Apollo 14 Heroes Bound for Samoa

ABOARD USS NEW ORLEANS (AP)—Apollo 14's moon heroes, healthy and snug in a quarantining trailer, steamed aboard this carrier toward Samoa today after safely completing man's third lunar landing mission. From Samoa they'll be flown to the Manned Spacecraft Center near Houston, arriving early Friday. They'll get a glimpse of their families and friends in their isolation against possible moon germs until Feb. 26.

Next Step: Unveil Birth Of Universe

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP)—A crash program to unveil the mysteries of the birth of the solar system has been mapped out for Apollo 14 astronauts flying the last three missions to the moon. When Apollo 14 blasts off from the lunar surface in 1972, lunar exploration will cease for at least a decade, says Dr. George Low, acting administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

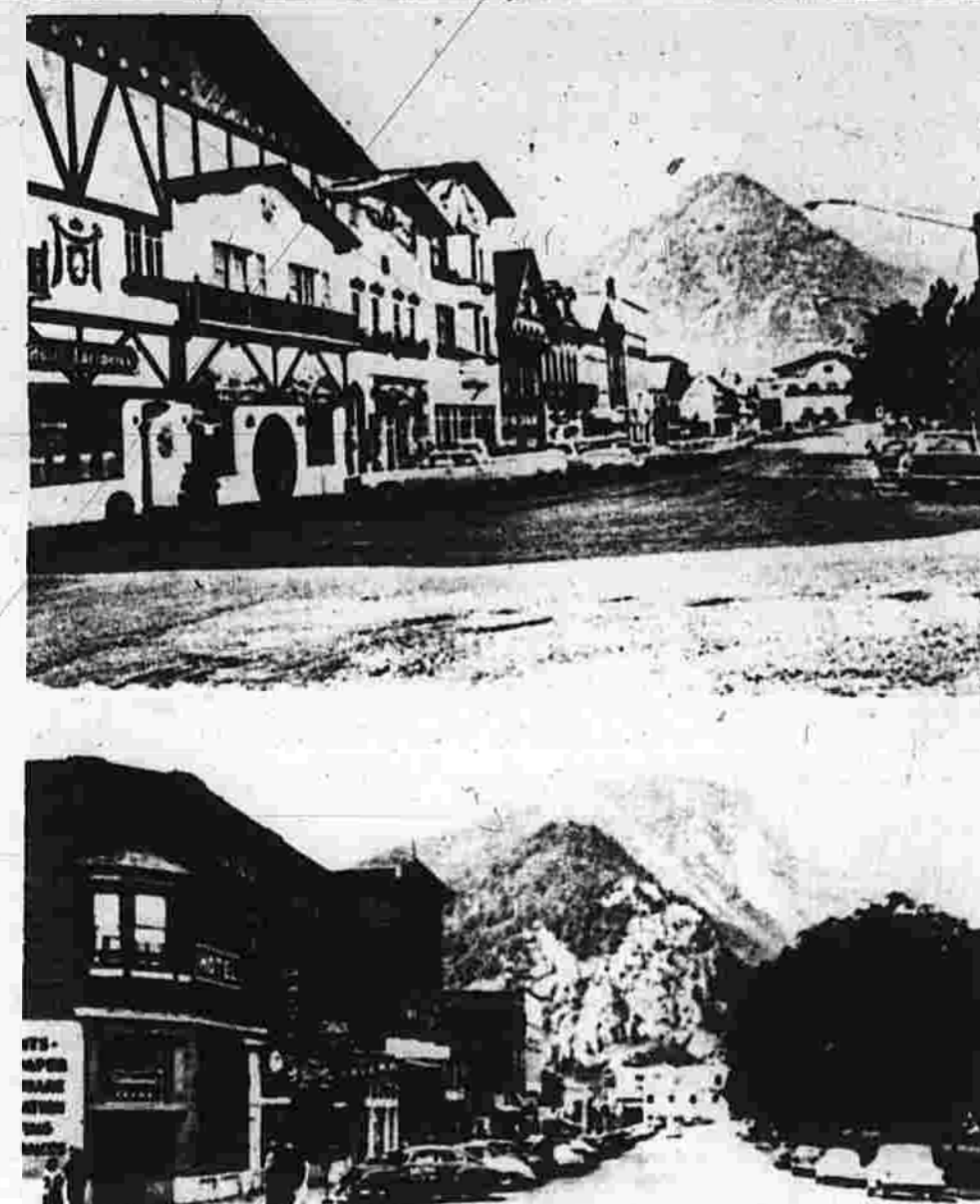

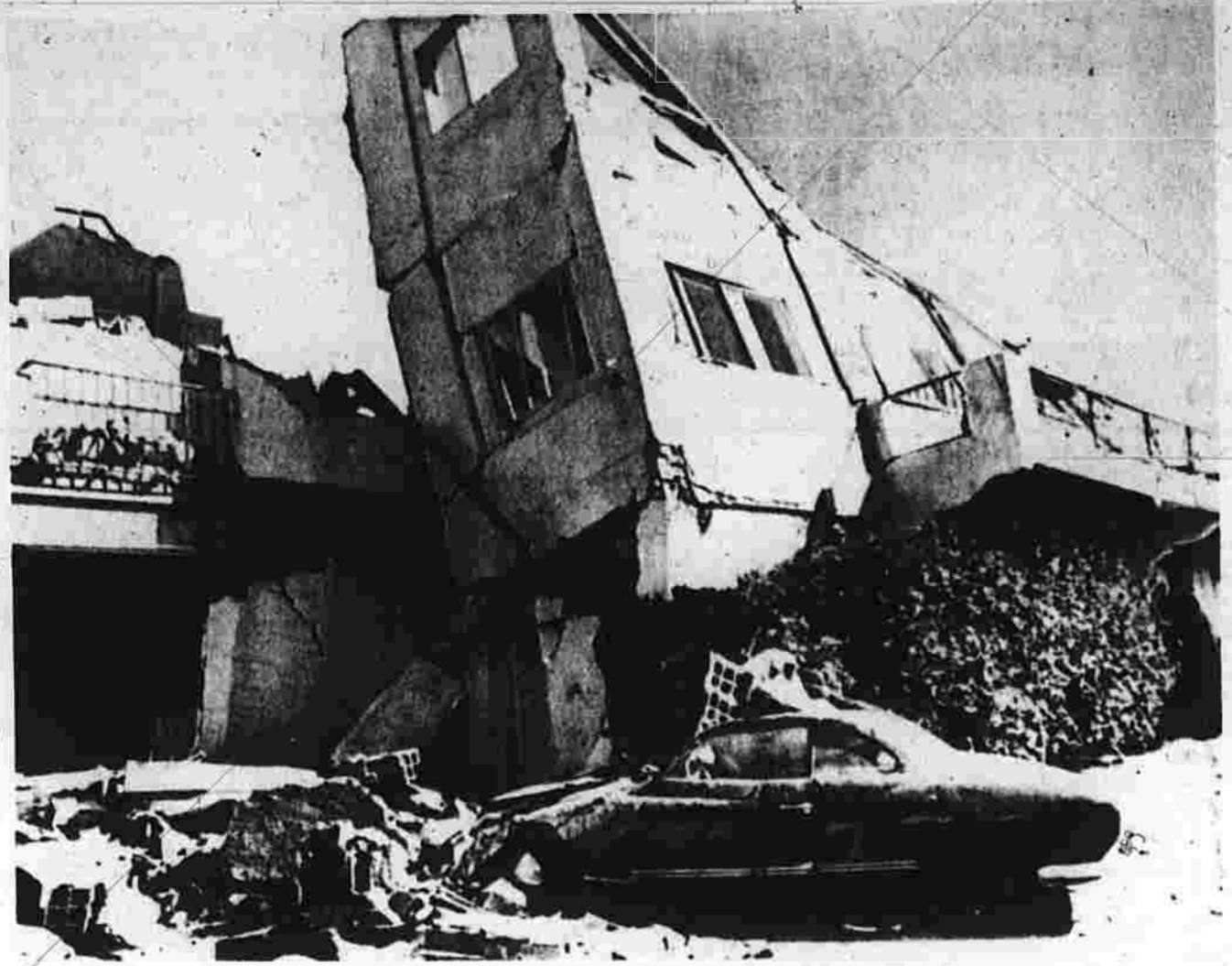

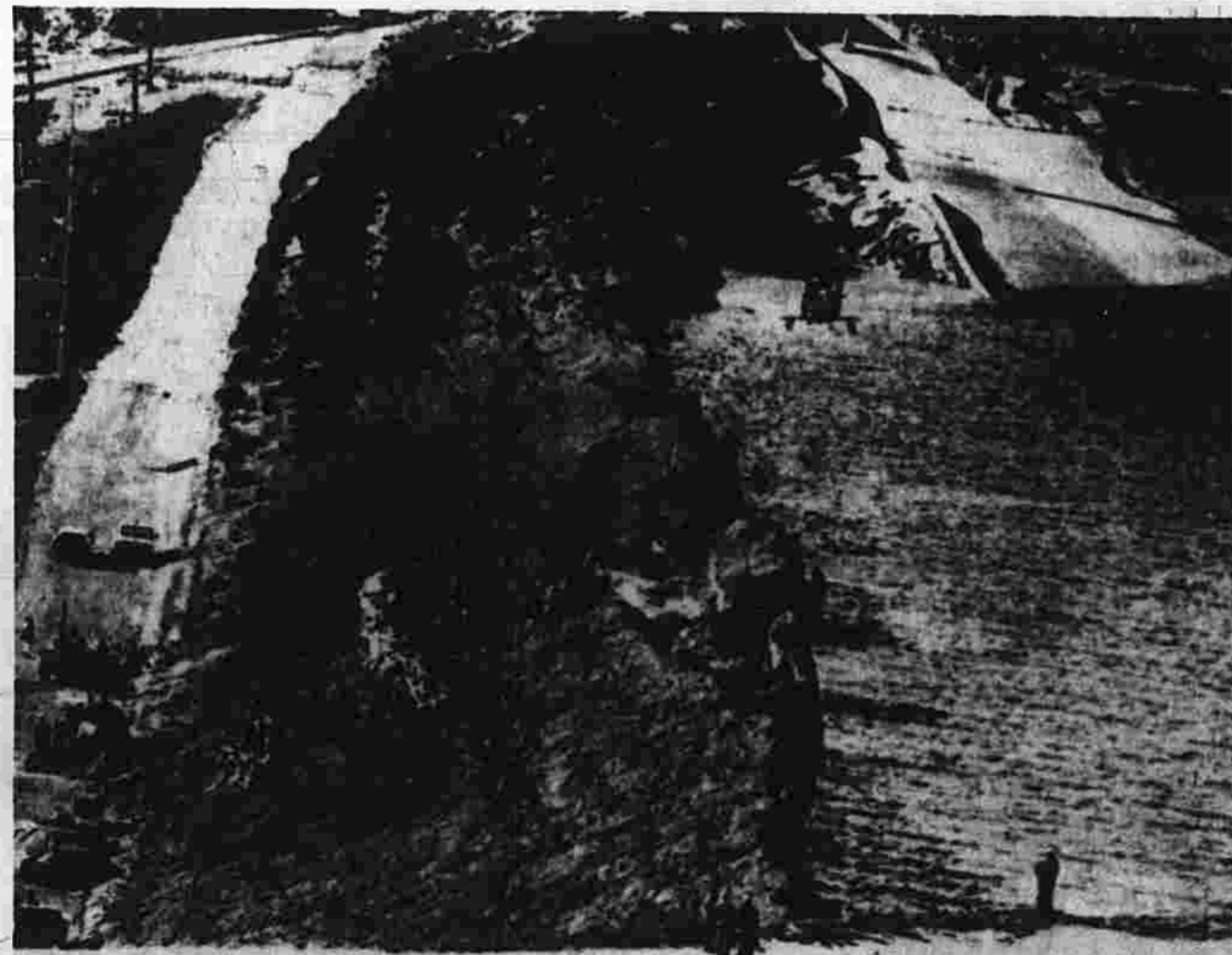

A big cleanup already was under way in downtown Los Angeles and in communities in the San Fernando Valley, whose western edge is but 10 miles from the quake's center, the glass and bricks and crumpled masonry that littered streets and yards were being scooped up and carted away.

Several major freeways remained closed because of crumbling paving or fallen overpasses. Scientists attributed the tremor to a little-known fault that runs as a plip-squak. It is the Soledad Canyon fault in the San Gabriel Mountains. A scientist who visited the scene found signs of vertical slippage along the fault, but it is so expensive to dig the crack in the earth. Seismologists at the California Institute of Technology estimated the quake a magnitude of 6.6 on the Richter scale, which rates major ones at 7 or more. This made it comparable to the 1933 shock in nearby Long Beach that killed 115 persons and caused \$40 million damage.

Experts emphasized that this was not the long-predicted "great" earthquake of magnitude 8 or more expected some day when the faulted San Andreas fault cuts loose. This giant crack in the earth's crust runs from the Gulf of California into the sea north of San Francisco and was considered the cause for the devastating 1906 temblor in the Bay area.

Vice President Spiro T. Agnew headed here for consultations today after President Nixon proclaimed California a disaster area, eligible for help from a dozen federal agencies. Reagan, after issuing a similar disaster proclamation, flew from Sacramento and made a helicopter tour of north-hill areas. He saw rescuers pull victims from hospital ruins.

The deaths and greatest damage were concentrated at the west end of the San Fernando Valley, Los Angeles, bedroom community and home to 1.3 million. It is a 320-square-mile oval west of downtown Los Angeles, with the Santa Monica Mountains on the south and the San Gabrielles soaring a mile high on the north. It is paved with housing tracts and dotted with shopping centers.

Almost as hard hit were two foothill agricultural communities in the process of becoming suburbs, Newhall and Saugus, with an area population of 70,000. They too are but 10 miles from the epicenter and virtually every building in their downtown districts reported some damage.

The area of greatest tragedy was the Veterans Administration facility in the hamlet of Sylmar. Two buildings, part of a much larger complex built in 1966, collapsed in five wards for treatment of heart and respiratory ailments, along with attendants. Inside the roofs fell almost to ground level.

Officials a few years ago had ruled the hospital so sturdy it was renovated rather than replaced. Hundreds of firemen and rescue workers, backed up by doctors from other hospitals, assembled at the scene. A temporary morgue was set up on a lawn.

"We still have live people in there," a spokesman said Tuesday night. "Rescue workers hear voices. Nobody's been able to get into the basement." Old men among the beautifully landscaped grounds, watching helicopters fly out injured, as squirrels tripped in trees in the sunshine.

An 18-year-old girl screamed as rescuers probed: "It's my mother! She's in there!" Just a mile away, at the new \$23-million Olive View County Hospital, three died and the structure was pronounced practically a total loss. Lower levels of the six-story complex crumpled, tilting or wrenching upper levels. The victims were two patients and an employee.

Two men were killed when a freeway overpass collapsed at Sylmar and another died in a bridge collapse at Newhall. In downtown Los Angeles a transient was killed when the wall of a skid row mission toppled. The streets of Los Angeles seemed remarkably normal after the shock. The great majority of buildings were unscathed, and downtown workers stepped nimbly around glass and rubble on sidewalks.

There was high business alertness as many employees stayed home to pick up what might replace windows and assess other damage. Middleclass areas were hit hard. The central library offered free parking to anyone who'd help clean up.

Two Missing, One Dead In Jersey Blast

About one earthquake in 10,000 does noticeable damage. Ninety per cent of all U.S. earthquakes originate in the cracks which lace the land of California.

The biggest and most notorious of these rifts is the San Andreas fault, which runs 20 miles deep and extends from the Mexican border 700 miles northward. Earthquakes occur when there's a snap at the earth's crust bands and strains in well defined regions. The earth, in effect, readjusts itself during a tremor.

Dr. Bruce Bolt, director of the University of California Seismological Department at Berkeley, said he expects eventual earthquake forecasts to be in the form of probabilities, like tornado forecasts, rather than precise warnings.

"We must take moderate earthquakes more seriously. The Los Angeles quake was 6.6 (on the Richter scale), medium sized, yet there is the proof that such a shock can cause heavy damage and casualties."

Prof. Richard H. Jahn, dean of Stanford University School of Earth Sciences, predicted five days ago that a "great" quake would hit California before the turn of the century. "We were lucky Tuesday," he said. "This was a big earthquake but not a great one."

Legal Electronic Snoop Backed Up by Bar Group

CHICAGO (AP) - The American Bar Association has endorsed the federal government claim that it has the right to use electronic listening devices to investigate crime and foreign subversion.
The 287 members of the ABA's policy-making House of Delegates voted Monday approval of standards which oppose the use of electronic surveillance without a court order for closely the wiretap regulations in the Omnibus Crime Act of 1968.
The ABA action established guidelines on the secret electronic listening devices which advocates said they hoped would be followed by 38 states which have no wiretap statutes.
The delegates voted down proposed amendments that would have limited approval for use of electronic surveillance to the investigation of terrorism.
Supporters of the amendments said the delegates were endorsing action of a kind which was not in the ABA's interest.

MOSCOW (AP) - Grisha Feigin, a former Red army officer and a leading voice in the Soviet Jewish movement, left the Soviet Union today for Israel.
Feigin, 44, was the third well-known Jew to be allowed to emigrate to Israel in the past month. Three weeks ago physicist Boris Zerkov was permitted to leave. He was followed by Vitaly Svirsky.
All three men, particularly Zerkov, were active in the movement on behalf of Soviet Jews.
Disident sources here said the officially sanctioned departure of these three leaders is an effort by the Soviet government to satisfy any dissent by the Jewish movement before the upcoming Communist party congress next month.
They said any further emigration of top Jews will effectively cripple the already disorganized Jewish movement for a long time.
Feigin, who was born in the Latvian capital of Riga, was a member of the Politburo. He came to the attention of the KGB when he was turned in by his military medals to related, last summer and the government last year to prove test what he called disident.
According to Jewish sources, he was promptly committed to a Soviet insane asylum. Following a brief protest demonstration by sympathizers outside the asylum, the government released him.
Feigin was awarded seven medals for his military service. He served as a captain in the Red army during the war.

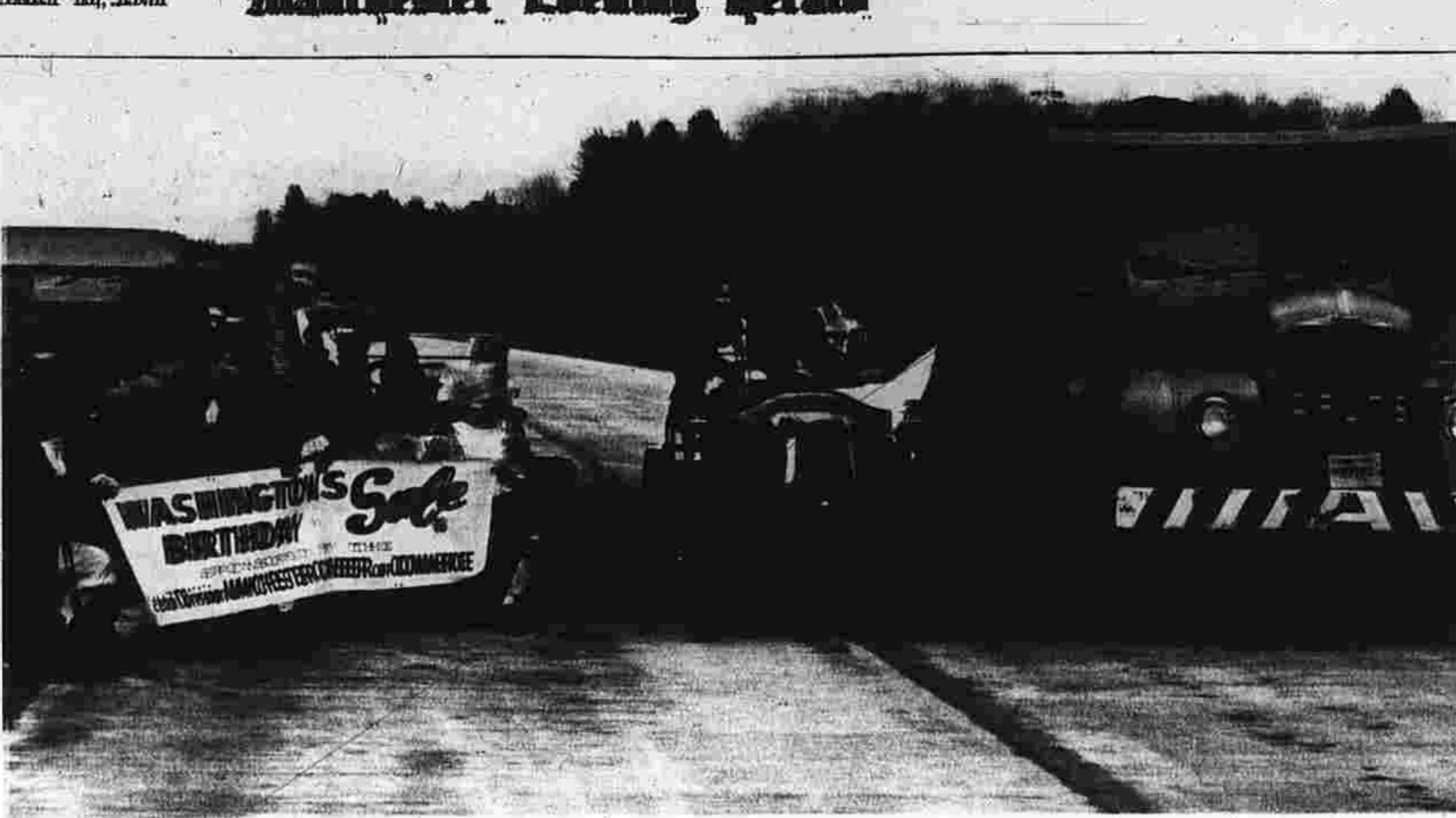

Hebron PZC Seeks Funds to Update Town Plan, Zoning Regulations

The Planning and Zoning Commission last night discussed the possibility of requesting \$15,000 to the town and state to update the town plan and zoning regulations by a professional consultant.

Chairman Richard McDonald explained that the commission constantly is running into problems where regulations have to be updated as a situation arises. This has happened recently with the excavation regulations, banning of apartments in town and the business zones regulations.

The last town plan, which was completed in 1963 at a cost of \$2,000 to the town and state and federal funds paying \$4,000, was not comprehensive and as McDonald stated "some of us are professional planners."

First was to come up with the \$15,000 itself as state and federal funds are no longer available. At the time this was to be out of the question.

Secondly, the town could enter into the Community Development Action Program (CDAP). A meeting was set up last year with CDAP officials to which all through, members of the various town boards and interested citizens were invited. The response was so poor, this idea was eliminated.

And finally, McDonald pointed out that the town could enter into a Department of Community Affairs Program sponsored by the state.

The commission also approved the proposed subdivisions submitted by Caron Brothers Inc. and Robert Tupper, subject in both cases, to proper sanitary information being furnished to Building Inspector Richard Keeffe.

The Caron Brothers will divide property on Rt. 85 north of Hebron Center into two parcels and the Tupper subdivision is for three lots on property between Rt. 85 and Marjorie Circle.

They also approved an excavation permit form as drawn up by Keeffe. These forms will now go to the printers and when ready will be required for any excavation in the future.

They discussed briefly a letter from Richard Grant calling to the commission's attention a "serious void in the zoning regulations as they relate to commercial buildings."

Grant was referring to a certificate of approval given by the Zoning Board of Appeals for a two-bay filling station on a lot (corner of Wall and Main St.) containing less than a quarter of an acre.
