The program was interrupted by a gymnastics exhibition staged by a visiting Albanian athletic team at which Premier Chou En-lai was seen.

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP)—Opponents of the proposed belt highway around Hartford remain skeptical following the announcement by the state transportation commissioner that the state is going to Washington to seek federal funds to study an alternative route to the most controversial part of the superhighway. "That's a howl," said the head of one of the anti-highway groups, "you mean that after years of struggling to loosen up the state's most powerful bureaucracies (the Department of Transportation) it is now coming to us to ask for help to reach the point of a feasibility study."

Inmates Win Concessions In Bay State

NORFOLK, Mass. (AP)—A work stoppage by prisoners at a state correctional facility continued today but the protesting inmates apparently won some concessions to their demands for prison reform. Theodore Rinaldo, acting superintendent at the facility at Norfolk, said inmates today left their jobs for the third day, said state Corrections Commissioner John Filpatrick ordered major changes in the mail censorship policy at all prisons in the state. Rinaldo said that letters from inmates to anyone will now leave the prison unopened and unopened. Previously, outgoing letters, except those to legal counsel, were subject to censorship.

Course May Change Hurricane Ginger Aims Fury at Carolina Coast

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Hurricane Ginger, "a very fierce storm," aimed her fury at the North Carolina coast today but weathermen said she could change course again before hitting land. At 9 a.m. Ginger was packing winds of 39 to 40 m.p.h. just off the coast of the state's coastal area by late tonight. Allies Launch Viet Drive To Reopen Road

THAI NINH, Vietnam (AP)—Tauxans of North Vietnamese reinforcements and scores of U.S. bombers launched a counter-offensive along the South Vietnamese-Cambodian border today. The drive was aimed at reopening a 20-mile stretch of highway cut by North Vietnamese forces threatening to overrun a half dozen allied positions. Lt. Gen. Nguyen Van Minh, commander of South Vietnamese forces in the region, said initial reports indicated the bombing was thought to be the work of Viet Cong who apparently fixed a bomb on the highway. At Money Confab Withdrawal of Surcharge Urged by Latin Americans

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Latin American countries today called for immediate withdrawal of President Nixon's 10 percent tariff surcharge for the less-developed nations and its complete removal as soon as a worldwide general adjustment of exchange rates is achieved. The case for the Latin American group was presented to the annual conference of the Inter-American Monetary Fund (IMF) today. The IMF's executive director said the surcharge was a "disruptive force" in the world monetary system. He urged the IMF to pressure the United States to remove the surcharge. (See Page Eight)

Meskill Says: Connecticut May Not Get Full Measure Should Revenue-Sharing Become Reality

HARTFORD (AP)—Connecticut may have trouble getting a full measure of federal revenue-sharing if and when it becomes a reality because this state does not have an income tax, Gov. Thomas J. Meskill said today. Congressman Wilbur Mills, the powerful chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, seems to feel that a state without an income tax is not making a big enough tax effort. Meskill said that the revenue-sharing strategy was to reward the few states which have state income taxes. The General Assembly enacted an income tax July 1, but repealed it seven weeks later in the face of public opposition. Meskill said at his news conference today that many congressional leaders are heavily into local property taxes and therefore federal aid should go directly to the cities in these states not to the state government. Book Review

CRUISING SPEED, By William F. Buckley, Jr. Putnam, \$6.95.

For some 20 years now Buckley has been making his way through the maze of political philosophy, coming out with a generally recognized status as an intellectual, a wit, a master of the language and one of the leading spokesmen of the conservative viewpoint.

Known best as the editor-in-chief of the National Review, he also conducts a television program, writes a syndicated column, lectures widely and contributes articles to many publications.

This book is a diary or journal covering the seven days beginning Nov. 20, 1970, and may or may not be typical of his past events and incorporates his earlier experiences.

He relates a good many details of his day-by-day activities in journalism, broadcasting and public speaking, and in addition quotes many examples from his voluminous correspondence with a remarkable variety of letter writers—unknown, conservative friends, liberal friends, petitioners for help, cranks and self-appointed critics, among others.

Also, there appears to be some ambivalence in Nevins' attitude—perhaps unintended—toward the public in general, the brickbats as well as the bouzouks he has received, on the plea of the mail.

It becomes apparent that his many friends and acquaintances include a wide range of people from the political field but also from the world of the arts.

As do most of the other books that give an insight into the author's personal qualities, as well as his professional experiences. The reader may or may not agree with Buckley's political views, but aside from that his story constitutes an interesting portrait of a man who has become a public figure.

THE WAR FOR THE UNION, Volumes VII and VIII, By Allan Nevins, Charles Scribner's Sons, \$15 each.

These two volumes conclude the notable history of the Civil War, its antecedents and immediate consequences, which Allan Nevins fortunately was spared to complete before his death at 80 in March.

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The Man Who Can't Retire

The losses of Justice Black and Harlan from the Supreme Court, and the retirement of Secretary General U Thant bring to mind a man who would like to retire but cannot: Dr. Ralph J. Bunche.

Bunche has had a full and famed career as a professor of political science, international statesman, author, and member of distinguished commissions.

In 1946 Bunche was an expert on colonial problems and Africa in the United States Department of State and was seconded to the United Nations.

He became the Director of the Division of Trusteeship at the U. N., then served as Acting U. N. Mediator in Palestine in 1948 and 1949. In 1948 Bunche became the Under Secretary for Special Political Affairs.

Bunche received the Nobel Peace Prize in 1958. It is extremely difficult for Bunche to resign as Under Secretary because the position is an institution, and the United States considers it an American-led institution.

China watchers in Japan say that this removal of pictures indicates that Mao's leadership has been stabilized and that his personality cult is no longer needed.

A Polish newspaper believes that Mao's role is diminishing while Premier Chou En-lai is moving into a position of greater strength.

The Italian Ambassador to Peking has reported by telephone that the recent events are in accordance with changes Mao described to American writer Edgar H. Snow recently. Mao supposedly told Snow that he intended to "redeem" everything, to diminish everything built on his name and retain only the title of "great educator."

Chairman Mao has always had a bit of the colonialist in him; he had always started life over again with renewed purpose. He has been the master of the constant change, including such major upheavals as the Great Leap Forward, the Hundred Flowers Bloom experiment in criticism, and the Cultural Revolution.

San Antonio, Tex. — No Political dispatch out of this state with its large number of electors has ever been so long as the Texas Liberal. It's been that way for years. Tucked in somewhere in these analyses, there is always a sentence saying the Texas Liberal never just liberals — are dispensed or falling apart or grinning or something.

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New 1972 Cars Resemble 1971 Models on Outside

By STEPHEN H. WILSTROM Detroit (AP) — New 1972 cars are operating on the nation's roadways but it's tougher than ever to tell the new ones from last year's models. Chrysler Corp. models have received a 12-month-12,000-mile warranty on the bumper. And all the manufacturers have installed better exhaust systems to cut pollution.

On the outside much is the same. Styling changes have been held to a minimum while the companies focused their money and manpower on meeting safety and antipollution regulations. Continuing a trend of previous years, there are fewer models down to 327 from 389 in the '71 model year.

Many of the discontinued lines are intermediate-sized performance cars, whose sales have dropped sharply in recent years, following criticism from insurance companies and government safety officials. Only 17 convertible models are being offered, down from 25 last year. Automakers say the decline in convertibles is due mainly to the popularity of air conditioning and vinyl roofs.

There are no new safety requirements making effect this fall, but General Motors has put improved bumpers on all its new GM cars will be able to hit a rigid barrier at 2 1/2 miles an hour with their front bumper without damage to the car. 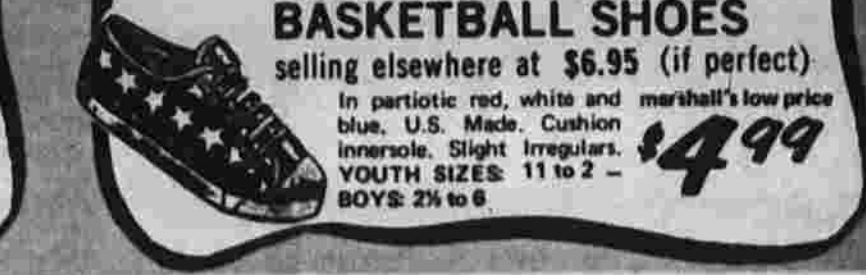

Bolton
Townpeople To Vote Again
On Addition to High School

A request for the addition of a cafeteria-auditorium at the high school will be presented to townpeople in the near future for the third time in a decade. The proposed addition would cost \$200 for eating and \$80 for assembly purposes and would cost between \$221,000 to \$260,000. Fifty per cent of the cost would be reimbursed by the state, according to Superintendent of Schools Joseph Casagrande.

After hearing Casagrande's presentation, the Board of Finance voted to withdraw its earlier recommendation that an alternative be presented for a combined cafeteria-auditorium. The board also voted to support the request for a combined facility.

Since the requested appropriation is for more than \$100,000, it must be approved by a town meeting. It is too late to add it to the agenda for Monday's town meeting, since the legal "call" has already been issued.

If approved, it will be presented at a joint meeting of the Board of Education, Finance, Education and the Public Building Commission. Similar requests for cafeteria facilities have been twice turned down by residents, once in 1963 when the original high school was built and was constructed and again in 1968.

It was noted that building costs have increased from approximately \$50 per square foot in 1968 to approximately \$122 per square foot today.

The Board of Finance has also received preliminary plans and site and engineering work for the project. It is expected that the town will have two choices to townpeople: one for a cafeteria and one for a combined cafeteria-auditorium.

Last night's meeting, Casagrande explained why the combined facility is needed, noting that in addition to eating and assembly space, the new wing will provide a much needed stage.

An official of the Ministry of International Trade and Industry said reports that the yen would be revalued in the first 10 days after the yen was floated amounted to only a tenth of those for the same period a year earlier.

Some trading firm officials said, however, they anticipate difficulties in trade negotiations because of the floating yen.

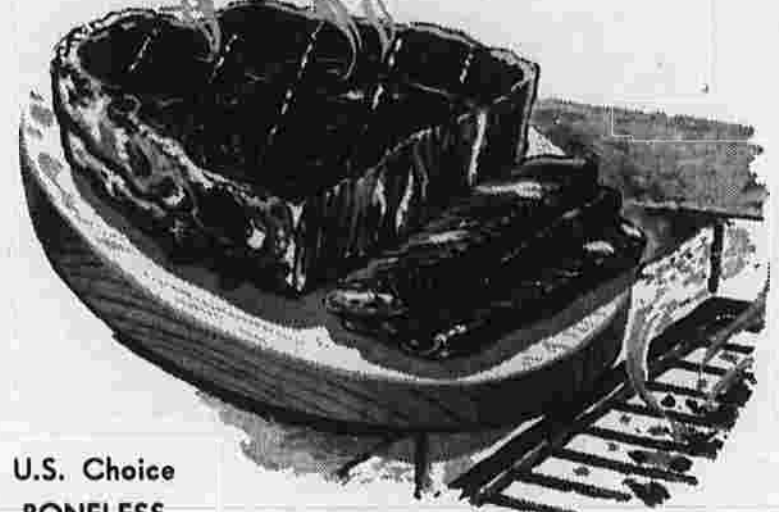

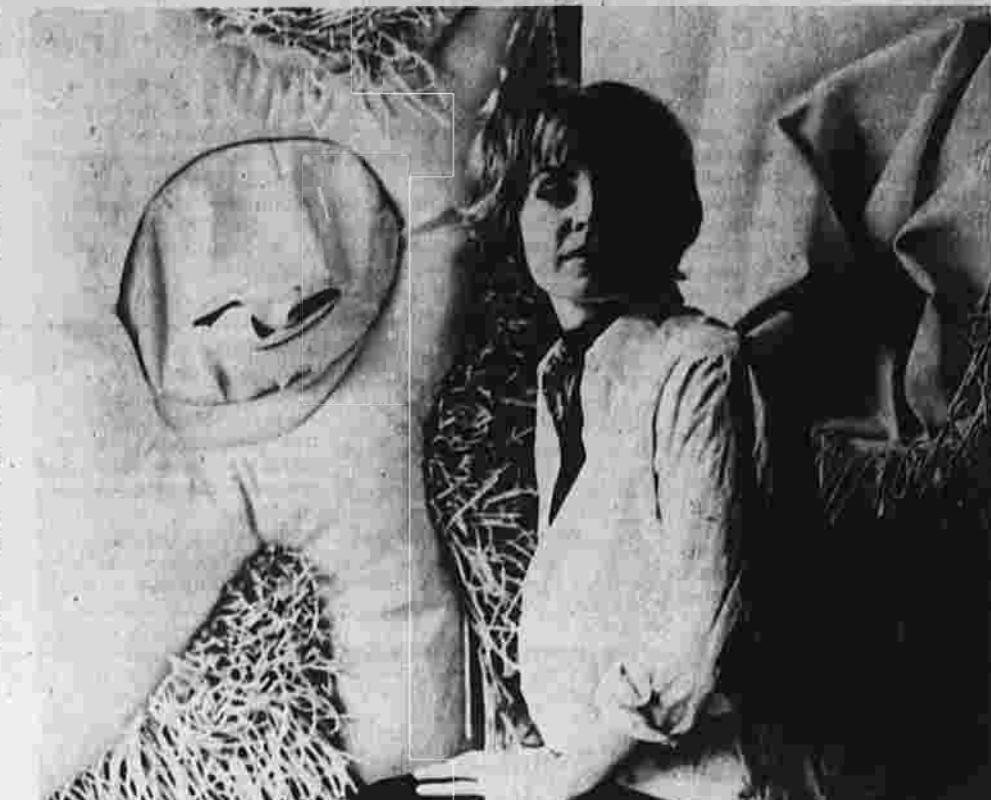

Vernon Town Teachers At State Meet

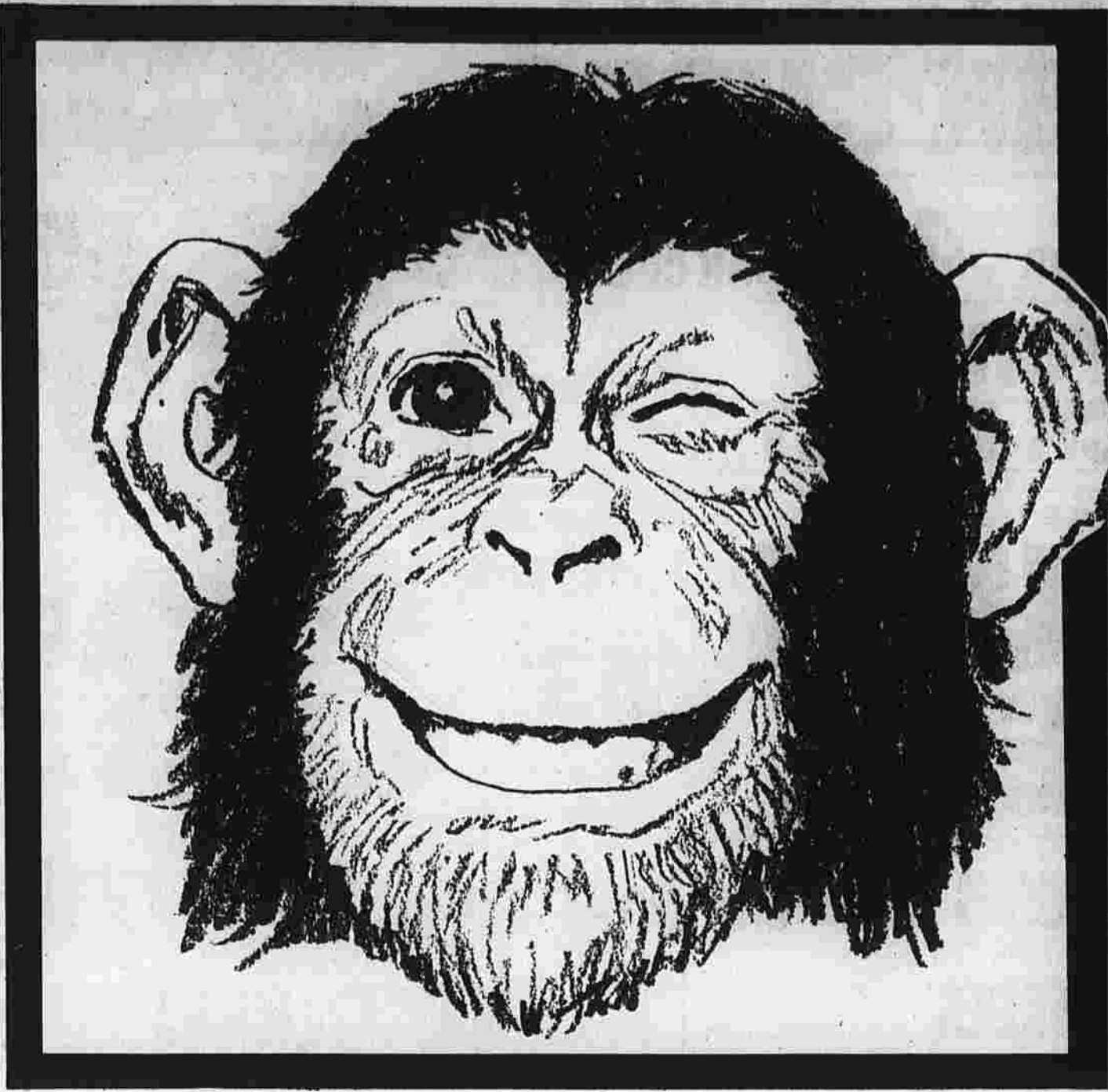

"Turned On" Wedding

"I do," solemnly spoken by bride and groom, is usually enough to make a legally valid marriage. But suppose one or both of the parties is "turned on," either by drugs or by alcohol. This may create a situation once described as follows by Euripides: "The tongue hath sworn, but the mind is unsworn."

Marriage is a contract—a special kind, to be sure, but a contract nonetheless. The key to a contract is mutual assent, a meeting of the minds. And a mind not competent to assent is not competent to make a contract, no matter what the tongue says.

How clear must the mind be? The law's test is whether the person is able to understand the nature of a marriage contract at the moment he says "I do." If he is not, the marriage may be annulled.

But intoxication short of that which will be overlooked. Since the law gives matrimony the benefit of the doubt, courts generally will not grant an annulment merely because the bride or the groom was a little high.

Furthermore, even if one of the parties was indeed "out of it" at the time of the wedding, the marriage may become valid because of what happens afterward. Take this case:

A man married a girl he scarcely knew, as the climax of a protracted drinking party. Seeking an annulment later, he pleaded in court that he had been in an alcoholic stupor at the time of the wedding.

But the girl pointed out that he had continued to cohabit with her for several days after he had sobered up. Result: annulment denied, because the marriage had been "ratified" by subsequent events.

What if one of the parties, although in good shape at the wedding itself, had concealed the fact that he was an alcoholic or a dope addict? Under these circumstances, most courts will grant an annulment to the spouse who has been deceived.

Thus, a bride won an annulment when she discovered after the nuptials that her bridegroom was a heroin addict. The court said this was the kind of vital information that, in all fairness, any bride had a right to know.
