Guantanamo Fenced in By Castro

QUANTANAMO BAY, Cuba — Fidel Castro has completed the enclosure of this tiny American enclave with three seven-foot wire fences, one behind the other.

The project completely isolates the Guantanamo Bay base from the rest of the island. It was begun a year ago. U. S. aerial reconnaissance photographs show the fences set upon a bare ribbon of land running completely around the American base.

American officials here do not know whether to breathe easier or prepare for a crisis. The consensus is that the event presages a calm spell.

President Theodore Roosevelt created this base by treaty in 1903. In effect, the United States can have the 16-square-mile area — about half the size of the District of Columbia — in perpetuity, as long as it pays \$4,000 a year rent and observes other conditions.

One of these is that if any Cuban applies for asylum here or prepares for a crisis, the United States is obliged to comply. For that reason, a question about the fences has been raised.

Woodard said that in cases of non-compliance, LEAA would recommend court action by the Justice Department when the agency refused to correct the practice itself. An ultimate aim, LEAA would move to cut off anti-crime funds.

Under the 1963 Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act which created LEAA, the agency is barred from requiring that police, courts or prisons use a percentage ratio or quota in their employment system to achieve racial balance or eliminate racial imbalance.

Woodard said LEAA did not view the anti-discrimination regulations as running counter to that restriction.

He noted that before the regulations were issued they were submitted to Sen. John McClellan (D-Ark.), Roman L. Hruska (R-Ohio), and James H. Eastland (D-Miss.), all of whom supported the law against LEAA requiring a quota system to achieve racial balance.

There was no response from the senators, according to Woodard.

The regulations are expected to have a growing impact as LEAA's budget increases. This year the agency has a \$460 million budget, most of which will be distributed to state and local governments. Congress recently authorized a \$1.75 billion LEAA program for fiscal 1972.

Bias Among Police, Courts Target of New Law Arm

WASHINGTON — The Justice Department announced today that it will establish a new law enforcement arm to target racial bias among police, courts and prosecutors.

The new arm, known as the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA), will be headed by a new director and will have a budget of \$1.75 billion for fiscal 1972.

The LEAA was created in 1968 to coordinate federal aid to state and local law enforcement agencies. It is the largest federal agency for law enforcement.

The new arm will focus on racial bias in law enforcement. It will investigate and report on racial bias in police, courts and prosecutors. It will also provide training and technical assistance to law enforcement agencies to eliminate racial bias.

Arabian Horses Romp in Suburbia

South Windsor

Although South Windsor is considered rural suburbia, away from the bustling cities of Hartford, East Hartford and Rockville, it is a rare sight to see a herd of horses in this town today.

But, Sandra and Davis Lane of 1060 Avery St. know that you can, for they are proud owners of five high-spirited, gentle, affectionate Arabian horses which they house at Fairlane Farm on Avery St.

Like all young children, years ago Sandra wanted a horse but had to wait until she was a junior in high school before her father bought one for the family. She remembers that horse to be short, fat, and beautiful, to her, her family and all the neighborhood children.

After she married Dave and moved from her home town in East Hartford into the home they built in South Windsor, she bought a horse of her own and took riding lessons. These lessons were temporarily interrupted when Cheryl, now six, Jonathan, four, and Karen, three, were born.

The couple didn't want to deprive their children of fulfillment of the childhood dream of owning a horse, and they themselves dreamed of raising horses.

So they saw Robert Amende of Union, formerly of Rockville, one of the first breeders of Arabian horses in this area who got them interested in this breed of horses.

"I fell in love with the fire-breath and versatility of the Arabian horses. Everytime I watched Amende's mares running in the pasture with their tails carried over their back and nostrils flaring, I wanted one more and more," Sandra said. This obsession grew and she began to study the breed and learn about the horses' various bloodlines.

Breed's History

Arabian horses have wide foreheads, large dark eyes set low in the head, a small tea cup muzzle and small ears. The breed is said to have one less vertebra in its back than other breeds and is the oldest pure breed horse there is. The Arab, an originator in Egypt in the desert where the mare was the prized possession of her owner. They were used extensively in their home country for long distance racing, cutting cattle, jumping and just about anything one can imagine a horse can be used to do.

The Arabians in racing are fast, coming their own in the United States. They are show horses and content in western pleasure, English pleasure, "park" (more formal), jumping, reining (racing hooked to a cart, the gait is trot) formal driving and pleasure categories.

Their characteristic "floating trot" gives the impression that the animals are actually floating. Their front legs, at the end of the stride at the trot, hesitate a moment before returning to the turf.

So, the Lanes decided, if they bought any horse, it would be an Arabian. After visiting various farms and looking over hundreds of horses, their hearts went out to a little dark gray filly from the Black Watch Farms in Pabkhill Plains, N.Y.

They returned home and, for two weeks, thought about the animal. Again they journeyed to New York to see it and after another week of "not being able to get the animal out of our minds," they said, they called the Black Watch Farms and made arrangements to buy the filly.

The horse was supposed to be delivered on the day of the Connecticut, All-Arab Horse Show in Durham and the Lanes were to meet the sellers who would show their new possession in the show, and then bring her home to South Windsor.

Late Arrival

The show started but no trailer or filly arrived. Anxiety and disappointment seemed to shadow the day when a huge, six-horse van pulled into the fairgrounds. Black Watch Farms had gotten the trailer loaded and hooked up the night before, but when they went to load the filly for delivery that morning, they found the trailer was a flat tire. So, a huge van was used to transfer the precious cargo.

The next few minutes at the show seemed like hours as considerable rushing followed the arrival of the filly, Garterde, to prepare her for entry into her class in the show. The class was only delayed for a few minutes and then Garterde went into the ring and won her class.

Once at home in South Windsor, the animal was not about to let her arrival be uneventful; she had been put into a board paddock to spend the night. The next morning, when the Lanes went to see their prize, she was gone. She had jumped the 4 1/2 foot square enclosure to join the other horses in the pasture.

The following spring when Garterde was three years old, she was bred to Amende's stallion Court Orlando. Court Orlando was imported from England and had been shown tentatively there. He was one of two horses to ever win the Winston Churchill Cup for Supreme Riding Horse of All Breeds. The other horse was his sire.

Tragedy strikes

A bay colt was the result of this breeding but the Lanes experienced a tragedy when the colt was two months old. It wandered onto the road and was killed by a passing motorist.

Make-Up Expert Advises Constant Facial Changes

PARIS (AP) — "You never stop thinking in life, so why stop changing your face?" asks Serge Lutens, whose daring white face make-up for Dior has stunned Paris for the past four seasons. "Most women wear make-up as a form of social courtesy, like brushing their teeth or saying good-morning," he continues on his pet grievance. "But the real make-up is an experience in self-concentration—in short, in looking yourself in the face."

When Lutens, who wears mostly blue and hair to his shoulders, tells the Dior mannequins how to put on their faces, he has to subject his "strong ideas" to "imperatives of clothes." "Alas," he says with resignation, "it would be much more amusing to think about the spirit of fashion not about a few rules."

The face that goes with this winter's long 30's clothes is "like Chinese furniture, brilliant, satiny and lacquered," he describes grudgingly. "The lips are like varnished wood, the eyes like crystal, the whole face transparent and sophisticated."

This means applying pale pink foundation, almost white powder, gelish purple-lilac eye shadow coating the entire eyesocket, lipstick to match and a Japanese rose-blue shadow under the chin "to detach the face from the neck, as if placed on a pedestal." The eyebrows should be almost nonexistent, the hair as smooth tight cup.

An alternative is to sketch pink crescent swooping from above the eyebrows down to the cheekbone, "to show the rapport between the eye and the cheek." If traced too timidly, Lutens cautions, this makes women look like rabbits.

"It's nice to be natural," he says, "but that's not the point of make-up. I hate everything that improves on nature, like false eyelashes. That's cheating."

However, a woman does have the right-up to a point—to some say when her face is in question. For example, "if a woman likes bushy eyebrows, she can keep them." Lutens magnanimously. NASA Criticism Heightened By Russian Moon Probes

WASHINGTON (AP) — The recent successes of two unmanned Russian moon probes have sharpened the arguments of critics of America's manned space flight program.

The critics proclaim that America, too, should rely more on automatic payloads and they urge additional cutbacks in manned projects.

Congressional opponents of man in space already have sliced deeply into the space agency budget since the Apollo 11 moon landing in July 1969.

They have been aided by several factors: The need to spend money on more earthy problems like pollution, poverty and Vietnam; the abortive Apollo 13 mission which demonstrated the risk to astronauts; and the fact that most Americans believe the Soviet Union no longer is a threat to U.S. superiority in space.

The congressional action, which has trimmed NASA's budget from a peak of \$5.9 billion in 1968 to \$2.2 billion this year, has resulted in elimination of three Apollo moon landings, a stretchout in other missions and cancellations of some unmanned programs.

That leaves just four more Apollo shots, starting with Apollo 14's scheduled Jan. 31 launching.

In the same period, the number of persons employed in the space program in the United States has dropped from 200,000 to 145,000.

Yet, a Senate attempt in December to delete \$10 million from the budget for NASA's next major manned vehicle, the space shuttle, was defeated.

The feeling of the Congressional action seems to be: Space cuts have been deep enough. Let's ease up for the time being.

However, the \$110 million will allow NASA only to move into a study phase on the shuttle, a reusable vehicle intended to ferry men and supplies between earth and a large orbiting station. Space officials foresee future budget battles similar to those being waged by congressional opponents of the SST, the supersonic transport. They say it will be a fight against the SST or shuttle space station.

Leading the opposition may be the Senate senator conducting the charge against the SST, William Proxmire, D-Wis.

Proxmire has noted that America paid \$24 billion to see television record man's first steps on the moon. Given that Broadway standards this is a pretty stiff price to pay for a front row seat.

Proxmire cited Russia's Luna 16, an unmanned craft which returned moon soil to earth, and Luna 17, which discharged a wheeled rover on the moon, as said the U.S. program should concentrate more on such automatic devices.

In arguing against the shuttle, Sen. Walter F. Mondale, D-Minn., said the \$110 million would "be only the tip of an iceberg" which he said might cost \$4 billion or more.

"The shuttle and space station," Mondale declared, "are the first essential steps toward a manned Mars landing—a program that could cost anywhere between \$50 billion and \$100 billion. The President apparently believes that \$110 million for the space shuttle is more important than providing increased funds for urban renewal, for a clean environment and for improved veterans care."

He said the shuttle project is based on the assumption, still unconfirmed, that man can function effectively in a space environment for long periods of time.

Rep. H.R. Gross, R-Iowa, long has fought heavy budget cuts any space project.

"Anyone would have to have a head on his back to believe there is any austerity in the space program," he said. "We now have the rocks and moon dust down here. How much more of this do we need? Let some other country that has a lot of money do this."

Congress has cut enough funds in the past two years to delay the launching of the shuttle space station from 1975 until 1977 or 1978, perhaps later.

The only other plan for sending man into space is a Soviet call for a small three-man station named Skylab to orbit the earth in 1974. It could carry a crew of four or more years in a manned space flight.

Manned flight proponents fear this will enable the Russians, who have declared they will orbit the first large station, to overtake the U.S. lead in space.

Most opponents of manned flight feel this argument is flag-waving and propaganda intended to influence Congress to loosen the purse strings. They feel the United States can maintain an on-going space program and a lead over Russia with an annual budget around \$3 billion.

"It is too early to go into the shuttle," complains Rep. Joseph E. Kari, D-Minn., chairman of the House subcommittee on space science and applications. "Some day we may well want to do this, but let's take it slow and easy. Let's not rush this multimillion-dollar program."

Now, as Lester Maddox leaves office, the post-mortem are surprisingly mild. Those who expected disaster have discovered that, somehow, Maddox was never quite as bad as he seemed likely to be.

It seems to be on the record that, willingly or not, Governor Maddox, in these past four years, presided over more integration than had occurred in all the rest of Georgia's history.

And people of Connecticut will be interested in the fact that Governor Maddox took an interest in his state's penal system that paved the way for his successor, Governor-elect Carter, to employ away from Connecticut its Commissioner of Corrections, Ellis MacDougal, who is probably the nation's number one dedicated servant in penology.

Two things often happen when extremist campaigners actually come into office and responsibility. First, they inevitably discover that the real problems of public service are not subject to simplistic answers and solutions. Second, they find that they themselves have a human desire to be remembered for broader and more constructive views than they may have exhibited in their campaigning.

What a Might-Have-Been! It now seems to have passed from the realm of rumor into that of probability that there was some long range discussion, back in 1966, of the possibility that Hubert Humphrey might engage one Nelson Rockefeller to be his nominee for world federation, so strong it could only be threatened and challenged and tested by some revolution as deep and violent as the Civil War which had unsuccessfully challenged the federation which was the United States.

And there were hopes that not only small nations, which it could be imagined might have little choice, but great nations as well would consider it their special obligation, as world leaders, to submit themselves to the jurisdiction and judgment of the United Nations even in instances when they did not like the results.

Parents vs. Grandparents

Jane and Eddie, a young married couple, showed almost no interest in their baby boy. Out of sheer necessity, Jane's parents took over the task of bringing him up.

But when he was three, Jane and Eddie decided they wanted him back. The grandparents refused to part with the boy, so the two couples squared off in the courtroom to fight for custody.

"Parents outrank grandparents," argued the younger pair. But it also appeared that Jane and Eddie drank too much, worked too little, and had no home of their own. The court ruled that the boy was better off where he was, with his grandparents.

It is not rare for parents and grandparents to disagree about the custody of a child. Generally speaking, the law puts its main emphasis on what is best for the child, even at the expense of parental sensibilities.

Nevertheless, in most instances, parents are indeed favored over grandparents because they are the "natural" custodians of their own offspring. As one court put it:

"The law seeks to work in harmony with nature, and to confine those ties which bind man to his own flesh."

Thus, in another case, parents regained custody of their daughter even though they had no savings, no life insurance, and only a modest income. Noting that their income at least was steady and their habits sober, the court said:

"Unless they are to be deprived for all time of the love of their child, and of the opportunity to give their love, they should be given that chance now."

Are a child's own wishes taken into consideration? Yes, if he is mature enough to have independent views. But usually this factor is not decisive by itself.

A 15-year-old boy, transferred to his parents' home after many years with his grandmother, was unhappy about the change. He said in a court hearing that, because of squabbling between his mother and father, he wanted to move back with his grandmother.

But the court held that the boy's discontent was not enough reason to grant his request. The court said he would probably soon get used to the shift from a sheltered existence with his grandmother to the normal abrasions of family life.

Lax Screening Blamed in Four Recent Skyjacks

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. director of civil aviation security says four of the most recent airline hijackings occurred when the airlines failed to make proper use of a government-approved passenger screening system.

Retired Air Force Lt. Gen. Benjamin O. Davis spoke to an opening session of a three-day international meeting on transportation and security Monday. He said of the four hijacked planes, "our screening system would easily have identified each of these hijackers—on the ground—before the aircraft took off."

Davis said of the four recent hijackings, each had these characteristics:

—The hijacker wanted a free ride to a destination he could not reach otherwise.

—A stewardess was held hostage and threatened with death.

—The incident occurred shortly after takeoff.

—And the passenger screening system was not in use or was not properly used.

Two of the hijacked planes belonged to National Airlines, he said. The other planes were owned by United and Eastern.

The conference, before which Davis spoke is being attended by delegates from 74 nations, including the Soviet Union, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Poland and Romania.

Brazil Frees 70 Prisoners As Ambassador's Ransom

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) — Buckets of champagne and a welcome-home banquet today awaited Gwion ambassador kidnaped by terrorists 29 days ago and ransomed by the Brazilian government with the flight of 70 Brazilian prisoners to political asylum in Chile.

The ambassador's butler began making plans for the banquet after a Virgin Airlines Boeing 707 took off at midnight for Santiago carrying the 70 prisoners, the largest number ever released as ransom in a political kidnapping.

The jetliner arrived at Santiago's Pudahuel International Airport at 4:22 a.m. A Chilean Foreign Ministry official said Bucher was released as soon as the ransom money was received.

Photographers and television cameramen were the only persons allowed on the ramp as the prisoners—29 men and women—disembarked. The prisoners were not allowed to speak with newsmen. Plainclothes police patrolled the terminal, and maintained security outside on the ramp.

Along with the prisoners and the plane crew, the jetliner carried three children and 20 security guards. The children were those of prisoner Bruno Pilo, who was freed with his wife. The crew members and guards remained aboard the plane while it refueled for the flight back to Brazil.

A group of about 80 young Brazilians living in Chile cheered loudly as the prisoners left the plane. Several of the hostages said they were glad to be home.

Some prisoners were laughing and some were weeping. "I'm glad as I ever was," said one of the prisoners.

Two buses took the prisoners to a police barracks in Santiago where they were to remain for the day.

Brazilian President Emilio Garrastazu Médici signed a decree ending the prisoners' release as "dangerous to national security."

The Rev. Philip Berrigan, the imprisoned antiwar priest, and four others have denied kidnapping plot, scoring the charges as a government attempt to discredit the antiwar movement.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Fire in a home and senior citizens early today killed nine and injured 48 other persons, authorities reported.

Blaze in Home for Elderly Claims Nine Senior Citizens. The blaze apparently started in the chapel on the first floor. The dining room and chapel were destroyed by the blaze but there was no fire damage in the remainder of the building.

U.S. Bombers Join Campaign to Open Cambodian Highway

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. B-52 bombers have joined the campaign to reopen Cambodia's highway to the sea, where severe fighting was reported, informed sources reported today.

The command reported that the last message shortly before the fighting was reported was still raging, but gave no details of casualties.

The North Vietnamese seized about 200 miles of road in the southwest of Phnom Penh. The North Vietnamese seized 21 and are well dug in to resist aerial attacks.

The U.S. Command said allied forces killed 1,177 North Vietnamese and 1,177 Viet Cong last week, bringing the total enemy dead to 693,005 since Jan. 1, 1961.
