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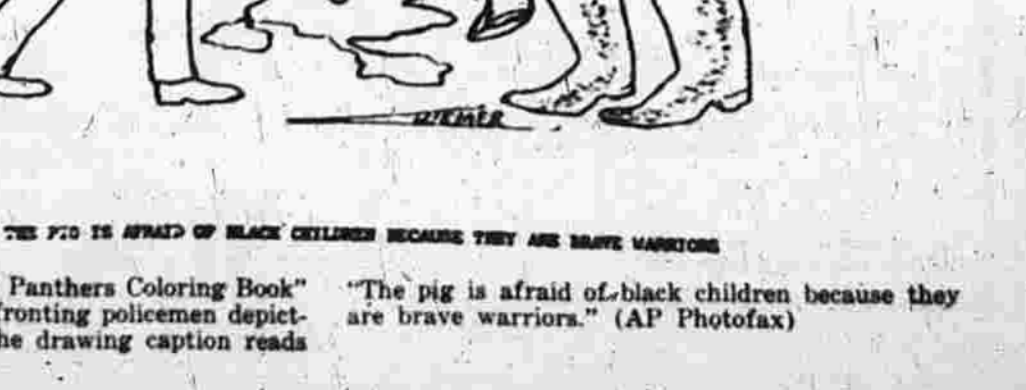

The national Moratorium Committee this week has dispatched 12 regional coordinators to solidify grass roots participation in antiwar activities and provide a feedback for the Washington coordinators.

"The antiwar movement and the Moratorium in particular are near a turning point," Miss Ellinger said at a news conference this week. "It is time for new programs and new ideas."

Unlike the massive demonstrations of October and November, the December Moratorium will emphasize quiet discussions and silent vigils, antiwar leaders say.

Counterdemonstrators have announced plans to demonstrate support of President Nixon's Vietnam policy, including a City Hall rally in New York and leafleting by the Young Americans for Freedom on college campuses.

The Moratorium activities, which are scheduled to continue through Christmas Eve, began in New York City Thursday night with a candlelight peace procession by some 100 Jews observing the festival of Hanukkah.

The Hanukkah demonstration, arranged by the National Jewish Organizing Program, concluded with eight speeches denouncing Nixon's Vietnam policy.

In Washington, D.C., small rallies were scheduled today at the Department of Health, Education and Welfare and Office of Economic Opportunity. The November Moratorium in the capital drew a throng on Nov. 15 estimated by police as 200,000.

Drug Council Asks Dempsey For State Financial Aid

A telegram to Gov. John Dempsey asking for funds to fight the drug problem in Manchester was sent yesterday by W. J. Godfrey Courley, chairman of the Drug Advisory Council (DAC) of the Chamber of Commerce.

Gov. Dempsey said Wednesday that he is "taking for action" and "a real campaign against drugs."

In Courley's telegram, he implores the governor to join the drug council in Manchester as the willing to take that action but needs state funds to help finance it.

The yearly cost of this operation, said Swank, would be \$25,000 minimum with \$11,500 plus fringe benefits going to the "competent person" who'll run it.

British Women Worried About Safety of Their Pills

LONDON (AP) — Bewildered women swamped the switchboards of Britain's family planning clinics today, seeking advice about what contraceptive pills are safe to use.

Many were alarmed by Thursday's recommendation of the government's safety committee that doctors should in future only prescribe 11 of the 30 brands of pill now available.

The confusion of women who wanted to change the pills they were using for others was made worse because the Family Planning Association, which alone has some 400,000 women on the pill, advised against use of two types of pill the committee had approved.

The clinician and even the Health Ministry were besieged by calls from women asking: "Is my pill all right? What shall I do? Stop taking the pill or come to the clinic immediately?"

Chaparr Brook, London director of the Family Planning Association, said he had made a list of half a million leaflets to be distributed to worried women at 800 FPA clinics throughout the nation.

A spokesman for the Family Planning Association said: "We accept the (Drug Safety) Committee's findings and we also accept that the 11 makes of the pill are less likely to cause blood clotting side effects than those with a high estrogen content. But this does not mean they are as effective."

Two kinds of pill (marketed under the names of Norplant and Verton) contained no estrogen at all but they were rejected because of their effects on the endocrine system of the body.

The spokesman added that it was not recommending three other makes which the committee has approved.

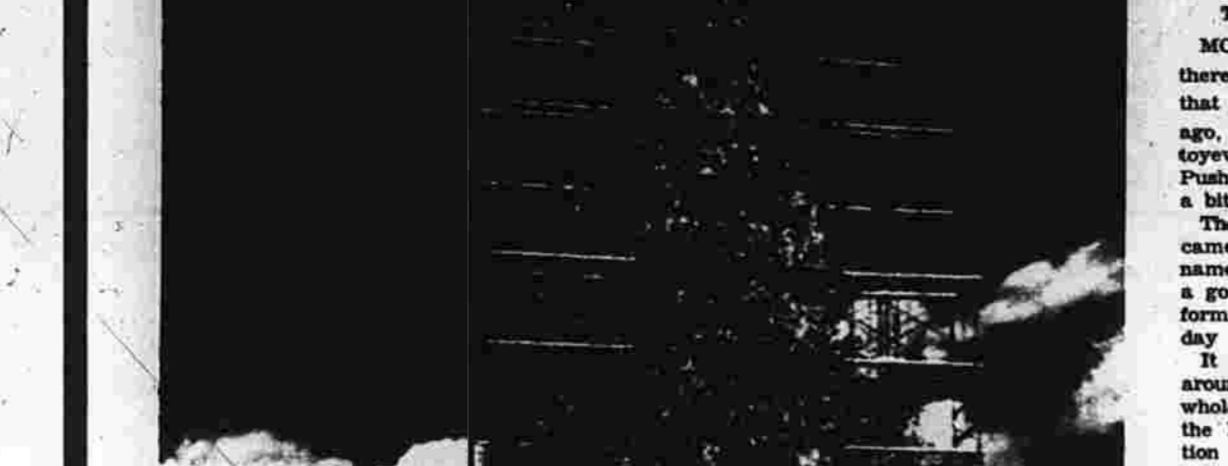

MOOSCOV—Once upon a time there was a Russian language that made sense. That was long ago, back in the days of Dostoyevsky, Tolstoy, Chekhov and other masters of the Russian language.

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Greece Quits Europe's Council Before Vote on Its Suspension

PARIS (AP) — Greece's military dictatorship announced today that it is withdrawing from the Council of Europe. The announcement was made a short time before the Council was to vote on a motion suspending Greece from the 18-nation Western European organization because of the regime's violation of human rights. The motion appeared sure of adoption.

An official Greek spokesman said Foreign Minister Panayiotis Pispinis had told his colleagues in the council's Committee of Ministers of his government's decision.

When Pispinis made his announcement, 11 nations already had given their backing to a resolution calling for suspensions of Greece until real progress had been made toward democratization of the Athens regime.

During the period of suspension, Greece would have been permitted to keep its delegation at Council of Europe headquarters in Strasbourg, but would not have been allowed to take part in deliberations.

Pispinis left the session surrounded by aides. He looked grim and declined to make any comment on his government's decision.

Jean De Lapkowal, secretary of state at the French Foreign Ministry, said it was a "tragic" move. "There was no doubt the suspension resolution would have passed," he said.

De Lapkowal described Pispinis' speech as moving and impressive.

He said, in effect, "I am a moderate. But don't forget there are hard-liners back in Athens." The French diplomat reported.

Pispinis' announcement came as a great surprise to the other foreign ministers, council sources reported.

They said that during the morning discussion, spokesmen for West Germany, Ireland, Norway, Cyprus and Great Britain had commented on the Greek foreign minister's speech and the meeting chairman, Adolfo de Maro, proposed that the ministers break for lunch.

Pispinis raised his hand and said: "No, I have something to say." "I have noted that several of the ministers disapproved of my intervention this morning and I feel myself obliged to denounce the status of this organization and to quit the Council of Europe."

In his earlier speech, Pispinis made an impassioned defense of his government and urged the council not to suspend Greece.

Contrary to expectations, he offered no proposals to restore democratic procedures in his country.

The Scandinavians led the move to censure the Greeks, but the West Germans apparently moved the resolution because it was thought their sponsorship would carry weight with undecided members.

Meanwhile, the Greek regime made a veiled threat to quit the North Atlantic Treaty Organization if suspended from the council.

Full-page articles in the two major newspapers in Athens, however, said suspension would compel Greece to reconsider its

U.N. Committee Condemns U.S. Chemical Warfare

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The small nations in the U.N. General Assembly gave the United States a rebuff Wednesday for the second time in two days. This time the Russians did not share in the American defeat.

Brushing aside U.S. objections, the General Assembly's main political committee held that the use of tear gas and defoliants in war is against the principles of the Geneva Convention of 1925. Voting 88 to 3 with 25 abstentions, the committee approved a resolution declaring that "the use of international armed conflict of any chemical agents of warfare" is "contrary to the generally recognized rules of international law as embodied in the Geneva protocol."

Although less than half of the 128 U.N. members voted for the resolution, the vote in the assembly was expected to follow the pattern in the committee, with abstentions putting the resolution across.

Before the vote, U.S. delegate James Leonard argued the defoliants in war is against the principles of the Geneva Convention of 1925. 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Many Medicines Found Ineffective or Dangerous

WASHINGTON—A few days ago, I was consulted by a patient who took out of her bag eight different medicines that she was taking, not one of which was indicated. She had the Hong Kong flu, mild type, and her doctor had started to treat each symptom with a different medicine, including a drug which is totally ineffective in controlling a viral infection; namely, tetracycline, an antibiotic which has no effect upon virus infections.

"The result was that the disease was not cured," she said, "and she was suffering at the time she consulted me was caused by the medication she was taking."

She had what is called aphoristic medicines in the mouth, and lesions in the colon giving her distressing bowel disturbances. It may take months before she recovers from the effects of the drug which wasn't indicated.

War Against Inflation: White House Economists Present Uniform Facade

WASHINGTON (AP) — To the right of the White House, a group of economists designed to bank the fires of inflation gradually, add a split within the Federal Reserve Board.

Among the White House economic corps, however, the facade is as uniform as ever despite some pungent criticism from outsiders and ex-advisers.

Inside the independent "Fed," which is accustomed to presenting a unanimous face to the public when it talks of keeping or easing its restrictions on money and credit, board members Sherman J. Maisel and George W. Mitchell have publicly dissented from their colleagues' status-quo position.

As ease up now, they argue, or credit will get so tight and money so scarce that it will be too late to correct the condition.

But Maisel and Mitchell, opposed at the Fed, also face stiff opposition elsewhere in the federal bureaucracy. One opponent of their ideas, Budget Director Robert F. May, outlined his reasoning today in a speech written for delivery at the University of Washington in Seattle.

"It seems to me that the economy is in a state of delicate balance at the moment," he said.

"Inappropriate actions at this time could tip the balance against us in our battle to curb inflation and could undo the impetus toward stability that we're now beginning to appear."

Although he didn't spell it out, his argument followed the reasoning of a good many other economists in basic agreement that "inflationary psychology" is at the root of the problem.

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Bolton School Panel To Hire Girls' Phys Ed Aide

The Board of Education voted to hire a girls' physical education teacher for the lower grades next year, to allow Grade 7 students hunting French at the end of the second quarter to drop it and to run a late bus on Wednesdays from the Center School starting next month.

Principal George Patros expanded the distribution of classes among the two physical education teachers. This year one man has taught all classes, from kindergarten through Grade 8. Hiring a female instructor will allow separate classes for boys and girls at the junior high level, and the additional personnel may make it possible to have physical education for boys and girls at the elementary level.

Space is as much of a problem as personnel. The CD room, which is used for gym in the Center School, can be divided for girls' and boys' activities, Patros said, and the same room could be used for some of the more advanced classes, such as those in which the girls would be working out.

Asked how the CD room was working out, Patros said that it was "not the ideal situation, but it will be alleviated once we get the CD material out of the Center School. The girls' room advocated some type of soundproofing to insulate the two classrooms next to it against noise. The architect had said soundproofing would not be necessary.

The possibility of using the multi-purpose room at the new elementary school for physical education classes from either school was not encouraged, Dr. Joseph Castagna, superintendent, and Patros, explained that it would be free from cafeteria use only about an hour-and-a-half at the beginning and end of each school day and that folding up and unfolding 160 chairs would present a problem. The chairs evidently present a problem when anything other than eating is scheduled. The tables fold readily into the wall, but the folding benches, which the Board ordered, were not ordered. These would have folded up with each table, according to Dr. Castagna.

The proposal that Grade 7 students be allowed to drop it midway through the year was made by the French department in consultation with administration. Patros said there would be a "failure" on the students' part and that the students would be transferred to a study hall. French, taught twice a week, is a required subject for all seventh graders, and for two-thirds of the eighth graders this year.

Grade 8 French students will be ready to go on with high school French, and those not taking junior high French can start with French I in high school.

The late bus at the Center School was requested by teachers primarily for remedial purposes, Patros said. There is a guarantee of 10-20 pupils. Board members questioned the high school principal on how many students ride from the high school late bus from the high school and decided it was possible to combine the runs, with the bus starting at the high school at 2:45, picking grade schoolers up at 4, and going on.

Taking advantage of the fact that high school principal Norman Shaw was at the board meeting, Patros suggested that Grade 8 and 8 students be invited to some of the interesting assemblies the high school has been having. Shaw said it would be fine with him, and the only problem will be finding money to pay for the necessary buses.

Western authorities have charged that Soviet anti-Semitism has increased since the Arab-Israeli war in 1967.

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Duffey Puts Himself In Party Mainstream

The emergence of the Rev. Joseph Duffey as a serious candidate for the Democratic nomination for U.S. Senator was apparent last night, as he addressed an open meeting of the Toland County Democratic Association in Vernon.

Receiving a standing ovation at the start of the program, Duffey presented a new facet of his image, that of friend of the working man and of labor.

He stressed his childhood years as the son of a politically active West Virginia coal miner from the hills of Appalachia and his later involvement as a Protestant theologian in the areas of sociology and urban problems.

His candidacy is firmly planted in the midst of the Democratic party, he declared, casting aside the imputation of a renegade Democrat.

The reception of Duffey by county Democrats was one of cordiality and interest in his work, even by those who were not in complete agreement with him.

Support for his candidacy was apparent among several of the county Democrats attending the meeting.

Duffey cited three prime issues of his campaign being the first to be chosen as candidates in the state, the second, "How as Democrats are we going to choose our candidates?" and the third, "How as Democrats are we going to choose our candidates?"

He described the growing number of candidates and proposed candidates for the Senatorial nomination as "a list of horses at the gate looking at each other and waiting for someone to start the race."

He laid the cause of inflation at the doors of military spending, and expressed criticism of the means being used by both President Richard Nixon and former President Lyndon Johnson.

"We haven't yet learned how to control a galloping economy," he said.

A debate between Duffey and State Senate Majority leader Edward Marcus had been scheduled for next Wednesday night at the Storr Grammar School on Rt. 109 in Mansfield at 8.

Both Marcus and Duffey have been actively campaigning in Toland County. News of the debate stirred considerable interest among those attending last night.

"Increased interest rates hit hardest at the people, at those buying homes and trying to pay for education, while big business continues to be unaffected," Duffey declared.

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Hebron 751 Students Expected In Schools by Next Fall

The Hebron elementary schools anticipate an enrollment of approximately 751 students in September 1970 as compared to 714 at the present time. This increase will require the use of 21 classrooms, or two more than are presently available.

Reporting to the Board of Education last night, Aram Damjanjan, superintendent of schools, stated that based on the latest enrollment report, increased enrollments can be projected for next year, mainly in the kindergarten and fourth grades.

At present, it is not expected that the new addition to the Gilead Hill School will be completed by September, but hopefully by Jan. 1, 1971.

Therefore, there is a strong possibility that arrangements for outside classrooms will have to be made to cover the interim period.

Mrs. Cindy Robinson, Mrs. Cynthia Grinnell and Earl Porter, the board's representatives to the informal school organization study committee, reported that they have been meeting almost weekly with the other committee members from Andover, Marlborough and Regional District 8.

The committee hopes by the middle of January to be able to present to their respective boards recommendations and suggestions as to whether the towns should enter into a formal study on reorganization or start committees of their own to study the problem.

Porter also submitted his resignation to the School Building Committee which the board accepted with regret.

In his letter of resignation, Porter stated that his construction company might be interested in bidding on the new addition to the school and under the circumstances, "I believe this is the only decision I can make."

The main concern was the possibility of a conflict of interest, which had already been brought to his attention by several residents.

His replacement was named by the board to fill the vacancy.

The board decided to provide the necessary action required to obtain the funds for the town's Reserve Fund for the ball field at the Hebron Elementary School.

It will take town meeting action to obtain the money so work can proceed on excavation, grading and seeding.

However, it was pointed out in a letter from Thornton Reed, Conservation Commission agent, that the field probably would not be available for use until late next summer.

In his report to the board, Principal Paul White stated that at last month's parent-teacher conference, 94.7 per cent of the Hebron Elementary School guardians attended the conference.

Dale Harrod, principal at the Gilead Hill School, requested the board's approval, which was given, of fund raising projects, such as food sales, to raise money for badly needed library books.

The student activities committee hopes to hold these sales in Hebron center, possibly where the PTO is presently conducting its Thrift Shop at the Old Town Hall.

Ford Sees Auto Price Rise For Sixth Consecutive Year

DETROIT (AP) — Henry Ford II says there is "no question" that automobile prices will go up again next fall, "because the cost of everything keeps going up."

He declined to speculate on how much the boost might be.

The Ford Motor Co. chairman also said price increases made on his company's 1970 models "come nowhere close to covering our cost increases."

He added, however, he sees "no reason" to make mid-year changes in the prices of the 1970 models, which were raised an average 3.6 per cent over 1969 when the new cars went on sale in mid-October.

Ford's price increase comment came as he chatted with some reporters informally following his 10th annual year-end news conference Wednesday.

He said Ford's return on investment and its profit margin on sales have been shrinking, although "we are pulling in our horns (on expenses) wherever we can."

The 1971 model increase would be the sixth in a row at the start of a model year. Ford boosted prices 1.8 per cent on 1969 models and 3.2 per cent on 1968.

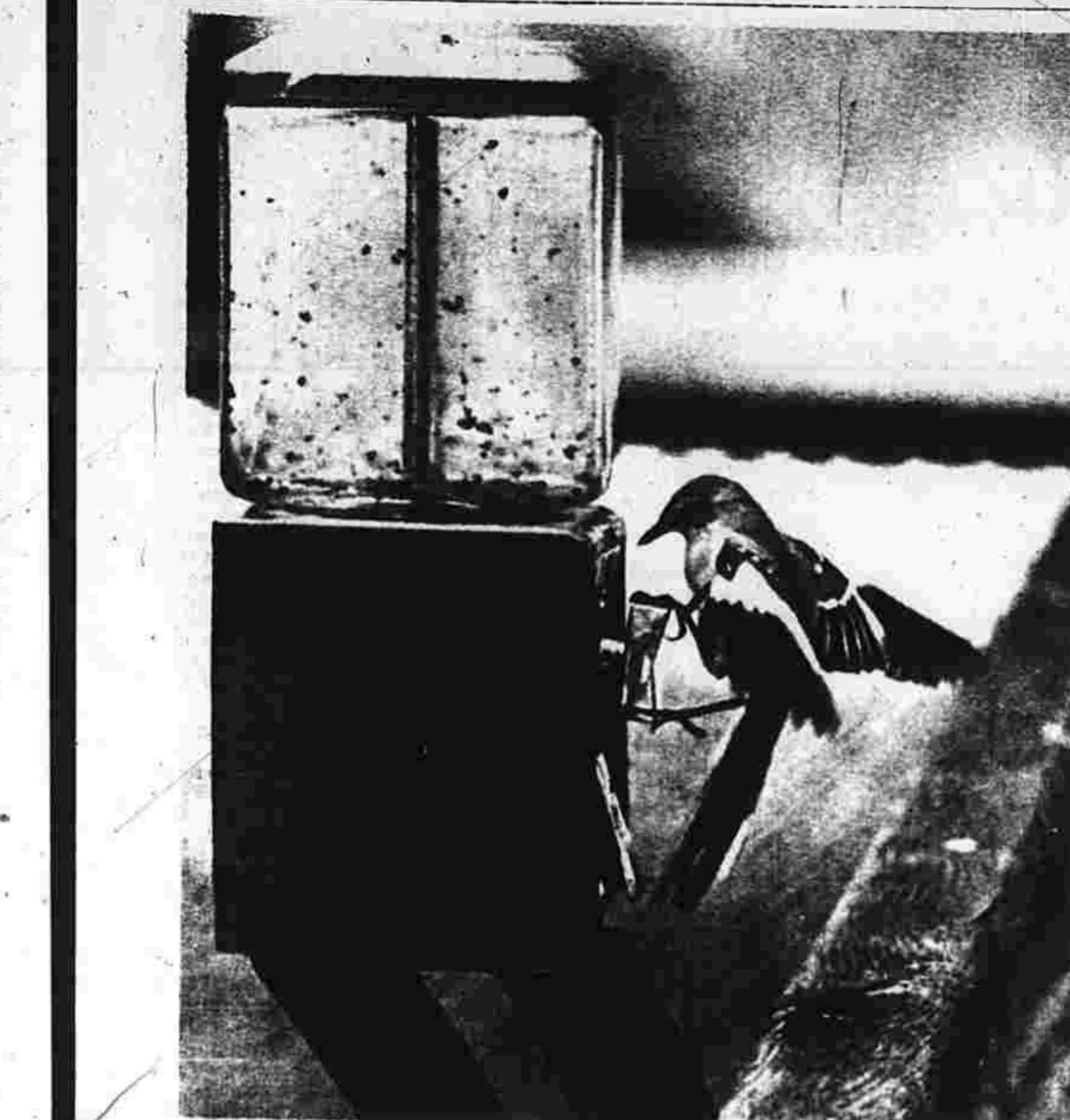
General Motors Corp. raised prices on 1970 models by an average 3.7 per cent, compared with Ford's 3.6. Chrysler Corp. and American Motors Corp. increases were smaller.

Ford told his news conference 11,000 workers and 81 million have been assigned by his company to the problem of combating exhaust air pollution next year.

"I'm publicly committing Ford Motor Co. to an intensified effort to minimize pollution from its products in the shortest time possible," he asserted.

Ford said that in addition to the cost of curbing emissions, his company will spend \$80 million in 1970 on control of air pollution from its production plants.

40 Students Suspended By Harvard

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) — Forty Negro students have been suspended by Harvard University after a brief sit-in at the administration building that was ended by a court injunction.

Nearly 100 blacks filed out of University Hall without incident Thursday, promising to "continue to build pressure at all levels" to attain their goal of at least 20 per cent Negro employment on all Harvard construction.

Harvard has rejected the demand.

A spokesman for the demonstrators announced that about 100 persons outside the administration building that they thought it would be "counter-productive" to defy the court order.

Harvard has an enrollment of slightly more than 18,000 students.

The injunction, issued in Middlesex County Superior Court by Judge Thomas J. Spring, barred the sit-in or engaging in further disruptive demonstrations.

More than 100 blacks had gathered outside the administration building about noon by battering down a door.

Harvard said it rejected the demand that Negroes make up at least 20 per cent of the construction crews because it was not justified.

A university statement said census figures show that blacks make up 1.3 per cent of the population of Cambridge and Boston.

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Cutbacks Scored: NIH Scientists Fear Onset of 'Dark Ages'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Government scientists say budget cuts have slowed research sponsored by the National Institutes of Health and threaten to usher in the "dark ages of medical science."

Joining non-government scientists in criticizing the cutbacks are officials of the NIH—the world's largest concentration of medical research facilities—said a short-notice report by a group of age of funds and personnel are prompting research leads.

Looking to the future, Dr. Robert W. Berliner, an associate director of NIH, said "I think we are going to lose a generation of potential investigators unless things begin to pick up pretty soon in medical research."

His top assistant, Dr. Carl M. Leventhal, added, "We could have what you might call the dark ages of medical science. We're not there yet—but the potential is there."

Berliner, Leventhal and other government scientists have, until now, been more or less silent about the research budget cuts. They spoke out in response to interview questions.

In September, the Nixon administration announced a 9.5 to 10 per cent cut in most government-aided health research as part of a government-wide effort to stop inflation by budget trimming. The cuts amounted to about \$20 million of \$400 million for new and on-going NIH-sponsored research.

In addition, the administration sought a \$7 million reduction in the still pending request for NIH funds for 1970. This bill is now before the Senate Appropriations Committee.

In the interviews, NIH scientists said, approximately 700 employees, many of them nurses but also some top research scientists, have been lost from NIH's clinical center, a 618-bed research hospital whose uniqueness stems partly from the fact that it has some 1,100 research laboratories in close proximity to the patients and the doctors caring for them.

The laboratories do clinical research on everything from the common cold to cancer and mental depression.

The two officials said that sales and production increases should be generally similar to those achieved the last two years due to the cooling off of the nation's economy in the first six months of 1970.

Cause of Bridge Collapse Unknown After Two Years

By LARRY HEINZELING Associated Press Writer KANAUGA, Ohio (AP)—Just before Christmas two years ago, the Silver Bridge collapsed and sent 46 persons to their deaths in the icy depths of the Ohio River. The cause? No certain cause has yet been advanced. Eyewitnesses said after the collapse that the bridge was overloaded with bumper-to-bumper cars carrying holiday shoppers and homeward bound workers and could not stand the strain. A report from the National Transportation Safety Board, however, said the 40-year-old bridge linking Point Pleasant, W. Va., and Kanawga, Ohio, was not overloaded. Whatever the cause, it is among the worst road bridge disasters in American history. Of the 46 who died, two have never been found. Nine others were injured. A new bridge has been built in the place of the old, but the event has not been forgotten. An estimated 25,000 persons are expected Dec. 15 at ceremonies opening the \$12-million replacement span to be called the Silver Memorial Bridge. West Virginia officials have announced that there still is minor work to be done on the new bridge and that it won't be open to traffic until after the ceremonies. It was 10 days before Christmas, just before 8 p.m. when it began to happen. Glaciers in the steel superstructure on the two-lane river crossing twisted in convulsive circles. Steel in the 2,800-foot suspension bridge clattered onto cars and trucks inching across the wildly rippling bridge floor. When the U.S. 50 highway linkup fell it appeared to drop on the Ohio side and then leaned up on the West Virginia bank. Most of the vehicles—exactly 37 cars and trucks arranged in a line—were on the concrete roadway as they dropped 100 feet to the water. In less than 90 seconds the bridge disappeared into the brown Ohio River. Only two concrete piers remained visible. Trucks, cars and humans were entwined in what one rescuer described as a "giant, grotesque bird cage of steel" 40 feet below the surface. "Everything started to shake," survivor Frank Wamsley, a truck driver, told reporters later, "and I saw the bridge snapping and snake toward me." Wamsley, a Point Pleasant sand and gravel company employee, said "we bounced inside the truck like rubber balls. I don't remember hitting the water, but we stopped and I guess we were at the bottom. "Somewhere, I got out of the door and the next thing I knew I was on top of the water. I grabbed hold of a barrel I saw floating nearby—there was another man holding on too." The grim business of finding the bodies trapped under water was hazardous and difficult. Thirteen divers braved the swift, murky waters for days cutting the metal apart with underwater blow torches. Cranes lifted the pieces onto barges. Pieces of the bridge were taken to a field near Henderson, W. Va., and the bridge was reconstructed to seek clues to what had happened. At least \$8 million in damage suits have been filed as a result of the collapse. None has yet been resolved. What caused the accident remains a mystery. "An interim report last year by the National Transportation Safety Board said the total weight of 87 vehicles should not have been sufficient to overload the bridge. The board ruled out the possibility of aerodynamic instability, sabotage, or displacement of bridge anchorages, piers or tower seats by barge collisions. The board did say the fracture of one of the eye-bar chains suspending the bridge from its two main towers was a "key factor" in the tragedy. A final report to the federal studies of the disaster is expected to be released around New Year's Day. The Silver Bridge, unlike most bridges which are suspended by cables of flat steel bars 40-50 feet long linked into a suspension chain in pairs with steel pins through eyes at each end. The Silver Bridge was suspended on two chains of eye-bars. Each link of the chain was made up of two eye-bars side by side. A large pin, passing through the "eyes" at either end of the bars joined the links. Federal investigators have said, "The cause of progressive damage may well be found by the material investigations of the eye-bar steel."

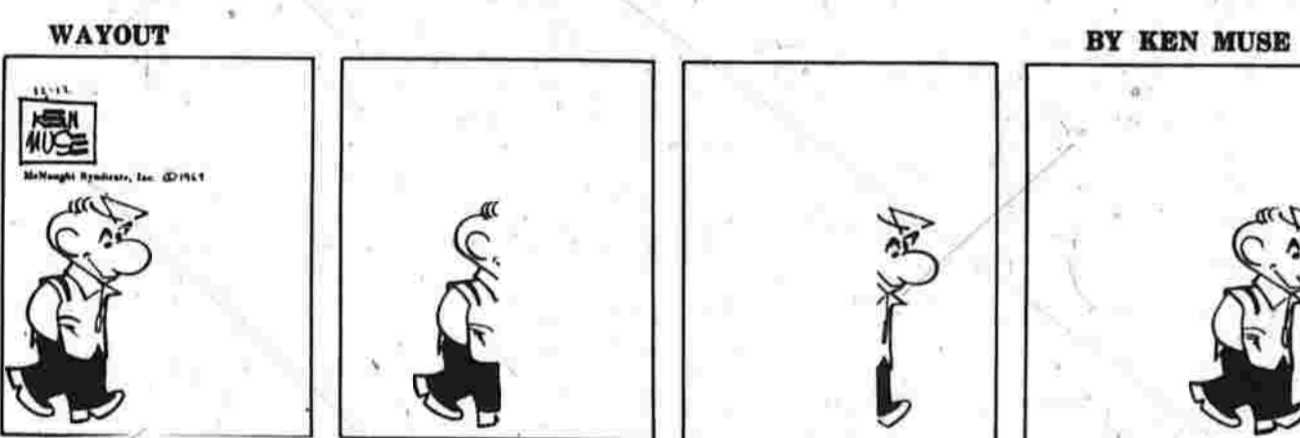

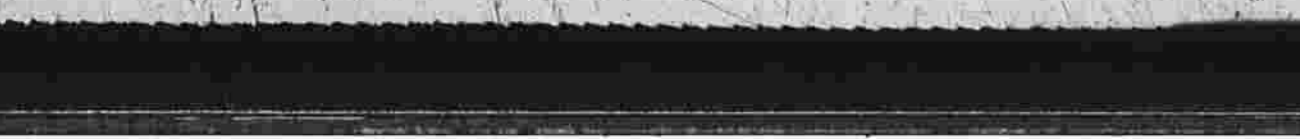

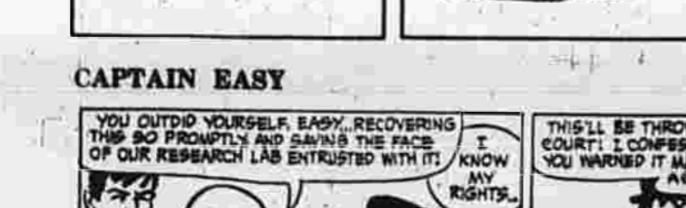

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Minorities Need Police Aid: Mitchell

HOT SPRINGS, Ark. (AP) — Sen. John M. Mitchell said today police must give "full and equal protection to members of minority groups."

Mitchell told the nation's Republican governors that the problem of improved police-community relations is especially necessary for members of minority groups.

He said resentment against the police is being fanned by their deeply held belief that the police are not protecting them adequately against crime.

He warned against "partisan and sectional bickering" that could lead to the destruction of law enforcement.

He said a lack of cooperation often exists between mayors of "big cities, mayors and governors, and governors and state attorneys general and local officials, for they are victims of crime out of proportion to their numbers."

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Hope Seen for Improved U.S.-Red China Relations

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nixon administration officials, encouraged by recent progress in restoring diplomatic talks after a 20-month lapse, see hope for improved relations with Communist China.

The State Department disclosed Friday Ambassador Walter D. Hooper had met the day before with the ranking Chinese diplomat in Warsaw, Lei Yang.
