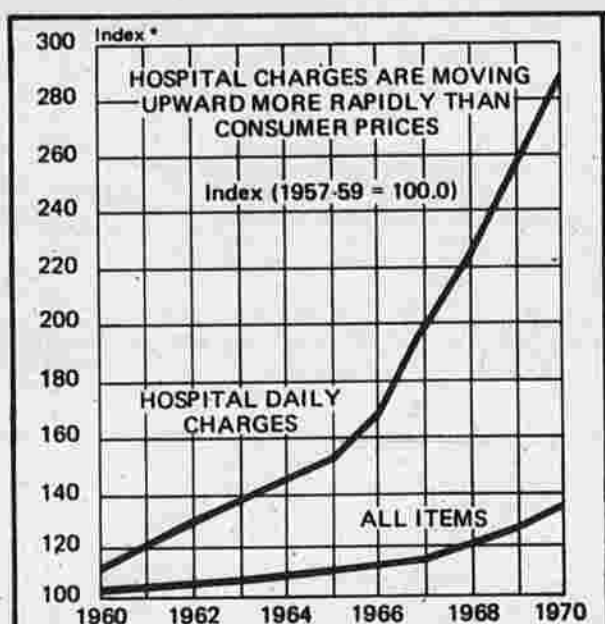

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon outlined today a two-year \$100 million plan to combat the "enormous economic inequities" which he said still confront minority businessmen.

In a special message to Congress, Nixon proposed legislation intended to establish local centers to "bring together a vast array of training, advice and information for minority businessmen."

Nixon said advances in promoting minority enterprises through his administration "is a record of which we are proud."

But he called for Congress to join with the administration "in a still more intensive and far-reaching effort to foster business development among minorities."

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House said today a special appeals board may be set up to review wage and price control orders. The board would be created to expedite appeals that grow out of wage-price regulations in the post-freeze period.

In response to a question by reporters, he said this judicial appeal mechanism will be confined to wage and price control orders. The presidential spokesman pointed out that the legislation would give the board the authority to expedite appeals, but that it would not have the power to overrule the board's decisions.

The Great Cripplers

Cerebral Stroke Counted Higher Among Disablers

By FRANK CARLEY (Third in a Series)

WASHINGTON (AP) — Life-saving gains are being made against cerebral stroke, the often paralyzing brain disease that afflicts two million Americans and is a threat from infancy through old age.

But an Associated Press survey of efforts in the medical fight against stroke shows full progress depends on learning more about high blood pressure and solving the riddle of a sort of biological rust that can clog the body's arteries.

Cerebral arteries currently rank behind only heart disease and cancer as the nation's most common causes of death. They are the top killer among the nation's great cripples: arthritis, cerebral palsy, muscular dystrophy and multiple sclerosis.

Besides the physical toll, cerebral stroke costs the nation \$2 billion annually in medical expenses and lost productivity.

Sometimes called apoplexy, strokes often are triggered by hypertension—high blood pressure—either by itself or as an insidious partner of arteriosclerosis, the so-called biological rust clogging the body's arterial pipelines.

Abnormalities of blood vessels nourishing the brain. Blood clots are prominent villains.

Because the brain is command post for many of the body's mental processes, a stroke—a rick-damaged brain can cause paralysis, numbness in the hands and face, weakness and difficulty in speaking.

Difficulty in thinking, impaired memory and mental disturbances are other possible results of stroke. It all depends on what area, or areas, of the brain are hit, and how badly.

Often preceding a full-blown stroke are headaches, difficulty in vision, dizziness and fainting.

When it hits, a stroke can kill within minutes.

... correcting flaws or road blocks

Treatment for stroke has advanced little in the surgical field. For many years, cerebral surgery was limited almost entirely to correcting flaws or road blocks in the larger external arteries feeding the brain, especially the carotid arteries in the neck.

But now surgeons are operating on relatively large arteries within the brain cavity, which must be limited to operations on tiny blood vessels of the brain.

Dr. Fletcher McDowell of Cornell University Medical Center in New York says a classic argument bolstering the theory that diets rich in animal fats and carbohydrates are a cause of arteriosclerosis underlying stroke derives from World War II.

When most Europeans during the war were on a Spartan diet, the incidence of coronary artery disease and stroke dropped sharply.

From 1955 through 1960, the most recent period for which full statistics are available, the U.S. stroke-mortality rate declined 11 per cent overall and 20 per cent for the 45-to-64 age group that includes the most victims of the disease.

The drop is mainly attributed to improved treatment of patients who suffer little strokes and strokes are helped in time from having full-blown, often fatal strokes.

Treatment of little-stroke victims has been recorded in times includes use of blood-thinning agents to help prevent formation of clots.

Such treatment has been a part of new drugs designed to dissolve clots already formed.

The hunt now is under way for improved anticoagulants, which would help prevent clots from forming and allow brain blood vessels to 20 per cent of the body's oxygen-carrying capacity.

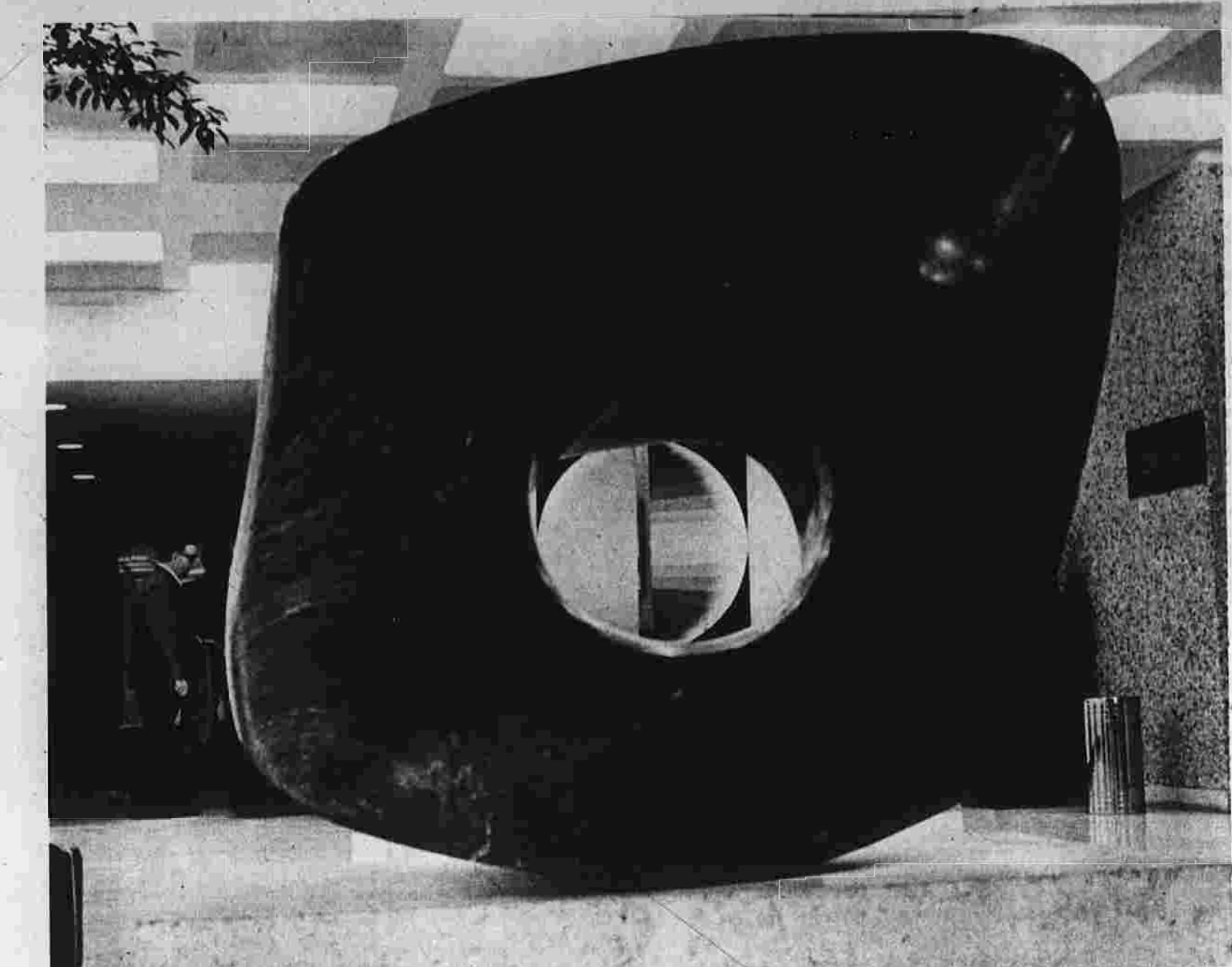

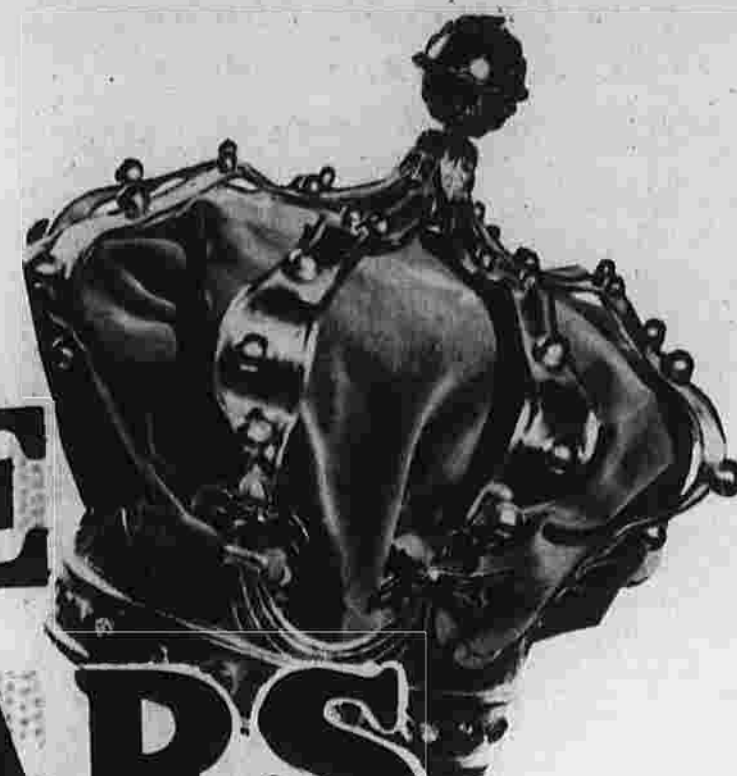

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Doubt Clouds Issued Of Hartford Beltway

State Transportation Commissioner A. Earl Wood went to Washington two weeks ago to consult with federal highway officials on a possible alternate proposal for the planned Interstate 291, a belt highway around Hartford. No specific information on the alternate's location has been released, but in the past two weeks speculation placed the proposed route in Farmington on the west ridge of Toltec Mountain, instead of through Metropolitan District Commission (MDC) reservation land in West Hartford.

Also in the last two weeks, reports from Washington predicted the death of the alternate route added to confusion created by the state transportation department's reluctance to release news of developments in the I-291 controversy. There were statements from federal officials indicating that the alternate route would be "a change of all," followed by a denial by state officials that the plan has been rejected and that the debate has been raging on the feasibility of an alternate route.

The alternate route would be a 20-mile loop around the city of Hartford, passing through the area of the proposed I-291. It would be a toll road, and would take only half the dwellers in the path of the present proposed route. But the new corridor would be "considerably more expensive" than the present route, and would necessitate a "sizeable increase in construction funds," according to Gov. Thomas Meskill, who announced Wood's trip to Washington.

Alternate Route Longer Wood, while declining to release the alternate's location, disclosed that it would be about six miles longer than the length of the highway under present plans. And since the route of Interstate highway system is set by Congress, it would be difficult to obtain approval for additional mileage.

The interstate system was launched in 1956 by the Federal Interstate Highway Act. Interstate highways are paid for by the users of the roads. Federal funds to 90 percent of the cost of the interstate system have already been allocated by the federal government, and the state of Connecticut would probably require matching with another state in the attempt to "transfer" allocated funds.

A state transportation department spokesman has emphasized that Wood was fully aware of the implications of going to Washington; apparent by this was one of the reasons for requesting a feasibility study instead of requesting an actual change in plans.

Wood's presentation was relatively informal, although the formal verbal report will be made for feasibility study. No deadline was set as to when federal officials will reply, but the state's spokesman expects something "soon."

The I-291 expressway, originally proposed in the late 1960s, has been continually under attack by public health, recreation, and conservation forces. It has opened a new era of protest and open confrontation to show their opposition.

The route through the MDC reservation land became a political issue in the last election, when candidate Meskill assured West Hartford residents that if he were elected, I-291 would not be built in the vicinity of the reservation land.

Drug Center, Once Kremlin Tourist, Nixon in Return Visit

WASHINGTON (AP) — When Richard Nixon last week visited Moscow, the Kremlin ignored him. And then there was the time that he and Nikita Khrushchev stood toe-to-toe in the kitchen debate, one of the landmark exchanges in Cold War annals.

The President announced Tuesday he will attend a Moscow summit next May after his visit to China, marking a first return to the Soviet capital since March of 1959.

On that occasion, while eyeing the Republican presidential nomination the following year, Nixon said the trip was needed "to give me a feeling of what's going on in the whole world."

But upon his arrival, he was denied permission to meet with Soviet leaders, and he came as just another tourist. Said Nixon: "A government without an openess is apparently not willing to recognize the opposition party in another country."

He went on, however, to battle South Vietnamese artillery base, Alpha, which is on the Cambodian side of the border. The fighting occurred about midwinter when three companies of South Vietnamese rangers and South Vietnamese tank column moved out of the base on a security operation.

On several occasions he was asked by Russians about his visit to the U.S. presence in Vietnam. Nixon said he was in Vietnam to see that the U.S. presence was not a burden on the American people.

What made no difference in setting on a Moscow summit was his plan to visit mainland China, said Nixon. He said he was going to see the Chinese leaders and discuss matters of bilateral concern there.

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Wine Making In the Home Given Boost

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Women Win House Vote, Face Fight in Senate

Sable has had only about a dozen inhabitants since the early 1900s. The population jumped to 20 when Mobil Oil of Canada Ltd. sent a crew to drill a test well at the island's western tip.

Business Mirror Canadians Seen Confused In Thinking on Surcharge

BY JOHN CUNIFF said, "We have too many... There is a certain confusion in the public thinking of Canadians in their criticism of the U.S. surcharge on imports, according to a high U.S. Commerce Department official.

Harold B. Scott, assistant secretary of commerce, made the statement during an interview as he attempted to counter statements by Canadian officials that an exception to the surcharge should be made for Canada.

Canada, it has been argued, has a special relationship with the United States and that it should be exempt from the surcharge. Scott said that while U.S. exports to Canada make up 26 per cent of all U.S. exports, they constitute only one per cent of the nation's GNP. Canada's 11 billion of exports to the United States, he said, is 15 per cent of her GNP.

"Do they want a special relationship with the United States, or do they want an independent course?" he asked. "It is just not true that, as Canadians say, the United States is indifferent to Canada. I will publicly say the facts belie this."

On the other hand, he continued, "Canada has developed an intense self-absorption, a preoccupation with the Canadian image as independent and distinct."

The two approaches "are to a degree contradictory," he said. "This is to me their problem at the moment and one they have to resolve."

Scott took pains to be precise and to put a constructive emphasis on his remarks. "Our economies are made to order for each other," he said. "They are not conflicting economies. We ought to sit down and plan things out."

He carefully laid down Commerce Department thinking in regard to special exemptions for any nation from the surcharge, which the U.S. government claims is a temporary device to force permanent corrections in what it feels is an unfair trade relationship.

"If we are not going to point the finger at anyone," he said, "we had to apply the surcharge to all with recognition that it would be unfair to some and to most unfair to some than to others."

Scott did not specify whether this meant that Canada was among those nations that might be treated unfairly, but he did construct a case that would indicate otherwise.

DETROIT — Mrs. Jacqueline Mariner, of Oak Park, Ill., was driving down a Chicago street when her 1969 Chevrolet station wagon suddenly accelerated out of control.

The car jumped a curb, careened down a sidewalk and sideswiped a utility pole. She stopped it by jamming the automatic transmission into the "park" position.

"Luckily," said Mrs. Mariner, "I didn't have any injuries and the biggest automotive liability insurer in the world...

PZC Decides to Table Business Zone Extension

The Planning and Zoning Commission last night tabled action on the request made by Donald W. Robinson to expand the Central Business Zone on Rt. 88 in Hebron Center to include all of his land, which is across from the Town Office Building.

In submitting his request Robinson pointed out that the property is centrally located, being near the primary intersection in town and that it is on a major highway artery.

He also stated that the highway is wide and is neither winding nor steep in grade and the property is close enough to a traffic light to hold down the speed of passing vehicles.

He compared this piece of property with most or all of the present business areas in town which "are in actuality residential in character", he said, "having much of their frontage already occupied by residences and are therefore, not available for business development."

Robinson described his property as the "only remaining centrally located tract of land still in the open state and as yet unspoiled by numerous residences."

He stated that he has been assured that capital is available and that within three or four years the town could expect a planned business complex, possibly in the quarter-million dollar category which would have an immediate effect upon the tax structure of the town.

Robinson explained that he is seeking the change at this time since an opportunity to sell a portion of the land had been lost already because the interested party had been unable to purchase additional land for business.

He was referring to the Citizens Bank which is building a branch office on Rt. 88 in the new Professional Center. The piece of land adjacent to the Town Office Building, which is owned by Robinson, was according to Robinson, the bank's first choice, after conducting an independent traffic survey in town.

Had the bank been able to buy the back piece of land, it would have settled next to the Town Office Building, Robinson said.

By requesting the expansion now, Robinson said "in the future I will not have to face this problem."

John Sibon, a former member of the Planning and Zoning Commission, spoke against the expansion, calling it "strip zoning."

Sibon also said that this area would not contribute to the general welfare of the town as a business zone. His reason included "close proximity to the church and the school (Rham), concern about the safety factor, strip zoning, and reservations as to whether the plan or cannot create ample parking."

Also speaking against a business zone for the land, which is a property owned by Rham High School, was Regional Board member Everett Jewett.

Jewett was mainly concerned with the "welfare of the young." He said the property borders not only the school property but the road leading to the school. He felt that the town "as a member of the Rham High School region should take specific care as to what we put in there."

Commission members felt that no action should be taken on the request until the matter could be discussed with the town planners who have been hired to draw up the new town plan.

In other action the commission approved the request of Ledgcrest Inc. to divide the interior of the subdivision on Wall St. to create three additional lots with the stipulation that these lots not be used for building purposes.

Being interior lots, Ledgcrest Inc. will now have to go before the Zoning Board of Appeals to request "right-of-way" to the lots.

Because of a conflict of interest, Commission Chairman Richard T. McDonald disqualified himself from voting on the request. McDonald is the real estate agent handling the property.

Action was also tabled on a request made by Anthony T. Sylvester to subdivide the remainder of the Farview Heights property to create lots 5 and 10 on Burnt Hill Rd.

Zoning Agent Richard A. Keefe, in a letter to the commission dated Oct. 12, stated that "these lots appear to meet the requirements of the public health code and are presently suitable for on-site sewage disposal systems."

He further stated that any approval of the subdivision is contingent upon the stipulation that "the sewage disposal systems be designed for each lot by a registered professional engineer and submitted to this of-

spect the property before any approval is given. Sitting in on last night's meeting was Mrs. Sue Dickerson, a member of Hebron Ecologists for Less Pollution, who expressed concern that the commission might approve Sylvester's request.

Also attending the meeting was John Heagle, Republican candidate for the Planning and Zoning Commission.

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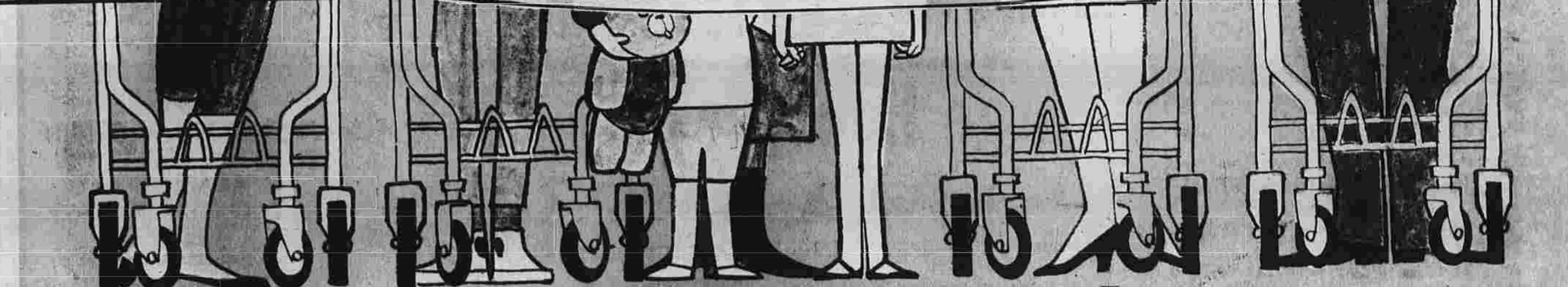

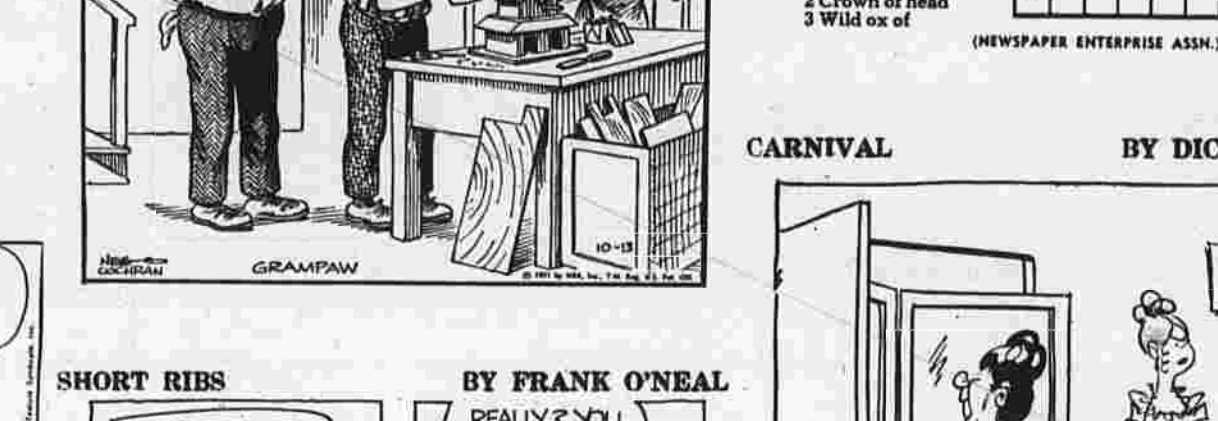
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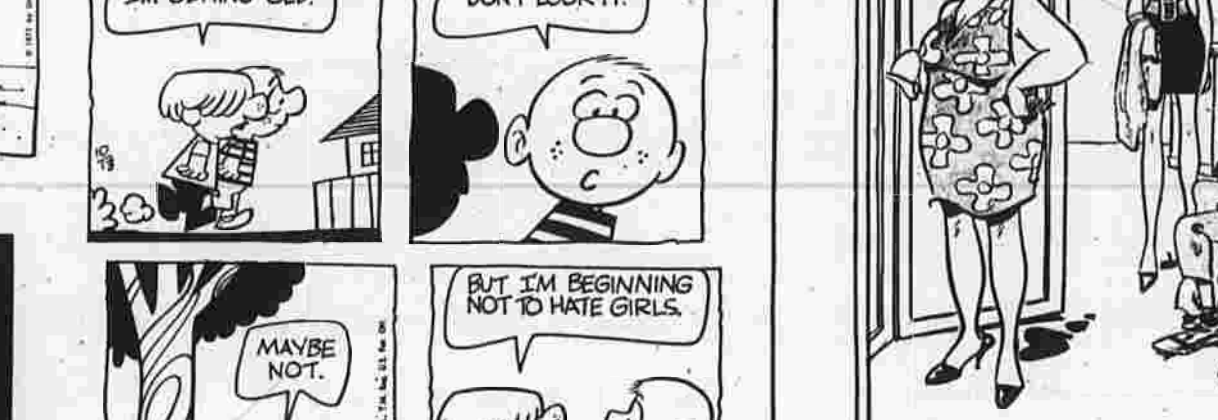
