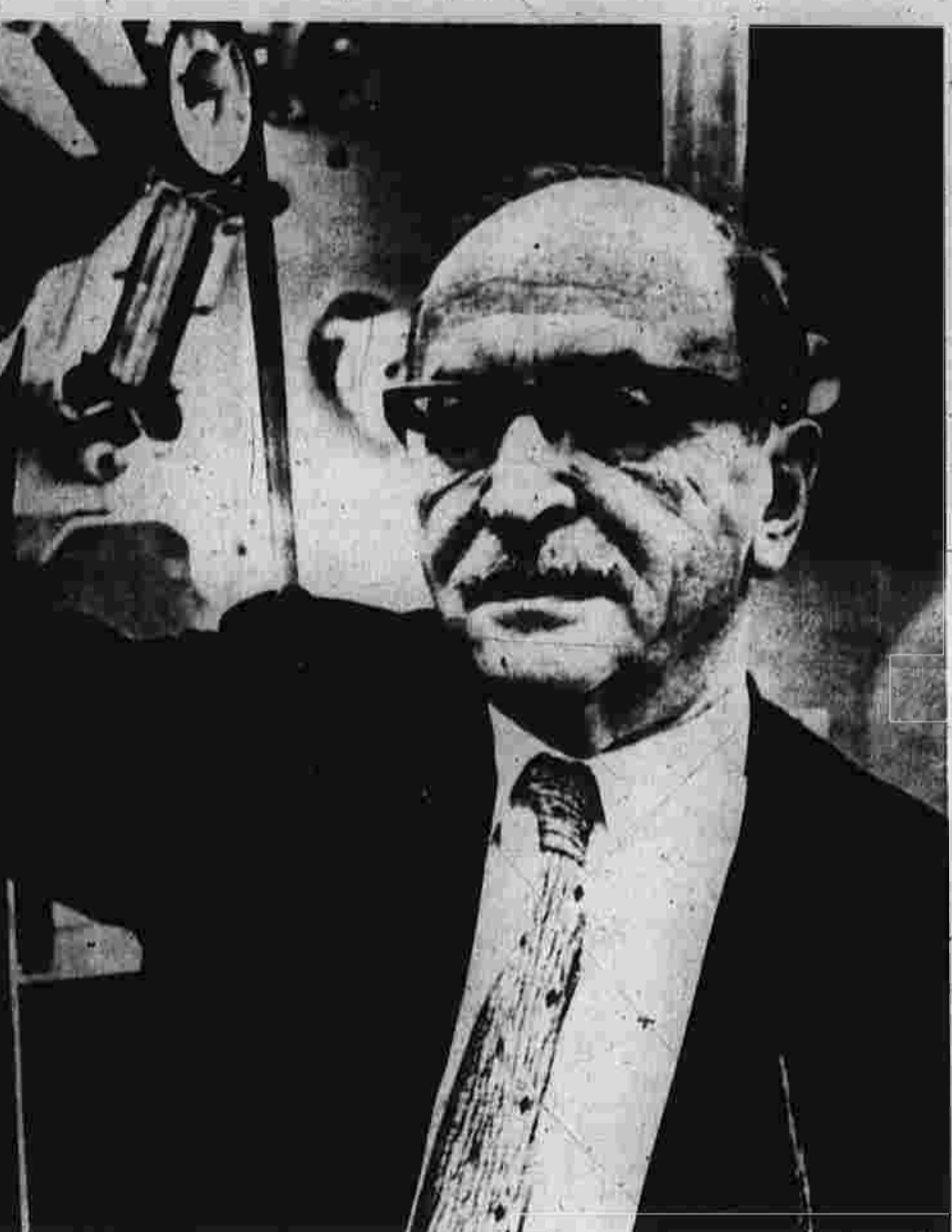

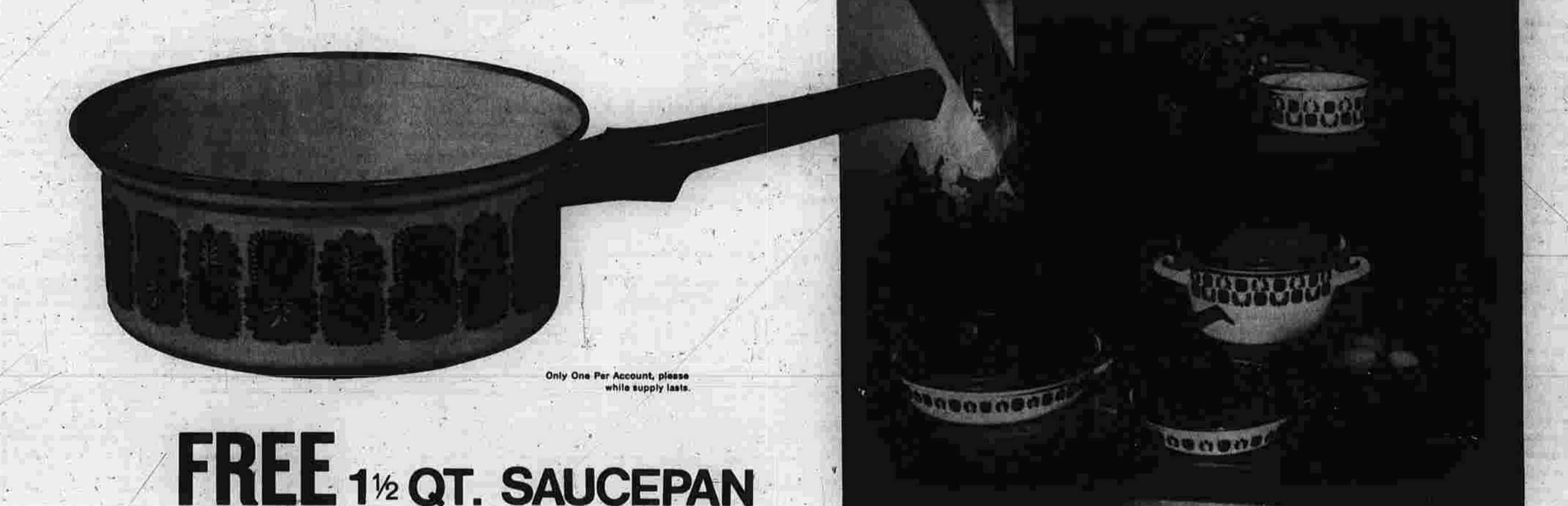

And it is indeed difficult to try to name anyone else who deserved to share his moment of triumph.

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Many U.N. Members Lax On Financial Obligations

WASHINGTON, N.Y. (AP) — If your club operated in public school, you would need a vote against this amendment, which would allow members almost anywhere to pay their dues on assessments for many of the biggest projects.

And if club members were as lax about meeting their financial obligations as many U.N. members are, your club would be at or near bankruptcy. The latest accounting shows that 95 of the 131 members are behind on their dues.

The United Nations is \$19 million in debt. It kept only \$1 million by most of its available funds held by some member nations and by the payment of its creditors—mostly member nations who are owed for three years to pay their dues.

Failure to pay these dues not only affects a nation's eligibility to vote, some nations—such as the Soviet Union—have refused to pay these assessments. Others have paid most but object to paying their dues.

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Old Sturbridge Village Academic Center Approved

STURBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) — Trustees of Old Sturbridge Village Monday approved preliminary designs for a new \$11 million educational center to make the "living museum" even more lifelike.

When working drawings are completed in four to six months, trustees will decide on authorizing construction of the center and a \$14 million addition and gateway building, according to James Blaisdell, director of public information.

The modern design, the education center will be divided into learning studios where children will be able to use ear-aiding devices and approved by the National Democratic Party Committee, State Chairman John M. Bailey announced Monday.

"They will be able to experience something in history, rather than just read about it," he said.

A "substantial gift" from the family of George B. Wells, one of the village's founders, will be the basis of a matching fund drive to finance the new building. The target date for completion is late 1973 or early 1974.

The buildings will not intrude on the reconstructed Sturbridge village to recreate a rural and agricultural village of 1700 to 1800 period.

The village, which opened 25 years ago in 1946, is also planning reconstruction of a second Harriet Beecher Stowe school.

Apartment Plans, Borrow Pit Tabled

Application for Stage 1 approval of apartments off Main St. and for a borrow pit operation off Tolland Tpk. were tabled by the Planning and Zoning Commission last night after both ran into public opposition.

The application by Oriswood and Puss Engineering, Inc. for approval of 28 existing apartment units at 210 Main St. was shelved pending submission of additional information regarding a drainage problem that may exist at the rear of the existing property.

The engineering firm is seeking approval for 28 more townhouse units on 3.1 acres in Zone A at the rear of properties at 180 and 182 Main St., which are presently owned by John S. Wolcott and Lester S. Wolcott, respectively.

Atty. Leon Podrove, representing the applicants, said they have firm agreements with the owners to purchase the site, which he termed "particularly well suited for the use intended."

Diana charged that the applicants had "flagrantly violated the regulations" and asked for denial of the permit. If the commission granted it, he said, it should impose restrictions to ensure protection for its clients.

Long-time Use. Among documents presented by Podrove was a letter from Town Engineer Walter deGowen stating that the project site can be drained using dry wells for the lower (west) portion and storm drains into Main St. for the higher portion of the land. The use of dry wells was questioned by Paul Sombrie of 97 Oxford St. His property borders the firm's existing apartments which are served by a similar system.

Sombrie said that on at least two occasions blockage of the system has caused water to flood onto his property.

Podrove said he was not aware of an existing problem and noted that it was up to the commission to make sure any system installed was properly designed.

Private Drive. Sombrie also wanted to know whether there were any plans for a private drive to the proposed site through an Oxford St. lot owned by Walter Fuss, one of the applicants, that lies adjacent to his property.

Both Atty. Podrove and Town Planner J. Eric Potter stated for the record that there were no plans for a private drive for that purpose it would have to be the subject of a separate public hearing.

Stewart Wolcott of 174 Main St. also spoke against the application, saying he thought more apartments there would create a traffic problem on Main St. He also said it is his understanding that five main lanes in the area have only a four-foot diameter, which he charged would be inadequate in case of a serious fire.

Borrow Pit. The application for a borrow pit, filed by Carl Holland et al., requested permission to conduct land excavation operations on a 4.4-acre parcel off the north side of Tolland Tpk., east of Glode Lane. The area is in Rural Residence Zone.

The site has been intermittently used as a borrow pit over the years since before zoning regulations were established, according to testimony brought out at the hearing.

Operations were started again recently, but were ordered halted by the town after complaints were received from neighbors. The owners did not have a valid permit and were told to apply for a new one, Potter stated. "They are here tonight by direction," he said.

Recent regulations on the zoning books are designed to regulate borrow pit operations so as to minimize hazards and nuisance factors such as noise and dust in the surrounding area.

Atty. Vincent Diana, representing neighbors opposed to the operation, called several witnesses who testified that runoff from exposed high ground on the site repeatedly flooded Tolland Tpk., causing washouts and highway icing in the winter that have contributed to several accidents.

Gabor, a Hungarian-born British citizen who works at the Columbia Broadcasting System laboratories in Stamford, developed the holographic system known as holography. It gives depth and dimension to photographs, enabling doctors, for example, to "look around" a tumor to judge whether it is malignant.

Herberg's award, the Royal Swedish Academy of Science said, came for his "contributions to the knowledge of the structure and geometry of molecules, particularly free radicals."

The citation said Herberg's research gave "extremely precise information" on elements and in turn gave scientists an idea of the distance between atoms which make up a molecule.

"The process he developed in 1948 at the University of London uses a laser beam, the concentrated beam of light that does not spread out the way a flashlight beam does. Holography, according to a Fortune magazine study, has grown into a worldwide business that grosses several hundred million dollars a year. It is used in industry, medicine, topographical mapping and media communications, where ever true dimensional depth and color is under way in its use in detecting heart disease by a process called ultrasonography.

Dr. Gabor also holds a patent for the use of X-rays of tumors on D-movies, but spokesman for CBS Laboratories in Stamford said this use of the process appears to be years away.

Gabor's three-dimensional images in color are so realistic that they can be used in the film industry to determine the hardness or softness of substances.

The viewer of a holographic image can see around the photographed objects by moving his head, just as he looks around real objects. Because of the property, the use of the process in X-rays of tumors enables a doctor to judge the size of a malignancy and "to look around it."

The Nobel citation also noted that Gabor, who has worked mainly in electron optics and information theory, "has made fundamental analyses of the information content of wave fields." It also pointed out that his interest in social problems in connection with technical development has manifested itself in two books, "Inventing the Future" and "Innovations," both written in the late 1960s.

A respected, balding man with an imposing silver mustache, Gabor was educated at Budapest, took a doctorate at the Technische Hochschule in Berlin and worked in German laboratories until he emigrated to England.

He is still professor emeritus and senior research fellow at the University of London's Imperial College of Science and Technology, won the Royal Society's Rumford medal in 1968 and the Cristoforo Colombo prize of the International Institute of Communications in Geneva four years ago.

Lorin Maazel Unimpressive As Conductor

A bus driver who got lost kept several thousand people waiting last night in UConn's Jorgenson Auditorium, when two-thirds of the New Philharmonia Orchestra of London managed to make it to the hall but the final third was wandering around in the woods somewhere, so that the concert finally got under way somewhat over a half hour late.

Lorin Maazel conducted, and in view of his recent appointment to head the Cleveland Orchestra, this fact was of considerable interest. Mr. Maazel comes to prominence as a prodigy with the baton and owes his reputation to this circumstance. The fact is, however, that he is not a very good conductor.

People in Cleveland are going to be sadly disappointed in him, I'm afraid, after the years they had with George Szell, who was one of the world's truly great conductors. It is always hard to follow in the shoes of the great but it is my opinion that Mr. Maazel, sleeping in Mr. Szell's shoes, will be able to execute "right face" leaving the footman completely unmoved.

True enough, the New Philharmonia is not a great orchestra. It exists, so far as I know, solely to make recordings, and a assembled only when some company wants a competent and relatively cheap orchestra for some conductor to record with.

On an extended tour like this playing only one or two programs under the same conducting for all the time, any aggression of music should be to sound well. Last night it sounded adequate and no more.

Mr. Maazel has a poor beat and the orchestra tends to play in spite of him, rather than because of him. He also tends to subdivide his beat unduly, which makes things stick in the groove, however beneficial it may be for ensemble in involved passages.

The music failed to flow and to have coherence last night. It went from note to note rather than from phrase to phrase and there seemed to be no large, overall conception of the composition.

The program, incidentally, comprised the Seventh Symphony of Beethoven; Bartok's "Music for Strings, Percussion and Celeste"; "Parsifal," a nocturne by Frederic Delius; and "Till Eulenspiegel's Merry Pranks" by Strauss. I happen to like the final number, but I didn't stay to hear it played, since I was positive I had heard innumerable better performances than I was likely to hear last night.
