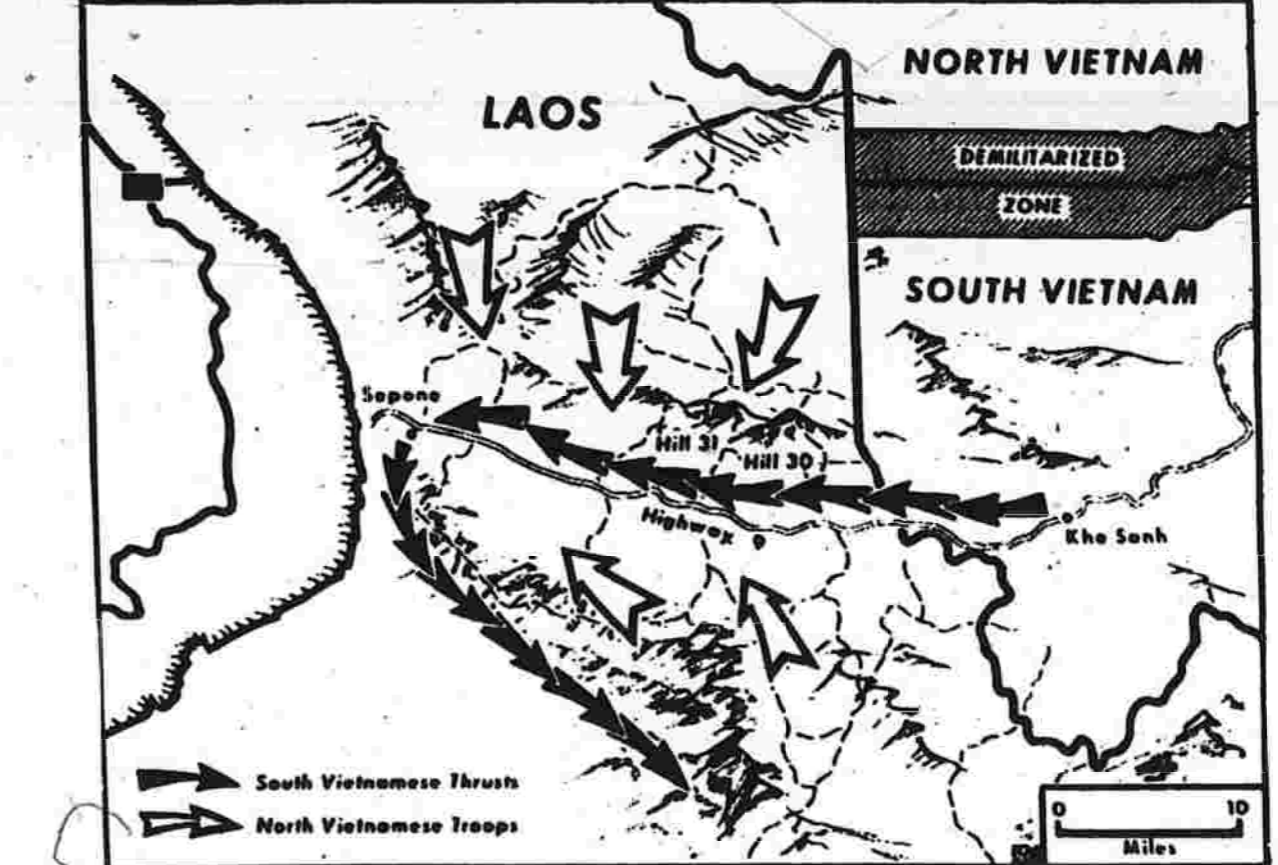

Threat by Military Spurs Resignation Of Turkish Premier

ANKARA, Turkey (AP)—The government of Suleyman Demirel fell today. The premier resigned under the threat of a military takeover, inspired in part by the recent kidnaping of four U.S. airmen. Four top military commanders demanded a new government "strong and respected enough" to halt what they described as anarchy, and to carry out basic economic and social reforms.

Mendel Rivers, chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, tried and failed to kill a Senate investigation into the conduct of former Army Brig. Gen. Earl F. Cole. Ribicoff made the charge during a Senate investigating subcommittee hearing in which the former general again denied all wrongdoing on his part connected with alleged corruption in Laos.

After the subcommittee hearing, Ribicoff said Rivers had called him at least twice, "told me what a good guy Cole was and expressed his hope nothing would be done about it." Ribicoff said Rivers told him that Cole was an old friend who he had known for many years and that he would vouch for him.

Crosby Bids For Release Of GI POWs

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP)—Bing Crosby's brother says he is doing his part to help negotiate ransom with prisoners of war. The group, "The Prisoners of War Rescue Mission," may appeal to the American public for financial support if the North Vietnamese make a reasonable offer, Crosby, 74, said Thursday. Crosby, often a spokesman for the 10,000 missing American prisoners of war, said in an interview an embassy for the group is in Vietnam, Laos. He said the embassy, John G. Fairfax, 55, met each week with North Vietnamese officials.

Shinwold on Bridge

NATIONAL TOURNAMENT SCHEDULE

Several thousand players will descend on Atlanta today to begin play in the national bridge tournament, and you will be able to tell the optimists from the pessimists by the way they play certain hands. In general, the tournament star is an over-bidder and an optimist, but he pulls his horns in when it is obvious that one opponent is much more dangerous than the other.

Neither side vulnerable. Opening lead — Ten of Diamonds.

The optimist looks at the dummy and remarks: "We may have misread the boat!" If West has the king of diamonds and East has the queen, the declarer can take two diamond tricks, get rid of a club and will then lose only one club trick.

If declarer plays the hand in that optimistic fashion, he will go down at king. East will get in with the king of diamonds and will shift to the queen of clubs. The defenders promptly take three club tricks.

The pessimist sees that he can make his contract even if both the king of diamonds and the ace of clubs are in unfavorable position. He puts up the ace of diamonds, catches the top spades, leads a trump to the nine, and returns the jack of spades, discarding a diamond. As West wins with the queen, South gets one good break since West doesn't have four spades and therefore cannot lead a spade to allow his partner to kill dummy's ten of spades by ruffing. West actually leads a trump, and dummy wins with the ten.

Now declarer tries a ruffing finesse in diamonds. He leads the ace of diamonds, and if West discards a diamond, he will go down at king. East will get in with the king of diamonds, South ruffs and gets a dummy with a trump to discard new trumps, hoes and the like, but not until the annual town meeting recently was the department recognized as an official town agency. Up for public hearing in the State Capitol Tuesday will be a bill pertaining to town purchase of the privately owned Manchester Water Co.

The bill, co-sponsored by Manchester's three state representatives, will be heard by the legislature's House and regulatory committees, at 2 p.m. in Room 410.

The bill actually is an amendment to a special act adopted in May 1969. That bill authorized the town to purchase the water company and set certain limits on the interest ceiling (8 per cent) and on the time-payment limit for a bond issue (20 years).

The new bill would eliminate a ceiling on the interest rate and would raise the bond issue limit to 30 years.

The town's option to purchase the Manchester Water Co. runs out Sept. 30. Town Manager Robert Weiss has recommended a referendum this year on the proposed purchase.
