Coventry Town Council Appropriates Funds for Additional Teacher

The Town Council last night approved an appropriation of \$4,274.44 as requested by the Board of Education, so that a sixth second grade teacher can be hired at Coventry Grammar School. The amount approved by the council equals the amount of additional ADM grant money released by Gov. Meskill which has not been included in the current budget.

This extra ADM money is considered "unallocated surplus" and would normally be a part of the school board budget.

Second grade teachers at CGS had brought a grievance before the school board asking for an extra teacher, since class enrollment runs from 20 to 29 in the current setup.

Superintendent of Schools Dr. Donald Hardy was present at last night's council session to make the presentation, as was school board chairman G. Richard Messier.

Hardy noted that the teacher will be hired as of Dec. 1 with an estimated salary for the remainder of the year of \$5,648.80 including fringe benefits.

The differences between this figure and the amount of ADM money will be absorbed by the board through monies from maternity leaves. Teachers now on maternity leave are replaced during their absence by substitutes, who are paid at a lower rate.

The school board also requested \$1100 last night for implementation of the adult education program, half of which would be reimbursable, but the council took no action on this following Chairman Albert Bradley's comment that he considered it "unfair" for the school board to present data at a meeting and expect the council to act on it immediately.

The school board had made a similar request several weeks ago, which was not acted upon.

Bradley, in suggesting deferring action on the adult education program, noted the long-term implications of expenses that might result from this request and suggested further that the \$1,100 request be turned over to the finance committee for further study.

In answer to a citizen request several weeks ago, Acting Town Manager Elizabeth Ryehling (Dennis Moore is on vacation) reoriented on the procedure for filing complaints.

She noted "It is neither our intent nor desire to establish stringent guidelines as to the registration of complaints relating to the violation of the zoning regulations, housing codes, public health codes or other town or state statutes."

Mrs. Ryehling noted that she and Building Inspector John Williams had discussed complaints with Town Attorney John Sheehan who recommended several guidelines.

"Except in cases where notification is received of a violation actually in progress, where a delay in investigating would hinder or make difficult enforcement of the regulations, a written complaint will be required. We will also consider oral complaints when they concern violations which can be seen from the road. There are several reasons for this position."

"In all serious violations, we must proceed as though we are building a court case to insure that our enforcement is not ruled invalid should we reach the courts. A written complaint strengthens our position."

Intimidation "situations" may develop where citizens attempt to use town officials to intimidate, or harass neighbors. The frequency of these false or inaccurate complaints is reduced by requiring complaints in writing. The rights of the supposed violator must be protected as well as the interest of the community.

"The town is responsible for the correction of violations and enforcing compliance with the town's regulations. We investigate complaints to see if they are valid. We do not accept them as proof that a violation exists. Written complaints tend to be more complete, thus aiding our investigation."

"Any citizen who knows of a violation of any law has the moral and legal responsibility to report the violation to the proper official through established procedures and to be prepared to support his complaint."

In conclusion, I want to emphasize that there will be exceptions to the above. This is why we do not intend on formulating a stringent policy. The town's enforcing officer must have the ability to accept written or oral complaints as he deems necessary. However, the guidelines prepared by Atty. Sheehan will generally be followed."

20 Flee Blaze At Waterbury

WATERBURY (AP) — Firemen said about 20 persons were hanging out windows of the hotel when they arrived shortly before midnight. Aerial ladders were used to bring them to safety.

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Coventry Council Quiet On Bid for Raid Probe

The Coventry Town Council refused to comment last night on requests by the Connecticut Civil Liberties Union that it initiate an independent investigation into charges the police department unreasonably vandalized Coventry homes in a drug raid last Thursday.

In a letter read by Bruce Stave, CCLU representative, at a meeting of the council last night, Executive Director William Oida called it a strong suggestion that "some members of the Coventry Police Department... allegedly participated in malicious destruction of personal property."

An emotional crowd of 150 moved with the council from the small board room at the town hall to the high school auditorium, by request of the fire marshal and allegedly blasted and praised the police and their chief, Robert Kjelquist.

No Comment The council chose not to comment on demands for an investigation, according to chairman Albert Oida. In order not to prejudice pending court action against three persons arrested in the raid, and "possible citizens to raise legal action against the town."

Board of Education member Robert Walsh said this morning he and certain officials of the CCLU might take action to force an investigatory town meeting, if the council fails to initiate action.

Deny Sargent, his wife, cautioned last night, "to discriminate between those police who did wrong, and those who didn't."

She said no one should "cut the open as soon as possible," any group into a general mold.

Residents of the raided home at Rte. 44A and 31 in Coventry said their lawyers, J. Vincent Hauser of Willimantic, and Arthur Melisar plan civil action against Coventry police who they said, reduced their home to shambles in a destructive search for drugs.

Like most who spoke to the council, Democratic Town Chairman Alvin Phillips questioned the ability of the police to function potently in an atmosphere of scandal, and insisted an immediate probe should be conducted to bring to justice those involved.

Walter Snow, former news editor of the Willimantic Chronicle, said he deplored the performance of Coventry police in the last 12 years, and said some Coventry police were "slovers, semi-thugs, those who like to push people around."

Police Absent William Dickson of Coventry, a member of the council, said in the absence of the police, none of whom attended the meeting, and Paul Dishi criticized the townpeople for failing to defend the police, whom he called, "prudent men doing their jobs."

The town council met with Kjelquist Saturday morning to discuss the drug raid, but Bradley did not say if any conclusions had been reached.

Three persons were charged with possession of marijuana after the search, which was carried out by Kjelquist and his men with a warrant. Kjelquist would not say how much marijuana was seized, but he said earlier that other arrests are expected.

Tom Sargent of Waterfront Park in Coventry, who organized a band of "establishment" citizens to raise legal funds for the youths, and to clean up the wreckage, said yesterday morning he suspected the search warrant was defective.

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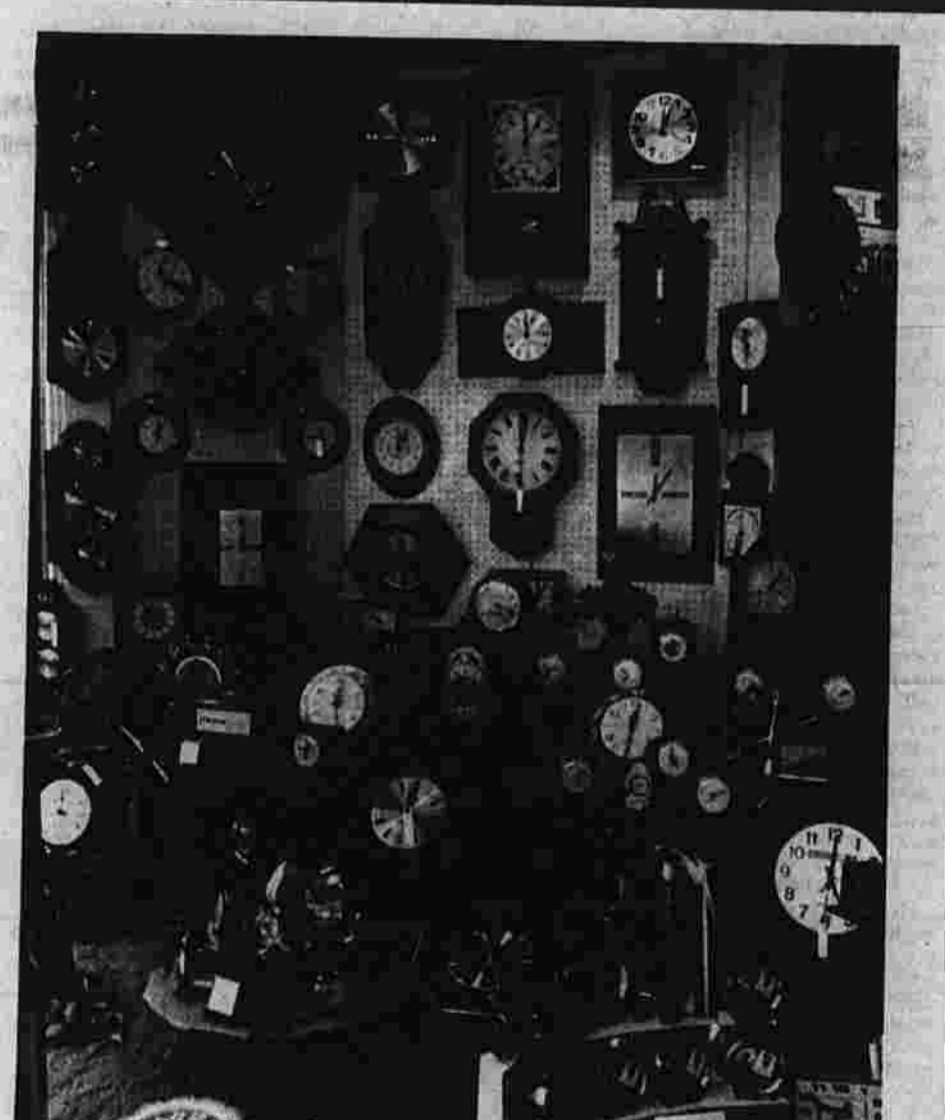
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Minister Quits After Landslide

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Nixon Signs \$21.3 Billion Military Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Nixon signed today a \$21.3-billion military procurement bill but said he would ignore one of its provisions — the Mansfield amendment urging him to set a final date for the withdrawal of all U.S. forces in Indochina.

Nixon said in a statement that the amendment "is without binding force or effect, and it does not reflect my judgment about the way the war should be brought to a conclusion."

The President charged, too, that "legislative actions such as this hinder rather than assist in the search for a negotiated settlement."

The procurement authorization bill provides for continuation of construction on the anti-ballistic missile system, as well as other research and development programs. It also includes an amendment removing the President's authority to ban chrome imports from Rhodesia.

Press secretary Ronald L. Ziegler said the Rhodesian amendment, a congressional move to force resumption of the imports, does not go into effect until January 1972. And, Ziegler said, Nixon will take no action nor have any comment while negotiations are underway between Britain and Rhodesia on the future of the white settler rebel government in South Africa.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Abraham Ribicoff, D-Conn., has demanded from the Agriculture Department names of 98 poultry firms a team of government investigators says are processing birds for consumers under "unacceptable sanitary conditions."

A sternly worded report Tuesday by the General Accounting Office, which did not identify the companies, said the dirty conditions found in a survey this year may be generally widespread.

The report was sought by Ribicoff, chairman of a government operations subcommittee, as a follow-up to earlier studies of meat and poultry inspection programs operated by the Consumer and Marketing Service in USDA.

"In GAO's opinion, this situation is indicative of a lack of strong, day-to-day enforcement by the agency's plant inspectors and a lack of effective supervisory review," the report said.

"Weakness in the agency's enforcement of sanitation standards may be widespread," it added.

Meanwhile, Ribicoff said the GAO report allowed families are buying and eating poultry processed in "filthy and refuse" allowed by "ineffective inspection procedures."

Ribicoff cited an investigator's description of conditions (See Page Three)

U.S. Calls Reds' Barbs in U.N. 'Empty Cannons of Rhetoric'

WASHINGTON (AP)—American officials say Red China's anti-U.S. barbs at the United Nations were "disappointing" and "unhappily predictable," but they will not affect President Nixon's Peking visit next year.

Embassador George Bush termed Peking's inaugural U.N. speech Tuesday "a disappointing" for all those who wish to see the United Nations promote the goals of peace and progress.

However, Bush said, the criticisms of the United States were only "empty cannons of rhetoric."

China had charged the United States with trying to keep the mainland cut off of the world body, and demanded U.S. withdrawal from Taiwan and Indochina.

But officials in Washington said statement alone will not affect plans for President Nixon's trip, which will be further coordinated next month when a second White House advance party is due to visit Peking.

In his foreign-affairs report to the nation last February, Nixon said mainland China "continues to convey to the United States and to the world its determination to cast us in the role of the devil."

Our modest efforts to prove otherwise have not reduced Peking's doctrine of enmity toward us.

"So long as this is true, so adamant for hostility, there is little we can do by ourselves to improve the relationship," he added. "What we can do, we will."

Since then, Nixon's efforts led to the visit by Dr. Henry Kissinger to Peking in July, and his trip in October to perfect arrangements for the Nixon trip.

Communist China's propaganda blasts at the United States have moderated somewhat. Last spring they described Nixon's hands as "red with blood" because of his Vietnamization policy which Peking claimed prolongs the war.

The latest New China news Agency attack on Nixon came Tuesday and called him "hyocritonal" because he had announced that 45,000 American troops were being withdrawn in December and January from South Vietnam. The broadcast called for total withdrawal.

Some U.S. authorities expect that a form of two-track diplomacy will develop with Peking saying one thing out loud and another in private.

In any event, the official view of China's U.N. attack on the United States was, in Bush's words, that "there was nothing new in the intertemporal language."

Parliament Nullified In Thailand Coup

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — Premier Thanom Kittikachorn assumed absolute power today by abolishing parliament, dissolving his cabinet and suspending the constitution.

Tanks surrounded the parliament building and paratroop reinforcements were brought in from Bangkok, but the city was calm.

Thailand is strongly anti-Communist. The 60-year-old premier, who came up through the military and has the rank of field marshal, told the nation that he is heading a revolution.

Cabinet ministers seemed unaware of what was coming. Thanom Khoman, who has been foreign minister, heard the announcement on a portable radio at dinner.

The announcement said there was no change in the structure of the military and police commands. The Revolutionary Council ordered all officials to continue working, and asked that the people attend to business and remain calm.

While Thailand has been a backer of U.S. policy in Southeast Asia, it has also started to reappraise its views toward Red China. The Thai Senate that China is hobnobbing an insurgency which has threatened to overthrow the government.

"Somehow or other we have mastered the political forms of Europe and America," he said. "Changes will have to happen in an abrupt manner."

"This is not an event that will bring people into the streets. It is an event that will bring calm and order and dedication."

"I take satisfaction in the development. The only regret I have is that it could not have taken a more revolutionary form."

It was in effect a return to the conditions that prevailed before parliament was reconstituted in 1968. There were 10 years of military rule before that. Thanom's predecessor, Sarit Thanarat, was also a field marshal. He died in 1963.

The action was a surprise, but it reflected the government's dissatisfaction with demands for a more revolutionary form.

There was no indication of a coup. The Senate rejected 44-to-25 today an amendment to continue the 7 per cent excise tax on autos after a 15-month suspension instead of repealing the tax outright.

The defeated amendment, offered by Sens. Alan Cranston, D-Calif., and Adlai E. Stevenson III to the \$25.5 billion tax cut bill, would have suspended the levy from Aug. 15 this year to Dec. 31, 1972.

The tax then would have been reimposed and the \$2.2 billion in annual revenue collected given to such purposes as mass transit and air pollution control.

"At a time when our states are pleading for federal help," Cranston said, "we must not turn our backs on billions in revenues which we could share with local governments to meet critical transportation problems."

Managers of the bill, opposing the amendment, said that means is formally challenged and will be voted on by the labor-management-policy body.

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South Viets To Begin Air Strikes Against Ho Chi Minh Supply Trail

SAIGON (AP)—For the first time in the Vietnam war, the South Vietnamese air force will soon begin regular strikes against the Ho Chi Minh supply trail in eastern Laos.

Informal sources said today that the South Vietnamese would join the U.S. Air Force and Navy during the next six months in bombing North Vietnamese troops and supplies moving south along the trail network during the dry season.

South Vietnamese participation initially will be token, a few missions flown each day compared to hundreds by American fliers. Informal sources said there is no aggression of the land air wing.

But three Democratic senators—George McGovern of South Dakota, Fred R. Harris of Oklahoma, and Hubert H. Humphrey of Minnesota promptly told him they view with misgivings his ties with huge agribusiness firms, and McGovern declared:
