and lemon juice. Mix sugar with remaining ingredients. Gradually add juice mixture and cook, stirring constantly until thickened. Add peach slices. Cook over low heat until just heated through. Yield: 2 cups sauce.

#### Golden Crown Fruit Cocktail Salad

3 packages (3 ounces each) lemon flavored gelatin 1 cup dairy sour cream  
1 can (1 pound 14 ounces) fruit cocktail, drained 1 can (1 pound 14 ounces) fruit cocktail, drained  
2 1/2 cups boiling water 1/2 cup chopped pecans  
1 can (12 ounces) ginger ale

Combine lemon flavor gelatin with boiling water and stir until dissolved. Stir in ginger ale. Gradually blend 3 cups hot gelatin mixture with sour cream. Chill both gelatin mixtures. When clear gelatin is partially congealed, fold in 1 1/4 cups drained fruit cocktail and pour into lightly oiled mold (11 1/2 quart). Chill. When sour cream gelatin mixture is partially congealed, fold in chopped nuts and remaining fruit cocktail. Pour into mold on top of first layer. Chill until firm (about 6 hours). Yield: 12 servings.

1 1/2 teaspoons salt 6 tablespoons chutney  
1/4 teaspoon garlic salt

Combine salad oil, lemon juice, salt, garlic salt and pepper. Pour over beef cubes and marinate for several hours or overnight. Place alternately on 4 12-inch skewers: marinated beef cubes, mushroom halves and stuffed green olives. Broil 3 inches from heat, brushing with marinade and turning to brown all sides of meat. Broil to desired degree of doneness, 18 to 23 minutes total time. Place peach halves, cut side up, in baking dish. Spoon 1 tablespoon chutney in center of each half. Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) for 10 to 15 minutes. Serve kabobs on herb rice; garnish with chutney cling peaches, 4 to 6 servings.

#### Fruit Cocktail Puddin' Cake with Sauce

1 package (1 pound 2 1/2 ounce) white cake mix 1/2 cup butter or margarine  
1 can (1 pound 14 ounce) fruit cocktail 2/3 cup confectioners' sugar  
3/4 cup water 1/4 teaspoon vanilla  
2 eggs, separated 1/4 teaspoon almond extract

Preheat oven to 350°F. Drain fruit cocktail, reserving juice. Measure 1 1/3 cups fruit into baking dish and heat in oven 10 minutes. Combine cake mix, 1/4 cup reserved fruit juice, water and egg whites in large mixer bowl. Beat with electric mixer at medium speed for 3 to 4 minutes. Grease and flour rectangular utility pan (8" x 12" or 9" x 13"). Pour cake batter in pan and spoon hot fruit evenly over top. Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 40 to 50 minutes or until done. Melt butter or margarine in heavy saucepan. Blend sugar and confectioners' sugar in until dissolved. Gradually add 1 cup fruit juice and cook, stirring constantly until thickened. Beat egg yolks and stir small amount hot sauce into them. Add egg mixture, almond extract, vanilla and remaining fruit to sauce. Heat and serve over cake. Yield: 8 to 12 servings.

### Bayh Says Ted Anxious To Tell All

BOSTON (AP) — Sen. Birch Bayh, D-Ind., a close personal and political friend of Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, said Wednesday that the Massachusetts Democrat is anxious to tell all he knows about the July 18 accident on Chappaquiddick Island, the Boston Record American reported.

"I think the matter has to be cleared up completely," Bayh told reporters from the newspaper's Washington bureau.

The story published today quoted Bayh as saying, "I think he'll do this. I think Ted wants to make available all the information."

Mary Jo Kopechne, 28, a Washington secretary, died when a car driven by Kennedy plunged off Dyke Bridge on the island.

The Indiana senator said the fatal accident hurt Kennedy politically but added that it was still "too early to tell" how badly.

"Some polls say he's completely through," Bayh said. "My judgment is that this is not completely true. He has a tremendous hold on young people — it amounts almost to worship — and young people are prone to forgive and forget."

Apparently attempting to explain the nine-hour delay between the time of the accident and the time Kennedy reported it to police, Bayh cited a personal experience. The Record American said, when Bayh was involved in a multi-car accident, he had thought that for 24 hours he had thought that he was responsible for someone's death.

It was only after he visited the home of the deceased relative to offer sympathy that he learned another driver was responsible, Bayh said.

In 1961, when Kennedy broke his back in the crash of a light plane in Southampton, Mass., Bayh pulled Kennedy from the wreckage.

### Yale To Publish Manuscript Of Magellan Trip

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — The first English translation of Antonio Pigafetta's account of the first voyage around the world is being published by Yale University, together with a facsimile of the manuscript.

Written nearly 450 years ago, Pigafetta's account of the voyage of Ferdinand Magellan includes the appraisal of the journey "I believe that no man undertake such a journey."

The manuscript, in French, is one of only four in existence. Pigafetta was one of 18 survivors of the first circumnavigation of the globe. Not even Magellan survived. He was slain in the Philippines in 1521 and the voyage was completed by other members of the expedition.

Pigafetta's account of the voyage also includes an explicit description of the death of Magellan at the hands of inhabitants of the island of Mactan.

### U.S. Command Denies Censorship Charges

BAIDOO (AP) — The U.S. command denied today it is investigating charges that the Armed Forces Radio and Television network is censoring war news for American troops in Vietnam.

The command said a cable to a Ohio congressman from the was making a "comprehensive review" of the situation of a soldier formerly on the network's news staff, not of the soldier's censorship charge.

Rep. Chalmers P. Wylie, R-Ohio, said Wednesday in Washington the cable was a reply to his query about Spec. 3 Michael Maxwell of Columbus, Ohio, who asked to be transferred from the network's news staff because, Maxwell said, war news was censored.

The U.S. Command spokesman said the cable read: "A comprehensive review of the situation is under way and you will be further advised as soon as possible."

The spokesman said that several days later another cable went to Wylie which read: "On or about Sept. 7, Specialist Maxwell made a specific request to be relieved from his assignment as war news editor. . . Specialist Maxwell is reported to have objected to editorial policies concerning war news. In accordance with his request, Specialist Maxwell was assigned to a different branch on Sept. 17, 1968."

The command spokesman said the second reply "ended the specific query. There's been no further communication."

Behind Maxwell, two other former military broadcasters sent letters to Wylie charging that statements by the secretary of defense, congressman, top South Vietnamese leaders and reports of enemy violations

### Tolland Board of Education Hit for 'Propaganda'

The chairman of the Middle School Building Committee has lashed out at the Board of Education and its chairman, David Cook, accusing them of teaching "propaganda" to school children.

"I am sure the budget cut cannot be recouped by the refusal of the use of the school buildings," Palumbo said.

"It is about time the public was made aware of the facts instead of being misled by the propaganda being submitted to the papers by David Cook," Palumbo said.

Referring to a recent report issued by the State School Economy Service, noting the cost of the Meadowbrook School addition was the lowest in the state, Palumbo attributed the low cost to the fact that the lowest cost items in any school project.

He disputes Cook's contention that "school boards may be much more conservative in building schools than most building committees."

"It is related areas that bring costs up, such as parking spaces, athletic facilities, access roads, toilet facilities, gymnasiums, kitchens and administrative areas," Palumbo stated.

"Each of those reports," Palumbo continued, "remind that facts should be used cautiously since each job is different."

The Middle School Building Committee is building the access road, the athletic facilities and additional parking spaces which will eventually be used by the Meadowbrook School, according to Palumbo.

He extended a pat on the back to the original Meadowbrook School Building Committee, "since they were the people with the foresight to plan buildings which would require only simple classrooms to enlarge its capacity."

Palumbo also delved into the previous controversy over the location of the middle school in the education park concept.

The issue which precipitated the showdown was a proposed 1971 tour of South Africa by New Zealand's All Blacks rugby team.

### South African Government Fights Internal Enemies

The fourth month caused the long-awaited revolt. Aided by support apartheid relaxations permitting nonwhite sportsmen to visit the country, Hertzig said he could not stomach the idea of South African players touring South Africa.

"They will sit at our tables with our young men and girls and they will dance with our girls," he said. "If this wedge is permitted to remain, you will never be able to close the door again."

Hertzig and 10 more of the 1,041 delegates voted against the motion. The rebels have been given two months to recant or leave the party. Hertzig, refusing to back down, has renewed accusations that Vorster has deviated from traditional Nationalist party policy.

After the show, Vorster dropped his election campaign to catch his opponents off guard. Blatter infighting will reach its peak at November nomination contests as their official candidates.

Hertzig has remained silent on speculation whether he would establish a splinter party. In the past, ultraright-wing splinter groups have fared ill in elections.

Left out in the cold by the tumult, white supporters of opposition parties seemed to regard the election as a bore.

"We have decided it is no longer enough just to keep factions apart and break up mobs," the army spokesman said. "Until now agitators have been able to throw something nasty, knowing they could disappear into a friendly crowd."

"Now we intend to go in after them and lift them out, if any more of these agitators are arrested lawbreakers they must take the consequences."

The spokesman said the squads will be brought into action as soon as possible.

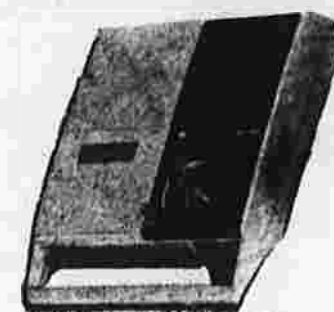

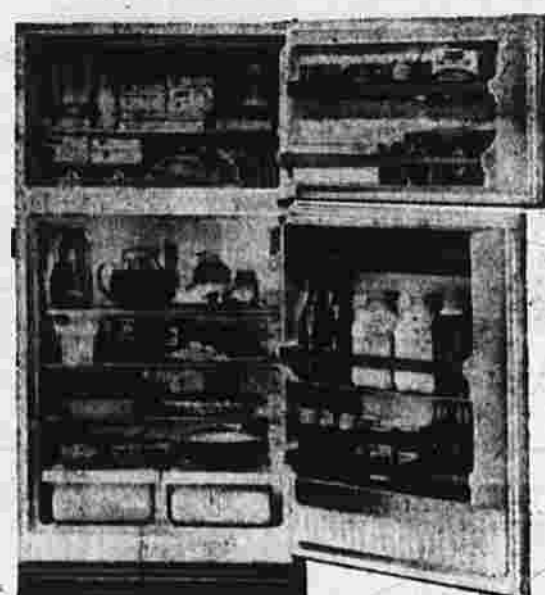

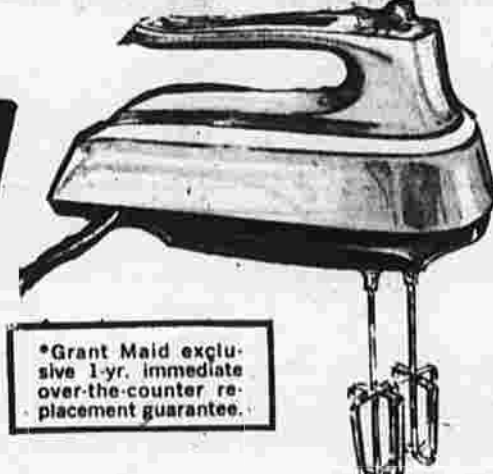

### Vernon First Session Set Tuesday At New Courthouse

The first court session will be held in the new Tolland County Courthouse on Tuesday, according to the Judicial Department coordinator of administrative services, John McNamara.

The first session will be a criminal session with Superior Court Judge David M. Shea presiding. Formal dedication ceremonies will be held later this month and are being planned by a Tolland County Bar Association Committee headed by Atty. Harry Hamner.

Four of them were already in custody for failing charges. The other three—Bruce Pina, 28, of West Haven, and Nicholas Bernick, 34, and Ralph Borrelli, 28, both of East Haven, were picked up Tuesday and Wednesday and arraigned before a U.S. Commissioner.

The indictment, handed down Tuesday by a federal grand jury, indicates a web of relationships between the suspects.

John T. "Jackie" Reed, 26, already facing a murder charge in connection with a gangland slaying in New Haven last year, is accused of taking part in the June 26, 1968, \$4,800 holding at the Lincoln National Bank in Stamford.

Jackie's brother, Edward, 21, already facing one bank robbery charge, is accused of staging the Dec. 11, 1968, \$22,200 hold-up at the Atlantic National Bank of Stamford and the Sept. 13, 1968, \$42,488 robbery at the Colonial Bank & Trust Co. in Meriden.

Edward Gould, 37, of New Haven, now in prison on a weapons charge, is accused of helping Edward Reed stage the March 6 hold-up at the National Bank.

Carl O. White, 28, of New Haven, also serving time in prison on another charge, is accused of helping Edward Reed stage the March 6 hold-up.

According to the indictment, Reed, Gould, White, and Bernick, 27, of New Haven, also serving time in prison on another charge, are expected to have annual incomes of \$10,000 or more by 1970, according to a recent study.

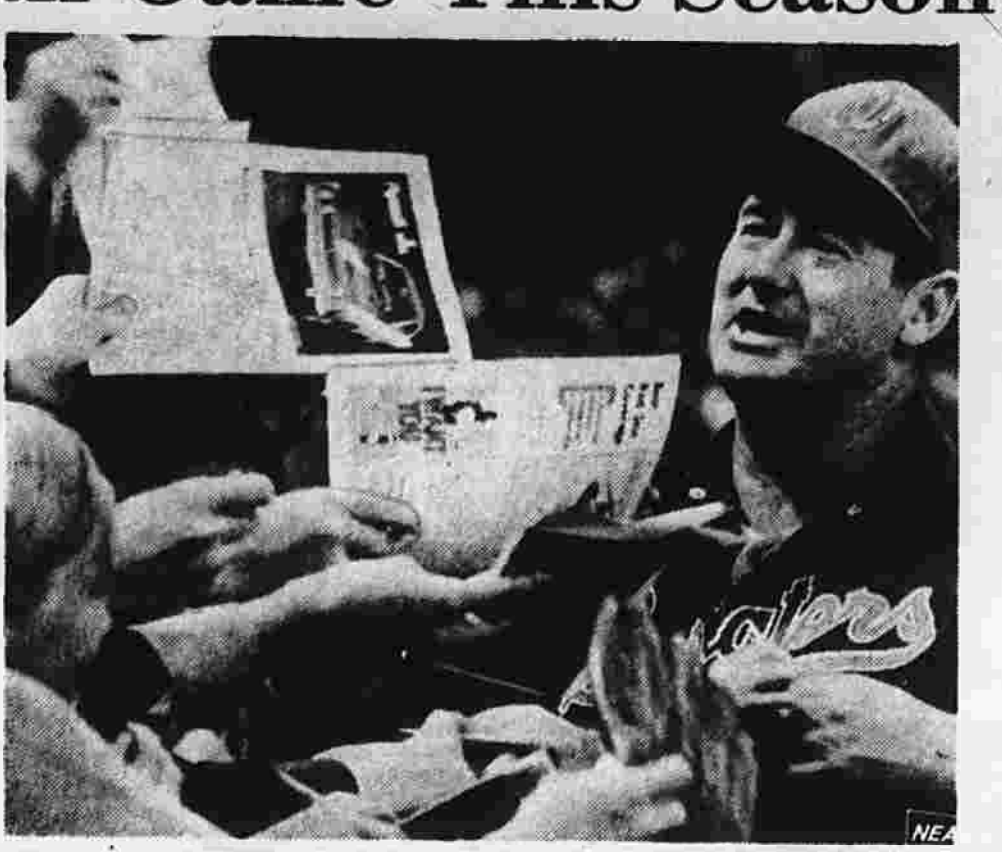
