Sheinwald on Bridge

PROVERBS WON'T HELP AT THE BRIDGE TABLE. By ALFRED SHEINWALD. The trouble with relying on proverbs in route directions is that they steer you in opposite directions. "Don't look a gift horse in the mouth," you are told by the arbiters of etiquette. But "be wary of the Greeks even when they bear gifts," is advice that you can't afford to ignore. Your best course at the bridge table is to rely on your brain instead of a proverb.

South-West North East 1 NT Pass 3 NT All Pass. South's club opening lead gave West a "free" chance to finesse. He gratefully played a low club from the dummy, only to discover that West's gift bore a price tag. Partner opens with one heart, and the next player passes. West leads the queen of clubs and fired back the jack of hearts. South stepped up with the ace of hearts, hoping that he wouldn't be taking the finesse, but his caution came too late. East got in with the ace of diamonds (South would have been safe if West had held this ace) and led the ten of hearts. The defenders then defeated the contract with three hearts, one diamond and one club.

South should make his contract by refusing the gift of the club finesse at the first trick. Declarer takes the ace of clubs and leads diamonds at once to force out the ace. Even if East then cashes the top clubs, declarer is safe since dummy's eight of clubs will eventually stop the suit.

Whenever South regains the lead he can take the heart and rubber with four diamonds, three spades, one heart and at least one club. South was unlucky to find both club honors, the ace of diamonds and the king of hearts in unfavorable positions, but he had no need to rely on luck. Coed Dorms, Even Schools Distracting, Educator Feels

NEW YORK (AP) — Dr. Helen Kim, who has devoted almost her entire 10 years to helping Ewha University in Korea become one of the world's largest women's universities, doesn't care to see it admit men. She's not endorsing coed dorms, either.

In Korea if anyone came out with that (coed dorms) would question the sanity of that person's mind," said the educator who is in this country raising funds.

There is enough human experience to tell us that close living quarters like dormitories should be separate at the college age level. Living closely together the sexes might also be a distraction.

"We may be wrong but we think some educators are going along with that idea because they are afraid," she said. "Also at men's colleges they have evolved ways of doing things and women might not fit into the pattern."

Dr. Kim attended Ewha, then earned a bachelor's degree at Ohio Wesleyan, a masters at Boston University and a doctorate at Columbia University. She was president of Ewha from 1959 to 1961.

She said Ewha students are less likely to demonstrate and take over administrative buildings because the country was war torn for so many years and because education for women was so long in coming.

We had enough upheaval and disturbance and all kinds of revolts in 1919, but the war and the Communist revolution interrupted that. It was a steady reconstruction," she said.

"Maybe your life has been protected and gone too easy for young people in this country," she said.

Her own mother, she said, was punished when she asked for lessons in reading and writing.

At the time, Dr. Kim began school in 1907, a woman's college did not even exist in Korea. When she entered college, it was a boys' school. She was the first woman to graduate from the school.

Now she said, women graduates are finding it easier to combine careers with marriage. College educated women have more freedom than in the past.

She received her BS degree in chemical engineering from Tufts University, and her master's degree in education and his Ph.D. in psychology at the University of Delaware. He is currently teaching at the University of Vermont.

Gore To Reoffer \$850 Exemption On Tax Reform

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Albert Gore says he has considerable backing for a plan to raise the \$850 federal income tax exemption for individuals to \$200 or \$1,000.

The Tennessee Democrat said he will reoffer on the Senate floor an amendment to the tax reform bill raising the exemption. The Gore amendment, opposed by the Nixon administration, was defeated when the bill was in the Senate Finance Committee.

Supporting Gore's amendment, which would allow individuals to deduct \$80 from their taxable income for themselves and each dependent, are Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield and Democratic Whip Edward M. Kennedy.

Sen. Winston L. Prouty, R-Vt., supports an increase in the exemption to \$1,000. Gore originally wanted to raise the exemption to \$1,000, but compromised on \$850 in committee sessions.

The Treasury Department testified against the amendment, noting it would reduce federal tax revenues by an estimated \$7.2 billion a year. Gore says he will offer the reduction by eliminating such cuts in income tax rates voted by the House.

Consumer Scores Points Against Corporate Giants

NEW YORK (AP) — After a decade of rising friction between consumers and producers, many of the issues seem to remain unresolved. Irritations have grown deeper and more painful, and many years have passed.

Instead of being quieted, consumer complaints seem to have grown louder. And where once the shouts seemed to fall on plugged ears, even whispered complaints now seem to be picked up in Washington. It's good politics.

In the past five years more than 20 important consumer bills have been passed by Congress, including laws on automobile safety, packaging and credit. And more than 100 bills are in the Congressional hopper.

At the White House there is more action. The President has proposed a permanent consumer office there. And he seeks also a new division of consumer protection at the Justice Department.

In fact, the evidence seems to add up to a defeat for business in its own way. Self-regulation does not appear to be winning in the battle to please the consumer.

One of the major reasons for the friction, ironically, is the growing financial well being of Americans, who once bought to satisfy needs but who now have the funds with which to be choosy. They are discretionary spenders.

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consumer, it will be only part of the answer. It is a formula for moving products. The marketing and advertising of goods has become very sophisticated, with subtle psychology wedded to hard selling. Perhaps as a result, some consumers have the feeling of being manipulated.

As one consumer affairs student stated it, "The essential problem in the marketplace is that amateur, part-time purchasers are trying to match wits with full-time, professional sellers."

A perusal of corporate speeches suggests that maybe business was late in recognizing the consumer movement for what it was, not simply the griping of some cynical people but the result of more basic frustrations in a rich, complex, material and impersonal age.

Against Corporate Giants

NEW YORK (AP) — After a decade of rising friction between consumers and producers, many of the issues seem to remain unresolved. Irritations have grown deeper and more painful, and many years have passed.

Instead of being quieted, consumer complaints seem to have grown louder. And where once the shouts seemed to fall on plugged ears, even whispered complaints now seem to be picked up in Washington. It's good politics.

In the past five years more than 20 important consumer bills have been passed by Congress, including laws on automobile safety, packaging and credit. And more than 100 bills are in the Congressional hopper.

At the White House there is more action. The President has proposed a permanent consumer office there. And he seeks also a new division of consumer protection at the Justice Department.

In fact, the evidence seems to add up to a defeat for business in its own way. Self-regulation does not appear to be winning in the battle to please the consumer.

One of the major reasons for the friction, ironically, is the growing financial well being of Americans, who once bought to satisfy needs but who now have the funds with which to be choosy. They are discretionary spenders.

This affluence is directly tied to the output of America's enormous production machinery, which puts so many complex products on the market that it anticipates questions. If a

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After 350 Jumps He's Sometimes Uneasy

After some 350 jumps, Ron Blake says he sometimes still gets knots in his stomach before he leaps out of an airplane that's flying at seven or eight thousand feet. And no wonder, because after he leaves the plane, he plummets earthward for about a mile before he pulls the ripcord that opens his parachute.

Ron has been a sport parachutist for several years and he is the president of Connecticut Parachutists, Inc. (CPI), a large parachute club with about 25 members that has its drop zone at the Ellington Airport on Rt. 88 in Ellington.

Ron said, "It's a little nerve-wracking on his first jump, he's lying through his teeth."

Despite all his jumps, Ron has never been seriously injured. "The worst thing that's happened," he said, "was the time when I got a couple of scrapes on my back. But I had some wild stories to tell about other jumpers who have had close calls or who have landed in strange places by accident."

He told about one parachutist who was jumping with him in a brisk wind at the Woodstock fair one year. "Woodstock is a terrible place to jump into anyway," Ron said, "the landing area is small, there's roller coasters and ferris wheels all around, and you have to be very accurate."

Another time, his friend was coming down, and the wind began to carry him. "He just missed it the ferris wheel and he came down in the middle of a horse racing track, while a race was in progress."

Another time, Blake said he saw a 42-year-old jumper almost lose his life when his chute didn't open until he was about 80 feet above the ground. Ron said, "He landed by me and I was floating down, and all I could see was a short puff when his chute quickly opened and closed just before he hit."

Blake said as he was still floating earthward, he could see several cars rushing toward where the man landed, and he began to steer himself over that way. "But then I thought," he said, "I don't want to see that, and I headed back toward the target area."

"When I hit the ground, I just sat there, and all these people, the man's wife, and a couple of girls ran by me crying. I asked them if his chute opened, and only one person said yes. It must have opened almost simultaneously as he hit the ground."

"When a few moments later, I saw the guy walking out of the woods, carrying his chute. But he was never allowed to jump in that place again. The manager of the jump site told him, 'as far as I'm concerned, you're a dead man. He wouldn't let him jump there any more.'"

Blake added that whenever the elderly jumper went again, he was required to wear an automatic opening device on his reserve parachute.

Blake, as do most experienced parachutists, owns a Pioneer Parachute Co. made "Fares-commander."

"It's a beautiful parachute," he said. "You can do almost anything with it."

Members of CPI follow strict safety precautions. One of these precautions is what they call a "pin check."

"Just before you board the plane to go up for your jump, another parachutist must check your rig," Ron said. "He will see that all your straps are fastened properly, and he'll check the release pins on the chute to make sure that none have been bent or broken."

"This precaution is done before every jump, and is followed by every jumper," Ron said, "whether he's had a thousand jumps or one jump."

Experienced members of the club pack their own main chutes, but the reserve parachute must be packed by a federally-licensed packer, Ron said. The reserve is checked and repacked every six months.

Because of safety precautions like these, parachuting is statistically one of the safest sports.

land because the area was heavily residential.

"The only place I could see was a school parking lot. To give you an idea of how fast I was going, you descend at the rate of about 12 miles an hour, and the wind was about 20 m.p.h., so if you're drifting with the wind as I finally had to be, you're going 42 m.p.h., so I was really burning in."

"To make matters worse I had to steer just over some telephone wires so I wouldn't hit them, but then too, I just missed a car parked in the lot."

"It hit that parking lot like a ton of bricks," Ron said, "but the only thing that happened to me was I got two half-dollar size pieces of skin taken out of my knees."

Blake said for exhibition jumps the airplanes climb to 7,000 or 8,000 feet. "That's the altitude we jump from, and we open our chutes at about 2,000 feet," he said. "To test the wind direction and speed, we drop a streamer from the plane at

2,000-foot and watch it go down. Theoretically, it's supposed to drop at the same rate as a parachutist would, but after we drop that, the plane has to climb to 7,000 feet and that takes some time, so by then the winds may be completely different."

Blake has landed in water. "On purpose," he said. It's a requirement to earn a certain degree license.

"It's really fun," he said, "you dress in a bathing suit and sneakers, and we always wear some kind of flotation device. The procedure is to start unbacking your straps at about 2,000 feet, so by the time you hit the water all you have to do is raise your hands above your head to help right out of your chute."

"You don't leave your chute until your feet hit the water though," Ron said. "A while ago, they used to tell us to drop out of our chutes when we were about ten feet above the water."

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but they changed that because of the problems found in judging distances.

They found that when you're coming down over your target, the flat surface it's very difficult to judge your altitude.

"There have been guys who have dropped out of their chutes thinking they were ten feet up when they were actually about 400 feet above the surface."

"In Texas there were two guys jumping at night who thought they were going to come down in a river, but they did connect all their straps and when they thought they were about ten feet up they let go. Well, they discovered that it wasn't a river but a road, and when they let go of their chutes they were 300 feet up."

"The ever since that incident they've told us to not let go of the chute until our feet are wet."

The cost of sport parachuting is so more expensive than many of the more conventional sports or hobby activities.

It's about equal to photography, golf, or small boat sailing. But much less expensive than sports racing, pleasure motor boating, or large boat sailing, and so on.

As Ron said, "There's only so much you can spend on a parachute. A parachute cost a couple of hundred dollars, and you can spend as much on a book, a helmet, and a pair of other gear and that's it. This price ceiling keeps snobby hobbyists out of sports."

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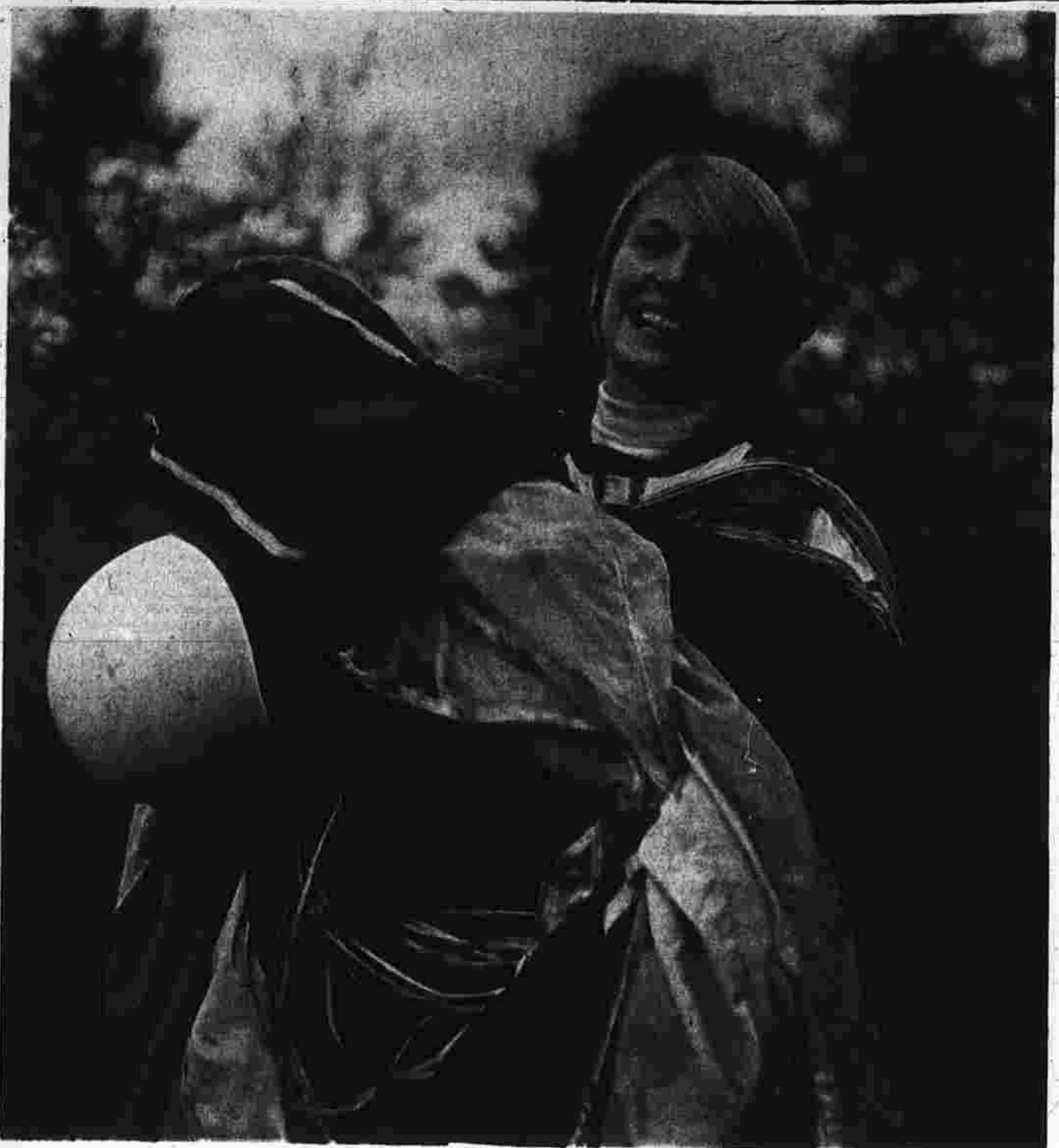

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Soviet Writers' Union Ousts Critical Author

MOSCOW (AP)—The Writers' Union of the Russian Federation has approved the expulsion of author Alexander Solzhenitsyn on the grounds he portrayed Soviet life in a negative way, informed sources reported today.

Solzhenitsyn wrote the book "A Day in the Life of Ivan Denisovich," "Cancer Ward" and "The First Circle" which were published in the West.

The informants said the Writers' Union charged Solzhenitsyn did not take sufficient action to block publication of his works abroad.

The case appeared to be shaping up as one of the most sensational in the Soviet literary world since Boris Pasternak was forced to decline the Nobel Prize in 1958. It apparently represents another step toward Stalin-like repression of writers by the present Kremlin leadership.

Solzhenitsyn, 51, first gained worldwide fame with the publication of his prison camp novel, "A Day in the Life of Ivan Denisovich." Former President Nikita S. Khrushchev ordered publication of that book to dramatize the crisis of Stalin's rule, which he condemned.

The present Soviet leaders have carried out a partial rehabilitation of Stalin and cracked down on writers who espoused freedom of expression and criticized conditions under communism.

Solzhenitsyn, a leader of this group, apparently had enjoyed a degree of immunity because of action against him would provoke bad publicity abroad for the Kremlin.

The Russian Federation Writers' Union refused to comment directly on the report of Solzhenitsyn's expulsion. A spokesman said, "Read the newspapers. Everything that needs to be reported will be printed there."

This seemed to corroborate the report and indicate an official account will appear soon.

Since the ouster of Khrushchev no Solzhenitsyn novel has been published in the Soviet Union. But mimeographed copies circulate of "Cancer Ward" and "The First Circle," both of which have appeared abroad and enhanced his reputation.

Solzhenitsyn has repeatedly denied responsibility for smuggling out the manuscripts. But at the same time he has made strenuous efforts to get the books published here, demanding the end of censorship.

This made him a hero to the literary underground and much of the outside world, but increased the hostility of the authorities against him.

Informants said last Tuesday he was summoned by the Writers' Union of his home town of Ryazan, 110 miles south-east of Moscow, and ordered expelled.

The Russian Federation the next day avoided confirming or denying this report, but said the case was under consideration.

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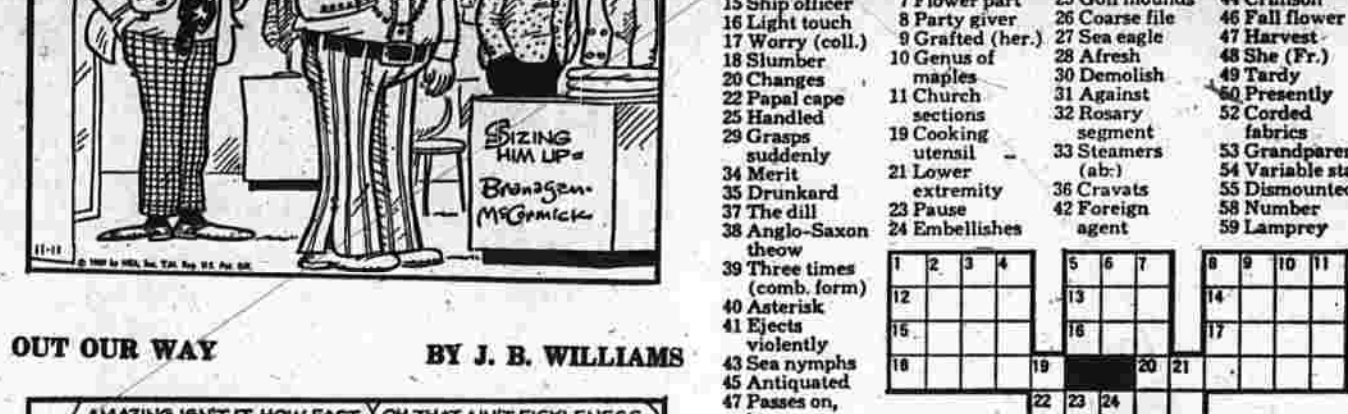

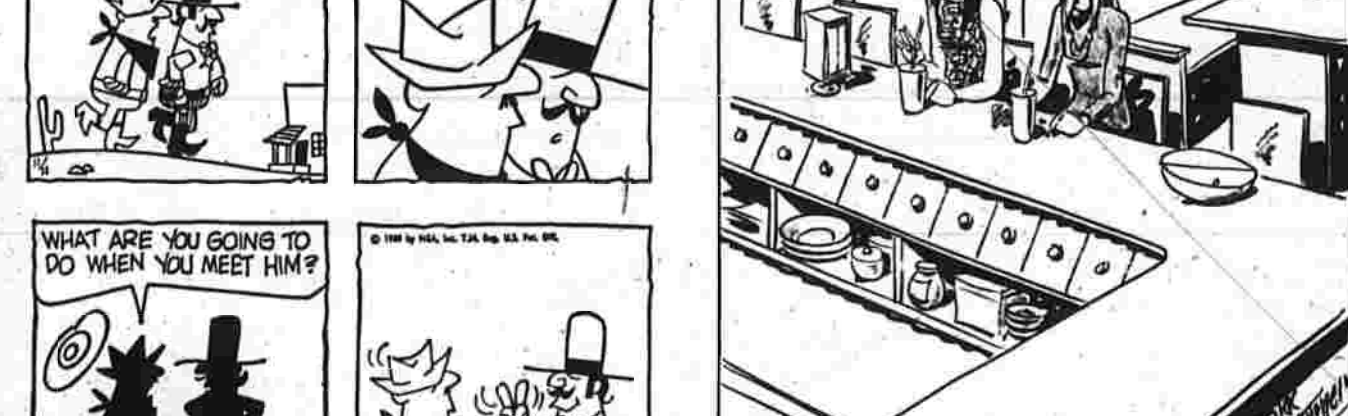

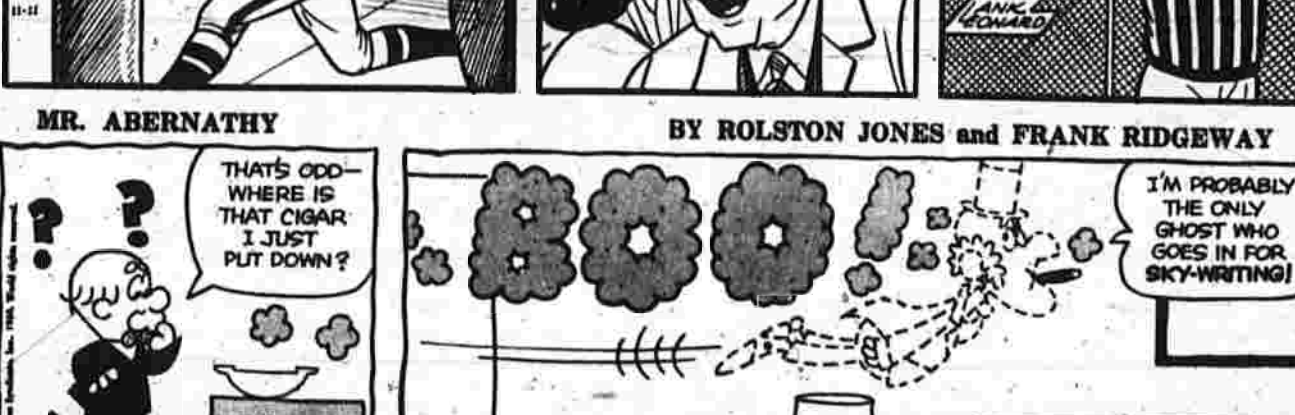

Bean Has Had Seven Years To Polish Handball Game

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — In the seven years he has been an astronaut, Alan L. Bean claims the most important thing he's done is play a spiced game of handball in the astronaut gymnasium.

He's the last member of the first three groups of astronauts to fly into space. Since his selection in 1963, he's been a bride-maid twice—serving two times as a back up crewman—had an Apollo 12 in his first space trip, and it's a big one.

Bean, a nearly bald, quiet speaking Texan, will be the fourth man to walk the surface of the moon. He is the immediate pilot on the second moon landing mission—and will spend about seven hours walking the moon.

While waiting for his chance to fly, Bean has spent more time than most playing handball in the astronaut gymnasium, the better players of the popular spaceman's sport.

"It's darn dangerous on that small court," he said.

Bean is something of a paragon of living lower-level executive than his Navy pilot and astronaut duties.

His mother said that at a frightened neighbors by climbing to the top of a roof and walking its ridge.

"He was always climbing to the top of some tree and testing the strength of the limbs," she says. "He always liked to be up high when he was little and to go fast."

When he turned 17, Bean quickly joined the Naval Reserve, the first step toward Navy wings.

"He came home and wanted me to sign these papers on his 17th birthday, but I wouldn't sign it," said his mother. "His father signed."

After graduation from high school in 1962, Bean went to the University of Texas on a Navy scholarship. He majored in aeronautical engineering and made firm plans to be a Navy pilot.

He was graduated in 1965, received a Navy commission and then earned his wings. After four years on an attack squadron, Bean attended the Navy test pilot school at Patuxent River, Md., and remained there as a test pilot after graduation.

Bean was on another attack squadron when the space agency selected him as a member of the third group of astronauts.

The Texas said "I think the future using a laser will make it a lot easier to fly on Apollo 12 with two experienced spacemen, Charles 'Pete' Conrad Jr., the commander, and Richard F. Gordon Jr., the command module pilot.

"We think alike and fly together like a team," he said. "I think the Texas demonstrated on a couple of flights and Dick's demonstration of the power supply that you're good feeling when you're a rookie."

All three are Navy commanders.

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP) — A tiny television camera worn like a miner's headlamp to give sight to the blind should be ready for testing on human beings in three to four years, an eye research scientist says.

Physician Herbert Schimmel of Albert Einstein College of Medicine in New York told a seminar for science writers Tuesday that miniaturization of equipment will permit fabrication of a prototype device next year.

"Tests with animals should come in 1971-72," he said, "followed by tests with humans in 1973-74."

Development of a television camera small enough to fit in the eye socket might come within a year or two, Schimmel said.

He said the artificial eye would work this way:

Electronic signals from the camera would be transmitted to a tiny wire implanted in the brain in an area known as the visual cortex, which normally receives impulses from the eye.

The brain would translate these signals into images which would show motion, depth and color, Schimmel said.

Another speaker at the seminar, sponsored by Research to Prevent Blindness, Inc., a Philadelphia-based organization, said that the device would be used to give sight to the blind.

Recout of Votes In New Haven Altered Nothing

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — A recount of the votes in last Tuesday's municipal election did not change any of the results.

Republican Albert Chalandria, who had served 28 years as a selectman, forced the citywide recount. Chalandria had come in sixth in a field of six (five were elected) and the recount Monday showed that he was 21 votes behind his nearest competitor, instead of just seven votes behind as originally tallied.

The recount also reaffirmed the three-way defeat of Democratic Alderman Blase L. Garbali, who had sought a recount in his district.

The recount turned up votes in every ward on the question of whether to allow banners and raffles in New Haven—although the original count had listed no votes on the referendum question in three wards. The outcome of the referendum remained the same—banners and raffles were overwhelmingly approved.

The office of selectman which Chalandria had occupied is a relatively minor one in New Haven, having to do with the qualifications of voters.
