## Jury Can't Reach Verdict on Seale; Told: Try Again

**NEW HAVEN (AP)**—The jury in the Bobby Seale-Erica Huggins case told the judge twice Monday it could not reach a verdict. Judge Harold M. Mulvey told the jurors to try again.

The jury first returned for deliberations with a note saying, "second-degree murder and admitted firing the first shot into a verdict on all the charges against both defendants." Huggins warned a group he was against using his car when the jury returned. Mulvey ordered the jury back to the deliberating room to clarify the original note, loud shouting could be heard from the jury room. Mulvey ordered the courtroom cleared of spectators and newsmen.

The deliberations came in the sixth day of the deliberations, just after the jury heard a 30-minute re-examination testimony given by Warren Kimbro, an important prosecution witness against Mrs. Huggins.

## Yugoslav Jet Crash Claims 812 Dead

**RIJEKA, Yugoslavia (AP)**—A two-week Adriatic holiday ended before it started Sunday night in death for 72 British tourists aboard a Yugoslav charter jetliner that crashed and burned as it was landing at Rijeka airport.

The Yugoslav family of three also was killed, the organizers of the tour said, but the Yugoslav tour director and the four Yugoslav crew members escaped. The crew members were slightly injured.

It was the worst air disaster in Yugoslavia since September, 1966, when a British charter plane crashed near Ljubljana, killing 96 holidaying Britons.

The plane Sunday was a four-engine Tupolev Tu-134, built in the Soviet Union.

## Coronary Attack Claims Former U.S. Sen. Dodd

**OLD LYME, Conn. (AP)**—Former Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn., whose 1967 coronary attack was attributed to alleged misuse of campaign funds led to his political downfall, died Monday of a heart attack.

Dodd, who turned 64 last Wednesday, was "enjoying a quiet evening at home" when he collapsed, according to his daughter, Mrs. Martha Bonaman. "He died instantly," she added. She said there had been no indication he was in ill health. She had suffered a heart attack in June, 1970.

Joseph Barabare, press aide for Dodd during his last term in the Senate, said, however, Dodd had told him in a serious moment a week ago: "I'm not going to live very long."

Barabare said Dodd gave no reason for his statement and the subject was dropped.

Dodd planned to re-register with the Democratic party this week but had no definite plans of holding public office again, said Barabare.

Dodd, first elected to the Senate in 1958 after serving two terms in the House of Representatives, was censured by the Senate in 1967 for allegedly using at least \$116,000 in campaign funds for personal purposes.

He staunchly maintained he had done nothing wrong, and he noted that he had never charged with any criminal wrongdoing.

He decided against seeking the Democratic nomination for re-election last year and ran as an independent in the general election, placing third behind Republican Lowell P. Weicker and Democrat Joseph P. Mooney.

The independent candidate, he said, had given the voters of Connecticut an opportunity to decide his guilt or innocence on a "day of public mourning and prayer."

Dodd said Sunday would be a "day of public mourning and prayer" for his family and the people of Connecticut.

Dodd was a determined and tenacious protector of his constituents, a man proud of his patriotism. He was a direct man, characterized by an uncompromising devotion and dedication to his family, his state and his country," he said.

Former governor John Dempsey said: "His long, distinguished public career was marked by his great concern for America and her people. He devoted his life to the cause of justice and freedom and championed the fight for law and order."

Democratic State Chairman John M. Bailey said: "The nation's history is enriched by the conduct of a man who was a true patriot and a true leader."

In 1970, Dodd became the first Democrat to be elected to the office of governor of Connecticut.

## Top Court To Hear Appeal On Amish Children, Schools

**WASHINGTON (AP)**—The Supreme Court agreed today to hear an appeal by Wisconsin parents seeking to compel Amish children to attend public schools up to the age of 16.

The appeal is from a decision by the Wisconsin supreme court that the state could not require the school attendance.

The case will be heard next week in other actions today, the court said.

## Quake Toll: 812 Dead In Turkey

**ISTANBUL (AP)**—New tremors today panicked the desolate survivors in eastern Turkey of the country's second quake this month. The body count rose to 812 around Sinop as troops and volunteers dug in the ruins, but no casualties were attributed to the after-shocks today.

Mobile hospitals, soup kitchens and other emergency aid centers cared for the injured and homeless in the town, 80 per cent of which was destroyed in Saturday's quake.

Some survivors were still without tents. Provincial officials reported by radio-telephone, however, that food and water were adequate thanks to relief efforts by the army and neighboring towns.

Half the death toll was in villages scattered over the counties of 460 miles east of Ankara. Some outlying villages had still not been contacted.

Premier Nihat Erim termed the disaster area Sunday and said all that could be done was being done.

He praised the work of volunteers and the assistance given by local army command units and provincial governors.

Survivors told harrowing stories of entire families trapped in the ruins. The quake struck as many residents were preparing for bed. Failure of electricity supplies and rain hampered rescue work.

## Fuel Tanks At U.S. Base Hit by foe

**SAIGON (AP)**—Half a dozen Viet Cong sappers slipped into the U.S. Army's Big Cam Ranh bay base Sunday night and blew up six tanks containing 1 1/2 million gallons of fuel, military spokesmen announced.

Field reports said two Americans were injured.

Six hours after the explosion, enemy gunners fired 30 mortars into the support command base at the bay 190 miles northeast of Saigon. A communiqué said the mortars caused no casualties or damage.

U.S. officers at Cam Ranh bay said the sappers planted satchel charges on the fuel tanks and the satchels set off a huge fire that was still burning 15 hours later. The officers said the sappers were seen apparently escaped.

A spokesman, Maj. Richard Gardner, said the aviation fuel destroyed was enough to keep 800 helicopters flying for 24 hours.

## Kidnaped Israeli Consul Found Slain in Istanbul

**ISTANBUL, Turkey (AP)**—Police hunting the killers of Israeli Consul-General Ephraim Eilrom concentrated their search today on a young married couple and seven young men.

Police sources said the couple rented the apartment in the fashionable residential district where Eilrom's body was found Sunday during a house-to-house search by 20,000 police and troops.

The couple was identified as Neomi and Itay Demir, both university students in their early 20's. The seven other men named as suspects also were students.

Two of the men, Ertugrul Kurkus and Yusuf Kupeli, are an army doctor estimated that he was killed between 5 and 7 p.m. Saturday, giving the murderers plenty of time to escape before the start at midnight of a 15-hour curfew was considering an extension of martial law in several provinces. Martini has apparently headed the search since they had arrested three men "in connection with the kidnaping" but gave no indication of what part they might have played.

A Turkish Air Force plane took Elron's body and his widow back to Israel Sunday. Their only son was killed in a plane crash last year.

TEL AVIV (AP) — Ephraim Elron, the Israeli consul-general in Istanbul killed by Turkish terrorists, was buried today in an emotional ceremony attended by Israeli leaders and the diplomatic corps.

A police honor guard fired three salvoes into the air and black-uniformed policemen carried the coffin to the grave in tribute to the 27 years Elron had served as an Israeli police officer.

Foreign Minister Abba Eban, speaking at the graveside in an Israeli military cemetery, declared that the members of the Turkish Peoples Liberation Army which kidnaped Elron, "stain the word (liberation) each time they utter it."

### Kidnapers Keep Silence In Argentina

ROBARIQ, Argentina (AP) — Twenty-four hours after the abduction of the British consul in Buenos Aires, Argentine authorities were today without word of the intentions of the leftist terrorist group which carried out the first political kidnaping in Argentina in 12 months.

ion and flown by Yugoslavia's Avionex line. It had flown a route from London to Paris to Rome to Athens to Belgrade.

At the airport, the plane was being refueled by a Yugoslav crew. Witnesses said the plane landed and taxied about 200 yards. Then the left wing broke off and the plane slowed to a stop, flipped over and caught fire. A series of explosions followed.

Authorities said the passengers were held in their seats by their seat belts and burned to death, but the crew escaped because the control cabin broke off and did not burn.

The only surviving passenger, Rajko Sarajic of the Yugoslav agency, said when he hit the plane breaking up, he unbuttoned his safety belt and ran toward a crack in the tail, calling for help.

Meanwhile, the plane was in flames and the passengers began to panic. A man shouted that everyone should be calm. The survivors continued, and at once the passengers fell silent. But apparently no one followed Sarajic, who got out through the break in the fuselage.

The Yugoslav passengers killed were professor at Zagreb university, his wife and 5-year-old daughter. They got aboard because a British family of three canceled their passage at the last minute.

Ten British children were among those killed.

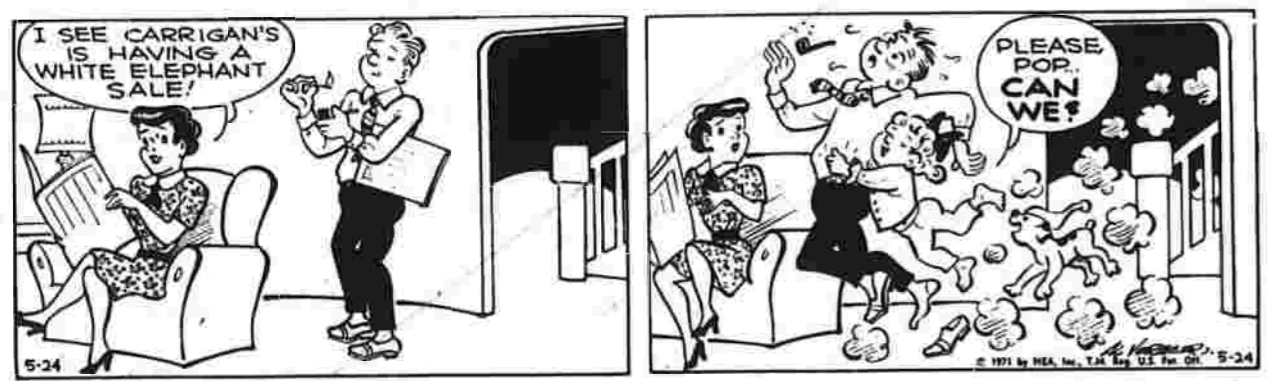
