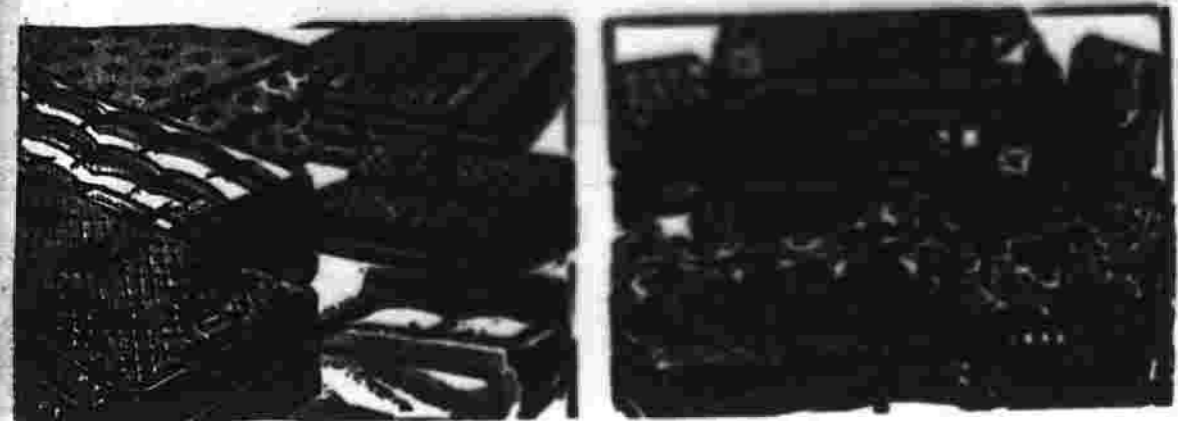

Senseless Killing, Prosecutor Cries At Seale Sum-Up

 NEW HAVEN (AP) — The prosecutor at the six-month-old trial of Black Panthers Bobby G. Seale and Ericka Huggins said in his final arguments Tuesday the 1969 slaying of another party member was "a killing as senseless as any we've ever heard of."

State's Atty. Arnold Markle told the Superior Court jury of five blacks and seven whites that the killing of Alex Rackley was caused by the "petty internal politics" of the Black Panther party and "people striving for power."

He charged that Seale, the 34-year-old colonel and national chairman of the Black Panthers, ordered Rackley's slaying. Markle said Mrs. Huggins, 28-year-old local leader for the party, was a participant in the events leading up to Rackley's death.

At the close of the morning session, Catherine Rorback, Mrs. Huggins' attorney, argued that her client might have been guilty to an assault upon Rackley but was innocent of the serious charges she faces.

"I have sometimes wondered during the last six months," Mrs. Rorback said, "why I am in this courtroom and why Arnold Markle decided to prosecute this case."

The attorney contended that "a brutal murder" had been com-

mitted, but she maintained that "the clupete have either pleaded guilty or been tried." Mrs. Rorback argued that Markle's two leading witnesses had made "little additions, little embroideries" upon the facts of the case and their testimony was "pretty misleading."

She said Rackley's murder had been accomplished by the two prosecution witnesses and Mrs. Huggins' "withdrawing her failure to do anything" to help Rackley is not part of a crime.

Seale and Mrs. Huggins face capital charges in the May 1969 slaying of Rackley, who was held at the New Haven Panther headquarters and shot before he was taken to a swampy area 20 miles north of here and shot to death.

Markle said the party members at the New Haven headquarters had "their mouths taped and their hearts frozen" while Rackley was being held there and everybody took "a piece of the sacrificial lamb."

"It's hard to believe that a woman would partake in these acts that you hear of," the State's attorney said. He told the jurors that if there was any doubt about Mrs. Huggins' participation, they should recall a tape recording made during Rackley's interrogation.

Brothers' Viet Swap Uncovered

YARMOUTH, Maine (AP) — The father of an Army rifleman whose older brother went to Vietnam to finish out his tour of duty says the younger brother is now en route back to Vietnam.

Carlston R. Storer added Monday night that the older brother, Wesley, 22, was being held by military authorities in Vietnam and could be sentenced to five years in a South Vietnamese prison for illegal entry.

Storer said Wesley, himself kept out of the war by a bad leg, agreed to impersonate his brother Glenn, 21, after the radio operator-rifleman came home to Yarmouth April 9 for a two-week leave after five months in Vietnam.

Storer said Glenn was shipped out of Ft. Devens, Mass., late Monday.

He said that a few weeks after Glenn's leave ended federal officials notified him that someone was impersonating Glenn in Vietnam and asked him to verify identification. "It was then he learned that all this switching they'd been kicking around had become a reality," Storer said.

Wesley, interviewed in Vietnam by a CBS-TV newsmen, said his brother's buddies covered up for him, but he was turned in the day before a march into the field.

Storer, who also has a 17-year-old son and a 3-year-old daughter, said that after hearing from federal authorities he contacted Glenn's girl friend and the next day Glenn called from Vietnam. He then returned to Portland to surrender to federal authorities, his father said.

"Glenn didn't want to go back," his father recalled. "He told us it's all pointless over there and that they were playing with his life."

Storer, an engineer, said Glenn had worked with his surviving crew before he entered the service and had never been interested in antiwar protests. "But he was embittered when he came back," Storer said.

Wesley, who had spent the winter working as a ski instructor in Vermont.

Nixon Ready To Act

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Labor Committee approved 13 to 1 today a resolution designed to halt, until Oct. 1, the nationwide rail strike called by the signalmen's union.

The committee acted as the strike sent mounting ripples of paralysis through much of the economy for the second day.

Sponsors of the resolution said they hoped it could clear the Senate in a few hours and then be concurred later in the day with House legislation, and sent on to President Nixon.

The committee included in its resolution an approximate 17 per cent wage increase for the 13,000 members of the signalmen's union.

Thus it revised considerably the proposal sent to Congress yesterday by Nixon after the strike began.

The President had proposed a simple extension of the no-strike period to July 1 without any wage increase.

But members of the Labor Committee decided that the men should receive an interim wage increase since they had been working 32 months without one. The wage boost included in the committee's resolution covers the first three steps of a two-year package recommended by an emergency board.

Shortly before the committee action, House Republican Gen. Carl Albert, D-Michigan, emerged from a White House meeting with President Nixon and announced that the House would enact permanent legislation dealing with similar labor disputes.

"The economy of the United States will suffer more and our tax loss will be greater by further delay in consideration of rail strike legislation than would be saved by troop reductions in Europe," Ford said.

The Senate committee also wrote into its resolution a provision calling on the parties to the dispute to bargain on improved working conditions for signalmen who live in camp cars on the railroads. The union had complained that conditions in these cars were bumpy and slow to heat.

Another provision added to the resolution calls on the Secretary of Labor, Transportation and Defense to submit to Congress a report on the effects of this strike.

Sen. Harrison A. Williams Jr., D-N.J., the committee chairman, said he hoped this data could be used by his panel in trying to draft some form of permanent legislation to deal with national emergency strikes.

U.S. Court Rules 'Red Flag Law' Unconstitutional

State's Food Supply Adequate If Strike Ends Before Thursday

NEW HAVEN (AP) — With 15,000 commuters already choosing between inconvenience of a long weekend away from work, the effects of a nationwide rail strike threatened to spread deeper in Connecticut after day-to-day supplies, and presumably, of retail food.

"If it lasts more than another day, the situation will be chaotic," said James C. Lamberti, president of the New Haven Food Terminal. He said today's supplies of meats, fruits and vegetables in the produce market would be adequate to meet retail demand.

But, he said, only for today.

By Wednesday, Lamberti warned, the strike would begin having "an adverse effect on our commerce," with shipments of meat waiting in Springfield, Mass. and shipments of fruits and vegetables stranded in other parts of the country.

In Hartford, the head of a fruit and produce firm said carloads of perishable produce are lined up on special tracks near Albany, N.Y. The railroads are taking necessary measures to reorganize the produce, "but it isn't moving," said Monroe Gordon, one of the Gordon Fruit and Food Co. executives.

Senate Poll on SST Shows Little Chances

WASHINGTON (AP) — The debate over the SST as the past—environmental protectionists and critics of government spending practices—a new and apparently telling argument has been picked up from an unlikely source: William Allen, board chairman of Boeing Co. SST contractor.

Again and again in Senate debate opponents have pointed to Allen's statement that a start-up cost for renewed SST production will be \$500 million and \$1 billion.

Allen made the estimate after last week's 201-197 House vote to turn the SST termination fund into revival money. Last March the House joined the Senate in stopping development subsidies after previously supporting the spending.

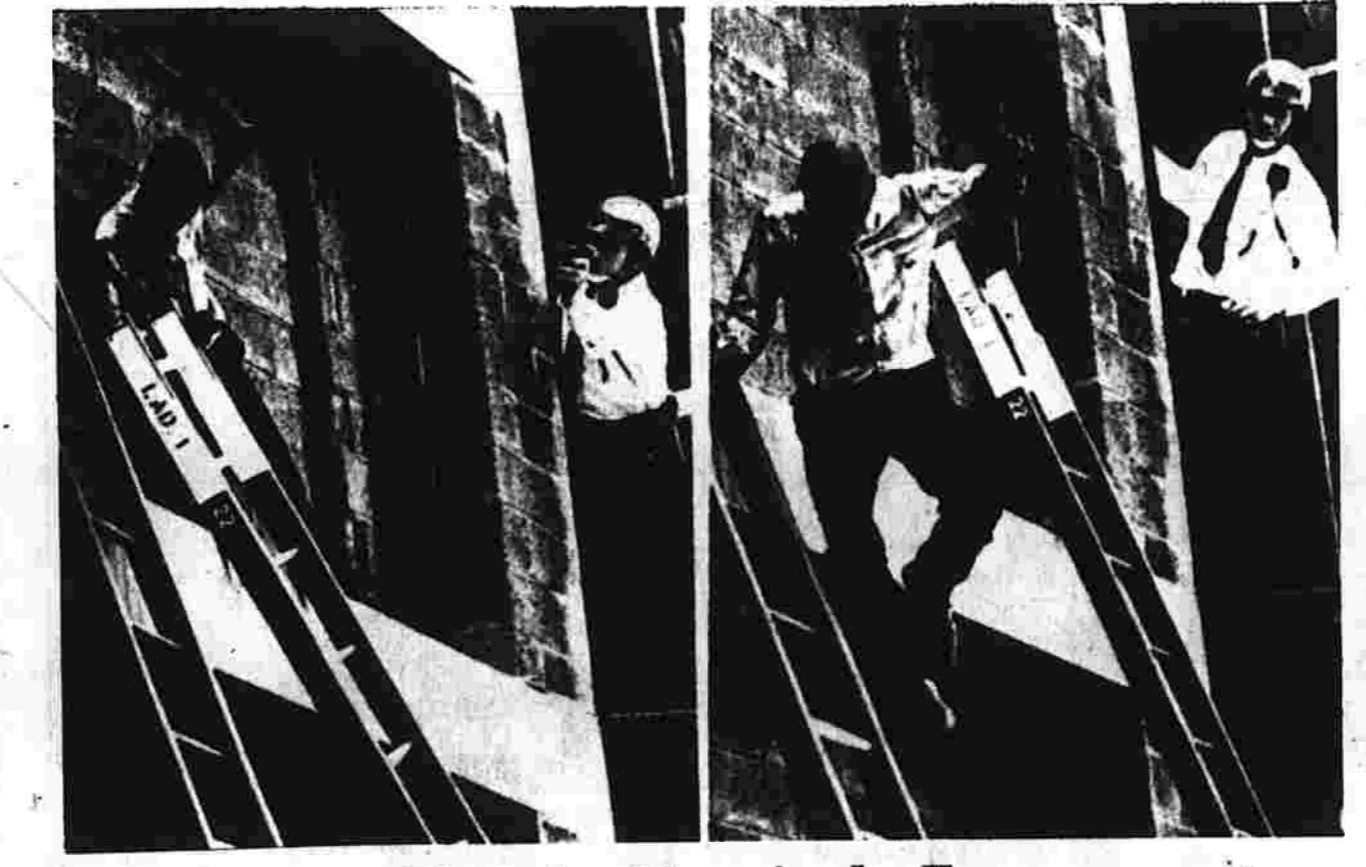

Marijuana Control Hit, Prof Asks Legal Status

WASHINGTON (AP) — A National Commission on Marijuana and Dangerous Drugs was told today marijuana probably is dangerous but should be legalized.

The testimony followed the claims Monday of two doctors that the drug produced distortion of perception and reality in test subjects and the opinion of another doctor that alcohol produces similar results.

Jim Kaplan, a law professor at Stanford University, told the commission today in prepared testimony he believes marijuana to be dangerous but added research since 1964 has yet to show how dangerous the drug may be.

Three Resign Curia Group In Protest

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Two priests and laymen who worked for the Vatican's Justice and Peace commission have resigned to protest the ineffectiveness of their work, reliable sources report.

The three complained that the commission, founded by Pope Paul VI to promote social justice and brotherhood, was doing more than a "study center" to gather information on social problems. They wanted it to have a direct role in shaping Vatican policy, the sources said.

The three were identified as the Rev. Marc Reuver, a Dutch Carmelite and the commission's press spokesman; the Rev. Antonio Gaudin, an Italian diocesan priest, secretary of the commission; and Mrs. Carolina Benedetti, an Italian laywoman who worked up reports on social problems.

The resignation, believed the first of its kind in Pope Paul's eight-year reign, reflected the discontent smoldering among progressive Catholics in the Vatican since the election of Pope Paul in 1967. It is headed by Maurice Cardinal Foy of Canada. But one source said the three resignations were frustrated by limitations placed on the commission's activities by Archbishop Giovanni Benelli, the Vatican's substitute secretary of state.

Benelli reportedly has asked that all reports be sent to the Vatican's mass press office. Father La Chapelle was said to have protested sharply when the secretary of state said he would not accept a resignation from a staff member from a dozen as an economy measure.

Burger Sees Danger In Shrill Incivility

WASHINGTON (AP) — Chief Justice Warren B. Burger said today "shrill and unproductive" arguments with seclusion advocates are bringing a 20th Century version of Know-Nothings to America.

The chief justice named no lawyers nor newspaper in his criticism. The one incident he related involved Archbishop Cox, the former U.S. solicitor general who teaches at Harvard Law School.

Burger, quoting an account in the New York Times, said Cox a few weeks ago "tried to speak to his own students at Harvard" and was met with a screaming, chanting audience.

Cox, said Burger, told his students: "Freedom of speech is indivisible. You cannot deny it to one man and save it for others."

At his home in Wayland, Mass., Cox responded to a newsman's inquiry with additional details. He said the incident occurred at a campus meeting devoted to the new book, "The Unusable American," by James Burnham.

"When men shout and abuse or call names, we will be reluctant to the new media unless they are in an effort to maintain order," he said.

The chief justice, citing the 19th century Englishman, said, "I hardly dare take the liberty of adding that this may also be relevant to the new media unless they are in an effort to maintain order."

Burger praised the institute and members for bringing to Washington a much needed quality of order, quietude, thoughtful and civil discourse. He said "other countries, news media were in a disarray."

Town Was at Fault ZBA Allows Variance For Office Building

After more than an hour of probing into the reasons why an Oakland St. office building under construction was in violation of zoning, the Zoning Board of Appeals last night unanimously granted a variance that will permit work to resume on the two-story structure.

The board granted the variance to Dr. Robert Stoker, a Manchester contractor, only after members satisfied themselves that the applicant was not at fault and that the violation was the result of an oversight by the Town Building Department.

Dr. Stoker had originally applied in 1969 for a two-story building in the A Zone. That variance was granted. But because of a complicated series of developments, outlined at last night's hearing, construction did not get under way until early this year. That violation is that the structure had been redesigned to be two full stories.

Honest Error
Dr. Stoker went through channels following proper procedure, according to Stoker. Eugene M. Kelly, who represented him at the hearing, admitted that mistakes had been made, but he charged that it was an "honest and mutual error" by the applicant and the Building Department.

Building Inspector Ernest McNeill, who issued the permit, was candid in admitting he had made a mistake. He said at least three plan revisions had been made over a period of nearly a year — his department's request—and that when he finally issued the building permit, he inadvertently overlooked the fact the building was designed to be two stories.

Testimony at the hearing brought out the fact that the original one-story building application was designed for a flat roof, rather than the peaked roof board members unanimously approved.

Also brought out was the fact that a one-story structure had been sought by the applicant and was not the result of a restriction by the board.

Atty. Kelly called Dr. Stoker, who testified he was unable to get a mortgage for his original design through a local bank. Later, a bank director suggested a two-level building would have a better chance for a mortgage, and Dr. Stoker had a contractor come up with a "split-level" plan something on the order of a raised ranch style — which was okayed by both the town planner and the building department head as qualifying as one-story plus basement.

The open stair-split entrance incorporated into this design was not acceptable, McNeill said, and he directed another redesign to ensure a closed entrance.

McNeill said he was so intent on making sure this had been complied with, he overlooked the fact that the final building design amounted to two stories.

A factor in the design revisions, Dr. Stoker said, was that he had told the builder ground-level entrance without stairs would be more convenient for his patients.

Construction was stopped by the Building Department recently after telephone complaints from area residents.

Speaks in Favor
However, none showed up at the hearing to oppose the variance request; and one, Fay Davis Jr. of the Oakland St. spoke in favor of granting it, saying he felt a professional building would be an asset to the neighborhood.

Norman Hosenbach, the builder, said in answer to a question from the board, that the present stage of construction cost was \$10,000-\$12,000.

Later, in executive session, board members agreed over being "put on the spot" by having to decide whether to allow two stories to be added to the building. The error on the part of the board was to allow the two-story building, rather than to create services than it purchased, a hardship for the applicant.

McNeill, who sat in on the session, was questioned at length about the volume of Commerce.

Town Seeks Funding For Open Spaces

Following an executive session last night, the Town Council passed two resolutions concerning applications for federal grants to acquire and develop open space land.

The proposal was presented first in executive session by Town Planner John McNeil. The resolutions state that the town desires to acquire and develop seven different areas.

They are: Valley Falls addition (abutting Valley Falls Park) consisting of about 68 acres; Trull Park (Rt. 83 and Trull Rd.) about 23.8 acres; Thacker Main Conservation Area (Main and Talcottville) about 89 acres;

Tillinghast Property (rear of Birch St.) about six acres; Talcottville (off Phoenix St., abutting the Tillinghast property) about 2.8 acres;

South of the parking area, about two acres and the Burke Rd. junior playground, about 2.2 acres.

The land, if purchased, would be held and used for recreation and conservation uses.

One resolution concerning state grants, agrees that an application be made to the Connecticut Department of Agriculture and Natural Resources for a grant of some \$120,000 and that the balance of the amount needed for acquisition and other costs, be secured by the town from other sources.

It further provides that it be requested to apply to the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, on behalf of Vernon, to provide the Federal share of the cost of acquiring the land which is estimated to be about \$240,000.

The Planning Commission is authorized to enter, execute and file the application and to enter into any agreement or contract with the state necessary to acquire the grants.

The second resolution concerns the town's obligations concerning the acquisition of open space land if the federal grant is forthcoming. The town has to agree that families and individuals who may be displaced as a result of the open space project, will be relocated into decent, safe and sanitary housing; to comply with Federal labor standards and Federal requirements relating to equal employment opportunity. This grant would be for \$60,400.

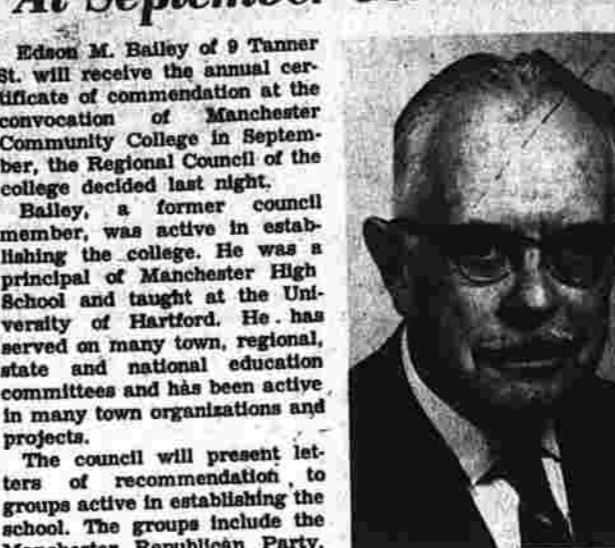

"Man of Gypsy Moth" is the heading of an interesting bulletin published by the Connecticut Conservation Association, executive vice president and editor, the following are excerpts from this recent publication.

Since the time that man first discovered his ability to fly, he has been striving to make life more comfortable for himself and for those creatures fortunate enough to be his favor.

Anything unobtrusive enough to gain a diastole has caused man to act with senseless fervor to rid himself of the intruder. Often, because man is impatient, he strikes without thinking. And man who neglects to tape his knuckles, he gets hurt in the process.

This kind of impulsive attack against a misunderstood insect is best illustrated by man's efforts to rid the world of what he has determined to be pest insects. Man has himself with a free-swinging charge, belittling his environment with persistent poisons that are now turning against him. The insect world is very crowded, and in his staying at the moment man knocks out many innocent bystanders, giving the pest more room to maneuver and making the pest all the more difficult to control. If a spotted child denied his prize, frustrated man only intensifies the saying.

One such "enemy," the gypsy moth, has been frustrating man for more than a century. Its insecticide punch that man counted on was DDT — but it failed. In fact, biologists now say, it actually spread the gypsy moth, making it more annoying.

The gypsy moth is a native of Europe and Asia, was brought to the United States in 1869 by a Harvard researcher. A small population was kept in Massachusetts as part of a silk producing experiment but several moths escaped. Twenty years later the gypsy moth "reappeared" for the first time. Today the species has achieved pest status throughout much of New England, New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania.

Like most insects, the gypsy moth has unstable population levels characterized by sporadic outbreaks followed by periods of low density. It is only during the "outbreak" period that the caterpillars cause noticeable defoliation. Unfortunately the gypsy moth does not follow a regular pattern of "high" and "low."

The common experience is from one to three years of high with often seven years of intervening lows. During the low periods natural enemies keep the population down. Periodically, as is the way in nature, the pest overcomes its natural controls and has a short cycle of high population. The natural enemies (if not further destroyed by pesticides) then rebound.

data, and control of commercial evergreen plantations are examples of localized, justifiable control areas.

There should be no statewide, publicly financed gypsy moth control program. These annual programs damage the forest community, do not control the gypsy moth, and for these reasons, are financially wasteful. What warranted, spot control programs on state lands should be paid for by the state. Any control efforts on town-owned lands should be usually financed by the town government. The cost of treating private property should be assumed by the owner.

All control applications should be made from the owner of the property. There should be no consideration of an ecologically sound control program. The control of the gypsy moth as well as a percentage of the most effective means of keeping the gypsy moth in check. The gypsy moth emerges free to explode at will. It is a proven experience that pesticides cannot keep the gypsy moth down. What is born of this practice is a continual, expensive and damaging reliance on the use of poisons which do no more than what nature can accomplish free of charge. The only tangible results are taxpayers' money in the pockets of pesticide applicators and the complete disruption of the ecological balance of a large portion of the state.

But what if the spraying is stopped? Will Connecticut lose its forest? No. Many people consider strip-pod (poison chow) which have spruce trees will invariably die. In reality, hardwoods can defend against severe insect (healthy) without permanent damage. It is generally stated that some trees will perish if complete defoliation occurs in three successive years. However, do severe gypsy moth infestations occur in three successive years. Actually, there are instances on record where as many as forty per cent of the oak trees in Massachusetts were destroyed by successive, severe infestations. However, are the exceptional moths escaped. Twenty years ago the gypsy moth "reappeared" for the first time. 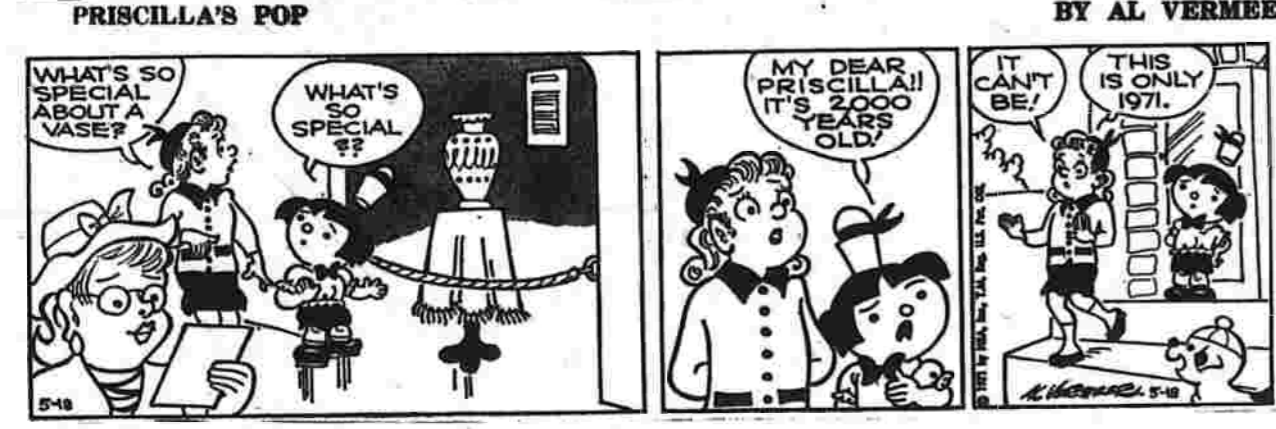

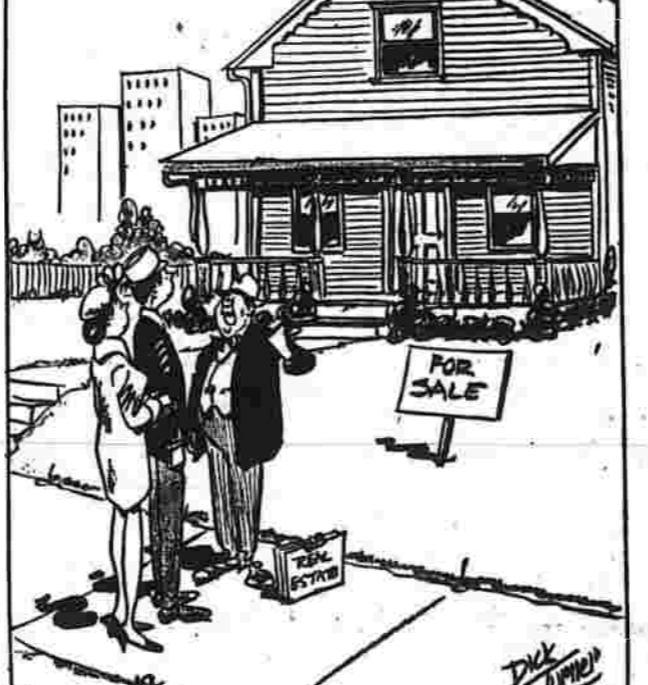

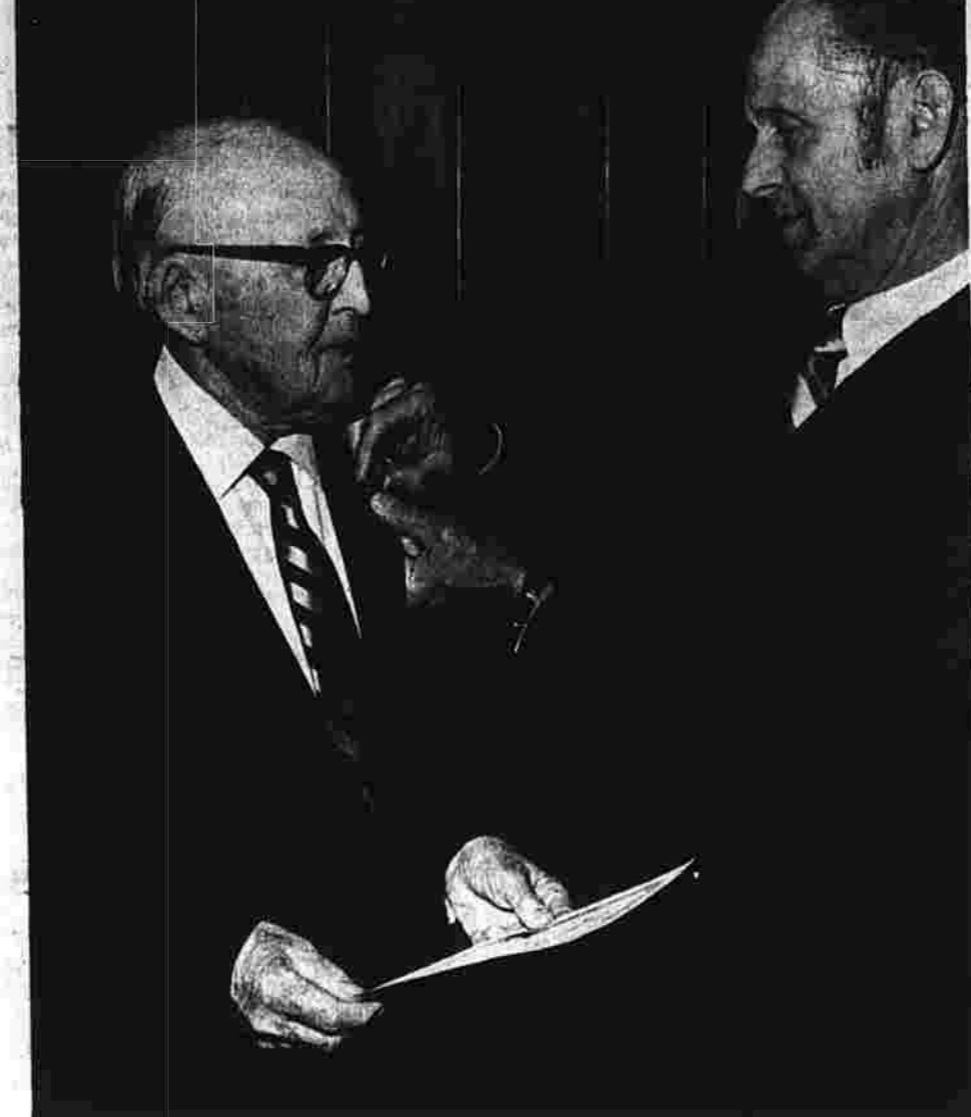
