Justice Department To File Suit to Halt Pay Hikes in Texas

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The action against Texas Gov. Preston Smith's defiance of the 90-day freeze was ordered Friday by the Court of Living Council, headed by Attorney General John N. Mitchell, the state's predecessor in the Supreme Court. Justice Department officials said a suit naming Smith and other state officials would be filed in U.S. District Court in Austin next Tuesday or Wednesday.

Smith's office said the governor would file a motion with the federal government to "attend to a little business" but a spokesman added that Smith would not appear in any of the administration's court cases.

Rebel Radio Claims Insurgents Control Six Bolivian Provinces

La PAZ, Bolivia (AP)—The rebel radio claimed today that 10,000 armed workers were marching on La Paz to support the uprising against the leftist military government of President Juan Jose Torres.

The radio, broadcasting from the eastern city of Santa Cruz where the insurrection began Thursday, said the insurgents had military control of six of Bolivia's nine provinces. It warned government supporters that further resistance "will be useless."

The government radio countered that the rebels were only a few hundred men and that the government would defend its regime "unto the last drop of blood."

Torres appeared Friday night from the balcony of the presidential palace for popular support and high ranking military officers. He declared he would "deserve the mobilization of the Bolivian people for the defense of the country in the face of fascist invasion."

The president still had the support of Bolivia's best equipped military units, and the motorized regiment at Viacha, 16 miles from La Paz.

But the rebel radio said that the government radio and movement among the Bolivian army's 2nd Division in the western province of Oruro, bordering La Paz Province, joined the rebel forces. The division entered Oruro City Friday, the rebel radio said, and fired bookshelves at the provincial university.

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Viet Court Okays Two-Man Race For Presidency

SAIGON (AP)—The Supreme Court, reportedly under pressure from President Nguyen Van Thieu and the United States, cleared the way today for a two-man presidential race. It reinstated Vice President Nguyen Cao Ky on the Oct. 3 ballot to oppose Thieu.

But Ky deferred his decision whether to run, telling newsmen through his press office that he would announce his decision Sunday. He canceled a scheduled afternoon news conference today.

There was no immediate reaction from retired Gen. Duong Van "Big" Minh, who withdrew from the election Friday, leaving Thieu unopposed at that point and throwing the political situation into turmoil.

Minh in a meeting four hours before the Supreme Court decision that he would not run even if the court ruled in his favor.

Regardless of Ky's decision, and Thieu's names will appear on the ballot for the presidential race. "Candidates do not have the right to withdraw" after the appearance of a reason, said the court.

More than a score of the Thailand-based bombers unloaded some 400 tons of explosives on North Vietnamese positions below the demilitarized zone last week. The South Vietnamese reported five fresh shellings against South Vietnamese bases along the DMZ.

South Vietnamese military spokesman Lt. Col. Le Trung said the base was hit by two bombs and a third base was hit by one bomb.

He said there were no casualties among the well-trenched South Vietnamese.

The biggest shelling was an 80-round mortar barrage in the first of the two bombardments on the day's heaviest shelling in the South Vietnamese defense chain of hilltop outposts protecting northern front.

Ground fighting on the narrow front appeared to have slowed down, at least temporarily.

Only one skirmish was reported in the area.

U.S. Bombers Unload Tons Of Explosives

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Nixon and Emperor Hirohito Schedule Session in Alaska

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Richard M. Nixon and Emperor Hirohito of Japan are scheduled to meet in Alaska next week.

The meeting is expected to be the first time since World War II that the two leaders have met in person.

Nixon is expected to arrive in Anchorage, Alaska, on Sunday evening, Sept. 28, and will be accompanied by his wife, Pat Nixon and Empress Nagako.

This will be the first time a Japanese emperor has ever left his homeland and the first also as a means of demonstrating an American president's respect for the emperor's status.

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British 'Open' System Makes Education Fun Says Teacher

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These were the words used by Walter Kiar of North Rd. to describe the atmosphere of a British primary school he visited last month. A candidate for a Ph.D. in Education at the University of Connecticut, he was one of 100 educators who spent six weeks in Oxfordshire, England, this summer studying the English educational system under the guidance of Dr. Vincent Rogers, head of the elementary education department at the University of Connecticut.

Kiar said he feels the major difference between the English and American approach to education is the attitude toward the child. English schools, he says, are more "child-centered," while American institutions seem to be more curriculum-oriented. In the British system, the emphasis is on providing a stable, happy environment with the idea that academic success will follow naturally. Thus, less stress is placed on the child, and more on the teacher's role.

Another key difference he noted between the two philosophies is the role of the teacher. In England, he says, the teacher is not "out-of-control," but is instead elevated as the head of the class. He also notes that the word "class" is rarely used in England, as educators there more inclined to think in terms of individuals.

"One rarely sees a teacher even standing," Kiar said. "Teachers are usually found kneeling, or sitting with a child somewhere around the large room."

Teachers never lecture, he said, and text books are seldom used. Each child in a group is working on a different project, he explained, and the teacher moves around through the school day offering whatever assistance, advice or criticism he feels appropriate. Thus, the teacher is not seen as a purveyor of wisdom, but as a friend and willing helper to assist with problemsolving.

Parent contribution. The role of the parent in the school is also different in England, Kiar said, as parents are expected to actively participate in the school program. Education is considered a community project.

Unfortunately, Kiar states, there is considerable misunderstanding about the nature of the so-called "free" or "open" school, many people feeling it is a "wild" place where children do as they please. On the contrary, he says, adult guidance is a very visible part of the approach, the key being knowing at what point and to what extent assistance or prodding should be offered.

Palaces For Sale In Rio

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) — With a couple of millions, you can buy a palace in Rio de Janeiro.

Ambassadorial residences are being sold because within the next year all diplomats will be in Brasilia, this country's new capital.

The American building, amid 14 acres of parkland, has 60 rooms. It will be sold to the best bidder. Nobody knows whether it will bring \$2.5 million, as the General Accounting Office in Washington hoped.

City officials fear that speculators may buy the place, tear it down and build an apartment complex. Rio is short on open space, so the threat of losing a chunk of well kept greenery worries authorities.

Next door is the British ambassador's residence, more or less equal in size and surroundings. The British hint they may sell, too.

The Portuguese, who own a handsome residence on the other side of the American building, intend to turn the place into a museum of Portuguese culture. Brazil once belonged to Portugal.

The Argentinians, who own a smaller residence in a much smaller place but with an unobscured view of Sugar Loaf Mountain, say they may be forced to sell for economic reasons.

The Germans have a castle on Santa Theresa Hill, complete with a spiral tower, overlooking Guanabara Bay. Officially they haven't decided what to do with it.

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relationship by the unloveliness, and so it is no surprise at all to have it being charged, now, that the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals is, in actuality, guilty of cruelty to animals.

In New York City, this criticism centers around the Society's "peace" way of disposing of unclaimed and unadopted stray animals. The process consists of wheeling the animals into decompression tanks from which the air is exhausted, resulting in "peace" for the animals in about three minutes.

The critics without necessarily alleging that death itself might be considered a cruelty, suspect that there are occasions when the animals are crammed into the decompression chambers, and even worse, some instances when some of the smaller animals escape the peaceful death designed for them and survive the experience, only to have to go through it again. In addition, the critics have been collecting alleged instances in which employees of the Society have given the animals in their care something less than the loving touch.

What We Owe South Vietnam It is a little late in the day for the United States to begin to show any great sensitivity over the loss of democracy it has been defending in Vietnam.

As has become quite evident from the publication of the Pentagon papers, the idea that we might be intervening in South Vietnam for sentimental political reasons was something it was all right to consider. The price we are paying for the American people but was never close to the real reasons which were topmost in the minds of those braintrusts who, having their fling at running the world, were preaching the doctrine that a big nation which had power must use it, and the further doctrine that American power must be used to keep the peace.

The nature of the political regime in South Vietnam in itself was never important, except that we did value, on our policy-making levels, the right kind of win-win dressing if we could get it. We try to provide that window dressing we have, at different stages of our game in Vietnam, indulged in such diverse tactics as the violent overthrow of a Diem and a frantic effort to throw an atmosphere of legitimacy over the election of a Thieu.

Now we are particularly disturbed over what appears in the South Vietnamese window. What appears there now is a President Thieu running for re-election in a situation where it is indeed difficult to create any illusion of legitimacy or democracy. Indeed, if election principle were involved, the kind of election about to be held in South Vietnam is no different from the kind of election Communism holds in the countries it controls, so that if it were democratic principle we would now shrug our shoulders and just turn the country over to the Communists, as something already lost by our own purposes and standards.

But democracy in itself was never our reason for being in Vietnam. We went in for reasons of power politics, and primarily in what our brain-trusters conceived to be our own national (imperial) interest, not primarily in the interest of the people we told to ask us in to help them.

Going in, and going in for such reasons, we have ourselves involved the people of South Vietnam in more trouble than they might ever have encountered if we had left them alone.

We owe them something for having used them in our own national interest. The current suggestion that we now have a right to lose patience with them and punish them, in some way, because they haven't come up with the right kind of a win-win dressing election, doesn't do us very much credit.

The end of our mutual involvement should at least try to guarantee that we do not make the people of South Vietnam suffer for being what they are, and what they were when we went in. Their possible worthiness or unworthiness of the aid of this great pure democracy of ours has never been a real issue. If we ourselves have national honor, we will not allow ourselves to be false excuses for any let-happen-what-may kind of withdrawal.

The World Of Opposites There is hardly a sector left to which the reverse symbolism of our age does not apply. Peace means war, and non-violent resistance means overt prosecution, and law and order may mean building, and evil liberties can mean

Lindsay's Chances

NEW YORK — Mayor John Lindsay can probably do a little more for the Democratic party than his enemies think he can, but less than he himself would like to believe. The omission in that ruling lights up, like a dream, the vision of the one freeze which would please everybody. The trouble is nobody ever votes taxes. But an absolute freeze on the taxes that towns and cities and states and the federal government itself could levy on us all would probably be the one stroke that would solve all the problems of our economy more efficiently than the intricate combination of economic measures now being attempted.

We might, for the first time in more than half a century, have some idea of what we stand where we are going, some element of fiscal stability and responsibility, some limit on the growth of the public bureaucracy, and even some common sense limit on our own expectations of what we ought to be able to get from government.

What we suggest is that later than never. Freeze taxes! In Connecticut As In New York In what must be something close to a record for speed, the state's Federal court in Buffalo Monday took only four minutes to decide that New York State's attempt to raise the age for welfare eligibility is unconstitutional.

On July 18 a three-judge Federal court in Connecticut came to the same conclusion. In both states the attempt to impose a new welfare standard was prompted by the mounting rise in welfare costs, and by the fact that the size of the welfare budget in New York and New York, as compared with many other states, induced poor persons to come to Connecticut in search of the greater benefits.

The Federal judges in New York State and Connecticut are not alone in their decision. The Federal court in Buffalo overruled the residency requirement on the ground that it "unreasonably burdens on the right of interstate travel of a citizen to travel between states."

Of the fiscal drain upon the two states by the overruns of the welfare there is no doubt. Connecticut's welfare commissioner estimated that, excluding the ruling on residency which cost Connecticut about \$26 million in welfare assistance.

The increasing cost in New York State, where the welfare program runs to \$2 billion a year, would be even greater. The fairness of the courts' ruling in the two states is obvious. It is indeed unfortunate that the legislatures of the two states, guided by runaway welfare expenses, sought by unconstitutional means to resolve a fiscal crisis.

If the crisis is to be solved, and it must be solved, the remedy lies in having the Federal Government take over the burden of public welfare and establish a national program, at least of equality of benefits among states, to the cost of living. At present, Federal welfare funds are distributed so unequally as to seem almost capricious. For instance, New York receives 78 per cent of Federal reimbursement for its aid to needy persons. More than 40 per cent of Federal reimbursement that paid in New York State, which receives only 41 per cent in Federal reimbursement.

The Federal courts in New York and Connecticut have done well to strike down discriminatory legislation. But the states are nevertheless entitled to relief from excessive and inequitable financial burdens. The welfare of the individual concerned, the fiscal burdens of the states involved, and the constitutionality of proposed remedies must all be considered. The most economical, most equitable solution of what is basically a national problem is a Federal program. No time should be lost in bringing this to pass. — MERIDEN RECORD

So, in their final vote, they used not only the ever-present fear of the income tax itself, but a special momentary fear of a sales tax even higher than the one in their own paragon, to help in the vote winning process.

It was a masterful operation in cynical political strategy, and it sealed a brotherhood which expenses, sought by unconstitutional means in Democratic party affairs from this time on.

Forecast of a 'Hit' Upsets 'Funny Face'

 WASHINGTON — Sandy Duncan's "Funny Face" has been forecast as the most certain hit among the 30 new programs arriving on television next month. Is Miss Duncan pleased? She is not.

"People," she declared firmly, "don't like to be told what they are going to like. They would rather find out for themselves."

What viewers will find in "Funny Face" is a bright comedienne, who has been acclaimed "one of the entertainment world's most promising young personalities." The description caused Sandy to respond: "Well, that's a pretty small world."

But her reputation has been growing ever since she came out of Tyler, Tex., and went to work in New York. She has seldom been idle, going from chorus work at City Center into a featured role on Broadway in "Canterbury Tales," followed by winning excellent notices for the 1970 revival of "The Boy Friend."

"Everything broke open for Sandy during 'The Boy Friend.' During the next 12 months, she made two feature motion pictures, was cast in 'Funny Face' and did a prize-winning TV commercial for United California Banks. She was a puzzled bank teller in the commercial and it was cited at the Cannes Film Festival.

Miss Duncan wasn't exactly overwhelmed by her success. She's been preparing for it most of her life and now practices a disarming kind of honesty.

"I have been warned," she said, "never to tell my age. 'I'm 25.'"

She was asked what elements have been put into "Funny Face" to make forecasters so certain it would be a hit. "I don't know," she said. "There's nothing in it that's new. There's nothing in it that's very different."

"And one reason that all these predictions worry me is that we have a lot of problems. We're trying to iron out the problems."

"Funny Face" is a situation comedy and the leading character is called Sandy Stockton. She is a student at UCLA, preparing to become an English teacher. She finances her education by being an actress in television commercials. The premise, as usual, is designed to give the main character what TV people love to call "social mobility." That fancy term means, simply, that comic situations can be found either in her life as a student or as a working girl. The character also does modeling.

"The biggest weakness out here," Miss Dennis was saying, "is finding good writing. The work is limited in so many ways."

But working in television, she added, beats unemployment and, as you may have heard, unemployment in the film business is running at more than 40 per cent.

"It is work," Sandy said. "And when this job was offered to me I said, 'sure, I'll do

this sort of thing for three or four years,' but I would like to do a few other things."

Ahead of her, she hopes, is additional film work, "which I love" and "in about five years, another Broadway show."

She is, after all, doing the one thing for which she has spent most of her life preparing. She began studying dancing in grade school and, by the time she was 12, her mother and dancing teacher took her to Dallas and she landed a job in summer theater. She was one of the children in a 1958 production of "The King and I." She went back to Dallas and performed for the next four years.

She was performing at Lon Morris Junior College in 1965 and the following year—at the ripe old age of 20—was working at New York's City Center.

By the age of 21 she was 5-foot, 4 and weighed 104 pounds. She has grown half an inch since then, but hasn't added a pound.
