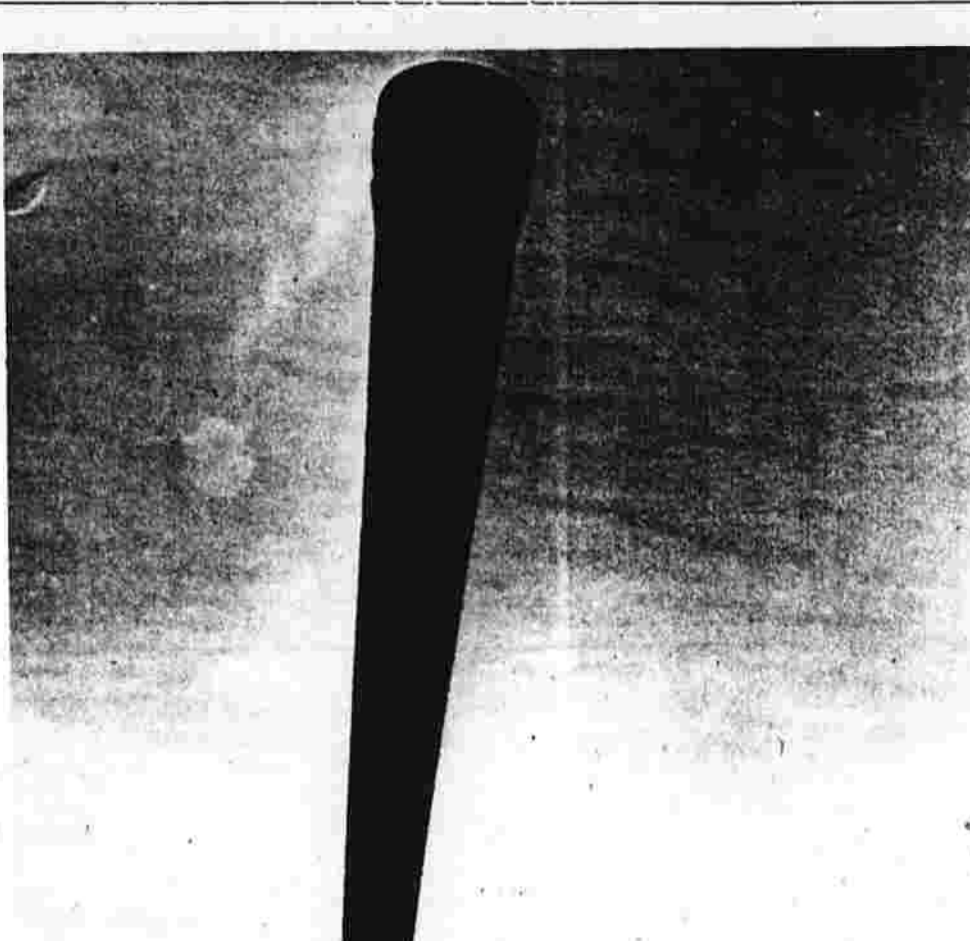

### Romania Ready For Soviet 'Push'

TEL AVIV (AP) — A Tel Aviv Daily newspaper said today that the Romanian army would move into the Soviet-occupied zone of the Danube delta in a "push" against Soviet attempts to "invade Romania or interfere in its internal affairs."

The labor newspaper Davar quoted a Romanian official source in Tel Aviv as saying "what happened in Czechoslovakia was a warning to Romania." The paper said "travelers returning to Israel from Romania continued that Romania's armed forces were on alert."

The sources indicated the Russians were contemplating armed intervention because of Romania's friendly policy toward Communist China. Romania's armed forces and military police are being retrained with weapons supplied under the Warsaw Pact, they added.

### Identity of Body Found in Ocean Eludes Officials

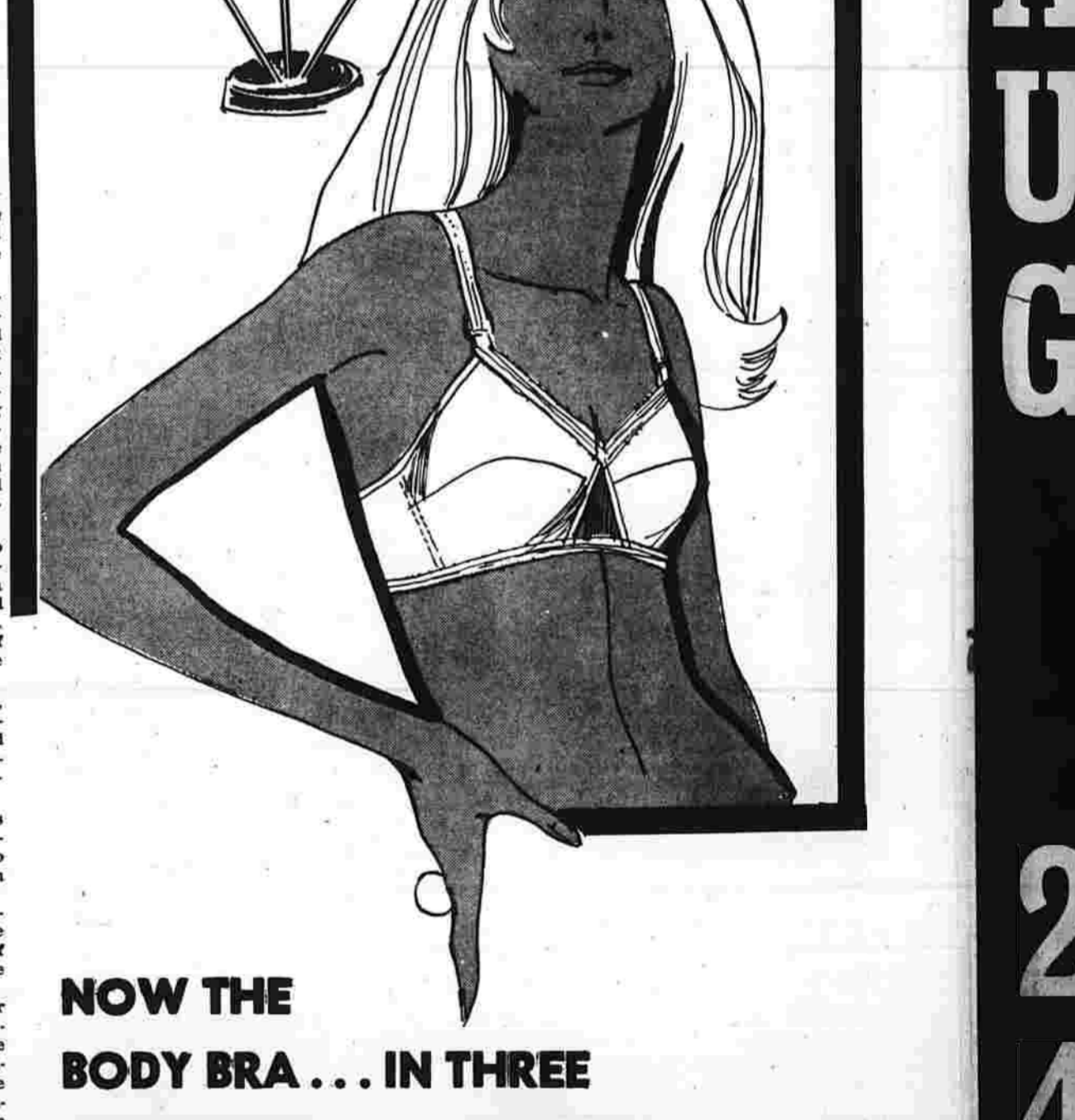

## State Treason Charges Face Blacks in Police Slaying

JACKSON, Miss (AP) — State treason charges have been filed against 11 black suspects in connection with the death of a policeman in a shootout last week.

The treason charges, based on an 1868 law, were announced Monday after a preliminary hearing in which the 11 were bound over to the Hinds County grand jury on other charges that included murder and attempted murder.

The charges stem from the death last Wednesday of Jackson police Lt. William L. Skider, 36, outside the headquarters of the Republic of New Africa here. Another policeman and an FBI agent were wounded.

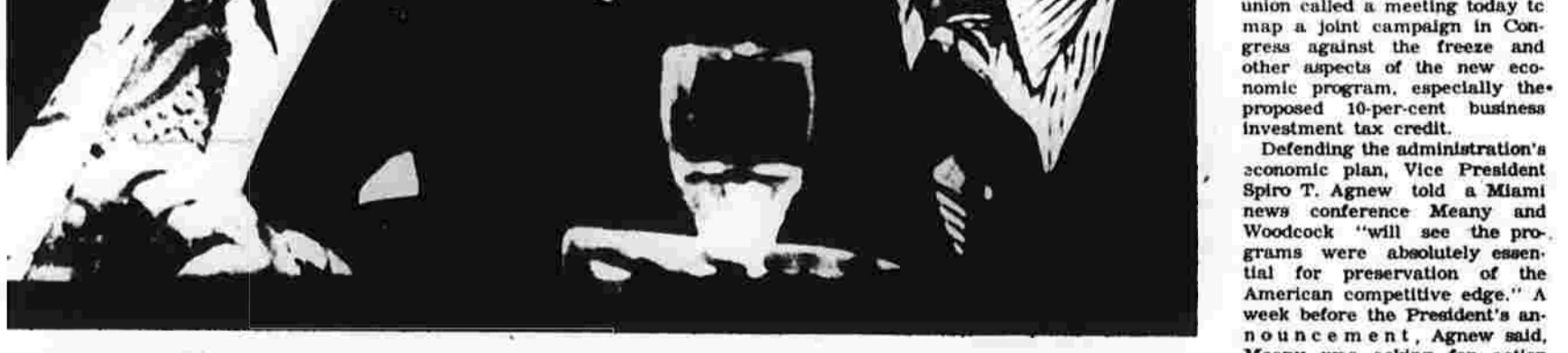
