



MOSCOW (AP)—Two Soviet spacecraft circled the globe in close formation today and the three cosmonauts aboard one of the ships, Soyuz 10, took a nap before trying to lock to the other, the unmanned Salute. The link-up of the two craft would be a major step toward a "radio technical equipment" construction of the world's first orbital space laboratory. Tass announced this afternoon aboard Soyuz 10 "feel fine" and that the cosmonauts had done all the systems aboard the work necessary for link-up and the unmanned and undocking of the manned dummy ship Salute "function spacecraft and the orbital station normally."

U Thant Flies to Europe To Discuss Mideast Crisis

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS With the Mideast peace talks postponed indefinitely, U.N. Secretary-General U Thant flies to Europe today to discuss the Arab-Israeli crisis with his special envoy Gunnar V. Jarring. A U.N. spokesman announced Friday that Jarring, the Swedish ambassador to Moscow, would not return to New York "as he had planned to do" to resume the peace negotiations broken off last month. Thant plans to confer with Jarring on Wednesday in Geneva. U.N. sources indicated that Thant and Jarring had agreed to put off the U.N. talks while Secretary of State William P. Rogers visits the Middle East in a personal effort to bring about a peace settlement. Rogers told a news conference in Washington Friday, "I do not anticipate any dramatic results or breakthroughs from this visit."

GI Usage Of Heroin Irks Steele

By BETTE QUATRALE (Herald Reporter) Second District Congressman Robert Steele of Vermont holds little hope for eliminating the heroin addiction problem among American troops in Vietnam... at least not until the indifference and corruption of several Indochinese governments is corrected. Commenting on his just-completed nine-day drug fact-finding tour of Southeast Asia and Europe, Steele estimated at least 20,000 American troops now in Vietnam are heroin addicts. He placed the percentage of addicts in the U.S. Forces at between 10 and 15 per cent. Heroin is being flown into Vietnam by South Vietnamese street corners of Saigon at airport, and can be bought on the street. Steele was approached by a nine-year-old boy selling it. "There is very little the U.S. Army can do about the problem," he said. Steele without the cooperation of Egyptian President Nasser offered to reopen the canal if Israel made a partial withdrawal from the Sinai peninsula. He

State Police Set Revision On Cruisers

HARTFORD (AP)—State Police Commissioner Cleveland P. Fuesenich says, as part of a planned revision of his department's approach to traffic control, he will stop the use of unmarked cruisers on highways in Connecticut. And, he said Friday, the use of radar will be avoided in all but exceptional cases. The commissioner, soon after taking command April 1, announced he would be discussing a new approach to traffic control with the courts and Department of Motor Vehicles. All state police cruisers on patrol eventually will be marked, he said. The design of the vehicles as police cars, Fuesenich noted, will be even more prominent than now with the red state police shield displayed on front and rear bumpers. Unmarked state police cars, however, still will be used in investigations, he said. Fuesenich explained he is considering a "convertible marking" that would allow conversion of unmarked cars for traffic work when necessary. Radar will be used to investigate specific complaints of large bills. 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

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
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# TURTLE NURSERY

Several thousand heavy young turtles toddle across the beaches of Jupiter Island, Fla., this fall and swim happily out into the ocean, Frank Lund can take a great deal of the credit.


Lund, a 20-year-old student at the University of Florida, has spent his last two summer vacations living on the beach, tagging loggerhead and green turtles and raising their young, out of fear for their possible extinction. Jesse and Mike White and Bruce Williams have been helping in this research experiment, whose aim is to determine the nesting habits of sea turtles, their populations, hazards they face when nesting, and percentages which hatch and return.

The boys dig up turtle eggs, take them to a "rookery"

for hatching, and then keep and feed the turtles in a protected pool for several months until they are big enough to fend for themselves. So far 600 big sea turtles have been tagged. And this year there were 30,000 eggs in the rookery—with luck three quarters of them will have hatched and survived at the end of the season. Hazards facing turtles include raccoons which eat eggs, extreme heat of the sand and erosion.

The four students hope to collect all their findings and publish them later. All this because, thirteen years ago, a fisherman friend happened to give young Frank Lund a turtle as a pet—which led to his present keen interest in turtles and concern for their survival.


Handfuls of baby turtles, in larger-than-life size pictures: newly hatched loggerhead, left, and a rare, three-month-old trunkhead.

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**BERNSTEIN Composing A Mass**

VIENNA (AP) — Leonard Bernstein is composing a Mass for the new Kennedy Center to be opened in Washington in September. He has found it "a very difficult thing to conceive."  
"There is no precedent for this piece," he says. "It is a work which involves dancing and stage presentation, but it is not like a musical comedy because it has no story and it has no characters."

## Secretary of State Starts Journey For Peace in Mideast

WASHINGTON (AP)—Amid signs of difficulties ahead, Secretary of State William P. Rogers took off for London today on the first leg of a two-week journey to promote peace in the Middle East.

An authoritative source said Rogers will be sticking to his settlement demands when Rogers arrives in London and then a Central Treaty Organization-CENTO party in Ankara which ends Saturday.

Then he flies on to Saudi Arabia, Jordan, Lebanon, Egypt and Israel, returning to Washington about May 9. His route home he expects to stop in Rome to see Pope Paul and Italian government leaders.

Rogers' talks with British Foreign Secretary Sir Alec Douglas-Home and Mideast leaders are expected to focus on preventing a new round of fighting for Egypt while armistice talks between Israel and Jordan hold of exposing demonstrators there against the touring secretary of state.

Departing from Andrews Air Force Base in a special jetliner, Rogers arranged first to attend a Southeast Asia Treaty Organization-SEATO meeting in London and then a Central Treaty Organization-CENTO party in Ankara which ends Saturday.

Then he flies on to Saudi Arabia, Jordan, Lebanon, Egypt and Israel, returning to Washington about May 9. His route home he expects to stop in Rome to see Pope Paul and Italian government leaders.

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## Fires Claim Lives of 26 Across U.S.

Four separate fires over the weekend across the country claimed the lives of 26 persons, most of them below the age of 18. One victim died today. Two persons were hospitalized in critical condition.

Seattle officials blamed a careless smoker for the worst blaze, in which 12 persons died Sunday morning. Nine were hospitalized. Two remained in critical condition today.

Five children died in a fire Saturday night that raced through a two-story home in St. Paul, Minn.

Nine persons died in two Ohio fires.

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Nixon assured businessmen today the nation is entering a period of fastening in a six-year period, with the rate of price increases cut in half, that "the worst of inflation is behind us."

Nixon repeatedly hammered on the theme of confidence in an address to the 98th annual meeting of the United States Chamber of Commerce in Constitution Hall.

With militant antiwar demonstrators in the capital organizing two weeks of protest against the Vietnam conflict, Nixon assured the country's largest business organization.

"First, you have a right to be confident that this nation will reject the counsel of the new isolationists."

"We are ending our involvement in the war in Southeast Asia in a way that will permit us to stay involved in building a peaceful world."

But the basic theme of the President was a declaration of confidence in the strength of the economy "in dealing with the future of this country, if you want to be a realist, you have to be an optimist," he said.

"You can be confident that America's economy will continue its vigorous expansion without bringing on a new round of inflation."

"The fact is that we are winning the fight against rising prices. In 1969, inflation was raging along at a rate higher than a percent a year; in 1970 it was 6.5 percent; in 1971 it is now 5.5 percent, and prices are dropping."

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## Presidential Panel Advises Admitting Red China to U.N.

WASHINGTON (AP)—A presidential commission recommended today that Communist China be brought into the United Nations with the continued membership of Nationalist China imperatively.

This was the highlight of a report from a 12-member commission set up in connection with observing the 25th anniversary of the United Nations. The commission is under the chairmanship of Henry Cabot Lodge, President Nixon's ambassador to the United Nations.

"The U.S.," the report said, "can best do its job of war prevention, provided they subscribe to its membership includes all the governments in the world, provided they subscribe to the principles of the U.N. Charter. This means all governments which are unquestionably governing specific areas—even though they may not control all the areas which they claim."

The commission members took the position that the United States should adopt a stand for including all firmly established treaty governments in the international community, subject to international obligations under the commission.

James C. Hagerty, American Broadcasting Co. executive and former White House press secretary, said the report was adopted before the recent State Department table tennis team to the Chinese government in the international community, subject to international obligations under the commission.

He told reporters that Nixon had not commented specifically on any of the recommendations, but termed it a very comprehensive report and noted that he had been much impressed on it.

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## New Trial On My Lai To Begin

PT. McPHERSON, Ga. (AP)—Capt. Eugene M. Kotouc, an intelligence officer charged with maintaining and assaulting a Viet Cong suspect after U.S. troops South American allies. One attack in 1968, goes on trial today.

Kotouc, 37, a stocky, balding man, was part of the third paratrooper from Humboldt, part of the country for the third time since January.
