

End Sought On State Aid To Schools

HARTFORD (AP) — Two Republican leaders in the House asked their fellow legislators Thursday to withdraw state aid to private colleges and universities.

House Minority Leader Frank J. Collins of Brookfield and assistant leader Gerald F. Stevens of Milford maintain that state aid to both the public and private sides of higher education will weaken the state's assistance in both areas.

Meanwhile, the Connecticut Conference of Independent Colleges recently asked the state and then Gov. Wilcox Tech. to increase state assistance to private colleges under the two-year-old plan to \$100 per pupil—which would cost an estimated \$12 million dollars each year.

The 1969 legislature enacted a bill that provides each private college with 125 per cent of the tuition for each new space created for Connecticut students. The bill filed by Collins and Stevens would repeal that law.

Other new bills filed, listed with sponsors, would:

- Raise the maximum assets permissible under Medicaid from \$500 to \$1,000 for single persons and \$1,000 for a married couple.
- Sen. Joseph I. Lieberman, D-New Haven.
- Require the state to buy paper that has at least 50 per cent recycled waste paper to encourage reuse of one of the main elements of solid waste.
- Sen. Peter L. Cushman, R-Lyme.
- Require an optional retirement qualification for teachers from 35 to 30 years, also reducing from 25 to 20 the amount of time that must be spent in Connecticut schools.
- Sen. Stanley J. Pac, D-New Britain.
- Provide a board of arbitration to hear a teacher's appeal from dismissal instead of the state.

Oil Tanker Catches Fire; 16 Missing

CAGLIARI, Sardinia (AP) — The \$3,882-ton American tanker Universe Patriot caught fire after an explosion of Sardinia during the night. Sixteen of the 98-man crew are missing.

Two ships picked up the German captain and 16 of his men early this morning. Later, six others were rescued after spending the night in the rough waters in a rubber raft.

The Cagliari Military Marine Headquarters and the Civil Port Authority said their earlier report that 22 men were on the ship was mistaken. Only six men were aboard according to the latest message from the rescue ship, a Panamanian freighter.

Italian officials quoted the rescued captain as saying the tanker had other rubber rafts and the missing men may be on them.

The captain said the crew in the rubber rafts were rescued by the Italian officials. The rest of the men were Greek, Indonesian, Portuguese, German, British and Filipino.

There was no leakage of because the tanker was bound for Tripoli with water ballast in her tanks after unloading a car of crude oil on the French island of Sardinia.

More Data Reported On Army Spying

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Former Army intelligence agents say they spied on student political meetings addressed by such liberals as Sen. Walter Mondale and ex-ambassador John Kenneth Galbraith.

The recently discharged agents say they took note of what the speakers said and described crowd reactions in reports to Army Intelligence Command headquarters at Ft. Holmdel, Md.

All six former agents interviewed by The Associated Press said they did not consider the surveillance of civilian meetings as assignments to spy personally on Mondale and Galbraith. But one agent said when he protested the propriety of the snooping, his commanding officer in the 11th Military Intelligence regional headquarters here said: "You are ordered to spy."

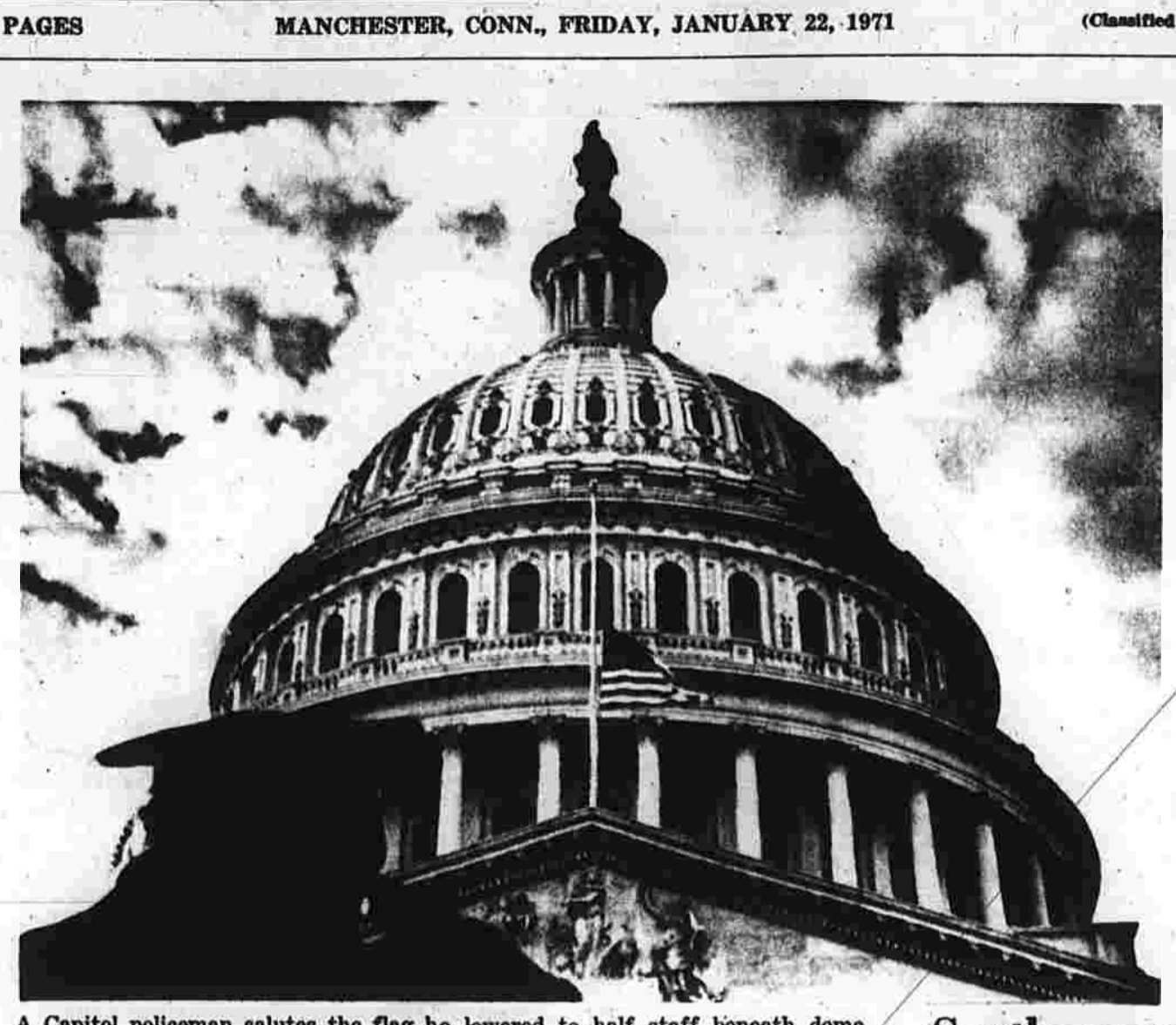
Earlier disclosures by agents in other parts of the country have fueled a growing controversy over military surveillance of civilian activity. Sen. Sam Ervin, D-M.C., who is heading a congressional probe, said last month agents had spied on such Illinois politicians as Sen. Adlai Stevenson III.

According to the former agents—all enlisted men—interviewed in Minnesota, a half dozen Army men were in the audience when Mondale, D-Minn., gave a speech at the University of Minnesota. Mondale and the crowd when the noted economist appeared on the University of Minnesota campus.

The six former agents said 95 per cent of their work with the 11th involved routine security checks on military personnel and defense contractors.

However, the agents said their superiors were intensely interested in civilian protest activities. As a result, they said the 11th:

Nixon To Propose Cabinet Alteration

WASHINGTON — President Nixon's State of the Union address before a joint session of Congress tonight will propose a broad reorganization of the federal structure reducing the 12 Cabinet departments to eight and triggering a massive congressional debate.

The message, which the President will deliver in person to the people of this country at 8 p.m. (EST), will be broadcast live on radio and television and will emphasize the major themes of revenue sharing with the states and cities, basic new health proposals, and far-reaching environmental protection.

If the President follows through on earlier decisions, he will propose a consolidation of the Departments of Agriculture, Labor, HUD, HEW, Commerce, Interior and Transportation into four Cabinet agencies.

The Post Office Department is already slated to be absorbed by a governmental corporation.

Left untouched would be the Departments of State, Treasury, Justice and Defense.

But officials who have seen some of the latest drafts emphasize that the President's proposals will be on grand concepts rather than details.

He wants to point the way to new concepts of how government — federal, state and local — can be properly structured to provide services to the people they want and expect.

As the President said in talking to his staff Wednesday, he wants to close the gap between governmental promise and performance.

Any reorganization proposal would arouse opposition from all powerful, prestigious and special interest groups and also would cut across existing lines of authority in government.

Thus the outlook for major reforms, which require Congressional approval, is not bright. The Senate, a body where seniority is equated with power and seniority, is not expected to pass any such proposals.

The President is considering the possibility of a new regulatory agency, but details of these plans are expected to be given in a later special message.

Similarly, he has new proposals to promote minority interests which he will outline to Congress later in the year.

Nixon Eye Fixed On '72 Race

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon, his eye presumably fixed on 1972, delivered his State of the Union message tonight, outlining for Congress and the nation the President's approach and new initiatives. He thinks will ease the country's problems.

The traditional message will be delivered live to a joint session of Congress and will be televised and broadcast beginning at 8 p.m. (EST).

For a brief time, consideration was given to postponing the speech because of the death Thursday afternoon of one of the most powerful senators, Democrat Richard B. Russell of Georgia.

The White House said it decided with alacrity to deliver the address as scheduled.

The focus of the President's remarks will be domestic programs and his foreign policy questions will be dealt with in a separate message.

Because Nixon's State of the Union remarks are almost all packed with domestic programs, the House announced in advance they will boycott the session. They wrote Nixon:

"Your constant refusal to hear the pleas and concerns of black Americans dictates our decision to be absent."

Sen. Edward W. Brooke, R-Mass., only black in the Senate, said he will attend the session.

The keynotes of Nixon's 1971 program is a great expansion blueprint for sharing part of Uncle Sam's tax take with hard-pressed state and local governments on pretty much a non-strings-attached basis.

Last year the Democratic-controlled House members from coast to coast urged Congress Thursday to give 25 million more dollars to the tax-lowering Democratic whip.

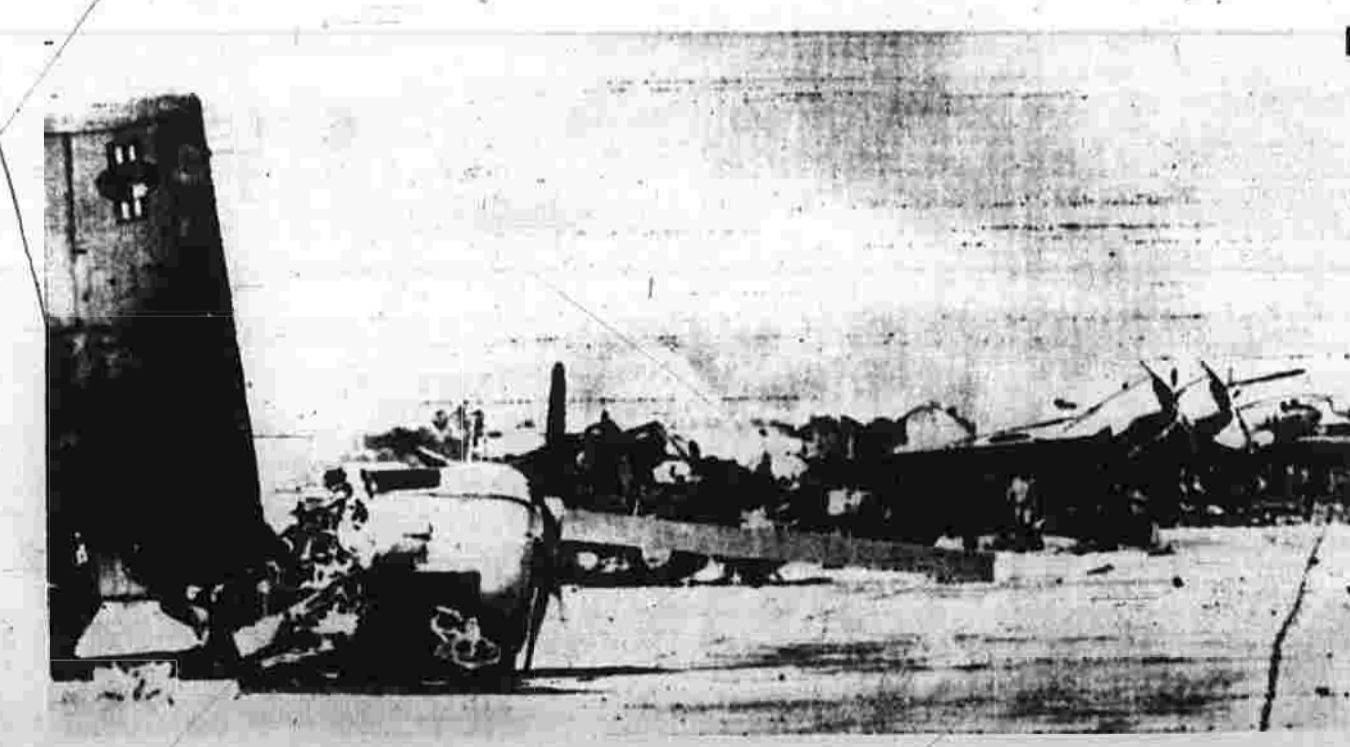
Complaining of discrimination which they said stems from a 30-year-old quota of history, the congressmen representing constituents in 28 states called for tax reforms to give unmarried persons the tax status of married ones who split the family's income in filing joint returns.

Rep. Edward J. Koch, D-N.Y., a bachelor and prime sponsor of the proposal, said his bill would "simply remove the unfair and inequitable rules now paid by single taxpayers" — not discriminate against married ones filing joint returns.

In the 1960s many states adopted community property laws which provided that half of the property income had been earned by the spouse, he said, and federal tax law was changed to lower the U.S. tax burden on married people in all states.

Congress, Koch said, neglected to "take into account the economic conditions of the states."

Raid Wrecks Air Force Of Cambodia

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (AP) — A rocket, mortar and commando attack on Phnom Penh's airport and a nearby military camp and ammunition dumps early today took a heavy toll of lives, wrecked Cambodia's tiny air force and overshadowed the Cambodian army's success in its drive to reopen the highway to the sea.

The casualty count was not available, but the number of Cambodian dead and wounded was estimated at more than 100. Only one or two of the attackers were reported killed.

Heavy fighting raged from the airport, eight miles outside the city, and no accurate count of the destruction was available. But Cambodian officers said six of their air force's eight helicopters were destroyed and the other two were extensively damaged.

From a nearby rooftop, it appeared that few if any military planes on the field today. The military flight line looked like a junkyard.

The destruction of the air force was likely to have little effect on the war, Vietnamese officials said. Simultaneous with the big attack on the airport, the enemy launched a rocket that landed in a riverbed shipyard on the edge of downtown Phnom Penh, the Cambodian attack jet on the base of the city.

As firemen fought the blaze in the yard, witnesses reported a 60-ft. wall was higher than a man's waist.

Informed sources said the damage to Cambodian air force planes was extensive. They attributed most of the plane damage to a single Viet Cong rocket. One source said several planes of the type they used to fly were destroyed. French F-7Cs, Magisters, trainers and converted U.S. F-4Es were totaled, as well as many transport planes.

Trucks hauled bodies and scores of blood-soaked women and children into Phnom Penh from the airport and army camp eight miles outside the city. The death toll was not known, but it was feared would be high.

O'Neill Picked New Englander Chosen House Democratic Whip

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Thomas P. O'Neill Jr., veteran Massachusetts legislator, was chosen today to be the House Democratic whip.

The 58-year-old O'Neill, a former speaker of the Massachusetts House, is a member of the House Rules Committee.

As whip, the No. 2 Democratic party post in the House, O'Neill succeeds Rep. Hale Boggs of Louisiana who was elevated to the Democratic leadership post.

Boggs made the announcement in O'Neill's selection.

O'Neill, a cigar-smoking native of Cambridge, Mass., served in the Massachusetts legislature from 1952-53. He was the minority leader there in 1957 and speaker from 1962-63.

O'Neill, who has a shock of curly white hair, was elected to Congress in 1962 and has been returned every two years since.

The selection of O'Neill gives more of a geographic balance to the House leadership.

Speaker Carl Albert is from Oklahoma. Boggs from Louisiana and Clin E. Ferguson, chairman of the House Democratic caucus, hails from Texas.

This was his first public announcement that he did not intend to continue on the Hartford Board when his present two-year term ends.

During his tenure no further political ambitions he did not feel constrained to avoid further embarrassment to the Hartford board.

Mr. Battles said that he had discussed the kind of leadership needed locally and nationally to overcome the problems facing us in the 1970's.

During his ideas about what makes a good leader, Battles revealed a self-analysis of the kind of leader he would like to see in the future.

Valiance House Sees First Year a Success

By JUNE LINTON (Herald Reporter)

A 65 per cent drop-out rate doesn't sound like success unless the subject happens to be a drug treatment program. The directors of Valiance House at Norwich State Hospital look at the positive side statistics and see that out of the 100 young drug addicts treated last year, 65 may just make it back to a drug-free life.

The drug therapy center, which opened its doors just a week ago in a Connecticut state hospital, during the year similar programs have been started at the two other state hospitals, Connecticut Valley Hospital in Middletown and the Fairfield Hills Hospital, the latter launched with help from two of the first Valiance House graduates.

The program at Norwich serves, at any one time, about 20 drug dependent patients. No methadone is used here, only group therapy and individual therapy. The program is a 24-hour-a-day for up to nine months in length.

It's a difficult program to get into and apparently it's also a difficult program to stay in. Only one out of three see it through. During its first year of operation, 65 per cent of the 100 who were in the final phase. However, only one out of four of those who go through "detox," as it's called, choose the program, and these are accepted only after a screening which includes a stress interview lasting 1 1/2 to two hours. Here the addict has to prove he has the will to help and is forced to think about things he doesn't want to look at.

Alan Taylor, assistant director. The many who decline to go to Valiance House are sent to the courts for the most part, but some do not want to give up drugs or alcohol. They can do it on their own.

Some of these men, most of them young, apply for the program voluntarily but most are under pressure from the courts. They may be sent directly after a sentence or suspended and they are committed to the custody of the commissioner of mental health or they may be on probation or have a criminal charge pending.

According to Taylor, the main reason they're here is that they don't want to go to prison and they're afraid of the courts. They begin to find other ways to change their lives, that there are things they never realized before that they can do, things they discover about themselves.

Head spinning screaming and yelling at one another, he said, is a brutal assault on the senses and by being in the program, this is what it takes. He explained that awareness has to be gained before the program can come out of it.

Two Many Vacancies This treatment center can handle only 20 out of the thousands of drug dependents need more often than it's been full. Yet, Taylor said they feel outside and here's a gradual program have a much better chance. "If we change the program so we have fewer patients leaving and more graduating, I think what would happen would be more failure in the long run, and even know that 90 per cent of those who do split (the drop-outs) go back on drugs, we also know that some of them sooner or later will come back or go into another program and at least they know what they have to do."

The outlook is that "it'll take time and it'll be a hopeless thing either."

It seems hopeless enough to the parents of those who leave or don't accept the program always say to him, "you're supposed to treat them, you're supposed to motivate them. He shook his head. "What do you say?"

Bolton Zoning Board Welcomes New Member

Selectmen Okay Transfer Of \$8,000 for Rec Building

Matters of finance dominated the agenda at the Board of Selectmen's meeting Wednesday night. The board approved a transfer of \$8,000 from the recreation fund to the building fund for the completion of the recreation building at Herrick Memorial Park.

The decision was made after the appearance of Board Commissioner Ray Somers, who stated that building costs have been higher than anticipated. He said that the greatest error was made in computing the cost of the heating system and the cost of building materials as affected by inflation.

He noted that original estimates were based on sketches rather than on finished blueprints.

First Selectman Richard Mora expressed the hope that the facilities would be ready before the start of the baseball season in June. He also said that a "think to do" light would be installed at the entrance to the park.

Another matter to be presented to the Board of Finance is the need for an additional voting machine before the next federal election.

The selectmen will also recommend that the Board of Finance authorize payment of two bills totaling \$77 presented by Assessor John Williams. The first is from the Connecticut Bank and Trust data service for making new file cards for all existing accounts. The second charge is for organizing information on tax exemptions for the elderly.

Mora also said he would like to have the Board of Finance appropriate \$2,000 or \$3,000 more to pay constables to check local businesses at night.

It was announced that a check for \$215 has been received from the Health and Welfare Department representing a grant for schools by the Bolton Nursery School.

The selectmen noted that their recent appointment of Ernest Reed to the Planning Commission was out of order for two reasons. The first is that, as an elected board, the Planning Commission has the power to fill its own vacancies within 31 days. At the end of that period, the selectmen may appoint someone to the position.

Secondly, the appointment was made before an official written resignation had been received from Bruce Hutchinson. Although there was a verbal resignation, written resignation was not received until last week. The selectmen's support of Reed as a candidate now stands as a recommendation rather than an appointment.

In further discussion on the Planning Commission, Second Selectman Joseph Licita pointed out that the matter of appointing alternates to the Planning and Zoning Commissions is being studied. Members of both groups indicated a desire for alternate members at a recent town meeting.

Lack of Funds Reduces Episcopal National Staff

NEW YORK (AP) — Many of the Episcopal National Staff members are to be laid off because of a lack of funds, Bishop Blanchard said today.
The center, built by the church at a cost of about \$8 million and now worth at least \$20 million, is being financed by the sale of the Episcopal Church's national headquarters building in New York City. Bishop Blanchard said the remaining "core staff," the smallest possible to continue the Episcopal Church's national headquarters, will act mainly as a "switchboard operation" for the various dioceses.

Over the past year, drops in income and rising costs have forced varying cuts in major programs and in most major Protestant, Roman Catholic and Jewish organizations.
But the drastic, abrupt nature of the Episcopal retrenchment, along with the concentration on a single, relatively new building, gives it a dramatic impact on the Episcopal Church.

Other special functions also charged to a halt as staff departures continued between Jan. 3 and March 31. On the 10th floor, once humming with activity, only four people worked in the vast, vacant sweep of files and desks.
The eighth and ninth floors were similarly thinned. Telephones are disconnected as people leave. The polished corridors were mostly silent.
