Dr. Tanah H. Atoymanat Child Guidance Clinic

Raising children is no bed of roses, but like most successful gardeners, an expert gardener helps!

Dr. Tanah H. Atoymanat, psychiatrist and director of the Manchester Community Child Guidance Clinic, offers his expertise with an enthusiasm that is infectious.

He feels strongly that prevention and early detection of the emotional problems of children leads to a better community. The problems of the child many times become the larger problems of the adult with you, the taxpayer, absorbing the bills.

Identification of the problem, helping the parent to see the problem or in some cases unsolved parental problems, unties the twig, so that it can grow.

Referrals this year to the clinic ran 15 to 18 per cent preschool, 50 per cent school age, and the rest in the adolescent category, indicating that the teenage years are not necessarily the most upsetting in a child's life.

Dr. Atoymanat feels that perhaps his early recognition of a child's problems, through the "staging" of a credit to the diligence of pediatricians and school personnel.

Is it time which is out of joint? Society never had a time when there were no problems. However, the 20th century has brought many new and disturbing ones. The influence of the media (and there are so many today that didn't exist 50 years ago), transportation, families moving farther, faster, high industrialization, and the need for and providing jobs that no longer exist, the final but devastating catalyst of the atomic age, all contribute to disturbing pressures.

The public's attitude toward psychiatry goes hand in hand with the sophistication of the community. In a highly competitive society, admission for the fight is ingrained. Many people do not have the strength to play in competitive life, the psychiatrist helps the research and the environment eases the first efforts of the patient who

comes back into the mainstream. This is just a smattering of the fascinating conversation with Dr. Atoymanat in the little white house located next to the State Department of Mental Health.

At the same time, he was associated with the Child Guidance Clinic on a part-time basis. The post of director was offered at the same time as a professorship in Omaha. Fortunately, he chose Manchester, missionary in Turkey.

As state psychiatrist in the state hospital in Raleigh, N.C., then an instructor at Duke University, he worked his way north, dividing his time between teaching and private practice.

With other steps in Kentucky, Maryland and Pennsylvania, he finally arrived in Hartford in September of 1960 as the chief and clinical director of the Division of Community Services, State Department of Mental Health.

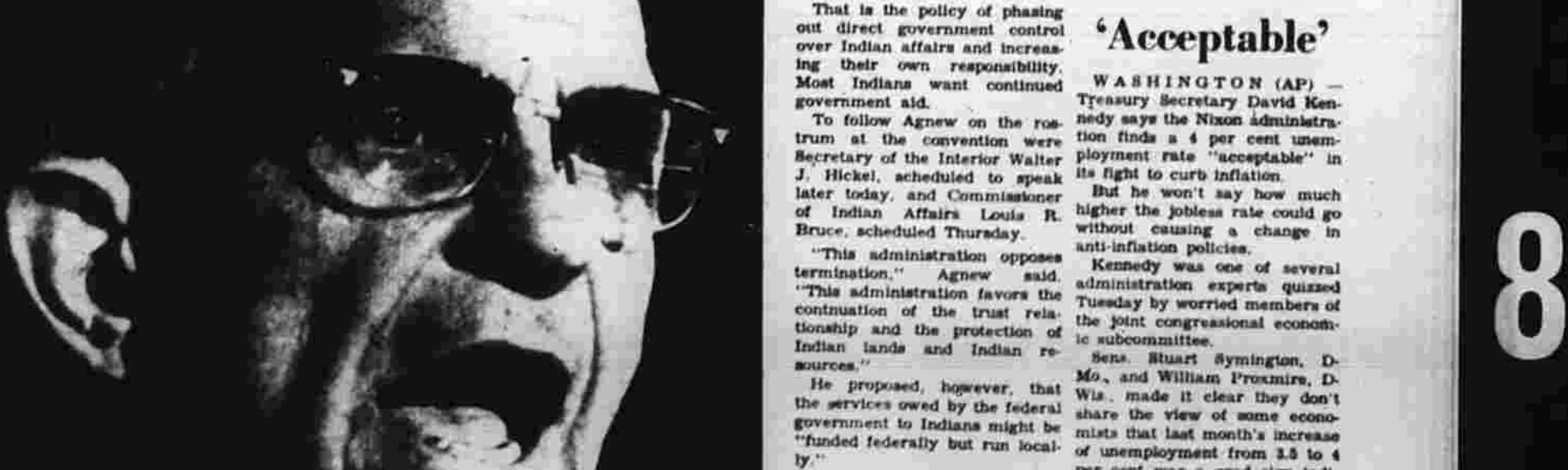

### Tolland September Building Permits Rise \$134,000 Over 1968

### CAB Asks More Study On V-STOL

WASHINGTON (AP) — A step which could delay up to a year completion of the Civil Aeronautics Board's feasibility study of city-center to city-center air service in major eastern cities has been proposed by a bureau within the CAB.

But the CAB's Bureau of Operating Rights, which has asked for a full record before probing the plan deeper, said the more thorough study would hasten the day when such service could be a reality.

The intermediate steps are necessary because the study involves a novel concept of air transportation to be provided with aircraft still on the manufacturers' drawing boards, operating from landing sites yet to be selected, in markets with vaguely defined characteristics and unknown traffic potential," said Bureau Counsel Alexander N. Argersick.

The CAB decided two years ago to take the initiative to help solve transportation problems of the so-called Northeast Corridor through an investigation of the feasibility of service between major cities of the area with VTOL or STOL aircraft—vehicles capable of short or vertical takeoff and landing.

The nine metropolitan areas are Boston, Mass.; Providence, R.I.; Hartford, Conn.; New York City-Newark, N.J.; Trenton, N.J.; Philadelphia, Pa.; Baltimore, Md.; Baltimore, Md.; and Washington.

The record thus far discloses that we know very little about V-STOL market characteristics and practically nothing about the potential V-STOL passenger in terms of where the center of passenger demand in each of the cities in issue," Argersick said.

**Busing Still a Burning Issue In Many City School Systems**

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS  
Few aspects of integration ignited more furor in recent years than school busing. Now, five years after the inception of busing programs, the controversy has not diminished. One of the first busing programs began in Berkeley, Calif., in 1964, under the auspices of Neil V. Sullivan, the then superintendent of schools, now commissioner of education in Massachusetts. Today, an Associated Press survey shows, every pupil takes the bus in Berkeley. From kindergarten through third grade, everybody goes to school in the predominantly white neighborhoods of the hill section. From fourth through sixth grade, they attend schools in the predominantly Negro neighborhoods near the water. Then, everybody goes to the same junior and senior high schools located near the middle of the city. There have been no serious problems, but William D. Rhodes, coordinator of special programs for the school system, says "there are always problems with kids." "At one time I was principal of a black school and if our ball team was playing another black team was playing another black team, it was just kids. But with white and black it becomes a racial incident." In Pittsburgh, the city is constructing "middle schools" for sixth, seventh and eighth grades to relieve overcrowding of Negro neighborhood schools, a chronic problem for most cities. As a secondary effect, integration has occurred as Negroes and whites are sent to the middle schools. Public transportation is used, but parents are reimbursed by the city. But a number of white parents are unhappy about the new system. A leader of the anti-busing movement is the Rev. **Thomaston Teen Gets Life Term In Girl's Death**

LITCHFIELD, Conn. (AP) — A youth who admitted the slaying of his former "steady" girl friend was given a sentence of life imprisonment Tuesday. Donald E. Ray, 18, of Thomaston, pleaded guilty last month to a charge of second degree murder in the stabbing death last March of 16-year-old Linda Morrow of Thomaston. A grand jury had indicted him on a first degree murder charge, and he pleaded innocent to that charge before being allowed to plead guilty to the lesser charge. State's Atty. Thomas F. Wall told the court Tuesday that Ray told police he had dated the girl for about three years before she broke up the "steady" relationship in November 1968. They continued to date, less frequently, and on March 16 he took the girl to a movie. After the movie he drove to Hillwell Hill Road in Thomaston, where he tried unsuccessfully to strangle the girl and then stabbed her in the chest with a 4 1/2-inch knife, police said Ray told them. The girl's body was thrown over an embankment, and Ray later tried unsuccessfully to commit suicide by running a hose into his car from the exhaust pipe of the vehicle, police said Ray told them. The state's attorney said Ray decided to kill the girl at least one week before the slaying. Before the mandatory sentence of life imprisonment was imposed, Judge Raymond J. Devlin asked Ray if he had anything to tell the court. Ray shook his head and remained silent. "If you can provide a good education, people don't mind busing. ### Fighter Plane Crash Lands, Co-Pilot Dies

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — A fighter plane trying to land in an emergency landing crashed in a residential area near Tinker Air Force Base Tuesday, killing the pilot and leaving a block-long trail of destruction.

The plane was destroyed and three damaged, but no civilians reported injuries. The pilot of the Kansas Air National Guard F100 parachuted to safety less than three blocks from the scene.

Col. Loy Norris, commander of Tinker base, said the pilot, Capt. James L. Kirkhuff, radioed that his engine had flamed out at 200 feet and that he was unable to restart it.

The body of the pilot, 2nd Lt. James Melms of Wichita, Kan., was found in the wreckage of one of the houses.

Kirkhuff, 27, of Eufaula, Tex., and Melms were attached to the Air National Guard 144th Tactical Fighter Group at McConnell Air Force Base near Wichita.

The plane came down half a mile north of the base runway, and only four blocks from where two persons died eight years ago when another F100 crashed.

"The whole front of the house lit up—just like lightning," said Mrs. Billie Redford, who lives across the street from the devastated area.

The plane came down in a street intersection, careened through one house, across the railroad tracks, through a small building, and across three back yards before it came to rest partially inside another house.

The houses destroyed were both vacant.

Houle added he thought the present fire truck should be replaced with another of its type. He pointed out that the money for the ambulance is being raised by a special tax on property.

Thompson said the old emergency truck, which is better than nothing and has served the town well, still remains nothing but a rusted piece of metal.

The present truck can accommodate only one patient where the ambulance can take up to five. Thompson noted it was difficult to administer oxygen or control bleeding or keep the patient from broken bones reasonably comfortable in the present emergency truck.

In answer to Houle's comment that an ambulance might commit the town to provide ambulance service, Thompson said anything more than improving the present service to Andover persons or victims of accidents happening in Andover and would be kept entirely to responding to emergency calls.

Several people seemed concerned with the housing of the ambulance. Thompson said the existing facilities would be adequate to house the new vehicle, provided the display fire truck used in parades is housed in the town garage.

Raymond Houle pointed out that a new radio for the ambulance would have to be purchased for an approximate cost of \$1,000. Thompson stated the radio will be furnished by the department.

Personal property must be declared during the month of October. After that time, there will be a penalty of 10 per cent. Lists are available at the Town Office Building.

**Business Mirror**

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Now that Labor Day has passed, the pundits of Wall Street and their likes in financial centers around the nation are expecting some stock market action. Problem is, they don't know what the action will be like.

One thing is certain: Things happen after Labor Day. The records prove it. As certainly as there is a "midsummer rally" there is a "post-Labor Day break." And about as often, but bear markets end after Labor Day.

In the old days, it is alleged, the action came when the tycoons returned from long summers at their spas, well rested and full of zest, eager to make things happen so they could make some money and pay off the crews of the yachts.

There's a bit of the old days around still. Executives like to begin new business around now. They commit money to advertising, make final estimates on capital spending, introduce new products, set sales goals and so on.

The federal government adds to the climate. It releases its study of capital spending plans right after the holiday. And this year it is expected to participate in another way by offering proof or disproof of its anti-inflation policies.

Ordinarily these factors furnish the market seer with grist, and he grinds out his forecasts by offset, letterpress, mimeograph, spirit duplicator or any other machine available.

Confidence often wanes from the pages, for seers seldom admit to knowing as little about the future as anyone else. No more than they confess to having longed that analysts are openly confessing their weakness, revealing without embarrassment that they are only humanly endowed.

Descriptions rather than forecasts fill their letters. "The market began September mixed and inconclusive," says one. Another describes the market as "picking up." The daring ones forecast "good values in depressed stocks."

One widely circulated advisory reads:

"In all probability we are about to enter a period in which the right stocks should be accumulated as they move lower." "Nobody is likely to dispute that."

Neither is anyone likely to disagree in the open market that follows: "... But we do not know yet what desirable issues will decline most, nor do we have anything more than vague notions about the next vogue in equities."

A technical letter advises:

"The unsuccessful drive to break through the July 20 bottom close of 801.86, otherwise termed a successful test of that extreme low point, followed by a recovery of sufficient strength to bring about a new high close of 813.30 on Aug. 18, which new high close surpassed the previous top close..."

Thus to peer into a clouded future, some investors instead are discovering new visibility in the past. History and the stars always provide clues.

One popular, outspoken and respected letter writer recalls that the market has broken apart after Labor Day in 1929, 1937, 1948, 1953, 1957, 1960, 1961 and 1966. Such evidence cannot be ignored.

"Since World War II, every major stock market decline (1950, 1959, 1967, 1968, 1969, and 1969) has ended in September or October—none later and none earlier!"

Take your pick, but remember that although the bear might liberate the bull never does, even in bear markets.

**New Uniform Considered For Britain's Navy**

**LONDON (AP)** — Britain's Royal Navy, whose uniform was copied by other navies round the world, may be ditching its famous bell-bottomed trousers.

The Admiralty has sent a questionnaire to sailors asking them what they think of a new uniform with trim-line trousers.

The present uniform of bell-bottoms, dark blue jumper, tan-beret, blue collar and black scarf has been unchanged for more than 100 years.

But the Admiralty bosses think that something different is needed for a modern nuclear-powered, missile-firing navy of the 70s.

"No doubt some retired admirals will grieve in the face of the thought, but a lot of the chaps seem to want a change," a navy spokesman said.

The idea of changing the uniform was started by Dr. David Owen, Undersecretary of state for the navy.

Owen said he received a good many complaints about the uniform from seamen during a recent tour of the Far East.

So he handed the problem over to the navy's psychological department who came up with the idea of the questionnaire.

The navy is also wondering whether to change another old naval tradition which is hardly likely to appeal—the cancellation of the daily rum ration.

**Housewives Are Using More Bottles and Jars**

**NEW YORK (AP)** — U.S. housewives this year will use about 12 billion glass bottles and jars for foods, ranging from delicate spices to such everyday staples as mayonnaise and preserves.

The use of glass containers to carry foods to market has more than doubled in the last 30 years, reports the Glass Container Manufacturers Institute.

A number of food products are packaged almost exclusively in glass. They include baby food, salad dressing, mayonnaise, preserves and jellies, cranberry juice cocktail, catsup, chili sauce, pickles, relishes, chilled orange juice, green olives, honey and soluble coffee.

GCI reports there are several reasons why glass is predominant in the packaging of these and similar products.

The housewife can see at a glance what she is buying. She can readily reseal the bottles and jars since most of these products are not fully consumed at one serving. And, since glass is chemically inert, it does not alter the flavor or appearance of the food while it is being stored.

GCI spokesman said also that several new packaging processes are being developed that will further expand the list of glass-packed food. One is a process for packing instant baby feeding formula that provides a new era of convenience for mothers.

**Accused in Embezzling**

**NEW YORK (AP)** — A 33-count federal grand jury indictment named Harold Nimpfius, a former union president of embezzling about \$7,000 through double reimbursement for expenses from both the union and his employees.

Nimpfius, 56, of Durham, Conn., is a former president of Local 1202, Amalgamated Transit Union, which represents New York metropolitan area Greyhound Bus drivers.

Nimpfius was accused of receiving duplicate expense money from both the union and Greyhound between Jan. 1, 1966, and June 30, 1968, when he left the Local 1202 presidency.

**UConn Oks Moratorium**

**STORERS (AP)** — The faculty senate of the University of Connecticut endorsed Monday the proposed Vietnam War Moratorium Day scheduled for Oct. 18.

In its resolution, passed by a vote of 48-12, the senate said it "encourages the entire faculty and student body to suspend or alter the usual university activities held on that day."

Scheduled in connection with the moratorium, in which students at a number of major colleges and universities plan to stay away from half classes, is a teach-in on the Vietnam war and United States foreign and domestic policies and racism.

**GI Deaths in War at Three-Year Low**

BAIGON (AP)—The total of American battlefield deaths in Vietnam dropped last week to 84, the lowest weekly toll since October 1968, the Pentagon announced today.

The reduction in American casualties continued a generally downward trend that began three months ago. Official sources said if this trend continues, it could prompt President Nixon to speed up American troop withdrawals.

However, the source cautioned that although significant enemy activity is at its lowest level for this year, captured enemy documents and prisoner reports indicate a winter campaign beginning in November.

Therefore, American forces have not curtailed their offensive operations to keep the momentum of the offensive.

Casualty totals for South Vietnamese government forces and for the army also were down considerably last week, and the government's military headquarters said in a communiqué: "The level of enemy activities during the week was the lowest since the beginning of the year and it decreased six per cent compared to that of the previous week."
