

Kennedy Sr. Near Death

HYANNIS PORT, Mass. (AP) — Former Ambassador Joseph P. Kennedy, father of an American political dynasty, was near death today at his seaside home in the Kennedy compound on Cape Cod.

His sole surviving son, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., was at his bedside.

His condition was described as "very low" by his son-in-law, Ambassador Sargent Shriver, shortly before 8 a.m.

"The end is only a matter of hours away," Shriver told a newsmen after attending early morning Mass at St. Francis Xavier Roman Catholic Church in Hyannis.

Kennedy, father of the late President John F. Kennedy, is 81 and has been in poor health for eight years.

He suffered what a doctor said was a minor heart attack over the weekend.

Shriver said the former ambassador has been unable to eat for several days.

Shriver and his wife, Eunice, Kennedy's eldest daughter, flew here Sunday from Paris. Shriver is U.S. ambassador to France.

Mrs. Rose Kennedy, matriarch of the Kennedy clan, also attended Mass this morning at St. Francis Xavier's, though not with Shriver. She entered the tiny church quickly, and remained inside for several minutes after the service was over.

There was no word on whether Kennedy was conscious, but one unofficial source said he was given the last rites of the Roman Catholic Church Sunday.

Richard Cardinal Cushing of Boston, a long-time family friend, said Sunday that he had received a telephone call from the family "advising me that he had a very serious setback, and it seems that the good Lord is about to take him in the foreseeable future."

Woman Found Slain In Bolton Woods

State police are still trying to identify a young woman whose body was found a few feet off the unpopulated section of South Rd., in Bolton yesterday afternoon. She was apparently shot to death.

The body was discovered at 1:30 p.m. yesterday by Philip Jacques of South Rd., who had been fishing the nearby stream with his four-year-old son. As soon as he sighted it, Jacques hurried to the home of his neighbor, David Sharpley. Together with the older Sharpley boys, they returned to the spot and confirmed that it was a body.

Mrs. Sharpley, meanwhile, called the state police.

Mrs. Sharpley described this sequence of events today. She said that her husband and Jacques had reported that the body was lying on its back on the leaves by a paved embankment near a small culvert which carries water under the road. The young woman had one arm over her chest. Mrs. Sharpley

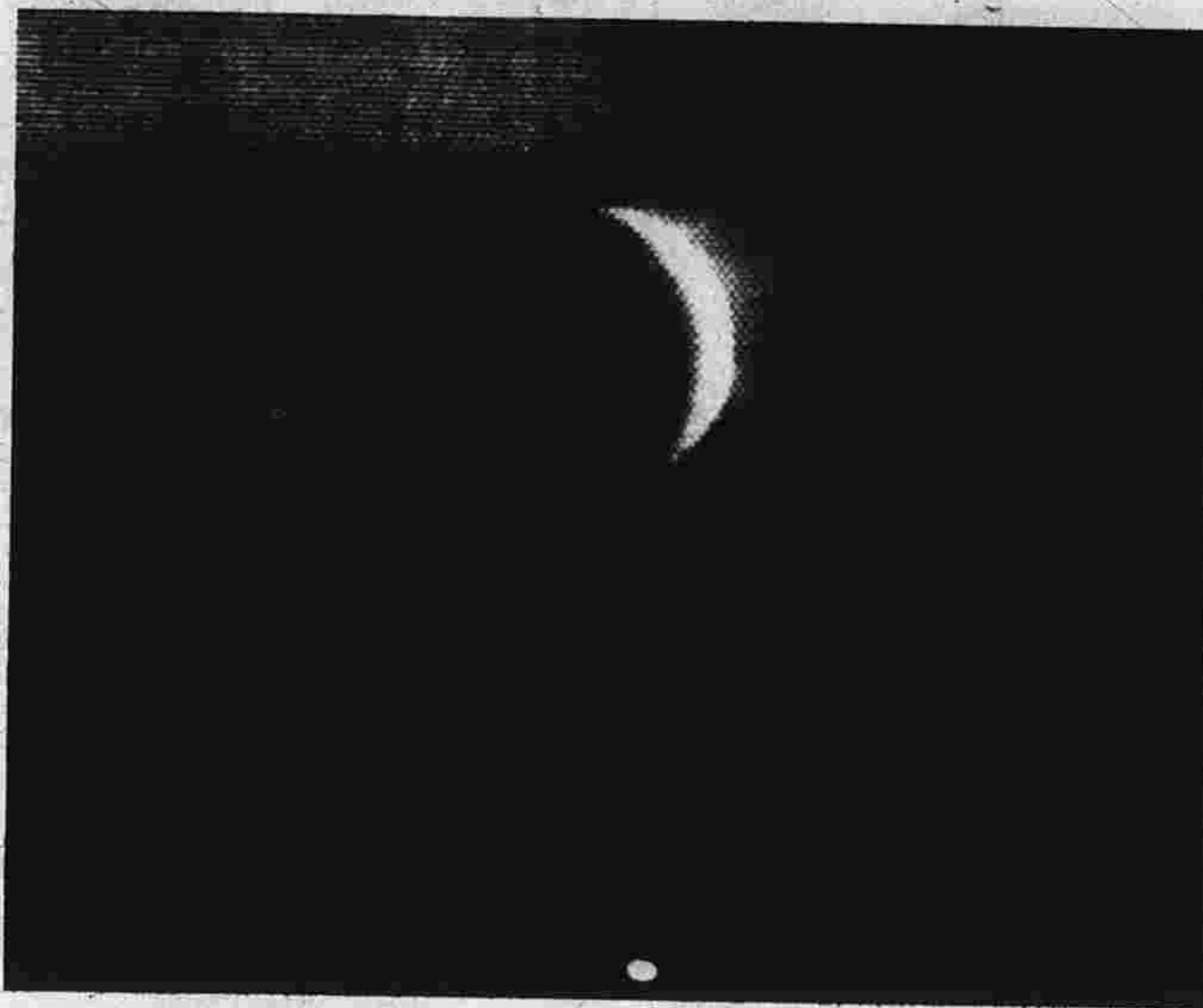
reported, but no blood was evident.

The young woman had gunshot wounds in her back. But these were not visible to the Sharpleys and Jacques. Mrs. Sharpley said. They mentioned a big bruise on her forehead, Mrs. Sharpley reported.

The body was found on a particularly deserted section of South Rd., which runs from Rt. 6 to Rt. 44A. At the Rt. 6 end, where there are no houses, there is a sharp curve as the road ascends the hill. The body was found beyond this on the right side of the road, about 10 feet from the edge. The embankment would have hid the body from the view of passing motorists. The open woods area is littered with bottles and beer cans. The nearest house is visible up the hill through the trees, about one-eighth mile away.

Moon-Talk Glossary

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — Here are some terms used in the moon mission of Apollo 12:

LOI—Lunar Orbit Insertion. LOI-1 puts Apollo 12 into an orbit of the moon. LOI-2 changes the orbit.

Apolune—High point in an orbit of the moon.

Perilune—Low point in an orbit of the moon.

DPS—Descent propellant system (pronounced "dips"), the rocket engine which lands the Intrepid on the moon.

APS—Ascent propulsion system, the rocket engine on the upper stage of Intrepid which launches it from the moon.

Soft Undock—Partial unatching of docking mechanism between command and landing craft.

IVT—Intravehicular transfer. Men moving between the landing and command modules while the craft are joined together.

EVA—Extravehicular activity. Working in space (spacewalk) or on the moon outside the lander (moonwalk).

Terminator—the line between darkness and sunlight on a heavenly body.

S-Band antennae—Antennae Charles Conrad will erect on the moon to improve radio and television links with earth.

PGS—Primary guidance system (pronounced "pings"), steering system on Intrepid.

AGS—Abort guidance system on lunar module. Automatically controls APS rocket firing for rendezvous with command module.

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Apollo in Lunar Orb: Crew in Slumberland

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — America's Apollo 12 explorers swept into the grip of lunar gravity today as the good ship Yankee Clipper hurtled unerringly toward a Monday night orbit of the moon.

Their target, a shimmering silver crescent, loomed larger and larger as their home planet shrank in the distance.

At 8:38 a.m., astronauts Charles Conrad Jr., Richard F. Gordon Jr. and Alan L. Bean slipped through a so-called "twilight zone" in which the gravitational influence of the earth and moon is equal.

Once across this invisible line, lunar gravity took hold and Apollo 12's speed accelerated after slowing to about 1,600 miles an hour on the long outward coast. The ship was racing toward a so-called "twilight zone" in which the gravitational influence of the earth and moon is about equal.

At 8:38 a.m. EST today, the moon will win the gravitational tug-of-war and the astronauts for the first time will be in the grasp of lunar gravity. They pass through the invisible barrier when they are 211,322 miles from earth and 38,933 miles from the moon.

The spacecraft's speed then begins increasing as Apollo 12

As Conrad and Bean moved into the lunar module for the familiarization check, the camera watched as they removed the tunnel hatch and the harpoon-like docking mechanism to clear the tunnel.

Inside the lander cabin, the astronauts beamed pictures of the control panels, the back packs they'll wear on the moon, window markings that will help them land on the moon and dust particles floating in weightlessness.

Through one window they showed the receding earth, about three-quarters in darkness. And through another they pictured the moon, a thin sliver of light.

"The view is spectacular," Bean commented.

"It seems that we're in suspended animation," Conrad said.

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Villagers Say:

460 Vietnamese Civilians Died During 1968 GI Maneuver

SAIGON (AP) — The province chief of Quang Ngai province said today that villagers told him 460 Vietnamese civilians were killed during an American military operation in March 1968, but he said he had no firm evidence they were executed by American troops.

Two soldiers, a lieutenant and a staff sergeant, have been arrested in connection with the alleged massacre on March 16, 1968, at Song My village, six miles northeast of Quang Ngai city.

Newweek magazine and the New York Times reported Sunday, however, that eyewitnesses said 50 or more soldiers were involved. They said the villagers were herded together, their homes destroyed, and then they were mowed down by GI gunfire.

The province chief, Col. Ton That Khien, said in a telephone interview that three months after the operation by the U.S. Army's Division, villagers "cried that the Americans killed them when they went through the village and made contact with the Viet Cong and they opened fire."

Asked if he believed the villagers were telling the truth, he said: "I think there is some truth but there is also an exaggeration of it. Maybe they exaggerate because of Viet Cong propaganda, because it is a Viet Cong hamlet and the people have been trained by the Communists. The people are guided by the Viet Cong."

Khien said American and Vietnamese investigators from Saigon visited his area about a year ago and discussed the incident. He said the investigators "could not go into the hamlet because it was still in Viet Cong control."

Asked if the Viet Cong still control the village, he said: "No, sir, there's only snipers."

The colonel said villagers told him that 370 civilians were killed in one hamlet called Tu Cung and another 90 were killed in the hamlet of My Ho. Both are part of Song My village.

Khien said he could not confirm the number of dead, that "is the village chief's report."

Asked if he believed the village chief's report, Khien replied: "No, because he was not there."

Khien said he had not spoken to any witnesses to the killings.

"When the villagers told me the Americans deliberately opened fire on them," he said, "I asked, 'Who saw this?' They said they didn't see it for themselves."

Khien said he was aware that bodies of civilians had been buried

in rice fields outside the village. But he said there were no plans to dig them up because "they are old bodies."

The colonel added: "I think that these incidents happen easily because some of the fighting is in strong Viet Cong-held villages and people get killed along with the Viet Cong by the bombing and the artillery."

"I operate with the American Division and never do they deliberately kill the population. If they kill civilians, it's an accident."

Khien said he had expressed this view to the investigators from Saigon about the incident.

Both the U.S. Command and U.S. Army headquarters in Saigon refused to comment on the published reports of the alleged massacres, saying they lacked sufficient information to discuss the case.

"We have no records," said an Army spokesman, "everybody involved in the case is gone, and the investigation is being conducted under another command's jurisdiction. We have nothing to base a statement on."

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Arms Envoys Begin Talks

HELSINKI, Finland (AP)—U. S. and Soviet envoys met today to begin preparations for arms limitation talks and President Nixon told his delegation he hopes for a halt to the nuclear arms race and eventually its reversal.

"You are embarking upon one of the most momentous negotiations ever entrusted to an American delegation," Nixon said in a special message read by chief U.S. negotiator Gerard C. Smith at the opening of the talks first proposed by President Lyndon B. Johnson three years ago.

Nixon declared a curb on the missile race would help both the United States and the Soviet Union without damaging their legitimate defense needs.

"I am convinced that the limitation of strategic arms is in the mutual interest of our country and the Soviet Union," the President said.

"Today... you will begin what all of your fellow citizens in the United States, and, I believe, all people throughout the world, profoundly hope will be a sustained effort not only to limit the buildup of strategic forces but to reverse it...."

"We are prepared to discuss limitations on all offensive and defense systems, and to reach agreements in which both sides can have confidence...."

"We seek no unilateral advantage. Nor do we seek arrangements which could be prejudicial to the interests of third parties...."

Nixon said it is possible that both powers can carry out their defense responsibilities "under a mutually acceptable limitation and eventual reduction of our strategic arsenals."

Chief Soviet negotiator Vladimir S. Semonov and Ahti Karjalainen, foreign minister of the host Finnish government, joined in voicing support for the talks. Semonov's statement was similar in some respects to Nixon's.

He declared that Moscow is looking for a limitation of strategic arms which would be "not prejudicial" to either the Soviet Union or the United States.

He voiced hope for achievements from the talks which would be "not only in the mutual interests of the Soviet and American peoples but also other countries of the world."

The Finnish foreign minister said that by beginning the discussions, the two great powers "which are in control of the major part of the nuclear arsenal of the world" have in part acknowledged "their supreme responsibility for the maintenance of international peace and security."

He saw the Helsinki beginning as evidence of the superpowers' "willingness to advance in the field of disarmament" and proceed along the path shown by the partial test ban and the nuclear nonproliferation treaties.

The Nixon message, which comprised the main portion of Smith's remarks, spoke of difficulties as well as hopes for the negotiations which—if successful—are expected to run for months, perhaps years.

The President noted that the fast advancing technology of modern weapons makes their control "an exceedingly complex endeavor." And suspicion and distrust must be dispelled

to achieve a disarmament accord, he said.

Furthermore, the President recalled that wars and international crises in the past have come not just from the existence of arms but from clashing interests or "the ambitious pursuit" of national interests.

"That is why we seek progress toward the solution of this dangerous political issue of our day...."

The U.S. and Soviet negotiators met for about a half an hour in their first private session immediately following the opening ceremony. A U.S. spokesman termed the initial meeting "entirely procedural" and called the atmosphere "cordial."

The down-to-business session at the American Embassy Tuesday will start at 11 a.m. Helsinki time (4 a.m. EST), he said. How often the negotiators will meet after that is still undecided, he added.

The Russians have favored daily secret discussions. The Americans tend toward meeting on alternate days, on grounds that the intervening time is needed for preparation. The sessions are to rotate between the U.S. and Soviet embassies.

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Mr. Speaker Soon to Have Last Word

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP)—It was a shock to some visitors to see the bearded, respectfully-robbed white man overruling African members of Kenya's Parliament and on occasion even the country's attorney general. They would see it much longer, for Humphrey Slade has just announced plans to leave the speakership he has held since 1960.

"As I told the president," Slade remarked to an interviewer, "you don't want the head of an institution to become an institution himself."

Of his wine robes and powdered wig, the 64-year-old lawyer said he had asked the Kenyans repeatedly "if they wanted to junk that archaic European outfit as a remnant of colonialism. But they said they wanted to keep it."

Slade said he thought it was part of his job to assure all minority voices a hearing in Parliament. He added that though a white speaker was preferred by the Africans here at first because one might be more objective than a man from one of Kenya's 50 tribes.

Only one member of Parliament in anticipation of new elections, Slade will remain on the job until Parliament is reconvened and elected a new speaker.

Slade has been compared with a schoolmaster and he agreed his role was to teach, but added: "I think it is the time when Parliament needs a change of horses; we are entering a different phase of Kenya's history."

But he has no fear of the future of these Parliamentarians. Educated at Eton and Oxford, Slade came to Kenya about 40 years ago and served on the ruling council for 17 years. The father of four and a grandfather, he is fond and patient in his garden when he retires.

The newspaper East African Standard commented: "No Parliament could have wished for a better speaker, patient and tolerant yet firm when necessary."

Independence, Objectivity Enliven French TV News

PARIS (AP)—A television news program in France is being discussed in France as well as in the United States. But here the focus centers on efforts to bring the politics out of the government-run radio and television networks.

Viewers of newscasts are seeing unusual things: Interviews with opposition leaders, students telling their side of the school problem, and an author actually taking to task the president of the republic.

The new policy is to put the networks in the hands of professional newsmen. They are to be seen as a "public trust" rather than as instruments of government policy.

The word 'objectivity' is too vague," Pierre Desgraupes, who runs the news programs on Channel One, said in an interview. "I don't say honesty and accuracy."

Desgraupes, 50, showed his glasses up onto his thinning hair and jabbed at a 45-second-long telephone console to stop the buzzing.

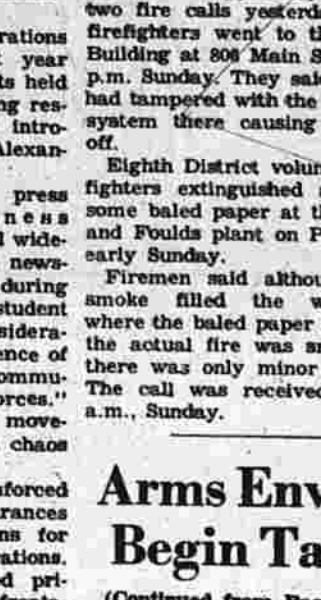

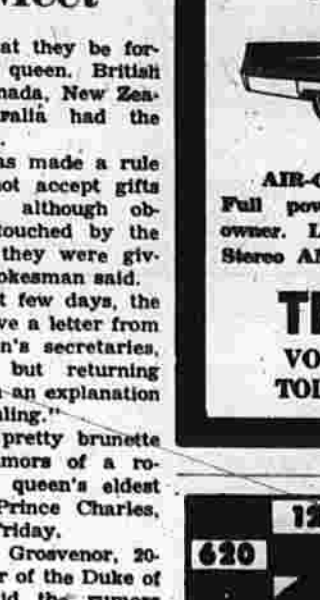

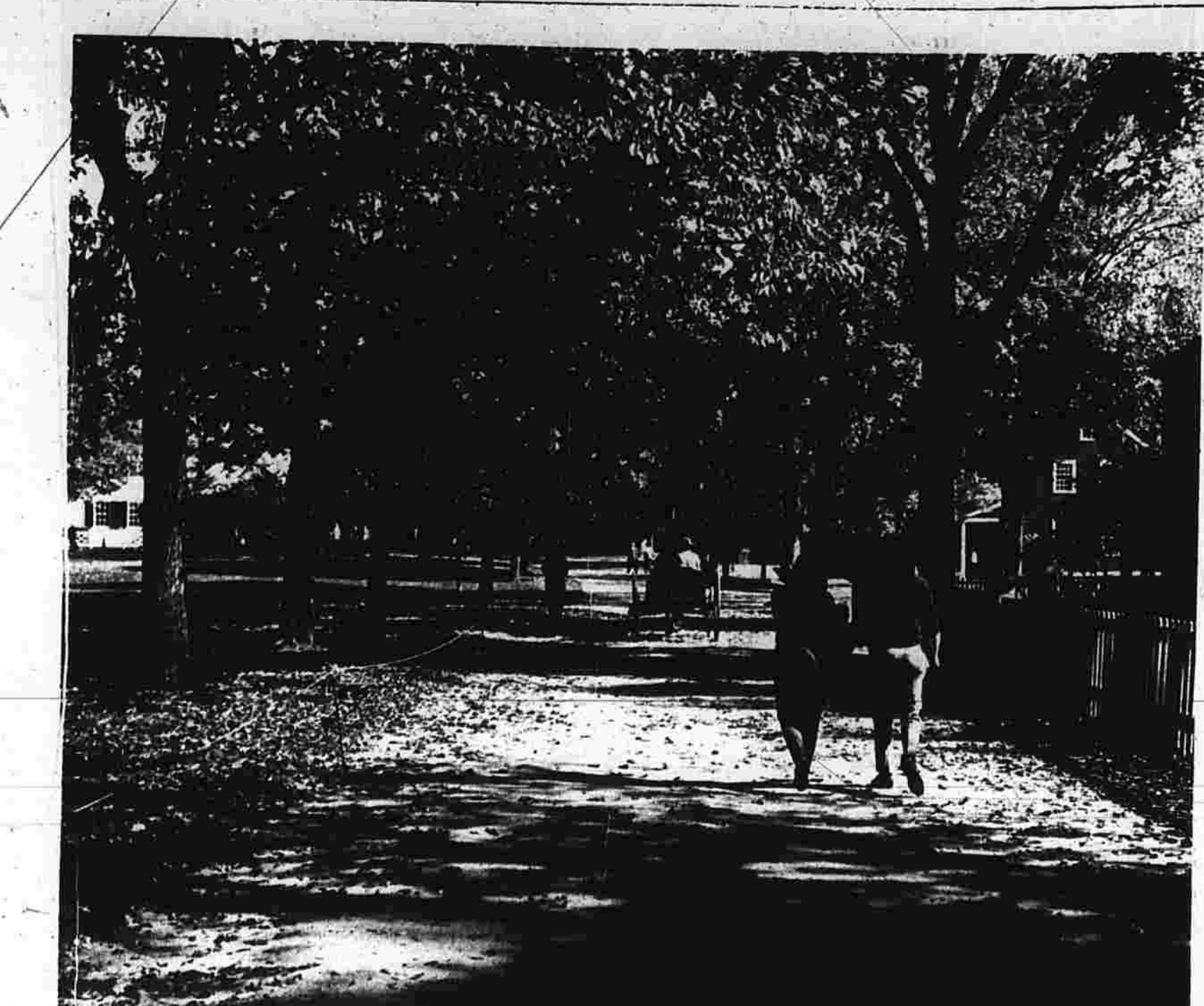

In Its Centennial Year Suez Empty Except for War Debris

CAIRO (AP) — It was one of those rare days for human endeavor, the realization of a dream thousands of years old shared by pharaohs and potentates. It was also a sublime day of achievement for a stubbornly dedicated Frenchman named Ferdinand de Lesseps.

The date was Nov. 17, 1869. Just a century ago. The occasion was the opening of the Suez Canal, linking the Mediterranean with the Indian Ocean, a new ribbon of trade between East and West.

There is no centennial celebration. The canal has been little more than two years and no one can say when—or, indeed, if ever—it can resume its place in commerce. Once a busy avenue of maritime traffic, the canal now serves as a most uneasy witness to two fierce antagonists. It marks an uneasy cease-fire line between Egyptian and Israeli troops—and a "cease-fire" in name only. Artillery and rocket barrages rain destruction and death among the forces dug in along each bank of the canal's 163-mile length.

But that day in 1869 was a proud one for the ruler of Egypt, the Khedive Ismail, who played host to a plethora of European royalty. Ornate displays of fireworks lit the skies to honor the spectators.

Headless of expense, the Khedive built a palace on the Nile in Cairo for his guest of honor, the Empress Eugenie of France, whose husband Napoleon III had played a crucial role in making the canal possible. The Khedive imported 1,000 cooks and servants from Europe to see to the comfort of his guests. Mountains of food were prepared for the series of banquets and feasts, including a grand ball for 4,000 persons.

A new opera house stood gleaming amid a park in Cairo. The Khedive later commissioned the Italian composer Giuseppe Verdi to write a special opera, "Aida," on an Egyptian theme which eventually would have its world premiere in this new opera house two years later. Verdi's "Aida" script missed the canal opening, but the composer was represented by "Rigoletto."

Months before Ismail had toured the capitals of Europe to invite the noble and the famous and the wealthy to attend the ceremonies. He asked about a thousand notables, including

Coventry School Program Readied For Exceptional Children

Arnold Pressman, director of Pupil Personnel Service in the local schools, has announced a plan that will aid in the implementation of General Statute 10-76, the law that requires towns to provide educational programs for exceptional children.

Pressman said last week that the financial burden of the law on the towns cannot be estimated as yet, but that it could be considerable. The most important step in implementing the statute was the Board of Education's approval recently to set up a special primary class for the educationally handicapped child.

Pressman reported that he has notified area superintendents of schools of this program, and asked for their comments and questions on it.

It is hoped that area towns might wish to join in such a program, sending primary school students in need of such a class to the Coventry class. Then, a similar program for the middle-school level, and one for the high school level, might be set up in other towns, so that ultimately, the towns could provide these programs on a cooperative basis.

Pressman explained that the class for the educationally handicapped child is specifically set up for those with behavior or learning problems, and that it will provide these children with a structured environment, as opposed to the more flexible program in the regular classroom.

It is hoped that the class will begin on or about Dec. 1, but Pressman said that a teacher has yet to be hired for the position. When the program does begin, children participating in it will still spend some of their time in the regular classroom, at which time the special teacher will be assisting the regular classroom teacher.

In the special class for the educationally handicapped, instruction would be highly individualized, and in small groups, with more than 10 youngsters. In the class, the child would be learning both new and missed academic skills and ways to become a group member. Hopefully, Pressman said, the class would be open-ended, that is, set up to serve youngsters for a relatively short time and return gradually to the regular classroom.

Pressman cited another advantage of the special class as being that it would take some pressure off the regular classroom teacher, at least until a

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Japanese Economy Leaps Toward 1980s

NEW YORK (AP) — One hundred and one years ago the Japanese emperor issued an edict to his people to "cleanse unbridled practices of the past." He encouraged them to "seek new knowledge from the rest of the world."

Thus ended three centuries of isolation. And thus also were laid the beginnings of an economic story that some observers feel is as significant to world affairs as the growth to world leadership of the U.S. economy.

The Japanese economy is growing at an amazing rate, somewhere around 13 or 14 percent in real dollars. And the way Japanese manufacturers are moving back into expanded facilities, that rate may continue for years.

Match this against a rate of 6 or 7 percent which most nations would be happy to achieve, but seldom do. Japan's rate is twice that of its competitors.

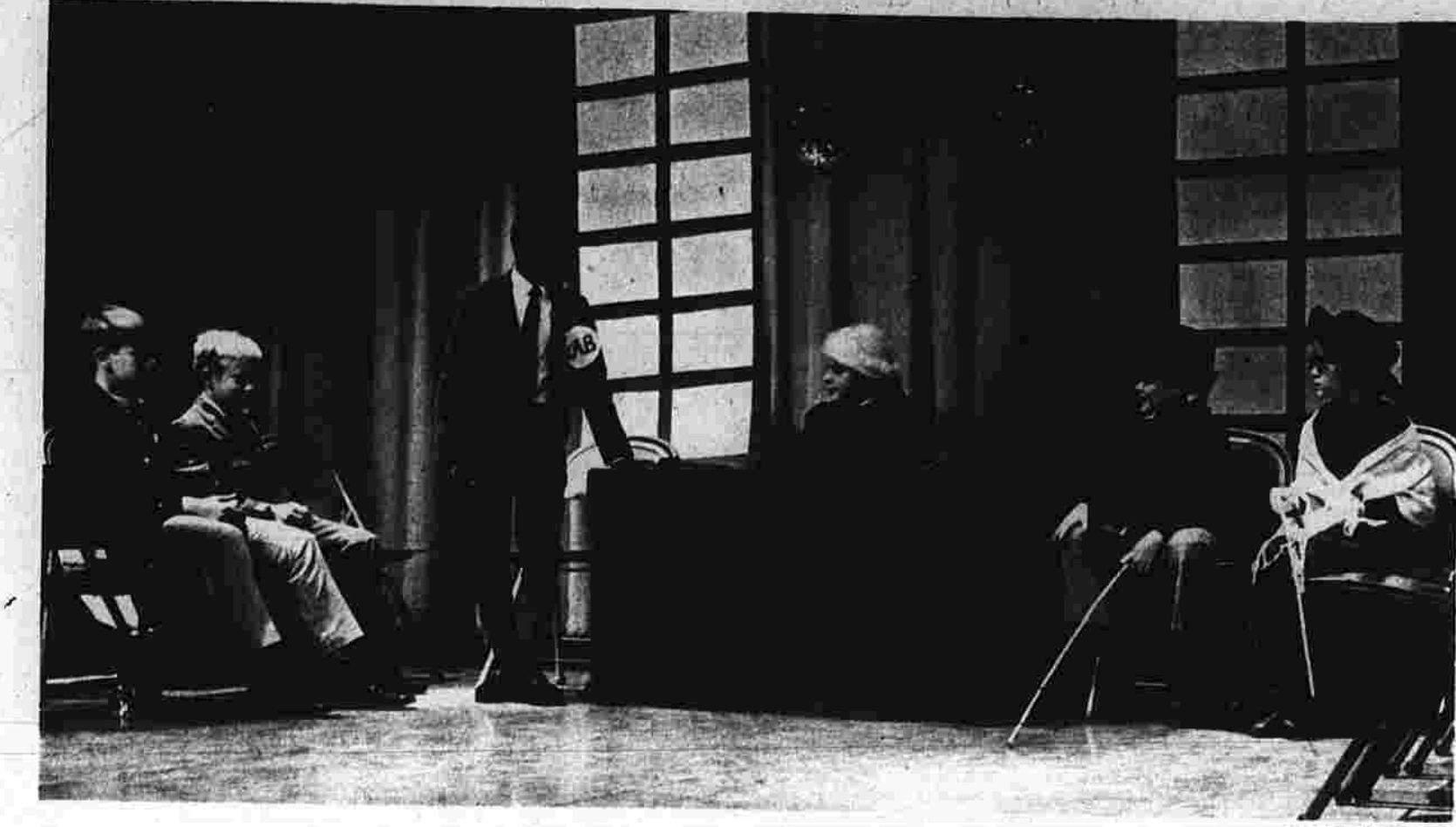
Rising from economic devastation following World War II, this island nation that is physically smaller than California, achieved by 1955 a production rate equal to that of its immediate pre-war years. But even faster growth was ahead, and Japan is now the third largest industrial power behind the United States and the Soviet Union.

It leads the world in shipbuilding, production of cotton yarn, machinery, watches and radios, motorcycles, cameras, sewing machines, artificial fibers and television sets. And it is third in steel, paper, cement and oil refinery products.

With such an abundant output, Japanese businessmen are searching for ways to sell their products and, in many instances, scoring the day's gains out of domestic companies.

There is a reason for the zeal with which Japanese business men approach foreign sales. Japan must export or perish. If its goods are not bought abroad, the nation could not afford to import its basic foods and raw materials.

This situation makes the Japanese story all the more amazing. Barely out of raw materials, Japan depends on imports for her oil, iron, wheat, cotton, coal, timber and a long list of other products.

motorcycles, they smoke, talk, and watch the passing traffic. When that fires, they kick and dash quickly down sidewalks, start, passengers board sidewalks on the back, and off they swarm down the streets at top speed, weaving in and out of slow automobile traffic, paying little attention to signals and lines.

Hartford Fire Stock Earns ITT \$20 Million

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — State Insurance Commissioner William R. Cotter heard from officials of International Telephone and Telegraph Corp. Friday that the firm has already made \$20 million on its transactions in Hartford Fire Insurance Co. stock.

A merger of the two companies is pending, and the hearing was called to determine its effect on stockholders and policyholders.

The ITT officials told how they bought 1.3 million shares of Hartford Fire stock in November, 1968 for about \$81 a share, and another 500,000 shares by the end of December.

On Dec. 25, they said, they proposed the merger with Hartford Fire, and did not sell the stock until the past month when an Italian bank bought it for \$82 and \$83 a share. The stock was valued at \$100 a share according to ITT officials, was about \$70.

The stock was disposed of after the merger was approved by a U.S. Justice Department request for a court order to block it—was turned down Oct. 21 by U.S. District Court Judge William H. Timmerman in New Haven.

The main spokesman for ITT at the hearing was Hart Furry, executive vice president for finance.

Cotter asked that ITT file with his office the details of an agreement between the Italian bank and ITT. According to the testimony, the agreement provides the bank against some losses according to ITT to take part in certain profits.

Low Bid \$95,100 On Water Tanks

The Fisher Tank Co. of Chester, Pa., with a total price of \$95,100, is the apparent low bidder for erecting two water-storage tanks and for painting the interior of an existing one.

Fisher bid \$44,000 for each of the two tanks and \$4,100 for painting the interior of the 200,000-gallon, existing tank, situated at the end of Garth Rd., on the Rockledge section.

The two new tanks will be of 800,000-gallon capacity each, with one to be erected next to the existing Rockledge tank and the other at the end of Lookout Mt. Rd.

The existing tank will be emptied and painted when the new one is up to it is completed.

Fisher's bid is below estimates. Ortwell Engineering, which prepared the specs, estimated the cost of the new tanks at \$80,000 each. He estimate had been made of the paint job.

Others who submitted bids today are: Pittsburgh-Des Moines Steel Co. of Waltham, Mass., \$104,700 total (\$99,600 for the new tanks and \$5,100 for the painting); Caldwell Tanks Inc. of Louisville, Ky., \$113,270 total (\$107,800 for the new tank and \$5,470 for the painting); and Chicago Bridge & Iron Co. of Boston, \$114,700 total (\$112,800 for the new tanks and \$1,900 for the painting).

The cost of the new tanks will be the determining factor in the award of a contract. The cost of painting the old tank is academic, since the contractor will be erecting the tank next to it.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States still has chemical warfare agents on Okinawa, nearly four months after announcing plans to speed their removal.
The question could come up for discussion by President Nixon and Saturday at Bailey Auditorium, Manchester High School, including a matinee performance on Saturday.

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Panel Suggests Linkup of U.S., Soviet Satellites

NEW YORK (AP) — The United States and the Soviet Union should join their communications satellite systems into a worldwide communications link for all nations, experts from a panel of scientists and engineers said.
The proposal was made Sunday by the Carnegie Institute of Washington, a non-profit organization for international peace and the Twentieth Century Fund, summarizing the conclusions of a conference of experts held Sept. 21-23 in Tallahassee, Florida.
The report concluded that "the satellite systems exist" in setting up such a system. It stated the 60-nation United States Inland system and Russia's satellite system could be merged without technical difficulties.
"Their orbital systems are complementary; their frequencies can be coordinated; and their ground stations can operate in either system and their transmitting and receiving equipment can be shared in operation in both systems," the report said.
"All nations should have access to a global, integrated communications satellite system. No political conditions should be applied to membership," the report continued.
It said the system would be internationally controlled by a body whose voting rules would give recognition to "special contributions" of the United States and the Soviet Union "while recognizing the interests of virtually all nations." It did not suggest any specific voting plan.
Participants in the conference included two Americans, and one delegate each from the Soviet Union, Britain, France, Nigeria, Japan, India, Canada, Poland, Mexico, the United Nations and the International Broadcast Institute. The members spoke as individuals and not as official representatives.

Third Ballot Recount In Bristol Ends In Tie

BRISTOL (AP) — A third count of the ballots in a contested city council election resulted in a tie Saturday afternoon.
Democratic councilman Frank Longo won the original election, and Republican Allan Treador who won on the second count both garnered 8,883 votes in the latest count.
At stake is the city's sixth seat on a city council which already includes three Republicans and two Democrats.
The situation is further complicated by the prospect of challenges to individual absentee ballots by both candidates.

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP)—America's Apollo 12 explorers circled the moon in perfect orbit today, only hours away from a ball-eye landing on the craggy, pockmarked surface and near a second expedition to this mysterious world.

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
