Two Cosmonauts 'Leave' Science For Disneyland

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — Two visiting Soviet cosmonauts turned today from scientific reality to pure fantasy—a trip through fabled Disneyland.

Maj. Gen. Georgiy Beregovoy and Konstantin Plokhov, a civilian, are on a tour of U.S. space facilities. They came here Thursday from the Manned Spacecraft Center at Houston, Tex.

At a news conference the Russian pair termed military use of space impractical and said they were hopeful that the Soviet Union and United States would share the exploration of space for scientific purposes.

They suggested the day may come when Americans and Russians will fly together in the same spacecraft.

"I personally hope such flights will be possible," said Beregovoy. "I don't know just when—as soon as we learn English."

Sheinwold on Bridge

LOOK FOR RIGHT KEY WHEN DOOR IS SHUT

By ALFRED SHEINWOLD

During World War II, I spent some of my time opening safes and locked doors, a nefarious practice that came naturally to me because of my bridge background. An experienced bridge player gets quite a bit of practice unlocking doors to get to the dummy, as today's hand indicates.

South dealer.
Both sides vulnerable.
Opening lead—Nine of Spades.
South won the first trick with the ace of spades and scowled at West for the flashy opening lead. With any other lead it would have been a cinch to get to dummy by ruffing a heart.

South could surely win six trumps, two hearts and the ace of diamonds. His game would be safe if he could get to dummy in order to cash the ace of clubs, that how could he unlock the door to dummy?

Declare made an attempt by leading a low heart to dummy's jack. This would lead him in the dummy if West had the king of hearts.

Wrong Key
The attempt was better than nothing, but not much better. East won with the king of hearts and returned a trump to take the last spade out of dummy's hand. Now South had to lead everything out of his own hand and wound up losing two diamonds and one more heart.

Down one.

Give the defenders credit for suspecting the club situation, but don't give South any credit as a locksmith. At the second trick South should lead the queen of hearts to open the door to dummy.

If East wins the trick, dummy's jack of hearts is an entry. If East declines the trick, South cashes the ace of hearts and ruffs a heart. Either way, declare is sure of the game and rubber.

Daily Question

Cheese souflis, green bean salad with homemade Appauce cake for dessert. Audience like a luncheon menu for the Gourmet Group? Not if you're one of the lucky doctors, nurses or technicians who come to man the bloodmobile in Manchester from the blood center in Hartford.

Mr. James Elliott, head of canteen service for the Manchester Red Cross, feels he should be serving food that would appeal to herself. The fact that she even makes hot breads "for a little treat" for her units, makes Manchester, understandingly, one of the most popular stops for the bloodmobile. One doctor even wanted her recipes!

Motherly, grey-haired Mrs. Elliott is a ball of energy with the most delightful sense of humor you'd ever want to meet, taking very little credit for herself and stressing the fact that she couldn't do anything without the ten women who are on her committee. Six of these 10 are always and faithfully on duty preparing lunch for the 13 regular visits, which include never less than 10 persons, along with the juice, coffee and donuts that are a must for every donor before leaving the unit.

In the 25 years that Mrs. Elliott has worked with the canteen she has pondered "how many pounds of coffee used," "kitchen I have known," and even the gentlemen who insisted that his wife made better and better coffee, without realizing it was supposed to be served lukewarm. The fact that lunch is served at the busy time for the staff, makes it generally at 3 p.m. How would you like to keep the souflis from falling if there was a rush of donors at 2:30?

In their spare time what else do the canteen people do? They play host to the Greater Hartford First Aid Committee, 15 strong, hungry men in a beautifully small kitchen. They also prepare refreshments for various board meetings and special Armed Forces family meetings open to anyone in the immediate area who has some news, news to report, or news to report. They are called to Hartford to help with large aircraft or insurance bloodmobiles. And always they are prepared and available for disasters of any kind.

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Andrew Ingbar is an experienced commercial pilot. He's 37, tall, and handsome. His hair curls thickly over his collar and his sideburns reach well below his ears.
The hair, Ingbar said Thursday in the reason Cal-State Air Lines fired him Oct. 3.
Cal-State confirmed that Ingbar had been dismissed. It said he had been warned two weeks earlier that he would be fired if he didn't get a haircut.
Cal-State President Richard Dick said, "Pilots have got to be dignified, to inspire confidence. We're serving John Q. Public you know. We fly five Beech 99s to 11 cities in California plus Las Vegas, and there's no separate pilot's compartment. They're right there for everyone to see."
Ingbar has no complaints about his abilities as a pilot. But he understands there was a negative public reaction.
Ingbar said he refused to cut his hair as a matter of principle.
"For one thing, I like it this way," he said. "For another, I'm trying to show what people are going through, not just students but professional people as well. People are being cut down because of the way their hair looks, and their professional ability doesn't make any difference."

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U.S. Official Denies B52s Carry H-Bombs

NAHA, Okla., Oct. 23 — The chief of the Okla. civil defense administration today denied reports that U.S. B52 bombers carry hydrogen bombs on daily patrol missions near Communist China.

Chief Executive Choboy Yara said Communist China, he said, is not a nuclear power and does not possess hydrogen bombs.

Asked about the hydrogen bomb reports, Yara said he could not comment further because he did not know the source of the report.

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The Taxable Middle Class: They're Fed-Up in France

PARIS (AP) — "We're fed up," they're saying all across France.

The butchers, bakers and candlestick makers who form the backbone of the stable, conservative and independent-minded middle class are edging toward what might be a new split French revolution.

Taxes are the cause, along with increased government social charges. And competition of supermarkets.

The small-business men and independent tradesmen see their class as the main tax horse for defending the franc, giving aid to African countries, paying for the "indignus" and for issuing relief payments to imported North African factory workers.

A great number have become sick of refusing to pay the latest increase. Many have marched in the streets. Some have pitched cobblestones at the police. And a few have dynamited offices.

"They're angry, and anger is a very dangerous counselor," said young, steely-eyed Bernard Faulot, leader of the militant National Union of Independent Workers.

Bearded Faulot is a lawyer in a working-class section of Paris. He says 6.5 million workers, or 13 per cent of the total French population—support, labor movement, shopkeepers, independent artisans, professionals, and their employees and dependents. These are people in business for themselves, risking their own money.

"Revolution is perhaps too strong a word," said Faulot. "But it's time to start blowing. If the government doesn't mean a social change, it's a hard fight. I won't say long, but hard."

Two blocks away, stately brown-eyed Claude Boutoulet, 30, perches on the stool he uses to reach the high shelves in his paint and tool shop.

"Personally, I'm not a revolutionary," he says. "I'm a very calm boy. But the way things are now, I'm ready to take to the streets."

Boutoulet, a house painter by trade, worked "day and night and Sundays" to save up \$4,950 to open his shop four years ago. Now taxes and charges have cut his business in half and his profit to zero. His wife is unemployed.

On Rue des Moines behind Montmartre, Denise is a seller, a sleek blonde and silken-haired, she serves up an excellent rabbit in cream sauce in her cozy Burgundy-style restaurant.

"I really don't know how it went when I was paid, righting back the hint of worry through my eyes. When I got through paying the taxes, social charges, each quarter, I hardly have enough to get my hair done. I'm in a corner."

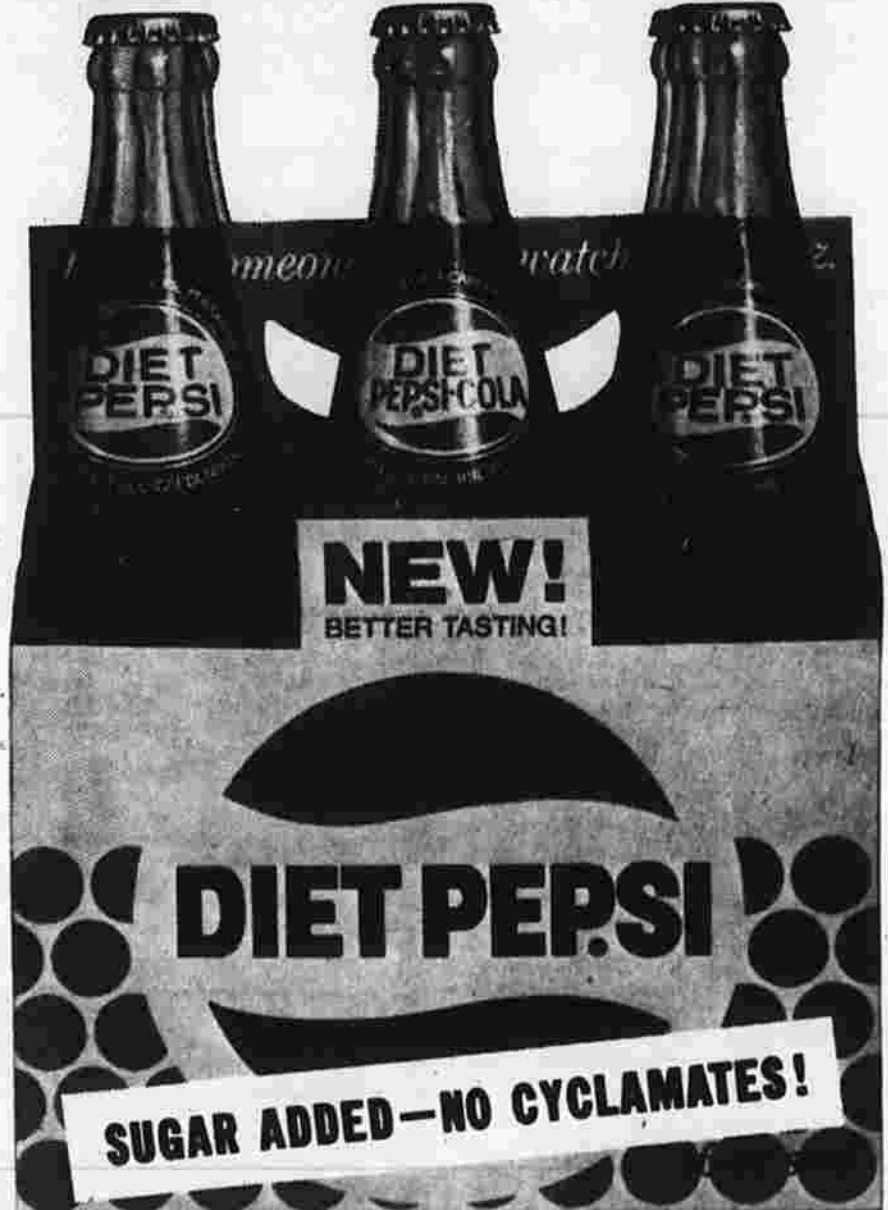

Equatorial Guinea: Its Major Accomplishment Is That It's Still Around

SANTA BARBARA, Equatorial Guinea (AP) — This sleepy, island nation, after some 100 days of turmoil, has survived its first year still steeply but at least still around.

In the spring, when 7,000 Spaniards fled and a dozen leaders were killed in a coup attempt, it appeared Africa's youngest state would collapse in bloodshed.

But in four days of self-congratulatory anniversary celebrations this month, Equatorial Guinea inaugurated its own currency and national airlines, Africa's major symbols of independence.

It is 45-year-old President Francisco Macias Nguema can control coconuts and intercom, politics, this tiny nation of 300,000 stands a good chance of surviving.

The United Nations, the Organization of African Unity and a few individual nations have promised technicians to replace the Spaniards, who have not returned.

"Our greatest accomplishment in the first year has been the peace we have maintained," said Eusebio Abu Ono Mayte, director general of information and tourism.

Development will come later, he said. "Things are all right," said a foreigner of long residence. "The electricity will work, the water will run, there is no trouble."

Few Guineans had been trained under Spanish rule to run technical services. When the Spaniards went, Africa's de facto became teachers and doctors.

Lindsay Tops Daily News' Straw Poll

NEW YORK (AP) — Mayor John V. Lindsay held a straw poll last week over Democrat Mario A. Procaccio and Republican Conservative John J. Marchi in the first round sample of the Daily News straw poll on the mayoral race.

A three-day survey of 3,000 voters throughout the city showed Lindsay with 44 per cent, Procaccio 23, Marchi 20, and 3 per cent undecided. The News poll has not been wrong on a mayoral race since it was started in 1925.

Lindsay completed his lead by taking 54 per cent of the Jewish vote in the poll and 67 per cent of the Negro vote. He led in four of the five boroughs, the exception being Richmond, which is Marchi's home borough.

Political observers expressed surprise over the size of Lindsay's lead. An Oliver Quayle poll taken for NBC in late September showed Lindsay 39 per cent, Procaccio 33, Marchi 12, and 16 per cent undecided.

Lindsay, defeated by Marchi in the June GOP primary, is running for re-election as the candidate of the Liberal and Independent parties and has received the endorsement of a number of prominent Democrats.

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The liberal bishops at the Roman Catholic synod are making most of the headlines but the conservatives are fighting hard.

The synod reasons with demands that the bishops get more voice in the governing of the Church, but prelates from such diverse places as the Vatican, Algeria, and Communist Poland have been sounding persistent notes of caution.

Cardinal Staffa, 63, brushed off the idea of any changes in the synod and took time out to complain that too many bishops used poor Latin in discussing the synod.

He warned of a "danger of nationalistic division for Catholicism" and cited the 16th century schism that produced the Church of England.
