

Power as Potential Voter Puts Youth in Controversy

Student power, magnified by the potential in the 18-year-old vote, is fueling a new kind of town-gown controversy in colleges and universities nationwide...

On one side: Young people and their supporters who form and seek a chance to make an impact on government. On the other: The establishment, which has pleaded with youth to work within the system...

The recent success of a student-backed radical state in Berkeley, Calif., has reminded both young and old that in scores of communities the "new" movement's electronic holds at most a modest numerical edge...

"This could serve as a blueprint for other cities with the same basic makeup as Berkeley," said new City Councilman Jim Stinson...

They (students) really could raise havoc," said Leroy Burton, mayor of Kent, Ohio...

Twenty-five states have ratified the proposed constitutional amendment that would allow 18-year-olds to vote...

However, what bothers the elders in many college towns is not whether the young people vote but where they vote.

The proposed amendment merely gives qualified 18-year-olds the franchise in all elections, not only in federal elections as affirmed by the U.S. Supreme Court last December.

Rolling a law passed last year by Congress, the court knocked down provisions for local and state voting age raising the prospect of dual election systems estimated to cost up to \$20 million nationwide...

The amendment completely entrenching 18 year olds was passed by both houses of Congress last year and was sent to the states for ratification.

By itself, this is not enough to revolutionize local politics. But combined with proposals that would concentrate the youth vote by letting students register where they attend school, it is enough to give edge to townpeople nightmares of hippie mayors, tax-supported rock festivals and fleeing businessmen.

In Kent, three students are suing against a state law that permits students to register in their college towns only if they prove they plan to live there after graduation.

Similar efforts against similar restrictions are underway in Manchester.

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South Windsor Their Trip into the Past Depends on PZC Ruling

William and Patricia Krawski are planning a trip into the past. Whether or not they get to go depends on the Planning and Zoning Commission.

The Krawskis want to build an authentic copy of an old rural farm and village using old native clapboards, handhewn beams, barnwood, brick and field and quarry stone.

Originally, the Krawskis wanted to put three buildings on an eight-acre tract of land on Ruckland Rd.—a residence at the top of the hill looking over a proportionately scaled down Dutch gable-roofed barn, and a retail establishment.

According to Krawski, the Planning and Zoning Commission granted that a retail farm establishment "might be okay."

Now Process Developed Since this was the first time anything like this had been done, a new review process had to be developed.

The Krawskis felt that if they were to go for a subdivision change they might as well apply for a general commercial use permit and include additional structures — all colonial and specific in design — to house examples of business found in the 18th and 19th century America.

If their plans are realized, the facilities would provide for a blacksmith, carriage shed, a gift shop, a bakery, a gunsmith and cabinetmaker, a bank, professional offices, a small country hotel and inn, an undertaking establishment, a stable, a veterinarian, a general store and a container-grown nursery.

Private Roads These businesses would be put on private roads in the village — something similar to that of Starbuck's Village in Massachusetts — and will include living space for the proprietors.

Right now, uniquely depicting what they intend to do, stands a reproduction of a 400 square foot home and a Dutch barn made solely of native materials.

The buildings are a standing example of what can be done with something already here, and in a way, is a method of recycling. These structures conform with the existing zoning regulations, as the setup could revert back to a residence. But the town's tax structure could hinder future plans.

Nixon had returned Tuesday his communication of police authority, and added police for government workers who stayed on the job.

So imposing was the authority that most of the antiwar youth chose to ignore their street-blocking mission, moving on instead to the rally at Justice Square. About 600 were arrested for attempting traffic violations, many were charged with blocking sidewalks instead of streets although even those cases were much more docile than Monday's activity.

On that day, demonstrators watched the gathering, but no blocked roads with cars, threw mail-stuffed boards and other debris, and drew several tear gas attacks in clashes with police.

In typical action Tuesday, police ordered protesters to disperse, but they refused to do so. More than 300 were arrested, many of whom were taken to the Federal House of Detention.

When it became clear Tuesday that there would be little or no dispersal, the police resorted to Monday's hit-and-run, traffic-marshaling, tear-gas, and other tactics.

One woman arrested near Franklin Park, textbooks in hand, complained she was merely on her way to classes at Federal City College when police grabbed her.

LONDON (AP) — The British government announced today it favors a peace conference between the Arab states and Israel "with others present" but said the time for such a party is not yet ripe.

"At the moment," said the Foreign Office spokesman, "we believe that the priority must be given to the ideas which American Secretary of State William Rogers is discussing in the area."

The Foreign Office statement was a reaction to a proposal for the 1962 permanent members of the United Nations Security Council to convene an Arab-Israeli peace conference.

It was a reference to the talks Rogers has had or will have in five Mediterranean capitals on a limited Arab-Israeli agreement to reopen the Suez Canal.

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Insurers Ask Taxing Revamp

HARTFORD (AP) — The Connecticut insurance industry has asked lawmakers to overhaul the tax system for insurance firms.

The apparent net effect of the proposals would be lower taxes for insurance companies.

One proposal would dump the present 3 1/2 per cent tax on investment income earned by the companies and impose the state's regular 6 per cent corporation tax on them.

That tax, based on net income or the minimum tax base, would cut the industry about \$9 million a year, Captives have estimated.

The memorandum said the industry is expected to pay about \$17.1 million this fiscal year under the current investment tax.

The letter cited a "competitive edge" for insurance firms outside Connecticut that pay lower tax bills.

But it did not ask an immediate end to the investment income tax. It proposed that it be phased out with the first year of the period having a rate of 2.5 per cent, of three-fourths the rate of the present rate.

The memorandum also asks the current tax on insurance premiums be set at a uniform 2 per cent for companies of all kinds of policies.

The rates for Connecticut companies would be 2 per cent for life and health policies and 2 1/2 per cent for all other policies.

The rate for out-of-state firms would be 2 per cent for all policies.

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Vocabulary Expanded By Space Flight

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — "Everything is A-O-K."

That's how Lt. Cmdr. Alan B. Shepard Jr. informed Mission Control all was perfect after he landed in the Atlantic Ocean following America's first manned space flight 10 years ago, May 5, 1961.

It added a new word to the language of the space people. Called "space," this vocabulary of tongue twisters and verbal strings caught the imagination of the public as astronauts began challenging new frontiers.

There was a gung-ho attitude at Cape Canaveral and rocketmen uttered such phrases as "all systems are go," "spacecraft is a vision and green," the rocket is "right down the slot," and the shout of "go, baby, go" when it was blasted off.


A miracle was a "bird," and if something was wrong, it was a "sick bird." If something wasn't right it was an anomaly. If it was okay, it was "normal." Scrub meant the launching was postponed.

Two words that seemed to be forbidden were yes and no. Say affirmative or negative, and say it with authority.

Shepard's pioneering suborbital Mercury mission was about 15-minute up-and-down-but it introduced the world to such space as capsule, 6.6-ton weightlessness, re-entry and splashdown.

People learned that attitude meant the angle of the spacecraft; chicken scratch was a device astronaut could pull to fire his capsule escape tower, and telemetry was information radiated from the craft.

As manned space flight moved into the orbital phase, the public became acquainted with lingo like apogee and perigee, the high and low points of the orbital path, orbital plane, meters, which means the same thing, and zero G (weightlessness, or no gravity).

(Continued from Page One) landed the lunar module Eagle to develop a station-shuttle system.

Since then two other astronauts have landed on the moon. Shepard, after overcom- ing an ear disorder that grounded him several years, com- manded the Apollo 14 flight ear- lier this year, landing in the moon's highlands.

The Apollo program is to end after three more moon landings, the Apollo 15 in July and Apollo 16 in July or August. In 1972, the U.S. plans to launch a small lunar station named Skylab.

During the year it will visit Earth by three different three-man crews. Each will be a doctor and a scientist and will conduct experiments for up to 84 days.

After Skylab, America has no more man-in-space projects. The National Aeronautics and Space Administration hopes to launch a large space station with a dozen or more men and women in orbit in 1976, to be serviced from Earth by a refit- able space shuttle that would operate like an airliner, making 100 or more roundtrips into space.

Both projects have been delayed at least three years, and may be cancelled if Congress fails to vote funds in the next fiscal year.

As Others See Us

LONDON (AP) — Secretary of State William P. Rogers' visit to the Middle East raises the question whether U.S. policy in the region is "adventurously assisting" Soviet penetration of the area through its support for Israel, a British newspaper suggested last week. Pointing out that the Soviet response to the deadlock has been to raise the military stakes in the region, the London Daily Telegraph noted that "the current course is now in its ninth month, and 'events have moved on' twice in that period, none to the ward peace, others toward a danger of renewed war."

Foreign editorial comment on the United States, the Mediterranean and the Middle East has once again heard the "trend of thousands marching in protest against continued American involvement in Vietnam." "Mr. Nixon may feel that the antiwar movement is a fraction of the electorate," the newspaper said, "but the greater impetus for course may be largely influenced by throwing veterans as a fraction of the 2 million ex-servicemen from Vietnam. But the movement has shown its cogency and its staying power."

"Abroad," the paper continues, "Mr. Nixon—despite indications of the right and left, and pandering by the Democratic leaders to the pacifist and peace movements—is showing that he is able and determined to discharge America's responsibilities." "Such things do not make such good television programs as veterans' protests, but in the present context they are much, much more important."

Enough Is Enough BALEBURY, Rhodessa (AP) — Police officials were "pleasantly surprised" by the behavior of some 15,000 people who attended Rhodessa's first pop music festival. Police turned off electric power when the Glamis Stadium gathering ran one hour later than permitted by laws controlling public meetings.
