

Americans Back Programs For Children Around Globe

NEW YORK (AP) — Thousands of Americans donate millions of tax-deductible dollars every year to "adopt" children in developing countries around the world.

Last year, \$31.7 million was collected for child sponsorship programs operated by the three major private, voluntary agencies: Save the Children Federation, Foster Parents Plan and the Christian Children's Fund.

This kind of personal financial assistance, often including exchange of letters and photographs with the "adopted" child, has had phenomenal success in America, say voluntary agency officials.

"Historically the people in this country feel a strong need for taking care of the underprivileged in the world," said Stuart Gray, technical information editor for the American Council of Voluntary Agencies for Foreign Children, which began as a national organization in 1947, building a national base and was a pioneer in the field before the advisory committee of the American Council of Voluntary Agencies for Foreign Children was formed in 1954.

Officials of the various agencies say thousands of individual families and group sponsors appear to be content with the basic goals of the program.

Some sponsors arrange visits with their "children" on overseas vacations or business trips.

Letters from the children to their sponsors sometimes read like the ones to a foster mother in Briarcliffe Manor, N. Y., when the child "graduated" from the aid program.

The child wrote: "I will keep in my mind and heart what I learned in your letters. I will try to do my best with a home that I shall become a real fine capable person with whom I should be pleased. I will try to do things well lest your love and support for me should go in vain or with little fruit."

Save the Children Federation, based in Norwalk, Conn., was founded in 1919 and is the oldest of the agencies. The nonsectarian organization offers \$15-a-month, self-help sponsorships in South Vietnam, Korea, Greece, Latin America, Africa, Europe and the Middle East. It also provides sponsorships of American Indians and children of Appalachia.

Foster Parents Plan, a nonsectarian agency founded in 1937, has \$15-a-month, family assistance sponsorships in South America, Korea, Indonesia, the Philippines and South Vietnam. Christian Children's Fund, based in Richmond, Va., was founded in 1906. The international missionary organization offers \$15-a-month sponsorships in 50 countries, primarily for orphans.

A fourth, sponsorship agency, Children, Incorporated, is also based in Richmond. It was formed in 1964 by Jeanne Clarke Wood, daughter of the founder of Christian Children's Fund, and offers \$12-a-month self-help sponsorships in 17 countries and the United States.

Dozens of other private, voluntary organizations are also involved in various child-welfare programs in developing countries.

"Voluntary agencies are primarily concerned with services that directly reach people where they live," said Joseph E. Klein, deputy director of the U.S. State Department's Advisory Committee on Voluntary Foreign Aid.

"The agencies can't possibly take care of all the people in need," she said, "but, with their resources, they try to demonstrate how living conditions can be improved through an individual's own efforts."

Eighty-two U.S. voluntary agencies working in 220 countries are registered with the advisory committee, part of the Agency for International Development.

Registration carries benefits such as government grants of agricultural products, government payment for overseas shipments, and use of excess government property.

In addition, registration helps authenticate an agency for prospective sponsors who often query the advisory committee.

Each agency must have an active board of directors, a continuing overseas program, purposes that are not political or propagandizing, records indicating financial stability and efficiency, and proof, by incorporation, that contributions are tax deductible.

The three major child sponsorship agencies are registered with the AID advisory committee and audits are performed by such firms as Price Waterhouse & Co.

Bon Vivant Plant Missed By FDA Checks

WASHINGTON (AP) — A plant where vichyssoise was packed had not been inspected for sanitation by the Food and Drug Administration since May 1967, four years before a Westchester, N.Y., man eating the soup died of botulism poisoning.

Federal records also show a Department of Agriculture inspector had watched the manufacturing process at the Bon Vivant plant in New Jersey the day before the soup was packed.

USDA inspectors were not responsible for the meat and poultry canning.

The federal government ordered a recall of all Bon Vivant vichyssoise in 1970 and the plant after the New York man died June 20.

The New Jersey Department of Health, which has a cooperative agreement with the FDA for food manufacturers, had not inspected Bon Vivant since October 1966. An agency spokesman blamed manpower short-

Uncertainty In Hanoi

WASHINGTON — Unprecedented criticism of Communist China by the North Vietnamese, intense though indirect, reveals not only how worried Hanoi is about possible U.S.-Chinese detente but also how vigorously it will resist any dovish influence from Peking.

The lead editorial in Monday's issue of Nhan Dan, the top North Vietnamese daily, contended that the Democratic Administration and to their party unity than to the Republican. Secondly, it can argue that the Democratic Administration is listed as advocate papers, and that taken out of context they give a misleading impression of the authors' real positions. Only if the Hanoi politburo members were deeply disturbed by the implications of the stunning July 15 announcement by President Nixon and his advisers that they were ready to publish a joint communiqué with Peking would they have dared chiding their big brothers to the north. But their daring shows that a mere wave of the finger from Peking will not turn the lions of Hanoi into pussycats.

For three days after the announcement of July 15, Hanoi was silent. The North Vietnamese were not told the first word about what was happening until the public insisted on taking part.

This mood is measured in the number of documents which are stamped "top secret," "secret," or "confidential." In the Pentagon there are approximately 31,000 of them. In the State Department, they could buy a smaller country has ended for good.

If United States policy makers could have realized and believed this, way back when the post-war independence movement in Vietnam was exploring the possibility of imitating Yugoslavia, and looking to the United States for at least a benign neutrality, there might have been peace in Indo-China, all this time.

Instead American policy seems to have decided that Hanoi was inevitably a menacing extension of the Chinese-Russian arm, and that, consequently, South Vietnam, whether it itself had any particular will in the matter or not, had to play the role of the small country which would take our help and provide the spot for us to "halt Communism."

There might have been peace all this time in Indo-China if the big powers could have kept out of playing their own games in Indo-China. Now, however, ever displacing it may be to Hanoi, there is at least one thing the big powers do have to contribute to any future peace in the region. They have to agree in a joint guarantee that no small nation—Hanoi papers please copy—shall take over the role of bully.

'Longest Trip'

CAMBRIDGE, Mass.—Among all the other angles, the Nixon trip to Peking needs to be viewed historically from the Chinese end. Heads of state coming there have been an old Chinese custom.

Peking has been a capital city for roughly a thousand years, and foreign potentates or their envoys have turned up there practically every year as regularly as the winter solstice or the full moon. They have come for a great variety of purposes, usually to present tribute in order to profit from trade, some to get their legitimacy confirmed, others to ask for military help and still others to demand payoffs to keep them quiet.

Some chiefs of state have come unwillingly, like the King of Malacca in the early fourteenth century, and some as conquerors like Genghis Khan in 1261 and in nearly every case the trip to Peking has been a test of obedience to the emperor with a special favor, a certain mystique. Mr. Nixon and his staff will be trading well-worn paths without knowing it.

No one will ask him to perform the three kneelings and nine prostrations of the Kowtow, which Lord Macartney refused to perform in 1793 (although Mr. Nixon unlike Macartney has the firm figure suited to it). The Madai revolution has tried to wipe out the ancient unmodern customs.

Nevertheless, Sincereism, the proud consciousness of China's vast self-sufficient magnificence, is not so easily ousted, and part of the charm of going there still lies in the fact that Peking is the center of a different world not concerned about the Dow Jones average, the homine, the World Series, or the next election.

No one can stay for long without feeling re-oriented—or rather, Oriented—called upon to respond to a difference of the globe and accept the values of a different (for example, less individualistic) way of life. Mr. Nixon's journey for Peace from Washington to Peking is a very rational voyage, one given its premises, very experienced in the workings of human nature, addicted to self-discipline and ready to subordinate the short-term to the long—just the attitude needed for manipulating tribal chieftains to have to show quiet restraints to their people back home.

Current realities will of course have their impact, and Mr. Nixon's journey for Peace from Washington to Peking no doubt will succeed roughly in proportion as the rest of our troops in Vietnam have already made their own journey for peace from Saigon to San Francisco.

Nevertheless, revolutionary China lives in the shadow of history just as much as we do. If our press and courts have to censor the Nixon trip, it is equally certain that the Nixon trip will be equally censored in China. The Nixon trip to Peking has been a test of obedience to the emperor with a special favor, a certain mystique. Mr. Nixon and his staff will be trading well-worn paths without knowing it.

Aerial Survey Shows Losses By Gypsy Moth

NEW HAVEN (AP) — An aerial survey conducted by the Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station here shows that some 640,000 acres of land in the state are infested with gypsy moth and elm sawspawms.

In some areas the northern part of Killingworth and Guilford counties, the gypsy moth is at or more. But in other areas, particularly near the Massachusetts line, there was little damage.

The total is far more than last year's, which was a federal government survey reported some 300,000 acres of woodland "noticeably defoliated."

The state figures, moreover, record only those areas with 15 per cent defoliation or more. The federal survey last year counted destruction of 10 per cent or more as "noticeable" defoliation.

The state figures were released Tuesday morning by state entomologist John Anderson, who said the estimates are as accurate as possible. If anything, he said they are an understatement of the damage.

"In many of the areas, we can't go ground to check the estimates made by aerial survey," he said.

He also said that areas of old growth forest in which spraying took place have been surveyed in detail, and that the survey was approved by the state legislature.

No-Fault Deals Lawyers Pinch in the Pocketbook

BOSTON (AP) - Lawyers fact January 1, applies only to compulsory bodily injury insurance, but the legislature this year is expected to extend the concept to property damage coverage.

Economy Surging In Saudi Arabia

JEDDAH, Saudi Arabia (AP) — Fueled by a whopping increase in oil revenues, the Saudi Arabian economy is surging ahead.

Estimated increases in production and higher oil prices are likely to result in revenues of at least \$1.7 billion this year, compared to \$1.2 in 1970, knowledgeable sources estimate.

Thus the government is expected to have \$500 million more in oil income this year.

"Although we have all this extra money, we are not going to blow it," said an official informed on government financial planning. "We are going to spend it very carefully indeed."

Though heavy defense expenditures are reportedly planned, the government aims to insure that this will not slow down growth.

The budget for the Saudi fiscal year, which begins in August, is now being prepared.

The various ministries have asked for allocations totaling \$2.6 billion compared to allocations of \$1.4 billion in the present financial year.

"The Finance Ministry is looking closely at every project and every request," said one official. "There will be an easing of the post squeeze and substantially more spending, but the government is also keen on improving revenues."

Oil brings in about 80 per cent of government income.

This year the government is expected to benefit from an increase in production as well as the higher prices negotiated last February.

In 1970, oil production averaged a record 3.8 million barrels a day. Most of the oil—5½ million barrels a day—is produced by the U.S.-owned Arabi-American Oil Co., Aramco.

Judging by performance in the first quarter of this year, sources say, production by Aramco and other companies in 1971 may average 4.3 million barrels a day.

The relative slowdown in the economy in the past two years was due to high defense and security expenditures plus security payments to help Egypt and Jordan. Saudi Arabia has been paying the two countries \$150 million a year since the 1967 war with Israel.

Initial government spending will probably be on such pump-priming activities as municipal works, expansion of the road, telephone and electric power networks and an improved water distribution system.

This is expected to result in a business upswing.

Saudi Arabia imports everything from shoes to equipment for water desalting plants, plus most of its food requirements. The United States is still leading as the country's chief source of imports but there is growing competition from Britain, France, other European countries and Japan.

Provided that the Middle East does not go to war again, most knowledgeable sources here agree that Saudi Arabia's long-term economic prospects are good. Government planners are now using as a guide a five-year plan prepared with the help of the Stanford Research Institute.



Bike Tour Offered By Amsterdam

By JOYCE VAN NIEBR

AMSTERDAM, Netherlands (AP) — The city is offering a new type of tour this year—by bicycle.

For \$5 a tourist can join a group of no more than 15 under the leadership of an attractive guide in a yellow costume.

The package includes insurance, use of a bright yellow bicycle, lots of food, drinks and souvenirs.

The tour begins at mid-morning at De Drie Ploechies tavern near the royal palace on the Dam. Participants get a brandy while being fitted to their bikes.

Everyone receives a yellow bike bag to be slung over a shoulder. This "survival kit" is one of the souvenirs. It contains maps, tourist material including the paperback book, "Surprising Amsterdam," a miniature of gin or a liqueur, moist paper towels, sugar cubes for energy, plus pipe tobacco for men and mints for women.

From a small cart attached to their bikes the leaders provide yellow stickers and hats in case the weather turns bad. The cart also holds a big bottle of gin and glasses which may be used to while away the time during any traffic jams. The cart serves as a repository for jackets, handbags and cameras.

The first stop is the Tobacco Museum where visitors learn a lot about the history of smoking and each gets an old-fashioned clay pipe.

Riding along canal streets lined with 16th century houses, the next stop is for a wine, cheese and potato lunch just off the Leidseplein. Later, the 17th century almshouse, the Begijnhof, has a peaceful courtyard offering repose. It is a popular place for the Dutch picture lunch hour. Protestant and Catholic churches are open for visitors.

The path then leads through the oldest part of town to the 15th century Weeping Tower where Henry Hudson set sail for the New World. The building is being reconstructed into a tavern, cafe and diamond museum. It's called the Weeping Tower since the wives of Dutch sailors are supposed to have weaved goodby there as the old merchant traders sailed for the East Indies.

The route then passes Europe's most modern post office and Amsterdam's central station. Next stop is a bargaining stand. Here the towels are useful.

The last stop, about 3:30, is at the Bols Pavement on the Rosenkrantz. At this point, bicycles are exchanged for cocktails and a final souvenir. That is a passport for good sportsmanship containing an instant picture of the participant together with the tour leader.

Golden Gate Bridge May Get Barrier

SAN FRANCISCO — Golden Gate Bridge officials, faced with a sharp increase in suicides from the span, are planning to install a new 8-foot barrier they hope will prevent plunges into San Francisco Bay.

Bridge directors recently gave preliminary approval to the barrier after hearing the Golden Gate described as a "loaded gun," too readily available to persons contemplating suicide in a city long noted for its high suicide rate.

Since 1927, the year the bridge opened, 422 persons were reported to have committed suicide from the bridge, with another 128 listed as possible suicides, according to California Highway Patrol records.

Some 1,168 were reported as having been stopped either during an outright or apparent attempt to jump. Four are reported as having survived the 230-foot leap into bay waters.

Suicide prevention authorities here have become concerned with what they call a "dramatic" recent increase in the number of suicides and attempts from the bridge.

Dr. Jerome A. Motto, an associate professor of psychiatry at the University of California Medical Center, notes that the number of known bridge deaths has increased steadily from six in 1927 to 36 in 1970, a year in which there were also 97 reported attempts.

This increase, he observes, was substantially greater than the rate of increase in jumping deaths throughout the city during the same period.

Dr. Motto, as others, believes the Golden Gate has a peculiar appeal to the impulsive and that a preventive barrier is long overdue.

"For people who are feeling down, the kind of people who react to external influences, the bridge is like a loaded gun," he says. "They can't resist the temptation. The bridge is there 24 hours a day and has a certain seductive appeal. It's clean and they won't hurt anyone or make a mess."

BASKETBALL SCORES High Prices Paid In Yearlings Sale

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — Thoroughbred trainer Henry Forrest concluded his first venture into the buying business Tuesday by running his total to \$690,000 for six yearlings at Keeneland's Summer Sale.

Forrest, who's saddled 1966 Kentucky Derby winner Kauai King, completed the coup when he bid \$200,000 the second highest price ever paid at Keeneland for a yearling filly, for a daughter of Herbage being sold by Mrs. George G. Prosser of Akron, Ohio.

Forrest's total outlay topped the \$675,000 spent last year by Frank McMahon, whose purchases included a \$150,000 colt, and exceeded in Keeneland history only by the \$900,000 paid last year by the late Charles Engelhard.

His final purchase of the two-year-old filly, named "Lilie F. Webb of Paris, Ky.," paid \$131,000 during the afternoon session for a chestnut filly out of the Danamus-Oak Cluster, of Danamus-Oak Stud, of Lexington, Ky., and the Big Sink Farm of Lexington.

Forrest earlier had spent \$164,600.

Cromwell's Swim Ends With Sharks

DOVER, England (AP) — Richard Cromwell, 15-year-old American boy, battled tides and the threat of 16-foot sharks for more than 16 hours in a swim to become the youngest person ever to swim the English Channel—and was forced to give up early Wednesday when only a mile from shore.

Cromwell's father and his 15-year-old brother William were in the small launch that accompanied him on the crossing. William hopes to make the swim Thursday.

During Richard's crossing, British coastguards warned that three sharks between 10 and 16 feet long had been sighted in the channel a few miles east of the swimmer's course.

Ruffner Inks Condors Pact For One Year

PITTSBURGH (AP) — The Pittsburgh Condors of the American Basketball Association Tuesday announced the signing of Paul Ruffner of the Chicago Bulls. His one-year contract is worth a reported \$40,000.

Ruffner said he still had a year remaining on a two-year contract with the NBA club, and said he signed a one-year contract with Pittsburgh. However, that conflicted with a report from a source who asked Ruffner to remain anonymous. Ruffner signed a two-year contract for \$90,000.

The source said the Bulls will pay the difference in the contract the 6-foot-11 center had with them and the one he signed with Pittsburgh, amounting to about \$4,000 this year.

The move, technically, is a raid by the Condors on the NBA, a violation of merger agreements between the two leagues.

However, the Bulls have given their approval to the signing. It was learned, as partial compensation for the signing of Howard Porter.

It was Porter, the Villanova star named the Most Valuable Player in the 1971 NCAA tournament, who signed a contract with the Condors through the ABA before he was graduated from Villanova.

However, he chose to ignore that contract and signed one with the Bulls. The Condors subsequently filed suit in a New York court and showed proof of their contract with Porter before reaching settlement with the Bulls.

Trophy Collection — SALEM, Mass. (AP) — Tony Volpone, the Massachusetts Open golf champion, has added the New England PGA championship to his trophies.
