

UNUSUAL HOLD-UP PLAY RAVES PLAYER'S BACON BY ALBYR SHEINWOLD

As an experienced player, you know all about refusing the first trick, especially at notrump, when you have only one winner in the enemy's long suit. If you are a regular reader of this column you even know about refusing the first trick when you have two winners in the suit.

Both sides vulnerable. Opening lead — Six of hearts. West opens the six of hearts, and East puts up the jack. South has his first lead at this trick. If South wins with the king of hearts and tries to develop a diamond trick, East takes the ace of diamonds and returns the nine of hearts.





Germany. The other day, the Switzerland Express jumped the tracks just south of Karlsruhe, killing 28 passengers and injuring 500.



Connecticut Yankee

One of the complaints about the Pennsylvania Legislature, which seems to have become a maledictory not unlike that which distinguishes the Connecticut General Assembly, is that the Pennsylvania House, with 203 members, is the largest legislative body in the country.

A decade ago the Connecticut House stood at 294 members. Before that, its membership had been stabilized, for a time, at 270.

After the one-man-one-vote reapportionment, the size of the Connecticut House was reduced to its present figure of 177, which was generally hailed as an improvement but still not enough reduction.

And there was a moment toward the end of this year's regular session, when the Legislative Committee on Governmental Reform, with great pride, that it stood near an agreement to reduce the size of the House down to something like 155 members.

If in actuality modern electronic voting devices make it possible for a House of 294 members to cast its vote as quickly as one of 30 members, it can be reasoned that the presence of more people in a House averages out to produce more debate on more legislation.

Further, the presence of a single Egyptian soldier on the east bank would set a precedent directly contrary to Israel's long-held demand: Total demilitarization of the east bank after Israeli withdrawal. Yet Egypt's President Anwar Sadat could never make so humiliating a deal and still survive at home.

The second stickiest issue is known here as the "timetables" — that is, how soon a partial Israeli withdrawal should be followed by a second-stage pull-back. Sadat demands total withdrawal in six months but he will accept something far less (so long as it commits Israel to a second-stage deadline).

But Israel envisages a long, drawn-out "process" that, as one policymaker told us, could take anywhere from 10 to 20 years. Would Sadat wait that long?

That, "That," we were told by the Israelis, "is his problem." Although these positions may be explicable in the light of Egyptian misadventure last summer, they do present Nixon's peace plan. More significant is the Israeli mood behind them, in 1968, when it withheld ammunition at a critical point in the independence war, in 1968, when it compelled Israel to evacuate the Sinai after the first Sinai seizure; and in 1967, when it failed on its pledge to keep the Strait of Tiran open.

At 7:48 a. m., Apollo 15 sped through a "twilight zone" where it escaped the influence of lunar gravity and fell into the sphere of earth gravity.

That was 204,138 miles from earth and 38,410 miles from the moon and the craft began celebrating.

The spacecraft concluded man's greatest lunar expedition Wednesday when they fired the Endeavour out of moon orbit on a near-perfect course that will carry them to the splashdown in the Pacific Ocean 285 miles north of Hawaii at 4:46 p. m. Saturday.

The cat lovers, headed by Philip Horton of the Animal Cruelty Reform League of Florida, say pigeons are the problem and that the cats are not considered a hobby sport against their return.

"I could see Biscayne Boulevard littered with the carcasses of those homeless cats." Before the first cat was executed, Horton appealed to the city and won a 30-day stay of execution.

"That," he says, "will give me time to complete the purchase of some property near Biscayne and take the cats down there. But I still say those are pigeon mites."

Meanwhile, the cats go about their business of catting from park patios and napping in the roostery sun. It's said they don't give a meow.

Economists Resort To Fanciful Terms

By JOHN CUNIFF

NEW YORK (AP)—In an effort to calm what is said to be a dull subject, or perhaps only to clarify it, economists have resorted to a dictionary of fanciful terms that often seem to say more than they really do.

Runaway or galloping inflation has never been precisely defined but the term is used again and again. And just what is a rolling recession? What is a soft-peak recession? What is a soggy or sluggish economy?

Two new terms now appear to be gaining popularity among those who must describe economic conditions for the most part to property and, one of the most curious of all, growth recession. Both appear to be contradictions.

Profitless property is what an increasing number of economists are complaining about. They maintain that even though their sales rise, they can't make profits because costs are rising faster.

Profitless property implies a great amount of activity without great progress, like a sailboat on a lake that can't get a water-fall. It means that the sales manager may be exulting about his figures while the treasurer considers hiding his from the president.

Some retailers continue to show higher sales, but the quality of those sales may not be as good as before, for example. Buying down has become common, even in big ticket items. And as Henry Ford II said, minorities mean minorities.

The consumer complaint, however, is that pay raises are exceeding productivity. If high wages are a bad thing, then it is in output per manhour both employer and employee benefit. If pay raises exceed productivity, it means that the boss gets slyper.

Many of the indicators point upward, but polls show that businessmen and consumers remain unconvinced.


