

South Viets Enter Laos; Six U.S. Choppers Lost



U.S. Calls Laos Operation Limited 'In Time—Area'

WASHINGTON (AP)—U.S. forces are withdrawing from Laos today, the South Vietnamese government said today that the United States declared today that the South Vietnamese government's operations in Laos will be limited in "time and area" and will be conducted in a way that does not threaten the lives of the South Vietnamese people.

The operation carried the war into the third Indochinese country, but the State Department and the South Vietnamese government insisted the Indochina conflict was not being enlarged. The Soviet Union and Communist China called the operation an expansion of the war and blamed the United States. France reported to Hanoi that it was an extension and a prolonging of the fighting. The British government expressed its understanding of the operation and said North Vietnam was to blame for conditions in Laos. The North Vietnamese peace talks delegation in Paris condemned the incursion as a "new escalation of the war" by the United States. The operation was confined, in this first day at least, to one sector of Laos—a landlocked nation a little smaller than Oregon. The drive covers a little more than nine months after U.S. and South Vietnamese forces crossed into Cambodia to smash North Vietnamese bases there. American helicopters and South Vietnamese armored cars took the troops across the border. The U.S. Command pledged its full air and artillery support. But the U.S. Command said no American ground combat forces or advisers would cross the border. American troops who moved into the northwest corner of South Vietnam 10 days ago would act as a blocking force on the Vietnamese side of the border. Field reports said four U.S. helicopters were shot down and two crashed due to mechanical trouble. Pilots reported heavy anti-aircraft fire, but the reports indicated most of the crews were rescued. An Associated Press correspondent Michael Putek reported from the border that South Vietnamese troops made contact with North Vietnamese forces within an hour after they crossed the frontier. U.S. helicopter gunships attacked the enemy positions with rockets. About a mile inside Laos, an American Cobra helicopter gun was reported in action. The strategic goal behind the operation is to report its action to the U.S. Security Council, to the British and Russian as co-chairmen of the 1964 Geneva Conference on Indochina and to the governments of Canada, France and West Germany, which form an international Communist bloc. The U.S. government said it would not act as a blocking force on the Vietnamese side of the border. The operation is not an enlargement of the war, the State Department said in a policy statement. Press officer Robert J. McCloskey said the operation in which the United States is supplying air support for thousands of South Vietnamese troops, will be limited to the area between the 16th and 17th parallel. That would keep it within the southern Laos peninsula and the region of the Communist supply center of Soppone. McCloskey declined to define the time limitation. Under questioning he said that the limits determined by South Vietnamese President Nguyen Van Thieu would apply to U.S. air support also. President Nixon made the basic decision on striking at the North, McCloskey said. He declined to be more specific. A statement on U.S. policy promised an announcement by President Nixon on further withdrawal of U.S. forces. He said this to the Lao operation. It also sought to meet any charges that the operation conflicts with the Cooper-Church restriction on U.S. operations in Indochina by saying that the new move "is consistent with statutory requirements." As the Defense Department and done last night, the comprehensive policy statement today pledged that no American ground combat forces or advisers would cross into Laos. It repeated the South Vietnamese government's definition of the objective of the operation as being to destroy supplies and forces concentrated in Laos by the North Vietnamese. "The operation will promote the security and safety of American and allied forces in South Vietnam," the statement said, "and is consistent with statutory requirements." President Issues Ecology Proposals

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Nixon sent Congress today his environmental proposals for 1971, including brand new programs to control noise, ocean dumping, and the industrial and commercial use of toxic substances. The President also proposed to tax the use of lead in gasoline and to levy a charge on oil on oil polluting sulfur content of energy fuels, a measure whose greatest impact would be on the costs of electric power generation. As promised earlier, Nixon called for adoption by Congress of a national land use policy, which would lean heavily on the authority of state governments to regulate critical uses of their land. The package also repeated Nixon's call, contained a week ago in his budget proposals for fiscal 1972, to increase federal aid for construction of waste treatment facilities to a level of \$1 billion per year over the next three years. The President's proposals would also give the new Environmental Protection Agency a stronger hand in enforcing water quality standards by allowing it to impose administrative fines up to \$25,000. And it would permit citizen suits against water polluters, such as were authorized against polluters in the 1970 Air Quality Act. An announced previously, the President would place limitations upon industrial and municipal waste discharges into virtually all United States waters, including ground water. In all, said Russell E. Train, chairman of the President's Council on Environmental Quality, the program would require passage of about 14 pieces of legislation. Train told newsmen the bills would be sent to Congress within a few days, perhaps on Wednesday. He said, however, there was no estimate yet how much money the proposals would require for their implementation. Much of the message repeated what Nixon said last week when Congress has not acted. Apollo Spacecraft Races Homeward

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP)—Apollo 14 and its cargo moon treasure plummeted past the half-way mark of its homeward journey today, streaking faster and faster toward Tuesday splashdown in the Pacific Ocean. Alan B. Shepard Jr., Edgar D. Mitchell and Stuart A. Roosa reluctantly awakened after a 10-hour rest, which followed a Sunday night sleep in which they expressed hope the space program might help achieve peace and understanding on earth. Mission Control said it had considered letting them sleep later because they had only a light schedule on their last full day in space. Monitoring systems showed the spacecraft in good readings and resting for the keep re-entry Tuesday. Children Join with Fathers In Ulster's Street Warfare

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP)—"How do you fight a 10-year-old even if he has a bomb in his hand?" a British soldier asked today after six days of street warfare in Northern Ireland's main cities. Youngsters are fighting alongside their fathers and older brothers as Roman Catholic militancy switch from rocks and bottles to shots and bombs. A 16-year-old lost a hand in Belfast when a dynamite bomb exploded before he threw it at soldiers. Five of the dozens of persons arrested in Londonderry Sunday were under 12. All the suspects claimed to be British, but some were officially British, possibly as many as 10-12-year-olds, believed by the British to be Irish nationalists agitated by radical factions of the outlawed Irish Republican Army. The IRA advocates the violent overthrow of the Protestant government in Northern Ireland by bringing the six counties under the predominantly Catholic government of the Republic. An exact count was not possible. Most of the dead and wounded were dragged away for secret treatment or burial to prevent reprisals against relatives. The first fatality among the British troops sent to Northern Ireland in August 1969 occurred during the weekend, a 40-year-

WASHINGTON—What did the whole Sontay operation mean? "It certainly put the prisoners' issue on the front page," one senior military official commented. "Before the raid you could get any interest at all in POWs and now everyone's talking about them." The raid was certainly not on the front page now. But whether that will help in securing their release is problematic. One can argue that Hanoi will respond to much pressure only by making prisoners a more important bargaining counter in any negotiation to end the war. "It showed Hanoi that no part of its territory was invulnerable to American attack," said another senior military officer. "Yes. But it also revealed to Hanoi that American intelligence on what's going on in the north is so poor that even with the most careful planning and coordination, the most master-

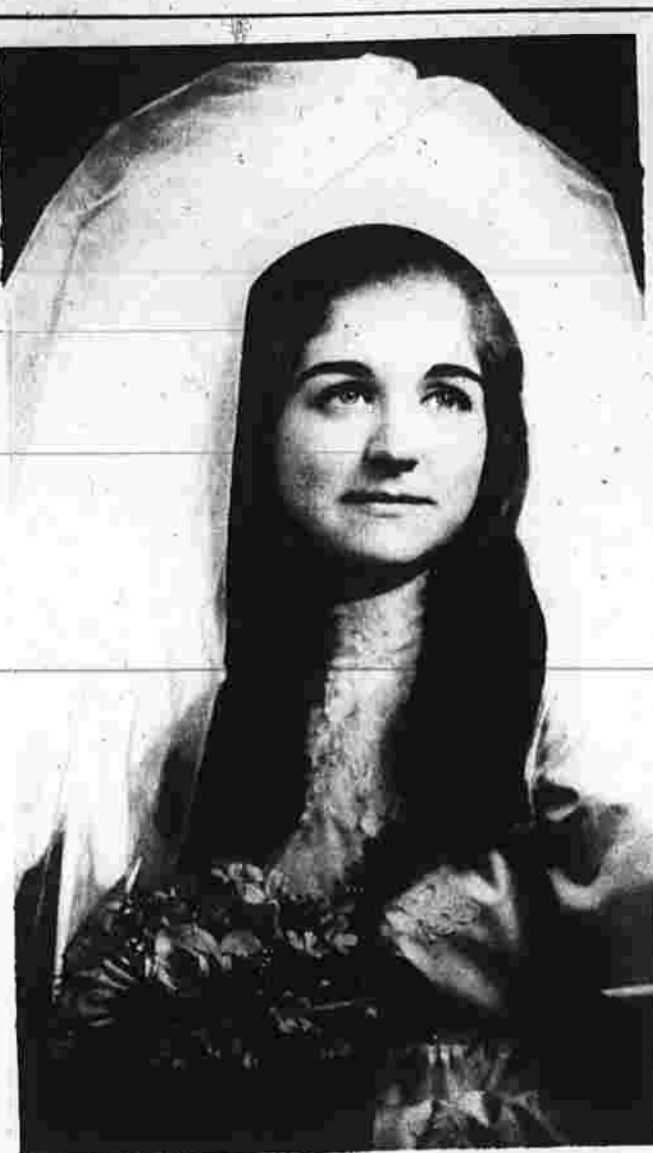

Frenchman Has Chance Of Becoming Next Pope

VATICAN CITY (AP) — A Frenchman has a good chance of becoming the first non-Italian Pope in 4 1/2 centuries. Soundings among Vatican officials and observers show that as things stand, Jean-Marie Villot is considered the most likely to succeed Pope Paul VI on his retirement or death.

Cardinal Villot holds down the Vatican's No. 2 and No. 3 posts under the Pope: secretary of state and chamberlain of the Holy See. In the first post, he acts as the Roman Catholic Church's "prime minister" and principal collaborator with Pope Paul.

Others besides Cardinal Villot thought to be "papabile" — in consideration for Pope — are two fellow French cardinals, Gabriel Garrone, head of the Vatican Congregation for Education, and Francois Marty, archbishop of Paris and head of the French conference of bishops.

The last non-Italian Pope was Adrian VI, a Dutchman who held the office 1522-23. Before the Second Vatican Ecumenical Council, a non-Italian Pope was virtually unthinkable.

Why Not Both?

Last Friday, when the astronauts were taking their first walk on the moon, Consolidated Edison had a cut in its power flow to New York City and arranged to buy additional power from out of state.

This was because there was an unusually heavy daytime use of television sets.

This was a reversal of the normal industry during a space operation.

Normally, we wonder whether the men and instruments up in space are going to have battery power and fuel power enough to complete their operations in safety, and normally we grow nervous every time we remember the possibility of some failure or shortage up on the moon.

This time, we had another kind of worry available to us.

We could worry about whether or not we had power enough, down here on earth, to be able to continue to watch our national representatives walk on the moon.

Actually the situation may have been, that we were much more sure of maintaining necessary energy power on the moon, a quarter of a million miles away, than we were of maintaining it down here, in our own television rooms.

Our readers will not find here any instinct to try to swap a cancellation of moon efforts for some guarantee of higher current for American gadgets down below.

What does seem plausible is that we really ought to be able to manage to do both.

Our Two Cents Worth

Though the final decision is still to be made, the fact that government financing of the new super transport jets has been denied automatic approval by debate and negative voting in the Senate has been taken as a heartening instance of a kind of possibility most of us had become weary to abandon.

It is, or was, the possibility that the people of a country might themselves have something to say about a proposal which deeply concerned their own every day living. It raised the possibility that, for once in their history, the American people might have the power to say no to some piece of "progress" which would normally be considered inevitable and all-privileged.

We don't know whether that battle is going to be won with regard to those super sound barrier breakers of the future. We don't even know, for that matter, that a majority of the American people really want to have the giant planes delayed until we are much more certain about our need for them and our capacity to put up with them. Indeed, our suspicion runs to the possibility that a majority of us may not have very much objection to the giant planes after all.

We would very much like, however, to keep alive that romantic possibility—the possibility that the people themselves might, once in a while, have something to say about a proposal which deeply concerns their every day living.

We would like to see something of a massive popular revolt against the impending increase in the postal letter rate from six to eight cents. We would like to see the Congress become sensitive enough to such popular revolt to take action forbidding the increase.

It so happens that the new increase in letter rates threatens new injustice against letter writers, in that it would continue to charge them more than their own service costs, which means they are, every time they send a letter, subsidizing some other class of user of the postal services.

We not only believe that the letter writers should not be compelled to subsidize other users of the mail services. We believe that, if it should prove necessary in order to give letter writers a stable, low, permanent rate, they are the ones who should be subsidized, if anybody is to be subsidized.

There ought to be a victory for people, once in a while, and a refreshing touch of defeat for those who assume there are no limits to what the public can be forced to take, just because it almost never does raise itself to defend its own interests.

An All-American Need?

Those tobacco companies who are now seriously engaged in experimental progress toward a cigarette that meets the health authorities will approve as a healthy experience are to be complemented for that occasional kind of selfish endeavor which, if successful, would create untold benefits for the entire society.

There is little doubt that, if the health cigarette arrives in time, it could save the television networks from that sudden economic disaster which has descended on them since Super Bowl Day, and which has plunged them into all kinds of drastic economies.

In back of the television networks stand, also in need of some guarantee of future life, all those football and baseball and basketball and hockey teams whose performances television may not be able to afford to carry without the help of an occasional cigarret commercial.

In back of American television and American sports, waiting for the guarantees of continued life which the arrival of the new safe cigarette alone can give them, is also the whole structure of American government, which needs to have people not only keep on smoking, but increasing their smoking, in order to keep on paying the higher and higher taxes that have been imposed on cigars.

In short, it is difficult to imagine when, in history, there has been a greater economic need for the invention of something than there is, right today, for the invention of the cigarette which can bring back the commercial, underwrite our sports once again, help keep our governments out of deficit, and restore a touch of peace and grace to business delinquency and social encounter.

The New State Taxes

It does not come as too great a surprise that the Task Force has done an extensive survey, and in the main, comes to conclusions that are sound and just—if maintained over the long run, and if the group has come a cropper. There would seem, for instance, little reason to reduce beer and wine taxes. This would be to reduce the revenue from 40,000 to about 30,000 dollars a year, which is probably healthy, and fuel taxes would be upped a cent a gallon. At first glance, there should also be considerable investigation of inventory taxes as a state that Connecticut remains as a state that is hospitable to new factories. Right now, several neighboring states place less of a total tax load on manufacturing plants.

A second area where the Task Force has opened a Pandora's box is in exploring the concept that the new taxes be "piggy back" except in the case of capital gains and state and municipal bond income. The former would be taxed as ordinary income, and all state and municipal bond income, except those of Connecticut, would be treated as income. The first problem is that once a "piggy back" tax includes exceptions it is to keep an easy tax to administer. A huge bureaucracy will have to be set up to check returns. Second, once those have been opened to exceptions, they will proliferate like cancer cells. Third, the taxation of capital gains at ordinary rates is very apt to slow down the move of corporate officials to Connecticut because of the punitive nature of the tax. Fourth, the taxation of foreign municipalities will set off a retaliation by other states, and Connecticut will soon find that its municipalities and state bonds have to pay more interest to attract buyers. In other words, other states will start taxing Connecticut bonds because of the lack of reciprocity.

Because of Connecticut's \$200 million deficit, new taxes are unavoidable, and the Task Force has provided a great service for suggesting methods to meet them. The Senate, however, we would reject, but the basic scheme of a piggy back tax should, we believe, be adhered to. MIDDLEBURY PRESS.

Why Laos?

WASHINGTON — Hard evidence of how much the mere threat of serious military action against the Ho Chi Minh Trail has frightened the Communist regime in Hanoi is seen in the hysterical reaction pouring out of the Vietcong's secret headquarters.

Thus, a Feb. 7 radio broadcast by the "foreign minister" of the Vietcong's provisional revolutionary government blasted "U.S. aggressors" for creating "an extremely dangerous situation in Indochina."

To U.S. experts long familiar with Hanoi rhetoric, that translates into an open admission that military assault in strength against the Ho Chi Minh supply trail (running from North Vietnam south through Laos into northern Cambodia) could be catastrophic to Hanoi.

The reason is obvious. With its one-secure supply system from the Cambodian port of Kompong Som (formerly Siem Reap), Hanoi has been able to maintain its land route to the Ho Chi Minh Trail, close to the Communist frontiers, with the possible exception of 40,000 North Vietnamese regulars.

Should that happen, the military situation in southern Laos and eastern Cambodia would deteriorate for Hanoi, opening the way for an offensive in South Vietnam any time soon.

As we write this, the news embargo from Hanoi is still in effect. Pursuing the purpose of the South Vietnamese buildup along the Laotian border near the Ho Chi Minh Trail, but the fierce reaction of Hanoi's puppet government, in South Vietnam last Tuesday indicates one great purpose has already been achieved: Psychologically, a highly credible threat to North Vietnam's vital supply line.

The steady increase of Communist troops in the Laotian panhandle started last year, with infiltration rates rising up to twice those of a year earlier.

Incident with these steady troop reinforcements from the north, the Communists have had conspicuous military success throughout the southern Laos panhandle—except they will proliferate like cancer cells. Third, the taxation of capital gains at ordinary rates is very apt to slow down the move of corporate officials to Connecticut because of the punitive nature of the tax. Fourth, the taxation of foreign municipalities will set off a retaliation by other states, and Connecticut will soon find that its municipalities and state bonds have to pay more interest to attract buyers. In other words, other states will start taxing Connecticut bonds because of the lack of reciprocity.

'Monsters of the Laws,' Ervin Says of Snooping

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Sam J. Ervin says he has asked three Cabinet officers to testify during broad hearings on whether the federal government sometimes violates the Constitution by snooping on its citizens.

The hearings will open Feb. 23 and will focus on the Bill of Rights, alleged military spying on civilian groups, and government use of computers and data banks.

Ervin, in a speech prepared for delivery on the Senate floor today, said many data-gathering programs on citizens were "undertaken in the pursuit of a number of high-sounding federal programs, worthy in their inception."

"But," he added, "because of their scope, they threaten in operation to become, and in some cases actually have grown to be, monsters of the laws, stalking the privacy and trampling the inalienable rights of individual citizens."

Asked to testify were Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare Elliot L. Richardson, Attorney Gen. John N. Mitchell and Transportation Secretary John A. Volpe.

Ervin said Richardson will be questioned March 31 on ways which Social Security numbers are used. He said the secretary already has directed the Social Security Administration to review the increasing use of Social Security numbers for identification purposes.

Mitchell will be asked to report March 8 on the government's constitutional power "to order or conduct surveillance and to acquire information on lawful political activities, per-

sonal beliefs and private lives of citizens where no probable cause exists to believe they are guilty of any crimes."

A subcommittee aide said no reply has been received from Mitchell's office on whether the attorney general will testify.

Volpe was asked to discuss March 11 his department's computerized national data bank of motor vehicle license holders. The subcommittee also plans to hear from Christopher Pyle, lawyer and author of several articles on surveillance activities of the Army Intelligence Command, and John M. O'Brien, who reported that Army units monitored the activities of a number of top Illinois officials, including Sen. Adlai E. Stevenson III and former Gov. Otto Kerner.

Your Dental Health Getchell Brothers Press For Permit to Build House

This is the 23rd annual National Children's Dental Health Week. As part of the observance, the Herald, in cooperation with the Manchester Dental Society, today begins a series of six articles on facts you should know about dental health. My dentist is always stressing toothbrushing after eating. Why is it important? Toothbrushing is the most important part of good oral care because it cleans debris from the teeth. We know that much bacteria can be removed from food within minutes, so it is highly important to remove as much debris as possible immediately after eating.

Oral debris is one of the causes of tooth decay. Decay and periodontal (gum) disease. Foods that are high in carbohydrates and sugars, are a prime factor in decay (dental caries). The oral bacteria react with the sugars to form acids that dissolve tooth enamel. The bacteria also produce these gummy substances called dextrans which enable plaque to stick to the teeth, forming a bacterial colony on the plaque. Once it is established on the teeth, more bacteria lodge in the plaque and reproduce.

Obviously, teeth that have lost some enamel and that are exposed to decay are more susceptible to decay. Once the decay has reached the pulp of the tooth, the infected part of the tooth must be removed and sealed with a filling.

This is why brushing as soon as possible after eating is so important. By removing the acid-inducing food and debris from the teeth, you greatly reduce the chances of plaque and bacteria forming on the teeth. This is why brushing with a fluoride toothpaste will help make the enamel stronger and better able to withstand acid attacks.

If plaque is not removed by toothbrushing it will harden into calculus, which irritates the gums, causes tooth decay, and eventually may lead to tooth loss. If the periodontal disease is not halted and treated, the gums recede and the teeth are exposed to the bone which supports the tooth. The tooth has become loose and eventually may have to be extracted. Regular dental visits for professional cleaning, remove plaque and tartar which cannot be removed by toothbrushing cannot entirely prevent the formation of

Periodontal disease affects nearly all the adult population — and a good portion of children. So, it is just as important to brush your teeth when you are an adult as when you are a child. You are actually working with the dentist to prevent tooth loss and periodontal disease. You are the one most responsible for your good — or bad — oral health.

Italian City Grieves In Aftermath of Quake

TURKANA, Italy (AP) — In a nearby town and there were no more casualties. A few hours after the main tremor destroyed the medieval hill town of Turkana, an aftershock crumbled a damaged building but caused no casualties.

About 30 archeology experts assigned damage to historic sites in the town of 12,000, and Mario Mottet, superintendent of the national antiquities, said, "The damage is extremely grave but perhaps not irreparable."

The president and Premier Emilio Colombo flew the 50 miles from Rome by helicopter to the Etruscan town where at least 30 persons died, 120 were injured and almost 4,000 were left homeless by the tremor Saturday.

At the end of an 80-minute inspection, Saragat said he was surprised to find that about 100 townspeople, many weeping over lost relatives or property. A physician in Turkana pleaded: "Help us. Don't forget us. I lost a granddaughter of 8 and my house."

An aftershock rumbled through the town's rubble Sunday night, but the survivors had been evacuated to tents and hospitals.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Liberal Democrats lost many a battle in the opening weeks of the 92nd Congress but think they are on their way to winning the war against the tradition of seniority.

Despite setbacks in their efforts to win leadership posts and make the dominant Democratic caucus, the liberals say forces have been set in motion that will remake the House in the 1970s.

"I'm not discouraged," says Rep. Sam Gibbons, D-Fla., a leader of the reform movement. "Far from it. I think we've made substantial progress."

The high-water mark in the campaign against seniority was reached when 88 Democrats voted to remove 70-year-old Sen. J. McMillan, D-S.C., as chairman of the District of Columbia Committee. McMillan got 28 votes and survived the challenge but the site of the opposition vote showed there is momentum in the reform movement.

McMillan himself is expected to get the message to retire after this session. The under-standing among members that he might retire probably helped get him the votes he needed to avoid the humiliating effort of his chairmanship taken away.

McMillan's victory and the defeat of efforts to remove John J. Driscoll and Walter Adams issued a minority report Saturday, protesting the tax cut setting out a method for removing chairman and a provision that the selection of chairman "need not necessarily follow seniority."

The classes in the caucus also overshadowed the fact significant new House rules approved by Congress last year are now going into effect and could hasten the pace of change.

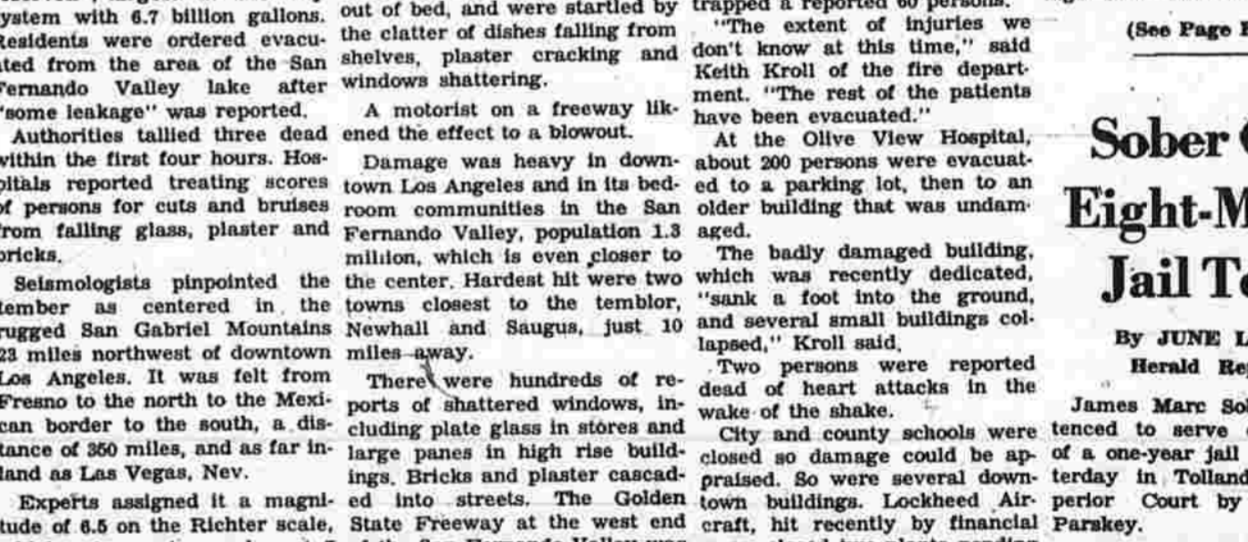
