

## Ky's Refusal to Run Triggers Crisis On Viet Political Front

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. Ambassador Ellsworth Bunker met in an extraordinary session with President Nguyen Van Thieu tonight in efforts to find a solution to South Vietnam's gravest political crisis since the Buddhist uprising of 1966.

The meeting came 11 hours after Vice President Nguyen Cao Ky refused to participate in the Oct. 3 presidential election, which he termed dishonest and a conspiracy. This left Thieu as the only contestant. Ky proposed as a solution that he and Thieu simultaneously resign from office, paving the way for a new election. He said this was the way "to avoid the prospects of dark days in the history of this nation."

While there was no immediate comment from the Presidential Palace, sources said Thieu met with his Cabinet and with military commanders from the four military regions, before going into the night session with Bunker.

The U.S. Embassy, which successfully managed Ky back on the ballot after Gen. Duong Van Minh's withdrawal from the race left Thieu unopposed, issued a brief statement saying it regretted the vice president's decision. Officials at the Western White House in San Clemente, Calif., also expressed regret but indicated the U.S. government still hopes Thieu will face more than token opposition.

Radio Hanoi said the Supreme Court's reversal putting Ky back on the ballot was a "farce ordered by President Nixon in a vain attempt to give the appearance of legality" to the election.

Nixon has already declared that Thieu is to be re-elected. Hanoi said, "But to make it look like a true and legal election Nixon had to have two candidates. So he ordered the puppet regime court that had thrown Ky out to put Ky back in."

Despite Ky's refusal to campaign, his name will appear on the ballot in accordance with the election law's provision that "candidates do not have the right to withdraw" after the Supreme Court's final posting of the election list.

Ky told a news conference that the Supreme Court, which had barred him from the ballot on Aug. 5 and reinstated him Aug. 21, "was unashamedly used to serve the political ambitions" of Thieu.

He said Gen. Minh's withdrawal from the race upset Thieu's "design to use an opponent slate as a screen to conceal electoral fraud. This event prompted the Supreme Court on Aug. 21, in the most hasty and most bizarre fashion, to include our slate in the second posting of the list of candidates."

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## Latest Trial Under Way On My Lai

FT. MEADE, MD. (AP) — The court-martial of Col. Oran K. Henderson opened today with a charge by the government that he practiced "a pattern of deceit . . . by calculated design" to hide the killing of unsuspecting civilians at My Lai.

In his opening argument before a jury of two generals and five colonels, the prosecutor, Maj. Carroll Tichenor, said Henderson was told of unnecessary killings in the infantry assault on the Vietnamese village on March 16, 1968, but did not report it to higher command.

"Nor did he order the killing be stopped," Tichenor said.

Henderson is charged with willfully failing to investigate reports of a massacre and violating a regulation to report "incidents and acts thought or alleged to be war crimes."

The trial judge, Col. Peter Wondolowski, ruled today, before the jury came in, to allow evidence on two additional charges—two counts of lying to a blue ribbon Army inquiry into the events three years ago.

Henderson could receive a maximum sentence of six years if convicted of the charges.

Henderson's lawyer, Henry Rothblatt, said the defense would not contest "that 100, or possibly 150 dead or injured were observed in the My Lai area and possibly 25 to 50 were killed or injured without justification or excuse."

But, Rothblatt told the jurors: "The heart of testimony, the heart of the evidence, is the believability of evidence given to the Army investigators" 21 months after the events."

Rothblatt said he would show evidence to see if the two are related.

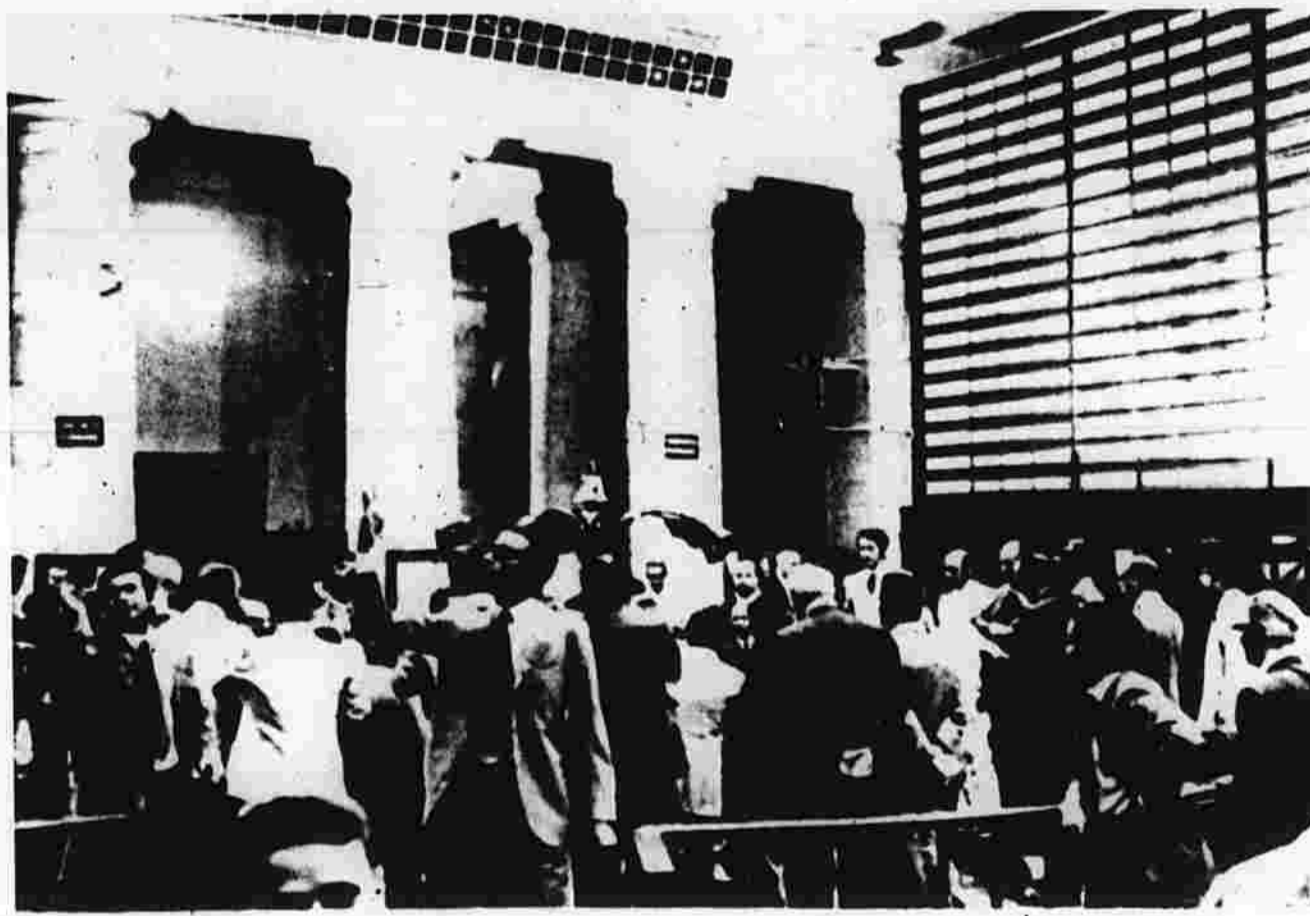

## European Exchanges Open; U.S. Dollar Shows Strength

LONDON (AP) — The U.S. dollar showed unexpected strength today as Europe's foreign exchanges opened after a week-long shutdown brought on by President Nixon's new monetary policies.

While the dollar eased in such European markets as London, Zurich and Brussels, the declines were relatively minor. Dealers were cautious and turnover was relatively light, as some of the experts had predicted. Uncertainty was the reason.

In mid-afternoon, rates in the leading markets were:

LONDON — \$2.4375 for a pound. That amounted to a devaluation of the dollar of about .75 per cent.

FRANKFURT — 3.425 deutsche marks for a dollar. The rate showed unexpected strength for the dollar, comparing to 3.4225 deutschmarks on the last day of trading before Nixon's announcement.

PARIS — 5.3275 francs for a dollar in the official market for commercial transactions and 5.47 francs in the floating market for capital movement and tourists. The free market thus resulted in a devaluation of roughly .75 of one per cent.

BRUSSELS — 48.875 Belgian francs, a devaluation of about 1 1/2 per cent of the dollar.

ZURICH — The official Swiss exchange remained closed. But banks handled normal operations at 3.995 Swiss francs to the dollar, a devaluation of about 1.75 per cent.

It was still too early to say what might lie ahead. Heavy selling of dollars could bring the value of the currency down. This would achieve the U.S. administration's objective of making American exports cheaper abroad.

If the volume of dollar sales remains low, then the U.S. campaign to restore a favorable balance of trade would face the threat of failure. Many American exports would remain noncompetitive in world markets.

Dealers said trading was quiet and hesitant. "No one is at all certain just where things will go," one dealer said.

Uncertainty about the European markets inhibited trading on the Tokyo exchange, where the market closed before the European markets opened because of the time difference.

Trading was calm, and the Bank of Japan bought only about \$10 million, compared to hundreds of millions absorbed on most days after President Nixon's bombshell announcement. The dollar sold at 357.50 yen, down only slightly from the official rate of 360.

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Japanese government spokesmen continued to maintain that the yen would not be revalued, but uncertainty pushed prices on the Tokyo stock exchange down again. The exchange index closed at 160.55, down 4.19 per cent, but trading was only moderate.

In Frankfurt, which has had a free market since the monetary crisis last May, the dollar fell back to about the level it held on Aug. 13—3.4250 marks compared with 3.4225. This indicated a sharp strengthening of the dollar in West Germany compared to the rate of 3.3875 marks that banks and travel agencies were giving tourists at the close of business on Friday.

Frankfurt dealers said trading was very slow. Some countries decided to postpone dealings until trends became clearer in the major monetary centers.

The government bank in South Africa ordered its foreign exchange to remain closed for the time being.

Banks in Italy refused to handle commercial exchange transactions until an official rate for the dollar was set later in the day. Italian banks were handling tourist transactions, though, at the rate of 600 lire, a dollar devaluation of 4 per cent.

France opened a split foreign exchange with two rates—one for tourists and one for other transactions.

The Big Four ambassadors have completed a draft agreement on the future of Berlin and will submit it to their governments for approval. U.S. Ambassador Kenneth Rush announced today.

"We have a draft agreement for submission to our governments," Rush told reporters. "I feel it will improve the situation in Berlin."

Rush emphasized he felt it was a good agreement or he would not submit it to Washington.

Pyotr Abrasimov, Soviet ambassador to East Germany, stood at Rush's side and declared: "Everything is perfect." He raised his hands over his head like a winning boxer.

The agreement was finished at six sessions in the past two weeks, and while its details were not announced it presumably included the vital question of Western access to West Berlin.

Abrasimov, Jean Sauvagnargues of France and Sir Roger Jackling of Great Britain stood on the steps of Rush's West Berlin residence to pose for photographers.

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It was the 33rd session of the Big Four ambassadors to divided Germany in a 17-month series that began on March 26, 1970. Rush, Sauvagnargues and Jackling are ambassadors to West Germany.

The agreement is understood to involve a wide spectrum that includes:

- Access to and from isolated West Berlin.
- Passage through the Wall into East Berlin for West Berliners.

- Conditional West German political presence in West Berlin.
- West German representation of West Berlin abroad.
- Soviet diplomatic representation on the consulate-general level in West Berlin.

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## Widow Of Pardue Sentenced

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — Nancy Pardue, the attractive 25-year-old widow of an accused bank robber slain in an abortive escape bid, was sentenced Monday to 10 years in prison on charges related to the attempted break.

The sentence was handed down by senior U.S. District Court Judge Thomas Murphy. She had been charged with a total of 10 offenses in the April 8 breakout effort of John R. Pardue.

The alleged escape bid came during a lull in his Bridgeport trial for the three robberies and the bank robbery that created a brief reign of terror in Danbury Feb. 13, 1970.

By official account, Pardue leveled a sawed off .308 caliber rifle at the guards near his lockup.

A young guard, Anthony Dierzo III, fired three shots into Pardue who lingered in critical condition for three weeks before his death.

## Prison Mutiny In South Korea Claims 30 Lives

SEOUL (AP) — A band of South Korean prisoners staged a bloody getaway from their prison on a Yellow Sea island today and made their way to a Seoul suburb before they were nearly wiped out in a gun battle with police.

Defense Minister Jung Nae-huk said 30 persons were killed, including at least 12 prison guards and officials. The mutineers broke out of custody on Shimi Island 15 miles offshore from Incheon on the South Korean west coast and later battled mainland police from a commandeered bus.

The defense minister said they were 23 "special prisoners with civilian status" guarded by South Korean Special Forces. The escapees wore Special Forces uniforms when they landed in a hijacked civilian boat near a popular Incheon beach shortly after their 6 a.m. getaway. They were armed with carbines and revolvers.

The Counter-Espionage Operations Command announced soon after their landing that a bus had been commandeered by North Korean infiltrators who had landed at Incheon.

Jung said Lt. Gen. Kim Chaemyung, who heads the counter-espionage command, mistakenly announced the mutineers were Communist infiltrators because they wore Communist uniforms when they landed in a hijacked civilian boat.

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## San Quentin Authorities Seek Attorney After Jail Escape Attempt

SAN QUENTIN, Calif. (AP) — Authorities said today they want to question an Oakland attorney who San Quentin prison authorities describe as the last person to visit Soledad Brother George Jackson before an escape attempt in which Jackson and five others died.

The Marin County police network broadcast an all points bulletin for Stephen M. Bingham, 29, saying he was wanted for questioning in connection with the breakout try Saturday afternoon.

San Quentin business manager Irwin Ritter said Bingham was the last person to visit Jackson before the escape attempt.

He said Bingham was searched before he entered the visiting room but "not the briefcase that he brought with him." He said Bingham also walked through a metal detector "but not with the briefcase."

Bingham, grandson of the late Hiram Bingham who served as Connecticut governor and U.S. senator before his death in 1966, graduated from the University of California at Berkeley law school.

The San Francisco Chronicle reported earlier that Jackson produced a 9mm pistol and launched the escape attempt a few minutes after leaving Bingham.

Bruce Bales, Marin County district attorney, confirmed that Bingham was being sought, the Chronicle said. Bales would not say precisely why other than "we have some questions we wish to ask of him concerning the incident at San Quentin."

The Chronicle said Bingham is grandson of the late Hiram Bingham who served as Connecticut governor and U.S. senator before his death in 1966, graduated from the University of California at Berkeley law school.

The young Oakland attorney, member of a politically prominent Connecticut family, is said by prison authorities to have visited "Soledad Brother" George Jackson Saturday afternoon, just before Jackson produced a pistol and the shooting started.

Authorities said only that they want to question Bingham. He has not been accused of any wrongdoing.

Bingham's father, a former state senator and now a Salem attorney, said Stephen, 29, was a veteran of a host of social and political causes, ranging from labor to the anti-nuclear movement.

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## Gov. Meskill Tax Decision Seen Today

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — Gov. Thomas J. Meskill was expected to announce his decision today on the legislative tax compromise recently passed by the General Assembly.

Meskill called a news conference for 3:00 p.m. at the state Capitol to reveal whether he has decided to approve or veto the bill.

The compromise measure repeals the controversial income tax and replaces it with a tax package which relies heavily on a 6 1/2 per cent sales tax and a 6 per cent tax on dividends and capital gains.

Meskill has had little good to say about the bill, he had urged the legislature to pass a package based on a 7 1/2 per cent sales tax.

He said last week that the legislative package might result in a deficit of between \$110 million and \$120 million.

Meskill said that if he signs the bill into law he will have to ask for more taxes when the legislature reconvenes in February. In addition to making substantial cuts in state spending. Among the cuts Meskill said would be necessary are slashes in state grants to cities and towns.

In addition, Meskill has said revenue estimates in the bill fall short of what would actually be produced.

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## Agents Foil Protest Plot; 25 Arrested

FBI agents broke up raids by antiwar activists on federal offices in New Jersey and New York over the weekend. Twenty-five persons were arrested, including two Roman Catholic priests and a Lutheran minister.

Six other persons were being sought.

Acting on information supplied by an informant, FBI agents nabbed eight persons at the Camden, N.J., draft office early Sunday and arrested 12 others elsewhere in the city. Government warrants for the arrest of six other persons on conspiracy charges were issued.

In Buffalo, N.Y., an FBI agent making a security check on the Post Office building Saturday discovered a break-in at the Selective Service office. Three young men and two women were arrested as they attempted to carry draft records away in canvas bags.

Although the FBI would not comment on a possible link between the Buffalo and Camden arrests, a Justice Department spokesman in Washington said: "I'm sure there will be an investigation to see if the two are related."

WATERVILLE VALLEY, Mass. — Robert F. Kennedy Jr., 17, second oldest son of the late New York senator pleaded no contest today in Barnstable District Court to a charge of loitering and loitering." and was assessed \$50 in court costs.

Kennedy, grandson of the late multi-millionaire Joseph P. Kennedy, said he did not have the money with him and Judge Henry L. Murphy gave him one week to pay the assessment.

Dressed in patched jeans and a blue denim workshirt, wearing his hair at shoulder length and shod in sandals which clunked when he walked, Kennedy appeared alone in the court house in this quiet Cape Cod town and left alone on foot.

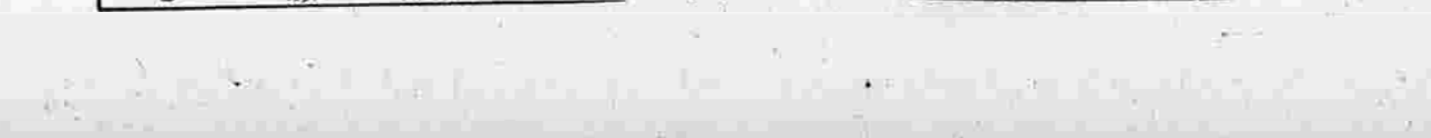
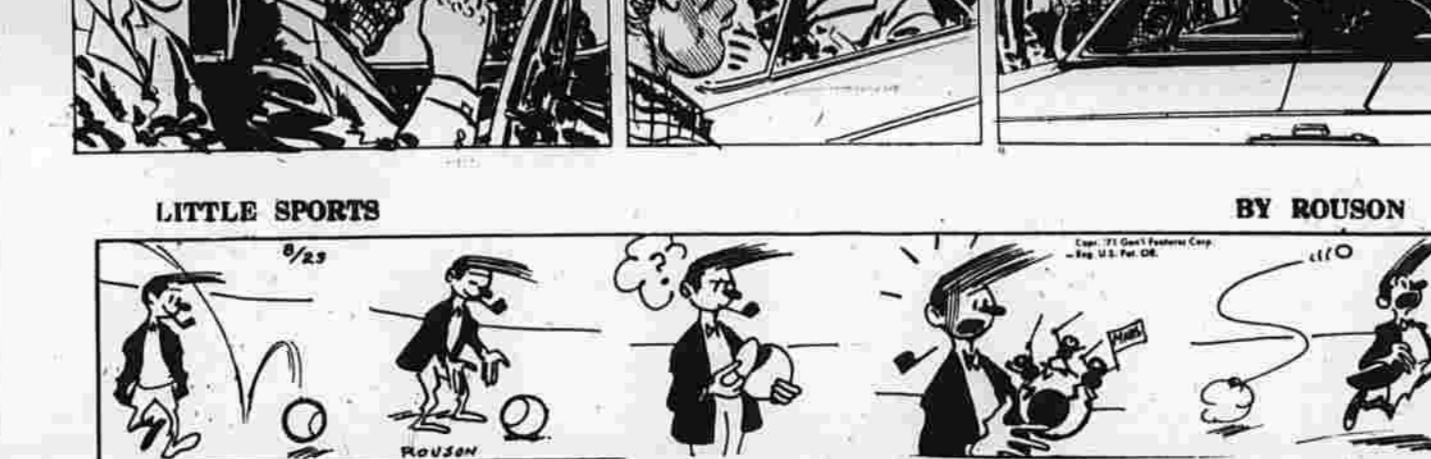

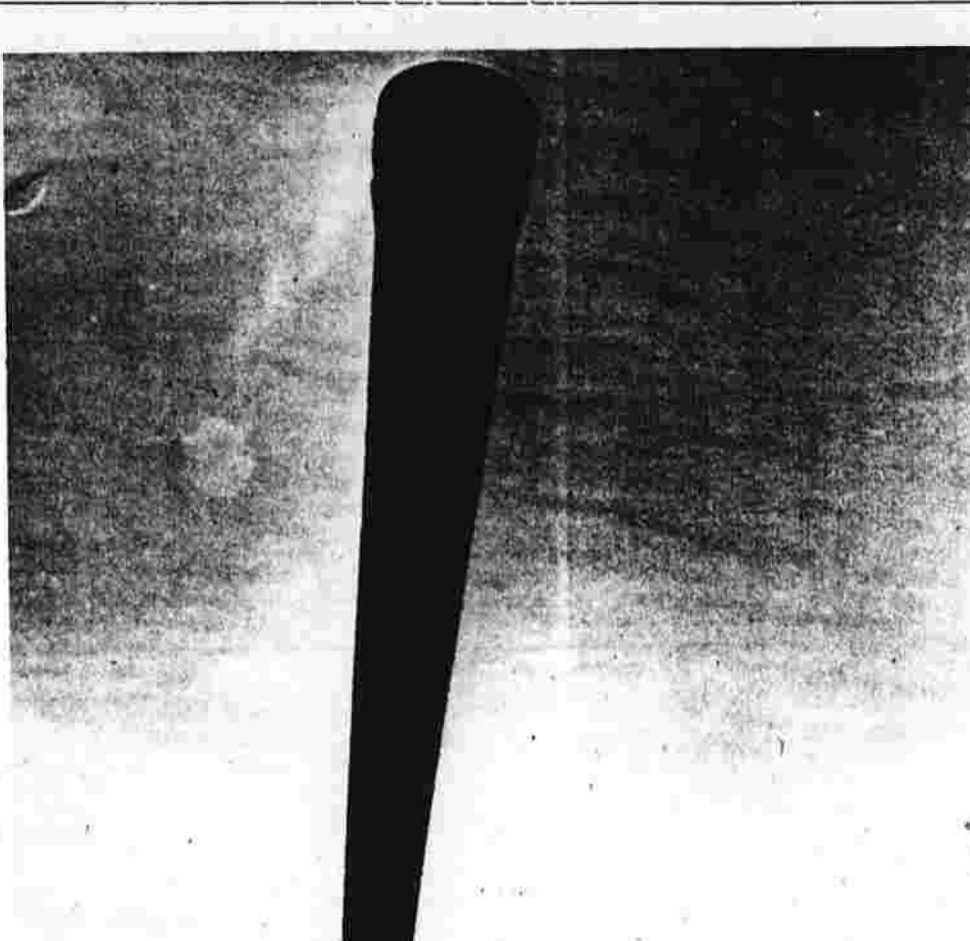
