**FORBIDEN PASS VITAL IN MANY SITUATIONS**

You've probably heard of the forcing pass in very high-level bidding situations. You have voluntarily bid a spade, and your partner passes a sacrifice bid around to you so that you have the choice between doubling and bidding on. In tournament play you often have the same kind of choice at the partner's level. Edgar Kaplan discusses the problem in his fine book "Duplicate Bridge," from which today's hand is taken. North dealer.

Answer: Bid 3-N7. Since you have 10 points in high cards, you know that the combined count is 26 to 28 points, enough for game but not nearly enough for a slam. There should be a much easier play for nine tricks at notrump than for 11 tricks at 3-N7.

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Tax Collections At 98.6% Mark

Tax collections in the 1970-71 fiscal year ended at 98.6 per cent, according to a report issued by Ernest R. Machell, town collector of revenue. Property tax collections totaled \$11,335,649. The total General Fund was 98.6 per cent at \$177,360 with \$273,170.38 outstanding. Last year property tax collections finished at 98.3 per cent with a total of \$11,388,252. The General Fund last year finished much lower than this year with only 78.8 per cent in a total of \$15,887,624.

Tax Collections

About 97.4 per cent of last year's sewer charges were collected before June 30. This totals \$244,000. Sewer charge collections finished at 92.9 per cent with \$38,061 in. Fire tax collections ended at 94.8 per cent, a total of \$862,044. Taxes collected in the Special Downtown Taxing District totaled \$268,583, about 78.7 per cent of the sum anticipated.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate today refused for a second time to curb debate on a corporate rescue bill designed to save financially ailing Lockheed Aircraft Corp. The cloture vote was 59 to 39 or 1 short of the needed two-thirds.

Tax Probe Paying Off In State

HARTFORD (AP)—State investigators are collecting \$100,000 a week in unpaid capital gains taxes and penalties by going through the federal income tax returns of Connecticut residents. The checking has been going on for about two years and has already generated \$400,000 for the state and should eventually bring "millions of dollars" to the Connecticut treasury, State Tax Commissioner F. George Brown said Tuesday.

Retarded Boy Found Alive On Mountain

CASPER, Wyo. (AP)—A mentally retarded, 8-year-old boy who eluded searchers for 10 days on a mountain peak was found alive today, tired but in reasonably good health. Five members of the Rocky Mountain Rescue Unit discovered the boy on the mountain at 8:30 a.m., about two miles southeast of the cabin where he was last seen. The boy was found in a cave, and his physical condition, but extremely exhausted. The boy had no memory of his disappearance and is described as hyperactive and epileptic.

House Panel Gets Report On Labor

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government's leading business indicators, which tend to forecast future movements in the economy, declined in June after seven consecutive monthly advances. The drop in the index of leading indicators pointed to a slackening of the economic expansion although a Commerce Department official played down the one-month decline. The department said the leading business indicator index fell by five-tenths of one per cent in June, with six of the eight indicators in the series showing unfavorable changes.

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Agents Crack Heroin Ring Supplying GIs in Vietnam

BANGKOK (AP)—Narcotics agents from Thailand, South Vietnam and the United States in their first combined operation have cracked a major heroin ring supplying American soldiers in Vietnam. They seized 97 pounds of pure heroin—the one of the largest hauls ever in Asia—and 680 pounds of heroin-laced opium. The caches were found in a warehouse in the northwestern South Saigon of \$4 million, originated in Burma and Laos and is now being sold to the Saigon police.

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
