

British Soldier Killed in Ulster By Terrorists

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP)—A British army jeep came under ambush on a main highway to Belfast today as troops fanned out into this province in search of terrorists who killed a soldier and bombed a village dance, wounding 20 revelers.

The driver of the ambushed jeep was seriously wounded by the gunman. The attack—blamed on the Irish Republican Army—came only hours after the British soldier was slain in the heart of Belfast by terrorists who escaped in the maze of narrow streets in a Roman Catholic district.

The shootings brought new tensions in a growing showdown between the outlaws determined to drive the British out and the British army set to keep the peace between Catholic Republicans and Protestants pledging loyalty to the British crown.

Gunsmen in a speeding car fired on the jeep heading to British army headquarters. Their car was later found blown up six miles away from the attack in Lisburn.

The British army launched a massive search for the armed terrorists who have adopted new hit-and-run tactics. Army snipers were posted along the streets and a mail area of Belfast. No one was allowed in or out.

The dead soldier, Cpl. Jim Jackson, an English regiment, was with a patrol carrying out a routine tour of the area. It was fired on from both sides of the street.

A police spokesman said: "This obviously was a planned ambush by the Irish Republican Army. The patrol returned the fire but we don't yet know if any of the terrorists were injured in this latest but fierce gun battle."

The killing brought this year's known death toll in Northern Ireland to 23. The known total since violence erupted between Protestant and Catholic in August 1969 is 84. Security officials believe the true figures may be higher, since Irish extremist groups try to keep secret their losses.

All but three of the 20 people injured when a 10-pound gelignite bomb exploded at the British Legion hall at Rathfriland, outside of the city were released from a hospital today. Most suffered abrasions and lacerations.

It was the fourth blast of the night. Earlier a girl and an elderly man were taken to a hospital after an explosion badly damaged the Belfast Corp. electricity department offices.

Other bombs exploded at an electricity transformer and a plumber's store, and a mail box was lobbed onto an army bullet in Springfield Road. Little damage was caused.

The explosions were heard throughout Belfast, Northern Ireland's riot-ridden capital, which today was ringed by the military.

Road blocks were set up at all main routes, cars stopped and searched and occupants questioned.

LBJ Paid Tribute By Nixon

However, he said, "more and more in today's world, the times require that a President, and indeed all of us who help lead the nation, go beyond party to be partisan of principle."

"Increasingly," he continued, "we confront great concerns that go beyond party and reach to the security of our nation, to our hopes for peace in the world, to realizing the American dream

Tax Plan Backed By Democrats

HARTFORD (AP)—House Democrats finally got behind a tax program Friday afternoon, but a Republican leader promptly called it nothing more than a "bargaining position."

The Democrats approved their so-called "alternative 3," which includes a 10 per cent tax on interest, dividends and capital gains. The vote in caucus was 78-8, and speaker William Roth said he knew for sure that nine of the absentees were for it.

"If they got 87 votes, they'd be able to pass it," said House Minority Leader Francis J. Collins.

While there is no question that Gov. Thomas J. Meskill would veto such a tax program if it ever reached his desk, Collins hailed the Democrats' action as "a necessary step."

"It's a bargaining position," he said. "At least now they have something on the table."

Senate Democrats are also expected to get behind "alternative 3," which will be reported out favorably by the Finance Committee and possibly be voted by the Senate next week.

The Democrats' action sets the stage for serious negotiations with Meskill and the Republican legislative leaders — negotiations which might result in an agreement on an income tax compromise.

Meskill's tax plan, which includes a 7 per cent sales tax, has no chance of winning the approval of the majority Democrats in the legislature, as Democratic leaders have been saying for some time.

On the other hand, the government has served notice that Democrats' "alternative 3" is unacceptable as an income tax bill he had previously called a "last resort."

Some Democratic backers of an income tax in the House even went so far as to say they were persuaded to go along with "alternative 3" as a wise political move. When the program was first presented to that there was a decision to

North Viet Gunners Unleash Rocket Barrages Along DMZ

SAIGON (AP) — North Vietnamese gunners unleashed new rocket barrages against U.S. bases along the demilitarized zone tonight after three earlier attacks in the northern quarter that killed 30 Americans and wounded another 50.

Most of the casualties were inflicted by a lone 100-pound rocket that bored through a heavily fortified bunker crowded with GIs in what field officers called, "a fluke shot, one in a million."

The rocket, carrying a delayed fuse, ripped through six feet of protective cover into the bunker, which was being used as a club at a base called Charlie 2, four miles south of the demilitarized zone.

A number of men had gathered in the bunker to drink beer and soft drinks, and other soldiers who had been eating at a nearby mess hall jammed in for refuge after the attack began at dusk Friday. Charles 2 came under mortar attack today but there were no further casualties.

"We all raced for the bunker," recalled Pfc. Steve Newton, of Havesville, Ky., who said he was standing in line to eat when the first two rockets came in. "I was standing by the door when the rocket came through the roof of the bunker. I saw blinding light and heard a ringing sensation," Newton said.

The force of the blast tossed him out the door. He was shaken but unharmed.

The U.S. death toll Friday was the highest for a single day in nearly two months and exceeded American battlefield fatalities for all of last week when the U.S. Command said 24 Americans were killed.

Up to 15 Soviet-made 122mm rockets hit Charlie 2 as many of the men were eating. After the first few rounds, they dashed from the mess hall into the club bunker.

Activist Served Subpoena In Alleged Bomb Conspiracy

NEW HAVEN (AP) — Stewart E. Albert, an antiwar activist and self-described friend of Lee Harvey Oswald, was served a subpoena Friday before a federal grand jury in New York City next Thursday to answer a subpoena he thinks had anything to do with the bombing of the U.S. Capitol.

"I intend not to do anything," he said. "I'm certainly guilty of nothing."

A federal source in New York City said a grand jury there wants to ask Albert about an alleged plot to bomb New York City banks.

The subpoena is signed by Walter North Seymour Jr., U.S. Attorney for the Southern District of New York.

It says the grand jury wants to question Albert in connection with an inquiry into alleged violations involving damage to her to "describe for the grand jury a conversation on March 1, 1971, at 2228 M St. N.W., Washington, D.C., in which Stewart Albert made the remark in legal possession of firearms."

Albert, 31, was served with the subpoena here Friday by an FBI agent as Albert and others waited in a Superior Court building for a verdict in the trial of Black Panthers Bobby Seale and Ericka Huggins.

Albert was across the street to the New Haven Green, Albert has been in New Haven along with antiwar movement.

On Common Market Domestic Opposition Awaits French, British Leaders

BY ARTHUR GAVSHON Associated Press Writer PARIS (AP) — The leaders of France and Britain face some fierce opposition at home as they harden their agreement paving the way for British entry into the European Common Market.

But after demonstrating solid friendship in their two-day summit parley, President Georges Pompidou and Prime Minister Edward Heath were reported confident today that the belated domestic criticism of their pledge to work together in Britain's Parliament seemed the most likely place for a battle over the understanding.

Reached between the two leaders that included removal of the long-standing French veto against British entry into the Common Market.

Among Britain's ruling Conservative and opposition Labor parties there are scores of lawmakers sworn to block the country's entry into the European Economic Community.

They reason joining the market would cost the nation a lot more than it would earn. And if the findings of pollsters are accurate, the weight of popular opinion also seems to be against membership.

Gallup poll this week reported only 23 per cent of those questioned wanted Britain to join the market, while 59 per cent were opposed and 18 per cent undecided. Louis Harris recorded 62 per cent against, 17 per cent for and 20 per cent with no opinion.

Opponents also may question Heath's promise to discuss "a European spirit" Pompidou's demand that the British pound be pegged to the dollar.

Convicted Slayer of Two Escapes in Rhode Island

NEWPORT, R. I. (AP) — A judge said today that a man who had been convicted of slaying two men in a Rhode Island courtroom had escaped from a nearby jail.

The judge said Lewis did not aim the gun at him but "he could have."

"I yelled at him 'Lewis' and he turned around and looked at me and kept running out of sight through a nearby service station."

The fugitive, Robert O. Lewis, 29, formerly of Portsmouth, Conn., was the subject of an intensive search. State troopers armed with shotguns blocked all bridges leading from Aquidneck Island, on which Newport is situated.

Superior Court Judge Arthur A. Carvelias, who presided at Lewis' trial and was hearing a motion for a new trial, said he was "infuriated" that the sheriff's department in this county, "permitted Robert Lewis to escape."

Sheriff John H. McGann of Newport County related that while they were sitting on the Lewis trial, "Lewis was convicted by a jury in the slaying of Anthony J. Rocco, 26, formerly of Fall River, Mass., and Duane L. Blake, 25, of Brockton, Mass. Their bodies were found in Tiverton Aug. 1, 1969."

The escape occurred about 1 1/2 hours after Lewis was taken to a cell and after he was locked up. McGann replied vigorously to Lewis' question. "To say that the sheriff's department allowed him to escape or obtain the gun is preposterous and ridiculous," he said. "Every man has done everything he possibly can." Considering the fact the prisoner had to be taken to a public toilet because there are none in the cellblock at the time of the escape, McGann said he was "very reasonable" in his opinion.

Coronary Attack Claims Former U.S. Sen. Dodd

OLD LYME, Conn. (AP)—Former Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn., whose 1967 campaign for the Senate for alleged misuse of campaign funds led to his political downfall, died Monday of a heart attack.

Dodd, who turned 64 last Wednesday, was "enjoying a quiet evening at his home" when he collapsed, according to his daughter, Mrs. Martha Bonzano. "He died instantly," she added. She said there had been no indication he was in ill health. She had suffered a heart attack in June, 1970.

Joseph Barabare, press aide for Dodd during his last term in the Senate, said, however, Dodd had told him in a serious moment a week ago: "I'm not going to live very long."

Barabare said Dodd gave no reason for his statement and the subject was dropped.

Dodd planned to re-register with the Democratic party this week but had no definite plans of holding public office again, said Barabare.

Dodd, first elected to the Senate in 1964 after serving two terms in the House of Representatives, was censured by the Senate in 1967 for allegedly using at least \$116,000 in campaign funds for personal purposes.

He staunchly maintained he had done nothing wrong, and he noted that he never charged with any criminal wrongdoing.

He decided against seeking the Democratic nomination for re-election last year and ran as an independent in the general election, placing third behind Republican Lowell P. Weicker Jr. and Democrat Gov. Thomas J. Meskall urged Connecticut residents to honor Dodd next Sunday.

Quake Toll: 812 Dead In Turkey

ISTANBUL (AP)—New tremors today panicked the desolate survivors in eastern Turkey who the country's second quake this month. The body count rose to 812 around Sinop as troops and volunteers dug in the ruins, but no casualties were attributed to the after-shocks today.

Mobile hospitals, soup kitchens and other emergency aid centers cared for the injured and homeless in the town, 80 per cent of which was destroyed in Saturday's quake.

Some survivors were still without tents. Provincial officials reported by radio-telephone, however, that food and water were adequate thanks to relief efforts by the army and neighboring towns.

Half the death toll was in villages scattered over the counties of 460 miles east of Ankara. Some outlying villages had still not been contacted.

Premier Nihat Erim termed the disaster area Sunday and said all that could be done was being done.

He praised the work of volunteers and the assistance given by local army command units and provincial governors.

Survivors told harrowing stories of entire families trapped in the ruins. The quake struck as many residents were preparing for bed. Failure of electricity supplies and rain hampered rescue work.
