Most Patronage Jobs Now in GOP Hands

WASHINGTON (AP) — Produced by complaints from patronage-seekers, the Nixon administration has made a fairly clean sweep of replacing Democrats with GOP appointees in policy jobs.

### Negro Files Suit Against Sikorsky To End Policies

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — James Hyatt, a Negro from New Haven, has filed a suit in U.S. District Court to have Sikorsky Aircraft of Stratford end what he says are policies that lead to racial discrimination. Hyatt, who worked for Sikorsky's painting department from 1965 to 1967, is now an insurance salesman.

His suit says that while he worked at the Stratford plant, Sikorsky failed to promote Hyatt and others to higher levels of employment including supervisory posts.

The suit also says Sikorsky failed to compensate Hyatt with amounts commensurate with that of others not of his race.

The effect of Sikorsky's policies, according to the suit, is to limit, segregate and discriminate against Negroes working for the firm.

According to the suit, Hyatt first complained to the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission in Oct. 17, 1967. On Sept. 30, 1968 the commission found reasonable cause to believe his complaint was valid and last Oct. 20 the commission advised him not to sue because the violations had not been corrected, the suit maintains.

Hyatt asks in the suit for a permanent injunction against the policies. He also asks that a lawyer be appointed for him, and that Sikorsky pay all legal fees in the matter. Sikorsky is a division of United Aircraft Corp.

### These Are Crucial Days In War Against Inflation

BY JOHN CUNNING AP Business Analyst NEW YORK (AP) — These are crucial days for the Nixon administration's economic program — a program that has promised much but which has been able to show very little until very recently.

Its purpose is to contain inflation by reducing demands on the economy by consumers, business and government. But business and consumers, while they have lessened their demands, haven't done so markedly.

Prices continue to rise sharply for both business and consumers, although not quite at the same rate that prevailed earlier this year. And there are suspicious members of the Fed's Open Market Committee who have indicated a move to loosen restrictions on the money supply.

About \$4 billion was paid from budget estimates made by the previous administration. And the President directed another cut of \$2.5 billion in outlays, particularly for military affairs.

But \$6 billion has been added this year to the budget for "uncontrollable" items, such as rising interest on the national debt. That in making money light and expensive, the administration partly thwarts its own goals.

But there are many ironies in this inflation battle. Just at the time when the President's words, "there are beginning to make some progress," there are indications that Congress and the people may be getting tired of waiting.

Instead of cooperating with the President, Congress has intent on passing legislation that might fuel demand. Or at least that is the way the President interprets Congress' intention of raising Social Security benefits by 15 per cent.

The Social Security issue really symbolizes the problem of growing demands for spending and the need for keeping the lid on.

Proponents of an increase argue that it is Social Security recipients and others on whom incomes who are hurt most by inflation and thus need wage increases. Opponents argue that the increase will only prolong inflation.

The same dilemma exists in regard to a dozen other issues. Lack of housing, for example is one of the major domestic problems; but the Nixon administration

### Great Britain Abolishes Death Penalty for Murder

LONDON (AP) — The House of Lords today permanently abolished the death penalty for murder in Great Britain after a two-day debate that crossed party lines. The Lords approved without a formal vote to make permanent a four-year experiment ending the hanging man despite strong conservative opposition and public opinion polls showing renewed support for using the gallows.

A key to the abolition victory in what both parties called a matter of conscience appeared to be the alternative: a return to the unpopular 1967 Homicide Act. Even the hanging lobby wanted to avoid that because of complicated definitions in it of which murders could be punished by death.

Camille Wounds Take Joy Out of Christmas

By ED TUNSTALL Associated Press Writer

PASS CHRISTIAN, Miss. (AP) — There's a big red ribbon on the Carpenter's front door. But there isn't any house attached to the door. Hurricane Camille took care of that four months ago.

No, it isn't a joke. Shirley Carpenter propped the front door against the slab of her home demolished by the hurricane at nearby Long Beach and she put a wreath on it. She even had a Christmas card made of the desolate scene.

The Mississippi Gulf Coast, from Pass Christian to Biloxi, looks pretty much like one of those Pacific islands after U.S. naval batteries had finished it in World War II. Much of the coast since Camille struck in mid-August has only added to the devastation. Big buildings have cleared much of the wreckage, leaving vacant lots where ancient homes once proudly stood, as if boating their antiquity.
