## Nixon Asks Restraint By Business, Labor

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Nixon is sending personal fight-inflation appeals to 2,200 leaders of business and labor — his first concerted effort to solicit wage-price restraint.

The White House said letters from the President will be mailed Monday as a follow-up to his nationwide radio address in which he asked all citizens to "bear the burden of restraint in their personal credit and purchasing decisions, so as to reduce the pressures which help drive prices out of sight."

Nixon said Friday the administration is sending the appeal to 2,200 leaders of business and labor — his first concerted effort to solicit wage-price restraint.

"I'm afraid the speech sounded too much like waxes," said a skeptical Mrs. Judith Pagan in Dover, N.J.

"In his address, Nixon called on labor 'to bear their wage demands in the new prospect of a return toward price stability.' He urged businessmen to 'bear their investment and price decisions on that economic plan.'"

But the message was headed mainly at housewives, and they were asked to "restrain their buying decisions in an effort to hold down living costs, and 'to remember that we are on the road to recovery from the disease of runaway prices.'"

## Nixon Sets 300,000 Troop Cut Troika Task Ends; A Partial Success

GARDEN CITY, N.Y. (AP) — President Nixon has ordered the Pentagon to work out plans for withdrawing up to 300,000 U.S. troops from Vietnam in 1970. Newday said today in a copyright story by columnist Flora Lewis.

The story from Washington said that according to reliable informants the President plans to announce the accelerated withdrawal program in his Nov. 3 television address.

While many details remain to be worked out, the initial outline of the plan calls for the removal of all American combat units.

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## 37 States Back Church Tax Relief

WASHINGTON (AP) — Thirty-seven states, headed by New York, have appealed to the Supreme Court to nullify the federal estate tax exemption for churches and other religious bodies.

Officially, the Peace Corps denied the White House flap. But inside sources reported Henry Kissinger, the President's foreign policy adviser, telephoned Peace Corps Director Joseph Blatchford to convey the administration's position.

## Army Back To Testing Of Chemicals

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army, armed with a report to blunt congressional criticism, has resumed testing chemical warfare agents at two posts after a three-month suspension.

Secretary Stanley R. Reiser announced resumption of open testing of chemical agents at Edgewood Arsenal, Md., and the use of such gases in defensive training at Ft. Meade, Md., after a civilian report endorsed the move.

## Laird Asks Halt To Production Of War Gerns

NEW YORK (AP) — Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird has urged in a secret memorandum to the National Security Council that the United States stop production of biological warfare agents, the New York Times reported today.

In a story from its Washington bureau the Times said Laird's two-page memorandum, supplemented by an extensive staff report on chemical and biological warfare.

The Times' story continued: "The staff report is to be reviewed next week at a meeting of high officials from the Defense Department, State Department, Arms Control and Disarmament Agency and other agencies."

President Nixon is expected to try to formulate a policy on gas and germ warfare at a meeting with the Joint Chiefs of Staff later in the week.

It was unclear whether the Joint Chiefs of Staff would support Laird's position on halting production of deadly germs and bacteria.

The Joint Chiefs have, in the past, reportedly held that the bacteriological and chemical warfare agents were necessary in the American arsenal to provide a deterrent against a germ attack.

## Finch Banishes Cyclamates From Grocery Shelves

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare Robert H. Finch ordered today that all foods and drinks containing the artificial sweetener cyclamate be removed from grocery shelves by Jan. 1. Cyclamate has been found to cause cancer in laboratory animals.

Finch emphasized, however, "we have no evidence at this point that cyclamates have increased cancer in humans."

He said he would not recommend that families who now have cyclamate-containing foods and drinks in their homes throw them away or stop using them at the present time.

Cyclamates, which Finch estimated are a \$1-billion annual industry, are found mainly in diet drinks and foods. They also are contained in a wide range of non-diet foods from bacon to canned fruit and children's vitamins.

Finch said he acted after two different laboratories presented evidence this week that cyclamate in very high doses produced bladder cancer in rats and mice.

## Highlights Of Address

WASHINGTON (AP) — Highlights of President Nixon's radio address Friday on the high cost of living:

For five long years, you have heard politicians and economists denouncing "the high cost of living," but after the speeches have ended, nobody seemed to be doing anything about it.

There was a fairly simple reason why your cost of living got out of hand. The blame for the spiral of wages and prices falls fundamentally on the past policy of your government.

The federal government spent a lot more than it raised in taxes for the past 10 years. The frequent failure to balance the federal budget over the past five years has been the primary cause for unbalancing the national budget of billions of dollars.

Step by step we took those measures necessary to get our nation's house in order. Let's face it: Holding down government spending and holding up the tax rate, and making it harder for people to get credit, are not the kind of policy that makes friends for people in public.

There will be no overnight cure, but we are on the road to recovery from the disease of runaway prices.

In our leveling off process, we intend to do everything we can to resist increases in unemployment.

We are not considering wage or price controls.

## Shifting of Burns May Boost Moynihan

WASHINGTON (AP) — When Arthur Burns moves from the White House to the Federal Reserve Board, the President's top economic adviser will lose one of his ranking conservative members.

One result could be a boost in influence for Daniel P. Moynihan, the House Ways and Means committee's ranking liberal and President Nixon's chief urban affairs adviser.

Burns and Moynihan have been rivals for the President's ear since the inauguration. Burns has been the more conservative of the two, while Moynihan has been the more liberal.

"Neither man's victories were always clear cut," said a source familiar with the two.

When the President accepted Moynihan's proposal for creation of income floors for the country's poor, he also accepted, at Burns' insistence, the idea that work requirements be made a part of any return plan.

## Reports Hint U.S. Guns May Cease in Vietnam

WASHINGTON (AP)—Amid increasingly violent sentiment for a faster U.S. withdrawal from Vietnam, President Nixon reportedly is considering a unilateral cease-fire.

The President may propose the cease-fire during his Nov. 3 address to the nation on the Vietnam situation. A White House source said Sunday.

Indications Nixon may, in fact, have been affected by opposition to the war expressed in last Wednesday's Vietnam Moratorium, which was held in the U.S. and other nations. He reportedly spent the weekend huddled with his top military and diplomatic advisors at Camp David.

Former Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, who last week emerged from a meeting with Nixon to endorse his Vietnam policy, said in Tokyo he is sure the United States will carry out "a systematic and accelerated withdrawal of U.S. forces from Southeast Asia."

Humphrey was among a number of prominent figures in the Vietnam Moratorium who spoke out on Vietnam over the weekend.

According to Newsweek magazine, Nixon has been urged by his military advisors to proclaim a U.S. unilateral cease fire so massive violations could be used "as evidence of the enemy's reluctance to end the war."

The advisors feel, the magazine said, a unilateral cease-fire would create so great a risk to U.S. troops in the field.

The White House source said Nixon could not afford to announce such a cease-fire during his Vietnam address or, by contrast, during his Thursday, Oct. 16, address to Congress. He said that the idea has been rejected.

The President conferred at the Maryland retreat with Secretary of State William P. Rogers, Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird, and other officials. He also met with his national security advisor, Dr. Henry A. Kissinger, and other top officials.

Humphrey said when he talked about troop withdrawals with Nixon he had encouraged the President to give it all possible support on the executive level.

In Washington, Sen. Fred Harris, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, called for speeding up troop withdrawals and Sen. Edmund Muskie, D-Maine, said United Nations Secretary-General U Thant should negotiate a political settlement of the war.

Harris spoke on the NBC radio-television program "Meet the Press" and "Issues and Answers."

Harris said Nixon has acknowledged he was overly hawkish on Vietnam and added that the President "ought to get about getting us out of there as much more rapid and systematic."

## CIA Official In Laos Quiz Vietnam Battling Increases But Still 'Relatively Low'

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Stuart Symington, declaring it a "travesty" to deny that Americans are fighting and dying in Laos, today began a week-long effort to plumb the depths of U.S. involvement in that shadowy nation.

The Missouri Democrat is chairman of a Senate foreign relations subcommittee which has held a series of hearings on the Central Intelligence Agency, and other top officials to testify before the subcommittee on the morning of July 19 and has also held a hearing on the subject of Laos just to testify.

Although the hearings are closed, Symington has promised to make the record public as soon as possible and has indicated there may be open hearings on the subject.

The main question Symington has set out to answer is deceptively simple: Are an increasing number of Americans fighting and dying in a war that may be called the Vietnam War?

"To deny there is fighting is a travesty, when not only the enemy but also the American participants, including those who are casualties and some of their families, know the truth," Symington said in a statement.

SAIGON (AP)—Fighting increased in the Mekong Delta in the past 24 hours, but was still "relatively low," a CIA official said today.

BRUSSELS (AP)—Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., said today there is a "great likelihood" that the Senate will soon adopt a resolution calling for a gradual withdrawal of U.S. troops from Western Europe.

When he was asked if a move has been isolated by a continuing European refusal to accept a greater share of the defense burden, Kennedy said a gathering of NATO (North Atlantic Treaty Organization) members in Brussels, Belgium, on Oct. 17, would discuss the issue.

"I am sure," he said, "that the United States will be able to bring about a new agreement that will allow us to reduce our forces in Europe."
