Dallaire pointed out that the names of the Republican candidates considerably outweigh those of their Democratic opponents.

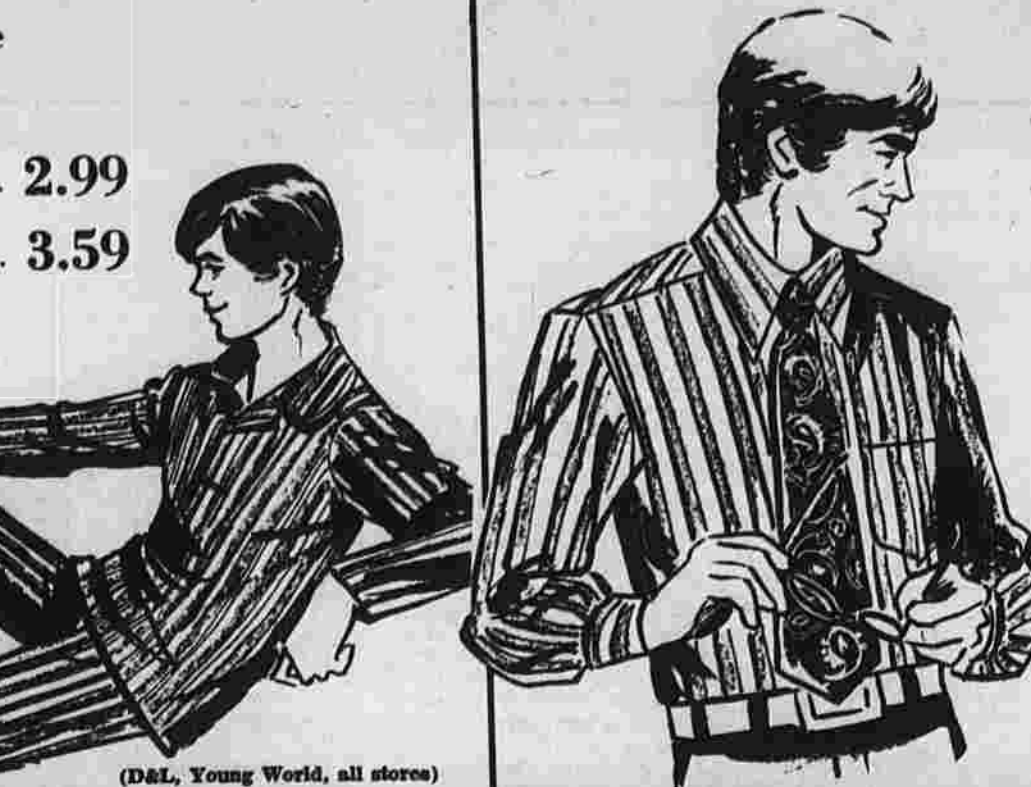

East Pakistan Government Hands Military Big Bill

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) — The government of East Pakistan has handed the military a bill of more than a half billion dollars for repairs and rehabilitation following last year's cyclone and this year's civil war.

About \$200 million would be for new housing. The bill, in a massive report on damage in East Pakistan, was turned in to the central government under the direction of Muhammad Husain, a West Pakistani civil servant who was appointed chief secretary of the provincial government—senior officer in the civil service in the East—after the survey was started.

It has not been released although a few of Pakistan's customary aid donors—such as the United States—have been given it. Pakistani sources said the program was too ambitious and would have to be revised.

According to Pakistani government sources, the program calls for the expenditure of \$274 million over the next five years to repair the damage caused by the cyclone last November killing 300,000 and by guerrilla warfare which still is under way. The amount includes about \$100 million in foreign exchange which the report said would have to come from donor countries, many of which

Dacca, the provincial capital, and the major port, Chittagong, are along the border with India. Tripura, has been at a standstill because it is vulnerable to sabotage of the Mukti Bahini, the Bengali nationalist guerrillas.

The survey estimate came as Pakistan was trying to find a way to restart the flow of new aid from the United States, which stopped when fighting started. Many of its major donors, including the United States, are legally bound to stop all aid—new and existing—until Pakistan continues to default in payment of interest and principal on its foreign debt.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) — Have you ever yearned to do absolutely nothing? A bunch of Cambridge whiz kids have come up with a gadget that can help. "It not only tells you when you're doing nothing," says sales director Glen Schacher, "it tells you how much nothing you're doing."

The gadget, called the AlphaTheta Cyborg, and it's a product of the Cambridge Cyborgs Corp.

Among its developers is an artist, a 21-year-old yogi and a 28-year-old electronics engineer.

The Cyborg is a miniaturized, portable version of the electroencephalograph (EEG) which hospitals use to read your brain waves.

The EEG is the most common form costs \$5,000 to \$20,000. It has little metal plates that doctor's stick to your scalp, usually after they've cut out much of your hair.

The Cyborg costs \$129, looks like a transistor radio, has only one dial, no graphs, and has little metal plates that are encased in a spongy substance so they can be attached to your head without benefit of scalp or razor.

"The Cyborg does nothing to you," Schacher said. "It just reads your brain waves and tells you what you're doing. Specifically how much nothing you're doing."

From that point, the explanation gets a little complicated, involving a new psychiatric concept called "biofeedback" and such esoteric concepts as Alpha and Theta brain waves, behavioral psychology and contemplation of the Unknown.

"Biofeedback," explained Schacher, "means that if you can monitor your body's functions, you can control them."

The AlphaTheta Cyborg monitors your brain and tells you when you're putting out Alpha or Theta waves, the more clicks, the better you're doing at doing nothing.

"The idea is to hook yourself up and see what you have to do to get to the Alpha or Theta

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In Philadelphia Major Election Issues: Law and Order, Racism

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Law and order and racism are major issues in the bitter battle for mayor of Philadelphia.

Frank L. Rizzo, a tough ex-cop once thought an easy winner, now is considered to have a narrowing edge in next Tuesday's voting over W. Tucker

Longstrech, a businessman pleading reform in place of boss rule.

Rizzo, 51, once rumored a possible successor to FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover, quit as police commissioner to run as "Change It" with your C.A.P. or C.B.T. Master Charge Card!

The Democratic organization choice.

Handpicked by Mayor James H.J. Tate was under law, Rizzo survived a bruising four way primary challenge to face Rizzo's public Longstrech, 50, a former city council man, advertising man and associate director of the Chamber of Commerce.

Four minor party candidates, two of them women, are expected to have little impact on the outcome.

A name-calling campaign, expected to cost each side a record \$1 million, has torn across party lines and disintegrated party labels in America's fourth largest city where Democrats have run the government uninterruptedly for 20 years. The party came in on a wave of reform, ending 60 years of GOP control.

Some of the harsh oratory has preached fear of crime, but Rizzo has captured nearly every labor union endorsement, which was the foundation of Tate's strength, but Tate also had solid support from the 250,000 registered voters in the city.

Rizzo has campaigned almost exclusively in Italian, Jewish and white blue-collar areas. He avoided those congested black neighborhoods where 25 per cent of the people and 20 per cent of the voters live, but denies it was deliberate.

The graying Longstrech, a 6-foot-4 former Princeton University football star, has signaled across the city day and night, going everywhere and refusing to let the police bodyguards Rizzo always had nearby. He has made daily forays into the black ghettos and has spoken almost every Sunday from the pulpit of a black church.

Rizzo is fighting not only the Republicans — outnumbered nearly 2 to 1 — but disenchanted independents and probably a majority of the normally Democratic black community.

The feeling of many blacks is epitomized by Dr. Leon Sullivan, a Baptist minister, founder of Opportunities Industrialization Center (OIC), and only black on the General Motors Corp. board.

Sullivan was elected vice president of the city and he will unquestionably have a say in the city's future.

"It is clear that both Rizzo and Longstrech are law and order men, but it is a question of law and order and progress under Longstrech, or law and order and terror under Rizzo," Sullivan said.

Angered, Rizzo said Sullivan played "dirty pool." The minister was more harshly denounced by Democratic state Rep. Earl Vann, a black supporting Rizzo, who called Sullivan a part of a sinister coalition of politicians and teamsters who have joined hands in a hate campaign.

The two Democratic mayors before Tate—Joseph S. Clark, later a U.S. senator, and Richardson Dilworth, who turned back Longstrech's first bid for the mayor's job in 1955—have endorsed Longstrech.

So have the city's daily newspapers, the morning Inquirer and the afternoon Bulletin.

Their editorials said there's a need for a change in government, and a mayor who will serve all the people.

More than anything else Rizzo is proud of his record as a cop. He admits he was tough, but insists he also was fair and impartial.

"I believe my record is crystal clear in this community that while I was police chief I served all the people of this city," Rizzo said. "The black, white, Puerto Rican community, people of all races and religions. All you have to do is check the record."

That record, though, has brought some charges of police brutality denied by Rizzo. Such charges were made 10

months ago after riots raged in Philadelphia. Rizzo was stripped several blocks in a sidewalk search. Similar charges were made in 1967 when Rizzo helped break up a demonstration of some 2,000 high school pupils mostly black.

All this has ruffled the confident but short-tempered Rizzo, a high school dropout who followed his immigrant father to the police force. He denounced the desecrating political signs and the newspapers which had built him nationally as a sort of "supercop" during his four years as commissioner.

"The whole nation is watching this election to see if a police chief can make it as mayor," said Rizzo, predicting he'll win by at least 130,000 votes.

There's only one other former police chief now running an American city, and that's Charles Bierstadt of Minneapolis. Longstrech followers claim the Rizzo lead, if it ever was as big as he claims, has evaporated, and that the GOP nominee, beaten by Dilworth by 138,000 votes, will win this time by 40,000 or more.

Most observers give Rizzo an edge of perhaps 25,000 if around 75 per cent of the 990,084 registered voters turn out. There are more than 800,000 Democrats in America's fourth largest city where Democrats have run the government uninterruptedly for 20 years. In Vietnam Volunteers Not Wanting To Evacuate The Wounded

By HOLGER JENSEN (AP) — An ammunition box falls on a GI's head at a dirty little fire base called Rawhide. Twenty miles away four young men are dragged from sleep by a white blast, their hair flying through their eyes. It is after midnight, a lonely time to fly.

Running lights are doused as the chopper approaches Rawhide. Two "Nighthawk" gunships are circling the fire base and the danger of collision is very real. But lights make a target for Viet Cong sharpshooters in the surrounding hills.

The aircraft drops blindly into an inkly void and someone mutters on the intercom: "Christ it's dark."

Suddenly light flickers thinly on the ridge top below. Rawhide is a few minutes from landing and the chopper comes forward.

Two men are slung from stretcher bearers are running forward.

The patient spits blood as the helicopter claws skyward again. Fifteen minutes later he is in Da Nang and the aerial ambulance is being loaded into the 30th Evacuation Hospital.

Men who fly this lifeline see the worst side of the war—the wounded, the feverish, the maimed and the dead. They take risks that become magnified as the war winds down.

But there is never a shortage of volunteers to fly the unmanned birds with the red crosses.

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Jobless Rate On Increase In Australia

In Sydney, where inflation has been greater than in other cities, senior members of the state government expressed interest in the wage-price freeze in the cost of living for the year ended Sept. 30.

Prime Minister William McMahon said the rise in living costs was predominantly due to large wage increases.

"We have been doing everything in our power to restrain the underlying forces which have caused the price movements," he said. "In particular we have sought to induce both employer and employee to observe greater moderation in wage settlements."

The president of the Associated Chambers of Manufacturers, Harold M. Hartford, said there was evidence that living costs would go higher.

"Manufacturers are justifiably alarmed at the trends and they have every right to expect corrective action by government," he commented.

On April 13, 1970, an examination was made of the Manchester Green Elementary School, to evaluate its continued use as an educational facility in the Manchester school system. Present were: Mr. Theodore Fairbanks, Supervisor of Buildings and Grounds; Mr. Isador Wolf, Principal, Green Elementary School, and the writer.

The original building, located on the north side of East Middle Turnpike, was built in 1921, with an addition constructed in 1924. In 1942, the 1924 addition was fire damaged and restored. Construction consists of masonry exterior walls with wood floor and roof framing. Finish floors and stairways are generally wood, with exposed concrete slabs at basement level.

The site, including the building area, is about 3/4 acres in size, with limited usable area for organized play, bus loading or parking. Minimum recommended standards for elementary school sites stipulate a basic 10 acres plus 1 additional acre for each 100 pupils enrolled.

At the present time, the building houses approximately 300 pupils in grades kindergarten through 6. Of necessity, classrooms are self-contained, since there are no specialized facilities for music, arts and crafts, physical education, science, remedial reading, speech therapy or materials resource, all of which are vital to a rounded modern program. Administrative, health and service facilities are minimal and generally improvised.

Day to day maintenance of the building appears to be excellent, within the severe limitations imposed by old and deteriorating finishing materials and mechanical systems. As in any structure of comparable age and type, repairs are frequent and preventive maintenance a continuing process. The building is under treatment for termite control, and it is probable that dry rot will affect wood framing wherever dampness exists in concealed areas. However, any major alteration involving structure would be ill-advised, since structural members are generally interdependent, and the attempted correction of one problem tends to create another.

All things considered, we strongly recommend that immediate steps be taken to provide a new, modern school on an adequate site to serve the Green area, and abandon the existing building as a school facility as soon as reasonably possible.

Local endorsement of GOP town committee members and delegates will take place March 2 and 3, if needed. GOP primaries for town committee members and all delegates will be on April 30. The new two-year terms for GOP town committee members will begin April 24.

Divorces In Haiti Quite Quick

PORT AU PRINCE, Haiti (AP) — For sheer optimism it would be difficult to top the case of the man who arrived in Haiti last week to take advantage of its new quick-divorce law.

Let's call him George. He arrived Tuesday from the United States with his wife, got divorced from his wife Wednesday, and remarried Thursday.

"That's a little fast," acknowledges a lawyer, Don McKay, who handles 80 percent of the divorce business here. "Most people who intend to remarry take some time to settle their affairs, you know, like a day or two."

From 150 to 200 persons are shutting in and out of this steamy Caribbean capital every month to take advantage of a law which requires no residence and considers "incompatibility" as ample grounds to sever a marriage contract. Court proceedings take about five minutes.

Haiti and the Dominican Republic, which shares the island of Hispaniola, have been cashing in since Mexico tightened its divorce laws.

McKay, 49, an Alabama native, saw what was coming, retired from his thriving divorce business at the Mexico-U.S. border and began looking for other pastures. He came to Haiti, and as he puts it "gave some advice" to the government of the late Francois "Papa Doc" Duvalier.

By February Haiti was in the quick-divorce business.

Theoretically, any Haitian lawyer can handle divorce cases, says McKay. But with his Mexican experience and American legal training he finds it easy to handle North American customers. McKay also is associated with the Tours, the only tourist agency authorized to present the names of divorce applicants to the Ministry of Justice.

The owner of the Tours is Luchner Cambrome, minister of the interior and national deputy in the government of Papa Doc's son and successor, Jean-Claude Duvalier.

Kosygin Chats With Workers In Cuba Visit

MIAMI (AP) — Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin has told a group of workers in Cuba that socialism is winning its worldwide struggle against capitalism because of the "enormous efforts" of people such as themselves.

"Our strength consists, among other things, of year after year building these houses here," Kosygin told the laborers on a new housing development Wednesday in a Havana suburb.

"We have to say with all our courage that the Socialist cause is winning in this struggle. We see it in the Soviet Union; we see it in Cuba and in other Socialist countries. We see it in the German Democratic Republic, in Poland, Czechoslovakia, Bulgaria, Romania, Hungary, Korea, Vietnam.

Kosygin's remarks, carried by Havana Radio and monitored in Miami, were enthusiastically applauded by the workers. They were translated into Spanish by a Cuban news agency, reported from Moscow that Kosygin and Prime Minister Fidel Castro began a series of talks in which the two sides exchanged opinions on the further development of all-round cooperation between the Soviet Union and Cuba. Tass said they discussed "international problems which are of mutual interest."

The Cuban government would not allow U.S. newsmen to cover Kosygin's visit.

Prime Minister Fidel Castro, who accompanied the visiting Russian on a tour of several construction sites, reminded the workers that much of their equipment was Russian built.

"One of the ways by which to express our appreciation to the Soviet people is to utilize these machines to their maximum extent, take care of them and improve our work discipline," Castro said.

Kosygin said he would always remember "the manifestation of warm sentiments toward our people" which the Cubans had demonstrated since his arrival Tuesday on a "friendship visit."

Meskill Meets Governors From Japan

Gov. Thomas Meskill was one of nine United States governors who met in St. Louis yesterday with eight governors from Japan. Both groups agreed that they need more money from their national governments to combat and solve local problems.

The one-day joint conference was the 10th annual meeting of the two groups. The United States governors are on the executive committee of the Governors' Conference. The Japanese governors are on a two-week tour of the United States, studying pollution problems and solutions here, with an eye toward implementing successful pollution controls into Japan.

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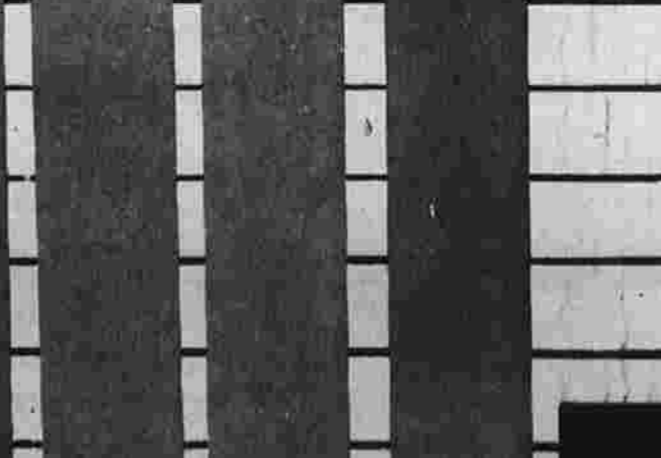
