themselves of the illusion that they are so indefatigably demanding higher wages without any concern for the effect on the firm or the industry, and without any regard to the prices its customers will have to pay.

"Governments," the Prime Minister went on, "must rid themselves of the illusion that you can find the way to prosperity by pointing out the taxpayers' money by perpetual subsidies for unproductive ventures."

"All of us," he concluded, "must rid ourselves of the illusion that we can buy our way out of the problems of today by mortgaging the future. It seems the easy way out — but we know now it is the fatal way."

Prime Minister Heath is notorious for a Puritanical instinct which considers hard work a virtue, easy gain sinful, and always expects that a price must be paid for everything. We don't know anywhere in the world where such a philosophy is really practiced, any more, but we do know any place in the world which can consider its economic problems solvable, either.

We cite two facts about the career of John Dempsey as Governor of the State of Connecticut, and ask which fact would be more likely to determine the way people voted for or against him during his candidacies, or the way he will be remembered after his public service.

One fact would be, of course, that he was Governor while the state ran up the most astronomical deficit in history.

The other fact would be that Dempsey, as Governor, usually preferred to travel in a state police car Ford rather than in the splendid long limousine which was the official car for his office.

We answer our own question: People did react more to Dempsey's folly than to his deficiencies. Undoubtedly, many more votes were determined by the kind of car he chose to ride in than by examination of the state's fiscal record.

Most experienced politicians would answer the question the same way we did, which is why the Meekill administration is quite sensibly apprehensive about the fact that it may suffer, in the matter of limousines, political damage if it has done nothing to deserve.

New limousines for the Governor and Lieutenant Governor are contracted for, as a matter of course, as a routine, every four years. This year the routine contract was executed before the election was even held, and this was an act of the outgoing Democratic state administration.

In the game of politics, the existence of such facts was no barrier to subsequent Democratic attacks on Governor Meekill for his extravagance in permitting himself to be equipped with an expensive new limousine.

And the real, realistic admission about the possibilities of the future has to be this: that conceivably Governor Meekill might lose the state's mighty Democratic majority, and still lose political ground by it, in the meantime, the public fancy should happen to stay concentrated on the fact that he seemed to like riding around in that long black limousine.
