

'No Smoking' Policy To Stay, Says Board

The current policy of the Board of Education regarding student smoking at Manchester High School will remain in force, the board decided last night. The decision is in answer to a request made at the Nov. 24 board meeting by Dana Wilk and Kenneth Hawley, MHS students, requesting the board to permit student smoking with parental permission.

Nixon was asked early in the session about the alleged massacre of Vietnamese civilians by U.S. troops at My Lai in early 1968.

"What appears to have happened was certainly a massacre," Nixon said. "Under no circumstances was it justified."

He said the United States was fighting to prevent the people of South Vietnam from having imposed upon them "a government which has atrociously against civilians as one of its policies."

"We cannot ever condone or use of atrocities against civilians in order to accomplish that goal," he declared.

Nixon said the My Lai incident was an isolated one. He also declared American soldiers have a record "of generosity, of decency" toward the South Vietnamese and this record "must not be allowed to be smeared."

That is why I am going to do everything I possibly can to see that all of the facts in this incident are brought to light," he said, "and that those who are charged, if they are found guilty, are punished."

He went on, however, a separate civilian investigation of the incident as urged by some congressmen and leading public figures.

On domestic issues, Nixon said he would not sign a tax reform bill raising personal income tax exemptions from \$600 to \$800 and providing a 10 percent increase in Social Security programs.

"If I signed the kind of bill which the Senate is about to pass," he said, "I would be releasing taxes for some of the American people and raising the prices for all the American people. I will not do that."

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Main Points Covered In News Conference

WASHINGTON (AP) — Here are highlights of President Nixon's news conference Monday night:

Taxes — "It would be very easy for me to sign a bill which reduces taxes. But if I sign the kind of a bill which the Senate is about to pass, I would be releasing taxes for some of the American people and raising the prices for all the American people. I will not do that. . . . I do not intend to recommend the continuation of the surtax beyond June 30. While I believe that the United States can afford what it needs to do . . . I do not want to see a substantial increase in the tax burden as a percentage of our gross national income."

News Media Agony — "Generally, I think the news media has been fair. I have no complaints about, certainly, the extent of the coverage I have received. I believe that the news media has followed the practice of newspapers, of separating news from opinion."

Chamber Lists Some Areas For Study by Task Force

Minority group capitalism in Manchester? Business and industrial architecture and landscaping in conformity with New England village charm? More vocational training in local schools to prepare people for careers in business and industry?

These are some of the questions suggested for exploration to the Economic Task Force of the Community Development Action Plan (C-DAP) by the Manchester Chamber of Commerce.

J. Grant Swank, executive vice president of the Chamber, said the list of 11 subjects for study was drawn up by the Chamber and presented to the task force as a result of a joint meeting last month.

Three representatives from the Chamber attended the task force's Nov. 18 meeting in the Municipal Building at the request of the C-DAP group.

Attending from the Chamber were Phillip Harrison, president; Swank; and Walter A. Morrissy, chairman of the Chamber's industrial development commission.

At that time, Swank says, the three Chamber representatives did some talking and answered questions from members of the task force.

The Chamber offered to cooperate with the C-DAP group in any way, and the list, Swank says, was drawn up by himself and Harrison as a way of cooperating and of suggesting areas of study the task force might pursue.

Some of the questions suggested by the Chamber for study by the task force are:

What is the responsibility of local business and industry in providing Black capitalism or minority group capitalism for potential entrepreneurs from Hartford's North End?

What is the responsibility of local business and industry in providing jobs and housing for Hartford's minority groups?

Should new businesses and industry use architecture and landscaping in conformity with Manchester's "City of Village Charm" atmosphere?

What is the responsibility of local business and industry in planning betterment for the whole community?

In elaborating on this last suggestion, Swank said the Chamber sent a representative to the Nativity Scene Committee this year to help raise funds for a new Christmas display for the town.

Swank said it was felt that it is the responsibility of business and industry to get involved actively in such town concerns.

However, Swank said, they have to consider, even in a small matter such as this one, if they are helping to lure business away from shopping parkades into the downtown area by helping provide an attractive Christmas display in Center Park.

Also, what is the responsibility of Manchester's town government in alluring outside business and industry into Manchester?

Do shopping center complexes in other area towns attract money away from Manchester shopping districts?

What are the effects of industry in communities surrounding Manchester on local industry?

What is the most profitable use that can be made of such old buildings as Cheney Mills?

How does local urban renewal (downtown and otherwise) reflect business and industry in Manchester? Is it profitable to business and industry already in existence? Does it attract more business and industry into town?

What are the advantages and disadvantages of an industrial park in Manchester?

To what extent should vocational training in business and industry be incorporated into local school curriculum?

How much influence should the local business and industrial community have in establishing business course selections and student training at Manchester Community College?

She Appeals, Rejection As Lifeguard

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — The job of lifeguard at public swimming pools in Waterbury was too tough for a woman, city officials told the State Commission on Human Rights and Opportunity Monday.

The case concerns the complaint of 18-year-old Celeste Frigo, who said she was discriminated against because of her sex when Waterbury turned down her application for a job as a lifeguard.

It was her hope that a young man with athletic ability and reasonable size and physical dimensions would be best equipped to handle the situation," testified James Curtin, Waterbury's parks superintendent.

Curtin said lifeguards must handle rather heavy equipment, and in addition, "there is the constant problem of teen-agers pushing people in the pool, threatening bodily harm on the lifeguards, stealing of bath towels, and foul language."

"We did not feel that a woman could cope with these problems and enforce the rules of conduct," said Curtin.

Miss Frigo, however, said the city never indicated that the job of lifeguard was restricted to males.

She said she has a senior life saving certificate, a Red Cross instructor's certificate and a first aid certificate, and has had 1 1/2 years' experience as a lifeguard-instructor at the YWCA pool in Waterbury.

Bernard F. McGovern, an assistant state attorney general, said the state is asking for an order barring Waterbury from discrimination on the basis of sex, and requiring the city to hire Miss Frigo and pay her the wages she would have received if her application for the job of lifeguard had been approved.

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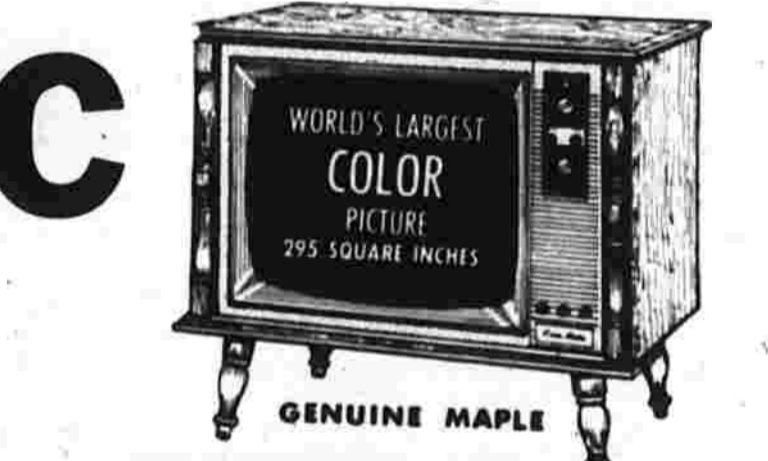
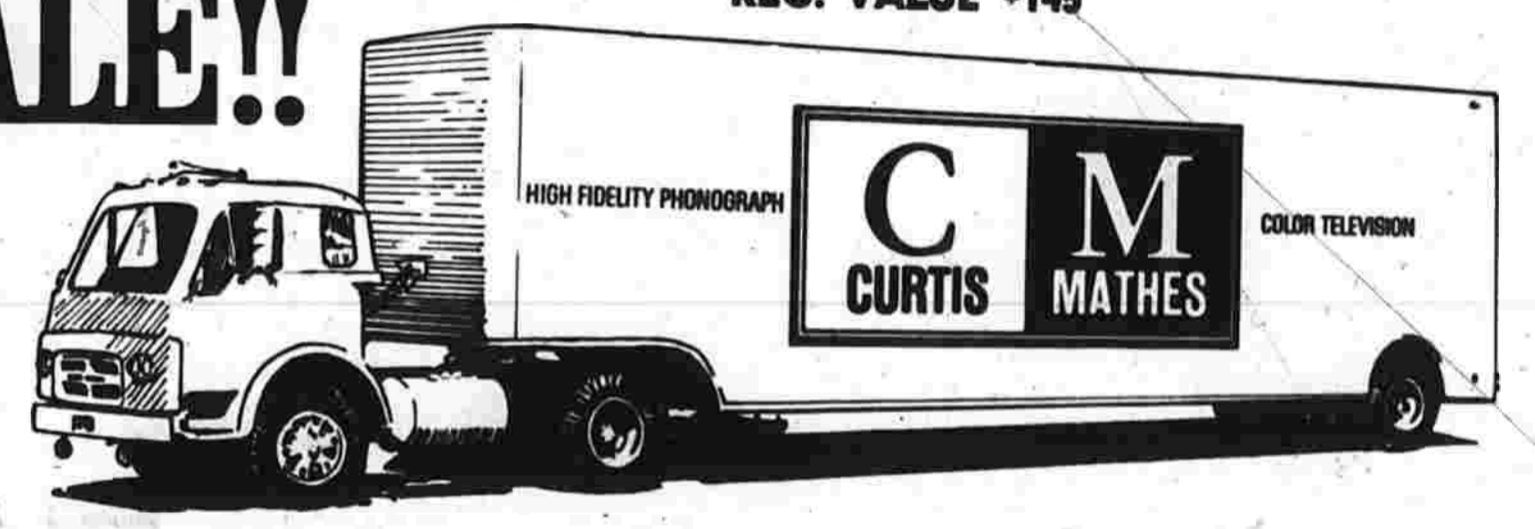
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Obituary Lawrence Dies, Was President Of Series Club

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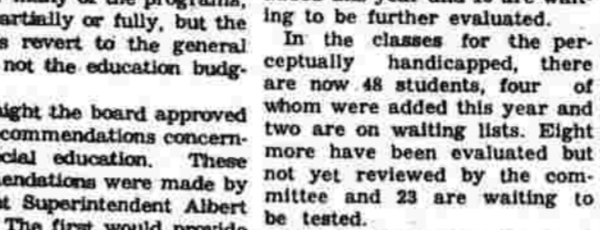

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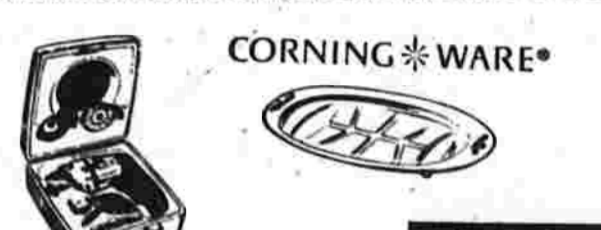

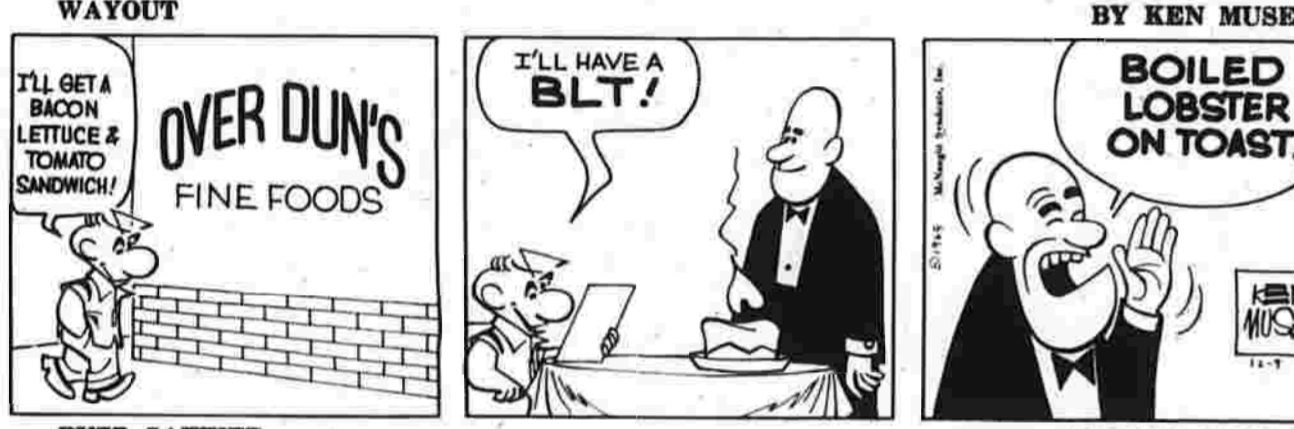
