Sheinwold on Bridge

COUNT YOUR BRICKS IN PLANNING PLAY

By ALFRED SHEINWOLD

You can often get away with planning the play of a hand on by after you have played a few tricks. The cards are sometimes well placed, or the opponents misjudge the defense, and you somehow land on your feet. So don't pay any attention to the top hand; it probably won't happen to you.

South dealer.

Both sides vulnerable.

Opening lead—Two of Hearts. South won the trick with the king of spades without giving the hand any thought at all. When both opponents played low trumps, South led the queen of spades next.

East took the ace of spades with ominous speed and just as ominously returned a third round of trumps. This led to two trumps in the dummy, and South eventually discovered that he couldn't ruff three red cards with only two trumps. South lost the ace of spades, a club trick, a diamond, and one other red card that he couldn't ruff in dummy.

South should count his tricks from the very beginning of the hand. He can win three aces and a king in the side suits and therefore needs six trump tricks to make his contract. This can be done by ruffing three cards in the dummy, but it is much simpler to ruff two cards in the South hand.

After taking the ace of hearts South should lead a club and try the finesse. This takes the king of clubs and will probably lead out the ace of trumps and there is a long trump. South leads a club to the ace, ruffs a club, ruffs a heart in dummy to ruff another club and ruffs another heart to return to dummy.

Declarer then leads the ten of spades to draw the last trump and catches the top diamonds to amass a total of 10 tricks.

Fish-In Delays Installation Of Drill Platform

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (AP) — Remembering the oil blowout that blackened their beaches last January, residents held a fish-in today to block installation of a new offshore drilling platform.

Ballboats and motor boats occupied the area where Sun Oil Co. prepared to erect a 300-foot high platform in the Santa Barbara Channel. It would be the 13th on channel waters.

Sun anchored tugboats and barges, which carried the platform from Oakland, near the site after dark Thursday, but held off installation of the platform until daytime to avoid a night confrontation.

Six boats in the fish-in took turns anchoring at the installation area overnight, and claimed right-of-way over any vessel attempting to enter it.

Each boat dangled a fishhook in the water during its turn on guard. No catches were reported.

The area is six miles offshore and a half mile east of where a well under a similar platform operated by Union Oil Co. blew out Jan. 28, blackening 800 square miles of sea and 40 miles of beach.

Fearful the new platform and its well would incite another blowout for a similar blowout, a 700-member citizens committee to "Get Oil Out (GOO)" began the fish-in.

Alvin C. Weingard, chairman of GOO, said his organization would occupy the installation site until "there is a ruling by Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas as to whether he'll call a halt to all operations."

If Douglas' ruling is negative, "then we'll stay there until officially ordered to leave," Weingard said.

Four Principals' Reports Point to No Major Problems

The "Atrocity-Capability"

The atrocities of most wars are successfully concealed. Veterans go home with certain experiences they never talk about...

The war in Vietnam continues to be a different kind of war. It discloses and advertises its own atrocities as it goes along...

What has actually gone on—the actual amount of atrocities present in the war—may not be much different from that in other wars.

Such disclosure, when it comes, forces us into a new realm of thought about our young Americans and what we can do to them, or make them do.

The atrocity-capability which is disclosed in some of the actions of some of these young Americans is nothing any of us really has the moral right to condemn and deplore, as if from some higher and purer pedestal...

If there is going to be any pointing of fingers, then let it not be outward toward a few individuals in uniform, but inward, toward the whole national acceptance of war itself...

And as for our attitude toward the fact that such disclosures keep coming during this war, instead of being buried for a time in its mass graves...

A Minority Report

The news reports say that Americans, and all the rest of the world, seem to be taking Apollo 12 rather calmly...

Nevertheless, we request the privilege of making a minority report. There were moments when we felt it was even more of a miracle to be do-

ing this a second time than it had been to do it the first time.

Doing it once could even have been a combination of scientific skills with luck.

Doing it a second time, with even more precision than the first time—as it, indeed, it were some established, familiar old routine—is hard to believe.

Perhaps the most exciting element in this travel to the moon—for the complete layman—is his realization of what a great gulf of space there is, not between the earth and the moon...

In the first moon trip, the attention of the layman was fixed on the human drama up at the forward progress of the journey.

One might take that rather joyful moment, an Intrepid finally snuggled in close to the Yankee Clipper's camera...

It is not easy to get really sophisticated about space travel. The more we go, the more amazed some of us are.

Out Of The Street? The Vietnam moratorium demonstrations have made the point that there's a lot of deeply felt opposition to the war.

It is by now pretty evident, also, that the demonstrations are not going to topple the Nixon Administration. In fact, it seems to us their upshot has been to leave President Nixon in firmer command than ever before.

Not even the anti-war movement leaders are any longer talking about the big powers—to break that stalemate with a plan for settling the intractable results of the six-day war.

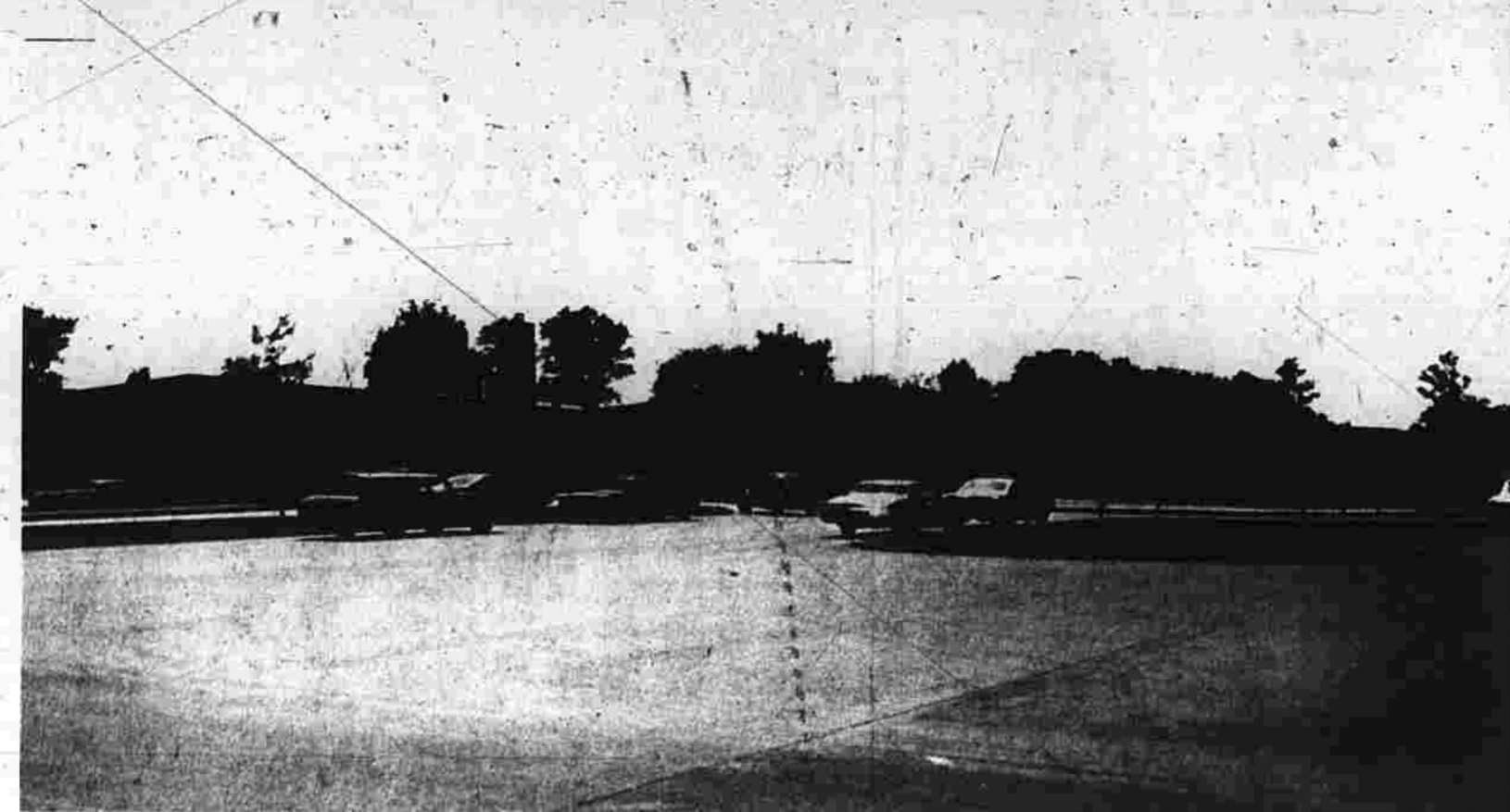
The latest moratorium, after all, resulted in the shooting of the streets of the capital. The fashionable circles have decided more or less to ignore this inconvenient fact.

The violence was wrought by only a few thousand of the demonstrators, of course, and was not the dominant mood of the event.

The danger of the appeal to the streets is precisely that you cannot control the chain of events you start.

Now that the streets will become a battleground, it is in electoral politics, not in the streets, that the real policy alternatives can be articulated and real national sentiment measured.

Street demonstrations are a heady sport; their chief success seems to be intoxicating the participants with their own virtues. We only hope they sober up enough to realize they are toying with fire, that the success of democracy depends on having the process and out of the streets—WALL STREET JOURNAL.

Volpe Sees New Era In City Transit

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Transportation Secretary Volpe said today that he sees a new era in transportation and all that's needed are breakthroughs in research and development.

Volpe, addressing the American Society of Mechanical Engineers Wednesday, discussed what he called new and exciting ways of moving people in crowded urban centers from city to city.

He said systems like the BART Coast's turbofan, air cushion vehicles and other new concepts are only the beginning.

"We need new ways to move commuters in a comfortable and stylish" he said. "That may mean dual-mode cars, demand responsive buses and so-called bus-on-demand."

"And we desperately need to speed up the internal combustion engine to smog-smothering many cities."

Volpe said the tracked air cushion vehicle, which operates on a low-pressure air cushion, is a promising new mode of mass transit.

"I look forward to the day when we can see a project started in the United States within months—instead of years—of its administration's present view."

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Polish Plane Is Hijacked To Vienna

VIENNA (AP) — Brandishing a boy pistol and talking menacingly to those which turned out to be dumplings, two young Poles hijacked a Polish twin-engine jetliner today and forced it to land in Vienna.

The men, both 20, were whisked away to police headquarters for questioning. The aviator with a warning label, a spokesman for West German Secretary Robert H. Finch says.

Although the spokesman would neither confirm nor deny that in the department's plan, he said Wednesday he "would not be surprised" at such a re-nouncement of the near future.

"The hijacking occurred on the same day two East Germans went on trial in West Berlin on charges of setting another Polish plane on fire."

Ulrich von Hof, 38, and Peter Jentz, 34, faced a three-month prison term for hijacking a plane Oct. 18.

The men who seized the plane today were reported to have boarded at Wrocław.

Near Bratislava, where the plane's route was near the Austrian border, they drew guns. They also said they had hidden bombs aboard the plane.

Immediately after the plane touched down, the two men were separated from the crew and passengers. An expert on explosives from the Austrian Interior Ministry hurried to the airport.

Officials said if his investigation revealed there were no explosives on board, the plane would be allowed to fly to Bratislava, 45 miles from Vienna.

CRPA Recommends Busing More Pupils

The Capitol Region Planning Agency (CRPA) last night endorsed a continuation of Project Concern and, without fixing any numbers, recommended that it be expanded.

It recommended that it continue to be a voluntary program, operated, evaluated and managed on a regional basis, with the Capitol Region Educational Council as the local agency to perform the project's educational functions. The educational council is composed of representatives from 28 Boards of Education in the Capitol Region.

Project Concern is a program of busing Hartford disadvantaged children to suburban schools. At present, about 800 children are in the program, including about 60 to Manchester.

Hartford Superintendent of Schools Merrill Blair is recommending expansion to include approximately 5,000 of the disadvantaged. The CRPA, which notes last night that making urban towns that now involved may participate in the program, recommended specifically that participation should continue to be on a voluntary basis.

It recommended also that state funds be made available, noting that it would be unrealistic to expect the City of Hartford to bear the cost alone and that it would be equally unrealistic to expect financial support from the participating suburban communities.

In endorsing Project Concern and recommending its expansion, the CRPA followed the recommendations of the State Committee on Health, Education and Welfare (HEW). The committee's report emphasizes, "should not be considered a long-term or permanent solution, nor should it be allowed to be a substitute for other programs which may take longer to implement."

The report continues, "It is only obvious to point out that if we had integrated communities, there would be no need for a busing program such as Project Concern. Thus we must continue to work for permanent solutions in housing and job opportunities, even while we are taking extraordinary measures to improve the educational opportunities of the present generation."

As an interim solution of the number of bused children will require the participation of more suburban school systems in order to become a substitute for more permanent solutions, such as three city children per classroom. Such participation should

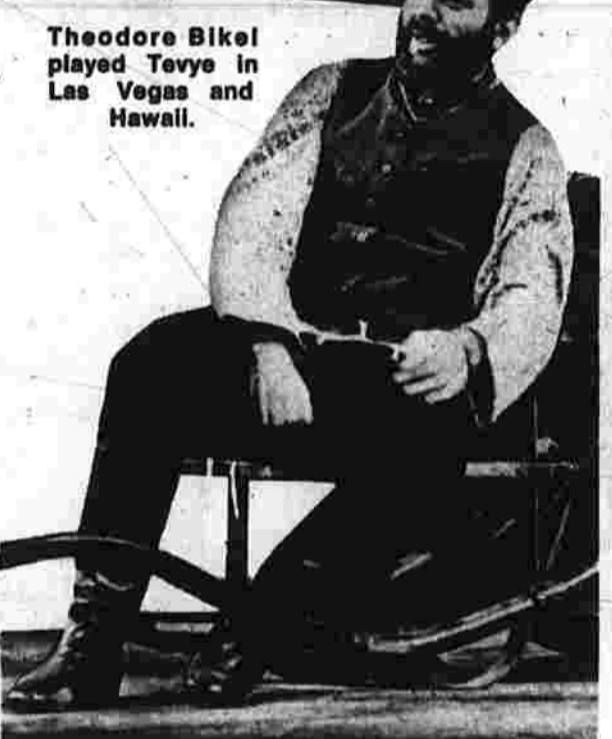
AROUND THE WORLD IN FIVE YEARS

The Fiddler is a much traveled figure. He's not only fiddled the globe of the world, he's arrived down under, too—and has girdled the globe from east to west—since his premiere in New York on September 22, 1964.

The musical is in its sixth Broadway year, and in its third year in both London and Melbourne, Australia. Its singing and dancing have been cheered in Israel, Finland, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Holland, Iceland, Germany, Argentina, Japan, Austria, Yugoslavia and South Africa. Due to exposure to its charms are Paris, Mexico City, East Berlin, Warsaw, Warsaw, Madrid, Geneva, Chile, Istanbul, Montevideo. No doubt they will succumb.

It's an unlikely success story in some ways. It's a time and an environment with a strong and special tradition. But these simple folk tales have a warm humanity which has proved to be of universal appeal, even today. And out of them has come this marvellously popular contemporary musical. Jerry Bock and Sheldon Harnick put together the music and the lyrics and, going on from strength to strength, Jerome Robbins set the whole show dancing with his choreography (and also directs the New York production).

We all still know how easily the fiddler could come to grief—whether or not we are familiar with the Chagall paintings which inspired the title of the show—and we all love the spirit which persists in making music while it may.

Law Officials Outline Strategy on Crime

By AMBROSE R. DUDLEY

PROVIDENCE, R.I. (AP)—New England law enforcement officials have adopted a new concept of plotting criminal activity that is aimed at "attacking the system that breeds organized crime."

"Catching the individual is not going to eliminate the system," said Rhode Island Atty. Gen. Herbert F. Dellmono, who outlined the program to New England governors Thursday at a meeting in Boston.

He called it the first program of its kind in the nation.

"We are not trying to charge just one person," Dellmono told a news conference in Providence later. "We want to see who he is connected with across state lines. Detectives will be developing information about how organized crime operates and how it gets into legitimate businesses."

The governors endorsed the program, called "New England Criminal Intelligence System," and officials of the U.S. Justice Department "are enthusiastic about the program being undertaken on a regional basis," Dellmono said.

"Ten years ago we closed our eyes to organized crime," he said. "Now we are fighting to control it. If we had had this system 10 years ago, organized crime wouldn't be in the position it is today."

World's Newspapers hail 'Our Merry Moon Men'

LONDON (AP)—Newspapers of East and West Europe were lavish in their praise today of America's latest Apollo achievement but lamented the failure of the television camera.

Gen. Francisco Franco, Spain's chief of state, sent a message to President Nixon congratulating the moon landing and expressing "our warmest wishes for the world and courage of your three astronauts."

The Polish Communist organ Trybuna Ludu said the feat of the Apollo mission was "a triumph for the human mind."

The Hungarian news agency MTI called the Apollo mission "an outstanding achievement" which it said was headline news throughout the Communist country.

British newspapers highlighted the lighthearted antics of the astronauts and the space television failure.

In Britain, the Daily Telegraph called Conrad and Bean "the merry moon men" and the mass circulation Daily Mirror heaped congratulations on "the first moon landing."

But although coverage was plentiful, it had slipped down the page in contrast to the massive amount of headlines which marked the first moon landing.

Court Upholds Convictions Of UConn Demonstrations

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP)—When a demonstration on a state university campus results in depriving persons of their rights, the state is justified in making arrests, the Circuit Court's Appellate Division ruled Thursday.

The appeals court was unanimous in upholding convictions of four University of Connecticut students who were arrested with 62 others during an antiwar demonstration on the Storrs campus Dec. 10, 1968.

About 200 persons gathered at a warming hut next to the UConn skating pond shortly after noon while the Army, Navy and National Security Agency were interviewing job applicants. The recruiting sessions had been moved to the hut, on the fringe of campus, because earlier antiwar protests had disrupted job interviews at UConn.

Nearly 100 state troopers were called to the warming hut by the university administration to ensure that the job talks would continue, according to the appeals court decision written by Judge Bill L. Cramer.

Accounts printed at the time of the incident stated that demonstrators sat in the road near the hut in an attempt to be arrested. State Police Col. Leslie Williams reportedly told them, "We can't arrest you for doing nothing."

Eventually, a group of protestors agreed to push between Williams and State Police Officer Leonard J. Mulcahy as an act of disobedience. A line of demonstrators filed between the two men and 6 were arrested, most on charges of breach of the peace.

The commissioner had some reservations as to the actions and force used by the students, the court decision stated.

Four of the arrested students, Lewis E. Greenwald of Storrs, Robert W. Drane, Mansfield, and Karen T. Della Sala and Judith L. Daszian, both of Willington, appealed their Circuit Court convictions.

The ruling said that the four defendants overstepped their rights of peaceful assembly and free speech, both guaranteed under the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. Persons may be guilty of breach of the peace if they "commit acts or make statements likely to provoke violence and disturbance of good order, even though no such result is intended," stated when appeals court, quoting from a previous decision.

The court drew further on the previous decision, stating that "personal abuse is not in any proper sense communication of information or opinion" such as those covered by the right of free speech.

"When violence or other action so far as to deprive others of their equal right to the exercise of their liberties," wrote Judge Cramer, "then these transgressions of those limits are punishable by the state."

The Appellate Division, in its decision, also supported the right of the UConn administration to restrict students from certain

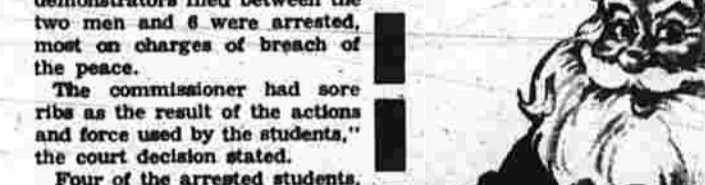

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Dum-Dums Didn't Break TV: Sun Did

THE LOS ANGELES TIMES... BECKY BOLAND in Houston, watching in fascination Wednesday as Abraham Charles Conrad Jr. became the third man in history to set foot on the moon.

But like the millions of other viewers, Becky was in for a major disappointment — the color television camera on the moon went awry.

In the pre-dawn drama, Becky walked into her mother's bedroom and announced: "Mother, those dum'dums broke the television camera."

No one at the manned spacecraft center here is saying astronomy Conrad and Roger B. Bean broke the camera (although they did tap it with a hammer).

But the logical explanation is that a blast of high-intensity light, probably from the sun or the sun's reflection, accidentally struck the camera lens, illuminating a seven-inch image tube inside.

The image tube is the most important part of the camera. It is highly sensitive to low-level light, permitting it to operate in near-darkness as it did during the Apollo 11 mission.

By the same token it is extremely sensitive to high-intensity light and the bright exposure can damage it severely. It would have been easy enough for Conrad and Bean accidentally to turn the camera lens at an improper angle, exposing it to sunlight.

Walking around on the tricky lunar surface, the two astronauts apparently did just that. A spokesman for Westinghouse, which built the camera, said the "sun made pretty bad damage."

A similar explanation came from officials at the space center here.

The camera feature came as Bean tried to place it on a tripod. The camera was held by astronaut Conrad and Roger B. Bean.

"They rapped the camera several times on the top with a wrench," he said.

"I don't think that did much good," one spokesman said here.

However, he added, the tube had probably already blown out if it didn't make much difference.

Julian Szeber, assistant administrator for public affairs at the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, said:

"While it is most disappointing, or all the systems the one I would have picked to go would have been television."

Dodd Assails Demonstrators, TV Newsmen

BRIDGEPORT, Conn. (AP)—Sen. Thomas J. Dodd said Thursday that between 100 and 60,000 of the protesters who assembled in Washington for last week's peace march were "hard-core Communists, Trotskyites, Maoists and other extremists."

Another 75,000, he said, were "hippies looking for a piece of the action," and 100,000 more were "pacifists, misguided liberals and misled young people."

Dodd made his estimates in a meeting of the Kiva Club in Bridgeport.

"They were there," he said, "partly because of shallow and vacuous opposition to our Vietnam commitment, partly because of a desire for peace that everyone shares, and partly because the demonstration seemed like a great outdoor lark."

He also said that 2 1/2 million people, or 10 times as many as the demonstrators attended college football games. There were no protests at these massive gatherings except possibly at the officials, he said.

He said that "stuffed shirt television news commentators ignored statistics like that and did not present a fair report of the demonstration."

Columbia Selectmen Told Disposal Site Will Soon Be Inadequate

The 26-acre town disposal site, in use for about four years, will no longer be adequate to handle the town's refuse, selectmen were told at a meeting Wednesday.

Francis Rooney, air pollution engineer for the state, told the selectmen, "Only a minimal area remains to operate the site with the present procedure of excavating the original trench and relocating the two-foot covering."

The selectmen, aware of the problem, have suggested that a state-owned gravel bank, no longer used, might be a possible site. It is on Rt. 6 near the Manchester Sand and Gravel Co., and contains about six acres.

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Religious' Group Dealings - More Profit Than Prophet

The Blessed Religious Institute of Mercenary Millionaires sounds like a group of pious-minded clergymen. But the institute is not so much a creature of the tax laws.

Its dealings are not so much with prophets, as with profits. The organization, incorporated in California, has been averaging \$100,000 a year in gross earnings from "activities which are clearly commercial in nature."

The institute's heavy reliance on federal practices in handling tax-exemption, sources in the department of employment said the institute is not unique, "thousands of other organizations are likewise making use of advantageous tax statutes."

The institute's name derives from that of its leader, Claude E. Britton.

His last name is an acronym for "Blessed Religious Institute of Mercenary Millionaires."

The institute works like this: Business and manufacturing firms occasionally need computer technicians for temporary work. Britton has about 40 such technicians on file. He sends them out to firms which want computer technicians.

If the firm accepts a technician, it makes a deal with Britton for the technician's services at a certain rate. Britton then supplies the technician and by agreement pays that person at a lower rate than Britton is being paid by the firm. The difference in rates produces the income for the institute.

On a visit to the institute's headquarters, a reporter found little in appearance to distinguish the Blessed Religious Institute of Mercenary Millionaires from any other business office.

Phon rang incessantly. Two secretaries worked over filing cabinets and electric typewriters.

However, in one adjacent office in a corner was an arrangement of religious symbols that had the appearance of a chapel.

The chapel and Britton's somewhat clerical dress (a white turtleneck sweater underneath a black Nehru jacket with a small gold cross over his heart) were the only signs with any religious significance.

Britton's version of the institute's activities is this: He is attempting to support a private college, called Los Angeles University, through research work for private industry, just as the faculty of colleges and universities do.

Britton said that more than 500 persons had taken up "missions training" at Los Angeles University. He said that the faculty of Los Angeles University consisted of 100 persons.

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Nixon Praises GIs' Mothers For Their Stand

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—President Nixon has commended the Gold Star Mothers, who blocked the reading during last week's antiwar demonstration of the names of 34 GIs killed in Vietnam, one of the mothers said today.

"You and the other Philadelphia Gold Star Mothers have paid your own the highest price in expressing your desire that their names not be among those read at protest rallies," the President wrote to Mrs. Charles Secrest, one of the mothers.

Mrs. Secrest, chaplain of the Philadelphia chapter, said she received the letter Wednesday morning. Her son, Edward W. Secrest, was fatally shot in Vietnam.

Nixon said he was sure the sons of the mothers who blocked demonstrations would be very proud of their stand.

"When the peace for which all of us pray comes in Vietnam," the President wrote, "there will be a special place in the hearts of free men throughout the world for your son, for each of you, and for all the others who have sacrificed so much to bring freedom into this suffering land."

The Gold Star Mothers also issued a court injunction to prohibit the New Mobilization to End the War in Vietnam from reading the names of their sons.

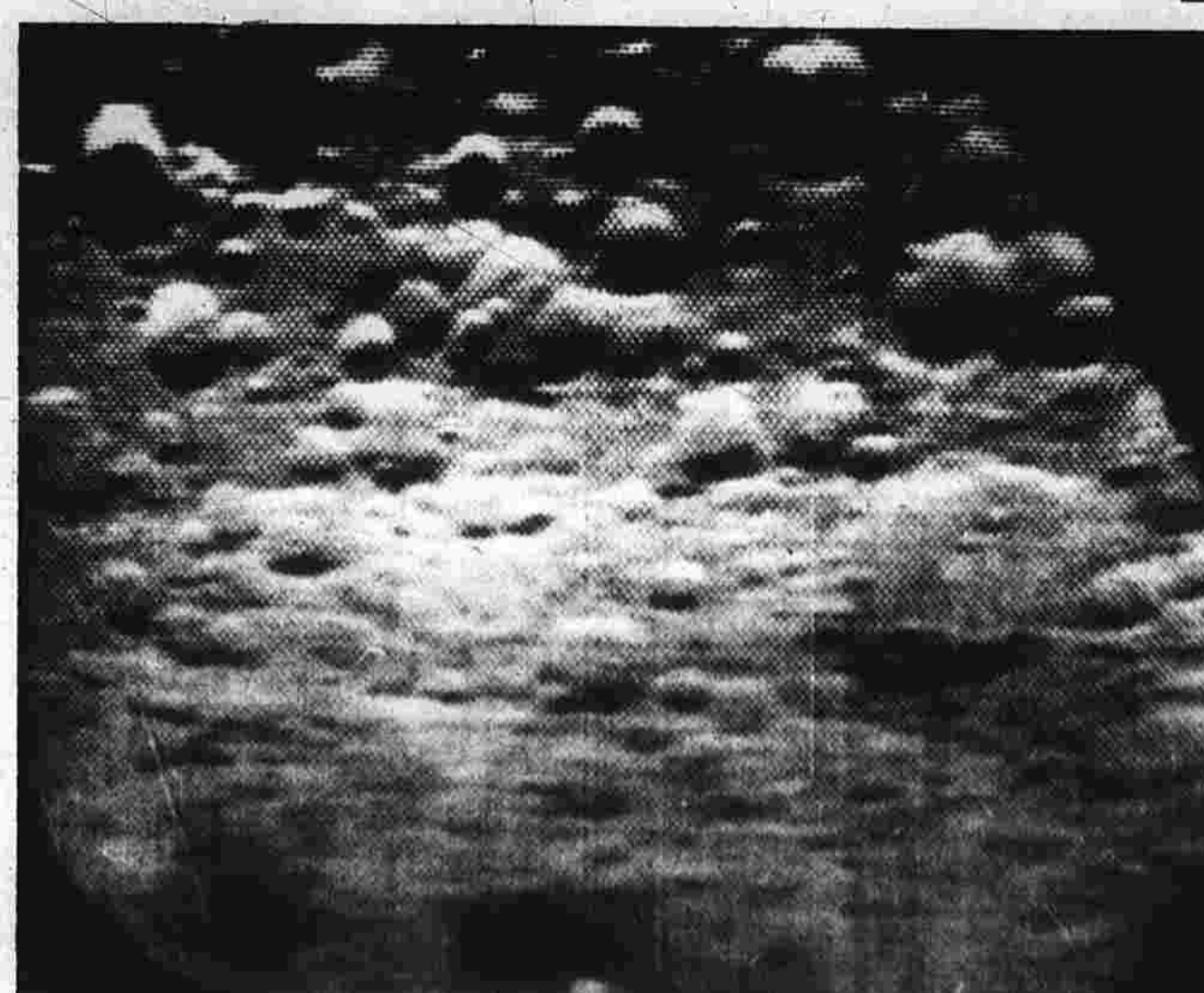


Judge Haynsworth looks over some papers with his law clerk, William Wilkins (right) in his office in Greenville. (AP Photofax)

Saigon Refutes 'Massacre' Tale

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Army says 24 U.S. soldiers and former servicemen, in addition to an officer and staff sergeant already charged, are being investigated in the alleged murder of approximately 100 Vietnamese civilians in 1968. But the South Vietnamese Defense Ministry in Saigon said today there was no massacre, that U.S. artillery and air strikes had killed "about 20 civilians" in a battle which claimed 125 Viet Cong. Referring to some accounts being carried in the U.S. and foreign press, the South Vietnamese agency said: "Reports from newspapers and foreign news agencies recently that said 527 civilians were killed were completely inaccurate." Pentagon spokesmen here had no comment on the Saigon announcement and indications were it caught them by surprise. Only hours earlier the Army had issued a statement to members of Congress where there is a growing demand for an investigation of the raid. In reference to the March 1968 raid near a hamlet known as My Lai, the Army said: "During the operation a small group of American soldiers reportedly shot many (possibly 100) Vietnamese civilians." The Army said that Lt. William L. Calley, 26, now stationed at Ft. Benning, Ga., was charged in the incident and a decision would be made early next week whether he will face court martial. Calley was leader of a unit involved in the operation. A staff sergeant, David Mitchell, 26, of Ft. Francisville, La., has been charged with assault to commit murder. Robert E. Jordan III, the Army's general counsel, said that another nine men still in the service and 25 others who have been discharged since the raid are under investigation. He said the former soldiers could face court martial under the Uniform Code of Military Justice. Investigators so far have questioned about 75 persons, including Vietnamese who might have first-hand knowledge about the case, Jordan said. He denied the Army is covering up the case, saying it is not in a legal position to give details or talk about aspects of the case because it could prejudice the rights of the men who may go to trial. "Whether a crime was committed and who did it will be the two big issues if there is a trial," Jordan said. Jordan agreed the Army might be in a better position from a public relations standpoint if it could come out in the open. The statement Friday came after a report in the New York Times, N.Y., and Rep. William L. Minshall, R-Calif., urged separate congressional investigations into the incident. Calley said he will press for an investigation despite the Army's revelation, which he called "abominable."
