Stonington Vote Upholds Budget

STONINGTON (AP) — Voters here defeated in a special referendum Tuesday a proposal to cut \$100,000 from the board of education budget.

The vote was 1,641 against the cut and 813 for it.

A group called Concerned Citizens for Better Education said the town could not afford the \$100,000 and that it should be cut. The total board of education budget is \$2,176,227.

The group succeeded in getting the 200 signatures necessary to have a referendum on the cut.

The board had said if the funds were cut the special education programs and athletics would be seriously affected.

Court Delays Pardue Action

NEW HAVEN (AP) — A one-month delay was agreed to Tuesday in U.S. District Court on proceedings to determine whether James Pardue is competent to stand trial on bombing and bank robbery charges.

Pardue is charged in the February, 1970, bombing of the Union Savings Bank in Danbury and the Danbury Police Station.

The continuance—until Oct. 4—was agreed upon in a meeting among U.S. District Court Judge Robert F. Zampano, U.S. Atty. Leslie Byrnes, and Pardue's attorney, Jacob Zeldes of Bridgeport.

Pardue, 24, of Limby, Me., was originally charged along with his brother, John Pardue. John died after he was shot during an attempt to escape from court in Bridgeport.

James Pardue was ruled mentally incompetent to stand trial last year, but a new examination was ordered later after a report from the federal medical center in Springfield, Mo., indicated his mental state would now allow trial. He had been kept at the hospital since the first incompetency ruling.

WASHINGTON (AP) — It was "a great building," says composer Leonard Bernstein in an interview in "Business Mirror" printed today on Page 14 of the Leonard Bernstein Mass at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts.

Shea Sees Obstacle to Water Firm Vote

Conditions which the stockholders of the Manchester Water Co. lacked on the extension to Dec. 1 of the town's option to buy the private utility may halt a referendum on the issue this fall.

John Shea Jr., town assessor, told the Board of Directors last night that he would recommend that the referendum be scrapped if at least one of the conditions is not changed. The directors occurred with Shea's plan to tell the water company that unless it is agreed to transfer Riskey Reservoir and dam by warranty deed, if such a transfer should ever occur, a November vote on the proposed \$2.25 million purchase will not be held.

In granting the extension to Dec. 1, the water company stockholders said that the Riskey property would have to be transferred by quit claim rather than warranty deed. A quit claim deed merely turns over the more than two years' use which the water company equipment has had since the option was signed.

The company, according to Shea, also wants to be paid for improvements which developers have made to the system. The firm has a procedure by which developers make improvements they need and are repaid for this according to a schedule of payments against the cost of the improvement is repaid. Andover Graboff Determined Eligible To Keep School Board Post

The Board of Education last night determined that one of its members was entitled to continue in the office even though he no longer resides in Andover.

In response to a request from Chairman Mrs. Beatrice Kowalick, Town Attorney Mrs. Katherine Hutchinson was asked for clarification of the status of a member who had moved out of Andover and into a neighboring community.

William E. Hutchinson's statement offered no opinion, it established precedents which said that anyone who is an elector in the town can remain on the Board of Education. The board established that Graboff is an elector, not having had it removed by the registrars. Under this definition the board deems him a properly serving member.

Special Education

The board also last night heard a report by a special speech and hearing tutor employed by the school to provide special tutoring during the weekly last year for a youngster in kindergarten.

Toward the end of the last school year, Duffy's professional recommendation for this child was that the school acquire a "phonic ear," a receiver worn by the child and a special wireless microphone worn by the teacher. The child is then able to hear the teacher's voice no matter where she sits in the classroom and what other sounds there may be.

The board ordered the "phonic ear," but when the device was received, it was found to consist of two non-compatible coils, and was sent back to the manufacturer.

At this point, Principal Dennis Libby questioned whether the nearly \$600 item is necessary. Duffy, who was unavailable until the end of the summer, was asked to appear before the board and present his recommendation and the reasons for it.

Duffy last night explained that the "ear" had been tried out with the youngster, last spring and proved to be quite successful. The device will enable the youngster to enter classroom participation on a more nearly equal footing with the other children. On the basis of this, the board voted to order the proper "ear."

Teacher Aide

At last night's budget hearings, the problem of this child had arisen and the law requires that a school do what ever necessary to provide a child with an education, the possibility of employing a teacher aide was discussed. The board was informed that there was also another hard-of-hearing child who would be in the same classroom so that the aide would provide help for both these youngsters.

On the basis of this information, the board made the formal recommendation for a "phonic ear" to the board last night. The board included a sum of \$2800 to provide for the special aide in addition to the special tuition, budgeted again at \$1275.

Former principal Mrs. Doris Chamberlain had made arrangements for the aide, who yesterday reported to the school for assignment.

The Board of Education last night went into executive session in an attempt to determine whether the school is not now overcrowded with help for this child. It has turned out that there is no other youngster in that particular class with hearing problems, except for one child who sustains temporary hearing losses when suffering from colds or ear infections, according to Libby.

Libby said this morning that he and School Superintendent Ann Damarjian will meet this morning with the aide to discuss the possible solutions in light of the recent information.

It was pointed out by Damarjian last night that all of the expenses incurred in providing for special education of children, are approximately two-thirds reimbursable by the state.

Muskie Rules Out Black As Running Mate in '72

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Sen. Edmund S. Muskie discussed his views with leaders of the Los Angeles black community and told them he did not think he could get elected president if he had a Negro running mate.

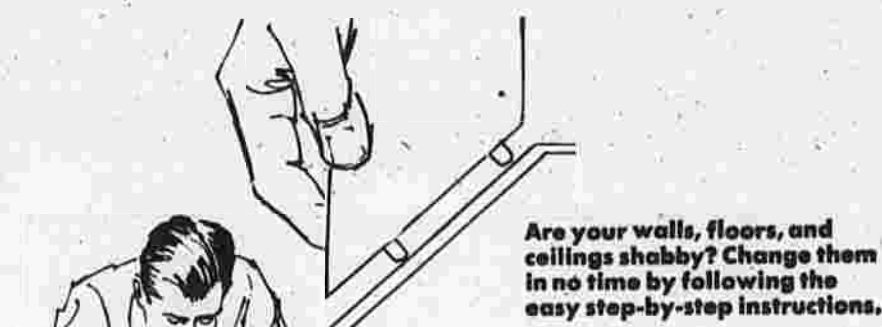
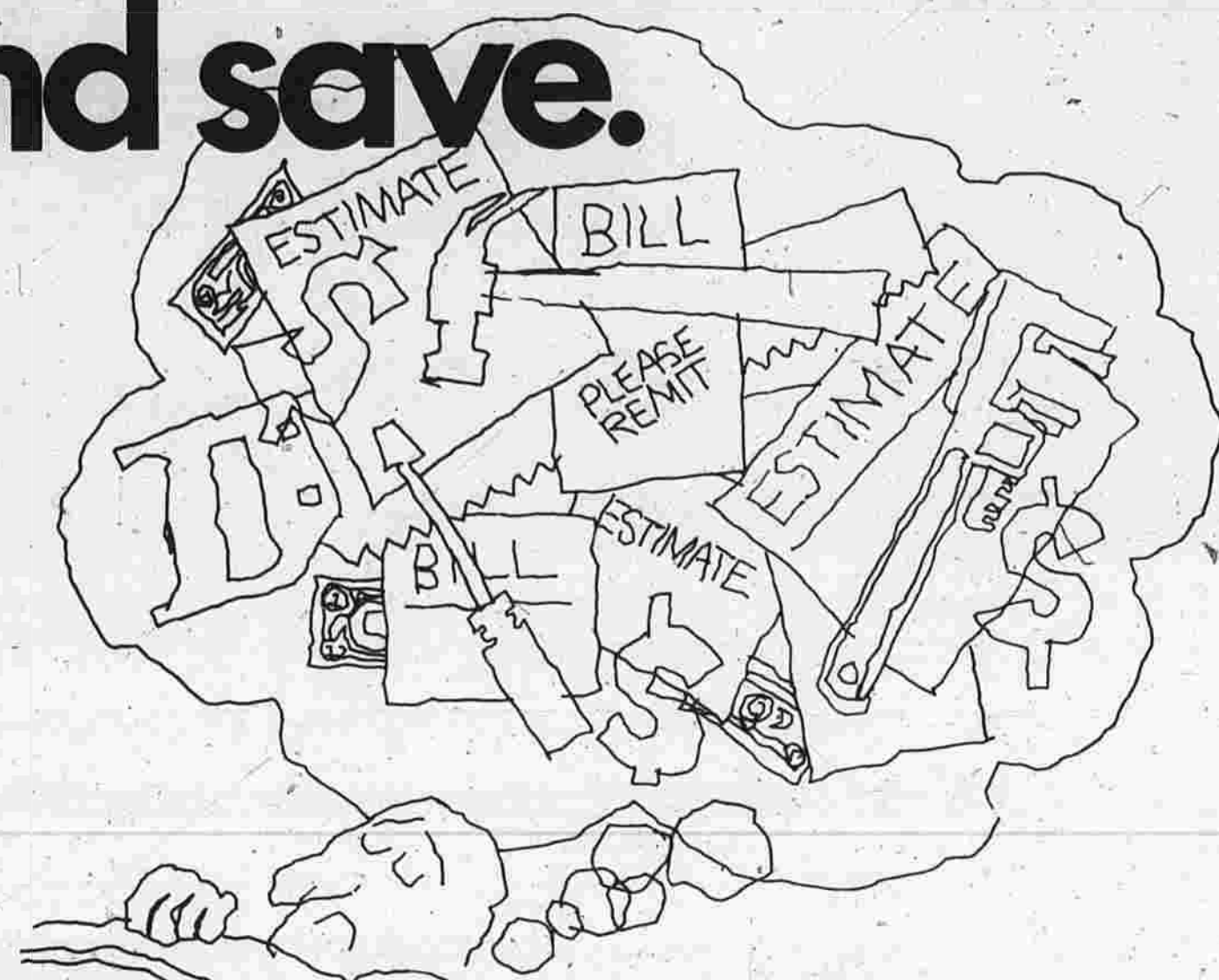
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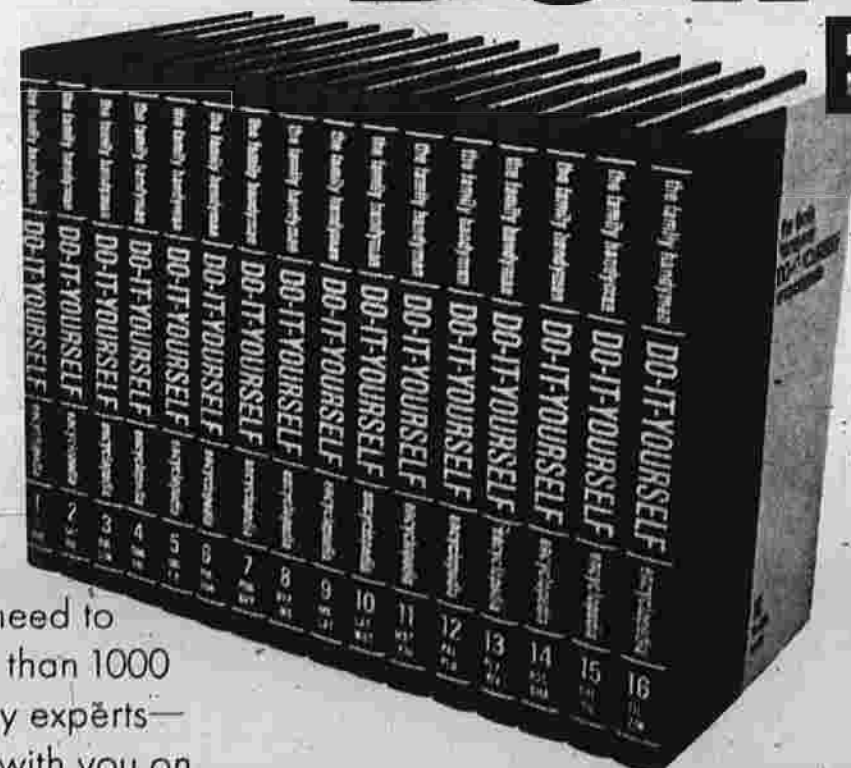

It's going to be strange and new to him for awhile and I wish you would sort of treat him gently—you see up to now he's been "King of the Roost." He's been boss of the backyard. I have always been around to repair his wounds and to soothe his feelings. But now things are going to be different. This morning he's going to walk down the front steps, wave his hand and start on his great adventure that will probably include wars and tragedy and sorrow. To live his life in the world he has to live in will require faith, love and courage. So world, I wish you would sort of take him by his young hand and teach him the things he will have to know. Teach him, but gently if you can. He will have to learn, I know, that all men are not just, that all men are not true.

Teach him that for every scoundrel there is a hero — that for every crooked politician there is a dedicated leader — that for every enemy there is a friend. Let him learn early that the bullies are the easiest people to lick. Teach him the wonders of books. Give him the quiet time to ponder the eternal mystery of birds in the sky, bees in the sun, and flowers on the green hill.

Teach him that it is far more honorable to fail than to cheat. Teach him to have faith in his own ideas, even if everyone else tells him they are wrong. Try to give my son the strength not to follow the crowd when everyone else is getting on the bandwagon. Teach him to listen to all men, but to filter all he hears on a screen of truth and to take only the good that comes through. Teach him to sell his brawn and brain to the highest bidder. But never to put a price on his heart and soul. Teach him to close his ears on a howling mob — and to stand and fight if he thinks he's right. Teach him gently, world, but don't coddle him, because only the test of fire makes fine steel. This is a big order world, but see what you can do, he's such a nice little guy.

And the story is an absorbing one, provided the reader is willing to sit still for Willy's abrupt mental leaps through time and space that carry from the battlegrounds of Cuba to the fighting in World War I and the time that cost Willy his favorite son.

As for the unfortunate son, also in a literary chamber, the reader can almost smell the powder as he watches the boy's anguished reaction to his taking a college degree and the vaulting and continuing to vault into his 40s makes for some of the funniest reading in this generally very funny book.

But these memories barely top those Willy has of the time he and his wife took dancing lessons with near disastrous results. Willy got involved in an affair with his dance instructor and his wife seriously considered running off with her. The resolution of this problem is hilarious.

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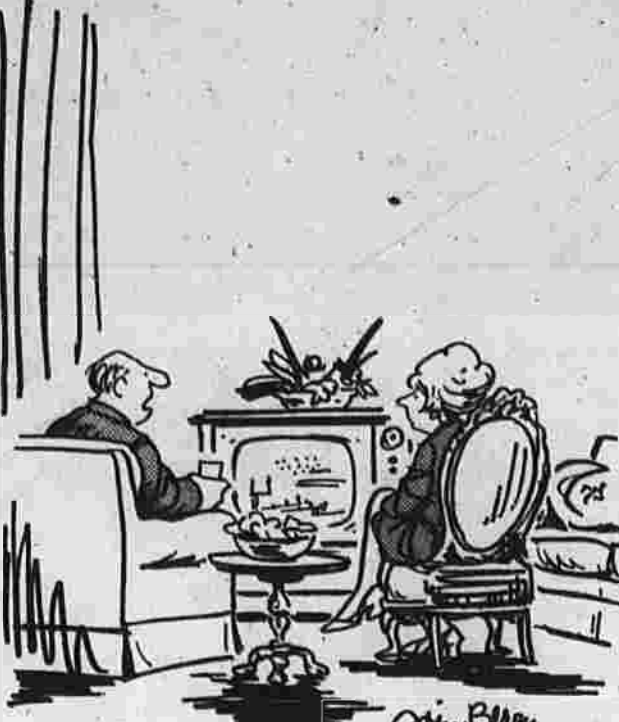
