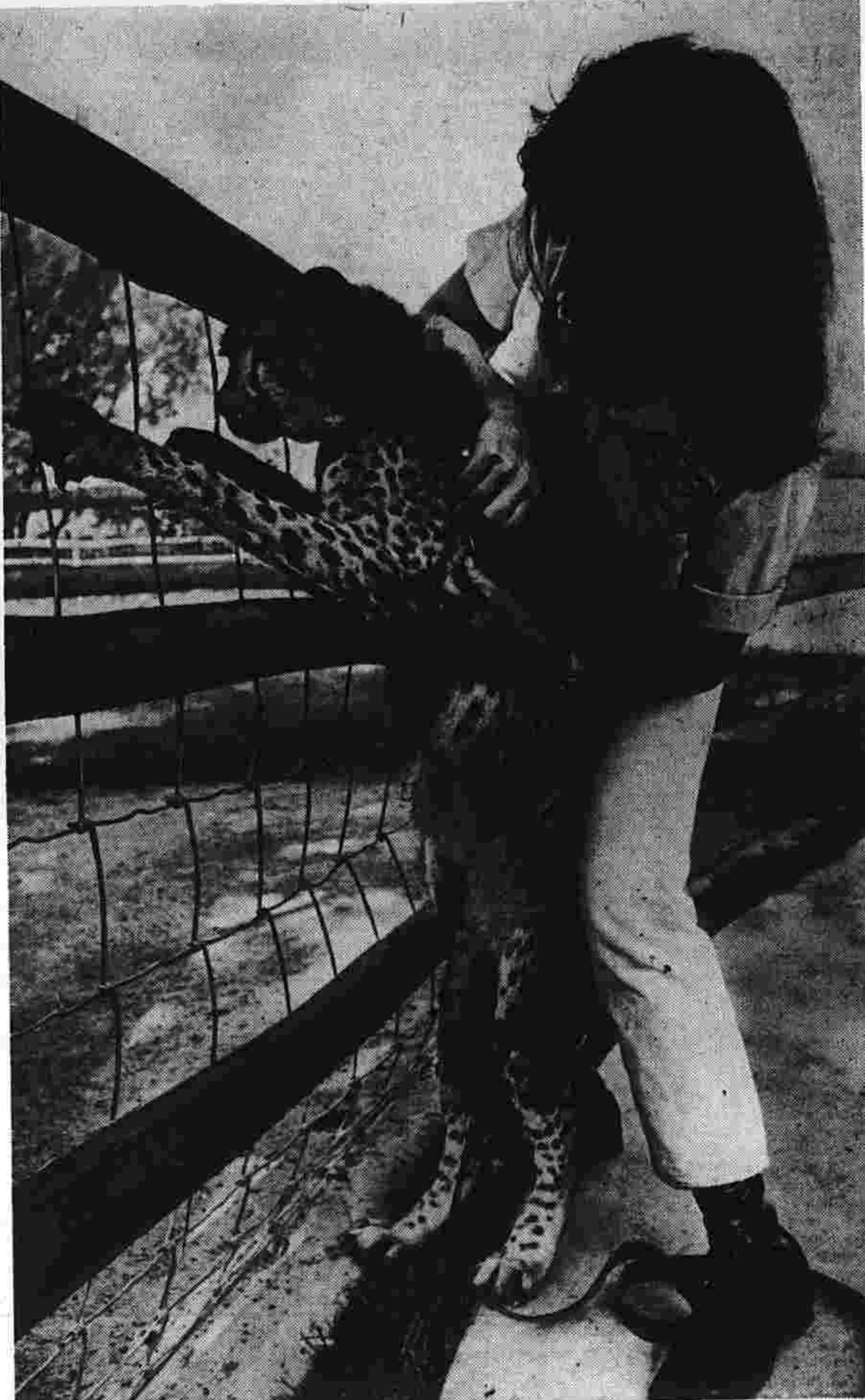

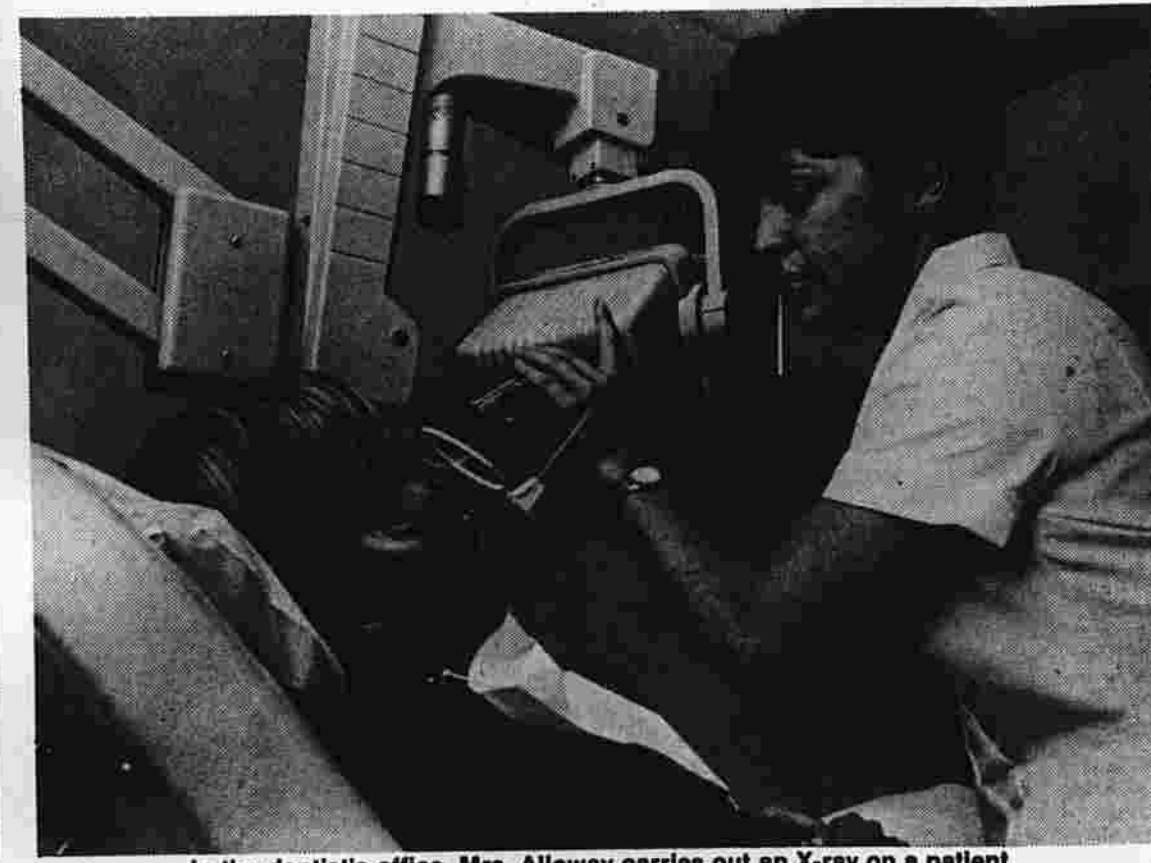
Judy, a chimp at Columbus Zoo, shares a piece of gum with her friend.

Sad Moons Quieting Happy Indian Tongue

LAKE ISABELLA, Calif. (AP)—A little valley in California's Shasta County is the home of the happiest Indians on earth. It is a distinct language that was spoken for centuries by thousands of Indians near what is now Lake Isabella but now there are only 22 men and women on fluent in Tubatalabul (too-boo-lab-bul). Tubatalabul is one of 150 different Indian languages still spoken in America, one of 50 living Indian languages in California. "Whenever Tubatalabul gets together and talk Tubatalabul everyone roars with laughter," says Mrs. Chanza Andreas, 56, explaining: "Other Indian languages aren't like that and people don't bend over in stitches when someone starts talking English. But when anything is said in Tubatalabul it always sounds so funny. "Even the name of our people and our language—Tubatalabul—makes us laugh and makes everybody that hears it laugh. "It's a hard name to say but when you say it, it makes you feel good—too-boo-lab-bul. Especially if you say it fast like we do. It's a real mouthful." Tubatalabul means "a people that go to the forest to gather tubat (pison nuts)."

... lived in remote verdant valley

For centuries Tubatalabul lived in what was a remote 15-mile-long, 2-to-4-mile-wide verdant valley near California's High Sierra Mountains. In recent years the rivers have been dammed an today half the valley is the Lake Isabella recreation area. "There are less than 100 Tubatalabul left and less than a fourth of them—all over 40 years old—speak the language. "It's all over for the Tubatalabul," says Tony Pablo, 68, "soon nobody will speak the language." Today only a handful of Tubatalabul are left in the valley—a few ranchers living in Weldon and Onyx, two hamlets at the east end. "Tubatalabul were everywhere in this valley when my grandparents and their grand-parents lived here," said Pablo. "They lived off the land, fished in the rivers and streams and hunted in the mountains that surround us." Mrs. Andreas said that when she was a child there were about 200 Tubatalabul fluent in its language in the valley. "They were the happiest people I've ever seen, laughing all the time," she said.

... tubatalabuls have built-in smiles

To this day the Tubatalabul seem to have built-in smiles. "It is because we have always been such a happy people with this wonderfully funny language of ours," insists Mrs. Andreas, 56. "Stories handed down in our families say the Tubatalabul were always a happy people living at peace in this little valley. "Protected by high mountains all around they had little contact with outside Indians. "The Spanish were the first of the happiest languages on non-Indians to come through. That's how we came by the names we have today. None of us have the old Tubatalabul names. "But our people didn't want to mix. They were always proud of their blood lines. They never mixed with other Indians. They didn't mix with the Spaniards or Mexicans. "Some people say all Indians look alike. That's not true at all. Each tribe or group has its own facial or physical characteristics, unless the blood lines have been mixed extensively. "We finally ran out of Tubatalabul. There weren't enough to go around. Now, many of my grandchildren and many grandchildren of the few of us that are left have blond hair and green eyes. "It is nearly at an end. My generation is about the last of a beautiful culture. None of my four children nor my 11 grandchildren speak Tubatalabul. "It's really sad. But with so few speaking the language, it is not practical for the young ones to retain it. 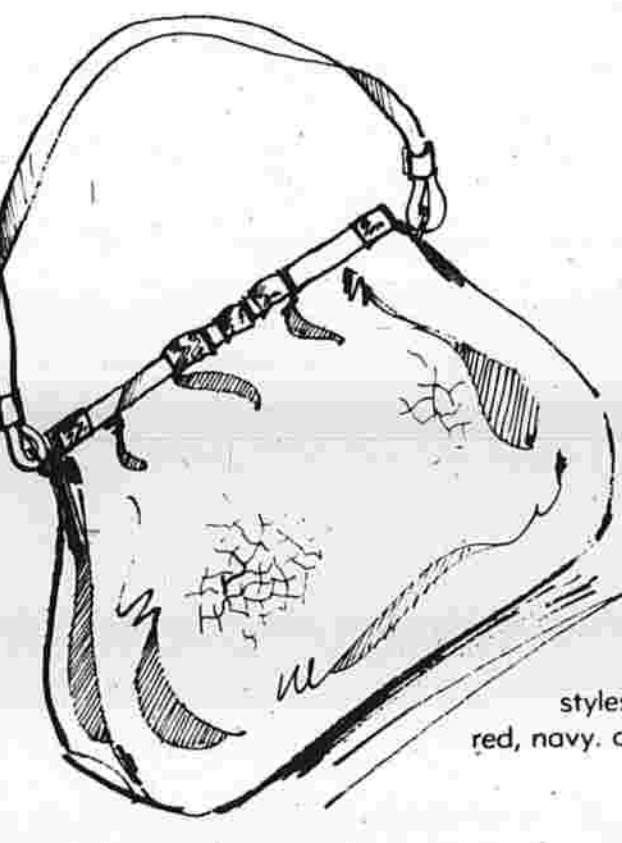
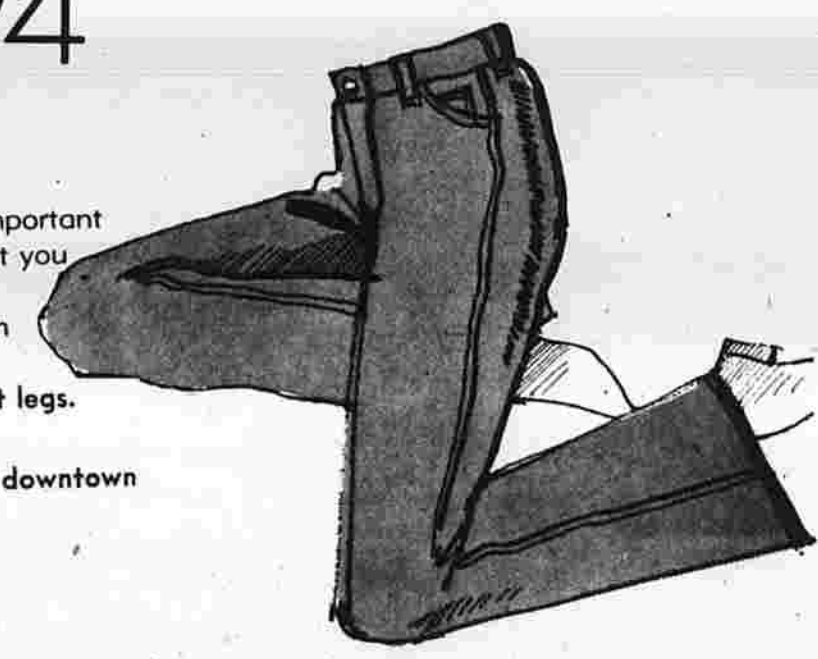

Crackdown Begins On Illegal Aliens

In many instances, aliens come through the airport terminal on St. Thomas in recent weeks to be deported to their home islands. The scene is repeated on nearby St. Croix in the U.S. Virgin Islands as the federal government cracks down on illegal aliens working here. As of March 5, the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service had deported 1,100 aliens, while many others had left voluntarily since the roundup began about a month earlier. Alien labor is an important part of the economy in the Virgin Islands—out of a work force of 56,000 nearly half are aliens. They are important to the economy of the other West Indian islands since they send home an estimated 4 1/2 million every year. Businessmen unable to fill all the available jobs in the Virgin Islands burgeoning tourist trade have traditionally drawn on labor supplies in neighboring islands where unemployment sometimes reaches 40-50 per cent. But the constant need for workers has led aliens to enter illegally to find jobs, or overstay their allowed time in U.S. territory.

Potential Seen For Drought

NORMAN, Okla. (AP) — Todd A. Fontstad believes that unless steps are taken, mid-America in this decade could see conditions similar to the Dust Bowl days of the 1930s. And the graduate geography student at the University of Oklahoma says the "dirty 30s" which led to the flight of "Okies" need not have happened. Fontstad, from Waupeca, Wis., said his research showed the Dust Bowl of the Depression days was a result of mismanagement by settlers and similar conditions in the 1950s also came as the result of improper use of the normally dry land, coupled with periodic drought, he says. "It is probable the decade of the 1970s will revert to droughty conditions," Fontstad says. "For it appears there is a 20-year wet-dry cycle existent in the plains."

"God forbid we should have parents bringing their kids up in a foam rubber cocoon," Kait says. "But what they should realize is that commonplace things can be dangerous. For example, if a woman puts her childbook on the floor and a child goes into it, the result could be fatal."

Lombardi, City Named in Suit On Gun Death

HARTFORD (AP) — The City of Hartford and a former Hartford policeman were named Tuesday in a \$100,000 damage suit filed in federal court by the estate of a man shot and killed by the policeman last year.

Attorneys for the estate of Abraham Rodriguez, who was shot last April, filed the suit against the city and former Police Commissioner Anthony Lombardi. Lombardi was fired from the police force after the shooting and later charged with manslaughter. He was acquitted of the charge in July.

Cholera in Kenya

By C. C. MICHIELS Associated Press Writer NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) — Cholera in areas of Kenya has placed more than 140,000 persons on famine relief and sidled the spread of cholera. The disease took 20 lives in one week.

These are areas where living is at the subsistence level, and virtually everything goes wrong when the rains fail. Tens of thousands of persons may rely on famine relief for months. If the spring rains fall tens of thousands of others will face starvation. If the rains come, in abundance, many fear floods will wash away seeds and seedlings while making roads impassable for relief supplies.

him of lying about not being able to read Kimbro said the book was given to Rackley by Mrs. Hugdins.

At that point, Kimbro testified, he and Sams hit Rackley with a stick and with their fists, and Sams told Rackley he was expelled from the party.

Kimbro said when Rackley did not leave immediately he was taken to the basement, handcuffed and a newspaper was handed to him to read. When he said he could not read, Kimbro, said, a noose was placed around the neck and the other end of the rope was thrown over a beam.

When Rackley said again that he could not read, Kimbro testified, "George Sams said this called for more discipline and Rackley was beaten."

Sams then ordered his tied and Mrs. Hugdins was present, Kimbro said.

Kimbro said Mrs. Hugdins and another Panther were told by Sams to get some hot water and that they were to wash Rackley.

Rackley was gagged and the other Panther returned with the boiling water, which was poured on Rackley.

Defense attorneys made frequent objections to Kimbro's testimony, saying it failed to link the clients to the slaying. Judge Mulvey overruled the defense on assurances from the state's attorney that the testimony would support the conspiracy charges.

On Tuesday, the jurors studied photographs of Rackley's body, taken soon after he was found in a riverbed 20 miles north of New Haven on May 21, 1969.

Defense attorneys argued that the pictures should be shown to the jury because they were "inflammatory" and bore a resemblance to the slayer. The prosecutor, State's Atty. Arnold Markie, said the photographs were needed to give the jurors the "flavor" of the scene.

Judge Harold M. Mulvey overruled the defense objection. Earlier, Margaret Hugdins, a frail Black Panther who became the state's first witness Thursday after she was subpoenaed 30 minutes before court opened, completed her testimony.

Mrs. Hugdins said she did not see Sams on either of the days that he was in New Haven but saw Rackley's death. The witness had testified last week that she saw Mrs. Hugdins go into the basement of the house serving as the local Panther headquarters, and that she heard Rackley's "holiering" coming from the room.

Mrs. Hugdins said that George Sams Jr., the prosecution's main witness against Sams, had beaten Rackley with a stick. On Tuesday she testified that Sams frightened her, and that he had forced a heavy-set Panther woman to perform deep-knee bends even though she cried and said she had polio.

Mrs. Hugdins conceded, under questioning by Markie, that she had done nothing to help Rackley or to bring Sams' actions to the attention of Panther officials.

An court opened Tuesday, Mulvey denied a defense motion to allow a defense-appointed "expert" to give Sams his second psychiatric examination.

But the judge ruled that if Sams is called as a witness, as he is expected to be, he will be examined by two Connecticut authorities on mental health, one of them the doctor who conducted the first examination.

Dr. Robert B. Miller, superintendent of the Parfild Hills Hospital at Newtown, Conn., was appointed by Mulvey last April after it was revealed at a bail hearing that Sams once was classified by New York authorities as a "dangerous mental defective" and a "murderer."

Miller reported some two months later that Sams no longer could be classified as mentally defective and was stable and intelligent enough to give reliable testimony.

The judge said he had no hesitancy about allowing Sams to testify at the trial of Louis McLucas, a Black Panther later convicted of conspiring to murder Rackley and sentenced to 12 to 15 years in prison.

According to the Panther, Rackley's killing was conceived and engineered by Sams in an effort to help authentic individuals support for the Black Panther party.

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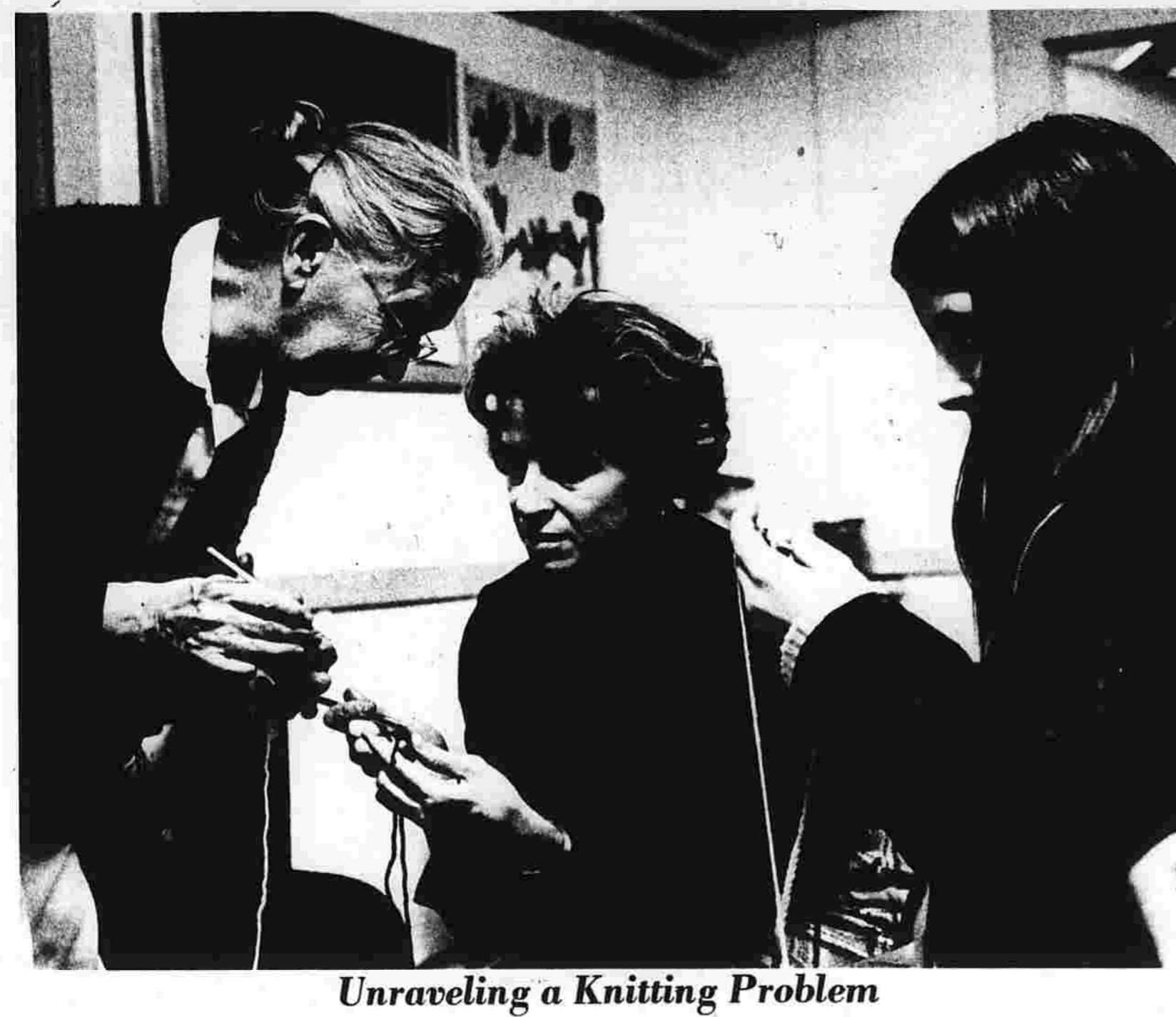

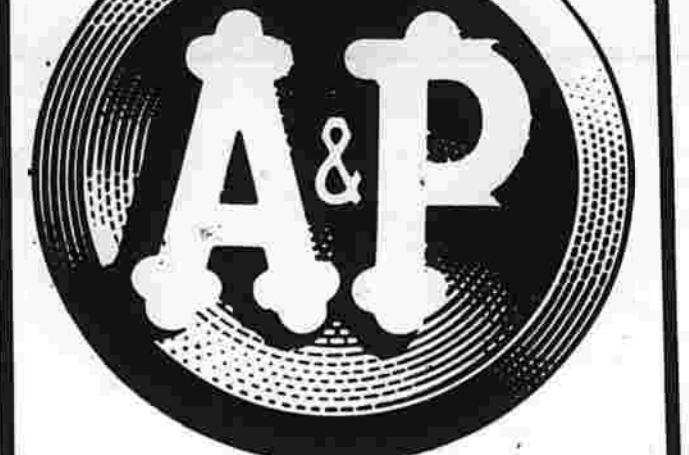

Backers of the 19-year vote predict financially pruned state legislatures will quickly ratify the amendment, rather than face the added election expense.

The amendment will have no effect in Georgia, Kentucky and Alaska; they already allow 18-year-olds to vote. Twenty is the minimum voting age in Hawaii, Maine and Nebraska, while persons 19 and older may vote in Massachusetts, Minnesota and Montana.

The House engaged in little debate before sending the amendment to the state for ratification. The few backers who spoke on the floor said the lower voting age would give youth a voice in shaping their government.

Rep. Charles E. Higgins, R-Calif., said Congress in approving the proposal has been demonstrating permissiveness in today's society.

Rep. John Schmitz, R-Calif., said 18 is too young to vote.

The HRB states that the amendment did so with a minimum of talk.

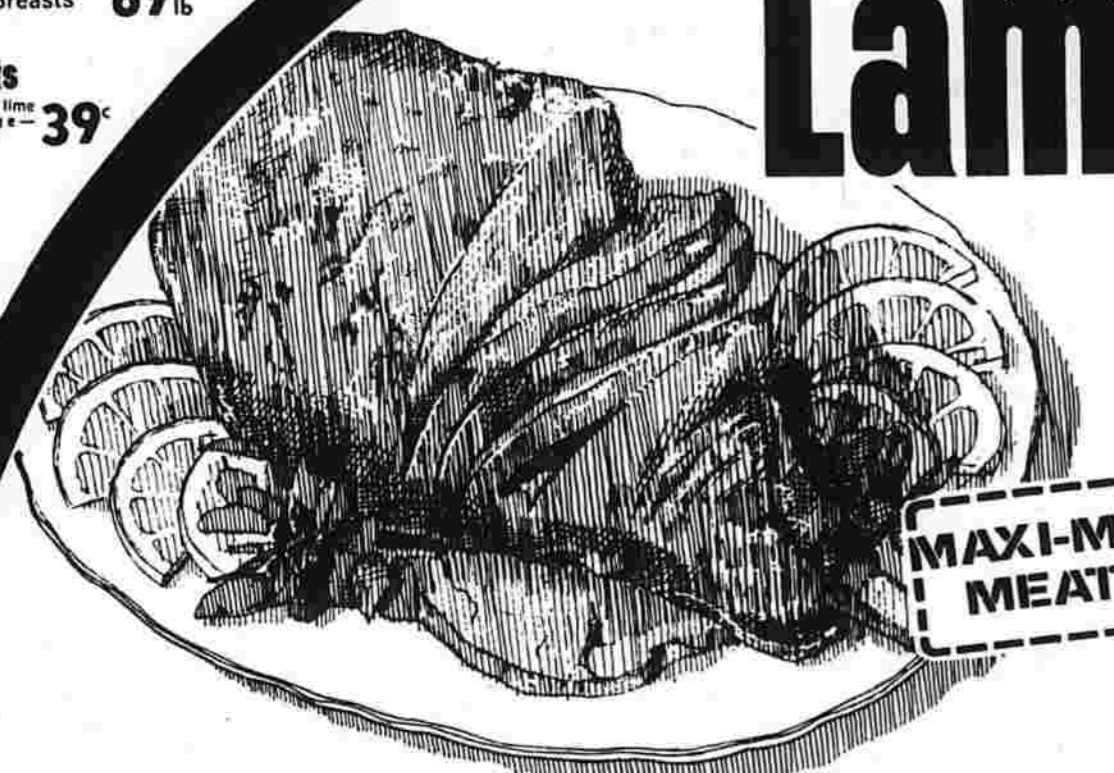

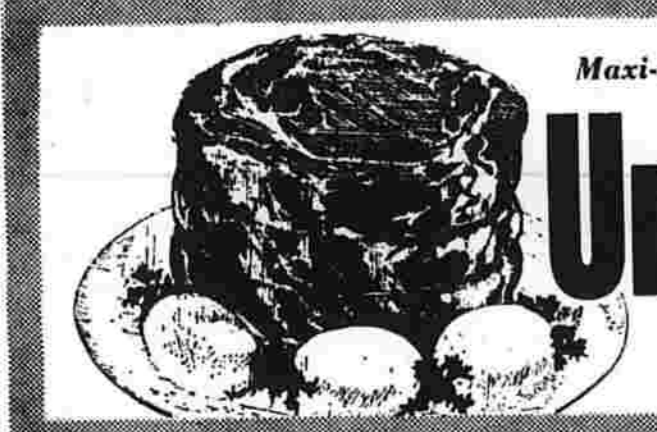

Bruised Feelings

"It's a boy," said the absent-minded doctor to the happy parents. But it happened to be a girl. The following morning, the doctor sheepishly acknowledged his mistake. However, the parents were so unnerved by this turn of events that they determined to sue him for damages.

At the trial, the doctor protested: "I admit I made a careless statement, but I can't see any basis for a lawsuit. After all, I didn't really do them any harm."

"Not physically," countered the parents, "but he certainly did hurt us mentally. We want compensation for our mental anguish."

Nevertheless, the court sided with the doctor and dismissed the claim. The court said mere bruised feelings, not inflicted on purpose, are insufficient grounds for collecting damages.

Most courts agree. They fear that with no physical injuries to be checked and measured, it is too easy for a claimant to exaggerate his woes.

They also fear they might be flooded by all sorts of vague claims. In another case, a girl demanded damages for hurt feelings when she was erroneously left out of a beauty contest. But again, the court decided her claim was too "iffy" to be allowed.

"To attempt to fix damages for such suffering," said one judge, "would be to enter the realm of speculation."

On the other hand, some courts have granted damages in unusually delicate situations, when feelings are most likely to be tender. For example: A telegram to a businessman, informing him that his mother had died, was delivered three days late — after her funeral. Doubtly distressed, the man sued the telegraph company for its negligence.

And, even though he had suffered only mental anguish, the court held the company liable.

The judge said: "The mind is no less a part of the person than the body, and the suffering of the former are sometimes more acute than those of the latter."

Elections Set For Sunday In Honduras

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras (AP) — Next Sunday's presidential election looks like a battle with minor ideological differences that may be decided by a controversy over the Central American Common Market.

The Nationalist party, which backs Ramon El Cruz, says Liberal candidate Jorge Bueso Arias and his party were responsible for putting Honduras into the Common Market under unfavorable conditions.

Honduras withdrew last December after declaring that its membership was seriously affecting the economy.

Previously Honduras had severed relations with El Salvador and closed its borders to the traffic of Salvadoran products to other countries because of the July 1969 war between the two nations.

Since 1962, when the market was founded, Honduras had a favorable balance of trade only in 1968.

The two parties agreed—at the urging of President Oswaldo Lopez Arellano—to divide evenly the 64 seats in Congress and fight only for the presidency. Lopez Arellano also convinced the two parties they should accept a common government program.

Gen. Lopez Arellano seized power in a 1963 military coup that overthrew Liberal President Ramon Villeda Morales a few days before an election in which Cruz appeared a sure winner.

The Nationalist party maintains that Bueso Arias is responsible for the participation of Honduras in the Common Market because, as a minister under Villeda Morales, he signed the integration treaty. Bueso Arias argues that the treaty was negotiated by two administrations that preceded the Villeda Morales government.

The two candidates have appeared in four television debates centering on the economic issue, with Bueso Arias being forced on the defensive every time.

Cruz, 61, says the first problem that must be solved is the border dispute with El Salvador. The Organization of American States has maintained military observers along the border since 1960. There are frequent shelling incidents.

Lopez Arellano and the armed forces have stayed out of the political debate, saying they "will guarantee, but not judge the elections."

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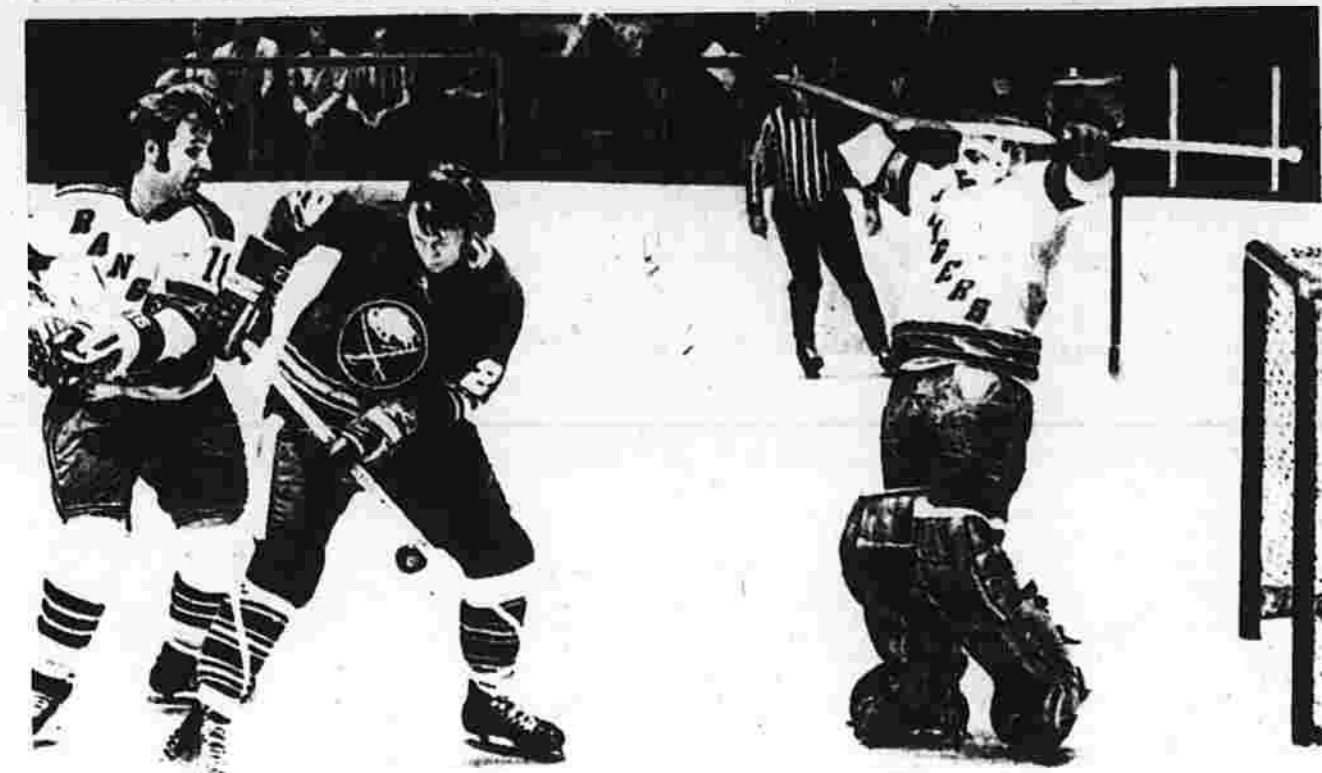

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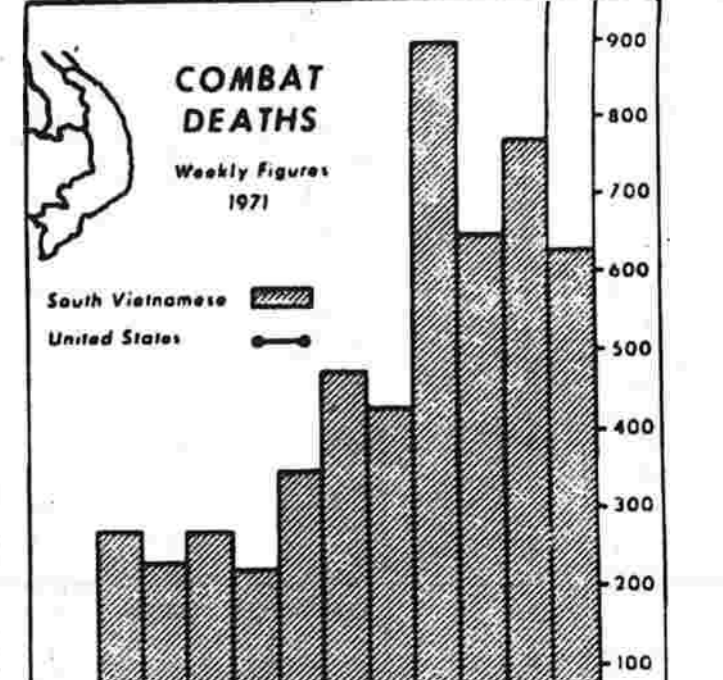
